**Suspect gives police the slip twice in 1 day**

■ An officer gave chase and lost the bag of pot allegedly found in the man's vehicle.

A man arrested in Ruidoso escaped from custody — twice — while he was being taken to jail, police said.

Officers responding to a call at the Win, Place and Show bar Jan. 3 questioned a suspect who identified himself as Jose Martinez, 22, of Ruidoso, sitting in a vehicle.

Police allegedly found a plastic bag containing suspected marijuana in the car.

En route to the police department, Martinez said he had to use the restroom and "could not hold it."

The obliging officer stopped the car and allowed Martinez out, then turned away briefly to speak to the other officer, and the suspect fled. The officer gave chase and caught the suspect, but "during the foot pursuit, I lost the Baggie of marijuana," he wrote in his report.

At the police department, the officer handcuffed the 5-foot-6-inch, 110-pound suspect to the bench in the holding cell and locked the door, then went to the dispatch center to call the Border Patrol about the suspect's resident alien card.

When he returned, Martinez was gone, the handcuffs left behind, and wire mesh at the bottom of the door was pushed out.

The officer found the suspect on the floor in front of the south entrance to the police department, where he had been unable to open the door.

Police discovered that the suspect's resident-alien card was for a person from Japan and that the social security card was a fake. When a Border Patrol agent arrived, "Martinez" told him his name is Julio Cesar Gonzales. The suspect then was taken to the Lincoln County jail.

As of Tuesday morning, the suspect was still in custody.

**Eggleston challenges Donaldson**

Five candidates seek three council seats; incumbent municipal judge upopposed

Only Municipal Judge Mike Line received a pass in this year's Ruidoso municipal elections.

Five people signed up to run for three seats on the village council and Mayor Robert Donaldson is being challenged in his bid for a second term by Councilor Leon Eggleston.

Council candidates are L. Ray Nunley, Bill Chance, Deborah Marcum-Byars, Jules B. Videau and Ronald Hardeman.

The three posts up for election March 5 are now occupied by Chance, Eggleston and Linda Flack, who did not seek re-election.

Nunley, who will finish eight years on the Lincoln County Commission in December 2002, said he could add a unique perspective if elected.

"I think I could provide some leadership and also be a bridge between the council and the commission," he said.

A pharmacist, Nunley serves as a member of the county-village

To vote in the Ruidoso municipal election, a person must be registered as a Lincoln County voter with the county clerk in Camanzo by 5 p.m., Feb. 5.

Early voting at the office of the municipal clerk at village hall on Kansas City Street will begin Feb. 13 and close at 5 p.m. March 1.

Councilors are elected at-large in a nonpartisan race with the three pulling the most votes winning the open positions.

Councilors are paid \$500 a month and serve four-year terms. The mayor is paid the same amount.

The municipal judge's annual salary will increase from \$30,000 to \$36,000 with the beginning of the new term.

Extraterritorial Zoning Authority, which oversees development in a one-mile zone around the village.

County Attorney Alan Morel researched the issue and Nunley concurrently can occupy a council

and a commission seat for the months remaining in his term.

"I love being a commissioner, but I feel there still are some things I'd like to accomplish," he said.

"Because I can't run again for the commission, the council is a good opportunity to serve in another public office and do things for Ruidoso."

Growth poses some significant problems for the village, especially in the area of water and the financial burden of infrastructure, he said.

Incumbent Chance works in real estate and is completing his first full term as councilor. He was appointed to a two-year term under former mayor Jerry Shaw, and was elected to a four-year term.

"I'm very committed to the community and the best way to serve it is to make myself available," Chance said. "I feel I have been an effective representative for the citizens to date and really have this community in my heart."

**Man killed in shooting at Mescalero**

FBI investigation under way

Mescalero Apache tribal member Sheldon John Albert Shanta, 31, was shot to death early Sunday after a confrontation in a parking area on the reservation.

Bureau of Indian Affairs police arrested Jericho Chino, 18, also a tribal member, at Lincoln County Medical Center, where he had been taken for treatment of a gunshot wound to the foot, police chief Troy Bolen said.

The Ruidoso Police Department had received two 911 calls about the shooting at 2:21 a.m. and 2:23 a.m. and called the BIA after dispatching an ambulance to a residence in B Section housing, Bolen said.

"Initial information from witnesses states Mr. Chino pulled a handgun from his waist and fired two shots. Someone yelled that he had a gun, and the decedent, Sheldon Shanta, reportedly attempted to gain control of the weapon as Mr. Chino left the residence and entered the parking area adjacent to the house," Bolen said in a news release.

"Witnesses state Mr. Shanta was highly intoxicated and as he grabbed Mr. Chino, Mr. Shanta slid down his body with his hands around Mr. Chino's legs. Witnesses state Mr. Chino then fired a total of three shots toward Mr. Shanta's back.

