## Officials weigh ideas to stop roaming oryx

■ The African antelope introduced to White Sands Missile Range now number about 3,000 and are wandering off the range in record numbers.

Rancher Jim McDonald said he doesn't like the idea of hunters roaming his land without his knowledge.

But a decision by the state Game and Fish Commission to issue 500 permits for a year-round oryx hunt means hunters "could be driving around with a rifle sticking out the window" year-round, he said.

**"Maybe this is not the best method, but we're going to try it."**

The debate over private property rights and road access to public land is scheduled for discussion at 10 a.m. Thursday during the Lincoln County commission meeting in the county courthouse in Carrizozo. Four private ranches are affected.

Representatives from the U.S. Bureau of Land Management will discuss three options under consideration, according to a memorandum from County Manager Tom Stewart.

They are to increase signage to improve access to public land, to ask the county to re-open roads previously vacated, or for BLM to build a road across state land requested by the Game and Fish Department.

Darrel Weybright with the department's wildlife division, explained that oryx, an African antelope, was introduced into the White Sands Missile Range along U.S. 380 under a multi-agency agreement and with assurances to the BLM that the animals would be kept on the range.

When they started to move off, damaging fences and driving livestock away from water, targeted hunts were scheduled. But those hunts weren't doing the job because the oryx population exploded to about 3,000. The animals are coming off the range in greater numbers, he said.

"We think an open hunt will be more efficient and means less administrative work for us," he said. "The numbers are increasing off range. Maybe this is not the best method, but we're going to try it."

The county Public Lands Use Advisory Council discussed the issue in late August and said the county should not be saddled with building and maintaining roads for the hunt.

## Rural health clinics present challenges

■ Health care needs, geography, funding and regulation combine to make managing the facilities a complicated matter.

Management of rural health clinics in Lincoln County isn't a simple issue, county officials illustrated recently.

For the village of Corona, which embarked on a grant and state-funded construction project to provide a better building with running water for its health clinic, rules are getting in the way of providing service.

James Gibson, administrator of the county-owned hospital in Ruidoso, said if the town decides to operate its new clinic, officials will have to obtain a license for the building and will have to follow state procurement codes to select a service provider, who also must be

licensed.

Currently, Corona is piggybacking on the Carrizozo Medical Clinic management contract with Presbyterian HealthCare Services for a once-a-week visit under an unofficial arrangement. Presbyterian also manages the county hospital, the Lincoln County Medical Center.

Once a new "official" clinic is built with Community Development Block Grant money, the rules change, Gibson told county commissioners at a meeting last month.

"We won't be allowed to continue as we are now," he said.

Village officials in Corona thought the service would continue as currently provided, said village clerk Kathy Munos.

"We put in space for a pharmacy lab and dental offices for the future," she said. "We were just trying to get a place for a clinic. Now we hear that (physician's assistant) Ernie

Gonzales may not even be able to provide for us."

Construction and renovation begins Jan. 1, and the building — the old city hall — should be ready by summer, she said.

"I won't provide services at an approved clinic without a state license," Gibson said. "It is against the law. Presbyterian fully supports creating a clinic there, but I would be remiss if I didn't put a problem I see on the table."

Munos said, "I'm just trying to provide hot water. Right now we have no hot water and no windows in the door."

County Attorney Alan Morel said he could help walk Corona officials through the process.

"If they (Corona officials) want the county to operate it as a county clinic, we will need to lease it, so we can control the building and issue an R. P. request for proposals for man-

## County gets to work on redistricting 'jigsaw puzzle'

Trying to fit Lincoln County's population into five equal commission districts is like putting together a jigsaw puzzle, County Clerk Martha Proctor said.

This is the second time she's tackled the project, but this time around, it's a little easier because of a computer program used by consultant Rod Adair.

District lines are redrawn every 10 years in line with new population information contained in the U.S. Census.

The Republican state senator from Roswell, a demographer, was hired to help Proctor come up with some options for commissioners to review. Proctor said Wednesday four plans will be presented at the commission's meeting Nov. 15 in the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

The session starts at 8 a.m., but redistricting isn't scheduled until after 10 a.m.

"They may not like any of them and send us back to start over," Proctor said.

The challenge is to take a population that grew from about 12,000 in 1990 to 19,411 a decade later and divide residents evenly with only a 5 percent variance, more or less, explained County Manager Tom Stewart.

Complicating the situation is that the census used large blocks of land when it started because growth was not anticipated in this area. The population is defined in each block, which has to be preserved in redrawing district lines.

Expected or not, growth happened. Proctor said her job would be a lot easier if the blocks were a lot smaller.

