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Three die in U.S. 70 head-on crash

Three Texas residents died Monday in a head-on collision with a school bus on U.S. 70.

Dead at the scene about four miles west of Hondo were driver Steven Harris, 27, of Breckenridge, Texas, and passengers Steve Stephens, 26, of Throckmorton, Texas, and his brother, Charles Stephens, 25, of Graham, Texas.

According to Lt. William Bower of the New Mexico State Police, the driver of the 1997 International school bus, Magdalena Salas, 55, of Hondo and the only student on the bus, Brenda Lucero, 11, of San Patricio, received minor

injuries. Salas was kept over night at the Lincoln County Medical Center with some broken ribs. Lucero was treated for injuries to her arms and legs and released, he said.

Bower said Harris was driving a 1989 Suburban west on U.S. 70 when the vehicle crossed the centerline and struck the bus, which at 4:31 p.m., was heading toward its last drop off.


Alcohol appears to be involved, Bower said. Several open containers of beer were found in the Suburban. The car was so badly damaged, it was difficult to determine if seat belts were in use, he said.

Members of the Glencoe-Palo Verde Volunteer Fire Department and Hondo emergency medical services responded to

the scene. Senior Patrolman Robert Eshom investigated the accident. The state police also brought in two sergeants from other districts to handle the accident reconstruction and two detectives came from the Major Crime Unit in Roswell, Bower said. At this point in the investigation, speed doesn't appear to have been a factor, he said.

The highway was reopened about 10 p.m. Before that, traffic was routed around the accident scene, Bower said.

The three deaths are the first fatalities of the year on the two-lane stretch of U.S. 70 from Ruidoso Downs to Roswell. As a result of a two-year study process, the highway currently is recommended for widening to four-lanes.

Old tickets

When Gina Chavira opened a letter from the state Motor Vehicle Division, she was surprised to see a notice to her husband that his driver's license was suspended.

"He was at work driving around on this license," she said. "I called him right away. He had no clue. He said he had done nothing, but here was a notification to appear in court and that his license was suspended."

She soon found out her husband isn't the only one in town experiencing the same surprise.

Susie Salas, Ruidoso municipal court clerk, said hundreds of notices were mailed out in an effort to close out old cases, some waiting to be paid for more than a decade.

In Juan Chavira's case, the ticket dated back to 1991.

"I asked how that can happen since then he has been pulled over for speeding and he has renewed his license and the ticket has never shown up," Gina Chavira said. "The clerk said it was his responsibility and I said I understand that, but not all citizens are responsible and that's why we have the law. I want people to know that someone in

municipal court didn't do their job. How could it have been lost in files for 12 years?"

The \$140 ticket was for speeding, she said.

Chavira said a notice apparently was sent warning of the possible

suspension, but the address used was from 1991.

"They found the right address for the suspension notice, but they couldn't get it from MVD to send the notice to alert us," she said.

Texas woman cleared in 1999 traffic fatality

Tamara Schones of Dallas was driving the sport-utility vehicle that collided with a pickup truck, killing Christine Sanchez of Glencoe.

A Lincoln County jury Friday acquitted a Texas woman, who was accused of vehicular homicide in a 1999 highway collision that killed Christine Sanchez of Glencoe.

Tamara L. Schones, 25, of Dallas, was driving a Ford Explorer that collided head-on with a pickup truck in the early morning hours of July 5, 1999, according to court documents.

Schones, 51, was the middle of three people in the front seat of the truck driven by her husband. Others in the truck and the sport-utility vehicle received non-life-threatening injuries.

During an earlier preliminary hearing on the case, a State Police officer testified that Schones told police she and three other occupants were coming back from a party and were behind a west-bound tractor trailer on U.S. 70 near Glencoe.

She saw a passing zone, went

around the truck and then saw headlights before hitting a guardrail.

According to testimony Friday, Schones passed three field sobriety tests, but her blood-alcohol level a few hours after the crash surpassed New Mexico's legal driving limit of .08 by registering at .13.

However, a state scientific laboratory expert said tests exist that could have, but were not run, to determine the level at the time of the accident. He said factors influencing the effect of alcohol include the sex, metabolic rate and body weight of the drinker, the pattern of drinking and the absorption rate.

