Mayor's letter irks some councilors

A letter sent to employees of the Ruidoso Police Department by Mayor Leon Eggleston following his failed attempt to fire Police Chief Lanny Maddox prompted criticism from some village councilors. The financial bump from Eggleston's actions against Maddox also was received last week as Village Attorney John Underwood submitted a \$4,812.99 bill for the research he did for the mayor on the issue. The mayor fired the chief, but at the next council meeting, the board reinstated Maddox. Underwood said

because Maddox filed for an injunction in district court during the interim, his work fell under the special projects category of his contract with the village. However, one councilor observed if Eggleston had followed the proper procedure and asked for a council vote, first, Maddox never would have filed the injunction. All but one councilor voted to reinstate the chief. In his May 6 letter to employees, Eggleston assured them that his actions regarding the chief were not meant as a warning to the entire department and that he knows the vast majority of employees are dedicated to their oath to "protect and serve." Since becoming mayor, "I have

become aware of certain information I was unable to attain as a member of the council and this information worries me," he wrote. "Because of this, I have a growing concern as to the leadership of the police department. It is my intention to affect change within the areas that need improvement in the village and to promote those areas that are acting under the law and in the best interests of the people." Eggleston claimed that his actions are not personal, but "stem from a growing concern I have as the elected leader of this community." He then reflected on the election and actions of the council "In the last election, the people of this

community sent a message that they wanted change and accountability," he wrote. "The vote of certain members of the council on this issue would seem to suggest one of two things: either they were afraid to announce their true intentions and simply pandered to a one-time biased assembly, or they made conscious decisions based on the information provided to them. "While I respectfully disagree with the outcome, I hope the thought process mirrors the latter rather than the former situations while acting in the interests of the people." The council left him no option other than to establish a working relationship with Maddox, "in order to restrain the

growing number of complaints and lawsuits against (the department)," the mayor wrote. Eggleston said Tuesday that he had consulted Underwood and some councilors before the attempted firing of Maddox, but that he was not aware of the \$4,000-plus bill. He added that the letter was sent as an assurance. "I thought the letter was self-explanatory. I was trying to reassure employees that nothing was directed at them," Eggleston said. Reacting to the letter, Councilor L. Ray Nunley recalled that at the last village council meeting, he urged the mayor and council members to concen- See LETTER, page 5A

Ranger: Forest closure likely

Because of severe drought and high fire danger, the Lincoln National Forest around Ruidoso likely will close May 22. Keith Fletcher, acting district ranger for the Smokey Bear Ranger District, said an official announcement is expected Thursday. "This is the worst it has ever been in the forest in terms of lack of moisture and we're not even in the hot months yet," he said Tuesday. "I've been here since March 25 while (district ranger) Jerry Hawkes is in Alamogordo and it's rained once. The closure easily could be for a month and a half to two months." Although rain was predicted for Tuesday evening, Fletcher said two inches would have to fall before U.S. Forest Service officials would consider reopening the forest. The closure also would cover the Sacramento District of the forest around Cloudcroft, a spokesman said. In the last 10 years, the forest has been closed twice during

prolonged periods of drought, the last in May 2000, when it remained closed for one month. On the brighter side, Charles Liles, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Albuquerque, said that the summer may see normal to above average rainfall. Some confusion was created after the release of a report on El Niño, a phenomenon of warmer winds and currents in the Pacific that usually brings more rain to New Mexico. A press release reported that diminished rainfall would result for southern New Mexico, but it should have read for southern Mexico. Liles said Tuesday. "We can't find a reason to say the rainfall will be below normal for the state," he said. "Although good rain might end the fire danger and the concern about watering, it would not end the drought. We'd have to have at least one or two good winters. "We're looking at stream flows that are at 100-year all-time lows. Nothing is going to put water back into reservoirs except a good spring run-off (from a snowpack)."

Debate features all GOP hopefuls


Education, water and the United Nations were among the hot issues Friday night.

