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Peaceful resolution to Downs hostage stand-off

■ No one was hurt in the five-hour confrontation that involved four police agencies Saturday.

A Ruidoso Downs man held his wife hostage for five hours Saturday before surrendering his gun and his hostage.

At least 31 personnel from four agencies were involved in the stand-off, while New Mexico State Police Officer Sam Huston negotiated with the subject.

Ruidoso Downs police had been called to the 300 block of North

Central Street at 7:17 p.m. March 30 with information that a male subject was holding a female subject hostage. Officers found Constantino Rangel, 41, "irate," said Police Chief Charles Anderson. "So we backed off, and had some Ruidoso units and State Police come down to assist."

Huston negotiated with Rangel until 12:30 a.m., when the subject surrendered his gun and released his wife.

Rangel was charged with kidnapping, aggravated burglary and viola-

tion of a protection order.

Anderson said Rangel apparently forced his way in, although, because of a protection order, he was not supposed to be at the residence.

"His wife had tried to walk out and he jerked her arm back; she was not able to leave," Anderson said.

One of their children ran next door to the neighbors and called 911, the chief said.

Three officers from the Ruidoso Downs Police Department, three

Ruidoso units and 25 State Police Special Response Team agents were involved in the stand-off, with a couple of Lincoln County Sheriff's Office units patrolling the village while the Ruidoso Downs police were at the scene.

Anderson said he attributes the surrender of Rangel to "an excellent job of negotiating; Officer Huston was able to calm the subject down."

Rangel was arrested and taken to Lincoln County Detention Center.

Paving the way on Gavilan

The county found a cheaper way to resurface the heavily traveled highway

A process new to the area that started Monday is scheduled to resurface Gavilan Canyon Road in seven days or less.

The first day on the job, Lincoln County and Ruidoso village officials watched as the machine owned by Cutler Repaving Inc. of Lawrence, Kan., first heated the road, then churned it up and left a new surface behind it.

The process was suggested by County Commissioner Leo Martinez, who noticed the state Highway and Transportation Department using the machine on U.S. 70 through the Mescalero Apache Reservation several months ago. He

asked county road manager Albert Hernandez to check on a cost comparison.

Hernandez reported back to commissioners that the state would allow the process as a substitute for a more expensive approach of tearing up the road bed and rebuilding the entire route. The portion of the project lying outside the village was financed as a cooperative project between the county and the state.

With commission approval, he arranged the change and the village of Ruidoso came on board to include the section of the road lying inside its boundaries.

Gavilan, which connects State Highway 48 to U.S. 70, was used heavily as a detour during more than two years of

construction on major highways surrounding Ruidoso.

Instead of tearing up the existing surface on nine-tenths of a mile, the scope of the original project, the surface on the full 3.7 miles will be patched, heated, scored and then overlaid with 2 inches of hot mix, Hernandez explained. The state will pay 75 percent of the cost on the county portion and the county road department will pay 25 percent.

"With \$238,000, we can do the entire portion belonging to the county," Hernandez said.

The change will not take money away from other roads.

Tax relief for fire victims in limbo

For owners who lost their homes in the Kokopelli Fire, state government is delivering a double whammy.

Lincoln County Assessor Ron Silva told county commissioners during a special meeting Tuesday that his plan to remove homes destroyed in the fire from county property tax roles was nixed by the state Department of Taxation and Revenue.

But commissioners aren't taking "no" as a final verdict. They directed County Manager Tom Stewart to write Gov. Gary

Johnson to protest the decision that the homes must remain on the 2002 tax role because they were there Jan. 1.

Stewart said State Rep. Dub Williams, a Republican who lives in Glencoe and represents District 56 that includes Ruidoso, put his signature on the letter along with Commission Chairman Rex Wilson.

In the letter, Stewart thanked the governor for visiting the fire site and activating the resources at his command during the very chaotic situation that started March 23.

Ruidoso cop charged with battery of minor

A Ruidoso police officer who arrested a 15-year-old runaway in November was indicted on a charge of battery against a juvenile, a petty misdemeanor.

District Attorney Scot Key said the grand jury convened in Carrizozo March 27, listened to the evidence and watched a videotape made in the holding cell where the juvenile was handcuffed to a steel bed at the Ruidoso Police Department. Police officer Alfred Stinnett, 38, allegedly pushed the girl, and she fell and hit her head.

