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Plenty of choices in June 4 election

There will be some hotly contested county and federal races in this summer's various primaries

With five incumbent Lincoln County officials not running for re-election, candidates flooded the Lincoln County clerk's office Tuesday signing up to run for the empty chairs.

Thirteen people showed up to declare their candidacies for county commission seats.

In District 2, former Ruidoso council member Bill Chance will face Maurice "Maury" A. St. John, a county planning commission member, in the Republican primary June 4. Democrat Mike Runnels, recently hired as director of planning and zoning for Ruidoso, will wait in the wings to challenge the Republican nominee in the Nov. 5 general election. Incumbent L. Ray Nunley could not

seek re-election because of term limits. He was elected to the Ruidoso Village Council earlier this month and will serve in dual positions until the end of December.

In District 4, Alto resident Earl Hobbs, a former cotton farmer and businessman, will appear at the top of the Republican ballot, followed by Francis "Frank" See **ELECTION**, page 2A

Four-lane plan gets approval from state, feds

■ To the chagrin of its opponents, U.S. 70 got the nod for widening.

A decision was signed Friday by state and federal highway representatives authorizing the widening of U.S. 70 to four lanes from Riverside to Ruidoso Downs.

The design also will include some center turn lanes, consolidation of driveways and perimeter acceleration and deceleration lanes.

Ruben Thomas, New Mexico Division administrator of the Federal Highway Administration, said Monday right of way agents were put into action that morning to begin making offers on land needed for the project.

"We will accept proposals April 2 for the design-build of the project and then evaluate the information," he said. "Sometime in May or June, depending on how the evaluation goes, we will award the contract."

"I hope when we finish the roadway, the comments will be, 'Why did we ever oppose this?'" It will fit in with the environment. We also put in restrictions for lower speeds through Tinnie and Hondo State police officers should find it easier to patrol because there will be places to pull over cars."

The overriding factor was safety, he said.

"We're averaging seven fatalities per year," Thomas said. "That's really unacceptable. There are environmental concerns, but I think we've done everything we can. Safety is the biggest issue."

In the last 34 months, 21 people died in accidents on U.S. 70.

Speaking on behalf of the Valley Community

Preservation Commission, a group that sought compromise on the highway design or an alternate route, Luis Jimenez said Tuesday members were "upset and disappointed" with the decision.

It will not provide a safer road, he contended.

"Studies in Texas, Arizona and Iowa have pointed out that simply four-laning a road is not as safe as an improved two lane, or what is referred to as a super two, in a rural situation," he said.

"We do not have adequate enforcement in the valley and

without that, it will never be a safer road. The proposed design will further degrade the river and the environment. It will cause severe damage and destruction to the history and culture of the valley. While we in the valley are most affected, we have spoken with

the National Trust for Historic Preservation and they also have serious concerns. The decision to use a 'design-build' has enabled Parsons Brinckerhoff (the consulting firm) and the state highway department to bulldoze through the process as it will bulldoze through this unique valley."

Jimenez disagreed that four lanes would have prevented two recent accidents that resulted in four deaths. He contended the drivers caused the accidents either by speeding or passing in no-pass zones on a curve.

But Thomas said with four lanes, the drivers could have passed without risk and the accidents could have been avoided.

"People will be there (on the road) anyway," he said. "This is a tourist area. The young men from Texas (in the pickup hit by a passing semi-truck) still would be alive today. They did."

Texas firm to build new Mescalero inn

Same company that constructed the reservation's new school chosen for resort, elderly care projects

A Texas-based firm was picked to build two projects aimed at expanding and improving services provided on the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

Centex Construction Company, which is winding up a \$37 million school complex on the reservation abutting Ruidoso, will oversee the \$85 million expansion of the existing Inn of the Mountain Gods and Casino Apache, and construction of a new \$6 million elder care facility.

