

## Budget cut may hurt arts

■ The village council will discuss a proposed 80 percent slash for the Arts Commission Tuesday.

A proposed budget cut by the Ruidoso Village Council would reduce Arts Commission funding by 80 percent and, according to commission members, cancel many projects planned for the future.

The council is scheduled to vote on the amendment to the proposed budget at its meeting Tuesday, May 28, and members of the Arts Commission and the public will be allowed to speak on the issue.

The proposal would reduce the arts budget from \$21,600 to \$4,000, thereby wiping out this summer's Great Bear Hunt and several other projects.

During the budget hearings, village councilor Deborah Marcum Byars suggested that the Arts Commission budget revert to its funding level of three years ago.

"We're having a really, really tough time of meeting the needs of basic services, the cost of everything has escalated," Marcum Byars said. "When we looked at that budget, department heads came in and just slashed their budgets."

Marcum Byars said forest health and water are the critical needs, that there aren't enough code enforcers to enforce the conservation measures. One code enforcement position was cut, she said.

The commission has applied for and received grants from New Mexico Arts, and the village funded the position of an arts coordinator, Mary Lea Lane. Now, Lane's contract has been cut to \$4,000.

"With this cut, it would be the end of the Arts Commission as we know it," said Ed Spurr, Arts Commission president. "Most of the programs which we

## Fort Stanton event to honor veterans

Celebrating Memorial Day at Fort Stanton cemetery brings home not only the gravity of the event, but a sense of what those who died were fighting to preserve in America, said Larry Holt, an Army veteran who helps organize the annual event.

Visitors who wander through the New Mexico Merchant Marine and Military Memorial Cemetery on a rolling plain, overlooking the Capitan Mountains before and after the service at 11 a.m. Saturday, will note graves dating back to 1899. More than 1,650 people are buried on the 13.5 acre site.

"About 14 years ago Victor and Jean Schaefer started the initial clean up of the cemetery and through the efforts of volunteers and local merchants, we've been able to bring the cemetery to a condition that pays honor to the veterans," Holt said. "We look forward to the state Veterans Commission Service making improvements in the cemetery to continue that tradition."

The service will start with a call to order by Holt, followed by the presentation of colors by members of the Marine Corps League of Alamogordo, American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Dr. James H. Smith of First Christian Church in Ruidoso will offer the invocation, Katie Armstrong will sing the national anthem and Michael C. D'Arco, state director of veterans affairs, will welcome visitors.

Sye Feldman, RAF, will play "Amazing Grace," on the bagpipes. Col. Mike Neill, USAF, will give a thank-you for dedication, followed by the Mariner's Farewell by Pat Brinkley, Bob Ashman and Hyman Otkofsky, all of the Merchant Marines.

Members of the Daughters of the American Revolution will lay the memorial wreath. Feldman will play "When the Battle is Over," and Holt will recognize people attending and supporting the cemetery preservation and operation effort.

The American Legion and VFW will give a 21-gun salute to departing veterans. Dick Mound, U.S. Army, will play "Taps," and Smith will give the benediction.

Administration and planning for the cemetery have been under the supervision of the New Mexico Veteran's Service Commission since 2000. D'Arco secured preliminary acceptance of a proposal to expand the cemetery to 27 acres with the addition of an office, committal shelter and the necessary equipment to care for the cemetery. The improvements would be financed by a proposed \$2.5 million grant from the U.S. Department of Veterans affairs.

Holt recommends that people bring folding chairs to the Memorial Day ceremony. The cemetery is located at the 13 mile marker on State Road 220 between State Highway 48 and U.S.

## Downs cop top marksman; force seeing better numbers

The Ruidoso Downs police boast a top shooter among their ranks. Officer Shawn Sanderson graduated the state police academy first in marksmanship out of a class of 50.

Police Chief Butch Anderson awarded Sanderson a desk set donated by Mayor Bob Miller at the April 22 village council meeting. The plaque is inscribed with his name and new moniker, "Top Gun."

At the same meeting, the village approved his promotion to certified police officer, which includes a raise in pay from \$10.80 to \$11.33 per hour.

The village had hired Sanderson in August

2001 as part of an effort to strengthen the force.

The authorized size of the department is 10 certified officers, including the police chief, deputy chief and sergeant, but when Anderson started as chief in January of this year, he had only four working officers.

The village hired Jeremiah Pillow as an uncertified police officer at its last meeting. Eight people had applied for the position he won.

Anderson expects to hire another officer later this month.

"We're up to strength now," he said. The force will send three officers for training and certification and should be fully up to speed in about a year and a half, Anderson said.

Uncertified officers have one year from their date of hire to become certified by attending the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy and passing the police officer proficiency test. The

program takes 22 weeks to complete.

A recent pay rate increase could be making the job more attractive, says John Waters, village administrator. The new step system allows for a raise upon certification and subsequent raises once a year, instead of the former system of a certification increase and cost of living raises.

Anderson said that system could help with employee retention.

"The longer you're here, the more money you make," he said.

Waters said the village has received employment inquiries from officers in other local precincts.

Some of the interest may be due to improved operations under Anderson's reign, he said.

"I've got a good bunch of young troops. They're eager. They work," Anderson said. "We've got (11) new DWIs this month already. All in all, it's a good department."

Veterans' military honor details at burial are being provided without charge by the U.S. Department of Defense to all honorably discharged veterans at this cemetery or any other cemetery of their choice, Holt said. A minimum of two members of the uniformed armed forces, at least one from the same military service as the deceased, will serve on the honor detail.

Defense department officials encourage local veteran service organizations to serve in the honor details, he said. No distinction is made between officer and enlisted, retired and non-retired. All honorably dis-

charged veterans are entitled to the honor detail if requested by the family.

Holt said the Capitan and Ruidoso American Legion posts and VFW groups have a funeral honor detail available for ceremonies in this area and can furnish pall bearers on request. Details can be arranged through a funeral director or by contacting a local veterans' service organization.

Copies of the deceased service records should be provided or be on file.

For the burial of a veteran's spouse at a national or state veteran's cemetery, a copy of the veteran's DD-214 and their marriage license must be provided.



# You Know Your Way Out?

## Evacuation Routes



**Evacuation Routes**

National Weather Service and local weather and all-hazard alerts are provided through the radio service broadcast on the 1580 AM frequency and requires a tone alarm that automatically activates to alert you of hazardous conditions.

The Village of Ruidoso is equipped with an interactive notification system called "The Communicator". This system is activated at the Ruidoso Police Department notifying you via telephone advising of an emergency in the area. If an evacuation is necessary in any part of the village, the Communicator will notify you of each event. If you do not receive a phone call from the Communicator, please listen to the local radio stations listed below. If you receive a phone call advising you to evacuate, if time permits carry advise the neighbors on each side of you, as they might not be equipped with a radio, phone, or may be hearing impaired.

If you have an immediate life threatening situation or emergency, dial 911.

Law Enforcement or other emergency personnel will announce evacuation by sounding sirens and will give information over public address loud speakers, as well as door-to-door contact. The Village of Ruidoso will activate seven emergency alert sirens to notify you in the case

of evacuation in necessary in the area. This is to you via phone call at 1580 AM on 7/15/97 AM 1580 AM or 10/15/97 AM 10/15/97 AM AT KRUI.

### WHAT IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY?

- WHAT DO I NEED TO DO?**
- Most importantly: **REMAIN CALM.**
  - Follow closely the evacuation instructions given in the evacuation alert and by emergency personnel.
  - Close heavy drapes and blinds.
  - Lock doors and windows.
  - You may be instructed to tie a white towel or large white cloth to the front door knob to advise rescuers that your residence has been evacuated.
  - Turn off gas/propane service, if you know how.
  - DO NOT turn off electrical service. Electricity may aid emergency crews providing lighting and power for fire fighting efforts.
  - Be sure to check your homeowners/renters insurance policy for fire loss information and any special clauses related to disasters.

**NO ONE WILL BE ALLOWED TO RE-ENTER THE EVACUATION AREA UNTIL IT IS SAFE TO DO SO.**

**WHAT TO TAKE**  
Important papers and valuables  
Driver's license/ID cards

Medications  
Prescription glasses and dentures  
Personal toilet articles and sanitary needs  
Sleeping bag or blankets  
Coats  
Special dietary needs  
Baby food, diapers, etc.  
Checkbook, credit cards, cash

**FOOD AND SHELTER**

In the event of a disaster, evacuees will decide where they will go. You may stay with family or friends, in a hotel/motel, or in a Red Cross Shelter. Meals for those in shelters will be provided.

The safest evacuation routes will be identified by the appropriate agencies and will be made public during the evacuation warnings and alerts.

Evacuation routes cannot be pre-established. The location of the hazard, the behavior of the problem, and conditions such as wind direction will determine safe travel routes. Pay close attention to the evacuation signs and/or personnel assigned to direct traffic. Stay on designated evacuation routes.

**TRANSPORTATION**

Residents will be expected to use personal vehicles. Pre-planning should be made with family and neighbors to transport individuals with special needs, children, pets, livestock, or those without a means of transportation. Persons with special needs, such as a medical condition that prevent normal transportation should make prior arrangements with family, friends or with your local emergency services. When school is in session, transportation of school children will be conducted by local school districts.

