Village's fire enforcement heating up

Police citations catch smokers on the street

Fire prevention rules in Ruidoso are being enforced stringently, the incident log maintained by the Ruidoso Police Department reveals.

An officer on forest fire prevention patrol June 23 cited David S. Gonzales, 40, of Tularosa, charging him with wrongful use of public property for fishing on the southeast side of Grindstone Lake.

To get to that area, the report states, a person would have to travel through the portion of the forest closed due to extreme fire hazard.

Police cited Bryce H. Kennedy, 23, of Ruidoso on June 22, charging him with improper handling of fire after officers saw him walk across Sudderth Drive from Quarters Bar smoking a cigarette. Outdoor smoking and fires are prohibited due to extreme fire danger.

On the same day, Corey D. Courts, 22, of Ruidoso, was cited for smoking a cigarette on the sidewalk in front of 1240 Sudderth Drive, and, in the Arby's parking lot on Sudderth Drive, Shawn Patton, 21, of Ruidoso, and Brandon Elliott Taylor, 20, of Katy, Texas, were cited for flicking ashes out of the front and back passenger windows of a vehicle, with their hands protruding from the windows.

Michael S. Branum, 21, of Lubbock, Texas, and Matthew G. Branum, 25, of Fort Worth, Texas, were cited for mishandling of fire on June 23. Officers saw them throwing ashes from cigarettes out of their vehicle at Sudderth and Eagle drives, the report states. Michael R. Randle, 23, of Roswell, also was cited for walking from Win Place & Show Bar while smoking a cigarette on June 23.

Attacking mean weeds

When Sally Canning drives through Lincoln County, she's not focusing on the scenery. She's checking out the weeds.

It's not that Canning is critical of unkempt lawns or roadways. If she sees native weeds, that's all right. But when she spots an invasive variety, Canning shifts into attack mode with whatever treatment is the most effective and safe.

Her latest effort centered on a lawn area in front of the Culligan Water Conditioning business on Mechem Drive in Ruidoso, where hoary

cross was sighted.

"I have lots of friends and people who serve with me on the Lincoln County Weed Management Area committee," said Canning, a petite, high-energy vegetation management specialist. "I have lots of eyes out looking for me. I start to get calls saying I've seen a picture and this looks like it. So I check it out."

To ensure the proper identification, she used specialists with New Mexico State University as backup.

Licensed to work with restricted chemicals, Canning doesn't just trample private property. She wins the cooperation of owners by telling

Job title critical to LCSWA supervisor

What's in a title? Plenty, apparently, if you're the operations supervisor for the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

If Debra Ingle was called manager, she could be fired without cause by the authority board. As operations supervisor, she is a salaried, classified employee and termination would require docu-

mentation of a job performance failure.

Angelo Vega, who represents the town of Carrizozo on the authority board and is police chief, wants to see the authority run by a manager as it was when it was formed in the early 1990s to handle garbage collection in the county. He also wants the board involved in determining raises for all employees.

"I can't see allowing an operations supervisor to make changes without coming to the board," he said Tuesday during an authority meeting. But authority members decided not to tamper with success.

Chairman Don Coleman, who represents Ruidoso Downs, said the board's responsibility is to

Rain, smoke tantalize, but officially it's '0'

Arizona fires put a haze over the Sacramentos while thunderstorms rattle windows, leave spotty moisture

The Ruidoso area received slightly more than a half inch of rain in spots over the weekend, but not a drop was recorded at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

The official record book at the National Weather Service in Albuquerque will reflect the zero because the airport is its reporting source. But the rain gauge at the Ruidoso Police Department collected .13 of an inch on Saturday and .38 of an inch on Sunday.

The moisture may have helped ground some of the ash and smoke blowing into the area Monday from two fires in Arizona and one near

Durango, Colo. On Sunday, a heavy haze blocked the sun in Raton from the same fires.

Lee Nielson, a respiratory therapist with the Lincoln County Medical Center, said that anyone who is sensitive to air quality should exercise common sense and stay indoors.

"If you walk outside and smell the smoke, go back in, close the windows and doors and turn on the air conditioning," he said.

Joggers should keep physical exertion to a minimum outdoors when smoke is present, he said. Anyone who experiences difficulty breathing, should contact their physician.

U.S. Reps. Tom Udall, D-N.M., and Mark Udall, D-Colo., last week asked leaders of the House Committee on Appropriations to provide emergency supplemental money for fighting wild fires in New Mexico, Colorado and throughout the West.