According to information from Centex, the existing hotel will be completely rebuilt with an adjoining casino. Plans include the transformation of the 250-room hotel into a premier resort destination with convention center, spa, retail corridor and ballrooms.

The majority of hotel rooms will offer lake views and extensive amenities, and existing attractions will continue such as golfing, hunting, clay shooting, horseback riding and skiing.

A major feature of the new resort will be a 40,000-square-foot adjoining casino with

1,000 slot machines and 25 game tables catering to large bus tours. The new spa and fitness center will offer an indoor/outdoor swim-under pool, steam and exercise rooms, sauna and several Jacuzzis.

Mescalero President Sara Misquez recently announced the tribe's commitment to construct the 60-bed elderly care center and kidney dialysis unit.

Construction of the 43,500-square-foot complex will begin in June and probably take nine months to a year. The project will consist of a 40-bed nursing home and 20-bed assisted living section. The closest dialysis treatment facility for tribal members now is a 60-mile round trip.

Misquez said the facility is designed in a hub concept with the shared nurse's station in the center. Patient and administrative areas are designed as spokes radiating out from the hub.

The elder care project has long been considered one of the top priorities for the tribe. Misquez said the center is expected to employ about 45 people, full- and part-time.

"Our beliefs and traditions dictate that

we respect and take care of our elders," Misquez said, "and this facility will allow our mothers, fathers and grandparents to come back home to be taken care of by their own people and in our own ways."

"I told the State Legislature earlier this year: We are building opportunities for quality education for our children and care of our elderly — a better life — with money from our gaming operations."

"Much of the same team completing the Apache K-12 school will continue on with these two new projects," said Rick Johnson, Centex vice president and executive overseeing the projects. "This continuity gives Mescalero a team that understands their culture and values and can incorporate these ideals into the new facilities."

The tribe has completed construction of a \$3 million "interim" school, and is closing in on completion of a \$37 million permanent school. Coupled with the nursing home project, nearly \$46 million in construction will be accomplished on the reservation in a three-year span, all since Misquez was elected president of the 4,000-member tribe, a Mescalero spokesman pointed out.

Higgins, of the extraterritorial planning commission, Bob Johnson and Curtis Payne. Democrat Darrel Stierwalt, principal of Capitan High School, is unopposed for his party's nomination.

Incumbent William Schwetzmann could not run for re-election because of term limits.

In District 5, incumbent Republican Rick Simpson will be challenged for his party's nomination by Humberto Maldonado and Orlando Montes Jr. On the Democratic side, Ralph Romero, a member of the county road review committee, will face Reynaldo Valcarcel, who ran unsuccessfully two years ago for state representative.

Commissioners are elected by voters within their districts, but candidates for county clerk and county treasurer face voters countywide.

For treasurer, Republican Beverly Payne-Calaway, currently chief deputy in that office, will run against Jules B. Videau, who earlier

this month lost a bid for a position on the Ruidoso village council.

For county clerk in the Republican primary, Tammie Maddox, Ruidoso village clerk for the past 17 years, will face Sam E. Chavez, elections and deputy clerk, and Robin Rafkin with the district judge's office.

No Democrats are running for either of those positions and incumbent Treasurer Joan Park and County Clerk Martha Proctor cannot seek re-election because of term limits.

Incumbent Magistrate Judge William Butts in Division II, based in Ruidoso, is being challenged by Phillip R. Smalley and Harrold Ray Mansell, who currently is Ruidoso Downs municipal judge. They all are Republicans.

In Division I, incumbent Gerald Dean Jr. is retiring. Running for his seat are Republicans Michael L. Shivers, owner of a Carrizozo feed and supply store; James B. Biggs, a detective with the Ruidoso Police Department; and Martha McKnight Proctor, now serving as county clerk.

In district races, State Rep. Dub Williams, a Republican from Glencoe and a retired teacher, faces no opposition for re-election in District 56.