### PLAN FOR SEPARATED FAMILY MEMBERS

- Every family should establish plans for times when families may be separated. Include the following:
- Establish a relative or friend as an emergency contact where all family members can call or exchange information.
  - Determine who will transport family members unable to drive, or if no vehicle is available.
  - Meet school children at designated registration/reception center.

### WHAT ABOUT THE SECURITY OF MY HOME?

Law enforcement personnel will provide security for evacuated areas. The nature of the emergency and the safety of personnel will determine where perimeters will be established.

### WHAT ABOUT PETS AND LIVESTOCK

- Planning for care of pets and livestock should be included with the family evacuation plans. An animal's best protection is to be with the owner, however, this will not always be possible.
- Locate a safe place for your pets before disaster strikes.
  - Ask friends or family to provide pet care.
  - Check availability of boarding facilities to shelter pets during emergencies.
- Pets are not allowed inside shelter buildings except for service animals.

# Burpo intends to be involved

CARLSBAD — Tanned and relaxed, Rob Burpo sits in his patio chair at the riverfront home of friends in Carlsbad. A smile spreads across his face as he stands to greet new friends and supporters.

Handshaking, fund-raising and garnering support for his bid for the governor's mansion in Santa Fe has been a way of life for more months than he cares to remember.

Although considered to be a relative newcomer to the political arena, Burpo said he had exposure to the political process as a young man living in Phoenix in 1964. However, he said back then he had no desire to go into politics.

"I campaigned for Barry Goldwater in 1964 when I was a member of the Young Republicans," Burpo said. "In 1997, when I was asked to serve on the Republican Party platform (committee), I felt comfortable doing that."

With a grin, Burpo said he might have done too good a job during his stint with the Republican Party. He said that in 1998, when a state representative in Albuquerque announced he was retiring, a group of people approached him to run for the seat.

"I ran for the House seat not because I had a deep-seated interest in politics, but because, as an entrepreneur in the field of finance and investment, I saw firsthand what is needed to move this state's economy," Burpo said. "We need to reduce our high tax burden and to develop can-do teamwork to stimulate more business in New Mexico."

Burpo said the importance of a strong work ethic, integrity and being a team player were instilled into him by his parents, whom he greatly admires. "My dad is my hero," he said.


In the 1940s, Burpo's father, George, pitched for the Cincinnati Reds. After his career was over, he worked for

the next 40 years as a salesman. His mother, Nancy, was a homemaker and raised him to think about integrity in everything he did.

"My mom died last spring. But before she died, I made her one last promise — that I would always act with integrity while holding political office. That's (integrity) one thing I struggle with in politics. The way I look at it, all you have to sell to the public is your integrity. The way I see it, is if you don't live your life with integrity, it's not worth a plug nickel."

A 1967 graduate from Sandia High School and a 1971 gradu-

# Sanchez touts lower taxes

ALBUQUERQUE — If anyone believes in the American Dream, it has to be Republican John Sanchez, the former state representative from Albuquerque who is running for governor in the June 4 primary election.

Born into a family of eight children, raised by a single mother, he started a family roofing business at the age of 18, one that became successful enough to be named Small Business of the Year by Albuquerque's Hispano Chamber of Commerce.

He dipped his toes into the political pond in his mid-30s as a village board member in Los Ranchos, and made a large step to statewide promi-

nence in 2000 when he unseated longtime Democratic House Speaker Raymond Sanchez in an election that also saw the downfall of Senate President Pro Tem Manny Aragon.

And now he says he's ready to make a quantum leap as the state's next governor.

He has a drive, one he calls a "fire in the belly" to achieve and a willingness to take the risks that can bring success.

"I've been working since I was 5 or 6 years old," he said. "Whatever it is that makes you a good kid is what makes you a decent adult."


He credits his mother with instilling that drive, and his father for teaching him at an early age to do it right the first time.

"My mother would not

allow her children to fail," he said. "She demanded high standards from us, in school, in our manners, the way we treated people."

Sanchez is proud to have come up from what he calls





## Excitement, thy name is horse racing

The 55th racing season in the Downs begins today

The excitement of the Preakness last weekend, which made possible a Thoroughbred Triple Crown winner for the first time in years, was an appropriate prologue for an exciting season at Ruidoso Downs Race Track and Casino.

A black horse named War Emblem is in a position to make history in a little over two weeks at the Belmont.

But many owners and trainers of the world's finest quarter horses begin today to make history of their own as they saddle up for a new race meet, one which offers bigger purses than ever and a chance at a \$4 million bonus ... if they can just pull off something that has

happened only once before — a Quarter Horse Triple Crown. A horse named Special Effort did that in 1981.

AQHA Trainer of the Year John Bassett would like a shot at it, but knows that many other trainers will be out to beat his horses. Making it even tougher is the fact that this Triple Crown is sought by 2-year-olds, matched up in the Ruidoso, Rainbow and All American races.

The 23 trial races today will set the stage for the Ruidoso futurity on June 9, and a win then is an absolute must for any horse hankering for a Triple Crown in 2002.

## A place worth preserving

Graceful old Fort Stanton probably never in its 147-year history has been seen by so many people in so short a time.

At least 2,200 visitors strolled the great green parade ground under a brilliant spring sky last Sunday.

They watched history re-enactors perform, listened to music and lectures and read new informational signs placed before handsome, if sadly deteriorated, old buildings. The hungry ones devoured all the food available, and asked for more.

Visiting motorcyclists who found their way into this corner of Lincoln County from a Ruidoso rally seemed to walk a bit more softly as they absorbed the scenes and sunshine — and somehow their leathers and tall boots and and bearded faces fit right into the scene...

On this once-dusty, now-grassy quadrangle, frontier scout and soldier Kit Carson had barked cavalry commands in 1862.

Some of the toughest soldiers in the West served here as they proved their worth, black though they were, against the toughest Indian warriors anywhere — the Apache. And the Apache gave them a name of honor, "buffalo soldiers."

A young Lt. John J. Pershing served here long before he became "Black Jack," chased Poncho Villa and commanded the American Expeditionary Force in France during World War I.

Here, last Sunday, people from far and near — many for the first time — realized what Fort Stanton *aficionados* had known for a very long time: This shell of a once-proud military fort, World War II internment camp, and hospital for merchant mariners and some of the state's own people deserves to be preserved.

No person whose sense of the past reaches farther back than his own birthday — whether from reading history or historical fiction or watching John Wayne Westerns — can fail to hear the distant bugle calls of another time as he stands in the shade of an adobe building already old in his grandfather's time.

Here on the gentle slope between a high grassy mesa and the Rio Bonito was erected something more than a fort; here was created a vibrant, changing community of men and women who lived lives of danger, of caring and hope. These massive buildings for much more than a century housed fighters and firemen, doctors and nurses, tubercular merchant seamen, German seamen held against their will, the mentally impaired...and today they house youth whose troubles are almost behind them.

Here, on the front edge of a new millennium, is a still-living community that deserves much more from us than a passing glance on a Sunday afternoon, and a closed purse.

have just got under way, and which are starting to take off wonderfully, will have to be canceled."

Marcum-Byars pointed out that the Parks and Recreation Department director "slashed his budget grotesquely trying to make it fit within the budget ... I hope people understand that we have absolutely critical demands on forest health and water. If our forest burns up or we were to run out of water, we would have no economy and would have no need of an arts commission."

The budget for Parks and Recreation was reduced by 6 percent in the proposed budget, from \$555,562 to \$524,076. Arts Commission secretary Sam Swearengin said much of this is used to subsidize adult

sports, and that another \$100,000 is budgeted for the Senior Center.

"For the people that don't play sports, they budgeted \$4,000," Swearengin said. "I say the budget has plenty of money in it for those type of events, but it doesn't have hardly anything for those people who don't play sports."

The Arts Commission installed three sculptures on Sudderth Drive last weekend, has coordinated the Arts in Public Places Program and expanded it to include the public library, senior center and Village Hall, scheduled concerts in the park, the StreetPlayers Festival in Midtown, gallery walks (First-Friday Art After Hours) and the two-day Festival of Music as part of the Festival of

Lights. Swearengin, along with Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director Patric Pearson and businessman Jules Videau, drafted an estimate of revenues and tax receipts from "cultural tourism" events created by the Arts Commission and came up with a total of \$158,658. Spurr said the figures are fairly accurate, using nationally known formulas.

Lane said The Great Bear Hunt, planned for 2003, along the lines of the Painted Ponies, is jeopardized by the proposed

budget cut, and sponsors and artists have been lining up for that project, which according to the estimates would bring in about 8,000 visitors a day.

The previous \$21,604 level of funding for the arts comprises 0.007 percent of the total village budget.

"They don't realize that cutting this budget would wipe out the arts commission ... Such a

small investment for such a huge return," said Mary Maxson.

The Village Council in 2000 gave the Arts Commission the mission "to encourage quality economic development that is appropriate to our community, to encourage diversification of the tourism industry, to recognize and promote the cultural diversity of our area and to fos-

ter community pride." Future funding from New Mexico Arts is also jeopardized by this proposed budget cut, Spurr said. New Mexico Arts will "look at it very askance in that our program will be so small," he added.