The five Republican candidates seeking their party's nomination in New Mexico's 2nd District congressional primary election exhibited many more similarities than differences in their conservative approach to district and national issues when they sought votes from about 250 people attending a forum-cum-debate at the Ruidoso Convention Center Friday night. The winner on June 4 will meet a Democrat named Smith in the November general election — either Mayor Ruben Smith of Las Cruces or state Sen. John Arthur of Deming. All the GOP candidates Friday said they strongly favor private property rights, the Second Amendment's gun rights guarantee, and a self-sufficient national energy

policy, and all received applause. The debate was one of a series the candidates have had in recent days. Two of the five — Ed Tinsley and Leo Martinez — claim Lincoln County residency, Tinsley as a Capitan-area rancher and multi-state restaurant-chain owner, Martinez as a Ruidoso restaurateur and stucco contractor. Martinez, born in New Mexico but raised and educated in California, sought to separate himself as one who can attract Democrat votes in the general election in a district that has 47 percent Hispanic population and 52 percent Democrat registration. "I'm the only one who can defeat a Democrat," he said. He also cited a national party effort to build a larger Hispanic Republican constituency. But Earl Greer, a Sierra County farm and ranch property broker, noted that he also has Hispanic parentage, and that his relative

youth (45) could give him a chance to keep a long hold on the seat, as Joe Skeen had done. Roswell businessman Phelps Anderson spent some time defending his business career, in response to a question from the See DEBATE, page 3A

Woman says water sent her to hospital

An Alamogordo woman whose mother and sisters live in Ruidoso claims tainted village water sent her to the emergency room last week. Doris Ballow said after her mother, sisters and she became ill, she took two samples of the water from the tap on Heath Drive to a testing laboratory in Alamogordo. The results for water drawn on two consecutive days came back with an elevated level of total coliforms, although no E.Coli, a potentially deadly form usually associated with

animal waste, was detected. Coliforms are bacteria that live in animal colons and are indicators of contaminated water if they exceed set levels. A third test sent to the Coulston Foundation microbiology water testing laboratory Monday came back clear Tuesday, she said. "So they've treated it," she said. "I still want them to pay for the emergency room care." But last week was a different story, she claimed. "It smelled like c-p," Ballow said Tuesday. Lower levies possible for area health clinics

If Lincoln County commissioners follow the recommendation of their manager, the special property tax for the county-owned hospital in Ruidoso and three rural health clinics will be cut in half.

County Manager Tom Stewart is recommending a reduction from .9 mills to .5 mills for the clinics and from 2.1 mills to 1 mill for the Lincoln County Medical Center.

He based the recommendation on that fact that the county's Medicaid and Sole Community Provider payments will be taken out of the county's Indigent Health Care Fund, which is generated by a dedicated gross receipts tax. The money used to be deducted from the mill levy proceeds.

Commissioners will consider the action during their regular monthly meeting that begins at 8 a.m. Thursday in the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

One mill equates to \$1 for each \$1,000 of taxable property value. New Mexico taxes on one-third of market value. Voters renewed the special levy two years ago at a maximum of 4.25 mills, but the commission has the authority to go below that mark.

Whether to lower the special mill levy must be decided before commissioners approve a \$14,318,200 preliminary budget for fiscal year 2002-2003 to be sent to the state.

Department of Finance and Administration for review.

Of that amount, the general fund accounts for \$3,867,921 and the road fund for \$1,366,063.

Those figures show increases from this year's \$13.7 million budget with a general fund of \$3.7 million, but a drop of more than \$100,000 for the road fund from \$1,477,970, according to county finance officer Glenna Robins.

After slicing off requests in a budget review last week for 2002-2003, commissioners are looking at \$40,213 above the two-month reserve required by the state. An estimated \$300,000 carryover from the current budget also remains unallocated, Stewart said. He suggested using that money to reinstate some items previously cut by the county clerk, the county treasurer and other departments.

Stewart noted in a memorandum to commissioners that the county is doing better on its jail operation.

For a 40-bed facility in 2000-2001, the corrections department required \$981,036 from the general fund. But projections for the 2002-2003 budget at the new jail in Carrizozo look like that number will drop to \$643,778.

"Therefore, our current scheme of operations, supplementing with proceeds from loan carryovers, are projected to save the general fund \$337,258 per year in operations," Stewart wrote. "We're on the right track."

Current staffing consists of 20 employees for Corrections Systems Inc., which manages the jail, and nine county employees.

Other items on Thursday's agenda include:

- Consideration of increasing the county clerk's filing fee from \$2 to \$4 to be in line with the rest of the state.

- A report on an inspection of road cuts in Alto Village by county road superintendent Albert Hernandez and Stewart showing 16 sites with noticeable ruts from settling under the patch material. The review was requested by Commissioner William Schwettmann.

