Addressing a 'clear and present danger'

Ruidoso property owners face a warning to reduce surrounding fire risk ... or else

Property owners in Ruidoso who resist taking steps to reduce the risk of wild fire on their land may be facing new laws and stronger enforcement of existing laws to protect the safety of their neighbors.

Mike Runnels, director of planning and zoning for the village, said the problem of private landowners refusing to create defensible space or even thin trees on their land

stands in the way providing better wild fire protection for the village. "It's stopped us in the past, but I think people need to realize there are certain situations where (for) public health and welfare certain steps need to be taken," he told

members of the village planning and zoning board last week. "We need to identify those areas on a scientific and objective basis and come up with an approach that addresses the situation so someone can't say, 'I don't care about my neighbors or

fire."

"We have to confront that attitude as selfish, shortsighted and narrow minded and tell them, 'You're placing your lives and your neighbors' lives at risk and that

Looking out for victims

In the aftermath of major disasters across the United States, a new type of victim advocate is showing up to battle for the rights of those who lost homes and possessions.

Peter Romero already established a reputation in Los Alamos, but he wasn't looking for business during a stop in Ruidoso a few weeks ago. He was traveling through the area on his way back to his home in California when the Kokopelli Fire broke out, razing through several subdivisions northeast of town, destroying 29 homes and a barn.

With experience as a contractor and a real estate agent behind him, in addition to 18 years as an independent public adjuster, Romero contends he can squeeze more out of an insurance company because he's a good negotiator and knows the twists and turns often overlooked by property owners and even well-intentioned insurance company adjusters.

He's been an independent public adjuster since his own home burned and is licensed to operate in several states, including New Mexico, California and Florida. Being licensed carries a requirement for continuing education and he stayed on top of changes, he said.

"I've been doing nothing but disasters since 1989," Romero said.

He decided to get into the business when his insurance company sent a bilingual adjuster to tell him what he wouldn't be paid for, but Romero wasn't in the mood to compromise. They offered him \$151,000, a registered adjuster tipped that to \$275,000 and then Romero stepped in to finish up with \$333,000, he said.

The adjuster who worked for him then hired him. He resigned from his banking job, changed careers, two years later became a commercial adjuster, and two years after that, struck out on his own. Hurricane Hugo in South Carolina in 1989 marked one of his largest caseloads.

Technically, Romero now is retired, but when a disaster strikes

Flaky idea pans out

White Oaks studio tour offers visitors golden opportunity

Visitors to White Oaks no longer are restricted to reading about the gold extracted from the mountains around what was once known as "the liveliest town in the territory."

Starting with the annual Artists of White Oaks 2002 Studio Tour April 20-21, visitors will have a chance to buy some gold collected locally and take it home with them.

Depending on their budgets, they'll have a choice of \$5 to \$6 vials of gold flakes with a certificate of authenticity or nuggets that run \$15 per gram and can be used as pendants or for display.

The gold will be on view and for sale in the Brown Building, recently refurbished with a whitewash exterior accented with blue.

The gold comes from the White Oaks Mining District, which encompasses the Patos, Jicarillo and Carrizo mountains, said

artist Bob Reynierson, who also enjoys amateur prospecting.

"A very narrow vein was found, only one or two inches wide," he said. "No mining is being done. They are hand cobbling (the gold) hoping the vein will widen out. But everything they're bringing out is beautiful specimen gold."

The gold is shaped as delicate wire, attached to crystals or in the form of nuggets, he said.

"It encourages the amateur prospector to know there are still treasures to be found," Reynierson said.

Gold also is being recovered at the sand and gravel operation of Leonard Jensen, who leased Baxter Mountain from owner Carl Dodson.

"Every now and then they hit a few flakes

Accelerant used in deadly blaze

Police tests rule out accidental cause

Accelerant turned up in samples from the Feb. 24 fire that killed a Ruidoso Downs woman, said lead investigator Albert Venegas of the New Mexico State Police.

"The samples we sent to the lab came back positive for an accelerant," Venegas said Tuesday, ruling out accidental cause of the fire.

