Council asks Eggleston for water group

Task force similar to forest group

Ruidoso village officials hope a new Water Task Force formed last week will produce the same type of success as a forest task force that submitted its report and recommendations for new regulations in May.

Councilors Ron Hardeman and Deborah Marcum-Byars asked Mayor Leon Eggleston to

enough to say maybe we need to shut the door to tourism and take care of what is ours first."

One expert at the workshop stood up and cited places where water demand exceeds supply. Ruidoso was on that list, she said.

"With water as big an issue as it is and with the uncertainty we're facing, I'm asking for a task force," Hardeman said. "We have a lot of knowledgeable people concerned here in the village — not staff or elected individuals.

They should have a date to report back so it's not open-ended."

Byars said she's read about other communities that are more proactive about water conservation. She wants a system that ensures that everyone sacrifices equally when restrictions are imposed, she said. The council also must be willing to hire a code enforcement officer, if that's what it takes, she said.

At a recent water workshop, State Engineer Tom Turney asked her if Ruidoso is prepared to call a moratorium on growth, Byars said.

"I didn't answer," she said. "Some citizens are worried

happening in Texas, a person can't sell a home because the buyer can't get insurance on it."

Eggleston set a 90-day deadline for the council to receive a report from the new task force, which will be headed by urban forester Rick DeLaco, who also directed the forest task force.

Other members appointed were Dick Wisner and Ben Mason of the Ruidoso River Association, Pete Thompson, engineer Bill Midkiff, real estate representatives Rose Peebles and Harvey Foster, fisherman and business owner Jim Shoop, Myrtle and T.E.

Close races in county

Pearce leading Congressional race; Sanchez vs. Bradley for governor

Poll workers in Lincoln County often sat idle during the primary election Tuesday.

Counting 734 early voters and 237 absentees, by 10 p.m., with five precincts still out, the turnout appeared to be slightly higher than 30 percent of the 10,650 who were registered with a political party and eligible to vote in the primary.

With about 75 percent of the vote reported, Republicans, who outnumber Democrats in the county nearly two to one, appeared in the county picked Martha McKnight Proctor as the new magistrate judge for Division I in Carrizozo and returned incumbent Division II Magistrate Judge William Butts to the bench in Ruidoso. They picked Beverly Payne Calaway as the new county treasurer. The race for county clerk was close with Tammie Maddox at 769 votes to 648 for Robin Ralkin and 496 for Sam Chavez. No Democrats ran in those races.

In other local races, members of the two

major parties selected their candidates for the general election Nov. 5.

For County Commissioner in District 2, Democrat Mike Runnels was unopposed. Leading on the Republican side, Bill Chance had 72 votes to Maury St. John's 64 votes.

In District 4, Democrat Darrel Don Stierwalt will face the winner of the Republican primary. Earl B. Hobbs was leading on the Republican side with 109 vote in a close race against Frank Higgins with 106. Trailing were Bob E. Johnson with 62 votes and Curtis Payne with 96.

The County Commission race in District 5 race probably will see incumbent Republican Rick Simpson face Democrat Ralph Romero in the general election. Simpson led with 197 votes in the Republican primary against Orlando Montes Jr. with 167 and Humberto Maldonado with 35.

Romero, a Democrat, was substantially ahead with 90 votes to Reynaldo Valcarcel's 36 votes.

Several races still were undecided at press time because they involve more than

one county or are statewide.

Probably the most important for Lincoln County is the run for the 2nd Congressional District, for which two local Republicans vied against three others for that party's nomination.

Although final results were not available, Capitan rancher and restaurant owner Ed Tinsley had slipped to third after Steve Pearce and Phelps Anderson. Leo Martinez, a Lincoln County commissioner and businessman, had garnered 6 percent of the vote to come in fourth ahead of C. Earl Greer. On the Democratic side, John Arthur Smith led with 54 percent and Ruben A. Smith had 46 percent with 65 percent of the votes counted.

Martinez and Tinsley fared better in Lincoln County with 75 percent of the vote counted. Tinsley pulled 555 votes for the top number, followed by Pearce with 506 and Martinez with 496.

With incomplete results in the race for the Republican nominee for State Representative from District 57, which includes Chavez County, incumbent Dan

Village worker shocked by power line, recovers

Charlie Chavez, a Solid Waste Department employee, flew 27 feet after taking the electric jolt.

A Solid Waste Department employee was thrown 27 feet from a lightning loader/grapple truck when the truck's arm hit an electric power line in Upper Canyon Friday.

Charlie Chavez, a truck driver with the Village of Ruidoso Solid Waste Department was operating the mechanical arm to load pine needles and tree debris into the truck when the arm struck an electrical power line in the 100 block of West Riverside Drive May 31.

The power line then touched the truck, giving Chavez a shock that sent him flying 27 feet and sparking a fire in the bed of the truck where refuse was collected, according to the police report.