- A discussion of liability for the use of the county fairgrounds in Capitan.

- A report from the county assessor on a pilot program for Hotel Ruidoso and on adjustments for victims of the Kokopelli Fire last March.

- A report from Lincoln County Hospital Administrator James Gibson.

ease and her resistance is down. She's been sick for 12 days from that water and she can't get over it. My younger sister is sick and my older sister had a slight case. Last Thursday, I got sick from it and spent that night and the next morning in the emergency room (in Alamogordo). They said it was a severe bacterial infection due to the water."

Ballow's mother, Martha Collins, 76, has lived in the Heath Drive home since 1976. Her daughters, Dorothy Collins, 54, and Jolyne Collins, 46, live with her.

"She's never had a problem before," Ballow said, adding that she's not aware of any construction, or water or sewer line work in the area.

Ballow talked to village water department director Larry Grasmick and water plant operator Ken Mosley, but wasn't satisfied with their

response.

"They tried to slough it off as not their fault, that it was something in the kitchen that did it. Uh-uh, not with a lot of other people coming down with it," she said. "They told me they would do another test and I said 'fine.' They act like they're not going to pay for the emergency room and medicine, so I had another test done myself. They like to pass the buck. When water smells, you need to find out what's doing it. Even the dogs are sick."

Grasmick said his department sampled the water at the Collins' home late Monday and expected to hear back from the Las Cruces laboratory today, but that previous testing of the system has shown no problem.

"It's a 24-hour test," he said. "We had to make sure it was done correctly with a sterile bottle that was kept cool. The water has to be

allowed to run and it must come from the cold water side."

The department received a similar complaint the week before Ballow became ill.

"We tested that site and came out perfect," Grasmick said. "We've had no other complaints except the odor from the Alto treatment plant. Grindstone (Reservoir) is producing good-tasting soft water."

Once a week, his department routinely samples eight to 10 sites on a rotating basis, Grasmick said. The samples are tested and if any problem is detected, the laboratory calls, then follows up with paperwork.

He said the problem at the Collins' household could be between the city's water main and the kitchen faucet.

"I showed her our chlorination levels in April and they were well above the minimum requirement," Grasmick said.

Volunteers start cleanup work; organizer looks for more help

Operation: Save Lincoln County officially got under way Saturday

The first weekend of Operation: Save Lincoln County focused on cleaning up the lots at two homes in Ruidoso.

"About eight people showed up to help," said Maury St. John, who with her husband, Don, put together the program aimed at neighbors helping neighbors. "But we still need more muscle for the upcoming Saturdays."

Her husband arrived first to handle the major tree cutting work. The rest of the volunteers came to help about 8:30 a.m. and stayed until 4 p.m. doing "grant work," St. John said.

The help is for people who can't handle the job themselves, but also for the improved security from fire of the entire forested community, she said. Some volunteers showed up with smaller saws to handle limb cutting. Others raked up pine needles and ground debris. The work also will benefit the water recharge ability of the area, she said.

Ruidoso fireman Robby Hall and urban forester Rick DeIaco did their part the day before the clean-up by marking trees to be cut and noting other work needed.

The only glitch came when she checked back with the village solid waste department to collect the material cleared, St. John said. Although the yard debris would fill two large

roll-off containers, it may be sitting there for a while.

Leonard Corona, who heads the village solid waste department, said Monday that the material will be picked up, but it will be done on the regular time schedule. It wouldn't be fair to move those homeowners to the front of the list, he said. But St. John was planning on asking the council to approve an earlier collection date.

St. John said homeowners who would like to fill out an application for a clean-up can find them at local churches or can call her at (505) 257-4575. More volunteers also are needed.

Dem. says he will move on saving Fort Stanton

Bill Richardson — ex-congressman, ex-U.N. ambassador, ex-U.S. energy secretary and current unopposed Democratic candidate for governor of New Mexico — learned long ago that all politics is local.

He proved it again at the Hubbard Museum of the American West in Ruidoso Downs Thursday night with a promise to the 100 or so party faithful, and some Republicans, that he will work to preserve one of Lincoln County's historic jewels, the 19th Century frontier post called Fort Stanton. He said later that he would study the question closely, but believes the preservation of the fort will hinge on a combined effort by state, federal and local entities.

That promise came after he told the crowd, gathered in a facility owned by a foundation established by race track owner R. D. Hubbard, that as governor he would be a friend of the racing industry and would support a new race track in Hobbs.