"While the wild fires still are burning in our states and lives are at stake, it is important that we be certain our fire fighting agencies have the resources and personnel to do their job," Tom Udall said. "Our most pressing need is to adequately fund wild life management activities so that the loss to families, businesses and the environment are addressed swiftly."

If approved, the money would be part of the 2002 supplemental spending bill that provides additional funds to federal agencies for the current fiscal year.

Small fires quickly quenched; DA investigates one incident

The cause of a three-acre fire off Sierra Blanca Airport Road last week was ruled human-caused, but at least four others in Lincoln County were sparked by lightning.

Bill Duemling of the state Forestry Division said Monday that the person who reported the fire about 10:15

a.m. June 18, apparently previously started two small fires he was able to extinguish, but continued to work with welding equipment.

"Our investigative division has referred the information to the district attorney for possible prosecution," Duemling said.

The main fire started in grass, but burned into some piñon juniper, he said.

The heavy fuel sent a plume into the air carrying embers that started spot fires as much as a quarter-mile away and across the highway, he said.

Fire fighters worked most of the day and returned on Wednesday to check for any hot spots, Duemling said.

Six loads of fire retardant were dropped by two single-engine air tankers. A bulldoz-

er, a 20-person hand crew from Mescalero, two engines and a command unit from the Ruidoso Fire Department and three units from the Bonito Volunteer Fire Department responded to the Little Creek Fire, as did two units from the state forestry division and one from Capitan for structural protection.

About 1 p.m. Thursday, a blaze called the Dunovan Fire

was reported in the steep terrain of Nogal Canyon, part of the initial attack area of the U.S. Forest Service.

A contract helicopter dumped water at the top of the ridge while two 20-person hand crews rotated in fighting the fire. The crews stayed on the fire until Saturday. Two acres burned.

Three other small fires — each about 1/10th of an acre

and also lightning caused, were fought near the Bogle Ranch, on Forest Service land in the Jicarilla Mountains and near the Hubbard Ranch on Forest Service land.

Duemling reminded the public that because of the prevailing high winds and the lack of rain, extreme fire danger exists in Lincoln County

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
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

them about the negative effects of invasive species. They crowd out natural grasses and plants that are forage for wildlife.

Hoary cress is considered a noxious Class A type, which means, "If you can find them, do whatever you can to get rid of them," Canning said.

Often called a whitetop, the hoary cress is a perennial member of the mustard family inadvertently introduced into the United States from Europe and Asia.

The plant is one of the earliest to emerge in the spring with flowers produced in late April and May.

It thrives in waste places, cultivated fields and pastures, and seems to like the alkaline soils of the West, growing from 3,500 to 8,500 feet above sea level.

The type of treatment depends on the situation and which plant is targeted, Canning said. In the case of Culligan, owner Jack A. Bartlett was cooperative, but Canning knew using chemicals at a business where children and pets may wander right off Mechem Drive wasn't a good idea.

She decided on solarization. "These particular plants already had gone to seed and

the wind was ready to pick them up and send them to new locations," Canning said. "Solarization will keep the seeds confined."

After cutting down the plants, she spread sheets of heavy black plastic sheeting over the lawn area, which will heat the ground to as high as 175 degrees.

A charge may be involved with a large job, but smaller areas may qualify for a free treatment because of the benefits to the county, she said.

The money comes from a grant written by Canning last fall to the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation targeted for noxious weed control.

With the sponsorship of the Upper Hondo Water and Soil Conservation District, the county weed management group hired Canning, who also chairs the committee, to handle the job.

A sign is posted at each project warning not to disturb the treated area. A plastic pouch is attached containing Canning's card for future reference.

After the plastic is removed, the soil next year still will require a small-chemical treatment, she said.

"If we left the plants alone, in two years, we'd have more than 500 acres covered with

them," Canning said. "These plants take up water and spoil the land, displacing the natural grass. You take this plant out and the natives come back in."

One plant can produce 10,000 seeds, she said.

Members of the county weed management area hope to enlist more eyes and manpower in their hunt of noxious weeds. The group is sponsoring a Vegetation Management Workshop July 29 at the Ruidoso Convention Center.

They'll cover identification of plants and how to kill them.

The license enables a person to receive training and to buy restricted chemicals, she said.

A large job just finished by Canning includes spraying 45 miles of road easements in Ranches of Sonterra to control musk thistle, another noxious weed.