But for the first time in several years, the county also will be represented in two other districts. Republican Avon W. Wilson from Roswell is unopposed in District 59. But incumbent Daniel Foley, a Republican in District 57, will face Adam D. Rafkin, a Ruidoso attorney, in the primary. The winner will be pitted against Democrat Doris Cherry, a reporter for a Carrizozo-based newspaper and chairman of the Lincoln County Democratic Party.

All four 12th Judicial District judges will face a retention vote. They are Jerry H. Ritter Jr. and James Waylon Counts and Frank K. Wilson, based in Otero County, and Karen L. Parsons, based in Lincoln County.

For the State Regulatory Commission in District 2, which after redistricting includes portions of Lincoln County, David W. King will face Rory McMinn; both are Republicans. In District 5, incumbent Democrat Tony Schaefer

is opposed by Jack L. Valencia Jr. and T. Shirley Baca in the primary. The winner will face Republican Harold Chub Foreman in the general election.

On the federal level, incumbent Pete V. Domenici, a Republican, faces Orin G. Cole, a write-in, for his party's nomination. The three Democrats running are Gloria Tristani of Albuquerque, Francesca Lobato of Santa Fe and Don Durham of Farmington.

In the 2nd Congressional District, competition also is stiff because incumbent Joe Skeen, a Republican, is retiring.

Running on the Democratic side are John Arthur Smith of Deming and Ruben A. Smith of Las Cruces.

But the field is most crowded with Republicans. They are Phelps Anderson of Roswell, C. Earl Greer of Winston, J. Andy Kissner of Las Cruces, Leo Martinez of Ruidoso, Steve Pearce of Hobbs, Ed Tinsley of Alamogordo and William Scott English, a write-in from Alamogordo.

n't do anything wrong. The next person to die on that road could be a local or someone just visiting.

"I drove State Road 44 last week (in northwestern New Mexico), which was a notorious roadway for safety (before being widened). Driving it now, everybody is spread out and if someone is going a different speed, they just pull into another lane and pass, and you don't have this thing of fearing for your life every time you try to go around a

car.

"Everybody is enjoying riding that roadway now because they can relax and enjoy the scenery, which is truly beautiful, and they don't have to worry about meeting somebody head-on as you do now going through Hondo Valley on U.S. 70."

Two last-minute agreements were struck Friday, he said. One will change the alignment of the highway to lessen the impact on acequias, which are traditional and historically shared irrigation ditches. The other, still being

worked out, would ensure the involvement of the National Historic Trust and the state Historic Preservation Alliance in the handling of landmarks and historic sites, he said.

The only avenue of appeal to the project, first announced in June 1999, is in a courtroom, Thomas said. The State Highway Commission approved the issuance of \$95 million in bonds last October to pay for the 38-mile project.

"We realize this was a controversial project and was opposed, so we have tried to address everything," Thomas

said. "We've followed all the procedures and even did a supplemental assessment. The last two things agreed to on Friday were added to make sure we were meeting everybody's considerations. I know we've done everything in accordance with the law.

"I know some people still are not in favor, but we had to look at what is best for everybody. For safety, four-lane is the only way to go."

Vote recount yields same numbers as were tallied in March 5 election

A recount of votes cast for a two-year term on the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees came up with the same results Friday - Susan Garrett the winner by one vote.

Camille Johnson pulled 135 votes in the March 5 election to incumbent Garrett's 136.

But J. Robert Beauvais, the attorney for Johnson, said Monday some irregularities occurred in the election and he's waiting to hear from his client whether she wants to

go to the time and expense of protesting the election in district court.

"There were irregularities," he said. "Whether they are sufficient for the early voting box to be thrown out would be up to a judge. She also could seek to throw out the ballot of one early voter who was not a qualified elector and his vote should not count.

"That would put the election at a tie vote and the law says it would be decided by a game of chance."

The irregularities were tied to the required locking and

unlocking of the early voting machine and the residency of one voter, he said.


