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Mayor ousts Chief Maddox

LCMC not being sold; 'all rumor'

Board chairman says 'local control issues' are being examined. The county is raising some questions.


Lincoln County Medical Center is not being sold and no for-profit company is moving in to manage the county-owned hospital in Ruidoso, says the chairman of the local governing board.

Gary Mitchell said Tuesday that no "huge conflict" exists with Presbyterian Healthcare Services, the firm that has managed the 38-bed hospital for more than 20 years. The board is resolving local control issues "in a very amicable way," he said, without offering specifics.

"The local board always is concerned about maintaining the best health care we can, but no decisions have been reached one way or the other," he said. "Right now, everything is rolling right along at the hospital. The governing board, composed primarily of local residents, is discussing issues of local control with Presbyterian officials, who have been very cooperative in helping to resolve them, he said.

"I assure you, the hospital in excellent hands," Mitchell said. "Rumors that the hospital is being sold are untrue. Rumors that some for-profit is coming in

Juvenile probation office stays put

At least for the next year, the state Juvenile Probation office probably will remain in Ruidoso.

In an effort to serve residents of the village whose children account for the majority of the clients, village officials agreed to step back to the previous level of rent. The county commission is

expected Thursday to approve continuing to pay \$500 a month to keep the service in the municipal court building in Ruidoso.

Writing to the county, Ruidoso Village Manager Alan Briley pointed out that the juvenile probation office staff wanted more space, but no one was willing to pay the extra \$200 per month.

"The village feels very strong-

ly that the offices need to remain here in Ruidoso," Briley wrote. Municipal Judge Mike Line emphasized the importance of the office's local presence. Because the village owns the building, it can adjust the rent, but Line and Crime Stoppers also have agreed to help, if needed, Briley said.

Village councilors will review Eggleston's decision in a special meeting tonight

Ten days after saying he was satisfied with the job performance of Ruidoso Police Chief Lanny Maddox, newly-elected Mayor Leon Eggleston fired the 18-year department veteran.

The action - which was not approved by the village council in advance - caught some council members by surprise, but not everyone.

"This (an intention to fire Maddox) came up during the campaign and he denied it on radio and in print," Councilor Bob Sterchi said of Eggleston. "Lanny is a classified employee by ordinance. We did away with patronage years ago. Lanny has 18 years with the village (eight as chief) and I believe one year removed from the head of the state police chief's association."

"I just can't believe (Eggleston) did this unless there's something out there I'm not aware of," Councilor Deborah Marcum-Byars, elected with Eggleston in March, said she requested a special meeting on the issue. One was set for 6 p.m. today at village hall. The firing must be approved by the council to be legal.

"I'm waiting to be better informed," she said. Maddox filed for an injunction against the termination in 12th Judicial District Court. Judge Karen Parsons, based in Carrizozo, recused herself from the case and it was handed to Judge Jerry H. Ritter Jr., based in Alamogordo. A spokesman for Ritter's office said Tuesday no date was set for a hearing.

Eggleston issued a short statement Monday after news of the firing spread. "I don't feel I can work with the police chief and did not feel based on the last month that things would improve," he said. "We need to move on for the benefit of Ruidoso."

Maddox said assistant village attorney Charles Kennick delivered the letter from Eggleston firing him at about 3 p.m. Monday. The letter stated that pursuant to his authority as mayor, Eggleston was terminating Maddox's employment subject to a vote by the council. Lt. Wolfgang Born was named as acting chief. Eggleston told Maddox to vacate the office that day and directed questions to Village Attorney John Underwood.

"My attorney, Calvin Hyer of Albuquerque, says he has to cite a reason," Maddox said, adding that he has received many calls of support, but still is stunned. "All I can say is that I've dedicated 18 years to Ruidoso and have never ever had a bad letter in my file. My record is impeccable."

He was given no reason for the firing and has no idea why the mayor took the action, Maddox said.