Based on data from Adair, Commissioner Leo Martinez's District 3 is substantially the largest of the five with 4,317 people in nine square miles, followed by Commissioner L. Ray Nunley's District 2 with 4,110 people in 24 square miles — both primarily in Ruidoso. Commissioner William Schwettmann's District

4 in Alto and Capitan is close behind with 3,961 people and covering 966 square miles. Trailing behind is the more rural District 1 spread over 2,625 square miles in western and northern

Lincoln County, represented by Chairman Rex Wilson with 3,216 people. District 5, covering 1,209 square miles in the eastern part of the county, has a population of 3,807 and Rick Simpson as commissioner.

Proctor said to get around a state freeze on precinct lines until mid-January, she has created subprecincts that can be used to shift population groupings.

The new districts must be adopted by Feb. 1, but Proctor said she hopes commissioners give the nod to new lines by the end of December to allow potential candidates for commission seats to assess their positions.

Another challenge she faces is the directive to try to group together areas of like interests and character.

"For instance, Alto is a higher income bedroom community and we would try not to link it with high traffic or blight areas," Proctor said.

If commissioners favor a particular plan, they probably will set a public hearing for input, she said. Under all four plans, the lines for every commission district change, she said.

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





"The current board is advisory, but I recommend an independent board that reports to the commission and that could hold providers' feet to the fire," Gibson said. "I would want to be as intimately involved with the board as I am on the hospital board." Morel said he's not convinced that the county could legally get around the state procurement code that requires bidding every four years on management contracts. "I'll run it past the DFA (state Department of Finance and Administration)," he said. "The commission must decide sooner or later if staff at the Carrizozo clinic are to be county employees. That's the first step."

## Opportunity knocks on the reservation

The tribal election brings back a familiar name

**O**pportunities knocked, even if a bit tentatively, for members of the Mescalero Apache Tribe last week.

They elected a new president with a very familiar surname. Mark Chino will on Jan. 11 take the office his father, Wendell, had held for almost 40 years.

Mark Chino's 67-vote margin over incumbent Sara Miguez wasn't huge, but it was most striking in that President Miguez (for many years Wendell Chino's chief assistant) had followed a gubernatorial style many observers said replicated that of her long-time boss.

By choosing a younger Chino to lead them, it seems to us that tribal members were looking for a fresh approach,

not necessarily in revolt against the "old guard," but with hope that a new face with an honored name could better help them face the challenges of a new millennium.

The Mescalero Apache people made great progress in the latter half of the 20th century. Wendell Chino, by force of will, created a model for self-sufficiency emulated by many other tribes.

With Ferris Palmer as vice president and a mood for change apparent, President-elect Mark Chino was right on with his commitment to, early in his term, call a general meeting for tribal members to express their concerns, and then to prioritize those concerns.

That is the democratic process at its best.

## On appeal, ADA plaintiffs lose

**COLUMBUS, Ohio** — The nation's appellate courts have overwhelmingly ruled against people suing under the employment provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act, according to new research.

The study of federal appellate court cases from 1992 to 2000 found that between 83 and 89 percent of the decisions per year in employment-related ADA cases favored the defendants.

In other words, those who claimed discrimination because of disabilities won fewer than 17 percent of their cases on appeal, said Ruth Colker, professor of law at Ohio State University and author of the study.

"The judiciary has been hostile to plaintiffs in ADA employment cases," Colker said. "This suggests that litigation — particularly appellate litigation involving employment issues — has not been an effective vehicle for ADA enforcement."

Enacted in 1990, the ADA was designed to protect the rights of people with disabilities in employment, public entities and public accommodations.

This study focused on the employment title of the ADA and involved 730 relevant cases in the appeals courts between 1992 and 2000 that were available electronically through Westlaw.

The results showing plaintiffs winning fewer than 17 percent of their cases on appeal includes those in which the plaintiffs won in the original trial court, Colker noted.

It is particularly surprising

that ADA plaintiffs are losing on appeal even when they won in the original trial court, Colker said, because the rules of law are biased toward affirming lower court decisions.

About 60 percent of defendants in ADA cases who lost at the original trial had the decisions against them reversed in appeals court — well above the average for other types of cases, she said.

Colker compared her data to that from a study by Stewart J. Schwab and Theodore Eisenberg of Cornell University, who also looked at cases in federal appeals courts. Comparing data from the two studies, Colker concluded that ADA plaintiffs fared about half as well as plaintiffs in commercial litigation cases.

"Despite the bias toward affirmances on appeal, plaintiffs are losing their ADA cases on appeal at an astonishing rate," she said. "The high rate of reversal of pro-plaintiff trial court judgments suggests a hostility to ADA plaintiffs by the courts of appeals rather than poor litigation judgment by plaintiffs."

Colker said that if the ADA were consistently enforced, plaintiffs would likely do better in court as time went on because plaintiff lawyers would learn which cases have the best chance of success based on previous court decisions.

However, the results show the success rate of plaintiffs has not improved over the years.

"We have seen a consistent line of decisions which moves the statute in a pro-defendant direction," she said.