The accelerant was found mainly in the flooring of the master bedroom, where the body of 42-year-old Delia V. Hardee was found.

"They did find carbon monoxide in her lungs. If she

had that in her lungs, she had to breathe it," he said.

The 14-year-old son of the deceased told investigators that he was sleeping on the couch in the living room when he smelled smoke about noon that Sunday. He tried unsuccessfully to open the door of the bedroom where his mother was, he said, and then went to neighbors to call 911. The main damage was in the bedroom, although windows were broken and there was smoke damage in the rest of the mobile home.

The son went to stay with community members until he was taken out of state by Nancy

Hondo pilgrimage revives tradition

'We're community,' valley residents say

More than 200 Hondo Valley residents and supporters gathered the day before St. Patrick's Day to revive a tradition started by farmers decades earlier.

In that time, an agricultural pilgrimage to San Patricio Church was staged with the hope of winning favor for a good growing season, but these participants wanted to establish another point.

"There was something in the Environmental Impact Assessment for the U.S. 70 project put out by the state Highway Department that said we were not a community, that we were not united as one community," Bobby Richardson said Monday. "We wanted to bring everybody together to show that we are a community. We consider each other as one community. We are tied to each other through marriage and all kinds of different things in the valley, all the functions in the valley."

The group started from St. Jude's Church and walked 1.5 miles to the San Patricio Church where Bishop Ricardo Ramirez, from the Las Cruces diocese, pronounced a blessing.


However, last month, state and federal transportation officials announced a decision to move ahead with a four-lane design.

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Traffic deaths up statewide; 10 died in county

Pedestrian deaths in 2001 nearly three times the national average

Although teen traffic fatalities declined last year, pedestrian and motorcycle accidents contributed to an overall increase in traffic deaths statewide, a New Mexico transportation official says.

Peter Rahn, secretary of the state Highway and Transportation Department, said he especially was disturbed about the pedestrian fatalities that went up 60 percent from 48 in 2000 to 77 in 2001.

"The tragic deaths weren't in a consistent area of New Mexico and didn't affect a distinct group of the population," he said. "The fatalities

occurred mostly at night and the victims were mostly men 18 years of age or older."

New Mexico has an average of 4.15 pedestrian deaths a year per 100,000 people. The national average is 1.66. While 41 of the pedestrian fatalities involved alcohol, about in line with the previous year, 30 did not, representing an increase of 13 over 2000.

The majority of victims of motorcycle crashes were middle-aged men who were not wearing helmets, Rahn said.

Statewide, 33 fatal motorcycle accidents occurred in 2001 compared to 26 in 2000, an increase of 27 percent.

"Motorcycles drivers need to be especially careful, Rahn said. "They need to pay attention to their own actions as well as those of other drivers, and of course, always wear helmets."

In Lincoln County last year, one motorcyclist died on U.S. 70.

On a positive note, teen traffic fatalities declined 17 percent with 54 in the 13 to 19-year-old age group in 2000 and 46 fatalities in the same age group in 2001.

Rahn credited recent implementation of stricter teen licensing laws for a possible impact. A graduated law, promoted by the state Traffic

Safety Bureau, that took effect Jan. 1, 2000, requires teens start driving with a six-month instructional permit and then drive for a year under a restricted provisional license before obtaining a driver's license.

Another positive trend indicates a steady decrease in serious injuries as a result of crashes, with about 39 serious injuries per 100 million vehicle miles drive in New Mexico in 1990 compared to 16 in 2000, a drop of more than 100 percent.

Stronger seat belt laws may be a factor, Rahn said. Statistics show that New Mexico is number two in the

nation for buckling up, with an 88 percent seat belt usage rate. However, 184 of victims killed in traffic crashed in 2001 were not wearing their seat belt.

But those good signs didn't tilt the statistics in New Mexico's favor, with the state still showing an overall increase of nearly 10 percent from 435 traffic crash fatalities in 2000 to 478 in 2001.

Lincoln County registered a total of eight deaths on U.S. 70, and two more on U.S. 64 and State Road 48.

According to the Traffic Safety Bureau, 201 of the deaths from accidents statewide involved alcohol and

its involvement is unknown in 37 more.