A passenger in Schones' car testified that Schones never was impaired and had driven for 50 miles before the collision.

An accident reconstruction specialist hired by the defense and the driver of the semi Schones was trying to pass told the court she began her pass in the correct zone at a point where no oncoming vehicle could be seen.

Her reaction to pull left to avoid the collision was a reasonable decision under the circumstances, they said.

District Judge Jerry Ritter presided over the trial in Carrizozo and attorney Dan Bryant represented Schones.

Area stands to get state money for projects

With a day and a half left in the state Legislature's short session this year, state Rep. Dub Williams said Tuesday he's managed to add some capital outlay projects for this area in the bill that will go to Gov. Gary Johnson.

"We received nearly \$1.5 billion in requests and we have about \$250 million to spend, primarily from general

obligation bonds and severance taxes," the Republican from Glencoe said.

One of the projects he's most pleased to see budgeted is \$100,000 for an improved access and exit to the Hondo Valley Schools property off U.S. 70.

"The state Highway and Transportation Department said it will do the engineering as part of the U.S. 70 improvement project, but we needed additional money and this

should do it," Williams said from his office in Santa Fe. "State Sen. Dianna Duran (a Republican from Tularosa) also probably will have some money for this on her side."


Corona is in line to receive \$209,750 to build water storage tanks, Williams said.

"Two years ago they acquired the pipeline from El Paso Natural Gas, but they have no storage tanks," Williams said.

Municipal Judge Mike Line said all those receiving a suspension notice had four previous chances to take care of the problem and he doesn't think his small staff should have to chase down new addresses.

"Each one of those citations that were sent notices of license suspension, not only receive the ticket with an appearance date that they signed off on, but after they failed to appear the first time, they were sent a show-cause order to the address they gave the officer," Line said. "If they moved 15 times a year, that's not our fault. Then we tried again before the suspension went through to try to avoid the action."

In 1998, Line even declared a 30-day amnesty on failure to appear on the tickets.

"Only three people came in to settle their tickets," he said.

One of the reasons the village gave him a second clerk

this year was to clean up the two drawers full of old citations, Line said.

"We're handling close to 8,000 tickets a year. At the same time, you have this backlog at any given time of 600 to 1,000 people who 'just forgot,'" the judge said. "We don't have but two clerks and myself and it's about all we can do to handle the people who come through here."

"These warrants and orders for appearances ought to mean something. I agree after 12 years, that's a long time, but every time a warrant has been issued during my time on the bench (past four years), a copy has gone to the police department."

"On the other hand, if we went to the trouble and sent mail to the address that they gave the officer at the time and they just forgot and blew it off at the time, I don't know that we're required or that it's in the public interest to require my

clerks to issue that 600 more times. Instead of getting mad, if they would just come and take care of their business, I am more than reasonable. I'm not out to hammer some guy, but at the same time, a citation ought to mean something. It is not just a joke."

He suspects most people know when they haven't shown up for court, but after not hearing anything for a while, they think it will go away, he said.

"Well that's not what the law says," Line said. "If they just call, we'll work with them." What we're forced to do now to get the people in is to suspend their driver's license through the motor vehicle department and that is not a light task, dealing with Santa Fe to get that done. Sending them to the police has not cleared them. They've got all they can do. So one way we're going to clear them is to suspend licenses and that seems to work pretty well."

Wanda Muhlike, who works with County Attorney Alan Morel, said she joined the Sarasota society when it had \$75 in the bank. By the time she left 10 years later, the budget was more than a half million dollars and the organization was supported by 250 volunteers. She spent two and a half terms as president of the board of directors.

"We plan to do more fund raising and donor solicitation so we can introduce new programs and improve those we have," Muhlike said of the

Lincoln County society. "I also would like to see a cruelty investigator on staff. We used to have a retired police officer on staff in Sarasota. He would educate, not alienate people, but when necessary would go to court."

She hopes for more community involvement and a stronger educational program,

said Muhlike, who comes to the position with other good credentials. She owns four dogs and two cats. All were rescued animals. Lucy, a standard poodle, was adopted from the society shelter on Gavilan Canyon Road.