### A gas service monopoly?

To the editor:

Does the board of Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas or the citizens of the area who have called me really know what a monopoly is? For all of their information, Webster's Dictionary defines monopoly as: exclusive control of commodity or service in a given market, or control that makes possible the fixing of prices and the virtual elimination of free competition; or exclusive possession or control of something. Therefore, neither CCNG nor Zia Gas can be called a monopoly because there are other means of fuel available in the area...

Furthermore, Zia is a public utility, (its) rates controlled by the Public Regulatory Commission... (it) cannot set rates to suit; any rate changes must be approved by the PRC. This is not the case with CCNG; (it is) not PRC regulated and can change rates from month to month...

In the gas bills just received from

CCNG ... a letter ... states that Zia is a private enterprise company, and; if CCNG is sold there would be a monopoly created on gas service. Well, if you want to look at it that way, fine — but you could say that CCNG has a monopoly right now...because we in the Capitan-Carrizozo area do not have the choice of using Zia or CCNG but are limited to CCNG and its rates. Granted, we do have the choice of using alternative fuels, but natural gas is clean and safe compared to some of the other fuels...

CCNG ... states... that we have a say in our local gas company by attending gas board meetings and contacting our local representatives. ... (That) is a laugh; at the board meetings they have public input, but primarily executive sessions...and the requests made... ignored or tabled. As far as rates go, they told us at the last (Capitan) meeting that gas rates can be lowered by borrowing money to expand the gas lines to a larger size. ... just another way to increase indebtedness and not solve the overall problem — giving us rates that are comparable to Zia's...

Furthermore, the survey is on the back of our monthly statement. There is no way this survey can be anonymous; I feel that it can be intimidating...

Again, I'm calling for an immediate public hearing, not the information issued in our statements (but) by letters and surveys on the back of our gas bill.

## Two postal workers' deaths examined

**BALTIMORE, Md.** — The Center for Civilian Biodefense Studies at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health and the National Institutes of Health (NIH) have published a case study examining the deaths of two Washington, D.C., postal workers who died from inhalational anthrax as the result of the bioterrorism attack.

Both postal employees worked at the Brentwood, N.J., facility, which processed an anthrax-laden letter mailed to Senator Tom Daschle on Oct. 9, 2001. The report, which appears in the Nov. 12 online edition of the Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA), illustrates the difficulty doctors and clinicians face in distinguishing the symptoms of anthrax from a number of other common illnesses.

The report also emphasizes the need for better communication of epidemiological information to front-line medical providers and the need for rapid diagnostic tests for anthrax and other dangerous pathogens that could be used as biological weapons.

"The symptoms of anthrax look like many other common diseases. None of the doctors who treated these patients suspected anthrax until they heard reports of other sick postal workers from the news media," says the study's lead author, Luciana Borio, MD, a fellow at the Johns Hopkins Center for Civilian Biodefense Studies and the Critical Care Medicine Department, Clinical Center, at NIH. "These cases emphasize the importance of developing more rapid lines of communication

between medicine and public health.

Clinicians need information to make a proper diagnosis and provide timely treatment for their patients," adds Dr. Borio.

According to the report, a 47-year-old male postal worker developed "flu-like" symptoms on Oct. 16, which he attributed to food poisoning. A few days later, he sought medical attention in an emergency room, where he received intravenous fluids and anti-nausea medications. He was sent home after his symptoms improved.

On Oct. 22, the man eventually collapsed at home and was taken to the hospital. Doctors then suspected the man had inhalational anthrax after learning from media reports of two other postal workers hospitalized with the disease. The patient was treated with multiple antibiotics, but died five hours later.

The second postal worker began feeling ill on Oct. 17. The 55-year-old male visited a primary care doctor complaining of weakness, muscle aches, and fever. The man was diagnosed with a viral infection, but the symptoms persisted. By Oct. 21, the postal worker was admitted to the hospital. Once again, doctors suspected inhalational anthrax after hearing media reports of similar cases.

Doctors treated the man with antibiotics, but he died after 13 hours. The next day, his blood culture came back positive Bacillus anthracis.

"These cases also demonstrate the urgent need for better disease detection

capacities in the public health and clinical communities. This should be a priority in our strategy to improve response to biological attacks and other outbreaks," explains Dr. Borio.

It is important to note that the nasal swab of the first postal worker to die from inhalational anthrax was negative, underscoring that the nasal swab cannot be used as a clinical diagnostic test.

"Our report demonstrates the need for rapid diagnostic tests to distinguish an early anthrax infection from other diseases with similar symptoms. More research is needed in this area and should be a high priority on a national research agenda to respond to threats of bioterrorism," says co-author Thomas Inglesby, M.D., deputy director of Center for Civilian Biodefense Studies and assistant professor of infectious diseases at the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine.

Dr. Borio says that the rapid release of this information to the medical community was only possible because of the collaboration of several groups, such as the doctors and nurses from Greater Southeast Community Hospital, Southern Maryland Hospital Center, the medical examiners for the State of Maryland and the District of Columbia, the expedient review of JAMA, and the patient's families, who gave her permission to publish the manuscript in JAMA.

