Commission eludes jail tax conflict

■ A last-minute meeting allowed the county to reword its contract with the jail's operators.

Lincoln County commissioners voted Tuesday at a special meeting to approve an amendment to the contract with Correction Systems Inc to put the detention center in Carrizozo in compliance with IRS tax exemption status for the bond issue.

The bonds were to be released to the public market at 11 a.m. Tuesday. The tax attorney for the county's bond counsel found the wording in violation of IRS rules for tax-exempt bonds for a loan with the New Mexico Finance Authority.

County Manager Tom Stewart said setting a fixed rate for the contract, rather than having it vary with the number of inmates, puts the bond in compliance with IRS tax-exempt status rules. The amendment approved at the last hour sets a fixed rate of \$85,000 for the first 82 prisoners, and a per diem rate of \$24.90 per day for each additional inmate.

Stewart said the glitch was discovered late and a special meeting was scheduled for Tuesday. He recommended accepting CSI's proposal of the fixed rate with the additional per diem rate. He also suggested a 60-day out. The variable portion cannot exceed the fixed rate portion.

Also included in the variable portion is 1/12 of the average salary of county employees who are hired by CSI.

Alan P. Morel, attorney for the county, said CSI has had four or five contracts with the county since 1997, when it

managed the old jail.

Two years ago the State Fire Marshall said the facility did not meet fire code and the county decided it wasn't cost-effective to remodel. Instead, the new facility was built to hold up to 129 inmates. Initially, CSI just provided a manager.

With the new contract, an assistant jail administrator will be hired to support Mike Borrego, which "should allow us to increase the capacity of our federal contracts by an additional 10 federal prisoners, producing an additional \$200,000 in annual federal revenue," wrote John R. Forren, president and chief executive officer of CSI, in a letter to Stewart about the proposed billing structure.

Stewart said the county would have had to pay a penalty of an additional \$80,000 per year for a taxable bond if it had not amended the contract to include a fixed rate for operation of the detention center.


Morel said \$85,000 is an average of the last five months of expenses to the county for the detention center, and that, in the case of federal inmates, the county stands to make some money.

"The way the contract's drafted, over 82 (inmates), the county gets everything over \$24.90. Assuming we have federal prisoners, the county begins to make money," Morel said.

As of Tuesday, there were 90 inmates, including 25 federal prisoners. Over the last six months, an average of 93 inmates were housed at the detention center, 36.67 of whom were federal prisoners, for an average cost of \$81,102.

"Operational costs will be monitored by me on a continual basis to make sure it's still profitable for the county to participate," Stewart said.

Downs OKs interim budget

The Ruidoso Downs village council unanimously approved an interim budget two weeks before deadline.

The new budget focuses on slimming down project expenditures, increasing capital and improving the water system.

"We're probably not looking at paying for as many projects," said John Waters, village administrator.

The village paid for most of last year's projects out of its reserve funds, he said, but this year the village will apply for grants to cover most costs.

Under the new budget, improvements to the water system will likely require a raise in rates, Waters said.

The state of New Mexico requires that a municipality's enterprise fund, which is set up to maintain the water and sewer system, makes enough money to support itself.

Waters said the village will bring in a consultant to advise the council on structuring rates to make this possible.

Since last fall, Waters has decreased expenses in water and sewer with a 35 percent reduction in overtime.

Ruidoso Downs water rates have remained low, though rates throughout

the state are rising, he said.

"We don't want to overburden the public," Waters said.

Improvements include replacing pipes, repairing line breaks, installing valves and maintaining the system.

"It did not get this way overnight. This is certainly something that's been building for at least the last 10 to 15 years," Waters said.

The state Department of Finance and Administration requires the 2002-2003 interim budget be submitted by June 1. Ruidoso Downs closes the fiscal year June 30 and must submit a final budget a month after that date.

YMCA organizers decide to start small

■ Only "key leaders" will meet with consultants as part of the first step toward a center.

Only key community leaders will meet with YMCA consultants as the first step toward developing a YMCA for Lincoln County in Ruidoso.

The possible development of a YMCA took a different direction after the May 7 public meeting at First Christian Church,

attended by about 60 members of the community, when a national consultant told organizers that they were moving too fast by beginning with a large public meeting, said organizer Peggy Jordan French.

French said the meeting that had been scheduled for May 21 had been canceled and that the first steps involve some of Ruidoso's and Lincoln County's "key leaders."

"Over a short period of time, several meetings with small groups of community leaders will form a sound basis for any grass roots YMCA movement," French wrote in a memo to those who signed in at the first

meeting.

