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Reservation fire contained

Evacuations were forced by the 8- to 10-acre blaze Tuesday.

For the second time in four days, a fire broke out on the Mescalero Apache Reservation Tuesday, prompting the evacuation of two housing areas.

The origins of both fires are under investigation. Human cause is suspected, further fueling speculation that a serial arsonist may be at work.

About 1 p.m., a home owner in the Palmer Loop area spotted the fire across the road in mixed conifer, said Rachel La Paz, fire information officer for the Bureau of Indian Affairs Forestry Division.

One of the first persons on the scene was incident commander Cornel Cervantes with his initial attack response team and engines from the BIA. La Paz praised the team's ability to mobilize needed fire fighting resources quickly.

"The fire management program here in Mescalero has really been on these fires," she said. "Maybe there is

someone here who is lighting these fires, but the initial attack response has been great to pull out their capabilities in a matter of an hour...

"We're fortunate no one's home was lost and we had no injuries on this fire."

About 2 p.m., orders went out to evacuate the Carrizo Trails and Peña See FIRE page 2A

Facelift for Fort possible

While plans to expand and improve the cemetery at Fort Stanton move ahead, efforts also continue at other levels to preserve and use the 1855 fort complex.

A re-enactment is set for May 19 and Lincoln County Manager Tom Stewart said he's scheduled to appear April 29 at the Legislative Finance Committee meeting in Santa Fe. He'll discuss the use of a \$44,000 Economic Development Grant awarded to the county in exchange for a \$6,000 match.

The re-enactment put together by the Fort Stanton Partnership, a non-profit group dedicated to preserving the fort and its history, is scheduled from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Nancy Hoffman, wife of Fort Stanton Inc. president Tony Hoffman, said the event was planned in honor of Preservation Week and will wind up a day of other events staged by the state Monuments Division and the National Museum of the American West. 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Preparing for the worst

Training exercises from cutting into car frames to rappelling down a mountain-side are part of the 15th Annual Emergency Medical Services Region III Conference this week in Ruidoso.

Jan Elliott, executive director, said about 325 people are attending the pre-conference training workshops and drills Monday through Thursday and 375 more are anticipated to arrive in time for the Friday through Sunday conference. Nationally-known speakers will be featured during the conference and annual awards will be presented

including EMS Systems Excellence, Rookie of the Year and the Volunteer Provider Award, Elliot said.

"This is a joint effort with the Lincoln County and Ruidoso EMS," she said. "We couldn't do it without them."

It's not all work. The annual golf classic, two-person scramble is set for Thursday and a two-person team fishing tournament is Friday at Grindstone Lake.

The region covers 12 counties on the east side of the state and is responsible for offering education, training and injury prevention techniques. The region includes 105 EMS units, fire-based services, 12 hospitals and 22 dispatch services.

Hospital board wants to expand local focus

The governing board of the Lincoln County Medical Center may step forward to play a more prominent, even dominant, role in the operation of the county-owned hospital in Ruidoso.

"We just feel we're more attuned to taking care of the local needs than any outside group that manages the hospital would be and we want the power to do that," said Gary Mitchell, a local attorney and chairman of the board for the past eight years.

The latest in a series of meetings with officials from Presbyterian

HealthCare Services, the Albuquerque firm that manages the 38-bed hospital, occurred Monday.

"We discussed in detail a plan to accomplish that," Mitchell said. "The local board has been having extensive discussion with PHS management regarding more local control and the ability to contract locally for supplies and such, and to recruit more physicians into the community, and to try to avoid larger fees

for work that would have to be done outside the community. That encompasses a whole gamut of things.

"Anybody who goes to the hospital knows we have to contract with outside sources, whether it be at Pres or the University of New Mexico or wherever. If we can do those locally, it's a savings of money."

He described the discussions with Presbyterian as "amicable and productive."

The board intended to take the result to the county commission when all of the details were worked out, Mitchell said.