Swearengin said gross receipts are up 14 percent or about \$75,000, and he can't see a budget problem.



### NAR moves on D.C.

WASHINGTON - In town to lobby Congress on a number of real estate issues, Realtors last weekend voted to build a new building three blocks from the U.S. Capitol to house the Washington operations of the Chicago-based association.

Directors of the National Association of Realtors approved \$15 million for a downpayment on the new building to be located at 500 New Jersey Avenue, NW.

Total cost of the project, including land acquisition and construction, will not exceed \$45 million, NAR reported.

## Postage rates go up June 30

The price of a first-class postage stamp will go up to 37 cents on June 30, as part of an overall rate increase of 7.7 percent by the U. S. Postal Service. A three-cent "make-up rate" stamp will be available in mid-June.

Consumers will see other changes in postage and services, the USPS said in a news release.

While postage for the first ounce of a first-class letter rises to 37 cents, the cost of the second ounce remains the same at 23 cents. Customers who mail first-class mail parcels will now be able to buy delivery confirmation or signature confirmation. Post cards will cost 23 cents.

Priority mail will have a new one-pound flat rate at \$3.85. Postage for heavier pieces will vary by zone. An 8-ounce flat rate express mail letter will be \$13.65.

Post office box fee changes will vary depending on the location of the office. Certified mail will cost \$2.30 and will include Internet access to delivery confirmation. The charge for a return receipt will be \$1.75. COD fees will not change.

"The rate change came through a settlement between the Postal Service and the mailing industry which allowed the Postal Rate Commission to expedite the case and the new rates to be implemented earlier than they normally would have," said Robert F. Rider, chairman of the Postal Service's Board of Governors.

## 'Balance' led to closing forest

In deciding whether to close the Lincoln County National Forest this week, officials balanced the possible cost to local businesses against the threat to homes and lives posed by forest fire. The threat weighed heavier, and the effect of the closure remains to be seen.

"We don't do it unless it's absolutely necessary," said Gerald M. Hawkes, district ranger for the Smokey Bear Ranger District. "We try to consider the needs of the people."

The majority of local officials and residents supported the closure, he said.

Protecting the forest and community remains a priority, said Tom Stewart, Lincoln County manager.

"It's just that we have the forest, and you like to let people

use it, but it kind of runs against the grain to close it down," Stewart said. "Forest closure, any type of closure, is not good for business."

Smokey Bear Ranger District employees are trying to support businesses, Hawkes said, by such things as offering permits to gold panning and horseback riding businesses that can continue to operate safely in the forest.

Some businesses, like timber harvesting, still are not permitted because of the fire risk.

As for tourism, visitors will still come to town, said Karen McGeoghegan, executive assistant at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, but will enjoy shops, museums, galleries, golfing, casinos, the Billy the Kid Scenic Byway and the racetrack, as alternatives to forest-related activities.

Tourists come here to escape the heat, and they can do that without entering the forest, said Steve Olson, owner of Black Bear Lodge.

The forest closure has not affected his business, he said, noting that the number of guests booking rooms this month is the same as last year. "Some places are doing exceptionally well, some not," said Olson, who is also vice president of the Lincoln County Lodgers Association.

Officials look ahead to when the restriction can be lifted.

"Hopefully it won't last very long, and we'll get some rain," Stewart said. "We need rain bad."

To reopen the forest, officials will need to see about two inches of sustained rain, with a forecast for more, Hawkes said.

## The Economy and the Markets

### Now in the Fed's zone?

The stronger than expected jump in the CPI and a weakening dollar have reinforced some market views that the Federal Reserve will have to respond to an inflationary threat sooner than expected. Most likely, the new data will not change the timing of the Federal Reserve's actions, but it will impact the strength of the Fed's actions later in the year.

The 0.5 percent increase (month over month) in the CPI was certainly higher than expected, but most of the increase came from volatile energy costs and one-time sales tax adjustments. The bulk of consumer spending is better tracked by core inflation (excluding food and energy) which remains highly stable in the 2.5 percent range. More importantly, a weaker dollar will be inflationary as it makes imported goods more expensive.

Higher prices on imports often give domestic producers more pricing power as they are able to piggyback on higher import prices. Eventually, the impact on U.S. exporters will reinforce this inflationary effect. Exporters have been struggling for years with an extremely strong dollar, which magnified the slump in manufacturing. A weaker dollar will help manufacturing revive exports and contribute to tightening labor markets and wage gains in the future. These consequences will certainly impact the Fed's policy, but their impact will happen in stages. The impact on import costs will be first, and the boost to manufacturing exports will not be seen for at least six months or further out.

### Bonds: Increased Attention

The current yield curve is incredibly steep in historical terms. Measuring the slope of the Treasury yield curve as a ratio of 10-year bond yields to 3-month bill yields, the current curve is the steepest in the last 20 years. Does this mean the yield curve will soon collapse? We expect short-term rates to climb faster than long-term rates. However, following the lead of the last recession in 1991, the yield curve continued to grow steeper for over 20

months before peaking in November of 1992. In the current recession, the Federal Reserve took explosive action compared to the previous recession. This makes it unlikely that the last recession serves as a good model to predict the yield curve following this recession. More likely, the Fed will need to take quicker and more aggressive action raising rates this time, which will collapse the yield curve faster.

The Federal Reserve is approximately 115 basis points below its normal target rate. This decision is, in part, generating the unusually steep yield curve. The gap between the actual Fed Funds (FDTR) from its standard policy FDTR can be calculated using Taylor's rule, which sets the FDTR based on three parts — a real return, inflation and economic growth. The Fed never gives explicit goals for the inflation and economic growth component of this relationship, but historically it is possible to estimate them to a fairly good degree. The current situation will reward investors who position themselves to take advantage of the Fed's actions to get back to a neutral position with regard to their normal FDTR policy.

### Stocks: Individuals bullish

Many reports have emphasized the bearish outlook of investors. However, one measure of individual investor sentiment from the American Association of Individual Investors contradicts that assessment.

Although the week-to-week numbers can be quite volatile, a more stable eight-week moving average still shows above-average confidence. This combined with the high level of liquidity could continue to give the market a strong base from which to work. This level of bullishness might start to erode if corporate earnings fail to recover or too many companies need to restate previous earnings. This individual investor support will need to be monitored to help predict the market's future.

## Rotary International awarded 'Gates Award for Global Health'

Sam Swearingin, Ruidoso Rotary Club president, told members Tuesday that Rotary International has been awarded \$1 million by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, as recipient of the 2002 Gates Award for Global Health.

The award recognizes Rotary's leadership and impact in the field of public health, most notably the organization's top priority of eradicating polio by 2005. Rotary has contributed more than \$462 million toward polio eradication, and more than 1 million Rotary members

have volunteered their time and personal resources to help immunize more than 2 billion children in 122 countries.

Ruidoso Rotarians have contributed to the worldwide polio-eradication program since it began, Swearingin noted.

In a news release from the Gates foundation, it was noted that the award not only recognizes Rotary's work to end polio, but also the mobilization of more than a million Rotary members to work in areas of health and sustainable development. Hundreds of ongoing community

service projects are improving the health and welfare of those in need throughout the world, Gates said.

Examples of Rotary programs include a revolving loan program for women in Uganda to break the link between AIDS and chronic poverty and water projects that provide clean water in El Salvador.

"The Rotary Foundation is truly deserving of recognition for its exemplary achievements in the field of global health," said Bill Gates Sr., co-chair and CEO of the foundation.

## Focus on Agriculture

### Farm Bill phobia and the press

Let's face it. Big city newspapers don't like the new farm bill. In front page stories and in editorial columns across the country they have blasted the economics of it and the Republicans and Democrats who supported it.

The farm bill is unpopular in newspapers in New York, Boston, Chicago and San Diego. One thing most of these newspapers have in common is that they no longer have a farm editor, someone who might put the farm economy and farm bill in better perspective.

Contrary to recent reports, this bill is not a throwback to programs of land set-asides and government grain storage. The spending over 10 years is not inconsistent with past farm spending when adjusted for inflation. This bill was not slapped together in time to win rural votes this election

year. In fact, it was at least two years in the making.

A New York Times editorial writer sniffed that the population of New York City is twice as large as America's farm population. He needs someone to remind him that the farm population feeds all those people in New York City and feeds them quite well and at low cost.

In the early 1980s, when American agriculture was going through a debt crisis and many farms went bankrupt, most of these same newspapers deplored what was happening to our rural communities.

They eagerly reported on farm sales and the tractor-cades organized to dramatize the farmers' plight.

The farm credit crunch may have straightened out, but otherwise things are not much better for American farmers today. Farm prices are historically low and farmers are beset with much more govern-

ment regulation than they were 20 years ago. The strong dollar is hurting export sales and trade protectionism is still a problem.

Ridgewater Community College in Wilmar, Minn., examined the financial condition of more than 500 farms in central Minnesota. Net farm income averaged \$37,582 in 2001. Expenses averaged \$72,645.