"Two bullets entered Mr. Shanta's back and the third struck Mr. Chino in the foot," the release states.

Bolen said that the initial investigation indicated that Shanta had been trying to stop Chino from leaving the area with a pistol "that he had reportedly discharged at another individual."

Chino is the son of Tribal Council vice president Fred Chino.

Bolen said Chino was charged by the tribe with assault and battery, intoxication, negligent use of a weapon, criminal trespass and disturbing the peace. Chino pleaded guilty to all charges except negligent use of a weapon. The FBI is the lead agency on the case and other charges are pending completion of the investigation by that agency, Bolen said. The body of the deceased was transported to Albuquerque for an autopsy.

**Tribal voters go back to the polls today**

■ The election is a replay of the December general election, which was nullified by the tribal council.

For the second time in two months, Mescalero Apache voters will cast their ballots today to elect a president, vice president and four council members.

Incumbent Sara Misqueuz and Mark R. Chino will face off once again for the tribe's top spot.

They previously were selected from a crowded field in an October primary election. Chino defeated Misqueuz in November, but the results of that election were thrown out when the use of

machines instead of paper ballots was challenged.

Chino, a criminal investigator for Bureau of Indian Affairs law enforcement, is the son of the late Wendell Chino, who led the tribe for more than 40 years.

Misqueuz, former administrative assistant to the late president, has served in that position since May 1999, when Paul Ortega, who ascended from vice president, was removed by the tribal council.

At first appointed on an interim basis, she subsequently was elected to the office.

In the latest round of elections, a new primary was conducted in early

December after the tribal council approved the necessary action to permit electronic voting machines. Chino and Misqueuz, with only a four-vote difference, again were chosen to run against each other in a new general election.

The results for the vice presidential primary also were the same with former tribal administrator Ferris Palmer and council member Arthur "Butch" Blazer vying for the position.

Competing for four seats on the tribal council are Gregory Mendez, Raymond Kirgan, Michaelene Ahidley, Sandra Platero, Thora Walsh-Padilla, Berle Kanseah, Norbert Via and Joseph Geronimo.

All positions are for two-year terms.

Chance served as liaison to the council on a successful playground construction project last summer that required heavy community involvement.

Deborah Marcum-Byars, owner of Sierra Cinema, said she's running, "Because I think we're at a cross roads. I think we're at a point that 'they will come' regardless of if we 'build it.'"

She's committed to regularly reviewing and updating a comprehensive plan for the village as a long-term strategy to meet growth and quality of life issues, she said.

"My basic philosophy is leadership through service," Byars said, adding that she also would seek guidance from citizen advisory groups. "We have wonderful resources here, both human and natural. I want to protect and use both."

Jules B. Videau, owner of Ponderosa Cabins, retired from Exxon/Mobile and an engineer, also is an attorney and earned a master's of business administration degree.

"I've been a landowner here for 25 years and moved here last year," he said. "I've been familiar with the town since 1977 and have seen it go up and down. I'm sure it will continue to grow, but I'd like to see that growth take place in a manner that benefits everybody. I'm pro growth, but I also want to keep the small-town atmosphere and that can be a tricky balance."

Teacher Ronald D. Hardeman, who has a master's degree and has lived in Ruidoso about 15 years, ran unsuccessfully for the council as a write-in candidate two years ago.

"I did so because in that election, there were no declared opposition candidates to the incumbents," he said. "I had been interested in municipal government since before that election and I'd like to see

more interest, which I think might be generated by more candidates for positions.

"I'm not running with a grudge. I would like to see council members discuss issues more and see a more open village government in that people feel more welcome at meetings and able to ask questions."

Mayor Donaldson, who was elected to two terms on the council before becoming mayor four years ago, said he wants a second term because, "We're so close to taking care of many long-term issues such as water supply and maintenance of the water and street systems, I want to make sure those are put to bed permanently. I believe this administration has done a good job in changing the direction of the bureaucracy to be more responsive to citizens and I want to continue that."

"I'm proud of what we've accomplished," he said. "It wasn't always easy and sometimes there was debate, but debate is healthy."

Donaldson previously served on the village planning and zoning board. He owns a ski shop and is a partner in a mortgage company.

Eggleston said he's running for mayor because he thinks he would be good in the position.

"I'm familiar with government and how to make it work," he said. "I believe in hiring good people and then allowing the staff to do their work. That's what we pay them for."

He served two terms on the council and formerly worked for the village for 12 years, part of the time as acting village manager.

Eggleston was employed in the county finance department for two years. He currently is in real estate and also works at the Lincoln County Medical Center.

Municipal Judge Mike Line is running unopposed for re-election to a second term. Not up for election this year are Councilors Ron Anderson, Bob Sterchi and Frank Cummins.