"Hopefully, this case report will help other front line health care providers who may be dealing with anthrax patients in the future," adds Dr. Borio.

# Commissioners sort out redistricting plan

Proposed changes to district boundaries have Lincoln County officials shaking their heads.

Shaking his head as he pointed out proposed boundary changes for Lincoln County commission districts, Commissioner Leo Martinez said Monday his district receives the biggest whammy.

District 3 is moved south and east, putting his home in Commissioner L. Ray Nunley's District 2 under one plan and in Commissioner William Schwettmann's District 4 under another.

Representation in Ruidoso, the county's population center, might be splintered into three different districts, diluting its influence by coupling it with other areas with historically heavier voter turnout, he said. In another scenario, Ruidoso, if it has the bulk of voters in three districts, could send three commissioners to the board.

But under the options to be reviewed Thursday at the commission meeting, Martinez is the only commis-

sioner who couldn't run again when his current term expires in 2004, without moving his residence or waiting two more years to run in another district, because of staggered terms.

Schwettmann also is shifted out of his district under one option, but he has served two consecutive terms and can't run again when his term ends in 2002.

Other commissioners also weren't pleased with what they've seen so far, but Chairman Rex Wilson urged that commissioners put aside emotions and look at the numbers.

"This is very preliminary, this is strictly by the numbers and technically, that what we need to look at," he said Tuesday. "Just to look at the maps is a mistake. We have to know the criteria and what led up to it. My District 1 and District 3 changed significantly. Clearly, I have to pick up population."

The best way to approach the situation is to look at the area as a brand new county and what would be the best way to set up districts, he said.

"I think when all of us look at that map, there's a certain discomfort," Wilson said. "We realize there are some big changes. But this is why we hired that guy. (demographer Rod

Adair) to do what needs to be done.

"Each district has to have about 3,800 people and can only have a plus or minus of 5 percent, which isn't much room. Other calculations - like ethnic - also are involved. I think it's real important we not deviate much from what (Adair) proposes. There's no bias in this deal at all. It's strictly the numbers and that's the best way to make policy."

Although the district represented by Nunley would stay much the same in all the proposals, the commissioner who is elected from the west side of Ruidoso, said, "I was pretty disappointed in what I saw."

"We were told early on the changes in the districts would be minor. That's what I was expecting. They are anything but that," he said. "I think we have more work to do. I know it's doable to keep the districts pretty well intact as they are now. I'd be willing to work with anyone at any time on

this." Under one plan, Capitan would be split between the districts of Wilson and Commissioner Rick Simpson, which now cover the most rural areas and contain the smallest populations.

Another proposal would lump the high-dollar, bedroom community of Alto Village with the small county seat of Carrizozo and other rural areas under District 1. In that proposal, Simpson's district would pick up all of Capitan and extend to the northern and eastern borders.

Of the four presented, Schwettmann said he favors the proposal to split Capitan, placing a portion into two of the commission districts and cutting it out of his district.

"If I were running again, I wouldn't want to see Capitan split off," Schwettmann said. "They're such fine people. It's like my second home. I personally would miss that."

But it makes sense to lump Alto and parts of Ruidoso together, because

the areas are similar, he said. "As it is now, Rex has three fourths of the county (geographically) and he can't cover it," Schwettmann said.

Simpson said he wants more options. "I didn't see one that I liked," he said. "I know it's a real tough job between trying to work the numbers and lines and get all five equal."

He doesn't like the idea of splitting representation in the villages of Ruidoso Downs, Capitan and Ruidoso, he said.

He will propose a modified approach, if feasible, possibly breaking off chunks of the more populated districts to beef up the less populated, but leaving the bulk of the districts in place - an approach also favored by Martinez.


Wilson said split representation shouldn't be a problem, except for possible confusion on election day.

"We shouldn't focus on our districts much at all," he said of commission decisions on issues. "The other way to look at it is that it would give villages like Capitan two representatives on the board."

The county is heavily Republican and all five commissioners are members of that party.



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# Do You Have Defensible Space?



Removing flammable vegetation reduces the threat of fire. Follow these basic rules to create defensible space that works.

- Remove all dead plants, trees and shrubs from the site.
- Reduce excess leaves, pine needles, plant parts and low-hanging branches.
- Replace dense flammable plants with fire-resistant plants.
- The choice of plants, spacing and maintenance are crucial elements in any defensible space landscaping plan.

### Tips for a Fire-Safe Landscape

- Create a defensible space perimeter by thinning trees and brush within 30 feet around your home.
- Beyond 30 feet, remove dead wood, debris and low tree branches.
- Eliminate small trees and plants growing under trees. They allow ground fires to jump into tree crowns.
- Space trees 30 feet apart and prune to a height of 8 to 10 feet.
- Place shrubs at least 20 feet from any structures and prune regularly.
- Plant the most drought-tolerant vegetation within three feet of your home and adjacent to structures to prevent ignition.
- Provide at least a 10 to 15 foot separation between islands of shrubs and plant groups to effectively break up continuity of vegetation.
- Landscape your property with fire-resistant plants and vegetation to prevent fire from spreading quickly.