It came after he castigated the administration of Republican Gary Johnson for lack of a state budget and gridlock in the Legislature. Johnson had vetoed two budgets cleared by the Legislature in a regular and special session earlier in the year, but negotiations this week appeared close to finally achieving a budget after the primary.

Richardson saved his biggest salvo, however, for the status of public education in New Mexico: "We're 49th in terms of the amount spent on students in classrooms," he said. Education policy should focus on "classroom teaching, not school bureaucracy... In four years, I would like to see every student own and use a laptop computer."

He called education his No. 1 priority.

The state's biggest problem, however, is its "antiquated tax structure," which he said is at the heart of many of the state's economic ills. The gross receipts tax, he said, is driving away doctors and nurses and inhibiting new business.

The state's 8.2 percent income tax, he said, puts it at a disadvantage in competing with neighboring states — Colorado's 4 percent top rate and Arizona's 3 percent rate and no income tax at all in Texas.

He sees no problem in using interest earned by the state permanent fund for added support of education.

Richardson, who came to New Mexico from California in the 1970s to help run the state Democratic party, predicts a long, difficult campaign, and said "don't believe the ads that will be coming — I'm a good guy."

The candidate, who as a congressman conducted frequent "town meetings" throughout his 3rd District, made another promise: "Southern New Mexico will not be forgotten."

Noting that he had visited with some burned-out Alto homeowners during the day, Richards said the state Forestry Division needs more resources — "and I know about forest problems; the Cerro Grande (Los Alamos) fire came on my watch as Energy Secretary, and I'm not apt to forget it."

The meeting at the museum ended with a request for financial support for the Richardson campaign from its local campaign manager, attorney Don Dutton.

Richardson later met with Mescalero Apache Tribal President Sara Misquez and the next day was interviewed on radio station KRUI-AM, and had lunch with senior citizens.

audience about his relationship with his father, R. O. Anderson. "I'm proud of my father's accomplishments, but I'm running on my own," he said.

Steve Pearce, a Hobbs oil-field service owner and former state representative and U.S. Senate candidate, was circulating poll results prior to the debate indicating that he had jumped into the lead in the race. He cited a Wilson Research Strategies poll showing he has 26 percent of likely Republican primary voters, while Tinsley had 23 percent and Roswell businessman Phelps Anderson had 11 percent. The poll of 300 likely Republican voters has a margin of error of 5.7 percent.

All the candidates were concerned the role the United Nations is playing in world affairs, and particularly about efforts to impose control on the United States with such things as the "Border 21" program.

Tinsley said the U.N. has "gone astray" in designating areas under its control and U.S. troops never should be under U.N. command.

Anderson said the U.N. must go back to the narrow role of its charter.

Greer said the U.N. is a threat to the nation, and the U.S. also should withdraw from the International Criminal Court.

Martinez called the U.N. a forum for expressing ideas, but

now is a burden on U.S. taxpayers and should be held accountable for how money is spent. He said "rogue nations" in the U.N. disdain U.S. prosperity, but are first to come begging when financial help is needed.

Pearce said the U.N. is a nest of "corruption and fraud," and the U.S. must demand that it be held accountable.

Amnesty for illegal aliens got some attention from Martinez, who said he believes a guest worker program is a necessity.

All the candidates cited threats to private property rights from the Endangered Species Act, and other federal regulations they said too often resulted from "bad science."

Anderson pointed to efforts to save the Pecos Pup Fish, which he said survived four times when the Pecos River had gone dry for a year at a time — "but farmers are deprived of water, to save the Pup Fish."

Martinez told of an incident when six agents watched three empty barrels at his place of business for three days, suspecting an environmental violation: "That's overkill," he said.

Pearce said regulation can protect a way of life, but also can destroy property rights; the Clean Water Act, he said, is undergoing 40 changes, and 30 of the revisions increase government control.

Another example: The Albemarle Falcon, not seen in

50 years in southern Otero County, has impacted area forests because it's found to be a "suitable habitat."

Greer noted that allowable arsenic content in New Mexico water had been based on data from Africa, even though arsenic in water in the state always has been high.

Moderator Tom Stewart, the Lincoln County manager, called for "yes or no" responses to the question, "Would you sign a contract agreeing to resign (from the Congress) if you fail to honor your oath of office to support and defend the Constitution...?" Tinsley said no; the other four, yes.