Kokopelli Fire tax alleviation possible

'Compassionate' proposal would forego nine months of taxes on destroyed homes

State Taxation and Revenue officials were in town early this week to tour the area burned by the Kokopelli Fire last month and decide how to handle property tax assessments.

Jim Burleson, deputy cabinet secretary, said Tuesday that he's confident a proposal by Lincoln County Assessor Rick Silva should satisfy state law as well as show compassion for the 29 victims who lost homes.

The plan revolves around tax assessment statements that will reflect the loss of use of the homes for nine months of the year, but will retain the value of the land.

The bite for the county isn't that significant, Burleson pointed out during a meeting with state Reps. Dub Williams and Dan Foley, Republicans from Glencoe and Roswell, respectively. The loss of \$4.8 million in structures equates to about a \$20,000 total hit in taxes, he

said. "We're not looking at the county being minus millions because of the discretion this man has shown," he said of Silva.

Williams said he appreciated Burleson coming down to view the situation and agreed the solution seems appropriate. Foley said when someone loses a house in a fire and then receives a full tax bill, it's like being victimized again.

"This is an opportunity not to make this a tedious process," he said.

Burleson said, "We predict they're going to like what they receive. If they don't, they can assign a tax representative (usually a certified public accountant or an attorney). They could join together and in one appearance in front of the tax protest board, there could be one result for all."

"Many of the owners live out of town. For them to travel here for a 30 minutes hearing

makes no sense."

The tax board is composed of two local residents and one state representative.

Silva agreed that one tax representative and one hearing would save everyone's time and money.

County Commissioner Leo Martinez suggested if a mass protest is filed, that the hearing site be designated as the Alto Country Club to accommodate the property owners.

Burleson said he received three letters from Williams in two weeks and visited with Foley on the tax issue after the fire. Silva initially planned to remove the homes from the tax rolls, but was told by a state taxation official that wasn't allowed. State law dictates that houses on site Jan. 1 are to be placed on the 2002 roll, he was told.

But Silva proposed a compromise and



"Rumors kept coming despite his denials on radio and in print," Maddox said of the mayor. "Now we see they were true, so I think there is a real credibility issue."

But Village Attorney John Underwood said state law vests the authority exclusively with the mayor to appoint or dismiss the village clerk and village police chief. Ruidoso's clerk is Maddox's wife, Tammie Maddox.

"There's case law that despite falling under the village personnel code, if it's one of those positions, the state law rules," Underwood said.

The mayor can appoint a replacement, also subject to approval of the council, he said.

But at least a few people think Eggleston needed prior approval by the council, not

after the fact. They pointed out that laws governing a mayor-council municipality state a mayor can suspend an employee until the next meeting, but discharge requires prior approval of the council. If the person being terminated requests, he must also be given a list in writing of the reasons for termination, the law states.

Maddox was hired as a regular village employee by then village manager Gary Jackson. He was not appointed by the mayor at the time, Jerry Shaw.

Councilor L. Ray Nunley, who also was elected in March, said he was advised by Eggleston of the firing, but his only contact with the police chief since the election was a brief conversation on another issue.

"I've been through a firing once and it's not a pretty situation," he said, reflecting on the

removal of a county manager during his years on the Lincoln County Commission.

Councilor Ron Anderson declined to comment. Councilors Frank Cummins and Ron Hardeman did not respond to messages.

Former Mayor Robert Donaldson said, "All I can tell you is that Lanny Maddox is an outstanding police chief and before that, police officer. Any time I had concerns, he was open to my visits and was responsive. I never had any problems with him."

Personnel items will include re-employment of certified non-tenured employees (Action) and the high school principal position.


Rabies clinics

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Water shortage could impact development

County commission slates session on well problems, subdivision regulations

With an extended drought, streams drying up and meager run-off anticipated from the snowpack, the time may be right to tighten the reins on development in Lincoln County, some people say.

At their meeting Thursday, county commissioners first will hear from engineer Bill Midkiff, who has been tracking the flow — or lack of it — on Eagle Creek and the widespread problems with wells in the area.