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# Lincoln County outlines legislative priorities

The 30-day 2002 session of the Legislature convenes Tuesday in Santa Fe.

Financial help to renovate buildings, improve streets and expand water service dominate requests to the New Mexico Legislature from villages in Lincoln County.

But with the prospect of as little as \$8 million and a maximum of \$50 million to spread around this year, most of those cries for money will go unanswered, warned State Rep. Dub Williams.

The Republican from Glencoe and Tony Elias, executive director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, headed a legislative delegation meeting with representatives of villages, other entities and the county earlier this month.

The 30-day legislative session begins next Tuesday.

Capitan Mayor Norman Renfro said \$398,000 is needed to chip seal roads in the subdivisions around the town. The roads also serve as bus routes and are extremely dangerous in inclement weather, posing a risk to children and to elderly drivers, he said. The money would cover six miles and connect U.S. 380 to State Highway 48, Renfro said.

But the top priority was \$300,000 for biological maintenance of the village's wetlands wastewater treatment system. The effort would remove plastics from the waste stream, improve aeration and protect groundwater, said Bernie Reimann, the biologist who designed the system to serve the core of the Capitan commu-

## Sheriff, assessor want laws repealed, updated

Lincoln County lawman Tom Sullivan says a statute requiring him to attend certain public meetings is out of date and should be off the books.

An old law requiring sheriffs to attend all county commission meetings and all district court hearings is antiquated and should be repealed, Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan says.

Appearing at a legislative delegation meeting last month, Sullivan asked State Rep. Dub Williams, a Republican from Glencoe, to throw his support behind efforts of the New Mexico Sheriff's Association to eliminate the law, but to expand another dealing with carrying weapons into public meetings.

The sheriffs said in the late 1800s, a law was passed mandating the attendance of sheriffs as a means of giving them additional compensation when wages were very low.

"That doesn't happen anymore," he

said. "In my 10 years as sheriff, I have never been compensated and I have attended plenty of commission meetings."

A member of the local Libertarian Party has criticized Sullivan or his designee for not staying through lengthy commission meetings each month.

The same person, Tony Seno, objected to a ban on firearms in the county courthouse imposed by District Court Judge Karen Parsons.

But Sullivan said he'd like to see the ban expanded by the state Legislature.

People already can't carry firearms at schools, in airports, any place serving liquor and in federal courthouses, he said.

"I'd like to see public meetings added," Sullivan said. "We have lots of people out there who are less than stable and sometimes emotions run high."

When County Assessor Rick Silva came to the podium, he asked for help from Williams in changing regulation language dealing with industrial revenue bonds.

The assessor affiliate would like to

see the term "project property" changed to "real property," he said.

"They're wrapping up a lot of things in that term and it conflicts with the position of the Internal Revenue Service," he said. "All project property is tax exempt, the way it is now written. They're including under that all personal property. To me, it should only be real estate and shouldn't include furniture, the shelves, the silverware—whatever they use in the business."

Silva said he's still wrangling with owners of the Hawthorn Suites next to the Ruidoso convention center.

"We're still trying to figure out what's right," the assessor said. "We have different opinions and the state is telling us to fight it out, and I don't think we should spend a whole bunch of money doing that."

Members of the affiliation also would like all municipalities, no matter what their size, to be required to

notify county assessors at least 60 days before public meetings to discuss industrial bonds to allow them to ask questions, Silva said.

The current law requires notification only from cities larger than 200,000 in population.

Another request was for a real estate sale price disclosure law in New Mexico, Silva said.

"We need to know exactly what properties sell for because it will affect us later on," he said. "Under the new property tax law, we can't do reassessments as we were before because we're limited on increases under the same owner. Our only chance to ensure we're on par with market value is when a house has alterations or is sold and knowing the price is the only way we can keep up."

Silva said he's been told State Rep. Ben Lujan, D-Santa Fe, said if the governor puts it on his call for the 30-day session starting Jan. 15, he will try to get it passed.

nity. The village is trying to secure matching money for a Community Development Block Grant for a total project cost of \$650,000, he said.

The system, based on the use of plants as natural filters, was conceived in 1988 and became operational five years later. The efficiency of the system has gone down since 1995, with the decaying of plant material, Reimann said. Cleaning could reverse that situation and increase efficiency, he said.

Other requests were:

- From the village of Corona, the same \$150,000 request as last year. It was approved by the Legislature, but vetoed by the governor. The village needs money for water storage tanks to be built near wells donated by El Paso Natural Gas. Although the wells eight miles outside of town are connected to the city water system, no way exists to hold water there. To refill the lines if a well goes down takes 36 hours, said Village Clerk Cathy Perez.