Some of the noxious weeds also are poisonous to livestock and humans, she said.

"But most of those have some unusual characteristic such as a bad odor or dots on the stems," she said. "I think God was saying, 'Folks, I'm going to give you a clue and if you're not paying attention, too bad.'"

evaluate Ingle's performance, not other employees.

Leo Martinez, a county commissioner who serves on the authority board, said Ingle puts a flat amount for raises in the budget, which the board can approve or reject. But how that money is awarded in respect to merit increases is up to her.

Martinez said he didn't want to get involved in the operation of this authority other than if it goes into the red. "I think if Angelo had somebody watching his police department so he couldn't do his job, he wouldn't like it. I've seen that happen too many times ... and department heads couldn't function."

To Ingle he said, "It's your responsibility to keep the operation in the black, keep customers and employees happy -

that's a big job. I've seen some real good numbers in the last year and I will support you all I can, but I won't, if we slip into the red."

Later, during a workshop on the next fiscal budget, Vega again brought up his dissatisfaction with Ingle's title. He and John Whitaker, who represents Capitan and is a member of that village's board of trustees, questioned whether the authority was fair to other applicants for the manager's job.

"My problem is that the others who applied for a manager's job at \$20,000 might not have known that if they took the position, at mid-year, another \$20,000 would be added to the salary," Whitaker said.

Ingle said when the manager's position was advertised, only \$20,000 was included in

the budget because of the tight finances of the authority.

When no one seemed willing to work for that amount, authority board members changed the job to operations supervisor and said they would look at the budget mid-year for another \$20,000.

The board hired Ingle and at mid-year review, found the extra money. Ingle pointed out the amount still is less than the \$64,000 paid to one manager.

"I was willing to take the chance," she said.

Ingle agreed in the future to notify the board of how many employee evaluation she does each month and the results. If someone disagrees with her recommendation, they can appeal to the board, she said.

Authority attorney Don Dutton said the title of operations supervisor accurately describes Ingle's job.

and most of New Mexico.

The Forestry Division placed restrictions on non-municipal and non-federal lands throughout the state.

Most municipalities have passed similar regulations, as has the county commission.

They are:

- Smoking is restricted to designat-

ed areas within structures, within while on paved or surfaced roads.

• Open fires, including camp fires, charcoal grills and fireworks are prohibited with some specific exceptions.

• All fuelwood cutting, timber-harvesting and thinning activities are banned on days of extreme "red flag" danger, determined by forecasts. Local red flag conditions exist when sustained wind speeds are 20 miles per hour or greater and relative humidity is 15 percent or less.

• On non-red flag days, those forest work activities are prohibited during the

most dangerous period between 10 a.m. and 8 p.m.

Contact the state forestry division office in Capitan at (505) 354-2231 for more information and details on exceptions to the restrictions.

A parallel track to fire safety is critical for Ruidoso

Because of an extraordinarily dedicated and efficient fire department, Ruidoso has historically enjoyed a low rate of loss from fire and low fire insurance rates. The performance record of our fire department has made most of us confident that a fire initiated within the village will not go out of control and become a large-scale menace. Even if my neighbor's house burns, mine will probably be saved. But no municipal fire department can stop an invading wildfire originating in the national forest outside the village.

The stark contrast between the massive peril of a fire originating in neighboring Lincoln National Forest and the statistically modest hazard of uncontrollable fire arising inside the village suggests that money spent on thinning a buffer zone within the forest perimeter would deliver far more security per dollar than money spent to make every individual municipal property defensible.

Both the perimeter and in-village thinning are necessary, but the benefit payout rate of the two approaches is strikingly different. Individual property compliance will proceed randomly and slowly because of economic, legal, and equity issues. When half of the local properties reach compliance, true fire safety will not be advanced by 50 percent; more likely about 15 percent, because of the remaining checkerboard of noncompliant lots. Perimeter thinning and opening, on the other hand, might advance fire safety 50 percent by completing the first 15 percent of total planned thinning. This is because the effort could be targeted at eliminating the worst hazards first.

For all practical purposes, we have only one perimeter landowner — the Lincoln National Forest. The forest is within a half mile of virtually every property in Ruidoso because it infiltrates the village in innumerable slots

and islands.

The Forest Task Force recommendations (or something like them) will have to be imposed, but gradually and with great care because urban tree removal can be enormously expensive. If the schedule of compliance can be stretched, and if it can be somewhat evolutionary (falling first on new construction and vacant areas where costs can be controlled), then we can probably make it work.