During a public hearing for changes to the county subdivision ordinance set for 9 a.m., commissioners will review comments from New Mexico State University's water task

force. R. Craig Runyan, coordinator of the task force, cited places in Texas and Arizona that have imposed moratoriums. At least five proposed subdivisions will be affected in Kyle, Texas, by a moratorium that may be extended through October. Buda, another community in northern Hays County, also is planning a four-month pause in construction, he wrote.

He pointed out that a surcharge might be implemented to compensate a community based on the scale of a development and its total consumptive use.

Brian Hurd, water policy specialist with the university's school of Agricultural Economics, said the sustain-

ability of water resources is a key question when rapid growth occurs.

"For growth and development to be sustainable, specific information is necessary on the availability, quality, use and return flow of water," Hurd wrote. But without specific information that is costly to develop, he offered some observations.

"Reliability of water supply is and should be a critical concern of the community," he wrote. The county planning commission should account for the uncertainty in its planning and permitting functions, he said.

"When the extent of the water resource is limited and its recharge rate is uncertain, the addition of water users will erode reliability," Hurd wrote. "In such a setting as Lincoln County, additional users will negatively impact reliability felt by current users."

Several strategies could be employed by the commission, he said. They include:

- Developing contingency plans for drought and other water shortages, including restricting watering on large turf areas.

- Adopting an ordinance requiring developers to compensate the community for increased risk to water reliability.

- Implementing growth policies that mitigate impacts to water resources, including requiring larger lot size, appropriate landscaping design, strict zoning regulations and low water use building codes.

- Identifying and protecting watershed recharge zones essential to renewing groundwater supplies. "Controlling or restricting development in those critical areas would have the benefit of maximizing groundwater recharge while reducing the rate of growth and demand for additional water,"

Hurd wrote.

Specific recommendations were submitted by Coy D. Webb, an engineer with Livingston & Associates consulting engineers.

After reviewing the existing county rules for community water systems, Webb wrote the five-acre minimum lot size defining community water system need is a conservative and realistic requirement.

Because it may be years before accurate data is available on the current supply, aquifer location, production capacity, total storage and water quality, he said no further change in the ordinance could be justified now.

"However, we do recommend the conservatism of the ordinance be made more consistent in that type three subdivisions with lot sizes of two-acres or less be required to have a community water system," he wrote.

Proposed changes in the subdivision rules to be reviewed Thursday include:

- Reducing the amount of water a developer must prove for each parcel from a half of an acre foot per year to a quarter, a drop from 162,926 gallons to 81,463 gallons.

- That a detailed water demand analysis is required in all subdivision with six or more lots.

- A community water system will be required in any Type One subdivision containing any lot less than two acres in size and in any Type Two subdivision containing 20 or more parcels, any one of which is less than two acres in size. A type one subdivision contains 500 lots of more and a type three ranges from 25 to 499 lots, all lots under 10 acres in size. Type three covers two lots to 24 lots, none as large as 10 acres; four is 35 or more lots, each 10 acres or more in size; and five is two to 24 lots, each 10 acres or more in size.

Defensible fire space effort seeks help from commission

Organizers of a volunteer program to help neighbors create a defensible space from fire around their homes are asking Lincoln County commissioners to provide some minor assistance.

They would like to use the county manager's office as a receiving point for applications and would like County Attorney Alan Morel to help draft a "hold harmless" statement to be signed by homeowners and volunteers.

The commission will meet at 8 a.m. Thursday in the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

Maury St. John, who helped put together the volunteer effort, told commissioners in a letter that program is planned for two Saturdays in May and two in June.

"These will be the initial days of cleanup," she wrote. "The response to the program will determine if there will be any additional days."

"I have named this program, 'Operation: Save Lincoln County: Neighbor helping Neighbor.'"

Applications would be published in local newspapers to be mailed to the county manager. Ruidoso urban forester Rick Delaco, Don and Maury St. John would visit each site to determine the work needed.