"That doesn't necessarily mean that there would be some parting of ways," he said. "It may mean that local board takes a lot more control running the hospital, which is why necessary to make certain we develop more local businesses."

Although Presbyterian purchasing plans with savings of volume, "in recent years, so many people locally have been and if we can do business and...



housing areas, affecting about 100 people, La Paz said. But by 5 p.m., the fire was nearly contained and some firefighting crews were released.

"They're taking care of the hot spots now and residents of the two housing areas are being allowed to return home," La Paz said.

An estimated eight to 10 acres burned.

Harlyn Geronimo said he could see the flames and heavy smoke from his home, but a fast response from slurry tankers, including the BIA-contractual single engine air tanker sta-

tioned at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, reduced the intensity.

Two fires briefly filled the sky with smoke Saturday, one flaring up near the previous Kokopelli Fire that destroyed 29 homes last month and the other lighting up the night in Mescalero.

At 12:16 p.m., the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office received a call about a grass fire near an unused stable and training track on High Mesa Road in Kokopelli. The first unit from the Bonito Fire Department arrived by 12:19 p.m. Backup from the Ruidoso Fire Department, the state Forestry

Division, the U.S. Forest Service and several private contractors started arriving a few minutes later, according to Laura Doth of Grindstone Graphics, who coordinates fire information in and around the village.

By 3 p.m., the fire had burned five acres, but was contained and mop-up operations were under way.

The blaze Saturday in Mescalero was reported at 7:20 p.m. in the Chihuahua Well area in the northeast section of the reservation that abuts Ruidoso. Located in Ponderosa pine, the fire burned about 70 acres by 11 p.m. Saturday.

money in Lincoln County, we want to be able to do that," Mitchell said.

He doesn't expect the details to be ready for the next commission meeting on May 2 to review the county's preliminary budget. But he also doesn't expect the process to drag on.

"When we put it all together, we'll bring it to the commission and explain it and it may be necessary that we need commission

approval..." Mitchell said.

The local board realized that over the past 30 years of association with Presbyterian, the community has grown and matured, particularly in the medical sense, he said.

"We're able to do a lot more of that on our own than have outside sources do it," Mitchell said. "... Frankly, our doctors have done great work and so has our medical community, particularly our nurses.

"The local board believes firmly that the future survival of a rural hospital depends on the ability to take care of as much as they can on their own. That doesn't mean we're going to do complicated open heart surgeries. ... If we can recruit a doctor to take care of matters here, then we ought to get that doctor here."

The board is striving for that local control, he said. Presbyterian officials are cooper-

ating.

"Please don't believe the rumors," Mitchell said. "The people on that board have volunteered their time, some for as long as 20 years. We love that hospital and we're going to do everything we can to make it a better hospital..."

One of the thrusts will be to expand the opportunity for contributions to the hospital, through the local foundation Mitchell said.

who wrote, 'Fort Stanton and Its Communities' will be there to talk about the Buffalo Soldiers," Hoffman said. The groups are mostly from New Mexico, but Ulysses Davis from El Paso, a Buffalo Soldier re-enactor, also will attend the Fort Stanton event.

"Wear sun shade; and, although there will be some chairs, it might be good to bring your own or a blanket to sit on," Hoffman said. "Our venue is going to be set up all the way around the quadrangle (in the center of the buildings). We will have Apache dancers in one area, we will have living history characters in another and the military re-enactments going on in a different half of the quad. Food will be available, music and political candidates have been invited. An artillery unit also may be coming."

Although some supporters of a move to establish a national cemetery in Albuquerque are trying to block D'Arco's efforts, saying it endangers their project, the director explained that two different processes and two different pots of money are involved.

Fort Stanton is a state military cemetery, which is intended to complement national cemeteries and serve more remote locations. It also is an existing cemetery, with 1,700 grave sites, some dating back to 1899.

He envisions Fort Stanton serving an area that includes Lincoln County, Roswell and Alamogordo, with an estimated veterans' population of 16,000.