Village Clerk Carol Virden said Monday the tally came out exactly the same when certified voting technician Paul Baca rechecked the two machines used in the election.

Attending the recount in official capacities were Lincoln County Clerk Martha Proctor, district judge designee Robin Rafkin, Village Attorney Dan Bryant, Beauvais, Virden and Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean Jr., who was needed to recertify the election results.

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Rollover leads to cash discovery

Close to \$23,000 was seized by New Mexico State Police officers with help from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department following a single-vehicle rollover on Highway 54 at mile marker 137.

The 22-year-old driver fell asleep at the wheel, said State Police Officer Jose R. Salazar. He and his 3-year-old daughter were transported to Lincoln County Medical Center where they were treated for minor injuries and released.

At the scene of the rollover, Salazar received a call from the Emergency Room saying the driver was concerned about \$2,000 in a box behind the glove compartment. Salazar searched

the ground with the wrecker driver without success and called the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office to help because he had to do interviews.

"The Sheriff's Office called me and said, 'There's a little bit more than \$2,000,'" Salazar said, adding that the box was found and contained four or five bundles of \$6,000-10,000 each.

"This man about two weeks ago was popped coming with a load of marijuana at a U.S. 54 Border Patrol point, already pled guilty to that and was awaiting sentencing," he said.

When the man could only account

for about \$8,000 of the money, the State Police seized it, and Salazar called a narcotics agent, who told him that if he could come up with proof of how he earned the money, he would get it back.

"We gave them a few hundred dollars to get by on; we were concerned for the little girl's safety."

"We got them set up in a hotel in Ruidoso," Salazar said. "We gave them a few hundred dollars to get by on; we were concerned for the little girl's safety."

Salazar said the man told him he was thinking of doing jail time and wanted to spend some time with his child before he was put behind bars, and that he was taking her shopping in Mexico.

Victims of fiery crash identified by police

The names of the two men killed in a fiery crash on U.S. 70 March 13 were released Friday by the New Mexico State Police.

They were identified from dental records by the state Medical Investigator's Office, said Capt. John Sena. The bodies were too badly burned for other avenues of identification.

The dead were Jason A. Johnson, 23, of Humble, Texas, and Rydon D. Enres, 24, of Rowlett, Texas.

The two were killed after a

semi hit them head-on near Fox Cave east of Ruidoso Downs. The semi driver was trying to pass a camper on the two-lane road, according to the police report. He attempted the maneuver on a curve and in a no-passing zone. An investigation is under way and charges are pending.

Johnson was driving the 1997 Dodge Dakota, which was headed west. The pickup was pushed off the road by the semi, which was going east and was driven by Daniel Redmond, 23, from Dayton, Ohio, according to the police report.

Reconstruction of U.S. 70 west to be discussed

A meeting to give residents a chance to learn more about a reconstruction project on U.S. 70 from Ruidoso to the existing four-lane section on the Mescalero Apache reservation is set for 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. March 26.

Residents will have an hour to look at maps and displays at the convention center off Mechem Drive and then can stay for a presentation by state Highway and Transportation Department staff on the project's environmental assessment. The proposal includes sidewalks, lighting and median strips with five lanes through the Ruidoso portion, Village manager Alan Briley said. The state staff plans to award the project to a contractor in June.

Briley reported to the council Tuesday that representatives will be there to talk

about the redesign of the intersection of U.S. 70 and Sudderth Drive, also known as State Route 48.

"The design of U.S. 70 (west) has been going on for three to four years and involved two or three different consultants," he said. "Every time we have talks, we've asked about the intersection and what they intend to do because Gavilan makes it a five-point intersection."

One proposed design completely closed Gavilan as a tie-in to U.S. 70 and SR 48.

"We threw a fit and told them there is no way we can close one of the major roads in the county," Briley said. Village officials walked the intersection with state designers and engineers, who scratched their heads and decided that nothing

would work except an elaborate cloverleaf overpass.