On the designated Saturdays, volunteers would meet at Eastern New Mexico University parking lot for instructions and crew assignments. Texas-New Mexico Power will supply a boom truck where large or tall trees need topping first.

Sandwiches, beverages, gloves, rakes and first-aid kits will be donated by local merchants. Several local bear carvers will help in disposal of trees suitable for carving. Fire wood can be donated to needy families for winter use.

On the first Saturday, St. John called the Kokopelli Fire last month a wake-up call to prevent another catastrophic fire. The project is perfect for exercise buffs, she said.

The four days proposed are May 11 and 18, and June 8 and 15.

Sheriff's office needs many more radio dispatchers

The Lincoln County Sheriff's office and the county dispatch may need more staff and higher wages to remain effective.

County commissioners are scheduled to discuss the situation during the regular monthly meeting Thursday in Carrizozo.

County Manager Tom Stewart wrote in a memorandum that the sheriff is authorized for 13 deputies, but is functioning with nine.

"Despite the sheriff's best efforts, he has been unable to hire anyone qualified for the remaining four positions," Stewart wrote. "Starting

salary for deputies is \$10.64 per hour and grows to a maximum of \$15.05."

He compared those figures to a range of \$11.96 to \$17.79 in Ruidoso, about the same in Chaves County and \$12.14 to \$15.97 in Alamogordo.

Stewart also noted that the workload on the dispatchers is increasing.

"Staffing the dispatch with only a single person is no longer a prudent manner of maintaining emergency dispatch services," he advised. "The currently authorized five full-time dispatchers and two part time is insufficient to ensure proper 24-hour a day coverage seven days a week."

Stewart said at least nine dispatchers are needed.

But maybe the money for those two positions could come from the villages of Capitan and Carrizozo, he said. He sent letters to both villages mayors pointing out the free services that have been provided to them over a number of years and requested that they each consider paying for one position of \$31,251 per year in their next annual budget.

Dispatchers in this county earn a starting salary of \$8.65 per hour and a maximum of \$11.99, compared to a range of \$9.63 to \$14.46 in Ruidoso, \$8.97 to \$14.67 in Chaves County and \$9.80 to \$14.22 in Alamogordo, Stewart pointed out.

Anti-smoking effort launched

A former Ruidoso village council member is calling on village officials to regulate smoking to reduce the effects of second-hand smoke.

Bill Chance asked the council to schedule some time for a presentation at the council's May 30 meeting on behalf of the newly-formed Tobacco Prevention Youth Coalition, doing business as HARDCORE.

"We ask the governing body to schedule appropriate public hearings to consider establishing an ordinance regulating smoking to reduce the effects of second hand smoke in public places and places of employment in the incorporated areas of Ruidoso," he wrote in a letter dated April 11.

"Numerous studies have found that tobacco smoke is a significant air pollutant and that breathing second hand smoke, a Group A carcinogen, is a proven source and cause of disease."

"Health hazards and increased health risks include lung cancer, heart disease, respiratory infection and more. The smoking of tobacco is a form of air pollution, a positive danger to health and a material annoyance, inconvenience, nuisance, discomfort and a health hazard to those who are present in confined spaces."

He sent copies of ordinances adopted by Doña Ana County, the city of Aspen and the city of Boulder in Colorado, along with practical questions and answers and material covering the impact on tourism.

'Affordable housing' may be next door

Ruidoso's effort runs into a lake of red ink

Back to Square One, or to the drawing board, or whatever... Thus stands an effort to develop "affordable" housing in Ruidoso, the aftermath of much time and energy put into a 150-unit project on village-owned land near Grindstone Reservoir.

The Utah-based developer, Dan Stanger, told village council members last week that the Grindstone numbers don't work; that if the project is to survive, the village must either donate the land, find a less expensive, flatter site, or switch all the units to 100 percent market rent.

This came after an earlier report that it would be necessary to decrease the number of

reduced-rent units.