### Choose Fire-Resistant Materials

- Check your local nursery, forester or county extension service for advice on fire-resistant plants that are suited for your environment.
- Create fire-safe zones with stone walls, patios, swimming pools, decks and roadways.
- Use rock, mulch, flower beds and gardens as ground cover for bare spaces and as effective firebreaks.
- There are no "fire-proof" plants. Select high moisture plants that grow close to the ground and have a low sap or resin content.
- Choose plant species that resist ignition such as rockrose, iceplant and aloes.
- Fire-resistant shrubs include hedging roses, bush honeysuckles, currant, cotoneaster, sumac and shrub apples.
- Plant hardwood, maple, poplar and cherry trees that are less flammable than pine, fir and other conifers.

### Maintain Your Home and Surrounding Property

- Maintain a well-pruned and watered landscape to serve as a green belt and protection against fire.
- Keep plants green during the dry season and use supplemental irrigation, if necessary.
- Trim grass on a regular basis up to 100 feet surrounding your home.
- Stack firewood at least 30 feet from your home.
- Store flammable materials, liquids and solvents in metal containers outside the home at least 30 feet away from structures and wooden fences.
- No matter where you live, always install smoke alarms on every level of your home. Test them monthly and change the batteries at least once a year. Consider installing the new long-life smoke alarms.

### Maintain Home Heating Systems

- Have your chimney inspected and cleaned annually by a certified specialist.
- Insulate chimneys and place spark arresters on top.
- Extend the chimney at least three feet above the roof.
- Remove branches hanging above and around the chimney.

### Have a Fire Safety and Evacuation Plan

- Install smoke alarms on every level of your home.
- Test them monthly and change the batteries at least once a year.
- Practice fire escape and evacuation plans.
- Mark the entrance to your property with signs that are clearly visible.
- Know which local emergency services are available and have those numbers posted.
- Provide emergency vehicle access through roads and driveways at least 12 feet wide with adequate turnaround space.
- Village ordinance requires you to have your street address visible (minimum 4" in height).

### Follow Local Burning Laws

- Do not burn trash or other debris without proper knowledge of local burning laws, the village of Ruidoso does not allow outside burning of any type!

Did you know the Village of Ruidoso will pick up your pine needles and tree trimmings FREE of charge? Place near road, away from dumpsters and ditches. If commercial, please call for charges and arrangements for pickup. If you have any questions on pickup, call Solid Waste at 257-1502.

## Carrozo student takes over in D.C.

Four from Carrizozo High School attend a government leadership conference and one is elected President by 350 of her peers

Four Carrizozo High School students went to Washington, D.C., to learn about government — but in order to go, they had to jump into the world of fund raising and become entrepreneurs.

Lacey Martin-Burd, Ashley Zamora, Alena Borowski and Anthony Beltran were accepted to attend the National Young Leaders Conference in October, and they had to come up with \$1,130 each to get into the conference, plus about \$300 for transportation.

For Martin-Burd, Zamora and Beltran, that meant raising the money in six weeks. They had car washes, bake sales and the largest enchilada supper Carrizozo has ever seen. The students also approached businesses, relatives and friends for money — and they made it in six weeks.

The theme of the conference was, "The Leaders of Tomorrow Meeting the Leaders of Today." Besides discussing current issues with members of Congress and prominent journalists, the students participated in leadership activities.

Martin-Burd was elected President after a 10-second speech, and then had five minutes to prepare for a press conference about "the 2012 war between China and Taiwan." She was elected from 350 students attending.

"I found myself biting my bottom lip like the President does," she said. "There was an immense amount of pressure and I had to pull answers out of nowhere. It taught me a lot about leadership."

Students also formed a model congress on changing a constitutional amendment on youth firearm safety, and Martin-Burd was called on to testify before the judiciary committee.

Another role-play for participants was to act as the federal budget committee for the 2001 budget and to see how they'd come to the actual budget.

"The National Young Leaders Conference provides an opportunity for students to distinguish themselves as tomorrow's leaders," said Michael Lasday,

executive director of the Congressional Youth Leadership Council, the organization sponsoring the conferences since 1985. "Scholars not only gain knowledge and experience in the nation's capital, they leave with a sense of accomplishment and an increased ability to face the challenges of the future."

Martin-Burd was in Washington Oct. 16-21; the other three Carrizozo students went the following week, arriving at the House of Representatives just after it reopened following the anthrax scare.

Borowski said Rep. Calvin Dooley of California talked to the students about legislation and the Sept. 11 attacks; a representative from Florida was, she said, "an awesome speaker ... Feel good and conquer the world."