Huffing and puffing about a hot topic

Ruidoso considers a smoking ban

Some of the wisdom of Solomon would seem to be necessary as the Ruidoso village council comes to grips with one hot topic — tobacco smoking in public places.

Some young advocates from Ruidoso High School would like to see rigid rules about smoking in restaurants and other public places.

Ex-Councilor Bill Chance says he's been kicked out of some restaurants because he chose to propose it on the students' behalf — acknowledging it's very much a hotly debated topic.

Why? Carlsbad, El Paso, Las Cruces — indeed, all of Doña Ana County — have such ordinances.

But Ruidoso is different

from these other communities in one very significant way.

Our No. 1 industry is tourism, and the hospitality portion of that industry has a simple goal — make everybody welcome, and make them comfortable.

Nobody can gainsay the fact that second-hand tobacco smoke has been determined to be a danger to the health of those non-smokers who breathe it. But a fair argument can be made that the economics of the issue will prevail.

Ruidoso's restaurants and bars have made a determination about the clientele they want to serve, and that system seems to be working. More regulation hardly seems necessary.

Stand-up candidates at a public forum

It was a special night. Not one, not two, but all five Republican contenders for the 2nd Congressional District seat being vacated by the venerated Joe Skeen were appearing jointly at the community meeting hall.

Somebody lend me a coin.



The formation of public policy or the conduct of business by vote shall not be conducted in closed meetings. All meetings of any public body except the legislature and the courts shall be public meetings, and all persons so desiring shall be permitted to attend and listen to the deliberations and proceedings...

Rick Delaco, Ruidoso's Urban Forester, did a fabulous job in moderating the program as did those individuals who made presentations, were panel members, and/or led the breakout group sessions. This was undoubtedly one of the most professional, informative, and enjoyable community education events we have ever had the privilege to attend.

We found it ironic that more people

did not attend this workshop, especially after all of the fires we have had in the area over the last couple of years. One can only suppose that the lack of interest is either the folks in Ruidoso completely understand the nuances of the wildfire danger we are faced with (i.e., they are "firewise") or they just don't give a hoot. If they are firewise, their homes are enhanced with a wildfire defensible zone and they understand the procedures to be followed if evacuation is required. If they are firewise, they realize our forests are ecological time bombs waiting to be ignited. This situation resulted from misguided forest management for over 100 years due to not intuitively understanding the natural processes involved with creating and maintaining forests. It is now obvious that if we continue to "let nature take its course" on our forests, we will be faced with more and more catastrophic fires.

A firewise individual can reason that this is unacceptable and something needs to be done, which only will occur if our elected officials and special interest groups get educated on the subject.

For the folks in the area who don't give a hoot, imagine (God forbid) Ruidoso with all of its surrounding forests destroyed by fire.  trate on the important issues facing the village.
 "I felt like it was vitally important that we get all these distractions out of the way so we could get on with the important business of trying to take care of our water and forest health problems and our infrastructure," he said. "That's what I ran on and that's what I'm going to stay with. I think that these distractions are damaging to all of us, not just Lanny. If I personally have a problem with one of our department heads, my management technique would be to go directly to them and not to try to undermine their authority by going through their employees."
 Councilor Frank Cummins said he was disappointed to

learn about the letter.
 "I disagree with the letter," Cummins said. "I thought we put all this behind us. We can't let personalities get involved. Just because you don't like someone doesn't mean you can't work with him."
 He also disagreed with any notion that the council "caved."
 "That had nothing to do with it," Cummins said. "I disagreed personally with the action the mayor took. I have lots of problems with it. We have so many important things like water to take care of, we can't have these distractions. These are the people we hire to run our village and they need to have some vote of confidence."
 Councilor Ron Anderson said, "It's his (Eggleston's) right to do

whatever he wants. It's a free country. Whether he gains support for doing that or not is in the eye of the beholder."
 Councilors Bob Sterchi, Ron Hardeman and Deborah Marcum-Byars could not be reached for comment.
 Under a new contract approved in August 2001, Underwood receives a flat fee of \$90,000 for 900 hours of legal services per year. Special projects are charged at \$120 per hour. Last year under a previous contract, Underwood received \$72,692 for basic legal work and \$37,557 for special projects.
 Underwood explained Tuesday that any time a lawsuit is filed in district court, it automatically comes under the special projects category.