"It was more than a push," Key said. "The videotape speaks for itself ... She had injuries that turned out to be

superficial: bruising, swelling, a black eye."

The girl had been reported as a runaway Nov. 7, 2001, and police were dispatched to the 600 block of Wingfield Drive, where she was arrested. The police report states that she immediately became combative with police and tried to get away. Once secured with handcuffs, she continued kicking and pushing at officers, the report states. The Juvenile Probation Officer and her parents were contacted and she was charged with being an incorrigible child, possession of marijuana, resisting arrest and assault on a police officer.

No briquettes allowed

New fire restrictions include no use of charcoal grills; gas OK

With the weather ideal for an outdoor barbecue, residents should be aware that charcoal grilling is banned because of the high fire danger, said Virgil Reynolds, Ruidoso fire chief.

That same restriction also stands in the Lincoln National Forest.

Officials with the village and the U.S. Forest Service hope by continuing to publicize the restrictions, visitors won't be caught by surprise and possibly fined \$500 for violating the regulations.

The stricter rules went into effect Friday, about a week after a fire swept

through pricey subdivisions northeast of Ruidoso, destroying 29 homes and a barn and burning more than 900 acres.

In the forest, camp fires and outdoor smoking also are banned at Three Rivers Campground on the west side of the Sacramento Mountains, School House Picnic Grounds near Bonito Lake, Cedar Creek Picnic Area and Sam Tobias Group Campgrounds on Cedar Creek Road adjoining the village. Gas grills and stoves are allowed.

Several campgrounds remain closed until the middle of May. They are South Fork near Bonito Lake, Oak Grove on Ski Run Road and Skyline/Monjeau, off Ski Run.

Smoking in the national forest is allowed within an enclosed vehicle or building.

In the village, open flames that include campfires and outdoor stoves that use charcoal briquettes are prohibited on public or private property.

Smoking is allowed only in designated areas and all fireworks are banned. Gas grills and Coleman cooking stoves are permitted.

Village officials said violators will be given one warning, but will be cited for a second offense, which carries a \$500 fine. For more information, contact the Ruidoso Fire Department at (505) 257-4116.

White Sands gets OK to hunt African oryx

A decision to remove about two dozen African oryx from the White Sands National Monument was handed down last month by the National Park Service.

Bill Conrod, a natural resource specialist, said the animals impact the terrain and vegetation on the monument that showcases gypsum sand dunes south of Alamogordo.

For the past three years, the staff with the help of other agencies attempted to remove the animals by non-lethal means.

"We've captured 228 since 1993, about 175 of those in the last three years, but it's a very expensive and time-consuming endeavor," Conrod said. "We're down to between a dozen and 20 animals within a 67 mile fenced boundary. But we have no authorization to open hunting on the monument in National Park Service policy and they keep breeding."

The most effective way to manage the herd is hunting, but besides the lack of authorization, that also is controversial, Conrod said.

But now a finding of no significant environmental impact by the park service has cleared the way for the animals to be shot.

"Whenever possible, we will salvage the meat and the Game and Fish Department gets it to the public so it's not wasted," Conrod said.

Finding the animals isn't always easy in 125 square miles. They travel in small groups widely dispersed, usually led by a dominant bull with a few females and a few juveniles, he said.

Monument Superintendent Jim Mack said Friday that staff started hunting the animals two weeks ago and five have been killed.

"It probably never will be finished because every time we

have a flood event, the fence goes down and if we don't get out right away to the arroyos, the animals try to slip through," Mack said. "We're trying to get the number down to the lowest amount possible, but the possibility of pushing it to zero I think is only entertaining ourselves."

During the years service personnel tried to remove the oryx unharmed, helicopters were rented and would try to move the animals with the help of ground crews toward a pre-arranged and temporary opening in the fence, Conrod said. They were ushered onto a section of the missile range acceptable to the military.

Other times, an animal would be shot with a tranquilizing dart from a helicopter and sling loaded to a new location, he said. The cost was \$3,000 per animal and required having a veterinarian

on site during the entire operation, as well as support staff from several agencies, Conrod said.

Thirty-one oryx were released the first year that approach was tried and about the same the next year, he said.

"But it's getting harder to locate them and it's a dangerous operation for the helicopter because they have to be so low to the ground for pursuit flying," he said.