Chavez remained unconscious for about 30 seconds after Ruidoso police officers arrived on the scene, and was taken to Lincoln County Medical Center where he was examined.

"They couldn't find anything seriously wrong with him and he was released the same day," Leonard Corona, director of Solid Waste, said. "He doesn't remember having been thrown, how he ended up where he was at."

The Ruidoso Fire Department and U.S. Forest Service extinguished the fire, and Chavez returned to work Monday but will see a doctor again next week.

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P&Z chairman wants tougher hillside protection

■ Infractions are not being dealt with properly, Glen Barrow said.

Tighter enforcement of approved site plans is needed to ensure property owners don't ignore restrictions and slice into hillsides, says the chairman of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission.

Glen Barrow passed around photographs of a lot in the Camelot subdivision.

"They excavated and excavated," he said last month at the end of a board meeting. "They've taken all the trees and dirt. I'd like to see what was approved for that lot."

Village planning and zoning director Mike Runnels said he's aware of the problem and will send out a village planning specialist and a code enforcement officer to check the site.

"It doesn't conform to the site development plan," he

said. "It's far exceeded that. It's a disturbing situation, but I don't know how far we can push for total restoration. There may be some requirement in the hillside protection provisions to restore a portion of what was removed."

Barrow said that's not good enough.

"A cease and desist order should be issued until the situation is rectified," he said.

"We discussed that this morning," Runnels said. "An order could be issued until they come back with a remedial plan."

Still not good enough, Barrow said.

"They weren't granted a variance. They should comply with what was presented and approved," he said.

"We could take them to court," Runnels replied.

"Why court?" Barrow asked. "Issue a cease and desist order until they comply with the site plan they presented. Don't just fine them and let them go to the next lot."

The site already was red-

tagged, but work has continued, Barrow said.

"I thought we had a checklist," he said. "If everyone is signing that, they are agreeing to comply."

Runnels said if the land isn't restored, the owner will need a retaining wall that is designed by an engineer.


"Some of these lots would be unbuildable unless they do something like this," said Commission Member Bill Hirschfeld.

"They would be unbuildable in most of the state, but this village relaxed the restrictions," Runnels said.

The time may be right to revisit hillside protection and tighten the rules, commission members agreed.

The director said his office also is looking into a lot on Flume Canyon Road where a D-9 bulldozer "pushed half the lot into the river and left everything there."

"Obviously, people think they are going to build a road and a house, but they haven't been in to see us yet."

Commission will hear public on county subdivision changes

A vote to renew the ban on open fires and charcoal grills also on the agenda

With no rain and a wildfire threat that increases each day, the Lincoln County Commission is expected to renew its ban on open fires and charcoal grills for another month.

The commission will meet at 8 a.m. Friday at the courthouse in Carrizozo primarily to validate results of the primary election Tuesday. But among the 19 other items on the agenda, a public hearing is set for 9 a.m. to consider changes to the county subdivision ordinance. The board previously approved the changes concerning proof of water supply and collateral to guarantee completion of improvements, which had to be reviewed and signed off on by several state agencies before final action.

Other items listed on the agenda include:
• County Manager Tom Stewart notified commissioners that indigent health care claims for the year to date total \$138,678 compared to \$47,480 for last year. This past month, the claims coordinator processed 28 claims and recommended 14 for approval for \$25,618.

Under claims filed through the sole community provider category involving the Lincoln County Medical Center, 53 claims were processed this month and 39 were recommended for approval totaling \$25,611. Year to date, payments hit \$422,886 compared to \$289,788 last year.

• The county manager wrote that he received

notice from the Farm and Ranch Heritage Museum that its staff was successful in convincing the State Highway Commission to place the moving of the Green Bridge in Hondo on the state and local transportation improvement plan. Although the project currently is not funded, its status as an alternative funding project may pave the way. Plans call for the museum staff to reassemble the bridge on museum grounds in Las Cruces.

• Instead of renovating a portion of the show barn at the county fairgrounds in Capitan, the entire structure will be replaced at no additional cost, Stewart wrote. The Fair Board will keep the disassembled materials.

• Two new applications to the State Engineer's Office. On April 12, James D. Kerley Estates and S. Lee Ware Estate based in Irving, Texas, filed for a permit to change the location of a well and place the use of a 1.6 acre-foot per annum of shallow groundwater by ceasing diversion. The move from well is about one-half mile southwest of San Patricio and the move to well is about five miles west of San Patricio. An acre foot equates to about 325,851 gallons of water.

On April 26, Rancho Ruidoso Village Water Company, based in El Paso, Texas, filed to use an exploratory well to supplement four existing shallow wells about four miles northeast of Alto. The permit would cover the continued diversion of up to 251.875 afpa and for temporary use of 97.5 afpa until May 31, 2010.