The Minneapolis Star Tribune carried a thoughtful article about this under the headline "The Bad Habit of Farming."

Farming is a bad habit for many of the families trying to make a living at it, and supporting their habit with off-farm jobs. There's no question about it. They'd be better off doing something a whole lot easier.

But because of them, we are the best-fed nation in the world and are doing the most to alleviate world hunger. Without farms, open space

and wildlife habitat would disappear along with the many jobs and businesses in farming communities. By not investing in farming, we would also be losing the opportunity to develop a domestic supply of renewable fuels at a time when energy security has become a priority.

One reason there has been so much criticism of this farm bill is the high expectations we had for the last one, the 1996 Freedom to Farm Act. The public was led to believe that farming would not need as much federal assistance in the future.

Expectations exceeded outcomes, as frequently happens with federal programs. This time it is likely to be the other way around. This farm bill probably will exceed the expectations of its critics.

Roofers, Sanchez said, had the lowest reputation of all the trades, of being sloppily dressed guys who showed up late, performing shoddy work. It's also a trade that is by its nature hard, hot labor — there's nothing romantic about mopping out melted tar in the blast furnace heat of a New Mexico summer.

"I wanted to be a leader, to raise standards in the industry," he said.

Leadership is a running theme in his conversation.

"There are very few leaders out there," he said. "People want to know they have confidence in their leaders, that they'll make a decision and stick with it — if I give my word on something people can take it to the bank."

That includes his vow to lower taxes in order to stimulate the economy and create jobs, a pledge he said he has already made with New Mexico voters.

"Increased taxes are job killers," he said. "And the state needs good, high-paying jobs."

He favors a steady reduction in business and individual taxes, and a phasing-out of gross receipts taxes on food and on physicians' services, a phenomenon that he said is "bleeding out" vital jobs to nearby states.

Lower the tax burdens on big and small businesses, he said, and the jobs will come.

Sanchez has found his excitement in being a businessman and believing in capitalism, in creating jobs so that others can provide for their families.

What energizes him, he said, is the "sheer human spirit" of the people of New Mexico.

"There are no achievements without chance," he said. "Those who are afraid to take risks will never succeed."

But he said he has also learned from his weaknesses and discovered that as a young man he didn't have all the answers.

"Arrogance can hurt a person in life or politics," he said. "I learned that you need to listen to people."

An avowedly private man, Sanchez demurred when asked his daughters' names, saying he feels very protective of them and their nonpublic lives, but added that his family time is the most important thing in his life, and that the experience of raising them has "helped soften and polish that sense of machismo."

He is also "somewhat private" about his faith, but said he regularly attends church services and is grateful to God. "I understand who allows me to do all this," he said.

His heroes are former President Ronald Reagan, for his fiscal policies and "stick to your guns" personality, Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., for his broad bipartisan appeal, and President George W. Bush, a man he considers a role model and personal friend.

"I see something of him in myself," he said, "because he faced some tough challenges and had to prove himself to the people of his state."

He enjoys reading the works of professional consultant Dick Morris and his high-

powered analyses of election strategies, but also has a fondness for children's books.

"I love to read to kids and I wind up enjoying the books as well."

Sanchez favors a "back to basics" approach to education and raising standards as a means of improving the state's low rankings nationwide.

"There's too much bureaucracy, and there needs to be 90 cents out of every dollar winding up in the classroom," he said.

He likes charter schools as a means of offering parents choices, but cautions that vouchers are not a "silver bullet."

When other Americans think about New Mexico, he said, there should be more that comes to mind than tourism and the glorious mingling of many cultures.

"I'd like people to think of New Mexico as a state on its way to leading the nation in providing good, high-paying jobs," he said. "We have the best people, the best weather and the best ideas, but we need good leadership to help reach our potential."

Sanchez was appointed to

fill a vacancy in the board of trustees for the Village of Los Ranchos, a small town in the North Valley, seven miles north of Albuquerque. He ran for re-election in 1998, serving about three years with the town's mayor-board form of government.

Current Los Ranchos Trustee Donald Lopez, who worked with Sanchez, said he expects the candidate to go far.

"John really understood the issues and he was well

spoken of in the community," he said. "Thanks to his help, we were able to head off a gross receipts tax increase."

Leo Bartolucci, a former village trustee, said Sanchez "really did his homework."

"He put in a lot of effort to make things work in the village," he said.

Sanchez had the ability to learn as went along, he said, becoming an effective trustee in the process.

In November 1999 Sanchez left the board to prepare to run against Raymond Sanchez, no relation, a 30-year incumbent Democratic state representative.

In a classic political battle over turf deemed crucial to both parties, John Sanchez carried District 15 by a mere 212 votes, a slim margin that was overshadowed only by the even-closer presidential race between Al Gore and George W. Bush.

"We had an 80 percent voter turnout in that election, and I'm proud of that," he said.

Raymond Sanchez had a lot to say about the man who defeated him in a tight race, but almost all of it was negative.

"He was ineffective as a trustee for Los Ranchos and ineffective for the 15th District," he said. "They tell me they called him 'Johnny Walker Sanchez' in the Roundhouse because he was always just walking around — and I've heard that other lawmakers characterized him as the best-dressed but least-effective legislator — I don't know that for a fact, but that's what I've heard."

At a child abuse prevention event in Farmington recently, John Sanchez spoke about the state's anti-child-pornography law that he helped pass last year.

"It's unfortunate that Ray Sanchez responded that way — but the truth is the first year that he and Manny Aragon were out of the Roundhouse I helped pass a bill that made possessing child pornography illegal — every year that they were in, the bill died," he said. "If that isn't being effective then I'd like to know what is."

# BURPO: Gubernatorial hopeful has different management ideas

ate of the University of New Mexico, Burpo said he learned his first lessons in business while working his way through school as a stockboy at Sears. After college, he joined Dean Witter in Albuquerque, where he worked his way up to the position of vice president. There, he developed government bonds and loans for everything from senior centers to youth activity facilities.

"I became one of New Mexico's most experienced government finance experts," he said.

By 1985, he started his own business, First American Asset Management, now First American Financial.

"I've been managing more than \$250 million in assets and helping finance businesses," he said. "In 16 years, not one business I've helped finance has defaulted on a loan. In fact, The New Mexico businesses I've helped finance have generated more than \$1 billion in sales revenue and economic growth. Because I deal with government finances, I would have a good handle on the state's finances if I am elected governor."

Calling himself a "fiscal conservative" and "pragmatic," Burpo said those qualities have helped him during his tenure in the House to get both sides of the aisle to put aside their politics and come up with solutions.

As governor, he said he believes he could work with the Legislature to make New Mexico an attractive place for businesses to relocate, as well as help businesses that are home-grown.

Burpo said he is proud of his record in the Legislature.

"I guess my proudest moment was when I wrote and co-sponsored the mental health parity bill, which basically gave insurance coverage to the mentally ill. We tried to get it passed in 1999, but the state didn't get it done. The next year I wrote that bill again and it passed unanimously. Typically, the mental health issue is thought to be a liberal issue, but in this instance, the Legislature didn't distinguish between conservative or liberal. I'm proud to have had a hand in that."

Another proud moment for Burpo came in 2001 when he managed to obtain an appropriation for a wing at the University of New Mexico's University Hospital to treat sexually abused children ages 2 to 12.

"The things these kids have gone through just make me ill," he said. "I asked for \$135,000 after I learned what they were doing for abused children in the Para Los Ninos wing of the hospital. To me, what's an extra \$100,000 if we can help these kids."

While there have been many personal highs during his legislative career, Burpo said there have been times when he

has agonized over issues.

"I think one of the most important decisions I had to make as a legislator was whether I should support or go against the governor's stance on drug legalization," he said. "I remember the morning the Legislature was to go into session, I got a call from the governor's office. I went to see the governor, and I was asked to sponsor the bill to legalize and decriminalize drugs. I made my decision then and there. I said I couldn't and wouldn't sponsor the bill."

"I had a few people upset at me, but I was not going to compromise my integrity," he added.

When asked what the most difficult thing he has had to do, Burpo's voice softened. "The day I had to deliver the eulogy at my mother's funeral. My dad wasn't up to it, and my mom had given so much to me. I knew it was the right thing to do. It was tough, but it was my way of giving something back to mom," Burpo said.

Karen and Ray Westall of Carlsbad met Burpo at the governor's inauguration in Santa Fe eight years ago.

"During the evening of the inauguration, the couple struck up a conversation with Burpo and his wife, Sharon. They found they had a lot in common with Burpo and his wife, and the two couples became close friends."

"We all go fishing in

Wyoming every year, and Rob and Sharon come to Carlsbad to visit us," Karen Westall said. "We have a lot of fun and Rob makes the best banana fosters you have ever eaten. He's an honest person who really loves New Mexico and wants what is best for the state."

So what would Burpo's governing style be? Such a question brought a thoughtful look to Burpo's face.

After a brief pause, he grinned and said, "Very active." He said he would be more involved with the Legislature and that he would be involved in economic development.

