Ruidoso youngsters take to the slopes on the first day of

## SKI SCHOOL

The first day of the School Ski Program at Ski Apache was a success, with 725 students, mostly from Ruidoso and Capitan, with a few from Hondo and Corona — and none from Carrizozo, which also participates in the program.

Three or four children suffered altitude sickness and one boy had a minor cut on his face, said Frank Cannella, principal of White Mountain Elementary School, who coordinates the program through the schools.

Ski days are planned for the next three Tuesdays, as well Jan. 29, Feb. 5 and Feb. 12, and students are dismissed from classes early to participate. First-timers take beginner instruction for their first two days for \$2.

"It went great, we had a great first day," Cannella said. He said the most children to participate in the program was about 1,500 a couple of years ago.

The program started in the 1960s with fourth-graders and

older. Now kindergarten students and older are allowed to participate. The cost of the lift tickets, \$2, is the same now as it was then; lessons were \$1, compared with \$2 now. For the school ski program, ski rentals for students are \$5 and parents pay the same fee for equipment as their children.

## Downs may seek different trash collector

Early morning racket, fuel charge bring complaints from residents

The village of Ruidoso Downs may try to find another source of garbage collection service, the town's new manager has warned.

John Waters told members of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority last week that he's looking at other options such as a private contractor or the village of Ruidoso to supply the service and meet additional needs.

Village officials are receiving complaints from residents about early morning noises from collection trucks and a fuel surcharge added to their bills, he said.

Earlier in the meeting, Debra Ingle, authority operational supervisor, reported on efforts to minimize those problems.

"I'm glad you're addressing those," he said. "But the board of trustees has to answer to its constituents, and a lot of issues have been raised. The board has instructed me to look into putting together a package to approach not only you, but perhaps another governmental agency or put it out for private service to see what we get in. I felt it was necessary for me to let you know ahead of time."

Residents look at services in Ruidoso, Alamogordo and other places and expect to see them in Ruidoso Downs, he said. The town's population leaped 98 percent in 10 years, he added.

Ingle pointed out that while Ruidoso residents may receive curbside pickup of some debris, they also must use dumpsters and are not given individual household collection with polycarts.

## Golf courses out of county's control

While several residents called for regulation of golf courses in Lincoln County, officials said they have no means to govern such projects if they aren't part of a subdivision.

At a county commission meeting last week, Oscura resident Jerry Carroll said the problem needs to be settled, but Commissioner William Schwettmann said it's beyond the county's control.

With no zoning regulations in the unincorporated county, golf courses aren't covered, he said.

Chairman Rex Wilson said the issue comes back to the water and that leaves decisions with the State Engineer.

With several golf courses already operating and others proposed for subdivisions and as independent projects, some residents insist the commission must protect county water resources.

"If they're not selling lots, the subdivision ordinance doesn't cover them," County Attorney Alan Morel said. "Zoning would."

## Stricter new sewer standards could cost taxpayers millions

The Rio Ruidoso's designation as a cold-water fishery is what requires the stricter standards to be met.

New environmental standards could cost the villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs more than \$10 million to improve the regional waste water treatment plant they share.

The plant's new discharge permit requires that stricter standards be met for the phosphorus content of the water discharged back into the Rio Ruidoso.

"The new standard is one of the strictest in the United States," Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson told members of the local Rotary Club Tuesday.

Forced to comply, partners in the plant could be looking at spending \$10 million to \$20 million within two years, he said.

"We've asked for a two-year delay for implementation to see if the phosphorus content is responsible for the algae growth," Donaldson said. "If it's caused by the nitrogen content, it will be a lot easier to correct."

If phosphorus content is the problem, village officials could seek to remove the "cold

water fishery" designation of the Ruidoso River east-down stream-of the plant, because it is that designation that requires higher standards to be met. Another option could be to stop discharging back into the river, and instead pipe the treated water elsewhere.

However, that could affect the river's flow, he said.

"If we have to meet the new standards, then it will require some 'out of the box' thinking," the mayor said. "This probably will be the most difficult issue we face in the next three or four years."

Village Manager Alan Briley said he's been trying to work with the state Environment Department, because that agency recommended the standards to the federal Environmental Protection Agency based on a stream study for cold water fisheries.

When he complained, environment officials said they conducted hearings and no one showed up to object.

"We told them no one came because they didn't have a clue as to the impact," Briley said. "You tell them you're going to require a lower phosphorus content and it doesn't mean a thing. Tell them it's going to cost you \$10 million and they'll show up."

# County changes subdivision water rule

Three down and one to go, but it's a big one.