Lincoln, Otero counties joined in application for emergency equipment federal funding

Although Lincoln County officials assembled a list of priorities for part of \$37.7 billion allocated for Homeland Defense next year through the Federal Emergency Management Agency, the ground rules changed last month.

County Manager Tom Stewart said that at the May 23 session dealing with the \$20 million to \$80 million that may be sent to New Mexico, he learned the state decided to lump Lincoln with Otero County as Homeland Region 7.

"At a meeting May 29, in

Alamogordo, our plans were combined with Otero's for submission to the state," he said. If approved, the grant could generate about \$800,000 for communication and response equipment.

A joint-powers arrangement will be needed between New Mexico and bordering states, designed to share resources when situations overwhelm local capacities, he said.

At the county commission's May meeting, Stewart listed the county's needs as \$40,000 for an emergency medical services specialized utility vehicle, \$21,000 for Global Star cell phones, two for each munici-

pality and four for the county, \$60,000 for two search and rescue vehicles, \$120,000 for a county SATCOM systems, including three base stations and 30 mobiles, \$140,000 for mobile command posts, two for the county and two for Ruidoso, and six emergency services vehicles for \$180,000.

Among others, he identified potential targets as local airports, water treatment plants, public schools, the detention center in Carrizozo, the forest around Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Alto for fire, five village halls and the county courthouse, area dams and the natural gas pipeline system.

Care center sale Saturday

Supporters of the Ruidoso Care Center are looking for donations of items to be sold at a rummage sale Saturday — and they hope plenty of buyers show up to purchase them.

for their total care, said Vaunda King-Stenzel, who was instrumental in saving the center from closure last year. The only nursing home in Lincoln County, the center later was sold to a community group.

Dottie Olson will be at the center this week from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily to accept items. Donation receipts will be issued for tax purposes.

Foley was ahead with 62 percent compared to Ruidoso attorney Adam Raffkin's 38 percent. Raffkin fared better in his home county, besting Foley with 596 votes to 455.

The winner will face Democrat Doris Cherry in the general election. Cherry had no opposition. Neither did incumbent State Rep. Dub Williams, a Republican in District 56, and Avon W. Wilson, a Republican in District 59. All three districts include portions of Lincoln County.

• **Governor** — In Lincoln County: Republican John A. Sanchez was leading at press time with 1,093 votes, followed by Walker D. Bradley, 694, and Gilbert S. Baca, 66; and Democrat Bill Richardson had received 678 votes. Statewide, with results from 67 percent of the precincts at press time, Republican John Sanchez was leading with 57 percent or 30,569 votes, followed by Walter Bradley, 37 percent, 20,089 votes; Robert Burpo, 4 percent, 2,150 votes; and Gilbert Baca, 2 percent, 1,103 votes.

• **Lieutenant Governor** — Lincoln County: Republican Rod Adair led at press time with 763 votes, followed by William F. Davis with 479 and Judy Vanderstar Russel with 467; Democrat Diane Denish

led with 471 votes, followed by Jerry Sandel with 255 votes. Statewide, with 68 percent of the precincts in, Democrat Diane Denish led with 59 percent or 51,466 votes, followed by Jerry Sandel with 41 percent, 35,336 votes; Republican Rod Adair led with 41 percent, 20,318, followed by William Davis with 30 percent, 14,765, and Judy Vanderstar Russell, 29 percent, 13,961.

• **U.S. Senator** — Lincoln County: Republican Pete V. Domenici had received 1,846 votes at presstime, Democrats Gloria Tristani 536 and Francesca Lobato 142 votes. Statewide, Republican Pete V. Domenici received 52,215 votes with 68 percent of the precincts in, and Democrat Gloria Tristani led with 78 percent or 60,659 votes, followed by Francesca Lobato, and 22 percent or 16,762 votes.

• **State Treasurer** — No Republicans ran; Lincoln County: Jan Goodwin, 378 votes, Robert E. Vigil, 218 votes, Ken Sanchez, 101 votes. Statewide, Robert Vigil, 40 percent or 32,419 votes, Jan Goodwin, 37 percent or 29,607 votes, and Ken Sanchez, 23 percent of 18,580 votes.

• **Commissioner of Public Lands, District 2** — Lincoln County: Republican Patrick H. Lyons was leading at press time with 1,178 votes, followed by Rick J. Lopez; Democrat Tom Mills was leading with

304 votes, followed by Art E. Trujillo with 252 votes, and Cisco McSorley with 80 votes. Statewide, Republican Patrick Lyons was leading with 73 percent or 34,747 votes, and Rick Lopez had 27 percent or 13,023 votes; Democrat Art Trujillo led at press time with 52 percent or 41,113 votes, Cisco McSorley had 25 percent or 19,248 votes, and Tom Mills pulled 23 percent or 18,158 votes.