"We're really excited about this," D'Arco said. "This is the first agency in the 50-year history of state control that has stepped forward and wants to do something with it. Volunteers have been doing a lot of hard work on their own.

included," D'Arco said of the improvements. "When the construction phase is completed, the state manages and operates the cemetery. There are a couple of ways to do it. We can hire an on-site manager or could contract with a local provider and for grounds work."

Agreements also might be struck with Amity Foundation, a substance abuse rehabilitation program at the fort, or with Camp Sierra Blanca, a youth offender rehabilitation operation nearby, he said.

"It could be a learning, vocational experience for the boys at camp," D'Arco said.

The money comes through the state cemetery grant program, a Congressionally mandated program. Twenty-six states participate. Eleven locations have expansion and improvement projects and six are under design, including Fort Stanton.

Improvements D'Arco sees at the fort cemetery include a committal shelter for families and mourners, a small office for families to discuss arrangements and look up gravesite information and an equipment shop.

"We also plan on adding in a gathering area where ceremonies can be held on special events days, and a flag court," D'Arco. "State cemeteries are not intended to replace national cemeteries, they are a complementary service."

"They are getting ready to open one in Grand Junction, Colo., 250 miles away from Denver. They're opening because it's a remote part of the state and not competing with Denver. It is almost an identical distance from Fort Stanton to Santa Fe."

The fort is located about 13 miles northeast of Ruidoso on State Highway 214 between SR 48 and U.S. 380.

State Veterans Affairs Director Michael D'Arco said Tuesday that he and architect John Jarrard of Hutt-Zollars will be there to answer questions about plans to expand the Merchant Marine and Military Cemetery a half mile west of the fort.

"We'll have some preliminary drawings of our concept of how the cemetery will be improved and preserved," he said. "The architect has a contract to do the design, improvement, expansion and preservation. When they finish that part of process, we will make formal application to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. We have preliminary acceptance for \$2.5 million."

"But they got our attention and it's under our watch now. There will be some rules to follow. We will protect the Merchant Marine section. I think the burial rate will increase twofold. It's such a serene little valley."

His plans include a 13.5-acre expansion.

## Finding the answers to protect against wildfire

A new village task force faces a daunting task

Good ideas need care and feeding to make them work, and Ruidoso's urban forester, Rick Delaco, clearly recognizes that, even if those ideas must come in a hurry.

The newly appointed Ruidoso Forest Task Force will be filling out the script for the next stage in the village's battle to save itself from wildfire in the next month. Thankfully, said Delaco, the task is in large part complete — willing woodcutters are available, and a market for the small-diameter trees that must be taken out has evolved.

Three other areas need a careful look, and a unified answer:

1. Access to potential fire zones, through development of

roads and cul de sacs;  
2. Structural safeguards that incorporate fire safety in building codes and material;

3. Fuel management — the task of removing excess brush and trees, and then maintaining the sites. There are some big unanswered questions, such as who does the work if the property owner can't afford it?

But the effort also is getting a push from the business world; insurance rates are going up. One company, it's said, won't insure a home if brush and trees are within 1,000 feet.

A fine place for everybody to start getting some answers is at the Fire Wise Communities Workshop on May 9 at the Ruidoso Convention Center.

## Budgeting the cost of living, or something

Do you ever sit back sometimes and just wonder why?

You, the overwhelming majority of you, gritted your teeth earlier this month and diligently ante upped your payments to the Uncle Sam and the state of New Mexico. It hurt, but you did it.

Lots of your neighbors cheated the government. Recently, a couple of New Mexico residents were busted for using their government-issued credit cards to pay mortgage payments and buy such things as computers, diamond earrings, and kitty litter. They are not in jail. Why?

About the only thing most of us know about electricity is that the bills come when we flick the switch. We pay our bills, that is, unless you live in some parts of southern New Mexico, you might be served by Texas-New Mexico Power, which will charge you \$55.40 for that amount of candle-power.