- From the village of Carrizozo, \$250,000 for renovation of village hall, which is 20

years old and in need of repair; and \$500,000 toward the expansion and improvement of the town's wastewater treatment system. The town still has \$518,000 left in CDBG money to go toward the project, estimated to cost \$1.25 million.

- From the Hondo School District, money to construct a new entrance to the school complex to allow one-way movement and provide two exits in time of emergency.

- From Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso, director Jim Miller asked for \$140,000 for the third consecutive year to

renew the campus building.

- From Ruidoso News, Village Clerk Carol Virden and Manager John Waters asked for \$250,000 from the

Legislature. The money would go toward \$8.5 million projects identified as needed in the town's 40-year water plan, he said.

## Deputy clerk in Capitan faces tampering charges

Accusations stem from work with motor vehicle department

Capitan's deputy clerk is facing charges of tampering with public records in connection with her work as motor vehicle department manager.

Lincoln County District Court records show that Kateri Hicks was charged Dec. 13 with four counts of tampering, a fourth-degree felony punishable by up to 18 months in prison for each count.

Hicks, who had worked for the village about two years, was placed on unpaid suspension pending the outcome of her trial, Village Clerk Kathryn Griffin said.

According to documents

filed in the court in Carrizozo, between July 6, 2000 and January 2001, Hicks created a false insurance card for Linda Youse to cover a 1984 Chrysler using the name of Mid-Century Insurance.

The card expired on Dec. 20, 2000 and a second card was created to run through Dec. 20, 2001.

The criminal charge also states that Hicks falsified an application for vehicle title and registration, and the certificate of vehicle registration, on a 1974 Chevrolet pickup belonging to Mark Hicks.

Todd Holmes, Hicks' attorney based in Alamogordo, did not respond to a request for comment.

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**BLINK...blink**

You probably never really thought about it, but most of us blink about once every six seconds. When nature demands anything that often, you might guess it is pretty important — and it is, especially if you are wearing contact lenses.

Blinking protects our eyes from the entrance of foreign particles, removes accumulated matter, and pumps tears to replace those which evaporate or have become contaminated. The eyelid acts as a wiper polishing and wetting the surface.

Although blinking may be controlled, it is usually involuntary and occurs in two forms: the spontaneous kind which follows a regular periodic pattern, and the reflex blinking which is in response to some stimulation such as dirt in your eye or drying of the surface.

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Good blinking habits can also ease computer eye strain. The blink rate during computer use drops by as much as 70% below the normal rate. Good blinking involves closing the eye, not just squinting. It is important to blink regularly when reading, driving or performing any visually demanding task.

## When a senator can't be bothered

There's not much capital outlay money to spend, after all

The absence of Sen. Pete Campos, D-Las Vegas, at last week's legislative "wish list" meeting for Lincoln County wasn't too surprising in retrospect.

Signals from Santa Fe, where the 2002 Legislature will convene next Tuesday, indicate a vast lack of funding for pork or any other capital spending, in the wake of a very bad year, economically.

Of course, that didn't prevent 19 government and quasi-public bodies from presenting their wants to Rep. Dub Williams, R-Glencoe, at the Carrizozo meeting.

Representative Williams, as he has done prior to almost every legislative session, told those attending that there will be much more in requests than money available. This year, thanks to the shrinking of rev-

enue from New Mexico's oil and gas fields, he's right on. That \$500 million surplus the state claimed last year almost imploded with the decline of oil and gas prices before and after Sept. 11. Now, say the experts, maybe \$8 million will be available for capital outlay projects.

That's hardly enough to plug leaks in the Roundhouse's roof. And it's certainly not enough to leave anything for projects in a Republican county after the majority Democrats get done with their carving knives.

It also perhaps explains why that Las Vegas Democrat representing Lincoln County in the state Senate made no effort to show up, nor even pass the word that he couldn't make it.

Pete Campos, a long-time public school administrator and currently part of the Senate leadership, no doubt had bigger fish to fry.

## Surviving winter ... with chemistry

WASHINGTON — As cold weather creeps across the United States, here's information from the American Chemical Society, the world's largest scientific society, on the some of the science behind winter:

Surviving the big chill — In the United States, between 750 and 1,000 people die from hypothermia in the average year. Despite common misperceptions, any air temperature under 60 degrees F has the potential to cause hypothermia.

According to a recent article in ChemMatters, a quarterly magazine for high school chemistry students published by the American Chemical Society, survival strategies such as eating snow for water can accelerate hypothermia because the body cannot afford the heat to bring the snow to body temperature and melt the ice crystals.

Falling into cold water is especially dangerous because water, which has a great capacity for heat, rapidly drains away heat energy from the body.

Aircraft de-icers — If you're planning to escape south this winter, rest assured chemists have made your travels safer.