"We proposed instead making Sutton Drive the main entrance and exit for Gavilan," Briley said.

Earlier this month, the manager told councilors that state officials agreed to look at that design, but they wanted a financial commitment from the village to help with the cost of a traffic signal.

After the meeting, he told Rick M. Padilla, engineer associate with the department's internal design bureau south, the village would kick in \$100,000, depending on budget approval.

But Padilla wrote back saying the village is responsible for the entire cost of the signal, which could go higher than \$200,000, Briley said. He noted that additional intersec-

tion work would be required that could drive the total cost to \$400,000, according to Padilla.

"Their response was that if we don't pay for the entire thing, they won't do it," Briley said. "We thought since Gavilan was in their way on U.S. 70, they should participate (in the cost). It should be a highway department problem and solution. I'm looking for confirmation that the council feels the highway department needs to be involved."

Councilors took no action, but told Briley to follow through with a letter stating the village's position that Gavilan Canyon Road must not be closed and the intersection is a mutual problem, not just a village responsibility.

Councilor L. Ray Nunley said to remind the state officials that their cooperative project money with Lincoln County is paying for part of the resurfacing of Gavilan.

Thanks, mayor, for trying openness

Don't let incivility destroy the experiment

Praise is due the Ruidoso village administration for opening council meetings to public input after a four-year hiatus. New Mayor Leon Eggleston said during his campaign that he wanted more openness and citizen input. Last week, he delivered.

What he and the council members got in return was a blast from a resident whose outburst shed much heat but exceedingly little light, and could have helped destroy the very openness of which the resident took advantage.

Democracy requires open-

ness and argument, certainly. It also (as the nation's founding fathers demonstrated more than 225 years ago) requires a modicum of civility, the kind in which reasonable people sit down and reason together.

The village council next Tuesday during a regular meeting will spell out some ground rules for continued public input during council meetings.

We hope they don't simply slam the door once more. We further hope every resident remembers that sincere words quietly spoken inevitably have the greatest impact.

So just when will reality set in?

Reality TV, as we all know, is out of control.

It started innocently enough on Saturday mornings in an era that predates the remote control device. The following scene, repeated thousands and thousands of times, is, in fact, the precise reason the clicker was invented:

Two guys in a fishing boat, one guy's pole bent in half.

"Looks like you got a bigun."

"Feels like a bigun."

"Man, that is a bigun." Cut to commercial for rod and reel.

Click. How we got from brain-numbing fishing shows to scantily clad babes sitting in vats filled with spiders is a sad commentary on cultural values. Reality TV. Bad boys, bad boys, whatcha gonna do? Fat cops near cardiac arrest huffing and puffing after thugs through dark neighborhoods.

The inevitable evolution: Squad cars in hot pursuit of runaway scumbags zigzagging city streets at breakneck speeds. "He's gonna run," the cop inevitably yells as the chase begins. And here is what the cop knows and the viewer knows: the chase will threaten the life of everyone in its path.

So why chase? There are reasons, for sure. A guy who just shot a clerk at Allsup's needs to be put in the clinker before he shoots again, even though the chase may endanger innocent bystanders. Tough situation, that one.

But what about the nutcase, high on some kind of dumbbell vapors, who runs a stop sign and is intent on running from flashing red lights and wailing sirens? Heck off. Let him go. Arrest him later. It's a small state. You'll find him.

Law enforcement people will tell you they are damned if they do, damned if they don't. Should they pursue the blockhead and he runs into someone, the police are lambasted. If they opt not to pursue, and the guy gets away and harms another person, the cops take it on the chin again.

Focusing attention on cop chases was the subject of a bill by Rep. John Heaton. Heaton is a three-

term Democrat from Carlsbad who campaigned on the rather ingenious premise that "no one will work harder." He has made good the boast.

Under his bill, the hothead who commits a simple misdemeanor, say, running a stop sign, but then tries to high-tail it away from the cops, has just been upgraded to felony.