Eastern New Mexicans get billed by Xcel Energy, the former Southwestern Public Service, at \$32.14 per month for the 500 kilowatt-hours. That is a whopping decrease from \$42.11 in the last couple of months. Thank you, Xcel.

Over in the Las Cruces area, you pay El Paso Electric Co. \$53.97 for the same electricity. Consumers in some other parts of the state are served by PNM, which charges \$42.70 a month.

Bottom line: When some New Mexicans flip that switch they are paying nearly double for the privilege than some of their distant neighbors. Why? Come to think of it, why can't we just go to Wal-Mart and buy an electricity card just as we do a phone card?

We sent our legislators to Santa Fe last January to develop a budget for the state. It is nearly May. No budget. That is mostly due to a recalcitrant governor who prides himself on his stubbornness.

There is a solution to this. The state business relies heavily on sales tax to reach goals. Sell X amount of product, receive X dollars. The same incentive would be given to the government. Don't pay sales tax for the days they are in office. Pay them for the days they are not in Santa Fe.

How it would work. The legislature 60 days to develop a budget. Pay each one \$100 a day of the 60 they are in office. get the job done at home, and we would get out of the legislature 100 times 50 days, guaranteed, we'd get a budget. They would get out of the legislature 100 times 50 days. Why not?

I spoke with a hospital board member who informed me that there have been discussions with various hospital management corporations, that he could not discuss any other details, and that there was probably no need for the RFP process if there is a change in the management company.

Hoping to be better informed, I went to the county commission meeting on April 18. However, when Commissioner Leo Martinez tried to discuss his concerns regarding secret negotiations, the other commissioners couldn't shut him up fast enough. They still don't like snoopers.

I take healthcare issues seriously and believe there should be an open process for decision making. The residents of Lincoln County don't need to be patronized. Given the correct information, they can decide what's best for their community as well as protect the salaries, pensions and benefits of the LCMC employees. This will also allow them to judge if their best interests are properly represented by their commissioners.

Lincoln County is growing, but under the current hospital board and Presbyterian management, medical services have decreased. Whether a corporation is for profit or not for profit, I can't see how secret negotiations benefit the entire community.

For reasons I don't understand, repeated violations of state procurement regulations have continued. Should there be a management change, I would hope the RFP process is followed. The county commissioners should also take back their right to appoint the hospital board.

Presently, new board members are selected by the existing board members. Better yet, maybe the hospital board should be elected. This would allow the residents of Lincoln County input into the selection process and provide a continuing check and balance system to insure high quality medical care.

# Rental owners must pay for garbage collection

Owners of rental property in areas of the county outside of Ruidoso are responsible to pay the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority for garbage collection. The authority board approved

a resolution April 16 establishing that responsibility. The authority currently bills renters or property owners on both commercial and residential rental properties. But when rental accounts aren't paid on time or at all, the authority loses money on those delinquent accounts.

The resolution states that property owners must send the payments and then collect from the renters themselves.

In other matters, the board continued to discuss possibly adding a second polycart collection to weekly service, a request first brought up by officials in the

village of Ruidoso Downs.

The once-a-week charge is \$13, Ingle said. To add another pickup each week would increase the cost by \$6, but the total would be about \$18 per month, because a fuel surcharge is being reduced on monthly

bills, dropping the regular price to \$12.50, and by July, to \$12.

If collection was converted to a "one-arm" type truck system that uses just a driver — the type employed in Ruidoso — the charge would go up to \$9, she said. The conversion also would

require many of the power lines in Ruidoso Downs to be raised because 14-foot to 16-foot clearance is required and some lines are just 10 feet above the ground. Some roads also are not wide enough for big trucks to turn around, she said.



# SCIENCE

Young scientists at Capitan Elementary School have been designing experiments; and, last week, advanced high school science students chose winners for the school's second annual Science Fair.

Students in fourth and fifth grade chose projects; and, although they had some help from parents, they did most of the work themselves, composing hypotheses and working out the conditions to prove or disprove them, said teacher James Weems.

