## Murder suspect on trial again

The retrial of Johnny Ray Gutierrez, accused in the 1998 slaying of a convenience store clerk, opened this week in Alamogordo.

Looking a few pounds heavier, his hair in a pigtail and wearing glasses, Johnny Ray Gutierrez faced a jury Tuesday for the second time on a charge of murdering a Ruidoso convenience store clerk in 1998.

This time, the trial was set for Alamogordo, where the case received less publicity. Gutierrez's first trial in Lincoln County ended in a hung jury in

July 2000.

In opening statements, Gutierrez's attorney, Gary Mitchell, insisted that the prosecution found no physical evidence linking his client to the scene of the murder in the early morning

hours of Aug. 29.

The body of John Diebler, 48, was found in the restroom of Allsup's store on U.S. 70 after Rob Stralow, who came to pick up coffee and cigarettes, was denied entrance by a man he didn't recognize, became suspicious and asked a clerk at another Allsup's to call the police.

Diebler was stabbed 27 times. Lori Hight, who was manager of the store at the time, testified that it lacked a security camera or buzzer to alert a clerk if someone entered the store. She also said Gutierrez worked at the store four months earlier, knew Diebler and was aware of the how the safe and cash register operated.

## Chino says he'll fight for office

Presidential victor in tribal vote blasts nullification of election

The recent nullification of the Mescalero Apache tribal election "is nothing more than a blatant attempt to snatch back from the majority of tribal members what Joseph Geronimo and (President Sara) Misquez were unable to win legitimately," Mark Chino said in a statement.

Chino was the presidential victor in the Nov. 6 tribal election. But Tribal Vice President Frederick Chino said the mistakes were the fault of the council not knowing the constitution, not of Misquez.

"For the past two years I have tried to babysit the tribal council and get them to respect the constitution," Frederick Chino said.

The two Chinos are not related.

Mark Chino said Friday he intends to fight the nullification for himself and for members of the tribe. If forced, he said he would defeat the Misquez administration by an even larger margin than before. (He won by 67 votes.) He said he has not forgotten his pledge to bring back, not only pride and dignity, but also integrity and honesty to Mescalero Apache tribal government.

"It's a power struggle is what it is," Frederick Chino said.

Mark Chino was elected to replace incumbent President Misquez. The tribal council nullified the election after Geronimo questioned its validity because voting machines were used instead of paper ballots, as required by the election code.

## Rec center boosters woo county

Advocates of a proposal to build a new recreation center in Ruidoso say they hope the Lincoln County Commission will join the effort to revive the plan.

Ruidoso voters turned down a bond issue for the project two years ago, but Genevieve Phelan, chair of the Lincoln County Health & Wellness Planning Council, said last week the center is needed. It would contribute to three of five top priorities listed in the county's 2000 Strategic Health Plan, she said.

"A recreation facility would contribute to child and youth development, substance abuse services through prevention and services for the elderly," she told commissioners. "It is the opinion of the planning council that Lincoln County would benefit greatly from a recreation center, one that is intergenerational, free

to all residents as is the library, and that is the heart of the community.

"An Olympic-sized indoor pool would be particularly beneficial for people of all ages."

Phelan said that at the October meeting of the planning council, Joe Zagone reintroduced the subject of a bond issue for the Community Events-Recreation-Teen Center first proposed in 1993.

"Mr. Zagone requested that council's support in petitioning the board to collaborate with the village of Ruidoso to provide significant development and operational funding for a facility, which would be available to all residents of the county, not just those of Ruidoso," she said.

Commissioners took no action on the request. Commissioner Leo Martinez said, "This was turned

down by voters for specific reasons."

Commissioners William Schwettmann said he'd like to see more of an outreach to communities in the county such as Capitan to ensure they are a part of the process.

"I think it's a good thing," he said of emphasizing the county-wide aspect of such a center. "As the county grows, each community comes closer together. It's important not to leave them out or Ruidoso Downs."

Chairman Rex Wilson said he'd like to hear more about actual building and operational costs of the center.

"As it was packaged last time, the voters turned it down," he said.

Phelan said the planning council views the project as a collaborative effort of many entities and communities.

## Ingle to 'supervise' solid waste agency

Deciding a manager would be too expensive, the board in charge of Lincoln County's trash collection named Debra Ingle as its "supervisor."

Ingle, who served as board chairman and acting manager of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority since the departure of County Commissioner Rick Simpson, was hired last week for an annual salary of \$20,000.

"I was hired just as another worker, not appointed as a manager," she said Friday. "They just needed a supervisor to run the place."

The board, consisting of representatives from the county and its five municipalities, interviewed four of five applicants for the job of manager, but decided to reject all. As an alternative, they hired Ingle as supervisor.