"The national Y has a format they follow," French said. "They like to start out with smaller groups."

John Brooks, the El Paso, Texas, YMCA director who attended the first meeting, said he was shocked by the number of people at that meeting and had expected only two or three people. (See his letter, page 4A.)

A meeting with national consultants will take place in Ruidoso on May 29 with community leaders, French said, and the next meeting or two will be open to the public as was proposed for the May 21 meeting.

Commission hopefuls offer views at debate

Candidates for three Lincoln County Commission seats in the June 4 Republican primary election fielded some tough questions last week about their attendance at county meetings and if sessions should be scheduled outside of the county seat of Carrizozo.

Laying out their qualifications and answering questions during a forum sponsored by the Federated Republican Women of Lincoln County were former Ruidoso village councilor Bill Chance and county planning board member Maury St. John for District 2, Democrat Mike Runnels will face the primary winner in the general election. In District 4, Earl B. Hobbs, Frank Higgins, Bob Johnson and Curtis Payne

spoke. The winner will oppose Democrat Darrel Stierwalt in the general election.

For District 5, incumbent Rick Simpson was the only candidate who showed up to speak to an audience composed mostly of family and supporters of those running. Candidate Humberto Maldonado didn't attend and Orlando Montes Jr., was represented by his daughter. The winner will face the victor of the Democratic primary between Ralph Romero and Reynaldo Valcaroel.

Responding to audience questions, Chance said marathon meetings once a month in Carrizozo do not serve the public. He would like to see twice a month meetings with one in Ruidoso on relevant items, and one in Carrizozo.

He explained that the village convention center couldn't be used as a polling place for

the primary because that date already was booked. "Its primary function is for economic development and revenue," he reminded the audience.

In response to a query about his past negative comments on county government, Chance said at one time the commission and county administration seemed so anti-Ruidoso that there was talk of the village breaking away.

"I think the county's come a long way in the last four years," he said. "But prior, it was like a circus. I felt the county was not listening and responding to the people of Ruidoso."

As for attendance at county commission meetings, Chance said he's been at three to five during the past year.

St. John said she's missed four commis-

sion meetings in the last two years.

"It's very important to know the business going on and how it's conducted," she said. "I have seen how smoothly it runs. I questioned (about other sites) and was told when they had meetings in other places, there was no better turn-out. I saw that last year when they met in Ruidoso Downs and only five people attended."

Hobbs, a retired businessman and retired FAA air traffic control specialist, said he's missed only one or two meetings in the last year and has been attending for about four years.

"I've seen that the business of the county is best conducted at the county seat where the records are kept," he said. "But I'm not opposed to alternate locations, such as Ruidoso, Corona, San Patricio and Capitan. They have just as much (right) and if it would get more participation, by all means, let's look at other locations."

Higgins, a former planning board member with 29 years in the international oil and gas business, said he's attended from five to eight meetings in the last year and favors an approach that encourages more participation.

"I recognize that a large percentage of the population lives in this end of the county and I think we should accommodate them when the subject pertains to the area," he said. "We should move

around from time to time. We need public input for future action."

Johnson attended one meeting and said, "I don't believe how many meetings you have attended means anything about how many you will attend."

He favors all regular commission meetings at the county courthouse in Carrizozo, but flexibility for special meetings. Payne agreed with Johnson and said he also had gone to one meeting.

Simpson said with all county records and a good recording system in place at the courthouse, regular meetings should stay there, but special meetings could be elsewhere.

In general remarks, Chance said he's concerned that lack of planning on how to manage growth may jeopardize the county's water supply, that the new jail could mean more liability to the county for lawsuits, that the U.S. 70 project is finished in a timely manner and that taxes are kept to a minimum.

St. John, a registered nurse for 24 years, said she moved to the county seven years ago and her main focus is for the people already here.

The area faces two big issues, water and wildfire, but they are two sides of the same coin, she said. "If you thin the trees, you'll save water."

She advocated conservation measures "everyday by everyone," such as not allowing the water to run while brushing

teeth, taking fewer showers and waiting for a big load to wash dishes.

Payne, a fourth-generation resident, says he knows the county and its needs and wants to keep continuity on the board and reduce squabbles.

"Our problems didn't start overnight," he said. "The trees took years to become overgrown and we've had drought before and we will again."

He would oppose a moratorium on development.

"I think we need more control of growth in the future," he said. "We could conserve water and we might be more prepared for the next drought."