The projects were divided into three categories for judging: biological science, earth science and physical science. Students competed within their grade levels. First-place winners in each category then competed among themselves to choose a grand champion for each grade.

Advanced high school science students judging the projects interviewed each student and asked him or her to explain the methodology and conclusions. The champions were interviewed again for the final selection.

Winners and their projects (pictured): "Brushing (teeth) really does help," concluded Gavin Gilson,


who was the fifth grade grand champion. "If you don't brush your teeth, they will rot." He put a piece of potato in four containers and labeled them constant, before (brushing teeth), and mouthwash only. He then swabbed a Q-tip on his tongue for the second and third conditions, and on his mother's tongue after she used mouthwash.

It was surprising to discover bacteria growing on the potatoes in the before and after tooth brushing, but less on the mouthwash-only potato, he said.

Caleb Wilson wanted to see how flowers were fed, and set up carnations in glasses with different colored food coloring, and one with plain water. Surprisingly, the carnation in plain water

died first, but Caleb discovered that the flowers "suck up the water through their stems and it goes through veins of the flower. They're darker at the tips of the flower because it passes through the veins and has to stop at the end," he said.

Hannah Sullivan's experiment was to make a magnet with electricity. She wrapped a jar with insulated copper wires, and attached a blue and a red one to a six-volt battery. Then she attached an iron nail to a piece of cork and put it in the jar of water, and found that the nail gravitated toward the copper wires on the outside of the jar, showing that electricity makes a full circuit, she said.





Tyler Scarafioti tested three methods of desalinating water: evaporation, distillation and freezing. He discovered that evaporation is the most effective method.

To test evaporation, he put a cup in a large sealed jar with water and a teaspoon of salt in the sun, and got 10 ml. of water in the cup each day.

To test distillation, he heated a vessel of water connected by two straws to a pot, and 50 ml. of water evaporated into the pot. To test freezing, he put water in a small cup of water and let it sit at 10 degrees for eight hours, freezing. The salt adhered to the sides of the ice block, so he washed it off, let the ice melt, and got 50 ml. of desalinated water.







ject asked how the earth's surfaces affect the water cycle. To simulate a desert, she used sand, putting a cup in the middle of a plastic container covered with plastic wrap. An ocean was represented by salt water, the earth by dirt, and a lake by tap water.

She measured what dropped into the cups in the middle of the plastic containers, and found that there was the most evaporation from the tap water container, concluding that lake water creates the most rain.

Miranda Zamora compared rates of decay of food in four different environments.

She quartered an apple, a banana, a piece of bread, a carrot, celery and potato and put one quarter of each into a sealed bag in the refrigerator, a sealed bag on the table, an unsealed bag on the table and in direct sunlight in an unsealed bag.

For five days, she wrote down the condition of the foods every 24 hours.

"The potato started making quarter moons and blackening," she said. "The second day, the bread turned stale. From this experiment I learned that in order to prevent the rapid decay of food, you should seal and refrigerate it."

Preston McQuire wasn't walking on eggshells for his experiment; he applied books to four halved eggshells (taped along the middle to give them support), and kept adding books until one of them broke.

His conclusion: The four half eggshells held up to 17 pounds, which is 862 times their own weight. He went through 16 eggs to perform his experiment.

"The first time, I did it with all big books, but two eggs were taller, so they broke first... Eggshells are in the shape of a dome, and the dome is one of the strongest shapes known," he said.

Eighth-graders in this year's Optimist Oratorical Contest expressed fear of World War III and of fighting in that war, said teacher Dierly Stierwalt from Ruidoso Middle School.

Top winners in the finals at Cree Meadows Country Club April 10, Nicole Doth and Starnes Reveley, presented their speeches at the Ruidoso School Board meeting April 18.

They will compete in Roswell, and, if either of them wins there, at the district competition in El Paso, Texas, where students vie for a \$1,500 scholarship.