"Job growth in New Mexico is absolutely the number one key to economic growth in New Mexico," he said. "We should be cutting, not raising corporate taxes. As governor, I would rewrite our obsolete tax code and create jobs. If we do the first, the jobs will follow."

"We need to revamp the tax code so that rural New Mexico can grow and our children don't have to leave town to find jobs," he said. "Sharon and I have two children. Our son works with us, but our daughter graduated from college and is working in Austin, Texas. We are trying to find her a job in New Mexico. She is just one of many who have had to leave the state to find a job. If the tax code is revamped, new companies will come and new jobs will be created."

Burpo said that as governor, his management style would also differ from his predecessors.

He said that one idea he has mulled around is establishing a liaison office to coordinate all job creations in the state.

He also said as governor, he

won't be sitting in his office — he plans to get out among the people of the state.

"If someone from Rotary in Carlsbad, or anywhere else, wants me to come and speak to them, I will," he pledged. "I strongly believe that to be really informed about the state, you

have to get out there and see what's going on. You can't do that by sitting in an office."

## Another big season predicted at the Downs

Horse racing starts today at Ruidoso Downs with 23 trials for the Ruidoso Futurity. Post time is set at 10:30 a.m.

Slot machine business, exciting new races and a festival which highlighted New Mexico-bred horses, culture and cuisine enabled Ruidoso Downs to enjoy a wildly successful season last year.

By all indications, this year will be even better.

Beginning today at 10:30 a.m., a record number of horses running in 23 trials for this year's Ruidoso Futurity kick off the 55th racing season at Ruidoso Downs, and the projected earnings for winning horses continue to go up, according to track president Bruce Rimbo.

"We have so many trials this year, probably because the business is doing so well," Rimbo said. "There's a lot of other factors, of course, but certainly the amount of money is a big draw."

The biggest draw is the \$4 million bonus to the horse that can win the Quarter Horse Triple Crown, a feat only accomplished once, by Special Effort in 1981.

The Triple Crown consists of the Ruidoso and Rainbow futurities and ends with the All American Futurity, which this year is projected to be at \$2.5 million.

The futurity races have always done well, but the derbies — featuring the best 3-year-olds, many of which were in the previous year's futurities — are bringing in some big numbers as well.

Most of that can be attributed to caps placed on the Rainbow and All American futurities. The cap insures any money

over a set purse amount on those races will roll over into next year's derbies.

The strategy has paid off, as the Rainbow and All American derbies will likely reach a combined \$900,000 next year — possibly becoming the two richest derbies in the country. This year will mark

the first year the Ruidoso Futurity will be capped in a similar manner.

"That's my luck," said trainer John Bassett, who won last year's All American Futurity with Ausual Suspect and is coming off a season in which he was named the American Quarter Horse Association

Trainer of the year. "All my best 3-year-olds are this year."

**Reaping the Rewards**

Bassett's success — and the overall

## Youth baseball highlights weekend

Starting today, 85 teams in seven different divisions will begin a four-day celebration of our nation's pastime when the 3rd Annual USSSA Baseball Classic kicks off.

The tournament has grown since it's first year, as teams from all across New Mexico and west Texas will compete in divisions for kids ages 8-16 at the high school, Little League, Eagle Creek Sports Complex and Ruidoso Downs fields.

In all divisions, teams will be organized into pool-play, with the tournaments seeded according to those games' results.

For all the divisions and players involved, there will only be two local teams. The Ruidoso Eagles will compete in the 12U division, while the Ruidoso Warriors take part in the 13U tournament.

The Eagles will play at Ruidoso Downs and are scheduled to play the Las Cruces Bats Friday at 5:30 p.m. and West Texas Heat Saturday at 10:30 p.m. When the division tournament begins Sunday at 7:30 a.m., games will move to Field C at the Eagle Creek Sports Complex.

Other teams to play in the 12U division are from the Texas cities of El Paso, Andrews, Midland and Lubbock, while New Mexico teams from Farmington, Roswell and Santa Fe will also take part.

In the 13U division, the Ruidoso Warriors take on the Las Cruces Tigers Friday at 5 p.m. and

take on the Texas Blue Jays Saturday at 3:50 p.m. All games are scheduled for Eagle Creek Complex, Field B.

Other teams in the 13U division are from El Paso, Pecos, Lubbock, Albuquerque, Hobbs and Portales.

Amarillo, El Paso and Lubbock will field teams for the 8U tournament, with games scheduled Saturday and Sunday, with the championship game on Monday. All games will be played at the Little League field located on White Mountain Drive next to the fire station.

In the 10U division at the Little League field on Gavilan Canyon Road, 16 teams from Las Cruces, Farmington, Albuquerque, Roswell, El Paso, Amarillo, Odessa, Andrews and Midland will play, with the first game to start Friday at 5 p.m.

Starting Friday on Field C at the Eagle Creek Complex, Las Cruces, El Paso, Hobbs, Kermit, Amarillo and Midland will field teams in the 11U division. Games will move to Ruidoso Downs Sunday and Monday.

Field A at the Eagle Creek Complex will host the 14U division, starting at 5 p.m. Friday and featuring teams from El Paso, Lubbock, Sunnyvale, San Angelo, Midland, Las Cruces and Farmington.

Rounding out the divisions will be the 16U competition on the high school field at the White Mountain Sports Complex. Teams from Midland, El Paso and the Roswell area will play Saturday through Monday, with competition starting Friday at 7:30 a.m.

Still, I'm excited about the

upcoming season. Money is promising to flow through the track like an uninterrupted river of fiscal success, and the high stakes could mean some even higher attendance figures.

This means I could have a front-row seat to one of the most exciting racing seasons on record, and I'm ready to learn all I can about this sport.

So far, it's been smooth sailing. I've met only a handful of the trainers currently holding court at the Downs, but all have been open, congenial and patient with an earnest — if somewhat ignorant — sports writer.

Those in charge of the track itself have been a big help, as well. Neal Mullarky and Kristen Lovelace — my two

The Ruidoso News is an excellent source for what's happening at the track. This may be your first day at a horse race or you may be a veteran at the track. Regardless, our staff is dedicated to making this an enjoyable experience and we hope, creates a desire to

come back often. The excitement is at the highest level I have experienced at the Downs. There are many reasons and we will point those out to you as the meet progresses. Two of the reasons are the Triple Crown and the Zia Festival.

The Zia Festival was more than you could have hoped for in its first year. Not only was it a great race day, it offered an opportunity for fans to become

involved in many other activities.

The Triple Crown offers a \$4 million dollar bonus to the winner. A horse must win the Ruidoso Futurity, Rainbow Futurity and the All American Futurity. Special Effort is the only horse to win all three of these races.

One of many other indicators of how high the interest is at Ruidoso Downs are the new sale barns that have been erected to meet the demand for the number of horses already consigned for this year's Quarter Horse Yearling Sale Aug. 30, 31 and Sept. 1. The QH and TB Mixed Sale dates are Aug 16 and 17. The New Mexico Horse Breeders have invested heavily to meet the buyers' demand for NMB horses. These are just a

few of the exciting things happening at the Downs.

Now for this weekend, here is a simple but effective way to rate the horses as contenders.

1. Has the horse raced within the last seven to 21 days at this track, at this distance and track condition? If not, has he had at least two works in the last 21 days at this track. It's best if one of the works is from the gate in company.
2. Has the horse raced well at this distance at this track, in his last several races?
3. If the horse comes from off the pace, did he finish first, second or third and no more than four to five lengths off the pace?
4. If he is a speed horse, was he holding his position throughout the race? If he is a closer did he improve his posi-

tion and finish in the top three or four positions?

5. Is he dropping in class, moving up in class or staying in the same class? He should have raced well in any of these conditions.

The horses with the most points should be contenders. Join us at our seminar race days, one hour before post time, at the east end of the grandstand on the ground level. We will be happy to answer any of your questions.

Hear our prediction show "The Winners Circle" at 9:18 a.m. race days and results at 6:18 and 8:18 p.m. on KWES FM 93.5. The predictions also are at 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. and results at 8 p.m. on KRUI 1490AM and W105 FM, your racing information stations.

# Ranch rodeo to benefit family fund

■ Proceeds from Saturday's rodeo go toward medical bills for ranching families.

A ranch rodeo which started as a friendly gathering of Lincoln County ranchers and ranch hands has now grown to a celebration of the ranching heritage in the area.

The 13th Annual Lincoln County Ranch Rodeo will be held Saturday at the Capitan Fairgrounds, with nine ranches already entered into the competition.

According to Sherry Goodloe, whose mother Shirley started the rodeo in order to honor ranching pioneers in the area, the LCRR is meant specifically to raise funds for a cowboy crisis fund.

"This is a fund raiser for ranch families that have had

some sort of family tragedy or injury," Goodloe said. "Ranch families often aren't covered by insurance, so this pays for doctor bills and the like."

The fund is owned by the Lincoln County Ranch Rodeo Association, which also organizes the rodeo each year.

Unlike the much larger Smokey Bear Stampede held during the Fourth of July, the LCRR is only meant as a charity event — with no teams taking home any monetary prizes.

"The Smokey Bear Stampede, they compete for a lot of money at that one," Goodloe said. "Here, you get bits if you're first, but everyone loves taking part in this one."