If hardball methods are used, it will fail, because the first lien filed will create an implicit lien on every property in town, and no appraisal will be worth the paper it is written on without an estimate of the overhanging compliance cost.

At the perimeter, however, no more than three years of serious thinning of the Lincoln National Forest might reduce our risk tenfold. A recent evaluation of the Lincoln forest recommended immediate pilot programs to return plots to pre-settlement condition by thinning and creating open areas. It states that "There is no reason why we cannot bring annual wildfire acreage losses back below 10,000 a year, as they were in the 1920s - 1940s." This would be a 90 percent reduction from the 1991-2000 wildfire acreage.

The evaluation group estimates that by thinning and opening mixed conifer forest from its present density to pre-settlement conditions might save 2 inches of precipitation annually from our current loss to evapotranspiration. Two inches over 12,000 acres would amount to 2,000 acre-feet of "new" water. Some would increase runoff, improving instream flows, some would reappear as springs and seeps, and the balance as aquifer recharge, raising the water table.

Myriad other benefits would accrue: improved forest health and wildlife habitat and diversity; stabilized soil as grasses and forbs (broad-leaved plants) are released from competition of deep

rooted trees and brush; greatly reduced loss of soil and restoration costs after wildfires.

The Forest Service has been thinning a buffer for some time, but not to pre-settlement standards, nor deeply enough; certainly not quickly enough. If sufficient money has not been allocated for urban interface protection, then we should go to work finding it! The average cost of forest fires in our district is over \$57 million per year and that figure would have been much higher if significant structures had burned.

Forest thinning and opening must obviously be done anyway; the benefits from increased water storage plus the savings on fire suppression and losses would vastly offset the cost.

Why not press hard for immediate, large-scale action on the Ruidoso/Lincoln Forest interface? No better demonstration site could be found in the West. We are a community that faces the national forest on every boundary, and we may house as many as 30,000 people during peak tourist periods. We have a critical water shortage, and we know that we have no other means of achieving wildfire security in a relatively short time.

We should also address the matter of insurability. Insurance is a compact between an insurer and a policyholder to treat risk in an actuarial manner, averaging the risk over time and over population, not changing rates and conditions to suit every new weather forecast. Insurers do not like policyholders who cheat by making false or inflated claims, and policyholders do not like insurers who try to weasel out of their actuarial compact by cherry-picking the best risks and redlining the rest. That kind of firm should have its license revoked, and that is what insurance commissions are for.

Police release Akita in dog-bite case

■ Quarantined dog found not to be infectious; ordinance isn't violated.

The Akita dog who attacked a 70-year-old man at the condominiums at 106 Granite on June 13 and had been placed in quarantine was released to its owner June 19 on orders of Ruidoso Police Chief Lanny Maddox.

"Our ordinance states that the reason for that quarantine is to see if the dog has something that can be given to the victim through that bite," Maddox said.

Pamela Ann Mills, 43, the owner of the dog, supplied more than sufficient paperwork proving that the dog had the proper vaccinations, he said.

Maddox said he told the dog owner that she will assume lia-

bility if the dog bites someone else, since this incident serves as notice that the dog might be vicious.

"The court's going to have to make a determination as to what type of restrictions it's going to place on the dog and the owner of the dog," Maddox said.

A Silver City man in a time-share condominium had noticed the dog barking, tangled in its cable with only about two feet of leeway, and with no water.

Hugh E. Bearup and his wife gave the dog water and then attempted to untangle the leash, at which point the dog allegedly attacked the man. Police found Bearup bleeding from both arms.

The dog was subsequently taken to the Humane Society of Lincoln County for a 10-day quarantine, and staff there said the dog was vicious with them when they attempted to feed

him. Bearup was taken to the emergency room at Lincoln County Medical Center and two stitches were made in one arm. He returned to the hospital for a check-up before returning to Silver City, where he reportedly noticed white streaks, swelling and a "red hot" feeling in his right arm, and went to his physician there.

Mills, the owner of the 12-year-old dog, wrote in a statement that "the animal is not known to be vicious and did not attack anyone. He was approached, was friendly until Mr. Bearup hurt him. I know he must have been stuck by the cactus several times

because he has sores around his neck, chest and head."

Mills claims that the dog was tied out on the private roadway of the condominium, in a "remote, wooded area away from the condos, with full permission of the manager."