"I'll also be paid 25 cents a mile for my truck," said Ingle, who represents the village of Capitan on the board. "I turned my letter of resignation into the mayor."

**Agencies' work gets county approval**

State and federal agencies were encouraged by Lincoln County commissioners to continue their efforts to blend public access with private property rights.

The discussion was tied to a year-round oryx hunt declared by the State Game Commission on state and federal land south of U.S. 380 that is accessed through private ranches.

Commissioners asked members of the county Public Lands Use Advisory Council to monitor the situation and come back to the December meeting with a recommendation.

Ed Roberson, Roswell field office manager for the federal Bureau of Land Management, said the hunting ground lies between the lava flow west of Carrizozo on the White Sands Missile Range in the counties

of Lincoln and Socorro.

The hunt was expanded because the herd of oryx is increasing, wandering off the missile range, destroying fences and chasing livestock away from food and water.

The BLM is considering building a road that also would access the Puckett Cave Complex, Roberson said. While the road would be on public land, it would open up areas where people could access private land, he said.

Preventing trespassing and controlling access are major issues.

Other options are to use a county easement or develop a cooperative agreement with ranchers to use private land.

**Silva takes a bow**

Lincoln County Assessor Rick Silva received kudos earlier this month for the quality of his department's mapping program.

Keith Cunningham of Spatial Data Research said it is considered one of the best in the state. But by next summer, the new goal is to add capability to the data base, allowing information to be shared with the state, he said.

"It will ensure that each piece of property is accounted for properly with a correct evaluation," he told county commissioners at their Nov. 15 meeting.

Maps will be based on "real world" coordinates, instead of local surveys, which have been shown in many areas to be off significantly, as detected in the rural addressing project, he said. Eventually, each appraisal will be tied to video photographs to show all improvements, he added. Aerial mapping also will help.

Even if the "real world" coordinates differ from the survey, a legal description is the document of ownership, not the maps, Cunningham said.

The election board set a precedent in 1998 when it began using electronic voting machines, Mark Chino said. He said the election board legally passed the ordinance to use machines and the council approved the use of voting machines for future elections.

But Frederick Chino said the ordinance to use voting machines must be approved by the Election Board before every election, unless an ordinance is passed after the election to change the code for future elections. He said that hasn't happened.

"Mr. Geronimo knew well in advance of this year's elections that voting machines were to be used, but he never objected until after he lost his bid for a tribal council seat," Mark Chino said.

The tribal council cannot dictate to the Election Board what ordinances to enact, Frederick Chino said. The tribal council approved the use of voting machines at the Aug. 21 meeting before the Election Board had been appointed; that should not have been done, Frederick Chino said. The ordinance for voting machines should have been approved at the Sept. 14 meeting, but was never brought up, he said.

Another violation occurred when the tribal council decided

not to allow prisoners the right to vote, Frederick Chino said. The Mescalero Apache Tribal Constitution says all members of the tribe living within a 50-mile radius are allowed to vote. The Election Board is supposed to go to nursing homes, hospitals and jails for tribal members to cast their ballots.

"The tribal council discriminated against their own people by depriving them of the right to vote," Frederick Chino said.

Mark Chino said the tribal council acted illegally by allowing Geronimo to go directly to the tribal council instead of obeying the election code, which requires all disputes be settled in the Mescalero Tribal Court once the election board certified the results.

"The tribal council then acted illegally by passing an 'after the fact' law, nullifying the elections," Mark Chino said.

Geronimo is a tribal council member and is immune in the Mescalero Tribal Court, Frederick Chino said. "The tribal council sits as Supreme Court," he added.

Mark Chino said the actions by the tribal council demonstrated that it had no regard for what the majority of members wanted. Chino said it sends a clear message to voters: "Your votes don't count. We intend to remain in power

whether you like it or not!"

The actions of Geronimo, Misquez and the tribal council will set dangerous precedents for future elections if allowed to continue, Mark Chino said.

"If the loser in any given race is not satisfied with the election results, he or she may circumvent tribal law and demand another election. Theoretically, this process could go on indefinitely, like children playing a game, with the loser changing the rules until he or she finally wins," he said in the news release.

Geronimo was one of Wendell Chino's harshest critics, calling Chino a dictator on more than one occasion, Chino said. "Who is the dictator now?"

The current situation results from the failure of the present tribal administration, as well as the tribal council, to understand the Constitution of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, Mark Chino said. "These violations of due process must not and will not be allowed to stand," he said.

Frederick Chino said that during former President Wendell Chino's administration the actions of the tribal council were run according to the constitution but that has changed. "None of the tribal council takes the constitution seriously enough to learn," he said.