Lincoln County commissioners last week approved a major change in the amount of water availability a developer must prove per lot, but faltered on setting a threshold figure for community water systems.

They agreed to reduce the amount of "provable" water from a half acre-foot to a quarter acre-foot, which equates to about 81,463 gallons per year.

But they added a requirement for a detailed water analysis and left themselves leeway to approve a lesser amount, if the study justified the action.

Commissioners said they hope to glean data from the studies to help produce a picture of water quantity and location throughout the county.

"We have to build a data base and that's going to be a concentrated and slow process," Chairman Rex Wilson said. The Ranches of Sonterra-Airport Road area will be a starting point, they agreed. "Each subdivision coming forward is going to have to pay for part of the data base and not the taxpayers."

The county planning board had recommended staying at a half acre-foot, but

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said he didn't want to see development stifled.

He cited homeowner average usage figures from Ruidoso as .14 acre-feet and from Alto as .16 acre-feet per year.

The board also approved eliminating letters of credit as guarantees for subdivision improvements, and added a requirement for disclosure statements to inform buyers that they must pay monthly fees for garbage collection by the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

But commissioners postponed action on the density issue related to community water systems until they have more information.

The county planning commission recommended that community systems be required with subdivisions of 100 or more lots.

To ease the financial burden on developers who would have to buy water rights to operate a system, several real estate agents urged commissioners to lobby for a change in state water law. The change would allow owners of individual lots in subdivisions to give up their rights to request domestic well permits and would transfer the acre feet to the community water system.

Currently, domestic wells can't be turned down and own-

ers are allowed to pump 3 acre feet per year. However, the State Engineer is expected to ask the legislature to reduce that amount to 1 acre-foot, several officials said.

Surveyor Tim Collins said the threshold should be based on the size of the lots, not on the number. One hundred acres divided into quarter acre lots might need a community system while a development of five acre lots would not, he said.

Nunley said the State Engineer told him a community water system is easier to monitor than "hundred of holes poked into the ground."

Van Patton, a developer, and a few real estate agents said if the threshold is too low, the cost will push developers to create larger subdivisions.

Commissioner Leo Martinez said the density of a development should be predicated on proving there is enough water.

Pete Thompson, a land developer, asked about the status of a water study recommended many months ago.

County Manager Tom Stewart said he met with the State Engineer last week and, "They said it would take a lot more than the \$60,000 we've allocated. They said they will assist us in the (2003) legislative session to get an appropriation."

Services Waters said village officials would like to see provided by the authority were listed as:

- Twice a week residential collection.
- Regular commercial collection routes with options for extra pickups.
- Permanent drop-off site for residential yard waste, construction/demolition debris, tires, Christmas trees and spent appliances within the village or close proximity.
- Guaranteed collection of waste within 24 hours of regular pickup time.
- Residential collection times between 5:30 a.m. and 5 p.m.
- Monthly curbside pickup of yard waste.

Guaranteed collection within 24 hours of scheduled times is very important to residents, especially at holidays, he said. Ninety-gallon containers fill quickly with a four-person household and it's hard to keep a neighborhood clean if they spill over, Waters said.

Curbside collection of yard debris also is needed to encourage homeowners to clean up their areas, he said.

"It's another thing essential to a village trying to clean itself up," he said.

Ingle pointed out that to delay the start of collection to 5:30 a.m. would bring some trucks back to the yard too late to meet the deadline for transport to the landfill south of Alamogordo. Letting the garbage sit until the next trip could cause odor problems in

the summer for neighboring property owners, she said.

Ingle said the authority is looking at land outside of Ruidoso Downs for a recycling center. Moving out of the village may alleviate some of the complaints, she said.

She also noted that Ruidoso Downs is a partner in the authority through a joint powers agreement "that's an absolute," she said. "That's something we will have to let the two attorneys visit on."

Waters responded, "I don't know how absolute it is, but certainly, we plan on giving the board an opportunity to look into this and we will be fair about it. At the same time, we have looked at other places like Ruidoso and they did it (garbage collection) before. It's something I cannot ignore."

This year, members are celebrating the 90th birthday of

the Girl Scouts. To appeal to more buyers, they'll be offering a reduced-fat cookie and a new type of shortbread and fudge commemorating the nine decade mark of the Girl Scouts.

Goar said scouts will stop at area businesses and homes Friday. Deliveries are expected Feb. 25 and booth sales in Capitan, Carrizozo and Ruidoso will start after the goods arrive for people who missed the scouts at their businesses or homes.

"All the money earned supports the local council and the girls," Goar said.

Cookies sell for \$3 per box, the same price as last year.