De-icers such as chloride salts are effective and popular for use

on roadways, but they are corrosive and prohibited for use on aircraft. Like automobile antifreeze, aircraft deicing fluids are aqueous solutions of glycol, according to an article published in Chemical & Engineering News, a weekly magazine published by the American Chemical Society. Aircraft de-icers break up snow or ice so it can be removed from critical surfaces — such as the wings, flaps, and fuselage — more easily. When a plane is held over for a longer period of time, de-icing is followed by treatment with anti-icing fluid, which keeps water from freezing or refreezing.

Powder for the slopes — More snow falls on ski slopes today from snowmaking machines than from the sky. Real snow is formed when tiny ice crystals adhere to dusty particles in the atmosphere, according to a recent article in ChemMatters.

When the particle becomes heavier than the buoyant force of the air holding it up, it falls to the ground as snow. Snowmaking machines mimic the process by sending out a spray of water, compressed air, and dead, nonpathogenic bacteria for ice crystals to build on.

The water, shot 20 to 30 feet into the air, turns to snow before it hits the ground.

My emissions permit requires me to have a phone and call people all over the county, driving around to locate someone to sign my permit, and travel to Ruidoso to reapply for a new permit.

No one in the village of Ruidoso has to call anyone about emitting smoke.

They just smoke and smoke away.

I do not believe that the playing field is even. Regulate some, but not all? Regulate agriculture, but not homeowners when they're both doing the same thing? I have a hard time with this as it targets and regulates and increases costs for agriculture, but looks the other way for home owners. A home that heats with wood burns as much fuel over a period of 24 hours as I do in a pile of fuel burned in 30 minutes. What's the deal.

I understand that the regulation came about due to complaints about people in town having to deal with the smoke from ranchers' burning. Well, I would like to complain about the smoke from the towns' burning. My home is downwind from Ruidoso and Capitan. What will N.M. Environment department do about that?

## Researchers create a modern mummy, Egyptian style

Ashes to ashes. Dust to dust. Death comes to everyone, and decay follows soon after. At least, it usually does. But now and then, something — either chance or design — holds putrefaction at bay, and a body becomes a mummy. We're so fascinated by the "living dead" that you'd think we would have worked out exactly how these bodies are preserved.

Of course we understand the broad outline — freezing, drying and certain chemicals prevent bacteria and human enzymes from breaking down tissues, but the finer details are only now beginning to emerge, thanks to a few researchers who've decided to make mummies of their own.

Take Egyptian mummies. We know that dehydration was the key here, depriving bacteria of the water they need to go about their business. But the Egyptian embalmers kept their exact methods a trade secret, and archaeologists never knew whether the few descriptions written by outsiders held the complete recipe followed by mummy makers.

It was quite a secretive profession, and you would question whether the embalmers would have given away their secrets to a foreign visitor," says Richard Evershed from the University of Bristol.

So Bob Brier, an Egyptologist at Long Island University, decided the only way to find out if ancient historians had left out important details was to make his own mummy, following their instructions. In 1994, he and his colleague Ronn Wade from the University

of Maryland got their hands on the fresh corpse of an elderly Baltimore man who had donated his body to science, and set to work.

Following descriptions recorded by the Greek historian Herodotus and others, they extracted his brain and abdominal organs and then packed the body cavity with linen bags of natron, a mix of salt with sodium carbonate and bicarbonate that Brier had dug from dry salt lakes in Egypt for historical accuracy. They then covered the corpse in a 264-kilogram heap of the stuff and put it in a hot, dry room. There they left it for 35 days, half expecting to find a putrid lump of flesh when they returned.

When they finally opened the room, their noses heralded better news. "It had a fishy, peppery odor," recalls Wade. "I wouldn't say it was pleasant, but it wasn't obnoxious." Sure enough, when they cleared away the natron, the body had dried. "In a sense, we were looking at an Egyptian mummy for the first time," says Brier. "And what was shocking was that it looked just like a mummy — that leathery brown — and to a great extent felt like a mummy." In other words, 3,000 years of storage has little effect on many real mummies.

The natron had drawn out more than half the body's weight in water, with only the buttocks and a few parts of the back retaining enough water and oils to be pliable. After examining the body closely, the two researchers tiled it and packed the cavity with spices and wood shavings. Then they wrapped it in linen — in ancient Egypt this would have protected the body from nibbling insects, as well as giving it a more life-

like plumpness — and stored it away. Their mummy is now seven years old, and shows no signs of deterioration — which suggests, says Brier, that simple dehydration is the key to mummification.

Or is it? "I think there's a bit more to it than that," says Evershed, who believes that the application of oils, waxes and resins to the body surface after drying plays a crucial role, not the mere ceremonial purpose that Brier ascribes to it. "The tombs are rather damp places. Maybe they found that things would rehydrate if you didn't then take further steps to waterproof them and add some antibacterials."