The theme this year was "If I could change the world." Stierwalt said "9-11 had a big impact on what we heard in the speeches: A lot of getting rid of prejudice, racism and terrorism, improving society as far as families, drugs and alcohol and schools... Surprisingly, I heard more political statements than I usually hear from kids at this age."

Nicole Doth opened her speech by saying that

4,000 people lost their lives in Pearl Harbor and that what happened in New York last September is "all too common an occurrence elsewhere in the world."

"Prejudice must stop," she said, asking for "all countries to work together and get along."

She cited John Walsh, director of Seeds of Peace, who established peace camps for Israeli and Palestinian teenagers to get to know each other as individuals and discuss the issues their

governments are involved in.

She ended her speech by asking people to "go home and work out the differences between people, because it all starts with one, and that one can be you."

Starnes Reveley asked his audience to "try to get rid of hatred."

"It's everywhere," he said, "even in my school. I think and I think, and I can't think what is the gain from hating."

He started noticing hatred popping up in seventh grade, he said.

Ignorance is part of the problem, "and people who identify the problems can help change the world for the better... The Holocaust happened because people ignored it until it was too late. It

can happen again."

Stierwalt said all 137 eighth-grade students were required to do a speech for the competition.

# Commission encourages endangered species hiatus

■ The moratorium also backs easing current logging restrictions.

Despite requests for more research, a resolution calling for a moratorium on species being added to the federal Endangered Species list and backing revisions to reduce restrictions on logging was approved Thursday by the Lincoln County Commission.

Commissioner Rick Simpson suggested the resolution that will be sent to congressional leaders and federal agencies.

In the resolution, commissioners contend that after the enactment of the Endangered Species Act in 1973, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management used questionable science to restrict the use of federally controlled lands.

That created "severe economic hardships" for some citizens of New Mexico, reducing county, state and federal tax revenues, it states.

"I'd like to see this pass," said Tony Seno, policy analyst with the county Libertarian Party. "I think we've been lied to for a long time."

But Charles Rennick, head of the county Democratic Party and an attorney in Ruidoso, pointed out the commission already is on record supporting multiple uses of public land. Three commissioners represent more urban portions of the county where residents may look for different uses than those from agricultural areas, he said.

"As I understand the resolution, this deals exclusively with public land and agricultural interests," he said.

But Simpson said the term "rural resource industries" includes agriculture, tourism and recreation.

Rennick said he thought it is inappropriate for the commission to send the resolution to Congress without a full study.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said the act has restricted logging, which endangered the economic base and water recharge in the county.

"The more trees in the forest, the less water," he said. "Logging

reduces the number."

Rennick said the act is not interfering with logging in the county, which is restricted primarily to small diameter trees in designated thinning projects, not full scale logging operations.

"I don't think this makes the commission look like it studied the situation," he said.

But chairman Rex Wilson said, the act "has imposed rules and regulations and shut it (logging) down."

Doris Cherry, a candidate for state representative, said she objected to the resolution because the Farm Bureau doesn't represent all of the people in the county and the agency lacks specifics. Until recommendations are defined, the commission should postpone action, she urged.

Oscara resident Jerry Carroll said the Constitution provides for avenues like resolutions to redress grievances.

Ron Gray questioned if the commission had any authority to affect federal law. County Attorney Alan Morel said a resolution simply sets forth the opinion of the commission, it doesn't change the law.

# Stewardship week aims for forest health

The objective of this year's national observance of Soil and Water Stewardship Week, April 28 through May 5, is to urge citizens to support improvement management and conservation of trees and forests from the nearest community street to the most remote mountain top.

Members of the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District hope that people observe the special week by planting a "good" tree.

"In most situations, the knowledge for conserving and managing trees is available," according to a statement from the district staff. "What is needed is the willingness of people to do what is necessary to conserve our forest resources in a

healthy way.