Also elected to the board were Dr. Robert Owens, DMV, Fran Overlees, Janet Krantz,

Laura Janson, Cal Cowden, Sue Jones and Becky Knight.

For the fifth year, the society will be the beneficiary of the annual Cross Your Heart Cup ski race at Ski Apache Resort and an auction at Casa Blanca restaurant.

The race, celebrating a decade of fun, features 20 to 30 participants who show up in bizarre costumes. Sandra Ford, shelter administrator, said puppies will be brought to the ski area to thank those skiing and perhaps tempt a few prospective adopters. The races begin at 10 a.m.

The auction is set for 6 p.m. in the lower level of Casa Blanca off Mechem Drive. In a casual assembly, people can bid on more than 75 items, including top of the line ski clothes and accessories and a \$225 weekend retreat at a local bed and breakfast, \$150 in green fees and taste-tempting gift baskets.

All proceeds go to the society's spring time Prevent A Litter spay and neuter campaign.

Another long-awaited project is a new roof for the Ruidoso education center of Eastern New Mexico University. Williams said \$135,000 is set aside for that request.

Tularosa in Otero County also should see \$100,000 for renovation of its city hall/public safety building, he said.

"There might be some more in there, a vehicle or two and expenditures for senior citizen program in Lincoln County," Williams said.

As of Wednesday, bills to ensure the state's ability to meet its water debt to Texas were moving between the Senate and the House, he said.

"If the State Engineer has to make a call on water rights, it will be devastating to the agricultural economy of the southeast part of New Mexico," he said. "If farmers can't water crops and produce food, the state also will suffer in taxes."

"I'd hate to see a lot of money wasted in court that could be used for conservation, forest health and water retention. I think this debate has brought up public awareness that this is a state problem, not just along the Pecos and Rio Grande."

An agreeable House opts for openness

But some N. M. Senate members prefer the 'ludicrous'

New Mexico has a relatively accessible government at most levels, thanks to some hard-won laws concerning open meetings and open records.

The big exception has been in the Legislature itself, and those conference committee sessions in which three Senate and three House members get together and make the compromises in wording necessary to accommodate different versions of a bill passed by the separate houses.

Historically, politicians like to cut their deals in private. So the recent effort by the Republican minority to open up those conference committee meetings to some sunshine, air and outside observation is notable: The House last week passed, by a 45-19 vote, a resolution requiring those conference committees to open their meetings to the public unless lawmakers say there is "good cause" to close them.

Senate Pro Tem Richard

Romero — who managed to replace the redoubtable Manny Aragon last year — predicted the Senate might approve the rules change; it had OK'd something similar last year, but not by a sufficient (two-thirds) margin required to change legislative rules.

We happily salute Lincoln County's Rep. Dub Williams and all the other House Republicans and Democrats who voted for the rule change.

But the regular session ends Thursday, and on Tuesday the Senate, by one vote, 27-13, failed passage.

Strangely, Republican Lt. Gov. Walter Bradley ruled that a two-thirds vote of senators elected (not present) was necessary to change the rule. Supporters said the rule was two-thirds of those present. It could be resurrected, but will it? Sen. Rod Adair of Roswell, who carried the bill, called the failure "ludicrous."

So do we.

It was a touching moment. There he was, Senator Manny Aragon, master power broker, ferocious political fighter, skin tough as hide, favor seeker, deal maker, Democratic Godfather, all of a sudden taking a turn as Senator Pooh Bear.

Those pesky 'workplace romances' create problems

ALEXANDRIA, Va. — The majority of Human Resource (HR) professionals and corporate executives agree that workplace romance is something they would personally avoid, yet their organizations typically don't have policies addressing it.

These are the findings of a new survey on workplace romance jointly produced by the Society for Human Resource Management (SHRM) and CareerJournal.com, the executive

career site from The Wall Street Journal.

The survey respondents included 558 HR professionals surveyed by SHRM and 668 corporate executives surveyed by the CareerJournal.com Web site. The majority of HR professionals (81 percent) and executives (76 percent) said that workplace romances were dangerous because they can lead to conflict in the organization. Respectively, 76 percent and

71 percent said workplace romances would be something they would personally avoid.