ENMU-R students are building a spec house in Rancho Ruidoso

Not many students finish a course and have a completed house to show for it, along with 10 hours of college credit. A building-trades class at Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso goes into its second semester with only four students — and needs six more to finish the building in Rancho Ruidoso Estates.

Last semester the students began their class by excavating the land and pouring the footings for a "spec" house. Actually, they began class at the Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso facility where they learned about safety on the job, applied math, blueprint reading and materials required. Second-semester students — and there's still time to sign up — will learn to do roofing, sheet rocking, framing, finishing, painting and interior finishing.

The class will meet from 8 a.m. to noon (or 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. in cold weather), Monday through Friday, starting Monday. Registration is Jan. 14 and 15, and late registration is Jan. 14 through 18. Students who complete the semester will receive an occupational certificate that lists the skills they've learned and assistance in finding a job in the construction industry. The class is open to high school students, people who are out of school or enrolled in GED classes or another school. The cost is \$275 for Ruidoso school district students or \$319 for those from outside the district.

"They can go out to the job market and start a few rungs up the ladder after 32 weeks of building a structure from the ground up," said Jim Miller, director of ENMU-Ruidoso. "We think they'll be placed in the industry quickly because they

came to us to learn, they have the persistence to continue in the program, the training and the example that the job has set for them."

The 1,500-square-foot, three-bedroom, two-bath house was designed free by Dave Clark, a local architect and builder with Mountain Sun Design Studio Inc. John Kluthe is the instructor, sharing with students his 22 years of experience in the construction field — 18 of them with Eagle Creek Construction.

"It can be real challenging; also very rewarding," Kluthe said. "You're taking an inexperienced group of students and attempting to teach them the building skills that would be required, not only to be employed. They may want to build their own home. Even if they contract out, they'll have a better understanding of what is involved in building a house."

Kluthe spends much more time at the building site than the students do, laying out the work, but he finds sharing his knowledge rewarding.

"The other rewarding part," he said, "is that you create something that did not exist before."

Kluthe said most contractors are hunting for quality workers and one of the goals of the class is for students to step right into the job market, after 32 weeks of training.

This class is a collaboration between ENMU-Ruidoso, the Lincoln County Home Builders Association, and Gary Cozzens' School to Work Program — which provided startup funding for the tools that will remain permanent equipment for future house-building classes.

Next spring, Miller said, the Board of Realtors will help the college sell the finished house. He said they chose to build a

basic spec house as a teaching tool because they could price it affordably. The Rancho Ruidoso location is centrally located between the Ruidoso, Capitan, Carrizozo and Hondo school districts.

Besides working directly with Kluthe, some classes are taught by members of Lincoln County Home Builders. Concrete and electrical work is contracted out, but part of the bid for the jobs is to teach the students how to do these things.

Hardware stores have donated about \$5,000 in tools and materials, and others have loaned cement mixers.

The project was a bit delayed because of the weather and delays in the purchase of the land, Miller said, but the students and teacher made up some of the lost time over the holidays.

The Ruidoso Schools did a similar project in the 1970s with Lay Carter, now a computers teacher at White Mountain Elementary, as lead instructor, and Bob Dolgener, owner of Eagle Creek Construction, as consultant. Other similar programs exist in New Mexico with community colleges and high schools, including San Juan College, which builds two houses a year in its building trades program.

"John and I met with people who have the same program in Clovis, but they can't place their grads," Miller said. "Here, there's a demand for housing and commercial construction. The other advantage we have is the cooperation from the Home Builders Association for materials, suppliers, subcontractors and donated time."



The Tigers led by 12 points at the end of the third quarter, but then made some crucial mistakes. A series of fouls let the Coyotes sink a few much-needed free throws in the fourth, and two three-pointers by Coyote Rusty Hale brought them within striking range of Capitán's lead. Another Coyote three brought them within one point. Hale was Tatum's high scorer with 21 points.

The last minute of the game was breathtaking as the Tigers tried to maintain their lead, but a bucket by Tatum's Jacob Eubanks, his only one of the game, took the Coyotes over the top. A valiant effort by the Tigers in the last 30 seconds was to no avail as player after player missed shots.

After the game, Capitán coach Royce Brown said his players need to keep their heads in the game.

"Consistency is a concern," he said. "We've got the ability. Physically, all the pieces are there."

The Tatum contest was nearly a carbon copy of Friday's game against the Estancia Bears. There, the Tigers saw an 11-point halftime lead evaporate to four by the end of the third period. The Bears caught all the way up in the final frame, taking their first lead of the half at 46-42 with 4:41 left on a Brady Ness three-pointer. It was the first time the Bears were up since a 16-14 advantage with four minutes left in the second quarter.