Maddox said all the people with condominiums had legal access to the place where the dog was tied.

Mills wrote that the dog was not tied out there from 6:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m., as Bearup had stated, but from 11 a.m. until 12:30 p.m.

For future reference, Maddox said, anyone who sees a dog that appears to be without proper food or water or tangled up in a tether should call Ruidoso Animal Control at 258-7365 or attempt to locate the owner. "Don't attempt to approach the dog," he said. "Dogs don't know who's friendly and who's not."

He also called for renewal of the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Supplemental Grants Program.

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

The group's curriculum will focus on the architecture, art, music and theater history of Florence. Their studies will be supplemented with educational tours to Rome, Pompeii, Naples and Greece.

Unit value up slightly

The New Mexico State Department of Education announced that the 2002-2003 program unit value has been estimated at \$2,896.01, an increase of .87 percent or \$25

over last year.

These are funds appropriated for public schools by the 2002 Legislature. The unit value determines the amount of state funds provided for each public school student in the state for programs and services.

The final determination of the unit value will be announced in January 2003.

The units are based on programs in the schools and enrollment, and the estimate is based on the total units generated last year plus anticipated units as a result of implementation of full-day kindergarten and the initiation of new formula-based programs, such as start-up charter schools and grades added to existing charter schools.

"New Mexico's unit value ensures equity for all students and is the basis of our state's funding formula for public schools," said Kathleen Forrer, the SDE's chief financial officer. "The unit value allows us to address the individual needs of students and provide maximum opportunity."

The appropriated program cost for New Mexico's public schools for 2002-2003 is about \$1.715 billion, an increase of 0.88 percent over last year, or \$14,941,400.

New Mexico received a grade of B+ in the area of equity in an Education Week/Pew Charitable Trusts report released in January, placing third nationally and joining Hawaii, Utah, Nevada and Florida in the top five. New Mexico received a C for how it distributes its spending for all students.

Two middle schools now 'high improving'

Carrizozo and Capitan middle schools are on the State Department of Education's "High-improving Schools" list, and will share, with 99 other schools, \$1.843 million in incentive award funding.

The 101 schools on the list have shown the most improvement in test scores from 1999-2000 to 2000-2001, according to a SDE release. The listing is available on the SDE's Web site at www.sde.state.nm.us under "New This Month."

Capitan Middle School, with 141 students, will receive \$10,473.50, and Carrizozo Middle School, with 73 students, will receive \$7,351.53.

All the high-improving schools will receive at least \$4,000, with increases above that amount based on the number of students in each school. Clovis High School will receive \$75,042.89.

The average award is \$18,247.52. Schools can use the funding to provide incentives to students and purchase materials and supplies to continue improved learning.

Three 'corrective options' ordered for schools

SANTA FE - The New Mexico State Board of Education has directed State Superintendent of Public Instruction Michael J. Davis to consider three options when considering corrective action for schools in 2002-2003 - contracted management with a state-approved entity, an SBE-approved joint department and district agreement for operation of a school, and special services intervention that is proposed by the New Mexico state Department of Education and SBE-approved.

SBE President Margaret A. Davis formed an ad hoc committee to include diverse

experts to consider immediately how testing data from the TerraNova, second edition, might be used in rating public schools.

The deadline for recommendations from the ad hoc committee is Aug. 1.

In addition to the five accountability indicators (student achievement, dropout, student attendance, parent and community involvement and school safety), the SBE told Davis to consider additional information on each potential corrective action school in recommending an option for corrective action. Included would be the experience and extent

It may be corny, but it's educational

■ The public schools' summer enrichment program under the RASCAL Club focuses on art in its many forms.

Children in the RASCAL summer enrichment program conducted by the Ruidoso schools spend their days making "corny" plays on words and creating a five-foot sculpture called "Moonlight Cornata: New Mexico Symphony."

Drawing on the plans of J.D. and Brett Knight-Mark, owners of the Backdoor, the children gather and paint pine cones for the giant corn kernels, glue them onto the wooden forms Brett Knight-Mark makes and starch fabric for the corn husks.

The RASCAL (Ruidoso After School Care and Learning) Club operates during the school year for children from kindergarten through sixth grade from 7 to 8 a.m. and 2:45 to 5:30 p.m., offering indoor and outdoor activities, a homework center and academic enrichment.