But the key witness presented by District Attorney Scot Key and lead prosecutor, Roxe Anne Matise, in the first day of testimony was Mariel Diaz, a former jockey and horse trainer at Ruidoso Downs, who said she parted with the accused and two other friends the evening of Aug. 28.

Diaz outlined a night of beer, marijuana and cocaine by the four adults as Gutierrez' son and the child of her friend watched television in another room.

Gutierrez contends he fell asleep with his son and doesn't know what Diaz, her friend Rebecca Thompson and George Padilla did after he dozed off. Only later, did he agree to drive Diaz to Albuquerque, Mitchell

said.

But Diaz told a different story. She testified that Padilla and Thompson left, and that after a few hours all the beer was gone. Gutierrez asked her to drive him to Allsup's where he said he knew a clerk who would sell them beer after legal hours.

Acknowledging that her recollections are hazy, Diaz said she waited in the car parked in back of the store at Gutierrez's insistence for about 15 minutes, then carried out four cases of beer.

She didn't see the clerk or any signs of violence, but testified that Gutierrez told her on the way to Albuquerque that he had robbed the store.

Mitchell attempted to discredit Diaz, pointing to a histo-

ry of drug abuse. He hammered the lack of a blood, hair or fingerprint match with his client.

But Lt. Wolfgang Born and Detective James Biggs of the Ruidoso Police Department told jurors that a shoe print found in Diebler's blood in the restroom matched prints near the tire tread of Diaz's car behind the store and lined up with the sole marking of size nine Caterpillar work boots owned by Gutierrez.

Biggs said clear fingerprints are rare in most cases.

"In the last eight years, only two cases I've worked were solved by prints," he said.

The trial is expected to wind up by Friday. The prosecution listed 22 witnesses for testimony.

# Mescalero stands pat on gaming compacts

The Mescalero Apache Tribe opposed the decision of the Department of the Interior on New Mexico's new gaming compacts with other tribes, which went into effect Nov. 21. The compacts require 8 percent of revenues to be delivered to the state.

Tribal President Sara Misquez said in a press release Nov. 21, that the new compacts disappointed because they hurt tribes everywhere. Misquez previously said that changes allowing race tracks to increase the number of slot machines in their casinos were beyond the gaming limits spelled out in the current compacts.

"Although the decision preserves the Mescalero Apache Tribe's objections to revenue sharing, the decision does not settle our concerns about exclusivity since the state of New Mexico continues to consider more horse track casinos," Misquez said.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe contends the 1997 compact contained an illegally high revenue sharing provision.

The 1997 compact required 16 percent of casino revenues to be delivered to the state. The late tribal President Wendell Chino signed the 1997

compact, but revenue sharing was withheld. The tribe will continue to put the disputed revenue-sharing money in escrow, Misquez said.

Mescalero will continue to ask the state attorney general to drop objections to court-sponsored arbitration under the 1997 compact, which has been wanted for the past three years, Misquez said.

"Although we have concerns about the compacts, we hope that gaming will let tribes in New Mexico and other states realize their dreams of self-sufficiency, sovereignty and better lives for their members," Misquez said.

In a press release on Nov. 21, Gov. Gary Johnson said that the compacts approved by the Department of the Interior are the result of 13 years of intense negotiation between the tribes and the state.

- Johnson said the compacts:
- Provide a negotiated resolution to a current dispute, which has risks involved for both sides.
  - Create a situation of certainty where only major questions have existed in the past.
  - Provide a steady stream of income for tribal projects as well as the state.
  - Prove that the tribes and the state can reach real results on a government-to-government basis.

## A case of two dangerous highways

The State Highway Department has its priorities in order.

**W**ork on U. S. Highway 70 in the Ruidoso-Hondo valley remains merely a gleam in the eye of the State Highway and Transportation Department.

That project next month will go through another round of public hearings — at 7 p.m. on Dec. 11 in the Ruidoso Convention Center and at 7:30 p.m. Dec. 12 in the school gymnasium at Hondo.

Meanwhile, up north, some politicians have been taking the SHD to task for tilting toward the Lincoln County project rather than spending the money on U. S. 285/84 north of Santa Fe. They say traffic is much heavier and therefore it's more dangerous, according to the numbers.

Those legislators (who seldom express awareness that

the very large chunk of New Mexico south of Interstate 40 even exists) have said they might challenge the SHD's \$95 million bond issue to widen U.S. 70 to four lanes.

Those who have traveled the two stretches of highway, Santa Fe to Pojoaque in the north and from Ruidoso Downs to Riverside in the south, will agree that 285/84 is much more heavily traveled — and that it already is four lanes wide, with a median and wide shoulders.