Residents in the 100 block of Virginia Canyon Road were cited for animal nuisance at 1:25 a.m. May 14 after a police officer listened for 25 minutes to barking coming from inside the house, with the windows open. The officer knocked on the door and heard the sounds of people inside, but nobody answered the door. Dispatch had received a complaint about barking dogs at this residence two weeks earlier. The complaint charges that "It shall be unlawful for any owner or keeper of an animal to allow his animal to make excessive noise and thereby disturb the peace of others."

Drug possession

Police arrested Wesley L. Billips, 24, of Ruidoso May 8 at 112 Alonzo Way, charging him with possession of a controlled substance with intent to distribute, possession of drug paraphernalia, careless driving, not giving notice of accidents and

driving on a suspended or revoked license.

An employee of Sonic reported the license plate number of a vehicle that had turned into the parking lot at a high rate of speed and allegedly run into a wall on the east side of the parking lot, causing at least \$1,000 of damage. After checking the owner of the license plate, police went to the residence on Alonzo Way, the report states, and found Billips, who had borrowed the vehicle, in the bathroom. During the interrogation, the suspect removed drug paraphernalia and what appeared to be methamphetamines from his pocket. The report states that fresh damage on the vehicle was consistent with striking a wall.

Ring taken

A diamond ring valued at \$2,900 was reported missing from a locked drawer in the office of Napa Auto Parts, 133 E. Highway 70, Feb. 9. The owner of the ring found a diamond loose and had put the ring in a locked drawer and discovered it missing a few days later. Ruidoso police are investigating the case of a 12-inch-diameter telephone pole found sticking out of the windshield of a vehicle between 10 p.m. and midnight May 11. The pole had gone through the windshield about 3 feet and stopped just past the arm rest, the report states.

Ruidoso girls second, boys fourth at Class 3A meet

Loya, Darley individual state champions

ALBUQUERQUE — The final standings may not have been close for either the Ruidoso boys or girls teams at this year's Class 3A state track meet, but they did have a number of individual feats to celebrate.

Starting with Rachel Loya's state title in the girls javelin, and continuing with a first-place finish by Phillip Darley in the boys long jump, the Warrior track teams finished the 2002 track season in fine fashion.

Loya's throw of 112 feet, four inches stands as her best throw in the javelin this year,

and her win in the event was somewhat surprising. Many thought she'd be challenged by teammate Katie Coronado for the top spot.

Actually, many thought Coronado — who had thrown as far as 135 feet this year — would easily walk away with the title and a state record in the event. But youth and inexperience got the better of her — she's only a freshman — as she finished fourth with a throw of 105-9.

"I was hoping for second, and I figured it would be down to me and that Lovington girl," Loya said of Samantha Bridgforth, a girl who had defeated Loya at last year's meet. "I didn't want her to beat me this year. It was just about not being nervous and doing it right."

The 10 points Ruidoso got from that event weren't the 12 they had hoped for in a 1-2 finish. But both Loya, a junior, and Coronado will likely be back next year with something to prove.

As a team, the Lady Warriors finished well behind first-place Grants — a full 31 points back. But their 63 points were good enough for a second-place overall trophy.

In addition to her win in the javelin, Loya also took third in the shot put with a

throw of 33-3. She finished behind teammate Tamara Grant, who finished second in the shot with a throw of 34 feet. Grant added another five points with a second-

place finish in the discus with a throw of 115 feet. Grant and Loya were the two high-point performers for

Who cares? We enjoyed ourselves. And I doubt any other teams skipped their shots across the pond.

Darley's height of 14 feet in the pole vault was without a doubt a highlight of the Warriors' weekend in Albuquerque.

Combined with his sixth-place finish in the long jump, Darley had the most individual points for Ruidoso. Cody Small and Chance Hooper combined for a second and fourth-place finish in the high jump.

Running events were crucial, as Ruidoso was unable to make much headway in those areas.

Because of this, the Warriors finished a distant fourth behind Grants, Lovington and Cobre.

Josue Linares did take fifth in the 100-meter dash, while Tyler Line and Nick Fajardo finished fifth and sixth in the 200-meter dash. Fajardo also finished fourth in the 400-meter dash.

In relay action, the Warriors' 4x100 and 4x200 relay teams finished third and second, respectively. That marked the end of the points for Ruidoso.