Besides attending many briefings and meetings and participating in presidential, congressional and judicial simulations, students were taken on a whirlwind tour of the nation's capital.

They visited many of the national monuments, including the Washington Monument, the Jefferson Memorial, the Holocaust Museum and Arlington Cemetery — the latter made a strong impression on all four of the students.

Beltran said seeing the monuments was a highlight for him.

"You see pictures of them, but in person they seem unreal, like something out of a fairy tale."

Zamora said she was impressed with the way the city was designed and the colors of the trees changing.

"Being at the conference opened up

my mind," Zamora said. "It gave me a sense to let other people's opinions in." "The people are just amazing," Borowski agreed. "Listening to all the different viewpoints and talking to a kid who lived in Manhattan near the Trade Center and listening to debates and arguments."


Beltran talked about a workshop in which two groups of people were given a photograph and asked to describe it without referring to certain objects in the picture.

"We had to figure out what the picture was. It turned out it was the same picture, but with both groups describing the picture, at the beginning you couldn't tell it was the same picture."

All four students said they would like to return to the nation's capital.

Martin-Burd is the only one planning to become a lawyer, but all of them felt they'd learned something about leadership. Beltran and Zamora both want to be psychologists and Borowski wants to be a biotechnologist.

"If you don't set goals that seem unattainable, you'll never know what will happen or could have happened," Martin-Burd said, summing up what she had learned from the conference.

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**BLINK...blink**

You probably never really thought about it, but most of us blink about once every six seconds. When nature demands anything that often, you might guess it is pretty important - and it is, especially if you are wearing contact lenses.

Blinking protects our eyes from the entrance of foreign particles, removes accumulated matter, and pumps tears to replace those which evaporate or have become contaminated. The eyelid acts as a wiper polishing and wetting the surface.

Although blinking may be controlled, it is usually involuntary and occurs in two forms: the spontaneous kind which follows a regular periodic pattern, and the reflex blink which is in response to some stimulation such as dirt in your eye or drying of the surface.

It might seem that there is nothing to worry about. But, that is not always the case, especially when contact lenses are new. Because we feel the lenses, when the lid moves over them, we tend to inhibit the natural urge to blink. Furthermore, soft lenses protect the eye so well that wearers do not even realize that the lens surface is drying out since the eye itself is still moist.

Good blinking habits can also ease computer eye strain. The blink rate during computer use drops by as much as 70% below the normal rate. Good blinking involves closing the eye, not just squinting. It is important to blink properly when reading, driving or performing any visually demanding task.

The loss came just a day after the Warriors got a hard-earned victory over the St. Michael's Horsemen in the semifinals.

The Portales sweep was tough for the girls to accept, but Warrior coach Albert Ronquillo helped to keep things in perspective.

"I told them how proud I was of them. There's a ton of teams that would love to be in their shoes," he said after the match.

### Portales 3, Ruidoso 0

Any concerns about fatigue on Ruidoso's side after winning in five over St. Michael's were thrown out when Portales was pushed the distance by West Las Vegas.

The match was the fifth between the district rivals this year. The Rams had won three of the previous four, including the District 4AAA Championship Oct. 27.

After falling behind two games to none, the Warriors finally looked like the team that got one key win after another in the last half of the year. Ruidoso jumped out to a 7-1 lead and appeared to be well on their way to a fourth game.

Then Portales took over. The Rams scored the next 14 points, including the last eight in a row behind the serving of sophomore Erika Cook.

Ruidoso seemed to self-destruct near the end of the game, either getting in the net or failing to get the ball over on four of the final eight points. That, mixed in with the hard hitting of Portales, sealed Ruidoso's fate.

Warrior senior Carrie Line said the Rams came to play.

The first game was all Portales, as it got up 10-4 thanks to some Warrior mistakes. The Rams went on to a 15-6 win.

But Portales held them off, going back up 12-8 and eventually getting the 15-11 win.

It was a disappointing end for the Warriors and their three seniors, Line, Tania Sanchez and Mara Justus, but Ronquillo gave them credit.

"It's tough to compete against that many seniors and experience," he said. The Rams had 10 seniors back from a 2000 championship squad.

The coach added that he expects to be back here next year. "The goal is to get there again. ... This showed us a lot about what kind of athletes we have in Ruidoso."

### Ruidoso 3, St. Michael's 2

The Warriors came out hot in Friday's state semifinal in Albuquerque, winning the first two games from the Horsemen. Both games were tight, but Ruidoso held off a late rally in the second to win 15-13, after a 15-12 score in the first.

But St. Michael's refused to die, jumping out to a 3-0 lead in the third. Ruidoso tied it up at 4-4 behind the serving of Rachel Loya, and the game was close for a while. But with the Horsemen up 10-8, they turned on the defense, holding Ruidoso scoreless and notching a 15-8 win.