Eight types are being offered, including the most popular Thin Mint.

# County problems stem from state, auditor says

Two of three findings cited in the annual Lincoln County audit stem from problems with the state Finance Authority and a software programmer, County Manager Tom Stewart says.

Auditor Keith Day reviewed the results of the one-year period ending June 30, 2001 with county commissioners last week.

He said the county was unable to record loan intercept operating receipts and disbursement transactions during the accounting period in which

they occurred — something generally preferred. The county is unable to receive the monthly bank account statements from the New Mexico Finance Authority and perform the appropriate reconciliation procedures before the county treasurer's monthly closing and reporting deadline, he explained.

He recommend the county continue to press the authority for a more timely delivery of the information.

Stewart responded that the county has tried without success.

"Unless extraordinary efforts are taken, the (authori-

ty) is nonresponsive to county correspondence," he answered the auditor. "Unfortunately the county has no jurisdiction over the (authority) to force production of timely reporting."

Day also noted that employee gross wages reported in a pre-programmed state retirement report didn't accurately reflect the gross wages reported in the county's payroll journal. The cause apparently is an oversight by the software vendor's programming, he said.

Stewart said a letter was

sent to Triadic asking for a correction.

The third item cited by Day was a lack of security for the county's blank check stock and a facsimile stamp.

The county manager responded that the check stock was moved to the treasurer's vault room and the sequence numbering is being logged by the treasurer. The finance office staff will keep the box of checks being used locked in a back room. The facsimile signature stamp is now kept under

lock.

"I consider the results outstanding," Stewart said. "Two of the finding, I believe are the result of our rocky relationships with the Finance Authority and our software programmer — Triadic. One finding had to do with security of unused check stock and a facsimile signature stamp, which is easily corrected."

The results show "a real fine-tuning of our operation," he said. "Most important, prior-year findings were not repeated. Everyone associated with our financial operation deserves a real cheer for a job well done."

Protect Your Right To Know  
The Actions of Your Government

How important are public notices in newspapers?

As your newspaper looks to the future and toward continuing to provide the essential information that local citizens need in a timely fashion, it is appropriate to review the concept of Public Notice in newspapers. This concept is based on two fundamental principles:

- First, in a Democracy, the Public has an absolute right to know the actions of its government.
- Second, a Democracy is a system of checks and balances in which it is inappropriate to rely on the government to be the exclusive printer, repository and gatekeeper of information.

Government has a duty to make information accessible to the entire community in a place where the Public seeks and expects to find community news. Independent publication of Public Notice is essential to maintain the trust of the people.

## Here's one stinking kind of project

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. — The Army could have a new "offensive" weapon in its arsenal before long. One that really stinks!

Department of Defense officials have asked researchers at the Monell Chemical Senses Center in Philadelphia to create a universally offensive odor that can be used by the military for, among other things, crowd control, according to an article in the Jan. 7 issue of Chemical & Engineering News, the weekly news magazine of the American Chemical Society, the world's largest scientific society.

The nonlethal "odor bomb" is said to smell like rotting garbage, human waste and burning hair, according to the article's author, senior editor Maureen Rouhi, Ph.D.

Tests show the putrid odors "are potent in making people want to flee in disgust," notes the article. The odors also cause shallow breathing, increased heart rate and can lead to nausea, it adds.

The researchers focused on biological odors "because we thought those had the best chance of being recognized universally," says Monell researcher Pamela Dalton, Ph.D. "People really hated these odors," she adds.

Monell is the world's first research institute devoted to the multidisciplinary study of the chemical senses.

Another area of smelly research at Monell involves body

odor.

Monell chemist George Preti, Ph.D., has spent 30 years investigating such unpleasant, human smells as "underarm odor, bad breath and "fish odor syndrome," a genetic disease called trimethylaminuria.

Fish odor syndrome can be devastating to people with extreme cases, notes the article. They can smell like fish regardless of how many times they bathe or change clothes.


Unfortunately, because trimethylaminuria can occur sporadically, doctors are not always able to diagnose the disease. However, Preti has a battery of tests he administers that can tell if a person has trimethylaminuria.

Based on the results of the tests, Preti provides an extensive report that patients can then give to their doctors who can provide prescriptions for antibiotics to alleviate or reduce the smells.

Charles Wysocki, Ph.D., another Monell researcher, is working with Preti and the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture to lessen offensive farm odors.

With more urban housing communities springing up near what were once isolated rural farm regions, complaints have increased from the new neighbors about the pungent smells of nearby mushroom and pig farms.