We salute Stanger for an upfront acknowledgment of the problem. We salute the newly reconstituted village council for taking a longer look at the options as it prepares for a public rezoning hearing on the village-owned tract in June.

Perhaps there are no decent options; perhaps the answer, finally, is that "affordable housing" for Ruidoso workers is where it has been for some years now — in nearby, less expensive communities, like Ruidoso Downs and Capitan.

Maybe that's not so bad, either, since all of southern Lincoln County seems to be developing as a single economy, for better or worse.

A small thinker, at \$10,000 per month

Let me admit right off I am a small thinker. Whenever someone comes up with a cockeyed idea that makes no sense whatsoever, he observes my puzzled looks and tells me I don't get the big picture. Well, I don't.

You are no visionary, people tell me. Well, I'm not.

Here's an example of my simplistic way of thinking. I think we work our butts off and send way too much money to Washington, to the federal government. I think it is our money.

I think that the reason we send this money is that the federal government needs to provide basic services, such as, let's bomb them before they bomb us.

After the government provides these services, it needs to send any extra money back to us. It is, after all, our money.

By the way, in the event you are a prospective UNM student looking for a plush job, sign up for whatever courses you need to become a hotshot lobbyist and go to work for The National Group. It receives the \$10,000 a month from UNM.


This is not meant to be unduly critical of UNM for making the deal. It is no doubt necessary if New Mexico is going to get her hands on the money. Specifically, the company is looking at "extraordinary funding opportunities" in bioterrorism research, available now because of the 9-11 attacks.

So be it. But there seems something horribly wrong with a system so complex we need to spend 10 grand a month to get our money back from the government.

Oh, by the way. The University of New Mexico announced it is looking at a plan to raise tuition rates by 4.3 per cent, already up 40 per cent since 1995. "There are no free lunches," said UNM Regent Richard Taylor.

Perhaps that is true. But ten thousand dollars a month would buy a lot of snacks.

Worst fire hazard of all: the Flume Ridge wall

To the editor:

In your recent articles concerning the need to make the village defensible against fire, it seems that most of the "burden of prevention (and blame) is being placed upon property owners. I think that there is more to be said.

First, homeowners will certainly have to work to make the Upper Canyon safer, but their sacrifices will be useless unless something is done about the worst hazard at all, the steep wall of Flume Ridge which forms the south face of the canyon.

It is so densely wooded that it is almost impossible to climb, and it is on the windward side of Main Road. If a fire were propelled down that ridge by a southwesterly wind, it would easily leap Main Road and the river to take out all of the structures on both sides of the canyon.

My map of the Lincoln National Forest suggests that most of the ridge is Forest Service land but whoever owns it will have to thin it well to make the Upper Canyon safe.

Second, the authorities seem fixated on only the supply side of the fire equation — the fuel available. Wildfire has a "demand side," too — the people who start fires. Ruidoso managed for a century not to burn down, largely because we were free of the fools and arsonists who plague us now.

Back then, there was a culture of responsibility that prevented fires, but now, there seems to be no responsibility at all and no enforcement. Our serial arsonists still run free, and the fools who start fire by "accident" go unpunished.

One wonders why there is not a \$10,000 or even \$50,000 reward offered through Crimestoppers for information leading to a conviction. Those sums are pocket change compared to the cost of

controlling a wildfire.

I think it is time for a little of the rough talk to be diverted from the homeowner to the authorities in charge of dangerous public lands and those responsible for investigating and punishing the source of the fires. Based upon the pitiful results thus far, our public safety authorities are still nickel-and-dimeing the multi-million dollar crimes being committed against Ruidoso residents.

Improving the forest

To the editor:

This letter responds to Dianne Stallings' article entitled, "Fire Out, Dispute Still Smolders" in the April 9, 2002 edition. (I am) the owner of the land in the aforementioned article.