During two public comment periods on the proposal, 48 people submitted remarks and 39 supported the "preferred" alternative, which Conrod said is a misleading term. The preference of most people would be unharmed removal, one of the other alternatives, but time, money and other factors are against that, he said.

The action on the national monument has no impact on public hunting that is allowed during the year on the White Sands Missile Range under permits issued by the New Mexico Game and Fish Department.

TAXES: State nixes relief to owners of burned homes

He told Johnson that when the county tried to help residents, state restrictions stood in the way because no Presidential Disaster Declaration was issued.

"We are facing the threat of catastrophic health hazard if flooding hits a sewage treatment plant in the Rancho Ruidoso Valley area," he wrote. "While it is true that those covered by insurance will be made as whole as possible through private resources, the bureaucracy which is this state's Tax and Revenue Department seems to violate every rule of common sense."

While state regulations require valuation of properties as of Jan. 1 of each year, these people lost their homes just three months into the year, yet will owe a full year of taxes, he pointed out.

The commission would like to prorate the valuation of the property to provide a fairer outcome for its citizens, "but the system precludes assistance in any form," Stewart wrote. "This is simply unfair and we hope that some mediation can be applied

to the situation."

Even with a letter on its way, County Commissioner Leo Martinez, who originally was appointed by Johnson before being elected to a four-year term, said Tuesday he called the governor and is hoping for a direct response. As he understands the situation, the governor could suspend the regulation, he said.

In the meantime, commissioners told Silva to ignore the rules and let the state make the next move. But Silva said he can't do that.

"They are willing to challenge the state regulations," he said after the meeting. "But I have no choice. I must follow through as the law tells me. I told them, the state could come down and take over the office. I don't want to be the guinea pig to see what may happen."

Immediately after the fire, Silva announced that he would remove destroyed property from the tax rolls, but Tuesday, he received a letter from Tom Garcia, director of the property tax divi-

sion.

Garcia wrote that as county assessor he had no authority to provide relief for loss of homes from fire after Jan. 1.

"You have no choice but to value the property as it existed as of Jan. 1, 2002," Garcia wrote. "If the house is not rebuilt and the lot remains vacant as of Jan. 1, 2003, then you may remove any structure from the tax roll for the tax year 2003."

No provisions exist for prorating the value of any real estate destroyed by fire or other catastrophe, he said. Taxes can be claimed as a loss by the taxpayer. Fire insurance usually will replace any structure destroyed by fire, he said.

"The only recourse at this time for taxpayers affected by the fire is to pay tax under protest and file for a refund in district court," he wrote. "Refunds should be based on the value loss of the structure and not include any tax based on the value of the land."

Silva is mailing a letter to affected property taxpayers explaining the situation.

it was immediately handled through an internal affairs investigation, and disciplinary action and subsequent action was taken involving professional services," said Ruidoso Chief of Police Lanny Maddox.

"We initiated the investigation without being prompted by anyone, as we have always done." Concerning the videotape, Maddox said it looked bad without an interpretation. He said the girl was under the influence of something and that she became limp and would fall to the ground when officers attempted to grab her.

"She was belligerent and it was a bad judgment call on the officer's part that he pushed her down when she was in the holding cell, and we took action that it would never happen again," Maddox said.

Maddox said a petty misdemeanor battery charge, which carries maximum penalties of six months in county jail and \$500 fine is in the same category as running a stop sign. But Key pointed out that a person

can't go to jail for running a stop sign.

Stinnett will be arraigned in district court within the next week or so, Key said, and, if he pleads not guilty, will go to trial within six months.

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Ruidoso man bleeds to death after suffering arm laceration

A Ruidoso man died from a large laceration on his right arm March 28 after apparently breaking a window to enter his residence at Recreation Village, 717 White Mountain Drive.

Alden F. Hughes, 42, a contractor, was found by Ruidoso police on the porch of his residence, with his wife holding his head and his legs hanging off the edge of the porch, according to police reports. Rescues were attempted by the police officer, as well as a team from the Ruidoso Fire Department and Emergency Medical Services.

Hughes was transported to Lincoln County Medical Center, where he died.

A release by the police department states that the wound was accidental, but the investigation continues.

Detective Robert Layher of the Ruidoso Police Department was called in to conduct the initial investigation. He said he doesn't know how long Hughes was injured on the porch before his wife called the police.

"Both parties were apparently intoxicated," Layher said. "They got mad at each other at a party and she decided to leave without him."