Just as important, the Heaton legislation would add accountability for the patrolman who engages in the chase, a provision that is likely to dampen the cowboy instinct a cop might experience when his adrenaline gets out of whack.

It will not please New Mexico police officers that they would have more class time to undergo. It is a good idea, nonetheless. Sixteen hours of training in high-speed pursuits, followed by an additional eight hours every two years.

Rep. Heaton's bill makes eminent sense, widely acclaimed by his fellow legislators. The House passed it 60 to zip. So, obviously, it became law, right? Wrong. Governor Gary Johnson, New Mexico's poster boy for term limitations, vetoed this one, too. Go figure.

Political motivations involved in residency story?

To the editor:

Recently, Phelps Anderson, a candidate for the Republican nomination to replace Joe Skeen in Congress, charged that two of his rivals, Earl Greer and Ed Tinsley, live outside of the 2nd Congressional District.

Both candidates denied this allegation and said that their principal homes are in the district.

Two newspapers published articles based on this subject. One, the Albuquerque Journal, conducted a thorough investigation and presented a fair and balanced article.

The other newspaper, The Alamogordo Daily News, or ADN (reprinted by the Ruidoso News) primarily used information provided by biased political operatives and made the charges the story.

The ADN was very selective in the facts presented and failed to mention Earl Greer or Phelps Anderson.

The primary source for the ADN was Robert McMullan, an Anderson supporter and "long-time political activist."

McMullan's charges and accusations were extensively quoted. He even made

it sound ominous when he said Tinsley was going around saying "he loves southern New Mexico."

'Vegan' diet wouldn't save animals, study finds

CORVALLIS, Ore. — Why is it right to kill the mouse and not the cow?

This question is central to a study of bioethics that explores the moral foundation of a strictly vegetarian, so-called vegan diet. The research, by Steven Davis, a professor of animal science at Oregon State University, adds a new perspective to a millennia-old debate: Is it right for people to kill animals in order to feed themselves?

Davis turns that question on its head. How many animals must die, he asks, in order for people to feed themselves?

To address the question, Davis applies a principle used by moral philosophers to measure the least amount of harm an action might cause, called the Least Harm Principle.

Davis's research focuses on the work of Tom Regan, a philosophy professor from North Carolina State University and founder of the contemporary animal rights movement. Regan argues that the least harm would be done to animals if people were to adopt a vegan diet — that is, a diet based only on plants, with no meat, eggs, or milk products.

What goes unaccounted for in Regan's vegan conclusion, according to Davis, is the number of animals who are inadvertently killed during crop production and harvest.

"Vegan diets are not bloodless diets," Davis said. "Millions of animals die every year to provide products used in vegan diets."

Davis presented his research last fall at a meeting of the European Society for

Agriculture and Food Ethics, in Florence, Italy. There he questioned the conclusions of animal rights proponents and offered alternatives using the Least Harm Principle. Central to his argument is the unseen mortality that accompanies the production of row crops and grains, staples of a vegan diet, in agricultural systems large enough to sustain the human population.

"Over the years that I have been studying animal rights theories, I have never found anyone who has considered the deaths of — or, the 'harm' to — animals of the field," Davis said. "This, it seems to me, is a serious omission."

Consequently, Davis asks what is the morally relevant difference between the field mouse and the cow that makes it OK to kill one but not the other so that humans may eat.

Few studies document the losses of rabbits, mice, pheasants, snakes and other field animals in planting and harvesting crops. Said one researcher: "Because most of these animals have been seen as expendable, or not seen at all, few scientific studies have been done measuring agriculture's effects on their populations."

Davis has found evidence that suggests that the unseen losses of field animals are very high. One study documented that a single operation, mowing alfalfa, caused a 50 percent reduction in the gray-tailed vole population. Mortality rates increase with every pass of the tractor to plow, plant, and harvest. Additions of herbicides and pesticides cause additional harm to animals of the field.