"DWI continues to be a serious problem throughout the state," said Virginia Jaramilla, bureau chief of the Traffic Safety Bureau, a division of the state transportation department.

Other 2001 traffic safety trends cited by Rahn included:

- 333 of the people killed in traffic crashes in 2001 were New Mexico residents.
- 347 traffic fatalities occurred in rural areas of the state.
- For the 15 to 20-year-old age group, there also has been a consistent decrease in traffic fatalities; 27 teens were killed in 2001 compared to 32 in 2000.

County speeders beware

State police donate four radar units

Half the equation of improving the ability of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office to help with patrols on accident-ridden U.S. 70 was solved Tuesday.

Capt. John Sena of the New Mexico State Police arrived in Ruidoso with four boxes containing used speed radar units for sheriff's deputies patrolling county roads.

While Undersheriff Ricky Virden said he's pleased to see the number of units in his department jump from two to six, he still lacks the manpower to provide patrols some days.

Lincoln County Commissioners Rick Simpson and Leo Martinez have been especially vocal in calling for

stepped-up patrols on the scenic, but deadly, two-lane highway east of Ruidoso Down to the Chaves County line.

Sena also is shorthanded for the two-county area of Otero and Lincoln. Two months ago, he asked Sheriff Tom Sullivan for help, but the sheriff pointed out small starting salaries don't lure many applicants to the area.

"The equipment is part of being able to patrol," Virden

said Tuesday, then echoed the words of his boss. "But our salaries aren't competitive with anybody."

Sena said new radar units costing about \$2,000 each were purchased for his men and department officials decided the best use for the used Kustom Signal Inc. K-10 units might be in Lincoln County. For inventory purposes, the units technically are on loan, he said.

Kokopelli Fire displaced deer

Area wildlife suffered a loss of food supply

The Kokopelli Fire that destroyed 29 homes northeast of Ruidoso last month also displaced between 100 and 200 mule deer attracted to the area because of easy access to food and water.

"The animals have dispersed now," said Conservation Officer Alexa Sandoval. "But I imagine they were pretty shocked when their feed burned up."

Sandoval, Southeast Area habitat specialist for the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish, said wildlife throughout the state is facing another dry spring and summer, as well as an early and more than like-

ly intense fire season.

Those conditions often prompt members of the public to encourage the department to provide food for the animals, but the agency to date has resisted the suggestion, she said.

"The Department stands ready to take whatever action is necessary to assist these animals during these rough times," said Larry Bell, department director in Santa Fe.

However, feeding animals can create unintended problems.

"We have no guarantee the animals will find the food," he said. "We also believe that feeding wildlife will create unnatural concentrations and can cause unneeded suffering in our populations. If we draw deer to one location with hay, for example, some of them may get killed or

injured in crossing highways to get to it."

In the case of bears, attempts to feed them can result in the deaths of cubs because along with their mothers, they may concentrate in the same areas as adult male bears, which are known to kill cubs found within their territories.

"We are monitoring our wildlife near Alto and elsewhere and we will take appropriate actions when necessary," Bell said. "What's most important, however is that we provide wildlife with quality habitat rather than simply feeding any of the species we manage."



Evildoers can expect a stunning impact

■ A Sandia Labs researcher has developed a way to take down the bad guys safely, and with a reusable device.

ALBUQUERQUE — A cheaper, less dangerous way to stun kidnapers or terrorists holding hostages has been developed by Sandia National Laboratories.

The nonlethal device — about the size of a small soda can — creates a blinding, deafening, yet ultimately harmless explosion when lobbed into a room. Unlike earlier versions that ignite from concentrated materials, the explosive source in this device fans out as an airborne powder before it ignites, making it less dangerous to hostages. The stun grenade is also reusable, making it feasible as a training tool.

Developed by Sandia researcher Mark Grubelich, the device is of interest to police departments and to law enforcement officials from a variety of federal agencies.

Dispersory devices — also called stun grenades or flash-bangs — are used in interventions practiced by most police departments and some Washington agencies.