The research is especially meaningful to the state, given the importance of farms to Pennsylvania's economy.



## LEARN

A special education coordinator for eight schools in San Antonio, Texas, Susan Martinez handled "angry parents, staff and attorneys." Now she's special education and bilingual education coordinator in Ruidoso.

"I like being more hands-on with kids and programming," she said, and her excitement about applying the latest research on how the brain works and how people learn is contagious.

Martinez moved into the position vacated by Paul Wirth when he became the high school principal this fall. For the three years prior to this, Martinez had been director of special education in Tularosa, although her family lives here and she'd been a commuter. She hadn't worked as an administrator in bilingual education, but finds the bilingual teachers in the Ruidoso schools "neat ladies, enthusiastic about their work."

One of the assets Martinez brought with her from Tularosa was a grant through the State Department of Education.

New Mexico has been "under the gun" by the federal government because the state had not been in compliance with federal law requiring that students with special needs or talents be in one classroom, she said. The Office of Special Education at the state level offered a grant to develop some good inclusion schools.

"I had done a lot of inclusion work in Texas and had some ideas, and I started getting grants in Tularosa," Martinez said. "When I moved into this position, the Office of Special Education with the State Department of Education offered to support the same work in Ruidoso."

Cloudcroft had been paired with Tularosa to save money on training, and now the program could be expanded to include Ruidoso.

Martinez chose to focus on the concept

of "differentiated instruction" because teachers had been asking her for ways to teach all ranges of ability levels and different learning styles in one classroom. What Martinez is developing is a set of teaching practices that vary how the subject matter is presented and "worked" by a wide variety of students.

An example she gave is teaching the planets. The gifted students could work on a research project, using reference books and the Internet, while severely delayed students might learn the names of the planets and locate them on a map of the universe.

"The content could be modified for upper and lower ends, different kinds of test questions could be used, with more analytical questions for the upper end students and for the others, knowledge questions. Everybody is still learning about the planets."

While some students may learn well with study sheets and other written materials, not all do, and differentiated education means providing learning experiences for many different learning styles, including those that may be more visually or tactually oriented.

Martinez taught for several years in a psychiatric day hospital, teaching students from kindergarten through sixth grade in the mornings — all together in one classroom — and students from grades 7 through 12 in the afternoon. She learned on the job how to set up her classroom so that everyone was learning, no matter their ability or learning style.

Some of the advantages of learning the techniques of differentiated education, she said, are:

"When you teach this way, teachers can do as much or as little as they want to,"

Martinez said. "It cuts down on behavior problems when kids are allowed to work in groups. It increases their motivation to learn; and, over all, student test scores rise because everyone is learning more. It really gets learning on a roll."

In order for differentiated learning to work well, teachers have to be very clear about what they want students to learn and be able to do — the essence of what the students will walk away with, she said.

Students are grouped based on interest and readiness levels, and because everyone in the classroom is doing meaningful work, the teacher is working with all of the students directly rather than just keeping the students quiet.

The groups of students are flexible so the teacher can work with a group that needs help — and all students need help at some point.

"All the kids learn more, no matter where they start out, and you don't have complaints about gifted kids saying 'I already know this,'" Martinez said.

Martinez, Sierra Vista Primary School principal Danny Flores and six teachers from White Mountain Elementary and Ruidoso Middle School attended a conference on differentiated instruction in Scottsdale Jan. 9-12 given by David A. Sousa, author of "How the Brain Learns."

"The research on this says it works," Martinez said. "It calls on us as teachers to become learners, to learn to do things in a more effective manner. I love learning and teaching and find this very exciting."

Martinez will teach a class through Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso to teachers in Ruidoso and the Region IX schools. The grant pays the tuition of Ruidoso teachers so that they will develop projects for their classes, such as "learning contracts" for different subject areas.

"I hope to find teachers that really want to go in depth in this and develop some kind of model classrooms," Martinez said.

## Reading — and sticking with it

All day, students at White Mountain Elementary School stuck to the Velcro wall or jumped in the inflatable room set up in the gymnasium as a reward for the 250 out of 380 students who qualified for an Accelerated Reading award. "I've dressed up as different things and wanted something for the kids to be excited about," Frank Cannella, principal, said. Rewards are arranged after every 9-week

period for those who meet their reading goals, which are based on reading ability and the teachers' reasonable expectations, Cannella said. Students earn points for reading 20 minutes a day outside of school, then take Accelerated Reading tests on what they've read. The last nine-week reward was T-shirts with the words "Proud Reading Warriors WMES" on them. In past years, Cannella has dressed up as a cow, a wicked witch, "Granny Cannella" and kissed a cow and a pig.