In the summer program, May 28-Aug. 2, children maintain and develop early literacy, reading, writing, math and science skills, participate in field trips, and in the Museum of New Mexico's Bridging to the Arts Program, said Anne K. Flaherty, coordinator of the club. Funds are provided through a grant to 13 sites in New Mexico through the Museum of New Mexico and the Department of Education.

Last year's summer project was a quilt children made that was then exhibited at all the Ruidoso school sites, to the Legislature in Santa Fe and in Region IX's board room.

This year's project is "Stories of Corn," as a theme to tie the 13 school district sites in the state together. Funds were provided for local artists, and in Ruidoso, the Knight-Marks were chosen because they're "compositionally inclined, and create sculptures, leather designs, and fine art and decorating" pieces, J.D. Knight-Mark said.

The children are also compiling a corn recipe book from family recipes and making covers for their own copies of it. On July 15 they will have a "CORNbration" picnic dinner using some of the recipes, Flaherty said.

Lincoln County commissioners, who give the club grant funds, school board members, principals, families

and up Jack Little Drive. of the children, the artists and community people who have donated materials to the project will be invited for the dinner and the first viewing of the sculpture. The sculpture will then make the rounds of the schools, and later the Hubbard Museum of the American West will exhibit it.

Brett Knight-Mark assembled a "CORNference" one day so he and his wife could explain to the children how they came up with the design of "Moonlight Cornata." They chose a design that would use local materials.

The gathering, painting, starching and gluing the children do is integrated into literacy activities, explained teacher Deanna Wright. Besides reading and writing about the culture of corn, children use their math skills to design color patterns on graph paper.

"We had a math lesson on sequencing and patterns and the kids' patterns will be used for coloring the corn," Wright said. "The theme of the project is using literacy and showing how art can support literacy and be used to express knowledge of culture ... We (teachers) learned through the Kennedy Center program workshops how to teach academics through the arts."

Jessica Schoenwald, 13, said the children gathered pine cones around the golf course, en route to the library

and up Jack Little Drive.

To play on the musical theme for their sculpture, children listen to recordings of music featuring the individual instruments. The RASCALs also are reading books on corn and advising their parents on corn recipes to include the cookbook. Some of them will cook a corn recipe for the CORNbration and families will sign up to bring a dish to the picnic dinner, while the program will supply the meat.

"We sorted them by size and now we're working on color - spray-painting them blue, yellow and red," Jessica said.

As they work, the children have given names to the giant corn cobs they're creating: Maiz for the bass playing yellow corn; Cornsuela for the blue flautist corn; Knee-high for the red cellist corn. "Cornelia the Conductor," will be a scarecrow dressed in a white tuxedo and tails.

On the morning of the CORNbration, children from Tularosa, who are also participating in the Bridging to the Arts program through Region IX, will come to Ruidoso to give a "CORNcert."

"Kids are so into the theme that when Deanna asked them what their favorite snack was because they'd worked so well, Branden Atchley (age 5) asked, 'Corn?'" Flaherty said.

LCSWA asks Simpson to pay up

In a unanimous vote last week, members of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority agreed they must insist that former authority manager Rick Simpson satisfy an auditor's criticism.

Following a closed-door executive session, the board instructed authority attorney Don Dutton to write to Simpson that payment of \$3,450 cited by auditor Dan Austin is due. Failure to pay could result in legal action.

Austin reported in January that Simpson, who also is District 5 county commissioner, was paid \$3,450 without verifying his expenses. Simpson should either produce the documentation or repay the money, he said.

Dutton contacted Simpson, but nothing was resolved. Contacted Thursday, Simpson said he had no comment at this

time other than, "We're still working on it."

Money owed also was an issue Tuesday with the village of Capitan, which fell behind in monthly payments to the authority when newly elected Mayor Steve Sederwall decided to keep the money in escrow until he determined if higher rates approved by the authority board were legal.

Sederwall cited a June 1999 village ordinance setting the rates at a lower amount. But Dutton said the village attorney serving that year was unaware of a 1991 ordinance that approved a joint-powers agreement between the village and the authority that gave the coalition board the power to set rates.

He advised authority board members not to overreact and allow attorneys to come back with their legal research, which may settle the issue. He noted that because he repre-

sents both entities, he could advise neither. The conflict of interest resulted in the village and the authority hiring different attorneys for that issue.

However, Leo Martinez, a county commissioner who serves on the authority board, said Capitan or any other member that doesn't pay should be charged a 1.5 percent late fee, just as the authority does regular residential customers.