Despite the fact that most executives would avoid a romantic relationship in the workplace, very few organizations have policies that formally govern workplace romance. Seventy-five percent of HR professionals and 59 percent of executives said their organizations had no policy on workplace romance. "Although they may not lose their jobs, employees involved in office romances could be viewed as unprofessional, especially if they are public in their displays of affection."

A majority of HR professionals (66 percent) and corporate executives (57 percent) reported that over the past five years, employees who had been involved in a workplace romance got married.

In the Hondo schools, one person teaches art from grades

K through 12

with brushes.

This is the second year for Hondo students to have a certified art teacher since the 1996 school year, but since there isn't an art room, all the classes are held in half of the multipurpose room.

"They hired me last year and didn't have an art facility, so they divided the multipurpose room and gave me half of it," said art teacher Kire Bennett. "I have a lot of combined classes and two periods of high school students."

Hondo schools offers art classes to kindergarten through high school students, something the system didn't have to do, Bennett said.

The high school was required by the State Department of Education to offer classes giving fine arts credits for graduation, explained John MacCallum, superintendent for the school district.

"We had been counting Fiesta Dancers as a fine arts credit, but the state said we have to have a certified dance teacher to do that. It was easier for us to hire an art teacher than a dance teacher," he said.

When fiesta dancing was taken out of the curriculum because community members taught the classes, the district didn't need to spend money on a teacher, but it did need an art teacher, MacCallum said.

Most of the projects Bennett's students work on are interdisciplinary and multicultural.

Students learn about famous artists in history, such as Miro and Van Gogh, and study American Indian arts. They've made beads out of clay and strung them, made kachina dolls and worked with mosaics, as

well as three-dimensional butterflies.

The same basic materials are used for high school classes as for elementary classes. All students draw, paint, and work with clay and papier mache.

"We have a lot of fun," Bennett said. "The kids just love to do anything creative."

Bennett grew up in the area, moving to Roswell from Santa Fe when she was 4. Her family had bought the Gibson's Discount Store franchise for the state of New Mexico.

She has a bachelor of fine arts degree in studio art from Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas, and a K-12 teaching certification through Eastern New Mexico University-Portales.

Most of the teaching she'd done in the past was in the education departments of Amon Carter and the Kimball museums in Fort Worth, Texas, and the Roswell Museum.

At the first two museums, she designed after-school programs to be taught at the collections. At the Roswell Museum, she taught painting and sculpture classes to children and adults. She also taught elementary art classes in the Dallas school system.

Last year, Bennett taught physical education classes as well as art classes in Hondo, but this year, someone else volunteered to teach physical education, so she's able to teach more art classes and to include all grades, not just high school students, as required.

"I don't think I've ever known anyone who's taught kindergarten through 12th grade," Bennett said.

Tiger boys dispatch Hatch; girls struggle offensively in defeat

"We thought if we could get it a little more up-tempo, we could use it to our advantage," he said. "They had seven offensive rebounds in the first half. We had zero. We had to cut their second chances."

Capitan led for most of the first half, but never built a lead bigger than six points and was ahead at halftime, 23-21. That tight play continued for most of the third quarter,

until the Tigers went on a 6-0 run to end the period ahead 34-26.


"We had a little letdown in the first half at times," Brown said. "But we've got a lot of heart and we believed we were more talented and we'd come out on top."

Laura Zuniga scored 26 points for Hatch, while the Tigers had no one in double figures. Sophomore Melissa Becker, who has played a good deal of JV ball this year, gave the team some quality minutes off the bench with six points.

"We scored two points in the third quarter and one point in the first. That was the difference of everything right there," Tiger coach Rusty Wilcox said.

The coach said he was happy with his defense, but that offense has become problematic recently.

"We have to struggle for every basket we get. There are no easy buckets."

The Tigers are now 1-6 in District 5AA play and have just one game left before the district tournament starts next week. They travel to Cloudercroft Friday, and will also have to hit the road for all their tournament games.

Wilcox said a win Friday would be a huge confidence-builder going into the tourney.

"Lately our confidence is probably not that high because we've lost four or five games in a row," he said. "If we would have won those first few district games, it would be better."

Capitan was in several early district games that it eventually dropped.