• **Public Regulatory Commission, District 2** — With no Democrats running, Republican David King led the Lincoln County race with 333 votes to Rory McMinn's 189. Statewide, King received 52 percent of the vote (9,719 votes) to McMinn's 48 percent (8,888) with 92 percent of precincts reporting.

• **State representative, District 57** — Lincoln County: Republican Adam D. Raffkin led at presstime with 596 votes, followed by Dan Foley with 455; Democrat Doris Mae Cherry ran unopposed and received 342; statewide, Democrat Dan

Foley received 62 percent with 1,975 votes, followed by Adam D. Raffkin with 38 percent or 1,202 votes.

Clerk says voting 'slow to medium'

Despite the addition of new subprecincts, changes in polling places and a complicated series of ballots, Lincoln County's primary election proceeded smoothly Tuesday. County Clerk Martha Proctor said being assigned new voting sites didn't seem to be the problem for most voters.

She stationed a representative at the Ruidoso Convention Center to guide people to proper precincts just in case. The center previously served for all of Ruidoso, but could not be used for this election.

"Most of the calls came from people who showed to vote, but had registered as 'decline to state,'" Proctor said. "They wanted to vote, but in

New Mexico you have to register a party affiliation to participate in a primary. Many probably come from states where that's not the system."

Although the county has 12,659 registered voters, only 10,650 signed up as members of the Republican or Democratic parties, which had candidates in the primary.

"The second most common call came from people who changed their registration or registered after the 28-day cut off date, May 7," Proctor said. "They will be eligible to vote in the general election or any special election that should come up."

Reports from her poll workers as the work day ended indicate that the voter turnout was "slow to medium," Proctor said.

It's the 'City of Ruidoso Downs' come Monday

What's in a name? A whole lot, according to the elected Ruidoso Downs trustees, who narrowly decided last week to declare their municipality a "city."

Enough, say the trustees, to move up on government lists (C before V, presumably), and maybe avoid being overlooked on funding and training opportunities.

Village administrator John Waters says the new label will make Ruidoso Downs sound like a progressive, business-friendly place.

Some residents present at the meeting suggested reverting to the community's roots and adapting the name Green Tree or Palo Verde — both

used in the early years of the last century. Makes sense, if the council really wanted to avoid confusion. But that, it was said, would take a vote of the residents.

This way, it'll be a done deal by Monday.

Trustees gave the change in name approval by a 3-2 margin, with Mayor Bob Miller breaking the tie. We do have to wonder if a behind-the-scenes motive simply is to play one-upmanship on neighboring Ruidoso, which in the 2000 census tallied 7,698 residents vs. 1,824 in the Downs.

Surely not.

But then they did choose to skip "town," the obvious next step up, in favor of "city." Wow.

A 'Green Destiny' seen for supercomputing tasks

LOS ALAMOS — The supercomputers of the future will never crash and will cost far less to run than today's machines. At least that's the vision of a scientist at the National Nuclear Security Administration's Los Alamos National Laboratory.

"Everyone's fixed on the mantra of performance at all costs," said Wu Feng of Los Alamos' Advanced Computing Laboratory. "What we've done is redefine the price-to-performance ratio to look at efficiency, reliability and availability, in other words, total cost of ownership."

Feng and colleagues Michael Warren and Eric Weigle developed the first of this new breed of high-performing, low-cost computers, which they named

"Green Destiny." The machine has been operating with unprecedented stability and performance efficiency for more than eight months in a dusty warehouse where temperatures routinely reach 85-degrees Fahrenheit.

Feng, Warren and Weigle argue that the costs of computing should include electrical power, infrastructure, air conditioning, floor space, time lost to system failures and salaries for the people needed to keep finicky machines operating. Supercomputers of the future may very well be similar to Green Destiny, they say: small, extremely stable and miserly in their power use.

Green Destiny represents a new "flavor" of supercomputer, Feng said. The machine packs 240 Transmeta proces-

sors that operate at 667 MegaHertz, mounted onto a half-inch-slim compact motherboard, or blade. A total of 24 blades then mount into a RLX Technologies System 324 chassis, and then 10 chassis, with network switches, are mounted in a standard computer rack.

Currently computing at a peak rate of 160-billion operations per second, Green Destiny uses less than 10 percent of the electricity and 25 percent of the space to give performance comparable to the previous generation of so-called cluster computers. Green Destiny, whose processors operate roughly one-tenth as hot as market-leading chips, has been running continuously since September without special cooling.

Judge fines Texan for ignoring open fire rules

Magistrate judge William Butts said it's important to show county means business

Judge William Butts charged an El Paso man \$300 in fines and \$51 in court fees for violating an ordinance that bans open fires on private land during extreme fire danger conditions.

Robert C. Gonzales pleaded no contest in magistrate court to a citation from the U.S. Forest Service.

Butts promised to fine future offenders the same maximum amount for a violation he characterized as "extreme."

"It's a very serious violation. We want to protect our forest

and our animals and keep it safe with this extreme dryness and drought.