Some of the devices are shot from a window of the apartment containing the hostages and escape, and hit in the

explosive device. Law enforcement officers follow with extreme rapidity, taking advantage of the general disorientation within to capture, disable or, if necessary, kill evildoers while freeing their victims. Such is the plan.

However, most devices currently in widespread use contain a metal powder that violently combines with a salt containing oxygen. When this mixture — aluminum and potassium perchlorate — is ignited by a grenade-style fuse, an explosion takes place within the body of the device. This creates a zone of extreme pressure nearby that may be dangerous if the device lands near a hostage's neck or head. The explosion also destroys the shell of the device containing the explosive, making such apparatuses expensive to use as training tools.

The new device is made of plastic. It contains only metal powder and no oxidizer. No explosion takes place within the canister. Instead of ignition within the device, the particles are forced like a burst of talcum powder out through 16 quarter-inch-diameter holes in the bottom of the structure.

The ejected particles hang momentarily in air, "flared like a peacock's tail," about five feet in diameter before igniting by combining with oxygen present in

the atmosphere. The distributed powder means that the pressure in the immediate vicinity of the exploded device is lowered to a safer level.

It also means that the canister is undamaged and can be reloaded for a few dollars, making it easy to use as a training device.

The new configuration is also simple to adapt for a variety of law enforcement needs.

Prison officials require a grenade that, if remaining whole after use, is too soft and flexible to be used as a black-jack by rioting convicts. Soldiers require a lightweight canister that can be carried over long distances. Police can carry the canister in their cars, so weight is not a factor, but they want no explosive material within the canister to eliminate the possibility that any falling into the wrong hands could be restructured into a bomb.



Raterman said Ames' lectures changed the way she looks at the world. She remembers when students were in the gym before an assembly. "He told us to turn around and hug someone sitting next to us and be grateful they were there. He's constantly reminding us to just be grateful," she said.

A Distinguished Warrior, Eva Rehfield plans to go to Australia to study medicine, she said, because she was born there. Ultimately, she'd like to study dermatology and find a cure for cancer.

Rehfield moved to Ruidoso four years ago, after her parents got lost on the road coming into town from the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

"We thought it was a cute little town and that winter we came back on vacation and decided to move here after I graduated from eighth grade," she said. "When I came here, everyone was so nice and the classes they offered here were more advanced than in California where I went to school. I feel if I had gone through middle school here I would've known a lot more. When I came here, most of the kids knew twice as much as I did."

"I figured I might as well get as much as possible out of high school before I go to college," she said, and she has: She ranked 11th in the senior class, with a GPA of 3.9388.

Although she named Galen Farrington, Joe Avalos and Carla Burns as teachers who influenced her high school years, she said Ron Wall changed her outlook on algebra. "I took it again here because the teacher in California didn't know what she

was teaching." Farrington got her interested in writing. Avalos challenged her more than any other science teacher has, and of Burns she said, "She's just got a great attitude. I love the way she teaches her class. She's funny and she's cute."

The fourth Distinguished Warrior is Tony Clawson, who was voted the friendliest junior and was Valentine king, as well as active in church youth group, Boy Scouts, Tae Kwon Do, football and track and was a volunteer for Special Olympics.

Clawson plans to work for the Forest Service this summer and then attend Adams State University in

Alamosa, Colo., chosen because it's a smaller school in the mountains and less expensive than larger out-of-state schools. He said he wants to go into teaching because it offers a lot of time off — and it's a family tradition: His grandparents and father are teachers; father Kevin Clawson teaches Spanish at the high school.

Clawson has been in the Ruidoso schools since second grade, when his family moved from Provo, Utah.

Clawson said what he'll remember most looking back at his school days are the sports in the community. He was in football four years and track two years, and hopes to be on the track team at Adams State. He said Ruidoso's is one of the best athletics programs in the state.

Memorable teachers for Clawson include Ames and Farrington. "Mr. Ames told us you learn from your mistakes, and if you don't know history, you're condemned to repeat it," he said.

Clawson said he's dealt with the stress of his high school years through Tae Kwon Do, which helped him stay balanced and gave him a relaxing break from school work, and time to reflect. His advice to younger students: "Don't give up. It seems like graduation's really close, but it can seem really far at times."