Rescuing your pets

The Humane Society of Lincoln County wishes to extend sympathy to all the families who lost their homes and were unable to rescue their pets from the fire before it overtook them. Because of this tragedy, HSLC urges all Lincoln County residents to plan for evacuation of your pets in case the next fire is in your neighborhood.

Here are some important facts about disaster and evacuation every Lincoln County pet owner should know:

- Never leave your pet at home during an evacuation.
- Most homeowner insurance policies will cover the cost of boarding fees for the duration of the evacuation.
- The shelter accepts all evacuated pets for boarding at no cost. There is a well-trained staff to respond and care for the special needs of evacuated pets and their owners. The shelter will stay open for receiving (animals) as needed.
- Have vaccination records, medica-

Introducing college kids to Apache life

Thirteen Stanford University students spend an "Alternative Spring Break" on the Mescalero Apache Reservation, and learn even as they teach.

Reciprocal visit coming up

Stanford students had the opportunity to visit Mescalero, and Mescalero high school students will have the chance to visit Stanford.

Besides coordinating Alternative Spring Break in Mescalero, Felicia Frizzell and Travis Holmes arranged for a scholarship program for three Mescalero high school students to visit Stanford during the Stanford Pow Wow, May 9-12.

"We raised some money to fly back some Mescalero Apache high school students to make college a tangible thing instead of something that seems unattainable and something you can't visualize," Frizzell said.

She and Holmes gave presentations at Mescalero and Tularosa high schools and formed a panel of the 13 Stanford students spending their Alternative Spring Break on the reservation answering questions about college. Students applying for the scholarships for the Stanford Pow Wow turned in applications and essays and three students were chosen. They are Bethany Klinekole and Troy Saenz, both sophomores at Ruidoso High School, and Joseph Valenzuela, a junior at Tularosa High School.

"The Stanford Pow Wow is the largest student-run pow wow in the nation," Frizzell said. "It's the largest on the West Coast, and about 100 Native American students put it on." The Pow Wow brings in about 30,000 people a year and features drumming and dancing. Local students who will attend will be guests of the 13 Stanford students who spent the week in Mescalero, Frizzell said, staying in dorms, eating in the dining halls, attending classes with their student host and then going to the pow wow.

Stanford Admissions funded one of the students, she said, and the rest will be through fund-raisers.

"We're still raising money and need \$350, if the community would like to contribute," Frizzell said. She can be contacted by e-mail at frizzell@stanford.edu.

Felicia Frizzell, a junior at Stanford University, in Palo Alto, Calif., and a 1999 Ruidoso High School graduate, introduced 13 Stanford students to Mescalero culture last week, with her partner Travis Holmes.

Frizzell, who is a Mescalero Apache, and Holmes, a Koniag/Alutiq from Kodiak, Alaska, taught a one-credit class at Stanford during the winter quarter, preparing the students to spend a week in Mescalero for Stanford's Alternative Spring Break program. It is affiliated with Break-Away, the national alternative break organization.

"The purpose of the trip is to do community service and teach Stanford students what it's like to live on a reservation and what issues the Mescalero tribe is facing," Holmes said.

The program "exposes students to complex social/cultural issues through direct service, experiential learning, group discussion, and individual reflection." The Web site (www.stanford.edu/group/SB/about.htm) states. "The vision is to transform students into advocates of social change on issues affecting our communities."

Holmes said he and Frizzell had been planning and coordinating the week in Mescalero for a year, with Frizzell contacting Mescalero leaders to arrange for them to talk to the students, setting up cultural experiences, community service opportunities and sleeping arrangements.

The students flew into Albuquerque on Saturday, March 23, and drove from there to the reservation. They spent their first night at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, and toured the facility the following morning, spending the afternoon helping at St. Joseph's Apache Mission on the restoration project.

That night, and several others, the students spent time at Carrizo Community Center, with one night sleeping outside in a teepee and one spent with Mescalero families.

They met with Tribal President Sara Misquez, toured the Mescalero Cultural Center, met with medicine man Sonny Baca and met with Mescalero leaders to discuss tribal policy and issues the tribe faces, including tribal enterprises and cultural and health issues. They volunteered at Head Start locations, at the Mescalero Boys and Girls Club and worked with the elderly. They flew back to Palo Alto on March 30.