They will also agree that when things get tight along most stretches of U.S. 70, there are few choices indeed. Trying to avoid a collision often means ramming an embankment on one side or going over a cliff on the other.

U. S. 70 should come first.

## Parents impact gang activity

**CHAPEL HILL, N.C.** — A new study confirms that parental behavior can affect how likely teenagers are to join a gang or participate in gang delinquency. But the study also reveals that the same behaviors that discourage gang activity in teens from one ethnic group might have no effect, or even encourage gang activity, in teens from a different ethnic group.

The same research indicates that gang intervention programs, which often focus on teens' peer relationships, could be more effective if they also addressed the parent-teen relationship.

"Parents are not powerless," says lead author Chanequa J. Walker-Barnes, Ph.D., of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, in the November/December issue of Child Development.

Previous studies on the interplay of family environment and teen gang activity have not accounted for the fact that "the effect of family environment may be different for adolescents from different ethnic backgrounds," she says.

Walker-Barnes treated the 300 Miami ninth-graders who participated in her study not only as members of one large group, but also as members of three ethnic subgroups: Hispanic (54 percent), black/African-American (25 percent) and white/other (21 percent).

This strategy revealed significant ethnic differences. For example, Walker-Barnes' analysis of the entire group revealed

no links between how controlling parents are and how their children's levels of gang involvement change over the course of a school year.

However, when ethnicity was taken into account, it became apparent that black youth whose parents exert more behavioral control tend to become less involved with gangs during the course of a school year, while white/other youth with more controlling parents become more involved.

These and other findings, Walker-Barnes says, "highlight the need for different treatment strategies for youth from different ethnic backgrounds." In particular, she observes, "programs which emphasize increasing parental control and supervision over adolescents' daily activities" appear appropriate for black teens.

Another distinguishing mark of Walker-Barnes' approach is her examination of both peer and parental influences. Previous researchers have tended to examine one or the other, making it difficult to determine whether gang intervention programs should focus on peer gang activity, teen-parent relationships, or both.

Her findings indicate that both exert a strong influence and should be addressed. The teens in her study group who had the most gang-involved peers also had the highest rates of gang involvement and participation in gang delinquency, both at the beginning of the school year and at its end.

## Many doctors willing to take part in executions, despite ban

**ANN ARBOR, Mich.** — More than 40 percent of randomly surveyed physicians say they would help execute a prisoner by lethal injection, despite the fact that their acts would go against their sworn oath and the guidance of nearly all major professional societies, a new study finds.

This willingness to participate in at least one aspect of carrying out capital punishment may be mostly due to a lack of awareness of those ethical guideposts, the study's authors warn in the new issue of the Annals of Internal Medicine.

Only 8 percent of the more than 400 doctors surveyed even knew that major medical organizations had already wrestled with the thorny issues pitting medical professional ethics against duty to society, and ruled against aiding execution.

But whatever the reasons might be for such a high percentage would say they'd help in a lethal injection, the study's authors warn that far more education of physicians is needed to help clarify the line between being a doctor sworn by the Hippocratic oath to "first, do no harm," and being an American citizen with personal opin-

ions of any kind on capital punishment.

"This issue really gets to the heart of the special place physicians hold in society, with the white-coat reputation of healers," says senior author Peter Ubel, M.D., a medical ethicist and associate professor of internal medicine at the University of Michigan Health System and the Veterans Affairs Ann Arbor Healthcare System. "The astonishing lack of awareness of the guidance barring participating in lethal injection, coupled with the high willingness to take part in at least some of the actions necessary to kill a prisoner, make for a troubling combination."

Ubel notes that the research team's intent was not to criticize the personal beliefs of physicians as individual citizens, but rather to assess the level to which doctors had squared those beliefs with their professional obligations. The result of the survey, he says, may have implications for the public's perception of doctors, and therefore for the privileges and responsibilities entrusted to the medical profession.

In an accompanying editorial, a

physician and an attorney from Northwestern University concur that the survey's results indicate the need for further education of physicians on the ethical challenge of execution. Ethical guidelines alone may not be able to bar an individual physician from taking part in executions, but, they write, education could help "morally confused" doctors.

"In this hard-fought effort to keep the white coat clean, the findings provide a wake-up call," write Linda Emanuel, M.D., Ph.D. and Leigh Biernan, J.D. "It is time to eliminate moral confusion by re-establishing the deliberate dissent of the medical profession regarding physician involvement in executions."

"That involvement, Ubel explains, has been the subject of ethical debate for centuries, but in recent decades has centered around more humane ways of executing convicted criminals under state and federal laws. The debate has led the American Medical Association, and the hundreds of medical societies that help guide the AMA on specific issues on behalf of 98 percent of American physicians, to set specific guidelines.