The Tigers refused to give up, though, battling back with four straight points to go up 46-45 with 3:40 to go. The lead switched back and forth in an exciting exchange over the next three minutes until Bear Kyle Autry hit a bucket and was fouled with 44 seconds left. He missed the free throw, but had put his team up 54-53.

A subsequent Estancia steal led to two foul shots by David Benakis, pushing the lead to three. Tiger Thomas Pruitt then hit a layup to narrow it back to one before Bear Justin Danella hit one of two free throws with 11 seconds remaining.

Capitán still had a good chance to tie the game when Dennis Brockman was fouled while grabbing a rebound. But Brockman missed the front end of a one-and-one opportunity with five seconds to go. The ball went out of bounds off Estancia with just one second left, but Capitán's inbound play failed to get a shot, giving Estancia a 57-56 victory.

Sparks led the way for Capitán with 16 points and seven rebounds, while Thomas Pruitt scored 14

and had six assists.

"I had really expected we'd be in the championship game with Hagerman," Brown said. Brown, who used to coach at Tatum, said that while there is not a big rivalry between the schools, he would have enjoyed a win even more against his former team.

"In the first half, we hit some shots, hit some threes. But we didn't look inside enough. We had a size advantage," he said.

Things did not go any better for Hondo, Carrizozo or Mescalero, the other three area teams at the tourney. The Eagles and Grizzlies sent boys and girls teams, while the Chiefs sent only their girls. None of the five teams won their first round matches, ending up in the consolation bracket.

The Lady Grizzlies had the best fortune from there, winning their second game over Hondo in a thriller, 44-43, and making it to the fifth-place contest against Hagerman. But the Lady Bobcats were too tough, downing Zozo 66-39. Bianca Baca had 13 points in that game, and Ariel Vallejos added 12.

The Hondo girls notched a win in the seventh-place game over Mescalero, 67-62, but the boys went 0-3, falling to Carrizozo 73-20 in the final game. Grizzly Brandon Langley notched 30 points in that game, Carrizozo's only win in the tourney.

"We didn't win as many games as we'd like, but we got better, and that's what we were looking for," said Grizzly boys and girls coach Mel Holland.

Mescalero girls coach Roland Bradford said his girls, who went 0-3, had plenty of offense, but not nearly enough defense.

"Against Tatum, we thought you got points for shooting shots," Bradford said. We put up 93 shots, and made 26. I couldn't believe it when I did the stats."

The Chiefs lost their first-round game to Tatum, 72-51. They nearly got a win in the second round, falling to Hagerman 51-49 behind Augusta Lang's 19 points. Nicole Dolan had 18 in their final loss to Hondo.

Local representatives on the boys all-tournament team were J.R. Mitchell, Bo Sparks and Sheldon Moor from Capitán and Brandon Langley from Carrizozo. Brown said he felt Tiger Thomas Pruitt had a great tourney and should have been honored as well.

On the girls' team, Tigers Jessica Tully-Mitchell and Jessica Becker made the squad, as did Mescalero's Augusta Lang.

All four schools are now preparing for the district season, which, for some, starts this week.

## Young jockey, rode locally, dies in wreck

Dusty Simpson, who rode several times in 2001 at Ruidoso Downs, is dead at 29.

Jockey Dusty Stimpson, who sometimes rode at Ruidoso Downs in recent years, died early New Year's Day after being in a one-car accident.

Simpson, 29, and his girlfriend, Jody Behunin, were driving back from Bakersfield when the accident occurred at the intersection of the 60 and 5 Freeway entering Los Angeles. Behunin, who was driving the vehicle, is currently listed in serious condition at USC Medical Center in Los Angeles.

Simpson's body will be flown to Ogden, Utah, for his funeral to be held on Friday, Jan. 11 at 11 a.m. at Myers Mortuary Chapel. His body will be laid to rest at Washington Height Memorial Park immediately after the service.

A native of Ogden, Stimpson made his riding debut at Wyoming Downs in 1990 and began riding at Los Alamitos in 1994 on the way to winning 424 races there.

In his career, Stimpson rode 4,678 starters and 501 winners, including 53 stakes winners. His mounts earned \$8,087,906.

# Aggies improve in conference; UNM drops thriller

■ NMSU got a 80-63 win over South Alabama, while the Lobos fell to Gonzaga in OT.

Sophomore forward James Moore continued his hot play by scoring a career-high 32 points to lead the Aggies to an 80-63 South Belt Conference win over South Alabama Saturday.

Moore also had a career-high six blocked shots and 11 rebounds. He hit eight of 13 shots from the floor and 16 of 20 free throws. Aggie junior center Chris Jackson was the only other player in double figures with 13.

The Jaguars were led by 16 points apiece from Jamaicus Ricks and Adam Salow.