"I'm so grateful about how welcoming the Mescalero community was," Frizzell

said on Thursday, when the week was drawing to a close, with the Stanford students helping Mescalero children at the Boys and Girls Club. "They opened their homes and hearts to all the Stanford students. Even though I coordinated events, people helped me more than I asked them to and made the trip really great."

Tristan Ivory, a sophomore majoring in communications and Japanese and part Choctaw Indian, said he didn't know a lot about Native American cultures before signing on for Alternative Spring Break to explore the Mescalero Apache experience with Frizzell and Holmes as student trip leaders. He said he hopes to work in ethnology research because "if we cling to old views on ethnic relations, which usually means the black-white dialogue, we leave a lot of people out, like the Native Americans have been left out of that dialogue for a long time, and Latinos and Asians are being left out of the dialogue as well."

Kelly McKenzie, a junior in American studies, said the few classes she's taken at Stanford on Native American studies exposed her to "a lot of misconceptions the society has about what life on a reservation is like, and also made me aware of the depth of the social issues involved, the fact that the federal government is supposed to fund services, but they don't always, so the tribe turned to enterprise; the fact that especially the Mescalero people have explored their own economic ventures to

accomplish the goals they have for themselves and their children."

The classes with Frizzell and Holmes inspired students to think about things they might not have considered, McKenzie said. One of the more enlightening hands-on experiences for her was going to the tribal hospital.

"Most of us are used to private hospitals and they're much bigger," she said. "We're not used to thinking of medicine in a cultural way or being sensitive to cultural values."

Ivory said what moved him most during his stay in Mescalero was "the belief by many of the Apache people that they're losing their language, and with that loss of language comes a loss of culture," he said. "That theme runs dominant in many people across the world. There are a lot of parallels between what's happening here and what's happening in the rest of the world."

McKenzie said she is interested in going into law and lobbying to get the government to uphold its promises, to "treat American Indians better than they have over the course of the last 200 years. Coming here ... you realize this is a place of strong community tradition, where people really cherish the ties they have to the land and to each other, so living on a reservation is special and needs to be protected," McKenzie said.

"We all wish we could spend more time here," she said.

The 'Majority Rules'

A number of local youths are staying away from illegal drugs through a new nationwide asset-building program

Layla Reyes is a 10th-grade student at Ruidoso High School, and her anti-drug is soccer. As president of the Lincoln County Community Youth Asset Team, a youth-oriented facet of the Lincoln County Substance Abuse Prevention Collaborative, she explained that the purpose of the Majority Rules campaign and this feature is to show people "that teens in our community don't smoke and we do other activities instead of smoking."

"A lot of adults' stereotype of teens is that we're lazy and ... like to sit around and get high," she said. "This campaign shows that there are a lot of teens out there that have jobs and activities to fill their lives other than getting high or smoking cigarettes."

The campaign is also intended to get a message across to teens that it's OK not to do drugs, and OK not to be in the "in crowd," she said, and that they can do other activities than "getting high, getting drunk or going to a party and doing things that hurt your body."

Reyes said the asset-building team went to Albuquerque to attend a youth leadership Power Conference in January 2001 with teens from all over the state addressing issues facing youth. Because of this experience, she decided she wanted to make a difference in Lincoln County and joined the team. Two months later she was elected president.

"As an asset-building team, we try to work on different assets," Reyes said. "This year we're working on setting goals and achieving them, and staying with our commitments. I have to stay focused on what we had on our agenda and make sure it gets done. We have to show people in the community that we're committed and will follow through with our promises."

The next project of the team is to go into the schools and give presentations about the risks of drugs to fifth-through seventh-grade students in Ruidoso at the end of April or early May, through a grant from The Counseling Center.

"With Media Literacy, we take apart ads that are run through TV and magazines and try to see what kinds of persuasion they're using to try to get you to buy their product, like bribery or bandwagon," Reyes said. "I want to focus on tobacco and alcohol ads for my presentation and pull those apart."

The younger children will have the opportunity to "pull the ads apart" and create counter ads, and Reyes hopes they'll put them up in their school and possibly have a contest to see how many counter ads the students can come up with.

This year's focus for the team is substance abuse. Last year's big project was suicide prevention, and the asset-building team put on what has become an annual event — the Celebrate Life Lock-in, last year held at the Ruidoso Senior Center.