People who won't read the signs or pay attention to the signs are just going to get it," Judge Butts said.

The maximum penalty can also include 90 days incarceration, but Butts said there is no room in the jail.

Hoot Murray, patrol captain with the U.S. Forest Service, was patrolling in Kraut Canyon at Bonito

Lake on May 4 at about 8:30 p.m. when he saw the fire and about eight people gathered around it.

"I explained how many signs he had to pass leaving

Ruidoso to go there," Murray said, referring to signs stating that open fires are not allowed.

Murray described the fire as a "fairly large ambient fire."

In court on May 14, Gonzales argued that the fire was small.

"I get all kinds of excuses," Butts said. "Any fire in Lincoln County is dangerous."

He said the fine reflects the mood of the county.

"It's important to us because we don't want to see Ruidoso burn down or Bonito Lake," Murray said.

Gonzales could not be reached for comment.

Budget squeaks through, could see some trouble next year

The village had to dip into reserves to avoid layoffs, other cuts.

Village officials must find more sources of revenue over the next year or face cuts in employees and services in fiscal year 2003-2004, Ruidoso Village Manager Alan Briley warned.

Although the council squeaked by this year, its luck probably will run out next year if revenue from gross receipts taxes doesn't increase and self-imposed reserves are gobbled up in the 2002-2003 fiscal year.

His words set the mood for a review of the village's preliminary \$25.5 million budget that was sent to the state Department of Finance and Administration for approval or changes. Of that amount, general fund expenses were listed as \$6.5 million, debt service expense at \$2,689,623, restricted use funds at \$1.5 million, capital improvements a \$3.9 million and the utility fund at \$5.1 million.

This budget was difficult to prepare, Briley said. He and finance officer Lorri McKnight are worried because they see a trend of increasing recurring expenses, with revenue sources that just can't keep up. Aggravating the situation is a

lower than expected return from gross receipt taxes.

"We have received 11 out of 12 months of our gross receipts taxes and have projected \$485,000 for next month," Briley said. To date, the village collected \$6.3 million, but may fall short about \$127,000 from the budget projection for 2001-2002, he said.

Departments that are supported by the general fund, such as police, fire and street, are being hurt the hardest, because they rely on the economy, Briley said.

Other services that operate based on fees can increase their charges as needed. Because he and McKnight are conservative in their revenue projections, the village traditionally has received \$400,000 more than anticipated, but this year, they started with a deficit of nearly \$600,000.

The village was hit by an 18 percent increase in liability insurance and a 20 percent increase in its contribution to employee health premiums. Briley also is recommending a 2 percent increase in the village's contribution to employee's state

retirement, equating to another \$90,000.

In response to his cry for cuts, department heads dropped their budgets between 5 percent and 34 percent. The street department sliced \$200,000, he said.

But the deficit still was \$500,000.

"We promised the department heads we would ask the council to dip into the \$500,000 (self-imposed) financial reserve that's sitting in a savings account," he said. The money is over and above the one-month \$545,000 reserve required by the state.

"The alternative to preserve the savings is to cut programs, personnel and operations (for 2002-2003)," Briley said. "We won't have the savings account to dip into next year and will be looking at \$450,000 in layoffs or other cuts if no new recurring revenues are created in the general fund."

Councilor Deborah Marcum-Byars pointed out the village already has the highest gross receipts tax in the state. Year-around residents should pick up the major costs associated with services they require, not tourists, she contended, saying

'TAYLOR'S KIDS'

■ Eight years ago, a Hondo-area rancher promised some third- and fourth-graders college scholarships, if they kept their grades up. And it happened this year.

A promise made to third- and fourth-grade students in the Hondo Valley Public Schools in 1994, was fulfilled this year for seven graduating seniors when they became eligible for \$10,000 each in college scholarships.


Patrick F. Taylor, who then owned the Circle Bar West Ranch in Hondo and Taylor Energy Company in New Orleans, La., visited the third and fourth grade classes and promised them college scholarships if they kept their grades up through graduation from high school and then on through the college of their choice.

The students had to maintain at least a B average each year, and at the end of the school year, Taylor deposited \$500 in an interest-bearing account in the Valley Bank of Commerce in Roswell in the name of each student. The guidelines given to the students at the time stipulated that if their grades fell below a B average, they had a year to bring up their grades.

For those students who continued studying in Hondo, the school sent grades to the Patrick Taylor Foundation, which had been created for the scholarships. Those who transferred to another school would be treated on a case-by-case basis, as far as eligibility for the scholarships was concerned.

There were 35 students in third and fourth grades when Taylor announced the scholarship program.

Four students graduating from Hondo had maintained their grades, as well as two, Christina Sanchez and Tyler Sisneros, who graduated from

New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell, and Pamela Fietek, who graduated in Alamogordo.