In contrast, grazing ruminants such as cattle produce food and require fewer

entries into the fields with tractors and other equipment. In grazed pastures, according to Davis, less wildlife is lost to the mower blades, and more find stable habitat in untilled fields. And no-till agriculture also helps stabilize soil and reduce run-off into streams.

"Pasture-forage production, with herbivores harvesting the forage, would be the ultimate in 'no-till' agriculture," Davis said.

Davis proposes a ruminant-pasture model of food production, which would replace all poultry, pig and lamb production with beef and dairy products. According to his calculations, such a model would result in the deaths of 300 million fewer animals annually (counting both field animals and cattle) than would a total vegan model. This difference, according to Davis, is mainly the result of fewer field animals killed in pasture and forage production than in the growing and harvest of grain, beans, and corn.

Applying the Least Harm Principle, Davis argues that people may be morally obliged to consume a diet based on plants and grazing ruminants in order to cause the least harm to animals.

Davis's work goes beyond the vegan debate to grapple with issues of animal cloning, genetic engineering, and ethical treatment of production animals.

Through the OSU Agriculture Experiment Station and a regional project on animal bioethics, Davis is part of a team of biological and social scientists from throughout the West who are working to integrate ethics and moral reasoning into the work and study of agriculture.

Global Village Day



She married J.C. Hughes Feb. 1, 1942, in Clovis.



A tax bill dating back to 1997, when Ed Tinsley started to build a cattle herd on his ranch north of Capitan, was compiled Friday by Lincoln County Treasurer Joan Park.

Tinsley is one of seven candidates running for the Republican nomination for the 2nd Congressional District seat being vacated by a retiring Joe Skean. A question about the number of animals kept on the ranch surfaced last week as a result of an interview dealing with his residency.

"We've talked to (County Attorney Alan Morel), we've talked to Tinsley. We are in the process of creating a correction to the tax roll for the last three - probably four - years because Tinsley asked us specifically to do it," County Treasurer Joan Park said Friday.

Tinsley mentioned that he ran about 150

cattle on his ranch, but records in the tax assessor's office reflected only five horses and five cows. A ranch representative faxed a paper registering 150 annual cattle later that same day. But Park said Tinsley didn't err.

"The consensus was that according to (state law), Mr. Tinsley's livestock should have been reported to the county assessor through the New Mexico Livestock Board," Park wrote in a summary letter.

A rancher has a duty to report livestock that are permanent, she wrote. But "livestock that is moved within the state is to be reported to the county assessor by the Livestock Board and thereby exempts the owner from reporting."

Tinsley requested that a tax bill be prepared back to 1997 starting with 46 cows. An additional 20 were added each year from 1998 through 2001.

"This adds up to a total of 126 cows at a

tax total of \$113.27," Park said. The amount was paid in full Friday, she said. The total tax paid by Tinsley and his Flying W. Diamond Ranch for tax year 2001 was \$3,348, she said.

County Assessor Rick Silva said, "The county inspectors we work with here have done their job and given us all of the renditions of cattle leaving the county. The problem we're having is we're not receiving notification from other areas in the state that they're coming into our county."

"This is a problem statewide from what I understand."

Although federal law doesn't require a congressional candidate to live within the district he represents, as long as he's in the state, some of Tinsley's opponents have focused on his home base as a main issue.

Tinsley, whose family has owned a ranch in Lincoln County for 42 years, is registered to vote locally. He owns another home in Albuquerque and his wife's family has a home in Ruidoso. Five of the K-Bob restaurants he owns are located within the congressional district, including one in Ruidoso.

Compliance officers part of commission's agenda

Magistrate judges in Lincoln County would like to see a new program initiated that would assign a misdemeanor compliance officer to domestic violence and DWI offenders.

Charles Buford, a retired probation officer from Los Alamos County, is scheduled to appear at the county commission meeting Thursday to discuss the program. The meeting begins at 8 a.m. in the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

Magistrate Judges William Butts and Gerald Dean Jr. also were invited to give input.