The working ranch hands will show off their skills in five different events — team penning, team roping and doctoring, team branding, wild cow milking and the remuda race — all of which demonstrate skills

needed to run a ranch.

In team penning, team members are presented with a number of calves. They must then isolate specified calves and herd them in a pen — all while being timed.

Team roping is similar to team penning, excepting that two team members rope the calves out from the herd, while the third marks an X on the head, symbolizing a vaccination.

In team branding, team members again pin down a calf, while the third brands the animal with paint.

Goodloe said the two more popular spectator events are wild cow milking and the remuda race. The concept of wild cow milking is exactly as it sounds: a cowboy must rope a cow, get milk in a bottle as the cow kicks, and demonstrate to judges a set amount of milk was procured.

In the remuda race, three team members turn their horses loose in a pen, then must use a

hulahan — rather than a regular lasso — to get them back. They all must saddle their steeds and cross the line at the same time.

All events are timed, and Goodloe said the events are exactly as they occur on a working ranch — excepting that things in the rodeo happen much faster.

"These cowboys are working so hard every day, this rodeo gives them a chance to get together and just have some fun," Goodloe said.

Festivities start Saturday at 10 a.m. with a working cowhorse competition. The actual rodeo starts at 1 p.m., with a barbecue to follow. A dance featuring Jody Nix caps things off starting at 8 p.m.

Admission to the rodeo is \$5 per person, with children 10 and under getting in for free. The barbecue is \$7.50 per plate, with a charge of \$8 per person for the dance.

success of the track — has netted him quite a bit more business this year. He has 10 horses starting today alone.

"I have horses from owners I've never worked with before," Bassett said. "There's no doubt all this is due to all the money we're looking at."


"I'm still in shock from what happened last year," he continued. "I had always dreamed about getting here (to the Downs) when I started, but I may never have a year like last year."

Bassett said he'll be returning a number of 3-year-olds from last year, and has a goodly number of 2-year-olds in his stables. Though he acknowledges he hasn't had much time to feel them out.

"I'm still just skimming the surface with them," Bassett said. "We haven't had a chance to work them very hard just yet."

Trainer Russell Harris has even more horses today, 12 in all. But of those horses, only one — a filly named Just See Me Fly — has actually raced before.

She did win at Retama in San Antonio, and another filly — First A Princess — is sister to

**Honor Ease**, who has run well both at Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park.

"We're all like college football coaches here," Harris said. "If you recruit well, you'll have a good season. If you don't do a good job of recruiting, well, you can't make the horses run any faster than they can."

Harris feels he has an excellent — if young — recruiting class this year at the track, and is looking forward to taking a shot at Bassett, widely recognized as the trainer to beat.

"There's a lot of good trainers here," Harris said. "And every year, it seems someone different has a really good horse in there. But there's also some young guys

coming in that are coming after us."

Another trainer that hopes to make waves is Roy Marcom, who has in his stalls the most expensive quarter horse ever.

That horse, **Corona Caliente**, was bought by Molly B. Morris at the Vessell sale in California last August for a whopping \$700,000. He'll be running in the fifth race today.

Of course, **Corona Caliente** isn't the only horse Marcom has in his stalls, and pointed to **Stormy Lane** as one of his favorites. **Stormy Lane** — a thoroughbred — has only raced twice before, but both times he won.

"There's no doubt, he's my pick of the barn," Marcom said.

Marcom has 12 horses total running today, and didn't try to hide the fact that money is the biggest reason behind today's large number of races.

"There's really only one reason: money," Marcom said. "Because of that \$4 million bonus, everyone wants to be in this race, the entries have doubled from last year."

### New Mexican Celebration

As with last year, the centerpiece of this year's racing season — aside from the All American — will be the Zia Festival, scheduled for July 14.

Beginning last year, the Zia Festival featured races with only New Mexico-bred horses, culminating in the Zia Futurity.

This year the Zia has an estimated \$680,000 purse, and is one of 11 total races scheduled for that day. In addition to the New Mexico-bred races, Ruidoso Downs will be home to another display of New Mexico products sold by local vendors.

The idea of selling the whole state, not just the state's horses, resulted in an attendance of just under 6,000 last year — an increase of 71 percent from the year before. Rimbo said the track is looking to build on this success.

"That will again be our cor-

nerstone day," Rimbo said. "We want to get more vendors in there to sell the state."

"We do have to be careful and be a little selective with the vendors," he cautioned. "We only have a certain amount of space under the grandstand for them, and we want a wide diversity in the products."

In addition to the Zia Festival's public relations attempts to promote the state's economy, the Zia Futurity is also part of a three-race cycle which will award a graduate from the 2002 Ruidoso mixed sale a \$500,000 bonus.

In addition to the Zia Futurity, a New Mexico-bred horse must also win the New Mexico Spring Futurity and the Shuefly Stakes at Sunland Park. The program will begin in 2003.

### Everyday Increase

Even with an extreme fire danger and the closure of the Lincoln National Forest threatening to damage the summer tourist season in Ruidoso, Rimbo said such drastic conditions won't affect track attendance initially.

"Based on the people I've talked to, the bookings are very strong," Rimbo said. "We'll probably lose the camping people, that's what happened in 2000, the last time the forest was closed."

"The impact could be more noticeable as the summer goes along, however," he added.

Fire danger aside, Ruidoso Downs is poised for another record year in earnings, and the biggest indicator of this is in the daily purses.

Last season, purses had increased five percent from the year before to \$62,000 per day. That's up from \$32,000 in 1999, when Rimbo first came to Ruidoso Downs.

"I've already seen quite an increase since I've been here," Rimbo said. "I believe we will see another increase before the year is out."

Rimbo and the rest of the Ruidoso Downs administration will see if that prediction comes true starting today.



# State's 4-H receives \$1 million in federal funding

Extension program celebrates national centennial, seeks to reach out to underserved youth across New Mexico

ALBUQUERQUE - As 4-H celebrates its national centennial, New Mexico's 4-H program is broadening its efforts to reach at-risk youth in communities where drugs, gang activity and other risky behavior is particularly widespread.

A \$1 million U.S. Justice Department grant has provided New Mexico State University's Cooperative Extension Service with enough funds to hire six new 4-H agents for a three-year period. The agents will work with at-risk youth

in Bernalillo, Chaves, Luna, Mora, San Miguel, Socorro and Taos counties, reaching out to youth not previously involved in 4-H, while strengthening traditional 4-H programs in those communities.

"There's a lot of youth in these counties who have never participated in 4-H for a variety of reasons, such as location of perceived social barriers," said Linda Schultz, Extension 4-H youth specialist. "This is an opportunity for them to benefit from 4-H, which helps young people build life skills and

confront social problems in healthy ways."

About 50,000 young people currently participate in 4-H in New Mexico. The program, which began in 1912, provides fun, educational activities that teach kids 5 to 19 years old to become productive citizens.

New Mexico's social problems have worsened because of population growth and stratification that have increased negative influences and the potential for risky behavior among urban and rural youth

in New Mexico, Schultz said.

In response, Extension recently broadened the 4-H program to provide substance abuse education prevention education for at-risk youth through after-school programs. An earlier Justice Department grant financed 4-H Share/Care, a three-year after-school program that has benefited more than 3,000 kids in 12 counties since 1999.

The new grant broadens that effort to reach underserved youth by going beyond after-school pro-

grams.

"This is an opportunity to extend the success of the Share/Care grant," said Justin Trager, 4-H Share/Care coordinator for Bernalillo County. "Share/Care was strictly substance abuse prevention education that relied primarily on after-school programs. We now have a much broader youth development mandate that will include everything from 4-H clubs to recreational activities and educational projects, both in and out of school."

## Smalley cleared of recent charges

Battery and animal nuisance charges filed against a Republican candidate for magistrate judge in early April were dismissed in Ruidoso Municipal Court earlier this week.

Phillip R. Smalley, 36, a candidate for Division II Magistrate Judge in Ruidoso, was accused April 4 of pushing his landlord through a screen door. On April 10, he was cited for allowing piles of horse waste to build up around a corral on property he rents.

The landlord, Gerald Welch, 68, was cited for criminal trespass on a complaint from Smalley.

According to the report by

Officer Dwayne Goar, Welch went to the property on Meander Drive that he rented to Smalley and his mother, Marilyn Smalley, to check on their status after giving them a 30-day eviction notice. He told police that while standing near the front door, Smalley "pushed him in a rude and insolent manner without any reason."

The Smalleys countered in the report that Welch and his son were harassing his mother and they would not leave.

Judge Michael Line granted a motion to dismiss the charges against Smalley and then dismissed the trespass charges against his landlord because Welch owns the property. The basis for the nuisance complaint has been cleaned up, the judge said.

# Don't drink and drive – and don't sell to those who do

*This is the first in a regular series of articles from the New Mexico State Police.*

The New Mexico State Police would like to take this time and opportunity to express our concerns on our new State Police Blotter. We here in the Ruidoso area have a major problem with alcohol and alcohol related violations.