Davis' advice to those coming up: "Get involved in anything you possibly can, whether it be Student Council, SADD or FCA, because you become more involved in the school and it becomes more enjoyable... Also take challenging classes, don't take the easy way out, because you'll be better off in the long run. Applying to colleges, the hard work does pay off."

Raterman said that in Ruidoso it's up to the students to decide if they want to get a good education. "If you enroll yourself in honors and upper-level classes and you work hard, you can get a really good education," she said.

Rehfield said cross-country track and Coach Ronny Maskew helped her in more ways than athletics, helping her prepare mentally for classes, and the running itself helped her deal with stress.

Romero's advice to high school students: "Find your interests and go for it, because so many times you'll be amazed by what you can accomplish just by having the perseverance... No matter how hard it seems life is going, there are people there who are going to help you through."

Credit for the original discovery of gold around White Oaks varies in written accounts from John Baxter, a prospector from Missouri who arrived in 1878, to partners John Winters and John Wilson, who reportedly bought a stranger's claim for \$40 and a bottle of whiskey. That claim later was known as the famous Homestake.

Whatever the truth, cowboys rounding up stray cattle brought back tales years earlier about gold particles in the stream beds of the Jicarilla Mountains. According to "Ruidoso Countryside, The Early Days," by Herb Seckler, the discovery of gold ignited a stampede to White Oaks. The town went through a heyday in the 1880s and 1890s and spawned the first governor of the state, W.C. McDonald, who is buried in the White Oaks cemetery.

At its peak in 1892, the population hit 2,500 people, but when the railroad was routed through Carrizozo and gold played out in the early 1900s, the glory days passed into memory.

But visitors didn't forget the settlement with its fashionable homes, intriguing history and unique brand of newcomers

past 18 years, will be selling \$275 versions of the machine he designed to isolate the "fine stuff" less than 1/8th of an inch in size. He claims a recovery rate of 96 percent to 98 percent. He's been working in the White Oaks area since November and probably will stay two more months before moving on to a new location, he said. Past stops include places in California, Idaho, Missouri and Arizona.

"Anyone over six years can run it and get a sizable amount of gold," he said confidently of the machine he has sold for a dozen years. They provide the bread and butter that allows him to pursue his gold "hobby and handicap," he said. Reynierson and Don Keller from the Jensen operation testified that in three days about 3.5 ounces were extracted.

Keller came into White Oaks last summer to repair some of Jensen's machines, but has sampled for gold with the com-

pany since 1988, he said. "I was born and raised in northern Idaho and was five years old when I first went underground with my dad and uncle," he said. "I was 18 when I went into the mines."

Thomas said once bitten, a person has a hard time shedding gold fever.

"The nice thing about gold is that I've been in it nearly all my life, but you never become an expert. Just when you think you know, you find out something you don't," he said.

"All the old boys knew the gold was here, but it was practically impossible to get it out," Reynierson said. "This machine allows recovery of what was missed. We thought the artists tour was the best time to show it off."

"White Oaks always was known for its specimen gold. Unfortunately, when the miners would come across a wonderful example, they were told to crush it along with everything else."

Normally gold is found in a solid mass or real thin flakes, seldom in wire or crystalline, Thomas said. But the delicate wire form isn't unusual in White Oaks, the men said, showing off a vial about half filled with examples.

To reach White Oaks from Ruidoso, head north on State Highways 3748 (Mechem Drive), turn onto SR37 when it splits to the left toward Bonito Lake. Continue to the intersection with U.S. 380, turn left going west to the county seat of Carrizozo. At the intersection with U.S. 54, turn right. The turn-off to White Oaks is five miles north. Turn right and the settlement is nine more miles east. The trip one-way is about 45 miles.

interferes with the public health, safety and welfare."

Urban forester Rick Delaco said other cities base the power to enforce mandatory thinning, clearing of underbrush and other measures through the adoption of the Uniform Fire Code. The village approved that code several years ago, he said.