The compliance officer would collect the \$30 per offender ordered by the court for probation supervision, turn the money over to the county treasurer and then be paid a like amount. The person would operate on a contractual basis as a professional service, County Manager Tim Stewart summarized in a letter to Butts.

A review by County Attorney Alan Morel indicates that the program requires passage of an ordinance by the commission and a request for proposals for

the services because the payment may exceed \$25,000 per year, Stewart wrote.

In a meeting with Stewart, Clark pointed out there is little supervision of domestic violence cases and that the DWI program office is overwhelmed.

The law authorizing the program took effect in July 2000.

Other issues on the 45-item agenda include:

- Confirmation that the county was allocated \$110,000 for dispatch and repeater improvements in Lincoln County, with \$70,000 coming from the House side of the state Legislature and \$40,000 from the Senate.

Stewart said before the commission session, he will meet with the five county volunteer fire chiefs to consider initiatives.

- Notification that St. Anne Chapel on U.S. 70 was nominated for the State Registry of Cultural Properties by Carol Marsh.

- Notification that representatives from the U.S. Department of Energy and related agencies visited the Glencoe Rural Events Center

last month to evaluate the WUD Inc. operation there. The business may end up as one of six sites for a Bio Mass Power Generation pilot program nationwide. WUD, run by Glen and Sherry Barrow, uses small diameter trees - a byproduct of forest thinning - to create shavings for animal bedding.

- Confirmation that the

county received \$600,000 in the Hazardous Fuels Mitigation Project funding to help private property owners reduce fire risks.

- Public hearings to consider amending, repealing and reenacting the county planning commission ordinance and the county indigent hospital/health care ordinance.



Fishing report for Ruidoso area, March 20, 2002

Release River: No changes from last week. The water level in the River is still at the lowest flow reported for the past year. We are under 2 CFS and dropping. If you plan to fish the river, we suggest you concentrate your efforts below the confluence of Carrizo Creek downstream to the Gavilan Canyon Bridge. The river was stocked March 6 with more than 1,200 Rainbows that averaged 11.6 inches in length. The last stocking was 10 weeks previous. It is just one more reason to please practice catch and release.

Special note: The Ruidoso River will have a new bag limit starting April 1. In the past a five fish limit was in effect. The new limit will be three fish. A good move by the NMFS Department to help conservation and a quality fishery.

Rock Worms are declining in size and quantity. Pleasant tail nymphs and head head Prince nymphs will produce fish when about anything else fails. Tie a dry fly on as a lead fly then tie a nymph dropper about 12-18 inches behind. Use the lead fly as your strike indicator. This is an effective and fun way to fish small waters.

Wet layers of clothes as the temperature near the water changes quickly. Remember to always wear eye protection. **Swimwear** - Sunblock is about done until Spring. The water flow rate is at a trickle. **Beats Lake:** Bonito Lake is closed until April 1.

Eagle Lakes: Eagle Lakes are closed for the season. **Chilivast:** No change from the past cou-

ple of weeks. Grindstone continues to offer spotty fishing. Woolly Buggers and Zonkers fished fairly deep have produced fish the past two weeks. For spin casters, tie on an Olive or Black propeller fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish. Please remember to squeeze the barbs down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water. **Lake Mesalero:** The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark woolly buggers continue to take fish late in the day. A few folks have been successful with Parachute Adams, Mosquito, or Hendrickson patterns and casting to rising fish. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk. Please practice catch and release wherever and whenever you can.

Fly Fishing Tip: Take a few seconds every hour or so during your fishing day to run your fingers up and down your leader. If you feel abrasions, stop and change out the leader. Do the same thing to your tippet section. However, with the tippet section, run your fingers up and down it each time you catch a fish or retrieve your line from a snag. A moment to check your rig may keep you from losing the fish of a lifetime.