While Patrick Taylor was not present graduation night, his wife, Phyllis Taylor, was there May 24 at a special reception to congratulate those students who are the recipients of the \$10,000 scholarships for their college careers.

"The key words are attendance, attention in class, study and completed homework," the guidelines state. "It is also expected that students will keep out of trouble, abstain from the use of abusive and illegal substances and obey the law."

Students will receive their scholarship money once they've enrolled in college and completed one semester, maintaining at least a 2.3 grade point average. After their freshman year, they must maintain at least a 2.5 grade point average to continue receiving the funds.

"Every year the executive director of the foundation or board members sent a letter to the children saying 'Congratulations, you're still in the program,'" said Donna Sisneros, mother of graduating senior Tyler Sisneros and a teacher in the Hondo schools.

"I feel like I'm lucky to have been involved," Tyler Sisneros said. "Mr. and Mrs. Taylor are very special people."

Fabien Sanchez plans to study wildlife management at New Mexico State University in Alamogordo.

Christina Sanchez said she transferred to New Mexico Military Institute when she was in her sophomore year because she thought she'd do better in college if she went to a college preparatory school. She wrote to Taylor explaining why she was making the move, and he kept her in the scholarship program.

In fourth grade, she said, she knew she would be rewarded if she maintained the required standards, and that's what kept her going and working towards higher grades.

"It helps me go on to college and better my education," she said. "A lot of the kids that actually got it wouldn't have been able to otherwise. It helps me to know I can do it if I put my mind to it and there are people out there willing to help you as long as you're willing to do your part."

Sanchez will be going through basic training with the U.S. Army in a couple weeks, and then will continue studying at NMMI for two years. She also has legislative and ROTC scholarships. Her long-term goals are Army or National Guard with a major in business management to fall back on, she said.

Sarah Davidson-Sanchez plans to study at Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso for her first two years, and then transfer for the last two years. She said knowing about the scholarship didn't really influence her, that she "just happened to make good grades," but "it was a relief, reassuring just to know the money's there, you don't have to worry about it."

Davidson-Sanchez said she's not sure what direction her career will go in, but right now she's "looking at photography."

Unusual UNM-LANL program probes Earth through its volcanoes

LOS ALAMOS - A collaboration between the U.S. Department of Energy's Los Alamos National Laboratory and the University of New Mexico has resulted in a successful, one-of-a-kind educational program where students can get a first-hand glimpse into the esoteric world of volcanology.

Fraser Goff - who has done numerous field studies of some of the world's most dangerous volcanoes - highlighted the UNM-LANL Volcanology program during an invited talk at the American Geophysical Union's spring meeting in Washington last week.

Goff is one of a half dozen Los Alamos researchers who teach classes for the volcanology

program, joining three UNM professors who also teach.

"The UNM-LANL Volcanology program really has two major things going for it that help make it the success that it is," said Goff. "First, we have unique expertise and exceptional research facilities as a result of being affiliated with the two institutions of UNM and Los Alamos. Second, we have an extensive volcanic record preserved in New Mexico."

Indeed, the Land of Enchantment is home to hundreds of volcanoes. Most are relatively easy to access and study.

Started in 1991 by UNM Professor Emeritus Wolf

Elston, the UNM-LANL Volcanology program has nurtured more than 100 budding volcanologists at the undergraduate and graduate level. Courses have ranged from basic volcanology to how volcanoes have played a role in human affairs from ancient times to the present. And the program offers one thing that no other volcanology program offers: A nearly month-long field-study course that uses the volcanically famous Jemez Mountains and Valles Caldera of Northern New Mexico as a classroom setting.

world who apply. Every other year we get 30 to 40 applicants, but we can only accommodate 17. Those who get in absolutely love the experience they gain from the course."

Volcanoes provide an opportunity for volcanologists to gain insight into Earth's history by studying the origins of magma; they learn the roles that volcanoes can play in Earth's atmosphere and in global climate change; and they gather clues

about a region's history by looking at the geology forged by the fires of volcanism.

Goff as well as anyone can appreciate what volcanoes have to offer. The Los Alamos volcanologist has braved furnace-like temperatures, clouds of poisonous gases and acid lakes on numerous occasions to gather fluids, rocks and gases from active volcanoes - volcanoes that in some cases have taken the lives of colleagues. But the samples Goff has gathered have helped him understand whether cold fusion is going on inside the earth as a natural process (it's not), whether volcanoes give out subtle clues that signal an impending eruption (they might), or whether volcanoes

unearth precious minerals such as gold (they do).

Goff's volcanology experiences make him an enthusiastic teacher. His colleagues who teach courses for the UNM-LANL Volcanology program are equally enthusiastic and experienced. Together the researchers are eager to pass on their knowledge and experience.

"Volcanology is an important aspect of Earth Science," Goff said. "I love to teach volcanology, and those universities that do feature volcanology programs don't have the laboratory resources that we have available here, nor the setting we have in which to teach. Just like everybody else, I love volcanoes."