Do You Have Defensible Space?



Removing flammable vegetation reduces the threat of fire. Follow these basic rules to create defensible space that works.

- Remove all dead plants, trees and shrubs from the site. Reduce grasses, leaves, pine needles, plant parts and low hanging branches. Replace dense flammable plants with fire-resistant plants. The choice of plants, spacing and maintenance are crucial elements in any defensible space landscaping plan.

- Tip for a Fire-safe Landscape: Create a defensible space perimeter by thinning trees and brush within 30 feet around your home. Beyond 30 feet, remove dead wood, debris and low tree branches. Eliminate small trees and plants growing under trees. They allow ground fires to jump into tree crowns. Space trees 30 feet apart and prune to a height of 8 to 10 feet. Place shrubs at least 10 feet from any structures and prune regularly. Plant the most drought-tolerant vegetation within 10 feet of your home and adjacent to structures to prevent ignition. Provide at least 10 to 15 foot separation between islands of shrubs and plant groups to effectively break up continuity of vegetation. Landscaping your property with fire-resistant plants and vegetation to prevent fire from spreading quickly.

- Choose Fire Resistant Materials: Check your local nursery, forester or county extension service for advice on fire resistant plants that are suited for your environment. Create fire safe zones with stone walls, patios, swimming pools, decks and roadways. Use rock mulch, flower beds and gardens as ground cover for bare spaces and as effective firebreaks. Thin and "fire proof" plants. Select high moisture plants that grow close to the ground and have a low sap or resin content. Choose plant species that resist ignition such as rockrose, iceplant and aloe. Fire-resistant shrubs include hedging roses, bush honeysuckles, currant, cotoneaster, sumac and shrub apples. Plant hardwood, maple, poplar and cherry trees that are less flammable than pine, fir and other conifers.

- Maintain Your Home and Surrounding Property: Maintain a well-pruned and watered landscape to serve as a green belt and protection against fire. Keep plants green during the dry season and use supplemental irrigation, if necessary. Trim grass on a regular basis (10 to 100 feet surrounding your home). Stack firewood at least 30 feet from your home. Store flammable materials, liquids and solvents in metal containers outside the home at least 30 feet away from structures and wooden fences. No matter where you live, always install smoke alarms on every level of your home. Test them monthly and change the batteries at least once a year. Consider installing the new long-life smoke alarms.

- Maintain Home Heating Systems: Have your chimney inspected and cleaned annually by a certified specialist. Install chimneys and place spark arresters on top. Extend the chimney at least three feet above the roof. Remove branches hanging above and around the chimney.

- Have a Fire Safety and Evacuation Plan: Install smoke alarms on every level of your home. Test them monthly and change the batteries at least once a year. Practice fire escape and evacuation plans. Mark the entrance to your property with signs that are clearly visible. Know which local emergency services are available and have those numbers posted. Provide emergency vehicle access through roads and driveways at least 12 feet wide with adequate turnaround space. Village ordinances require you to have your street address visible (minimum 4" in height).

Follow Local Burning Laws: Do not burn trash or other debris without proper knowledge of local burning laws, the village of Ruidoso does not allow outside burning of any type!

Did you know the Village of Ruidoso will pick up your pine needles and tree trimmings FREE of charge? Place near road, away from dumpsters and ditches. If commercial, please call for charges and arrangements for pickup. If you have any questions on pickup, call Solid Waste at 257-1502.

A call by Lincoln County Commissioner Rick Simpson to support the Ruidoso School Board's push to allow prayer in school went unanswered earlier this month.

Follow-up commissioners decided to pick up the discussion at their December meeting when they will consider a resolution.

The school board voted in

early October to send letters to the U.S. Supreme Court and to congressional leaders asking them to reconsider prayer in schools.

"We start our meetings with a prayer and it's the same with the state Legislature," Simpson said. "Yet, if you mention prayer in school, a hush comes over the room. The Ruidoso School Board has taken a step to change that and I would like to see us support that effort. After all, our pledge of allegiance states that we are

one nation under God." "But it doesn't say who your god is," said Commissioner William Schwettmann.

Ron Anderson, a Ruidoso village councilor, told commissioners his board uses a moment of silence to allow people to pray if they wish.

Thanksgiving holiday and President George Washington's birthday, Feb. 22, will be celebrated on Dec. 24 to extend the Christmas holiday. Columbus Day, Oct. 7, will be taken on Oct. 14.

The other days off are: the birthday of Martin Luther King Jr. on Jan. 21, Good Friday on March 29, Memorial Day on May 27, Independence Day on July 4; Labor Day on

Sept. 2, Veteran's Day on Nov. 11, Thanksgiving Day on Nov. 28 and Christmas Day on Dec. 25.