Dutton said to avoid the appearance of being "out after somebody," the board should schedule consideration of the late fee at its meeting next month.

Martinez agreed to wait, but said the board needs a policy in place in case payments are withheld again.

Two Capitan residents at the meeting lauded the authority leadership of operations supervisor Debra Ingle.

Village OKs 'backup' site purchase

A lot in Mountain Villa Estates, adjacent to village property at the Alto Crest Water Treatment Plant, has been approved for purchase by the Ruidoso Village Council.

Larry P. Grasmick, head of the village water and wastewater department, pointed out that the extra land could accommodate future plant improvements.

"The construction of decant basins would allow

us to recycle about 50,000 gallons of water every time we backwash a filter," he wrote in a memorandum to the council earlier this month. "We could save at least 100,000 gallons of water each day during high production. The backwash water currently is discharged into earth basins below the Alto Dam where most of it is absorbed into the ground or evaporates.

"Very little of it actually flows into Eagle Creek. All of it is lost to further village use."

The offering price for the lot was \$14,000 plus closing costs, subject to an appraisal of the land.

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

Basketball on the minds of several teams this summer

Ah summer. A chance to kick back, relax and play a few strenuous games of basketball at high altitudes.

Three local high school programs, and more than 20 programs total, took advantage of a basketball camp held Friday and Saturday at Ruidoso High School and Ruidoso Middle School.

Four teams from RHS, as well as the varsity squads from Mescalero and Hondo, took to the courts for six "pick-up" games each, which gave their coaches a good indication of how their programs are coming along.

"I saw improvements at all levels at this camp," said Ruidoso coach Billy Page. "There's no pressure here at all, you're here to learn and to have a good time."

The Warriors had teams from the varsity, junior varsity, sophomore and freshman levels playing in this tournament, and were facing some stiff competition from the likes of traditional powerhouses Alamogordo and Tularosa, as well as Las Cruces Mayfield, runner up in last year's Class 5A state tournament.

"We ask our kids if they can play at the 5A level, that's what we want," Page said. "That's the whole idea behind this and other summer camps."

Hondo coach Eddie Chavez was quick to agree.

"We will primarily have young kids next season, so you can't beat this experience," Chavez said shortly after his team's loss against an Alamogordo sophomore squad. "We're playing some tough schools, and when you play the better competition, it always makes you better."

"If you play someone at your level or lower, you don't learn anything," he continued. "You have to play those tough teams to learn how to play with the rest of them."

Hondo had a rough outing against that competition, as did the Ruidoso varsity, which went 1-5, including losses to Alamogordo, Mayfield and Roswell High.

That's just fine with Page, he's just happy to get some playing time for his kids.

"I don't want to play teams I know we can beat," Page said. "I want to play teams that are a challenge and will make us better."

All other Ruidoso teams were at least .500 for the camp. The freshmen were 3-3, the JV did well at 4-2, while the sophomores went undefeated.

"I may have got us in over our heads in this one," Page joked.


"We will primarily have young kids next season, so you can't beat this experience. We're playing some tough schools, and when you play the better competition, it always makes you better."

Lincoln National Forest stamp projects approved

With one unanimous vote, the state Game and Fish Commission passed a series of proposed Habitat Stamp programs in Lincoln county and throughout the state designed to improve and rehabilitate the health of New Mexico wildlife.

The commission meeting, held Friday at the Ruidoso village hall, covered numerous topics affecting the state wildlife and wildlife control, but only two directly affected the immediate area.

In addition to the stamp program hearing, the commission also voted to pass a proposed shooting preserve application for the Felix River Ranch in Chaves County south of Roswell.

Stamp Projects

The Habitat Stamp program, a joint venture between sportspersons and agencies that manage wildlife and their habitat, is supported primarily by hunters, anglers and trappers who purchase a stamp or validation when they purchase a license. This generates about \$1 million per year.

Those funds are then dedicated to habitat conservation and rehabilitation projects throughout the state.

Among the projects already underway in the Lincoln National Forest is a reforestation and improvement of the area affected by the Cree fire in

2000. There are currently close to 50 separate projects planned for the forest for 2003-04. Almost half of those projects focus on improving habitat for area deer.

In other business, the commission:

- Upheld a previous decision on Las Lunas hunter Lonnie Barber, whose license was suspended for two years for elk hunting violations;
• Passed an amendment to the rule considering forage lease value considerations in order to create a permanent intervention method to head off big game damage of private property. The amendment places a \$5,000 cap on all compensation to be given out to land and cattle owners in the state, rather than viewing each monetary agreement on a case-by-case basis.