## Prospects dim for Stanton work

State unlikely to find money for business plan, commissioners told

Prospects don't look good for the state to kick in any money to develop a specific business plan for the future operation of historic Fort Stanton.

Reporting to Lincoln County commissioners last week, County Manager Tom Stewart said he met with Les Swindle, head of the property control division of the state General Services Department, on Jan. 14.

"In view of the flat state budget and the recommendation in the Kells & Craig study

that the fort continue under state ownership, he doesn't see moving ahead with the second phase," Stewart said.

But a \$44,000 federal economic development grant awarded to the county for the business plan must be used or forfeited, he said, adding he will research other options.

The Kells & Craig study, paid for in part by a state allocation, listed two preferred options as public mixed use or public trust.

The estimated cost to stop deterioration at the 1855 fort northeast of Ruidoso, to

revamp infrastructure, handle landscaping and accomplish site development is \$9,265,170.

Another \$13,433,015 would be needed for "adaptive use" of the buildings, plus architectural and engineering fees.

Since Gov. Gary Johnson closed the fort in March 1995, advocates have worked toward a plan that would see it converted into a living museum and center for educational programs and recreation-related activities. They have suggested a federal partnership with private entities, if the state isn't interested.

## Ex-inmate sues over jailhouse beating

A heavy equipment operator who claims he was beaten by inmates while confined in Lincoln County jail is suing the county in U.S. District Court for \$175,000 in compensatory damages and \$350,000 in punitive damages.

William B. Moody, represented by his attorney, J. Robert Beauvais, filed the suit earlier this week naming as defendants the county, all five county commissioners, Correctional Systems Inc. and its employees.

The county jail, a 100-120 bed facility that opened April 1, 2000 in the Carrizozo Industrial Park, is managed by CSI, a Delaware corporation based in California.

Mike Borrego, who took over as jail administrator shortly after the incident cited in the suit, referred questions to John Forren at CSI headquarters. Forren responded that the company has no comment at this time because attorneys are reviewing the suit.

Beauvais noted in the lawsuit that during contract negotiations with CSI officials, reduction of operating cost and employment status of the existing correctional officers were two primary issues.

According to the suit, Moody was booked into the center at 8 p.m., Sept. 16, on a warrant for failure to pay fines.

He was placed in a dormitory-style pod already containing 21 inmates. The pod had no internal security to separate inmates physically or by any system of risk classification or by status as an adjudicated or pre-adjudicated detainee, the suit states.

Within four hours of entering the pod, Moody claims he was attacked by six inmates and severely beaten with a blunt object, which he believes to be a mop handle that hadn't been properly secured from the inmate population.

The jail at the time was manned by three correctional officers, one in the control center, he claims in the suit.

The two remaining correctional officers were responsible

for the supervision of in excess of 100 male and female prisoners in separate living pods and separate cells," the lawsuit states.

The plaintiff claims he was helped by another inmate to reach the control center to the pod where he started yelling for help.

"Due to the inadequate staffing and control, it took approximately 10 minutes for a correctional officer to respond and come to Moody's assistance," the suit states. As a result, he suffered lacerations and contusions to his head requiring seven stitches. He still suffers from headaches and blurred vision as a result of the beating, the suit states.

Moody contends in the suit that the defendants were deliberately indifferent to his safety, that his constitutional rights to be secure guaranteed by the 14th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution were violated.

The defendants failed to provide a secure environment and adequate staffing, creating an excessive risk to Moody's safety, according to the suit.



The support these young athletes receive not only from coaches and parents, but from RHS principal Paul Smith and the administration shines through. ### Fishing report

**Ruidoso River** Guess it is time to wash the truck and make it rain or snow. The water level in the River is nearly at a year low. We are under 2 CFS and dropping. If you plan to fish the River, we suggest you concentrate your efforts below the confluence of Carrizo Creek downstream to the Gavilan Canyon Bridge. The fishing in this stretch of water has been quite good. The last stocking of the river was four weeks ago; we should be getting another stocking soon. Large Stoneflies are still abundant in the river now. Rock Worms are declining in size and quantity, and Scuds are present but declining in size. Tie a dry fly on as a lead fly then tie a nymph dropper about 12-18" behind. Use the lead fly as your strike indicator. This is an effective and fun way to fish small waters. Wear layers of clothes as the temperature near the water changes quickly.

**South fork** —Southfork is about done until Spring. The water flow rate is at a trickle.

**Bonito Lake and Eagle Lakes** — closed for the season

**Grindstone** — No change from the past couple of weeks; offers spotty fishing.