Commissioners also set their monthly meeting schedule. All but two of the meetings are the third Thursday of the month. The exceptions are Friday, June 7, and Friday, Nov. 8, which follow elections. Commissioners are required to certify election results.

Foul trouble was a bit of a problem for the Chiefs, as Leslie Bigmouth and Augusta Lang both fouled out of the contest.


But Bradford had only praise for his club, especially Smith and Dolan.

# Lobos run to shutout over NMSU

■ New Mexico completely dominated the Aggies in the in-state rivalry game Saturday, racking up 350 rushing yards.

Led by dominating rushing and defensive performances, the University of New Mexico football team blasted interstate rival New Mexico State University 53-0 on Saturday afternoon at University Stadium in Albuquerque.

New Mexico improved to 6-5 on the year to notch its first winning season under head coach Rocky Long and first since its 9-4 campaign in 1997.

The Lobos also earned their first shutout in 206 games, since blanking West Texas State 27-0 on Sep. 15, 1984, and recorded their biggest margin of victory since defeating the National University of Mexico 77-6 in the first game ever played at University Stadium on Sep. 17, 1960.

Leading just 3-0 after the first quarter, New Mexico took control of the game in the second quarter behind its senior rushing attack.

Senior running back Jarrod Baxter ran for 60 of

the Lobos' 110 second quarter rushing yards, including a three-yard touchdown plunge to give UNM a 9-0 lead three seconds into the quarter.

Senior kicker Vladimir Borombozin added a 34-yard field goal and sophomore quarterback Casey Kelly vaulted into the end zone from seven yards out to give New Mexico a 19-0 halftime lead. NMSU was unable to convert on its best scoring opportunity of the day as Dario Aguinaga missed wide right on a 27-yard field goal attempt, spoiling a 13-play, 80-yard drive by the Aggies.

New Mexico slammed the door on NMSU in the third quarter, outscoring the Aggies 13-0.

Baxter capped an all rushing, seven-play, 59-yard drive with a seven-yard touchdown run on the Lobos' first possession of the half and senior cornerback Stephen Persey intercepted Aggie quarterback K.C. Enzinger on NMSU's first play of the half.

Senior running back Holmon Wiggins later scored on a one-yard run to give New Mexico a 32-0 lead at the end of the third quarter. In the quarter, UNM ran 22 plays for 137 yards, while New Mexico

State ran just four plays for nine yards.

Most of the Lobos' 21 seniors had a part in New Mexico's 60th win over the Aggies and biggest in the series since a 61-0 shutout in 1948. Baxter rushed for 131 yards and two touchdowns to pass Rocky Long on the all-time rushing list, finishing seventh with 2,090 yards.

Wiggins had 135 all-purpose yards, including 27 punt return yards, finishing three shy of Chad Smith's school record 666 career yards.

Fellow senior running backs Javier Hanson and Sulayman Konte added fourth quarter touchdowns and finished with career-highs of 88 and 42 yards rushing, respectively.

UNM's final touchdown of the game came when senior nose tackle Tony Mazotti blocked Brian Copple's punt, which was returned 30 yards by senior linebacker Amos Wilson.

The Lobos' senior linebacker duo of Mohammed Konte and Gary Davis combined for 13 tackles and a sack on the day, while senior Lobo safety Scott Gerhardt had five tackles.

Enzinger, playing his

fourth straight game with a torn ligament in his left knee, finished his career with 6,778 total yards. He's only the third player in school history - Cody Ledbetter and Joe Pisarcik the others - to have more than 5,000 yards.

UNM finished with a season-high 350 yards rushing on 59 attempts, while holding New Mexico State to just 79 yards on 31 carries. The Aggies entered the game averaging 219.5 yards and 47.2 attempts per contest.

Fullback Marcus Dixon led NMSU with 20 yards rushing on five carries, while Enzinger finished 8-22 passing for 77 yards and a two interceptions.

H.B. Briscoe had four catches for 48 yards, all in the first half, to lead the Aggie receivers.

Safeties Siddeeq Shabazz and Tyrone Gifford combined for 23 tackles, while linebacker D'Wayne Taylor had 11 tackles. Kelly finished with 113 yards on 5-9 passing, while Wiggins had two catches for 52 yards to lead the Lobos in receiving.