The goal of thinning vegetation and removing dead and diseased trees is to improve the health of the forest. A second goal is to reduce fire danger by removal of the woody debris and dead trees. A third benefit is the improvement of habitat for native animal species. These benefits are dramatically evident in the ... forest in Mescalero where sound forestry management has been practiced for many generations.

The contractor I engaged for my project agreed to follow the standards of the N.M. Forestry Division. These "best practices" result from the science and experience of the Forestry Division, other states, and the U.S. Forest Service.

The Alto Lakes Architectural Control Committee (ACC) had approved my lot project and Mr. Fischer, a neighbor, was present at the meeting when this approval was granted. Notwithstanding

the ACC endorsement, Mr. Fischer led the resistance to thinning and cleaning of my lot. As the owner of the property and following N.M. Forestry Division best practices, my contractor and I had the right to proceed ...

The Ruidoso News lead article in the April 9 edition, entitled "Addressing a Clear and Present Danger," reports on property owners who fail to take common-sense steps to reduce fire danger. Ruidoso's urban forester, Rick Delaco, presented the case for my lot project to the Alto Lakes ACC. New college grads face difficult job landscape

BOSTON, Mass. — As another class of newly minted college graduates prepares to descend on the working world, they face a particularly difficult road in the job search that others in graduating classes before them didn't have to hurdle, according to researchers at Northeastern University's Center for Labor Market Studies.

Recent analysis of data from the U.S. Department of Labor Statistics shows that young people, ages 16 to 24, have in particular, borne the brunt of the recession, suffering disproportionately in the nation's weakened economy. People in this age category account for some 63 percent of the total job losses despite the fact that they make up only 15 percent of the overall population. Despite the somewhat heartening news that unemployment overall has inched down from 5.6 percent to 5.5 percent, young adults 16 to 24 are still six times more likely than America's older adults to be out of work.

"The recession for young people has been more like a depression," said

Andrew Sum, director of the Center and author of the recent study on youth unemployment.

Sum said, "a rapidly rising number of young adults over the next five years will further complicate the task of restoring short-term increases in their employment rates."

All this adds up to a much-changed job market for the nation's newest graduates, forcing recent grads to either spring for freebie internships, live with their parents, or accept positions that are lower in pay and prestige.

"The weakening of the U.S. labor markets since the early winter of 2001, combined with the accelerated economic decline following the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11 have taken a severe toll on job opportunities for the nation's young adults," Sum said.

"Given that the population of people ages 16 to 24 is expected to rise by seven percent (versus a rate of five percent growth for ages 25 and older), this factor is particularly serious," Sum also points

out that a larger share of unemployed young people will be from different ethnic and racial groups, including Asians, Hispanics and recent immigrants.

Sum cites several reasons for a federal stimulus program targeting this age group's employment and training, including their own purchasing power, the boost for job opportunities across the board that such a package would provide, the provision of public services, an overall reduction in poverty among low-income families, and an overall increase in literacy/numeracy skills among this age group.



Holloman ordnance team safely burns old dynamite in Downs

An ordnance team from Holloman Air Force Base burned off 20 sticks of dynamite from the building site of a condominium across from the main entrance to the racetrack at 8:45 p.m. April 11 after the contractor dug it up with a backhoe, said Assistant Fire Chief of Ruidoso Downs Jim Badger.

Badger said the fire department was called out at 4:30 p.m. to look at "an old military ammo box that contained 20

sticks of dynamite, already sweating and starting to crystallize, which makes it very volatile."

The ordnance team from Holloman arrived at 7:41 p.m. and the Ruidoso Downs Fire Department stood by with two engines and a tanker, while police kept people away from the scene, Badger said. By 9:15 p.m., the dynamite was disposed of and everybody was cleared from the scene.

"We had hose lines off the truck so we could extinguish a fire in case it did get started

and start another fire in town. If it exploded, it would've caused a fire," he said.

Badger said he wasn't sure how the dynamite got there. He said the case was military, but the military did not claim it, adding that an amusement park previously on the site may have used it to blow up rocks.