"Our district promotes the planting of 'good' trees that provide shade, filter pollutants, reduce runoff from storms, are used for windbreaks and establish buffer strips along rivers and streams to improve water quality and wildlife habitat. We want to rid the land of those trees that take water from the underground water table, rob the earth of grasses that can't grow beneath them and cause loss of valuable farm and ranch lands."

## Wind, Colts batter Ruidoso baseball team

The New Mexico Military Institute Colts, the defending 3A state champion, showed just why they won that crown last year with a pair of convincing wins against Ruidoso Saturday.

NMMI won their 13th and 14th straight games against Ruidoso at the White Mountain Recreation Complex, defeating the Warriors 25-1 and 19-5 to remain undefeated in District 4-3A.

While Ruidoso's playoff hopes seem to be blown away like so much paper and candy wrappers in Saturday's tempest-like conditions, coach Mike Morris showed his eternal optimism.

"It's not over just yet," Morris said. "If those Santa Teresa games (against Lovington) have to be played, we still have a shot."

"Those games" Morris referred to are a pair of contests Santa Teresa was set to play against the Wildcats earlier in the year, but were ruled a forfeit when the Desert Warriors were unable to field a full team.

Under district rules, those games count as wins for Lovington, but Morris claims each athletic director agreed the games would be made up.

If that's the case, then Lovington has to play seven games within a two-week span — two against Santa Teresa, two against NMMI (in a make-up of a rain-out), two regularly scheduled contests against Ruidoso, and one versus the Warriors which was called earlier in the year due to darkness.

In that last game, Ruidoso was leading 3-2 in the top of the second inning.

With so many games yet to be played



by the Wildcats in such a short time, Morris is hoping Lovington will be worn out by the time they face the Warriors.

"Hopefully, they'll have run out of pitchers by the time they see us," Morris said. "That's certainly an advantage."

Of course, if the forfeited games in question do stand, then Ruidoso is out, and Lovington must contend with Portales for that final playoff spot behind NMMI.

Even then, Ruidoso would have something to play for, as they would face Lovington three times in two weeks and could play the spoiler — keeping the Wildcats out of post-season action.

### A dark and stormy day

It wasn't actually dark Saturday, but very stormy as winds reached gusts of up to 50 miles per hour on the field — forcing every fan in attendance to wear

jackets and huddle under blankets beneath a sunny, clear sky.

But the real storm could be found in the Colt bats. NMMI (14-2, 10-0 in district) opened up with a three-run first inning in the first game on a two-run double by Charlie Ward and an RBI single from Luke McKelvy.

NMMI never looked back after that,

scoring runs in every inning and stringing together numerous singles, doubles, and even a triple.

"They found the gaps," Morris said. "We still had some sore arms and they were hitting us well."

## It's crunch time for Ruidoso track teams

True, they had some major players like Kayci Brunell and Nathaniel Hedin back in the fold, but they also had to contend with some surprise problems with Philip Darley and Rachel Loya — both of whom had to sit out Friday's Artesia Invitational with an illness.

Add the fact that sprinter Jose Linares is likely out for the

season. That you have the backing of a ninth-place finish for the boys and a seventh-place finish for the girls.

"We thought we were a full speed, but it turns out we weren't," said coach Ronny Maskew.

As a result of Linares' continuing leg-cram problems, the Warriors still have yet to qualify any of their relay teams with just two more meets left before the state tournament in Albuquerque.

One Warrior who was back, just not in the relays, was

Nathaniel Hedin, who placed fourth in the 800-meter run.

"He took it easy, and was just getting some running experience," Maskew said. "He should be at full speed next week."

Despite the girls' overall finish, Maskew was very happy with the Lady Warriors' performance at the Bulldog Bowl.

Other Lady Warriors who performed well included Cecily Howell, taking second in the pole vault with a state-qualifying mark of 8-foot-6, and

Tamara Grant, third in the shot put at 32 feet.

For the boys, Cody Small won the high jump at 6-foot-5, also a school record, while Chance Hooper took third with a mark of 5-foot-10.