Probably our main concern is with driving while intoxicated. This has been deemed the No. 1 priority for the New Mexico State Police to attack and try to reduce. With the penalties stiffer than ever, and the tragic accidents that do result, I can't understand why anyone in their right mind would dare drive while intoxicated. I know that Ruidoso is a resort town and people come to have a good time, but

don't forget your responsibilities, and drive safely. If you are going to drink, have a designated driver.

Another concern is the serving or selling of alcohol to an intoxicated person. It's a tragedy that a business will sell an alcoholic beverage to an already intoxicated person. These businesses are supposed to be trained in the detection of intoxicated people. It's easy to detect an intoxicated person if they are staggering all over the place or if that person can't even talk straight, but they should also be able to detect if a person is intoxicated to the slightest degree.

I had an incident where I responded to a hit and run accident recently. A vehicle collided almost head-on with semi, but fortunately the semi driver was partially off the roadway and only got sideswiped by the vehicle. The vehicle only sustained minor damage to its left side,

which included getting its left outside mirror ripped off. The vehicle continued on its way and failed to remain at the accident scene.

A short while after the accident the driver of the hit and run vehicle was located leaving the parking lot of a local business. The vehicle was stopped and the driver was so intoxicated that he was not aware that he had been involved in an accident with a semi. The driver was subsequently arrested for DWI and other charges.

During the inventory of his vehicle I located a new 12-pack of beer that he had purchased at the business he had just left. This driver was obviously very intoxicated and still managed to buy more beer. The business was later issued an administrative citation and was fined for selling to an intoxicated person. I was amazed how the clerk could have sold to this obviously intoxicated

person. There is no excuse. We are also working with the Special Investigations Division (SID) to conduct follow-up investigation into sales to an intoxicated person violations.

Also a problem is the selling

or serving of alcohol to minors. We as State Police Officers are seeing an increase of minors in possession of alcoholic beverages. Sometimes it is not so easy to find out where the minors got the alcohol but, we will look into it

and make a great effort to do so. Alcohol in this community is a problem and we as New Mexico State Police Officers are doing, and will continue to do our best to attack and slow down the problem.

Locals have a chance to see the retrospective exhibit of Ruidoso's own Gordon Snidow at the Hubbard Museum of the American West before it hightails it on to the Cowboy Artists of America show in Kerrville, Texas, in November, and then on to the Smithsonian Museum in Washington, D.C., to hang there from February through May 2003.

Snidow's realistic work in gouache is best known as Western art, but the Western scenes he depicts include a lot more than cowboys — to wit, his series on the homeless, American women and wildlife, and one 11-foot painting of a graffiti-covered wall, "Graffiti: The Dog of Misery."

The exhibit includes 115 paintings, with comments from Snidow on many of them, because, as he says, "I have stories behind every one of them. I've gone out to contemporary ranches and it's their story, really." But it's the stories beneath the surface that catch his eye in the first place. Most of his paintings come from time spent on working ranches, watching everyone and everything for that something special and, in many cases, humorous. The stories behind the paintings are capsulized by their sometimes lengthy titles, as, for example, "Seventeen and Bullet-proof," "He'll be a Hell of a Hand if He Lives to be 35," "Fifty Years a Cowboy — Twenty-two Years a Cook" and "Headin' for the Barn."

"I listen to people talk. That's where I get most of my titles," he said.

Snidow got a reputation among ranches for not spooking the horses, and while there, he's just one of the cow hands — the one who paints.

"I try to paint the working cowboy. He's never recorded. The guys I've painted kind of represent the guys that don't get any recognition. Every one is a working cowboy or a real rancher. That's what appealed to me — the character of the people."

A charter member and three-time president of Cowboy Artists of America, Snidow became a member emeritus and was the organization's top medal winner, having won 27 gold and silver medals and three for best of show. His work is in the permanent collections of leading Western art museums, and in 1998 he was awarded the "New Mexico Governor's Award for Excellence in the Arts." In 1999, he was chosen by *Art of the West* as one of "The Twelve Most Compelling Artists of America Today" whose work will be remembered 100 years from now. His work has received international critical acclaim and two books and a British documentary film have focused on him.

Snidow said the idea of having a retrospective exhibit feels "scary. These are pic-

# On the stagecoach: The ride of your life

Around the world, the single most vivid and recognized image identified with the Old West is surely the stagecoach.

It was a ride that was a long, long way from comfortable, but it got the traveler from point A to point B, and that, after all, was the main thing.

Aside from the possibility of accident, the ride could be a dangerous one for a number of other reasons, not the least of which was "road agents." Road agents were, for the most part, mounted bandits who looked upon these rumbling contraptions as a sort of mobile bank that was there for them to make the occasional unauthorized withdrawal.

### Beginnings

Stagecoaches did not originate on the frontier, a fact that we modern movie-goers might easily overlook. But the fact is, like most of the frontiersmen who populated the Old West, stagecoaches were native to the East Coast. They had been in use back there since the late 18th century, but with the 19th century and the emergence of the railroads, they became something of a thing of the past. But the railroads did not arrive on the frontier until much later and the stagecoach was, for decades, the premier method of public transportation across the vast distances that comprised the American West.

And even after they became a thing of the past on the frontier, they still catered to tourists who, in the latter part

of the 19th century and early 20th, were eager to experience the "feel" of the frontier. In other words, after their days of practical use had come to an end, stagecoaches pandered to tourists — something they still do — unfortunately, in far too few locations in the West. Even today, to ride in a stagecoach is the closest we can get to experiencing at least a taste of what life on the frontier was like.

### Colorful characters and places

Many a colorful character has been associated with the stagecoach over the years. One of the most legendary drivers was a slightly built character who went by the name of Charley Parkhurst. Though slight in build and very soft-spoken, Charley was known everywhere as a man who could calm an excited horse with his soft tones. He was also known as a nasty character to tangle with, as more than one road agent found out.

At least one bandit was killed by his revolver and another blinded by Parkhurst's whip when they made the mistake of trying to rob Charley's coach.

Charley was secretive and, with the exception of a few trusted friends, tended to keep to himself. Toward the end of his life, Charley confided to his friends that he had a secret that he wished to impart before his passing, but that it could wait. He never did get around to letting his friends in on his little secret, but after his death,

it came out anyway. When the mortician undressed the diminutive driver he found — to his utter amazement — just exactly what Charley's secret was... Charley Parkhurst was a more extraordinary stage driver than anyone had ever dreamed. Charley Parkhurst was a woman.

### Drew's Station

It was the night of March 15, 1881. Stage driver Eli "Bud" Philpott and shotgun guard Bob Paul sat side by side as they passed through the little town of Contention, Arizona Territory. Paul had recently been involved in an election pitting himself against incumbent Charlie Shibell for the position of Sheriff of Pima County. The results had been contested, and Paul was still anxiously awaiting the outcome. But on this fateful night, all thoughts of politics were put out of his head by the events that transpired near a place called Drew's Station, located on the run between Tombstone and Benson.

Earlier in the evening, Paul and Philpott had traded places with Paul doing the driving. Bud had a stomach flu and Paul, as a favor to his friend, had taken the reins so that Bud might attempt to make himself at least a little more comfortable. As it turned out, Paul had unwittingly signed Philpott's death warrant.

Near Drew's Station, an armed man had stepped out into the road and commanded the coach to "Hold." Despite the fact that he had an ailing man seated next to him and he was handling the reins, the 6' 4" Paul had snatched up his shotgun. "By God," he shouted, "I

hold for nobody!" At this juncture, several more men stepped out into the road and both Paul and the road agents all opened fire more or less simultaneously.

Bob Paul was known as an efficient and dangerous shotgun guard and his reputation had preceded him. The outlaws were firing at the man in the shotgun guard's seat. Of course, in the dark, they could not make out the fact that they were firing at the wrong man and Bud Philpott's stomach flu suddenly became a terminal disorder.

At least one of the outlaws' bullets struck Bud in the chest and he pitched forward (no, people don't fly through the air

when they are shot like the movies tell us) down between the horses and, vanished from view as the stage lurched forward, pulled by its now terrified horses.

Bob Paul, aware of his friend's fate, had his hands full at the moment and could do little other than try to control the coach. About a mile down the road, when Paul finally got the horses under control, he stopped to take stock of the damage. It was worse than he had anticipated. Aside from Bud Philpott, who Paul accurately assumed to be lying dead in the road, a passenger, a man named Peter Roerig, had also been fatally struck by a stray bullet.

Whipping the team up, Paul went thundering, as rapidly as he could, into Benson where he alerted every lawman he could contact. It was eventually ascertained that the outlaws had been four men named Billy Leonard, Jim Crane, Harry Head (honest!), and Luther King.

King had friends in the law enforcement community in Tombstone and, after his capture, was "allowed" to escape. Leonard and Head were never brought to justice, not administratively, anyway. The pair attempted to hold up a store owned by the Haslett brothers in the Animas Valley, and the two storekeepers riddled the



# A celebration of cattle: From brand to burger

I learned that May is the taste buds. Certainly National Hamburger Month. The recognition is sponsored by White Castle, the original hamburger chain, founded in 1921, and pays tribute to one of America's favorite foods.