Next year, the team will focus on teen pregnancy prevention, Reyes said. The team is open to anyone in seventh through 12th grades and meets from 5 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. Mondays during the school year.

"People are more than welcome to join," Reyes said. "It gives you a chance to do something good for your community and to get involved. I know a lot of my peers are always complaining about 'If only had a say in our community,' 'If we could do something about this,' and, 'There's nothing to do.' If you get involved, you

can have a say in what goes on and what happens involving you as a teen in the Ruidoso community."

Other benefits for joining the team include interacting with teens one wouldn't otherwise get involved with, meeting new people, broadening horizons of activities and interests and finding out what issues concern other teens, Reyes said. Ice-breakers and fun activities are incorporated into the Monday night meetings to make them lighter and more fun.

After the Media Literacy project, the asset team will be planning an end-of-year party — a dance at the Ruidoso Senior Center open to all youth in the community (seventh through twelfth grades).

Jeremy Landrum is a 10th grade student at Ruidoso High School and was president of the Lincoln County Community Youth Asset Team last year. His anti-drug is boxing. He was a two-time Golden Gloves state champion.

Landrum got involved with the asset-building team through an event organized

by Wanda Figueroa, who was the youth advisor when the team formed three years ago. Although he's still a member of the team, he was accepted into a statewide group, the Youth Developmental Assets Council, and helps with projects similar to the Majority Rules campaign.

"One of the great reasons this group is so good is they listen not only to the DWI concerns, but they also listen to the SADD (Students Against Drunk Driving) concerns, they have in mind violence concerns, suicide concerns ... We're taking the whole thing on and we're willing to fight the whole thing. It's a really fantastic group, and Layla is doing a fantastic job with the group."

The asset-building team helps young people meet their goals, Landrum said, and the purpose is to make better youth.

"It's about you, about the kids, and about them being the future," he said. "If we can begin at the roots and make sure those roots are healthy, tomorrow will

be healthy."

Kat Clark is a 10th-grade student at Ruidoso High School, and her anti-drug is skateboarding.

Clark started skateboarding three years ago and practices at home in a barn with a concrete floor as well as at the skateboarding park on White Mountain Drive.

"Skateboarding is practically like a drug itself: I get adrenaline rushes and it's just so much fun," she said.

She moved to Ruidoso four years ago from San Diego, Calif., which has more youth activities and has a "really nice skate park. This one —" she said, pointing to the White Mountain skating park, "was a parking lot and kids started making their own ramps."

Clark joined the Lincoln County Community Youth Asset Team after hearing about it from Layla Reyes.


Now she's vice president and feels she has a chance to make the community more youth-based.

"We've made a lot of progress," she said. "We're trying to get the food changed in the schools to be more healthy. We're getting information, doing surveys to see who eats what."

In addition, she said, the team would like a recreation center with an indoor swimming pool, pool tables, dancing and a snack bar "because kids need something to do and (many) of them resort to parties and drugs."

About the asset-building team, she says: "It's all about kids and what they want to do," Clark said. "People often change their mind (about risk-taking behaviors) if they have stuff to do that are options."

The next meeting of the Lincoln County Community Youth Asset-Building Team is at 5 p.m. April 8 at the Ruidoso Senior Center.

The history of a unique youth program

In 1993, the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) received bi-partisan support from the U.S. Congress for an historic initiative: a large-scale, five-year integrated social marketing and communications program to educate and empower America's teens (13-18 years old) and tweens (9-12 years old) to reject illegal drugs.

This National Youth Anti-Drug Media Campaign, developed from a solid scientific base, is a multi-faceted effort supported by television, radio and print advertising; school-based educational materials; Internet Web sites; partnerships with youth-serving organizations and more. Parents and other adults who interact with young people are also key audiences for the campaign's messages.

To reach its primary audience most effectively, the campaign created a "brand" or umbrella for its youth-targeted activities. "What's Your Anti-Drug?" is a ground-breaking initiative — launched in September 2000 — that asks young people a simple, provocative question to help them think about the one thing that is so important they choose it instead of drugs — and then invites them to share this thing — their unique "Anti-Drug" — with the world.

Since the launch, more than 80,000 young people

have shared their "Anti-Drugs" on the Internet (www.freevibe.com), through the mail and through activities of community organizations nationwide. A special USA Today magazine insert, published on Nov. 27, 2000, captured the vitality and diversity of this youth movement by featuring Anti-Drugs expressed through stories, poetry, artwork and photography.