Local man tied to Navy rescue

Austin Hampton, son of part-time Ruidosoan, honored for heroic effort

Timothy Hampton of El Paso and Ruidoso has a lot to be proud of these days.

His son, Damage Control Second Class Petty Officer Austin Chase Hampton, was recently awarded the Navy Marine Corps Commendation Medal for Heroic Achievement. Petty Officer Hampton, a graduate of Ruidoso High School, has been enlisted in the Navy now for four years and two months.

He has recently transferred from the USS Inchon MCS-12 to the Mine Warfare Training Center in Ingleside, Texas, where he will be a Shipboard Fire Fighting instructor.

According to a release, on

Oct. 19, 2001, Hampton's ship lost all electrical power. The ship's fire party (comprised of about 15 sailors) then gathered in the hangar bay.

When Hampton got there, a friend of his told him there had been some kind of explosion in the ship's boiler room.

Acting on instinct, Hampton ran to the boiler room entrance, where he found several of his shipmates choking and gasping for air from the thick black smoke pouring out of it. Hampton rushed into the space, verifying that none of his shipmates were left in it. He began closing the entrance to the fire room and started the installed fire fighting sys-

tem.

As a result of his actions, Hampton is said to have saved his ship, and shipmates. Unfortunately, MM3 Ronnie Palm lost his life battling the blaze inside the fire room. Palm was awarded the Navy Marine Corps Medal posthumously for his heroic and brave actions.

Hampton was awarded a citation for his efforts.

"Petty Officer Hampton's courage, perseverance and loyal devotion to duty reflected credit upon himself and is in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service," the citation said.

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

Grindstone aids water stability

By pumping water from Grindstone Reservoir to Ruidoso's 10-million-gallon storage tanks, village officials averted a total ban on lawn irrigation despite heavy use after Memorial Day.

Village Manager Alan Briley told council members last week that he was considering a move into Phase III of water restrictions that would have prohibited all irrigation except by handheld hose or bucket. But the water department staff hooked up a pump that successfully is pumping a half million gallons of water per day from the reservoir to the storage tanks, he said.

Normally, the Grindstone water travels to Sudderth Drive and areas south. Portions of the village to the north are supplied by North

Fork and Eagle Creek wells. But with the pump, those "upper" areas are receiving more water from Grindstone, allowing the wells to recharge, he said. Between the two sources, 1.2 million is being pumped per day, Briley said.

"I feel comfortable that even with the amount of use over the weekend, production seemed to have kept up with demand," the manager said. "We had only a small drop in the tanks from Tuesday, the day people could water (by sprinklers and irrigation systems). I feel comfortable with productions and the wells. I don't think we're likely to have to go into Phase III in the near future."

Under Phase II, people can water by sprinklers only before 10 a.m. and after 3 p.m. on Tuesday. They can water by hand during those hours any day of the week.

Arrington, water department official Ken Mosley and former village and county manager Frank Potter.

Although one man suggested that a permanent committee would be more useful, Eggleston said he wanted a timely report with action steps. Those steps may include formation of a permanent board, but the task force also will look at water charges and conservation methods.

In other actions, the council:

- May look at the lodgers tax as a source to pay for recreational improvements. Village Attorney John Underwood said state statutes allow spending the money on anything related to the promotion of tourism, including building soccer fields and tennis courts.

- Asked Underwood to draft an agreement with the Rio Hondo chapter of the Red Cross to use the dispatch area at the old police complex on Wingfield as its headquarters.

Rent would be \$1 per year.

- Subject to review by Underwood, approved a joint powers agreement between the Ruidoso Police Department and the newly formed Mescalero Apache Fire Department to assist each other.

- Approved a moratorium on banners that cross Sudderth Drive until a funding source is found to buy a permanent and safe structure. The current situation is a liability to the village, because the power poles installed to carry banners are not strong enough to carry the wind load, Briley said.

- Approved a vacation of a public right of way on lot 8B, Block 9 of Country Club estates for Russell H. Scott, subject to conditions recommended by the planning and zoning commission and staff.

- Agreed to schedule a public hearing for June 18 on recommendations for ordinances from the Forest Task Force.

Village officials expressed regret as well.


"You've really done a wonderful job," Mayor Bob Miller said.

Field for Bayer Legend Derby set

In the first shot heard in this year's 2002 MBNA Challenge, a three-year-old filly coming back from a foot infection turned in the fastest time in the Bayer Legend Derby Trials May 31 at Ruidoso Downs, and her trainer is now looking ahead to fighting for the chance to represent the state.

Royal Baby Sister turned in a time of 19.71 seconds over the 400-yard race, and made trainer K.C. Carden very happy.

"We had her down at Remington Park [in Oklahoma City] in the Remington Park Derby," Carden said. "She had a bruise on her foot and ended up with an infection after the race."