Johnson, a rancher, farmer, former land use specialist for the state Land Office and a former state legislator, said from knocking on doors around his district, he found that many people don't know the extent of the commission's power. He read a list of the possibilities, although several currently aren't exercised, such as operation of parks and libraries.

He served on the Curry County Fair Board and would like to use that knowledge to boost Lincoln County's annual fair, he said.

"I realize that a well-planned subdivision can be an asset while a poorly planned one can be a liability," Johnson said.

Hobbs, an Alto resident, said he was raised in Lubbock, Texas, and attended Texas Tech

University, then served in Vietnam.

He called himself a monetary conservative and a social moderate.

"I don't believe government has any business in the business of running our lives, but it has a place to provide assistance," he said.

"The issues are water - we don't know how much we have, use or discharge," Hobbs said. Roads need improving, a fair return on their tax dollars is due to residents and growth must be regulated while remaining cognizant of private property rights, he said.

Higgins, a member of the Lincoln County-Ruidoso Extraterritorial Zoning Commission, said he moved to the county three years ago after spending 19 years as a negotiator and 30 years as a manager. He's dealt with different cultures, needs and environments and believes consensus is the longest-lasting solution to disputes.

"I'd like to bring that experience to Lincoln County," he said, adding that he's retired and has the time. "I think growth is a reality whether we like it or not."

"The baby boomers are coming and we need to be ready for those folks. We need to plan now for the future in water needs, hospitals, schools, waste control and fire protection. We can't wake up on July 4th in 2013 and

find we have no water. We need to start now and we need input from all parts of the county."

Simpson, a lifetime resident who served as commissioner when terms were two years and was elected to a four-year term in 1998, said his main concern is water. One way to improve that is to eliminate trees that have grown too thickly together since pre-settlement times.

One obstacle is the

Endangered Species Act, which interferes with some logging activity, he said.

A rancher and former owner of a school bus service, Simpson said he's a strong advocate of private property rights.

"One of the reasons I don't live in town or in a subdivision is that I'm particular about my property rights, and that's why I am about the property rights of others," Simpson said.

Something good blowing with the wind

A closed forest didn't stop our Memorial Day visitors

An ill wind blows no good, they say...and when dry winds close a forest, it usually is even less good for Ruidoso.

But not this year. Whether it was the 23 trial races on opening day for a shot at the biggest prize ever at Ruidoso Downs Race Track, or perfect weather, or the fact that our recreational forests were locked down because of the fire danger — whatever the reasons, new Memorial Day weekend records were set for attendance at the races.

Add to that an 82-team baseball tournament that brought

more than 1,000 more visitors to the village and filled every athletic field in the area.

All this spilled over into Midtown, where parking spaces were at a premium, lodgings were full and cash registers were ringing everywhere.

Race fans totaled 2,896 on Friday, 5,253 on Saturday and 5,505 on Sunday. Monday, even as many were headed back home, 3,663 people were in the racetrack stands. The weekend gate topped 2001 by 7 percent.

Ruidoso business people wanted something positive to start a new summer season, and they got it.

A modicum of outrage

I'm outraged. It is happening once again. Newspapers in New Mexico are making a big deal out of the oh-so-American practice of lavishing treats on our state legislators.

Look, these are our leaders! If we want to give them packages of fireworks, cute little Teddy Bears, and fly fishing trips, it is simply our way of saying "hey, thanks, job well done!"

But, no, let's not explain it so innocently, so simply. The cynical among you will just assume that when a lobbyist gives a gift to a legislator, that lobbyist kind of expects a favorable vote on bills affecting his business or industry.

And so when you hear about a dozen lobbyists spending \$2,900 to throw a birthday party for House Majority Whip James Taylor, do you chime in with, "Happy Birthday, Jim!"?

No, you don't. You wonder why Mr. Taylor can't put on a funny little hat and go visit Ronald McDonald with the rest of us kids. You're saying — because every party needs one, that's why we invited you — "what in heaven's name do you DO at a \$3,000 birthday bash!"?

You read the story about Senate Majority Leader Manny Aragon floating down the San Juan River with a fishing pole in his hand and you think, just because the Public Service Company of New Mexico is paying for this trip, Manny might be persuaded to look fondly at legislation benefiting the utility company.

How distrustful you are. What you should be savoring is the wonderful mental image of Manny sitting in a boat in the middle of the river with a silly hat on his head and appreciate the ammunition this gives political cartoonists around the state.

Do you really think a politician's vote can be influenced by such small favors? Don't be silly!