It looked like the Warriors would sew things up in the fourth game, taking a 7-2 lead. But the resiliency of St. Michael's was strong, as it scored eight straight points for a 10-7 lead, thanks to the serving of Ashley Romero and some Ruidoso mistakes.

The Horsemen went on to a 15-9 win to even up the match and force a deciding fifth game.

The rally scoring in the fifth game increased the intensity of the match, as neither team was able to pull ahead by more than two at any point.

St. Michael's started strong, getting up 4-2 on a Ruidoso service error and a kill by Bianca Barola.

But Warriors Carrie Line and Tamara Grant were able to stem the momentum with kills of their own. The game remained close, as it featured eight ties and seven lead changes.

Ruidoso was able to score the last three points of the game, off a Line kill, a mistake by St. Michael's and a service winner by Loya. The 15-13 win gave the Warriors a 3-2 victory and a spot in the State Championship against either Portales or West Las Vegas. That game was still in progress when Ruidoso clinched.

Ronquillo had a lot of praise for St. Michael's after the match.

"They didn't quit going into the third and fourth," he said. "They showed a lot of character."

The coach added that it is important the seniors put the game behind them and see the bigger picture. "We don't really deal on that. We focus on that it's a game and the sun comes up tomorrow," he said.

The year is far from over for Carter, though. He will coach an improving girls golf team in the spring, a task he said he is looking forward to.

"We carry the work ethic over. Obviously coaching football and girls golf are very different things."

As for the football season, the coach said that he was pleased with what his team accomplished in his first year back at the helm, and that he hopes for an even better 2002.

"I'm already drawing up plans for next year," he said.

Tony Lukins scored on an 88-yard interception return and Marcus Dixon ran for two TDs to lead New Mexico State to a 28-17 victory over Arkansas State on Saturday.

The Aggies (4-6, 3-2 Sun Belt) held off a late rally by the Indians (2-7, 2-3).

With the Indians trailing 21-10 with 9:07 remaining in the final period, Sanchez Scherer scored on a 5-yard run to make it 21-17.

But the Aggies bounced back with an eight-play, 81-yard drive capped by Dixon's second TD, a 4-yard run. Keon Johnson had runs of 14 and 40 yards on that drive.

Arkansas State missed two opportunities to take the lead early, with Andy McPherson missing two field goals in the first quarter.

It took the Indians three possessions to score in the first quarter. Jonathan Adams carried it in from 8 yards out with 7:33 left in the period. Adams finished with 189 yards on 31 carries.

After Adams' TD, New Mexico State came back to tie on the next drive, with Dixon

running it in from 2 yards out. McPherson hit a field goal with 3.1 seconds left in the first half to give the Indians a 10-7 lead at the intermission.

Arkansas State, playing with a committee of quarterbacks including Elliot Jacobs, Tommy Miller and Bryan Gauthreaux, had 419 yards of total offense. Gauthreaux led the way with 101 yards passing.

The Indians also dominated time of possession, holding the ball for 37:24. New Mexico State had it for 22:36.

Aggies quarterback K.C. Enzinger, playing with a knee injury suffered in the Middle Tennessee game two weeks ago, passed for 121 yards, giving him 5,160 for his career. It ranks him third on the Aggies' career list.

New Mexico 27, UNLV 17

New Mexico linebacker Gary Davis had his hands wrapped around UNLV's offense all game.

Davis had 15 tackles and recovered a third-quarter fumble that set up the go-ahead

touchdown in New Mexico's 27-17 victory over UNLV on Saturday.

The win keeps alive New Mexico's pursuit of their first bowl bid since 1997.

With the Lobos (5-4, 4-2 Mountain West) trailing 17-14, Davis fell on a fumble by UNLV backup quarterback Kurt Nantkes at the Rebel 23. Casey Kelly threw a 21-yard pass to Holmon Wiggins and fullback Jarrod Baxter went in from there.

New Mexico would not have needed Baxter's bullish run into the end zone if Davis had been able to stay on his feet after Nantkes lost the ball. Davis tried to pick it up, but stumbled and fell.

Two field goals by Vladimir Borombozin -- from 31 and 40 yards -- clinched the Lobos' third straight win.

Borombozin now has hit on a school record 16 straight field goals.

UNLV (3-7, 2-4) played without starting quarterback Jason Thomas, who sat out the game with the flu. Davis' final tackle helped

New Mexico hold UNLV on fourth-and-1 at the Lobos' 36 with 7:30 left in the game. That defensive stand led to Borombozin's second field goal.

Nantkes, protected well most of the game from New Mexico's blitzing defense, completed 12 of 23 passes for 159 yards. But his fumble with 11 minutes left in the third quarter gave New Mexico the break it needed.

The Rebels did their scoring in the first half on a 40-yard run by Dominique Dorsey, a 26-yard pass from Nantkes to Andrew Dubiellak and Dillon Pfeiffer's career-best 49-yard field goal with 44 seconds left in the second quarter.