New Mexico State has now won two in a row and improves

to 9-6 overall and 3-1 in the league. South Alabama falls to 5-9 overall and 2-2 in the Sun Belt Conference.

New Mexico State started the game red hot, hitting four of its first seven shots and grabbing an 8-0 lead. The Aggies would struggle shooting the rest of the half, but still led 36-32 despite South Alabama shooting 52 percent from the floor.

New Mexico State turned it on in the second half, hitting nearly 61 percent of its shots while holding the Jaguars to just under 36 percent from the floor.

The Aggie halftime lead was immediately cut to two on a jumper by Henry Williams, but New Mexico State then went on an 8-0 run to grab a 44-34 lead. The scoring spurt was fueled by

back-to-back dunks by Jackson and Moore.

South Alabama was still hariging around, down 56-47 with 9:06 left when the Aggies went on a game-breaking 11-2 run to grab a 67-49 lead with 6:16 left. The Jaguars would get no closer than 13 the rest of the way.

For the second consecutive game, the Aggies tied a season-low by turning the ball over just nine times, including just three in the first half.

Brandon Mason had another solid all around game scoring six points, grabbing eight rebounds, dishing out three assists and coming up with four steals while playing 38 minutes.

## Gonzaga 95, UNM 90, OT

The New Mexico Lobos had

a great chance to put away the 18th-ranked Gonzaga Bulldogs in the final seconds of regulation Monday, but came up short in a 95-90 overtime loss in front of 17,243 frenzied fans at The Pit.

Down by 12 points early in the second period, the Lobos tied the score at 78 following a Marlon Parmer layin with 11 seconds left in the regulation.

On the Bulldogs' ensuing trip down the floor, Dan Dickau was whistled for a charging foul. Upset with the call,

Gonzaga's Alex Hernandez slammed the ball on the floor and was charged with a technical foul with seven seconds remaining. UNM's Ruben Douglas, who got the Lobos back into the game by scoring 15 of his 19 points in the last 10:57 of the

second half, missed both free throws.

New Mexico still had possession, however, with seven seconds remaining, but Parmer barely got past half-court and never got a good look at a potential game-winning basket.

The Bulldogs posted four-point leads on three occasions early in overtime, only to have the Lobos roar back again. Parmer, who scored nine of his career-high 30 points in the extra period, nailed a three-pointer then a short jumper to give New Mexico an 87-86 advantage. Parmer also set a career-best with four 3-pointers.

UNM led 88-87 after a Jamaal Williams free throw with 1:13 to go. Corey Violette answered at the other end

with a baseline jumper to hand the lead back to the Zags at 89-88 with 1:01 remaining. Parmer was fouled on a drive with 47.6 seconds left, but managed just one free throw to tie the score at 89. Dickau's basket with 37 seconds to go provided the Bulldogs with a two-point margin.

Parmer drove again and scored, but the basket was disallowed when he was called for charging with 22.3 seconds left. Dickau, who did not play in last year's game because of a broken finger, secured the win by making four free throws in the final 19.6 seconds of overtime.

The two schools have played twice and both games have gone into overtime. UNM knocked off Gonzaga 81-80, last year in Spokane.

## Fishing report for Ruidoso area, as of Jan. 9, 2002

**Ruidoso River** - The bit of snow we received last week did little to increase the flow rate on the river. Remember 10 inches of snow equals about 1 inch of rain. As stated last week, if you plan to fish the River, we suggest you concentrate your efforts below the confluence of Carrizo Creek downstream to the Gavilan Canyon Bridge. The fishing in this stretch of water has been outstanding. The water flow in this part of the River is about normal for this time of year, but is dropping due to lack of rain. The last stocking of the river was three weeks ago, we should be getting another stocking soon. Large Stoneflies are abundant in the river now, Rock Worms are declining in size and quantity, and Scuds are still on the increase in the waters. Tie a dry fly on as a lead fly then tie a nymph dropper about 12 to 18 inches behind. Use the lead fly as your strike indicator. This is an effective and fun way to fish small waters. Wear layers of clothes as the temperature near the water changes quickly.

**South Fork** - South fork is about done until Spring. The water flow rate is at a trickle.  
**Bonito Lake**: Bonito Lake is closed until April 1.  
**Eagle Lakes**: Eagle Lakes are closed

for the season.  
**Grindstones**: No change from the past couple of weeks. Still no skim ice on the lake surface. Grindstones continues, to offer spotty fishing. Woolly Buggers and Zonkers fished fairly deep have produced fish the past two weeks. For spin casters, tie on an Olive or Black propeller fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish. Please remember to squeeze the barbs down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water.  
**Lake Mesquero**: The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark woolly buggers continue to take fish late in the day. A few folks have been successful with Parachute Adams, Mosquito, or Hendrickson patterns and casting to rising fish. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk.