Now the Warriors turn their sights to Carlsbad this Friday, and Maskew is hoping to get as many of his relays qualified as possible.

"They're not the last pieces, but they're very big pieces," Maskew said. "It's not how we


It's hard to see any positives in this year's Ruidoso softball season, unless you view the team's play as a character-building experience.

# Now the time to apply for big-game license

An important date is approaching for big game hunters. April 27 is the deadline to apply for special hunts on elk, antelope, oryx, ibex, bighorn sheep, javelina and deer entry permits. All applications must be postmarked by this date in order to be eligible for the drawing.

To apply for special hunts, pick up Form 2002 along with a Big Game and Furbearer Rules and Information booklet anywhere hunting and fishing licenses are sold. A separate application form must be used for each species.

Up to four people may apply on the same form for all hunts except bighorn sheep, oryx and ibex. For these hunts, only one person may apply per form. Applications will be rejected if they are not completely filled out, signed and accompanied by the correct fee.

Those that apply must send in the entire cost of the license along with a \$6 application fee.

Included in the cost of the license is a \$3 depreciation damage stamp fee for residents of the state and \$10 for non-residents. There is a chart on page six of the booklet that outlines the cost of different special hunts.

Resident and non-resident hunters may apply on the same form, but they will all be placed in the non-resident quota pool. Also this year, hunters may apply for different sporting arm types for their second and third choice options. There is an option available on the application form for elk hunters that will allow them to go in the drawing pool for any hunts that are not filled during the regular drawing in one of the four quadrants of the state.

The "fee type" asked for on the application refers to those listed in the proclamation as either an S, Q, HD or QHD hunt. There are complete step-by-step instructions for filling out Form 2002 on pages 56 and 57 in the booklet.


Kimbrell won the long jump, javelin and pole vault events, while taking second in the 100-

## Fishing report for Ruidoso area, April 24, 2002

Ruidoso River: The water level in the River is still at the lowest level reported for the past year. We are under 2 CFS and dropping. If you plan to fish the river, we suggest you concentrate your efforts below the confluence of Carizo Creek downstream to the Gavilan Canyon Bridge. The fishing in this stretch of water has been quite good.

Special note: The Ruidoso River has a new bag limit as of April 1. In the past a five fish limit was in effect. The new limit is three fish. A good move by the NMGF Department to help conservation and a quality fishery.

Pheasant tail nymphs and bead head Prince Nymphs will produce fish when about anything else fails. Tie a dry fly on as a lead fly then tie a nymph dropper about 12-18 inches behind. Use the lead fly as your strike indicator. This is an effective and fun way to fish small waters.

Wear layers of clothes as the temperature near the water changes quickly. Remember to always wear eye protection.

Southeast: The water flow rate is at a trickle. Great for a day hike and the view, but leave your fishing gear in the car.

Beale Lake: The water level is quite low for a spring opening; however, this does not detract from a fun day on the lake. Propeller flies under a bubble rig are a hot ticket for spin casters, and for the fly casters it was a light colored dry fly up on top with a small nymph dropper.

Eagle Lakes: Eagle Lakes are closed for the season. Gravelers: Woolly Buggers, Zonkers and Streamers fished fairly deep have produced fish the past three weeks. For spin casters, tie on a propeller fly behind a bubble rig and

enjoy catching fish with a fly. The lake is once again open to non-motorized craft. Dig out your float tube, air it up and go fishing. Please remember to squeeze the bars down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water. Please, if you pack it in, pack it out. Litter continues to plague the area lakes and streams.

Lake Mesquite: The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark woolly buggers continue to take fish late in the day. A few folks have been successful with Parachute Adams, Mosquito, or Hendrickson patterns and casting to rising fish. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk.

Please practice catch and release wherever and whenever you can.

Fly Fishing Tip of the week: When tying knots in your leader or tippet, give the knot area a quick lick. The moisture helps the lines slide together better for a knotted area. A drop of super glue on the knotted area is great insurance for a 100 percent knot.