Deborah Martum-Dyars, newly elected village councilor, said the zoning commission should be the place where ordinances begin, are aired for public input and then recommendations are sent to the council. But the ordinances must be fair and equitable to stand up to legal challenges, she said.

Runnels said there's no doubt in anyone's mind that the village and Lincoln County face a "clear and present danger" from wildfire.

"Anybody who has seen what happened out at Kokopelli, Ranches of Ruidoso and Deer Park (during a 900-acre wild fire three weeks ago) know that certain areas of this community are in at least that much danger, if not more," he said. "There may be a need to look at new ordinances and to look at what we can do about the vacant lots as well as owner occupied and absentee ownership in the community."

Runnels and board attorney Charles Rennick will begin the work of crafting ordinances.

"New ordinances start with public hearings at the P&Z level," said board member Bill Hirschfeld. "Let's fast-track it and get going. We did this a year ago and I'm still thinking that as much as has been done, if a fire starts in Upper Canyon, the first thing the fire department will do is get all its equipment downtown. I wouldn't fight it."

The village needs to create defensible space in the heavily forested Upper Canyon, he said. When Delaco said the city doesn't own any land there, Hirschfeld pointed out that every road has a public right of way and that would be a place to start clearing.

Board chairman Glen Barrow said the difference

jurisdiction to deal with the

issue. Runnels responded, "I can assure you we have the support of the mayor and the majority of the council on this."

The village will need to map the condition of land within its borders to see what's on ground.

James Mason of the Ruidoso Fire Department has offered to help on that project, he said, but it will be costly and volunteer labor or seasonal employees may be needed.

Board member Mike Reveley said the village should build on existing ordinance and not reinvent what it has, and caution should be exercised not to tread on private property rights. Living on a small city lot, if he cleared 30 feet for defensible space, he would have to clear-cut the land around his home, he said.

Delaco said creating defensible space doesn't mean every tree must go, which is a common misconception.

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Fire out; disputes still smolder

Restoration rehabilitation meets with growing opposition

A fire that destroyed a large portion of the state Division of Forestry's Ruidoso office building on Monday, April 8, is now being restored. The contractor, however, is not sure how much of the building will be saved. In the meantime, a number of neighbors verbally expressed their opposition to the restoration project.

The fire, which broke out at 10:30 a.m. on Monday, destroyed the two-story building and the two-story garage. The fire was caused by a power line that had been damaged by a lightning strike on the night of April 7. The fire spread to the building and the garage, and firefighters had to cut through the roof to reach the fire.

larger than six-inch diameter that should come down." The rehabilitation effort aims to replace lost ground cover, especially in those areas severely burned on steep slopes.

"These places burned but burned all the vegetation and needles," Hausler said. "That has the most potential for flooding. The Little Creek area also may face some hazard with increased flow. We will be working on giving them ideas."

The fact that the fire burned primarily on private property complicates the situation, he said.

"Lots of different land owners are involved," Hausler said. "In other fires on national forest land, the U.S. Forest Service has its own rehabilitation plan and the money to do the work. In this case, it will probably come from two sources, the individual lot owners and the insurance companies. The Upper Hondo Conservation District also may provide grant seed."

Representatives from the Emergency Watershed Protection program, based in Albuquerque, were in Lincoln County Monday to evaluate the situation, he said.

Some of the burned trees could be used to form horizontal

barriers on slopes to prevent erosion, Hausler said. But most property owners will want to get rid of the dead trees.

Referring to the incident Friday, Duemling said, "Someone had pulled the flagged line put there to keep the cutters from trespassing on other property. I guess they thought the marks indicating which trees to keep were meant to show what trees to cut."

"Our guys were only there to make sure the cutter remained on the right property."

The division has no power to cut trees on private land, he said. But the owner of the lot had hired a man to harvest some of the trees in an effort to thin the smaller ones that create fire ladders, allowing flames to climb into the tops of tall pines. Such crown fires travel fast and hot and are harder to fight, he said.

They also are the type of fires that potentially threaten homes the most because branches may drape over a roof or form a chain that could allow a fire to jump onto a roof, Hausler said.

Even representatives from the NRCS can't go on private property to design a rehabilitation plan, if the owner doesn't want them there, he said.