## Fishing report for Ruidoso area, Nov. 28, 2001

**Ruidoso River** - No change from last week. A small amount of moisture found its way into Ruidoso the past week. However welcome the rain, it was not enough to change the flow rate on the Rio Ruidoso River. The river flow rate is well below 2 CFS. Below the confluence of Carrizo Creek the fishing has been outstanding. The water flow in this part of the River is about normal for this time of year, but is dropping due to lack of rain. The River was stocked two weeks ago with over 900 Rainbow trout. The water is gin clear so wear clothes that blend in with the background. Large Stoneflies are abundant in the river now. Rock Worms are declining in size and quantity, and Scuds are still on the increase in the waters. Tie a dry fly on as a lead fly then tie a nymph dropper about 12-18" behind. Use the lead fly as your strike indicator. This is an effective and fun way to fish small waters. Wear layers of clothes as the temperature near the water changes quickly.

**South Fork** - South Fork is about done until Spring. The water flow rate is at a trickle. **Bonito Lake**: Bonito Lake was stocked two weeks ago with over 2,000 Rainbow trout. Add this to the nearly 3,000 Rainbows stocked over the past two months and Bonito will have a great carry over of fish for its Spring opening. Fly patterns that have been working on Bonito are Humples, Dark Hendricks, and Parachute Adam. The best fishing remains just before dark on the main lake body. A damsel fly nymph tied as a dropper behind your dry fly offer-

ing continues to bring an unexpected take. For the spin cast fishermen, try a hot pink renegade pattern propeller fly or a black with grizzly hackle propeller fly behind a bubble rig. Remember Bonito closes Dec. 1 and will reopen the first of April. **Eagle Lakes**: Eagle Lakes are closed for the season.

**Grindstone**: Grindstone Lake was stocked two weeks ago with over 1,200 hungry rainbows. Damsel fly and Dragon fly imitations continue working well. For spin casters, tie on an Olive or Black propeller fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish. Please remember to squeeze the barbs down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water. **Lake Mesalero**: The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark wooly buggers continue to take fish late in the day. A few folks have been successful with Parachute Adams, Mosquito, or Hendrickson patterns and casting to rising fish. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk.







**Some New Mexico kids top California's**

New Mexico's fourth- and eighth-grade students outperformed California's on the National Assessment of Educational Progress science assessment in 2000.

According to results compiled by the National Center for Education Statistics, New Mexico's fourth-grade students averaged a score of 138 on the assessment, compared to 131 for California, and eighth-grade students averaged a score of 140, compared to 132 for California. The average national score was 148 in grade four and 149 in grade eight, based on NAEP science scale of 0 to 300.

"New Mexico's content standards and benchmarks provide the basis for local school districts to develop their science curricula. We believe that as the standards are fully implemented at the local level, science instruction will improve and student achievement in the sciences will increase," said State Superintendent of Public Instruction Michael J. Davis.

The science assessment, including earth science, physical science and life science, was administered at the state level at grade eight in 1996 and at grades four and eight in 2000. New Mexico participated in both of these assessments; however, no individual student scores were reported by NAEP and no trend data are available for fourth grade.

**ENMU prof honored**

Mary Ayala, Ph.D., associate professor of modern languages and chair of the Department of Languages and Literature at Eastern New Mexico University, Portales, has been selected as the 2001 Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching New Mexico Professor of the Year.

The program is directed by the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education.

The U.S. Professors of the Year program salutes the most outstanding undergraduate instructors in the country — those who excel as teachers and influence the lives and careers of their students.

Ayala was nominated by Margaret Willen, Ph.D., ENMU associate professor of modern languages.

## WINNERS Two Lincoln County students research ranching history and win in a statewide essay contest

Two Lincoln County students put themselves into the past and won a statewide essay contest by writing "historical" accounts of dealing with the drought in Capitan and the Capitan Mountains in 1905.

Steven Ramirez, a ninth-grader at Carrizozo High School, won first place and \$300 in the junior division for ninth- and 10th-graders, and Jason Gentry, a ninth grader at Capitan High School, won honorable mention for that division.

Other awards were given for senior division winning essays from 11th- and 12th-grade students.

The 2001 Water Essay Contest was sponsored by the New Mexico Water Resources Research Institute, and almost 100 students from throughout New Mexico submitted 1,500-word essays. The first- and second-place winners read their essays at a luncheon Nov. 6 at La Funda in Santa Fe in conjunction with the institute's 46th Annual New Mexico Water Conference.

Both Lincoln County essayists said they didn't much care for writing. Ramirez said he sometimes likes to write, but it was the competition that made writing his essay fun, something he'd never done. He said he likes to write stories and make-believe, like this essay theme.

"I already spent the \$300," he said, listing the things he bought with his award-winning essay: a hunting rifle, ammunition, a hunting license and a Nintendo 64 — and there's still a little bit of change left, he said.

Going to Santa Fe to read his essay was "pretty cool and weird; the first time reading in front of a lot of people. They had a big ol' lunch and we read afterwards and I was nervous at first."