After that April 21 race, Carden had the infection treated and continued training. He saw the fruits of his labors on Friday, but he acknowledged it wasn't easy.

All but one trial was run in a strong tailwind. The only one that wasn't was the final trial — the one Royal Baby Sister ran in.

"We went out there with a cross wind, so she had a little bit of a disadvantage," Carden said. "It took a pretty good speed for us to qualify, but she did everything right in the gates and broke well."

Royal Baby Sister's success isn't all that surprising, as she

won last year's All-American Futurity Consolation as a two-year-old.

Following closely on Royal Baby Sister's heels was My Time Is Rare, another filly who was just a hair slower and finished second after the four time trials.

Trainer Blaine Wood was

happy just to have a horse qualify, given that trials are the most difficult thing to get through.

"It's hard to qualify for any race, and a bit easier to win the finals," Wood said. "Anytime you're in a race, you've got to outrun those other nine. But compared to the trials, when you

have to outrun 20 or 30 horses, the odds are a lot better."

Wood said My Time Is Rare's performance last weekend was the culmination of a frustrating two years he had

spent trying to get the horse into the winners circle.

"We had high hopes for her for two years," Wood said. "She was sore or sick on us — just one thing after another. This was her last shot to run for the big money."

"She had a perfect race — she had the outside, she left the gate good, (jockey) J.J. (Gonzales)

rode her superbly — everything was perfect."

One horse who turned out to be a big surprise was Scarlest, who won the first trial with a time of 19.76. It wasn't the fastest time, but she certainly had the highest odds.

Scarlest paid \$45.80 to win

There were more dead heats in those days.

Today's computerized equipment, part of the racing industry's effort to increase the bettors' pleasure through improved technology, vertically scans a space about three-eighths of an inch wide at the wire every .0001 of a second. Each horse's nose — in sequence, first to last — is imaged at the wire. It is the nose only that counts at the finish, not an outstretched leg or

the tassel on the helmet of a forward-leaning rider.

"It's just about as fool-proof as humans can make it," said Cy Leland, vice president of operations for Trident Network Services, from which Ruidoso Downs leases the photo finish service. "There are many advantages over the old system. For one thing, we used to have to rush to develop the film, which was a nasty, messy process, read the prints wet, and the images were not always crisp, at that. More importantly, our images are in color, much easier to read than black and white. And being able to place the cursor [representing the wire] precisely on the nose of each horse in the race, we get more accurate times."

Such pinpoint accuracy begins with the placement of the video cameras at the wire. When a track is laid out, a surveyor determines the finish line and marks the location for mounting the photo finish cameras. The cameras are aligned with the surveyor's marks and bolted to the grandstand.

They never move. Separate cameras are set up for each type of race — Thoroughbred or quarter horse — because their respective finish lines, on two separate tracks, are 10 feet apart. There are also two sets of cameras for each type of race so that if one set fails the other will still record the event.

When a race is completed the computer extrapolates from the horses and

times the distances separating them. For a Thoroughbred, .0018 of a second equals one length; for a quarter horse, .0015. Fractions of a length? The computer does the math. It also sends the results instantly, once they are approved by the stewards, to Equibase, publishers of The Daily Racing Form, the state auditor and the racing office at Ruidoso Downs. In addition, results can be transmitted to monitors throughout the track for bettors to view, whereas in the past, photos were manually delivered and posted.

With all this computerized efficiency, what do the human beings do?

Fishing report for Ruidoso area, June 5, 2002

Ruidoso River: The water level in the River is still at the lowest flow reported for the past year. We are under 2 CFS and dropping. If you plan to fish the river, we suggest you concentrate your efforts below the confluence of Carrizo Creek downstream to the Gavilan Canyon Bridge. The fishing in this stretch of water has been quite good.
Special note: The Ruidoso River has a new bag limit as of April 1. In the past a five fish limit was in effect. The new limit is three fish, a good move by the NMGF Department to help conservation and a quality fishery. Concentrate efforts between Gavilan Canyon bridge and the Chamber of Commerce building. There is plenty of water here and a good amount of fish. Toss Phreasant tail nymphs and bead head Prince Nymphs. Tie a Parachute Adams or Humpty dry fly on as a lead fly, then tie a nymph dropper about 12-18 inches behind. Use the lead fly as your strike indicator. This is an effective and fun way to fish small waters. Remember to always wear eye protection.
South Fork: Closed due to fire hazard.
Bottle Lake: Closed due to fire hazard.
Eagle Lake: Eagle Lakes are open for the season. Reports are that there are lots of hungry fish. The scenery here is an 11 on a 10 scale. Great place for teaching kids or beginners alike...Toss what you've got.
Ordnance: This lake was stocked with over 500 rainbows this past week. Woolly Buggers, Zonkers and Streamers fished fairly deep have produced fish the past three weeks. For spin casters, tie on a propeller fly