Wiggins, who had a 66-yard kickoff return in the first half from which New Mexico failed to score, rushed for 76 yards and Baxter added 63 yards as the Lobos rushed for 200 yards.

New Mexico had first half touchdowns on a 21-yard run by Derrick Shepherd and a 1-yard run by Kelly.

The Lobos could have had another one after Wiggins returned a UNLV kickoff to the Rebels' 24 midway through the first quarter. The Lobos drove to the 3 but on the next play UNLV's Adam Seward ripped the ball out of Javier Hanson's hands at the 6-yard line.

### Fishing report for Ruidoso area, Nov. 14, 2001

**Ruidoso River** - It's time to pray for rain again. The river flow rate is well below 2 CFS. Below the confluence of Carrizo Creek the fishing has been outstanding. The water flow in this part of the river is about normal for this time of year, but is dropping due to lack of rain. The water is gin clear so wear clothes that blend in with the background. Large Stoneflies are abundant in the river now. Rock Worms are declining in size and quantity, and Scuds are still on the increase in the waters. Tie a dry fly on as a lead fly then tie a nymph dropper about 12-18" behind. Use the lead fly as your strike indicator. This is an effective and fun way to fish small waters.

**South Fork** - Southfork is about done until Spring. The water flow rate is at a trickle.

**Bonito Lake**: Not much has changed here from last week. If driving to the Bonito area, be aware there is road construction going on, be alert and expect delays. The lake has taken on a green coloration due to a large algae bloom. The fly patterns that have been working are Humbugs, Dark Hendricksons, and Parachute Adam flies have been consistent producers before dark on the main lake body. A damsel fly nymph tied as a dropper behind your dry fly offering continues to bring an unexpected take. For the spin cast fishermen, try a hot pink renegade pattern propeller fly or a black with grizzly hackle propeller fly behind a bubble rig. Remember Bonito closes the Dec. 1 and will reopen the first of April.

**Eagle Lakes**: Eagle Lakes are closed for the season. Grindstone, Damsel fly and Dragon fly imitations continue working well. For spin casters, tie on an Olive or Black propeller fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish. Please remember to squeeze the barbs down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water.

**Lake Mesquero**: The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark wooly buggers continue to take fish late in the day. A few folks have been successful with Parachute Adams, Mosquito, or Hendrickson patterns and casting to rising fish. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk.





## Charges pending Ruidoso cops find suspected meth lab

Investigating a missing-person report, Ruidoso officers found what they believe is a drug-manufacturing operation in a trailer off Mechem Drive.

Ruidoso police discovered what they said appeared to be a methamphetamine lab in Teepee Trailer Park in the 100 block of Mechem Drive while investigating a missing person report at 9:30 p.m. Nov. 11.

Annetta Mae Daniel of Pasadena, Texas, contacted the landlord of Teepee Trailer Park to ask him to check on her son Roy Lee Daniel, 49, of Ruidoso Nov. 10.

According to the police report, the last time she talked to her son was between Oct. 26 and 27. The landlord allegedly found drug paraphernalia.

Police were contacted by Daniel and entered the residence with the landlord Nov. 11.

The officers said they found a box with white powder confirmed by narcotics Officer Daniel Spear as "a quantity of cocaine," and also found drug paraphernalia - injection needles and smoking pipes.

Spear entered the trailer

with a warrant on Monday afternoon to search for drugs and other evidence.

Spear said he found muriatic acid, jars with unknown liquid which were taken to the lab to be analyzed, paint thinner, lighter fluid and tubing with hoses attached along with an unknown white powder.

A drinking straw was found with white powder on it and a spoon with white residue, police said.

Six small marijuana plants were also found in the trailer, Spear said.

Spear said he was forced to leave the residence because of the strong acidic smell and

returned with a second warrant and the HAZMAT unit from the New Mexico State Police.

The team cleared out the trailer.

"There are strange events leading around this," Spear said.

Spear said in the report that from his experience all of the items found were consistent with the manufacture of methamphetamines.

"We're looking for Roy Lee to talk about the stuff going on at his residence, and we want to see if he's OK and to have him get back in contact with his mother," Spear said.

The evidence was packaged and tested. The next step, Spear said, is to talk to the district attorney to see what criminal charges need to be filed.

## State plans highway blitz

The state Highway and Transportation Department Traffic Safety Bureau will undertake a statewide "superblitz" Nov. 12 through Nov. 25 to crack down on DWI and lack of seatbelt use.

Throughout New Mexico, law enforcement officers will be conducting saturation patrols and DWI/seatbelt checkpoints. There have been 142 alco-

hol-involved fatalities from car crashes in New Mexico through September this year and 356 overall fatalities, the bureau said.

New Mexico was recently recognized as having the second highest usage of seat belts in the United States, but 63 percent of individuals killed in car crashes in 2000 were not wearing seat belts.