The impact and success of the USA Today supplement pointed up the value of encouraging similar newspaper initiatives at the community level where they can have the greatest impact. The result: a partnership with the Newspaper Association of America Foundation's Newspaper in Education (NIE) program to generate local "Majority Rules" anti-drug newspaper features to reach kids wherever they live and learn throughout America.

The feature section is called "Majority Rules" to underscore that most kids don't use drugs. The truth is 72 percent of youth ages 12 to 17 have never used illicit drugs, according to the 1999 National Household Survey on Drug Abuse. Through local supplements that add voices to a nationwide chorus, young people will see that drug use is not the rule — that most of them have better things to do than drugs.

Asset-building team gives youths chance to shine

Children involved in the program gained real-world experience and got to be on the radio.

This feature section is presented thanks to youth in Lincoln County, who sold the advertisements. The teenagers involved are all members of the three-year-old Lincoln County Community Youth Asset-Building Team, which meets weekly to plan educational activities, community service projects, and to increase the developmental assets of youth.

The team came into existence after a survey indicated that local youth have only 18.7 of the 40 assets, or positive experiences, qualities and val-

ues that research shows help them make good decisions in life and avoid risk-taking behaviors — such as taking drugs and smoking cigarettes. Members of the team have attended annual Youth Power Conferences in Albuquerque, state and regional workshops on youth issues and leadership, and have met youth from all over New Mexico and the United States.

Genevieve Phelan, substance abuse prevention counselor at The Counseling Center, one of the funding sources of the asset-building team, was the facilitator of the team and is currently an adviser. Phelan noted that the work team members have done on this feature was education for them as well as the members of the community.

"This is a hands-on, real-

world experience," she said. "Selling ads, they learned how to do a sales call. The merchants said how much they appreciated the fact that they came in person, shook hands and looked them in the eye."

In addition, the youth produced 60-second radio spots about their "anti-drugs" to be aired for two weeks preceding today, Kick Butt Day.

Over the course of their membership on the team, they have learned how to conduct business meetings, the importance of minutes and agendas and the importance of showing up, Phelan said.

"I like to think of the asset-building team as a support for them, giving them structure

and guidance and an opportunity to do what they want to do," she said.

The asset-building team is a part of a comprehensive substance abuse prevention plan that is constantly being reevaluated by the Lincoln County Substance Abuse Prevention Collaborative, which includes The Counseling Center, Presbyterian Medical Services, Region IX, the Ruidoso/Lincoln County DWI Program, and Children in Need of Services. The collaborative is a task force of the Lincoln County Health and Wellness Planning Council, which plans for all health issues.

Ruidoso student who is president of the Lincoln County Asset-Building Team, was recently accepted as a voting member of the Lincoln County Health and Wellness Planning Council, Phelan said, so the council will have youth input.

"I feel we don't give our children enough responsibility; we don't take advantage of their capabilities so we keep them children. For good mental health, everyone needs to feel that they have value and are contributing in a meaningful way."


Phelan pointed out that the Lincoln County Youth Asset Building Team participated in the Ruidoso "Christmas in the Park," making and lighting more than 1,000 luminarias in honor of those who lost their lives Sept. 11, 2001. Currently, they're preparing to deliver

"Media Literacy" presentations to other Ruidoso students, using the New Mexico Media Literacy Project curriculum.

All their meetings are run by the members of the team, who are learning a simplified Roberts Rules of Order.

"The best defense against risk-taking behaviors, not just drugs," Phelan said, "is a sense of being an integral part of the community."

The Majority Rules feature is presented by The Counseling Center, Lincoln County Community Youth Asset Team, Presbyterian Medical Services-Community Health Services, Youth Substance Abuse Prevention Program, and funded through the New Mexico Department of Health-Behavioral Health Services Division.

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

Injuries keep Ruidoso tracksters from doing better

Warrior boys still able to finish fifth out of 14 teams

Injuries continued to plague the Ruidoso boys and girls track teams Thursday at the Socorro Invitational, but they still got two more state qualifiers out of the deal.

Sophomore Chance Hooper leapt for a 6-foot-3 mark to get to state in the boys high jump, while junior Rachel Loya will be going to state in the girls javelin after a 101-foot throw.

Hooper took third at the Socorro meet with his mark, but Loya was unable to place, even with her impressive throw.