This month, the Canyon CowBelles once again hosted the annual Ag Day for Carrizozo students K-12 and staff. While students viewed ag displays and demonstrations and participated in various activities, the smell of burgers cooking on an outside grill was a sure promise of a noon treat. With or without condiments, on or off a bun, hamburgers have grown in popularity since the early 1920s and are now an American meal mainstay.

I often tell my art students that everything is art, including culinary creations that delight the eyeballs and please

how various brands are created. Branding was especially important in the era of the open range, when herds belonging to many owners used the same pastures and had to be separated by roundups. Although most ranches are now fenced, branding is still needed and used.

In most states, brands are registered with a central agency. Inspectors of cattle-men's associations check animals brought to markets to spot stolen ones; cases of brand alteration are taken to court.

Branding is usually done by a quick impression of a heated stamp iron to the hide of the animal that is tied firmly or held in a chute. The practice of branding was brought to the Americas, along with cattle, by the Spanish conquistadors.

If I were a ranch woman in charge of my own branding, I would most likely go overboard creating letters, designs and symbols. My cattle would not survive the branding activity.

desperadoes, permanently ending their criminal careers. Later, the last of the bandits, Jim Crane, led a group of his friends to the Animas Valley and killed the two storekeepers, but that is another story.

**Stagecoach assassination**  
Later the same year, Tombstone mayor and editor of the Tombstone Epitaph, John Clum, boarded a stage on the evening of Dec. 14 for a trip back east. The legendary and mis-named "Gunfight at the OK Corral" had taken place the previous October and Clum, as a supporter of the Earps, was not overly popular with the local outlaw element, known as "The Cowboys." He was aware of this, and before boarding, had confided to a friend that he suspected that the outlaws would "pull off a sham stage robbery, during which they would make it convenient to properly perforate my anatomy."

Clum had hit the nail right on the head, as that is exactly what the outlaws attempted to do. The stagecoach was driven by Jimmy Harrington and an empty bullion wagon followed, driven by another man known as "Whistling Dick" Wright. Less than five miles out of Tombstone, Clum heard the command "Hold!" come out of the darkness, followed by a volley of shots. Both teams panicked and bolted into the night.

When the drivers got them under control, they found that one of the horses had been badly hit and would have to be left behind. Additionally, Whistling Dick had taken a bullet through the leg. In all the commotion, no one noticed that John Clum had vanished into the Arizona night, and it was not until they finally pulled into Contention that his absence was noted.

Now, many writers have had some sport with Clum's predicament. The fact that he was prematurely bald and was a newspaper editor has caused some writers to assume that the eastern-appearing Clum was no match for the outlaws and escaped through pure luck. Assumptions are dangerous things for writers of history to make, and this is no exception. Clum may not have looked like the popular image of the frontiersman, but we all know how deceiving appearances can be...

John Clum, a six-shooter in each hand, had leapt from the

stage into the brush, later stating that he felt that his presence put the other passengers at more risk. As I said, Clum did not look like a frontiersman, but this particular newspaper editor had lived for some time with the Apaches at the San Carlos Reservation. (It was Clum who finally got the military removed from the reservation so that the Apaches could police themselves.) The outlaws were quite aware of this and the idea of trying to track him in the dark most definitely did not appeal to them. Deciding that he could be murdered later under more convenient circumstances, the desperadoes elected to try again another time... something that they never did get around to doing, possibly because a temporarily insane Wyatt Earp, distraught over the murder of his brother Morgan a few months later, eradicated most of them from the planet.

**Then and now**

These days, a stagecoach is a

rare sight indeed. For the most part, they are confined to places like Tombstone (the Disney World of the Old West) and other Wild West theme parks. However, for those of you who would like to experience the thrill and well, discomfort, of a genuine stagecoach ride, all hope is not lost.

There is the Lincoln County Overland Stage Co., Ltd., and it can be reached at 505-653-4954. The driver is expert and the ride

quite educational and even thrilling. And these days, you don't have to worry about road agents, either. But perhaps I speak too quickly - this is, after all, Lincoln County. You might want to ask if there will be a shotgun guard going along...



 tures that've never seen each other before. Makes me ask, 'How good did I paint 30 years ago?' and they're all hanging together in one room. It's also quite an honor and I'm humbled by it. Doesn't seem right to have that kind of honor and still be alive."  
 The earliest painting available for the exhibit is one painted by Snidow when he was 14, "Cats." The only reason this one is available, he said, is because he charged the "client" \$12.50 and she thought it was too expensive and refused to buy it. "My mother's still pissed off about it," he said, "so she had it."

Rita Snidow, however, recalls when her son was 5 years old and asked his grandmother to pose so he could draw her. She remembers him saying, "Set up straight, Grandma, I want to draw your picture."

There's another early painting in the retrospective of his cousin, "Boug," returned to him last year, along with a cigar box containing his first set of crayons. Born in Paris, Mo., Snidow and his family moved

to Oklahoma, and later Texas, but the boy spent summers in Missouri with Boug, whose family had a farm with horses. He and Boug worked — and played — with the horses and went to town to watch Gene Autrey movies.

"That's probably why I painted the cowboys so long," Snidow said. "I never was romanced by painting history I wasn't a witness to. It never appealed to me, even though it's easier to sell paintings of the old West than the contemporary West."

A few paintings done during his college years at the Art Center College of Design in Los Angeles, where he received his B.F.A. in 1959, are also included in the retrospective. Snidow recalls a teacher telling him he'd never make an artist, and this only spurred him on further, he said.

Those who've seen Snidow's Western paintings may be surprised to see a nude in the exhibit, but in college, nudes were all he painted, he said. In contrast, he had to teach himself to draw and paint a horse, hence, "It's harder to paint a horse than a nude."

## A different view of World War II

Ten years ago, Helga DeLisle and her husband came across an interesting sign as they explored Fort Stanton, northeast of Ruidoso. Above the doorway of a building, written in German, was the inscription, "Built in 1944."

DeLisle thought back to four gravestones she had just seen. They were separated from the rest of the nearby cemetery by a vast, empty field. She walked back to the four gravestones.

There she found the graves of four German seamen who once had been members of the crew of a German luxury liner, Columbus.

DeLisle, originally from Germany, decided to research the German connection to her home in southern New Mexico. What DeLisle, a former New Mexico State University professor, found was the subject of a talk she gave recently at the Unitarian Universalist Church in Las Cruces, an event sponsored by the Las Cruces Sister Cities. About 35 people attended.

The Columbus, then the third-largest cruise ship in the world, was built in Germany in 1924. In 1933, it underwent a conversion, and was based in New York. It sailed the Caribbean.

One day in 1939, the ship left New York. While it was at sea, World War II broke out.

The crew wanted to return to Germany. But the ship was stopped by two war ships, one American and one British. The crew had orders to burn the ship rather than turn it over to the British. In 12 minutes, the ship was on its way to the bottom of the ocean as its passengers sat in lifeboats in the North Atlantic Ocean.

After brief stints as "guests of the United States" at Ellis Island and an island off the coast near San Francisco, the German crew members were sent to a small camp adjacent to Fort Stanton, DeLisle said.

Fort Stanton provided a rural area where those German citizens would be out of sight of the American public.

The seamen were not considered prisoners of war, even after the United States joined World War II, DeLisle said.

The first group arrived at Fort Stanton in January of 1941 to repair buildings, paint and set up the camp. By March, more than 400 German crew members of the Columbus were at Fort Stanton.

Between 1941 and 1945, there were about 800 civilians held at Fort Stanton, according to

DeLisle. About 700 were German, most of them from the Columbus. The others were Japanese and Italian.

The seamen were treated well by citizens of local towns, DeLisle said. Until the United States entered the war, they were free to travel as far away as Roswell.

They also were permitted to convert the camp into whatever they wanted — and they "in essence really turned it into a German Village," DeLisle said. The camp included a swimming pool, tennis courts and other athletic fields, and shops — including a watchmaking shop and a place to buy beer, cigarettes and construction supplies. Some of the detainees built their own cabins.

The seamen had access to a large library and instruction was provided concerning astronomy, mechanics, five different languages and other subjects.

Then came Dec. 7, 1941, and Japan bombed Pearl Harbor. The United States entered the war. With that, the seamen were forced to remain in the camp, making it the first internment camp in the United States.

They could no longer visit nearby towns.

"They had the people already there, now all (the government) had to do was put a fence around it," DeLisle said.

As the Germans split into two factions — those loyal to the Nazis and those who were not — the government sent those not loyal to the Nazis to a camp in South Dakota, and kept the Nazis loyalists at Fort Stanton. That came after two were killed during political fights — two of the four DeLisle found buried there 10 years ago. The other two died from a bacteria outbreak after eating raw meat.

Evidence of that Nazi support is still evident at Fort Stanton. Swastikas are carved into the adobe on some of the walls of some buildings.

The seamen were returned to Germany after the war. But instead of being released to their families, they were jailed in a United States military prison in Germany, along with Nazi war criminals.

Only after many committed suicide did the United States government free them, DeLisle said.

June 1, the Lincoln community picnic, to be held at 5:30 p.m. at the Lincoln Community Church.