Hubbard announces future cap in Ruidoso Futurity

Continuing its commitment to the three-year-old racing program, Ruidoso Downs Race Track & Casino Chairman R.D. Hubbard has announced that beginning in 2003 the Ruidoso Futurity will be capped just as the Rainbow and All American Futurities are now to help enhance the Derby.

Ruidoso Downs Race Track & Casino announced over a year ago that both the Rainbow and All American Futurities would be capped and the result will likely be the two richest derbies in the country in 2003. "It appears the All American Derby will be valued at more than \$600,000 in 2003," Hubbard said, "and the Rainbow Derby will likely be around \$300,000. As these figures demonstrate, our commitment to 3-year-old racing is working so well that we are announcing a similar cap to the Ruidoso Futurity beginning in 2003."

Enhanced by the \$4 million Ruidoso Triple Crown Bonus, the Ruidoso, Rainbow and All American Futurities all experienced significant increases in nominations.

Nominations Secretary Vickie McCabe confirms that the All American and Rainbow Derbies are estimated to be the two richest derbies in the country.

"If current trends hold on the 2002 All American Futurity, a

little over \$500,000 will carry over to the 2003 All American Derby," McCabe said. "Combined with additional derby payments and added money, I would estimate the 2003 All American Derby will be worth about \$630,000."

According to the American Quarter Horse Association, the richest derbies in the country in 2001 were the Los Alamitos Winter Derby at \$260,000, the Texas Classic Derby at \$255,000 and the Los Alamitos Derby at \$250,000. The All American will far exceed that and projections are for the Rainbow Derby to as well.

"Again, if current trends for the 2002 Rainbow Futurity hold, a total of \$145,000 would carry over to the 2003 Rainbow

Derby," McCabe said. "Combined with additional derby payments and added money, I would estimate the 2003 Rainbow Derby would approach \$300,000 in value."

With the success of the All American and Rainbow programs enhancing the 3-year-old program, Ruidoso Downs Race Track & Casino will put a similar program into place for the 2003 and 2004 Ruidoso Futurity and Derby. Using nominations for the 2002 Ruidoso Futurity as a model, the Ruidoso Derby in 2004 would be valued at approximately \$175,000.

Catfish season is upon us

The most frequently asked question for the past month at the Game and Fish office in Roswell has been, "When are the 'big catfish' going to be stocked?" Those folks that enjoy catching catfish don't have long to wait. The stocking trucks loaded with catfish are scheduled to arrive in the next two weeks.

For the past six years, the Department of Game and Fish has stocked big catfish and it has been a very successful program. The state has no warm-water hatcheries, so the catfish being stocked must be purchased from private sources.

The fish will be an average of 14 to 16 inches in length and weigh about 1 1/4 pounds, with some being much larger. Also, anglers shouldn't be surprised by catching a pure white catfish. Some of the catfish raised in hatcheries are albino and will be white, but these fish are perfectly healthy.

Lakes involved in the catfish stocking program in the southeastern part of the state include Lake Van at Dexter, Green Meadow Lake at Hobbs, Eunice Lake, Jal Lake, Bataan Lake at Carlsbad, Bosque Redondo at Fort Sumner, Carrizozo Lake, Chaparral Lake at Lovington, Oasis Lake at Portales and green Acres at Clovis.

These lakes are stocked with catchable-size rainbow trout in the winter months and provide lots of fishing pleasure, but when the water

warms up in the summer, no trout can be stocked. The catfish-stocking program allows anglers to have summer fishing opportunities at these waters.

These lakes were also chosen because all tend to be shallow and broad with limited water sources. They constantly recycle nutrients and are potentially productive for fish, however they really aren't adequate for reproduction. That's why a stocking program makes sense at these small lakes and also why the department is not stocking large catfish in waters that are capable of producing big catfish without help.

Catchable-size catfish will be stocked three times each summer. Plans call for shipments the third week of May, June and July. If the water quality is not good enough in July, this stocking will be made the third week of August.

In 2002, the Department of Game and Fish will stock about 27,000 catchable-size catfish and spend over \$40,000 on this program. That turns out to be almost \$1.50 per fish.

In order to make the fish available to more anglers, the State Game Commission tightened bag limits on big catfish waters. The daily bag limit is two catfish and the possession limit is four in all waters stocked with catchable-size catfish.

This effort is aimed at providing added fishing opportunity in the state of New Mexico. Those anglers that live in urban areas can make a short drive to a fishing area instead of having to pack up and travel to one of the larger lakes.