As a team, the Warriors finished fifth out of fourteen teams, and were but four points out of second place.

Class 4A member Albuquerque Academy ran away with the team title at 110 points, with Belen trailing at 51, Grants in third at 50, Rio Rancho at 49 and the Warriors com-

ing in at 47.

Coach Ronny Maskew said the boys finish was a good one, considering they were only three points behind Grants, considered one of the better 3A track teams in the state.

"The improvement was how they competed against other people," Maskew said. "Aside from Grants, we were the top 3A school, and still ran without some of our best people."

The Warriors were again without Jose Linares or Nathaniel Hedin in the relays, both of whom are still battling injuries. Ruidoso also sidelined Kayci Brunell, who would have added points in the girls 400-meter and three relay events.

With Brunell out, the Lady Warriors finished ninth overall.

"That hurt our girls totals quite a bit," Maskew said. "We're not in great shape without those kids, but we still competed well."

Maskew hopes to at least have Linares and Hedin back in time for next week's Ruidoso Invitational at Ruidoso High.

"We kept them off to make sure they're running by next week," Maskew said. "As we move down the schedule, it will be a concern if we don't get them well. But we've located some guys that can run better than we had thought."

"They may not be as good as those two (Linares and Hedin), but they can fit in well."

The relay teams were good enough to place, a first for Warrior relay teams this year. The 4x100 team finished third with a time of 44.98, while the 4x200 took sixth with a time of 1:36.98.

As for other Ruidoso team members who placed in Socorro, Philip Darley led the way, continuing his dominance in the pole vault. Darley took first in the event with a high mark of 13 feet, two inches.

Darley also took third in the long jump with a mark of 19-5.

Brandon Brumlow added points of his own with a third-place finish in the discus, throwing for a 139-5.5 mark. He also finished fifth in the shot put at 40-11.5.

Nicholas Fajardo rounded out the individual placers, taking third in the 200-meter dash at 22.83 and fourth in the 400-meter with a time of 51.55.

Fajardo also finished fourth behind Hooper in the high jump with a mark of six feet.

On the girls side, Tamara Grant and Cecily Howell led the way with fourth-place finishes in their events. Grant had a 32-10 mark in the girls shot put, while Howell finished with an 8-foot-6 mark in the pole vault.

Grant also took fifth in the discus with a mark of 102-0.5 followed by teammate Rachel Loya in sixth place with a mark of an even 102 feet.

Sarah Breecher rounded out the Lady Warrior placers with a sixth-place finish in the 200-meter dash, coming in with a time of 27.42.

Fishing report for Ruidoso area, April 3, 2002

Don't forget, new fishing licenses are required as of April 1.

Ruidoso River: No change from last week. The water level in the river is still at the lowest flow reported for the past year. We are under 2 CFS and dropping. If you plan to fish the river, we suggest you concentrate your efforts below the confluence of Center Creek downstream to the Gavilan Canyon. The river was stocked March 6 with more than 1,200 Rainbow trout that averaged 11.5 inches in length. The last stocking was 10 weeks previous, it is just one more reason to please practice catch and release.

Special note: The Ruidoso River has a new bag limit as of April 1. In the past a five fish limit was in effect. The new limit is three fish. A good move by the NMDF Department to help conservation and a quality fishery.

Rock Worms: are declining in size and quantity. Phreatic fall nymphs and head head Prince nymphs will produce fish when about any time else falls. Tie a dry fly off at a lead fly then tie a nymph dropper about 12-15 inches behind. Use the lead fly and run dry fly to fish areas waters.

Wet worm of choice: as the temperature near the water changes quickly. Remember to always wear eye protection. Remember — Good work is about done until spring. The water flow rate is at a trickle.

Water Level: Bonito Lake is closed until April 1.

Edge Lake: Eagle Lake are closed for the

season.

Grindstone: Grindstone continues to offer sporty fishing. Woolly Buggers and Zorkers fished lately deep have produced fish the past two weeks. For spin casting, tie on an Olive or Black popper fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish. Please remember to squeeze the barbs down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water.

Please, if you pack it in, pack it out. Litter continues to plague the area lakes and streams.

Lake Mesquite: The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark woolly buggers continue to take fish late in the day. A few folks have been successful with Parachute Adams, Mosquito, or Hendrickson patterns and casting to rising fish. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk. Please practice catch and release wherever and whenever you can.