There's an element that opposes cutting anything beyond what the architectural board allows and that's a six-inch diameter maximum," he said. "I think they're going to have to review those architectural standards. There are too many trees, even some that are

County receives youth job money

Grants go toward conservation projects

Lincoln County is scheduled to receive \$70,303 in grant money from the New Mexico Youth Conservation Corps Commission.

The money was awarded to the Capitan office of the Division of Forestry, part of the state Department of Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources. A total of \$3 million was awarded for projects around the state.

Beatriz Rivera, the new secretary of the department, said the money will pay for 45 natural resource conservation projects throughout the state, employing more than 800 young New Mexico residents in fiscal years 2002 and 2003.

The YCC issues grants to local, state, federal, tribal and non-profit agencies to employ young persons ranging in age from 14 to 25 in public projects that conserve the state's resources and provide communi-

ty benefits of lasting value," she said.

Funding for the projects comes from the governmental gross receipts tax. Recipients are selected annually by the commission through a competitive process.

Since the inception of the program in 1992, the commission has awarded about \$15.8 million in grants to employ about 4,500 people. The commission is composed of secretaries of the departments of EMNR, Children, Youth and Families, the superintendent of the Department of Education and the State Public Lands Commissioner in addition to five members appointed by the governor.

Colvin, who told Venegas she was the legal guardian of the boy. She obtained the services of attorney Gary Mitchell for the boy, Venegas said.

In an earlier interview, Venegas had said the biggest question was who started the fire.

"It could be her, it could've been the boy, any of the people

that were there," he said. Two other residents of the mobile home, Sandra Ortiz and Sonia Luna, were there several hours before the fire.

Venegas said if no more substantial evidence turns up, he will go to the district attorney for a grand jury to present the case against one of several suspects to see if there is enough evidence to make charges.



Fishing report for Ruidoso area, April 10, 2002

Ruidoso River: The water level in the River is still at the lowest flow reported for the past year. We are under 2 CFS and dropping. If you plan to fish the river, we suggest you concentrate your efforts below the confluence of Carizo Creek downstream to the Gavilan Canyon Bridge. The river was stocked April 4 with 574 Rainbows that averaged 11.4 inches in length.

Special note: The Ruidoso River has a new bag limit as of April 1. In the past a five fish limit was in effect. The new limit is three fish. A good move by the NMGFD Department to help conservation and a quality fishery.

Pheasant tail nymphs and bead head Prince Nymphs will produce fish when about anything else fails. Tie a dry fly on as a lead fly then tie a nymph dropper about 12-18 inches behind. Use the lead fly as your strike indicator. This is an effective and fun way to fish small waters.

Wear layers of clothes as the temperature near the water changes quickly. Remember to always wear eye protection. Southfork — The water flow rate is at a trickle. Great for a day hike and the view, but leave your fishing gear in the car.

Bonita Lake: Bonita Lake opened April 1. The NMGFD did a great job of stocking some large fish last fall before the lake closed and stocked several thousand 11 to 13-inch Rainbows a few weeks prior to the opening, thus the stage was set for a run opening day.

The water level is quite low for a spring opening; however, this did not detract from a fun day on the lake for several hundred fishermen. Propeller flies under a bubble rig was the hot ticket for spin casters, and for the fly casters it was a light colored dry fly up on top with a small nymph dropper. Eagle Lakes are closed for the

season.

Grindstone: Grindstone Lake has been picking up in activity in early to late afternoons. The lake was stocked April 4 with 2,450 hungry Rainbows averaging 11.4 inches in length.

Woolly Buggers, Zonkers and Streamers fished fairly deep have produced fish in the past three weeks. For spin casters, tie a propeller fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish with a fly. Please remember to squeeze the barbs down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water.

Please, if you pack it in, pack it out. Litter continues to plague the area lakes and streams.

Lake Mescalero: The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark woolly buggers continue to take fish late in the day. A few folks have been successful with Parachute Adams, Mosquito, or Hendrickson patterns and casting to rising fish. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk. Please practice catch and release wherever and whenever you can.