Although they cleaned up their act in the last decade or two, newspaper writers themselves were often treated to junkets. You didn't hear so much criticism of politicians then, did you?

This writer was once the four-day guest of the City of Oceanside,

Calif., swank hotel, food, tours, and all the trimmings, free. The thought, just the thought, that somehow this gift could influence me to write nice things about Oceanside is an insult to my integrity.

(As an aside, I might mention that Oceanside is a delightful seaside community near San Diego, with acres of flower gardens and tremendous restaurants.)

So let's tell it like it is. These Teddy Bears and fireworks packages are not going to influence anybody. No. If you are going to influence legislation, you have to grease the palm in a more meaningful way.

Look at how the big leaguers play the game. Wouldn't you like to know what good lobbyist luck befell those members of Congress who pushed through \$180 billion in farm subsidies over the next decade? \$180 billion! Ooooh, saaaaay can't you see, the lobbyist behiindnd that tree.....



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Hunger impacts educational development, new studies show

the 2nd Congressional District Voters.

Greer said the future of ranching depends on what the government does.

"With one stroke of the pen, everything could change," he said. "But a lot of the people don't realize that."

He said changes should include proper management over U.S. Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management. Unlike his competition, Greer said, he has the understanding of agriculture and proper husbandry practices to make the changes needed and how to enact legislation, adding that management changes alone won't be enough.

Greer said the people need representatives in Washington who will ensure that the laws follow the Constitution.

Although he believes his strength is in property and individual rights, Greer said he is not a single-issue candidate, adding that each of the counties within the 2nd Congressional District has unique issues.

Noting the layoffs in Grant County during the past few months, Greer said he would support extending benefits — with conditions — so workers in retraining can complete

their education and find new jobs.

"But I'd want to make sure there's a light at the end of the tunnel," he said.

To help ensure that, Greer said, he would like the recipients to maintain a minimum grade point average — and understand that the aid package would not be perpetual.

"We help them now, and then they help somebody else," Greer said.

The candidate has some misgivings with the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) but, like the ESA, realizes it would never be repealed.

One major change Greer would like to see is that no more unfunded mandates come out of Washington.

"Hammering our border towns, that's not right," he said, regarding required actions that local governing entities are forced to finance.

Greer said the U.S. now has a "unique opportunity" with President Bush and Republic of Mexico President Vicente Fox to sit down and talk about their responsibilities to the people.

Greer said he is working toward meeting with Mexican Sen. Jeff Jones and setting up a liaison with the Mexican government.

Done correctly, he said, there could be major development on each side of the border.

One issue facing the district, as well as all of the Southwest, is water.

For a solution to that issue, Greer is looking to technology — and the coastal regions — for answers.

Looking to technology for the solution doesn't surprise Las Cruces real estate broker Dan Delaney.

"He is exactly what you see," Delaney said. "He's not thinking about what to say or how to say it. He just says it as it is."

Greer said there also has to be a long-term solution found

to the water rights issue, and not temporary fixes.

The candidate believes technology presently exists, or could soon with some tweaking that would have coastal cities using the oceans for their water source.

This, Greer said, would reduce the mining of the inland aquifers. Then, as the technology and applications continue, the coastal waters could be pumped to metropolitan areas inland, as well.

Greer said he has been given information indicating Otero County, alone, has adequate supplies to provide water for all of New Mexico for the next 1,000 years — if the salt content can be reduced sufficiently.

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Hopper works to promote agricultural literacy as director of the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau's Agriculture in the Classroom program. After earning her bachelor's degree in family and consumer sciences and master's degree in agricultural and extension education from NMSU, Hopper worked briefly as an Extension home economist in Valencia County before taking her current job.

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"The level of food deprivation in this wealthy nation puts millions of children at risk for multiple developmental problems," says Katherine Alaimo, who obtained her Ph.D. at Cornell in 2000 and now is a community health scholar at the University of Michigan.

Alaimo conducted the studies for her doctoral dissertation using data from the National Center for Health Statistics, with Cornell nutritional sciences Professor Christine Olson and Associate Professor Edward Frongillo.

One study looks at how hunger is linked to depression and suicide attempts among adolescents. The other links hunger with the cognitive, academic and psychosocial development of school-age children.

The Cornell researchers found that young people, ages 15 to 16, in homes where there is not always enough to eat are five times more likely to attempt suicide, compared with well-fed adolescents.

They also are four times more likely to suffer from chronic, low-grade depression, which is a high-risk factor for major depression, are almost twice as likely to have been suspended from school, and have more problems getting along with their peers.