Eight firefighters from Ruidoso Downs were involved and Steve Olson with the Rio-Hondo American Red Cross came with drinks and snacks for all the personnel on the scene.

Special pens to treat livestock more gently

LAS CRUCES - A nationally known expert in designing humane facilities for handling animals will help develop a new livestock facility at the U.S. Department of Agriculture's 193,000-acre Jornada Experimental Range near Las Cruces.

In preparation for the new work, Temple Grandin, an assistant professor at Colorado State University, will present a free, two-hour public lecture on low-stress animal handling and design of livestock facilities April 18 from 9 to 11 a.m.

The event will be held at the new headquarters building for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Jornada Experimental Range on the New Mexico State University campus. The presentation is sponsored by NMSU's Department of Animal and Range Science and the Jornada Experimental Range.

Following the talk, there will be a private tour for Grandin at the Jornada's existing livestock handling facilities, located 17 miles northeast of Las Cruces on U.S. Highway 70. Jornada officials will

explain their goals for the new facility and develop a construction timeline.

"We want to make sure we are handling our animals with the least stress possible to ensure the best quality research possible," said Ed Fredrickson, a Jornada Range research animal scientist and adjunct NMSU faculty member. A completion date for the new pens has not been set, but Fredrickson would like to see

construction on the new facility begin by late 2003.

Grandin has designed a number of systems that use behavioral principles to handle livestock.

The improved squeeze chutes and restraint systems that she invented prevent animals from being hurt and also keep them calm, by nearly eliminating upsetting sights and sounds, jostling and especially pain.

Screening tots to assure a better future

Volunteers team with the schools to evaluate children preparing for kindergarten

Children from birth to age 5 have been getting their developmental screenings through the national Child Find program, Region IX Education Cooperative and the school districts of Capitan, Carrizozo, Cloudcroft, Corona and Hondo — with Ruidoso and Tularosa scheduled for May 3 and April 12, respectively.

Volunteers from the community give the children checkups for vision, dental health, hearing, motor skills, speech and language development. They also give information to parents on their children's nutrition and check for general classroom readiness for those going into kindergarten.

Victoria Baca has been bringing her son, Ziar Apadaca, to the screenings in Hondo every year.

"I like coming to find out where my son's at," Baca said. "He's been in Head Start two years and he's graduating to kindergarten. They show me if he sees well ... where he is developmentally, how much he's learned at Head Start — and he gets his immunizations."

Baca had been concerned about Ziar's walk, but occupational therapist

Charlene McKinney assured her that he'll be fine as long as he can do what the other children can do.

Donna Sisneros, special education director for the Hondo Valley School District, said she sees some of the same parents every year from the birth of their children. The screening "answers a lot of parents' questions," she said. "If they're considering seeing a doctor but they're not sure, they'll ask one of the therapists. It catches problems early and assures parents that things are going well, or catches (problems) at an earlier stage before they become more serious."

Likis Vuicuich, who coordinates the birth-through-age-three program for Region IX, has been helping with the screenings of the younger children for 18 years, and she's seen the program grow, becoming more comprehensive as local professionals volunteer their time. Vuicuich is full of praise for the Child Find program.

"The parents have better information about the schools and services at the schools," she said. "It's a less stressful transition for families because going through the Child Find process helps them become aware of what to expect in the public schools."

Dahn Freed, coordinator of the program, said the speech and language screenings let parents and the schools know if a child is developing on target.

If there are developmental delays, something can be done about them before school starts, and children can be entered into programs to help them. "The point of doing this is if you find somebody needs a little help in developing in an area, we see what we can do to get them where they should be. Our goal is that by the

time they're in kindergarten, we can prepare them so they can function in a classroom or educational setting," Freed said.

"For example, when they start kindergarten, if they're having a language delay, it's going to impact their learning, so we want to prepare them and get them to work through those language barriers so when they do start kindergarten, they're prepared."