Ramirez said he got the information for his first-person account of living through a drought from his mother's friend's dad, Ronnie Hammett, who homesteaded in the Capitan Mountains.

"I wouldn't like to live here in 1905," he said. "It's a lot harder just to live because they didn't have water; they didn't have artificial food or TV dinners."

**Hard times for settlers**

**September 3, 1905**

It is hard to believe that just over a year ago we were still traveling in the wagons towards these mountains in New Mexico. We are so lucky to have a

dad that was able to find one hundred and sixty acres to homestead. We were even more fortunate to find a place with a spring that still runs. We came here in hopes of finding more water than we had at home but soon found out there has been an almost 10-year drought in this country too. Still, the drought has worked in our favor in a way because Dad knows how to witch wells. Uncle Cliff and Dad found a good place up in the Gap and hand dug a good well. Since then they have had plenty of work because everyone is desperate for water.

**September 5**

Talking about being desperate, just last week some people over the mountain got shot. Our neighbor Pat had found a little seep where he watered his goats and he got in an argument with a fella who claimed that he had a right to the water too. Pat got shot in the back and died. This sure is some rough country.

**September 9**

Dad and Uncle Bill had a real close call today while they were digging a well for some people down in Lincoln. We were real happy about the job because they are trading a real pretty horse for digging the well. Uncle Bill was down in the hole since he is the smallest and they were getting pretty far down. The side of the well started caving in and Dad heard Little Bill yell. He ran over there and pulled Bill up with a whole 10-gallon bucket full of rocks and dirt. We were so glad to still have Bill with us since there has been more than one person killed doing the same thing that he was.

**September 16**

Today we were so glad to have the well finished and to be able to go home.

I got to ride the new horse back and we were all happy until we got home and saw Mom sitting on the ground crying. As it turned out she had been to the garden picking beans and when she went to shelling them there were so many shriveled up that she got to worrying that we might not have enough to get us through the winter. This life has been hard on us but it has been even tougher on Mom than for any of us. Dad didn't dare tell her about what had almost happened to little Bill until after supper or she might not have even ate.

**September 25**

We have sure been busy. When we aren't hauling water from the well or the spring we have been working on the cabin trying to finish it for the winter. We have been living in a cave on the mountain since we got here. It hasn't been so bad this summer because we can camp out and not worry about freezing, or getting wet since it never seems to rain. Still, we don't want to grow up in a cave and we are working really hard on the cabin so Mom can be more comfortable. Dad says that it is really important since it looks like we might have another brother or sister by spring.

**"Water on the Table"**



It is now 1905 and I live in Capitan, New Mexico. I am a rancher who is struggling desperately to support and raise a family. In the ranching business, I raise cattle to sell as well as to feed my family. The past 10 years it has been very difficult because we have been in a drought. Without the rains, my pastures are not very productive and so my cattle do not get enough of the nutrients necessary to produce strong and healthy calves. I lose about three to five yearlings a season.

Although there are good places for them to eat, such as around creeks, it is still not enough food for the cattle to stay alive. Water is a resource that we cannot live without.

... In the late 1890s and early 1900s the area was very drought-stricken. This has made it very difficult for ranchers in the area to provide water for their cattle. With our well going dry, my family and I walk to the nearest stream for water five miles away. We haul the water back home in buckets to use for cooking and cleaning. It is heartbreaking to see the water level drop with each passing day. These same streams were also a water source for my cattle.

The wells near the town of

Carrizozo also have problems due to drought conditions. This has been making it difficult for the locomotives. The wells having alkali and gypsum in the water, the locomotives often snorted and wheezed to a standstill. The high mineral content also made the water unsatisfactory for drinking.

With the Sierra Blanca Mountain having as much as a 100-inch base of snow in the winter, run-off into the Rio Bonito occurs in the spring. A rancher by the name of Tom who lived in the Bonito Canyon decided to sell his water rights to the railroad. With this decision, the railroad can now build a pipeline to Carrizozo for the locomotives. This is a very big asset for the area because the water in the Rio Bonito is spring-fed and with the melt in the spring, this would prove to be good water source for both the Railroad Company and our local ranchers.

J.L. Campbell, chief engineer of the El Paso and Southwestern railroad, developed the project of piping water from Bonito to the railroad. The pipeline is going to be built from the South Fork of Bonito Creek and run a total of 53 miles. The first three miles will allow water to be stored in the Bonito Lake, then continue on to be stored in Nogal Lake. The pipeline will then continue on to different locations that the railroad needs.

When the pipeline is completed to Nogal Lake, Capitan will build a pipeline south across the range to bring water to our ranchers.

... Water is a precious resource and every drop should be treated so. Also, remember your neighbor in times of drought by leaving a glass of water on the table so that he may take a fresh drink if passing by.