Young people, ages 6 to 12, who live in families with enough food are twice as likely to have seen a psychologist.

Willis places three horses in Ruidoso Futurity

■ Corona Coquette led the field with a time of 17.515 in the 16th of 23 trial races for the first leg of the Quarter Horse Triple Crown

Horse racing is a sport of many uncertainties. And more than often, getting a horse into any stakes race is just as much a matter of luck as any amount of preparation or training.

Trainer Ed Willis certainly considers himself lucky after trials were run for the Ruidoso Futurity last week in the first day of racing at Ruidoso Downs — but he also believes his horses are the ones to beat.

Willis was without a doubt the most successful trainer on that day, as he qualified three horses for the first leg of the Quarter Horse Triple Crown. That includes the two fastest horses in the field — both of whom ran into an unrelenting wind which affected every horse equally.

"I thought I had four good shots, but I was lucky to get three," Willis said. "You've got to have things go right on race day, but you also have to have some good horses."

Corona Coquette was the fastest qualifier on the day, posting a time of 17.515 in the 16th race on Friday, while stable mate Southern Cartel ran a 17.568 in the third race.

That the two horses were the front-runners shouldn't come as too much of a surprise, the duo are descendants of Corona Cartel, a horse which won \$557,142 in 14 starts.

"I think everyone will have to outrun the two I've got," Willis said. "I hadn't seen them since they ran (Friday), but they should be OK."

Willis also qualified two other horses in the Futurity, including Red River Crossing, which ran a time of 17.707 in the 15th race Friday.

Willis was the only trainer to have more than one horse qualify, but the remaining field boasts some pretty big names.

John Bassett — last year's Quarter Horse Association Trainer of the Year — qualified Slew Ta Fame with the fourth-fastest time of 17.649, Blaine Wood has

Fast First Call, Roy Marcom qualified First Place Affair and Russell Harris saw Ritz Cartel get in with a time of 17.745.

Slew Ta Fame and Fast First Call are two state-bred horses. Slew Ta Fame, a brown filly by Dash Ta Fame out of Slew A Po Ta by Slewacka, is owned by Paul Troost of Lake Arthur. Fast First Call, a sorrel filly by Heza Fast Man out of Might Be A First by First Down Dash, is owned by Richard R. Shearer of Portales.

This year's Ruidoso Futurity is estimated at \$561,446 and is the first race in the Quarter Horse Triple Crown. Both the futurity and the Ruidoso

Rodeo showcases area ranch hand talent

CAPITAN — Most rodeos are professional affairs in which most participants ride or rope for about 10 seconds, return to their trailer and change back into their tennis shoes.

But then there are ranch rodeos — rodeos in which actual ranch hands show off the skills they need to do their job every day.

One such rodeo was the 13th annual Lincoln County Ranch Rodeo, held Saturday at the Capitan Fairgrounds. Eight teams from seven area ranches came to the rodeo to hone their working skills.

The rodeo was divided into five events —

Remuda race, team penning, team branding, team tying and wild cow milking.

In the remuda race, the opening event in Saturday's rodeo, four team members turn their horses loose in a pen, then each use a hulahop — rather than a regular lasso — to get them back. They all must saddle their steeds and cross the line at the same time.

In team penning, team members are presented with a number of calves. They must then isolate specified calves and herd them in a pen — all while being timed.

Team roping is similar to team penning,

Little League out of any town.

Indeed, Phillip believes USSSA and Little League can co-exist and even thrive in the same community.

"In Little League, they play a couple of games a week, and have no tournaments until the end of the year," Lathram said. "In USSSA, you can play your Little League games, and then there are tournaments every weekend."

"You can benefit all the kids and both programs," he added. "When it comes to all-star time for Little League, those kids have already played in four or five tournaments."

For all the teams, excitement and obvious benefit to the community, only two local teams threw their hat in the ring this year: The Ruidoso Warriors in the 13u division and the Ruidoso Eagles in 12u.

Neither local team did particularly well — they lost every game they played. But for Warriors coach Greg Kopacka, who is in charge of a CPS youth program, the teams still met their goals.

"Our job is to teach these kids life skills," Kopacka said. "Our target age group is 12 to 13 years old, and we started a sports-related program last year to give the kids something to do once school was out for the summer."

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Ruidoso Eagles coach Victor Montes is a close friend of the Lathrams, having moved to Ruidoso from Hobbs last year. Montes was a strong pro-USSSA advocate and has gone so far