According to Game and Fish director Larry Bell, that cap will encourage everyone on all sides to come up with a more permanent solution to big game destruction of private land and ranches;

- Voted to adopt upland game rules as presented for the 2002-03 seasons;
• Voted to remove an item considering sale of warehouse property in Santa Fe to raise funds for the Game and Fish Department's headquarters construction.

Due to an unforeseen amount of funds being spent on the purchase of property at Eagle Nest Lake in northeast New Mexico, it was decided this

building phase would be too expensive to pursue;

• Heard recommendations for waterfowl hunting rules for the 2002-03 seasons. The commission will have a final vote on the rules at its next regularly scheduled meeting Aug. 23 in Farmington;

• Heard recommendations for the 2003-05 trapping and furbearer seasons, with a final vote anticipated at the October commission meeting;

• Passed a resolution to open the preventative lion control rule for amendment, based on an agreement to transplant Rocky Mountain sheep to Arizona;

• Agreed to \$74,450 in funding for Share with Wildlife projects for 2003-04;

• Passed a proposal for the recovery of the Aplomado Falcon using captive bred birds;

• Passed a proposal to transplant Rocky Mountain bighorn sheep from New Mexico to Arizona in exchange for Mexican Desert bighorn sheep;

• Held drawings to issue bighorn sheep enhancement licenses;

• Passed a proposal to utilize \$500,000 from the bond interest retirement fund for the purchase of Eagle Nest Lake, and;

• Approved a renewal of the Game and Fish Department's lease with the state Land Office.

Among those golfers will be Jeffery Chapman, representing the Links at Sierra Blanca. Chapman is scheduled to tee off at 10 a.m. Friday with Lee Sanchez, Jr. of the Links De Santa Fe, Gordon Rowe from Four Hills Country Club and Bob Basham of New Mexico Tech golf course.

A pair of Ruidoso area youth — both seniors at Ruidoso High School — will face a two-day tournament July 1-2 in a fight for three total qualifying berths in the Junior World championships.

Fishing report for Ruidoso area, June 26, 2002

Ruidoso River: The water level in the River is still at the lowest flow reported for the past year. We are under 1 CFS and dropping.

Special note: The Ruidoso River has a new bag limit as of April 1. In the past a five fish limit was in effect. The new limit is three fish, a good move by the NMGF Department to help conservation and a quality fishery.

Concentrate efforts between Gavilan Canyon bridge and the Chamber of Commerce building. In this stretch of water you should find a fair amount of fish. Toss Phasentail nymphs and bead head Prince Nymphs. Tie a Parachute Adams or Humpty dry fly on as a lead fly, then tie a nymph dropper about 12-18 inches behind. Use the lead fly as your strike indicator. This is an effective and fun way to fish small waters.

Remember to always wear eye protection. Southern: Closed due to fire hazard.

Bonilla Lake: Closed due to fire hazard.

Eagle Lakes: Eagle Lakes are open for the season. Reports are that there are lots of hungry fish. The scenery here is an 11 on a 10 scale. Great place for teaching kids or beginners alike...Toss what you've got. Wear long pants and shirts and use bug dope. It's deer fly season.

Grindstone: This lake was stocked with rainbows this past week. Woolly Buggers, Zonkers and Streamers fished fairly deep have produced fish the past weeks. For spin casters, tie on a propeller fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish with a fly. The hot ticket for propeller flies has been purple

or black strip. The lake is once again open to non-motorized craft. Dig out your float tube, air it up and go fishing.

Please remember to squeeze the barbs down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water. Please, if you pack it in, pack it out. Litter continues to plague the area lakes and streams.

Lake Mesalero: The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark woolly buggers continue to take fish late in the day. A few folks have been successful with Parachute Adams, Mosquito, or Hendrickson patterns and casting to rising fish. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk.

Microbiological Contaminants:

(1) Total Coliform. Coliforms are bacteria that are naturally present in the environment and are used as an indicator that other, potentially harmful, bacteria may be present.

(2) Fecal coliform/E. Coli. Fecal coliforms and E. coli are bacteria whose presence indicates that the water may be contaminated with human or animal wastes. Microbes in these wastes can cause short-term effects, such as diarrhea, cramps, nausea, headaches, or other symptoms.