Volunteers from the Ruidoso Noon Lions are on hand to give vision tests by taking pictures of children's eyes with a camera and sending them to the ophthalmology school at Vanderbilt University in Tennessee, where they can be checked for the six most common vision disorders — myopia, astigmatism, hyperopia, arismotropia, media opacity and strabismus.

"A little girl last year had crossed eyes and had surgery to correct it," said Lions volunteer Bill Allen. "She came back this year to see how much improvement there was. She's much, much better."

Randy Barone, D.D.S., of Carrizozo, has been doing dental check-ups for three years as part of the screenings, along with Dr. Dale Goad. They see many of the children later on.

"Dr. Goad and I have more of a public health care practice," Barone said. "We see indigent and Medicaid and private pay patients. We like to do any type of interceptive treatment. We're able to intercept when the problems are a lot smaller."

Joseph Tam, D.D.S., will do the dental screenings in Ruidoso.

All the screenings are free and everyone is welcome, Freed said.

The Ruidoso screening is from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., Friday, May 3 at Nob Hill Early Childhood Center.

Parents are asked to bring birth certificates, immunization records and social security numbers of children registering for kindergarten, and immunization records for the younger children. For more information, contact Freed at 257-2368.

narrow and unforgiving Cree Meadows course on both days caused the Ruidoso varsity team to shoot a 771 and finish second behind Socorro.

While the boys came out as champions, they weren't the best team in the tournament. That honor went to Clovis.

The Wildcats scorched the 4A-5A field with a two-day total of 626 and were paced by Robert Goff, who shot an amazing 69 on the first day and finished with a one-under par score of 142.

"There's a little bit of disappointment; the kids were confident they could win. They thought they would play a bit better than they did," said Ruidoso boys coach Eric Eggleston. "Things were pretty rough out there, though. Clovis shoots a 318, and that's pretty good for today."

What seemed to hurt the Warriors the most was their apparent lack of conditioning. Eggleston had been working to get his players ready for a two-day tournament such as the Leroy Gooch — particularly because that's exactly how the state tourney will play out.

While Ruidoso shot an impressive 310 the first day to take the lead among all schools, their mental weariness started to show on the back nine at the Links.

The Warriors fell to 5-10


overall and 2-7 in district after falling 6-0 and 19-13 to Portales, and now need some help to get into the playoffs.

There comes a time in most teams' seasons when they reach the point where they know they have no chance for post-season play, and every game from then on is simply a matter of pride.

The Ruidoso softball team is almost at that point.

Almost.

The Lady Warriors did win their first District 4-3A game of the year last week, splitting a double-header with Santa Teresa, and there is still some hope they might see some sort of post-season action.

But at this point, they have to rely pretty heavily on other teams' performances as well.

And all of it is for naught if they lost just one game to Portales on Tuesday. Results from that double-header will be published in Friday's edition of the Ruidoso News.

"We have to beat Portales, or it doesn't matter," said Ruidoso coach Billy Page. "Even if we sweep, then Santa Teresa needs

to beat them at least once to force a two-way tie for second.

"It's not out of the picture for that to happen, but this is a hole we dug for ourselves."

Split at Santa Teresa

That hole got a bit deeper last Thursday, when the Lady Warriors saw Santa Teresa score six runs in the sixth inning to steal the first game away, 13-7. It was a game that Ruidoso had control of for much of the day, but let it slip away at the very end.

Once the Lady Warriors figured out what they were about, they came out in the second and pounded the ball, winning 21-6 after five innings on the 10-run mercy rule.

"I take nothing away from Santa Teresa, they played well," Page said. "They protected their home field. But when we got our heads together, we put them away."

Jessica Gibson got the win in that second game, but she



injured her already twice-broken ankle on a slide and was unavailable for her team's home game Friday against Socorro.

Lisa Spurr, who has had the lion's share of innings in the circle this year in Gibson's absence, started against Socorro. She was actually doing a fine job, much as she did against Santa Teresa.

"She's done everything we've asked of her," Page said. "I don't have any complaints about her."

nine hits and no walks.
