Councilors reconsider Rio Grande Air

Ruidoso officials are hesitant to recommit \$100,000 to airline despite sizable federal grant approved earlier this year

Ruidoso village councilors listened, but didn't commit, Monday to accepting a \$500,000 grant that would subsidize air service for this community and Taos.

Accepting the grant from U.S. Department of Transportation would mean that Ruidoso must pay \$100,000 as a match toward the grant, the same amount as a partnership in Taos that

includes several entities must contribute. The state Highway and Transportation Department also would kick in \$200,000 for a total of \$900,000.

Announcement of the grant came a few weeks after the council decided to eliminate a \$100,000 subsidy in the 2002-2003 budget, about \$50,000 less than the village paid Rio Grande Air last year.

The airline subsequently pulled its service here and shifted its focus to

Alamogordo, where it receives more than \$872,000 in a federal grant to provide commuter service because of that city's designation as an essential destination.

Councilors agreed to review the material presented by representatives of the airlines and related agencies, to examine the possibilities of a local partnership with other towns, tribes, casinos and hotels that would benefit from air service, and then consider action at their meeting July 30.

One of the key changes would be a route connection to El Paso, as well as Albuquerque through Alamogordo. Tim Wooldridge, chief executive officer of the airline, said agreements also are lined up that will show Rio Grande as a connection when people line up tickets through American Airlines.

One of the first things council members learned Monday was that they couldn't seek another airline to provide service. The grant is tied to using Rio Grande. One of the reasons for the

award was the airline's proposed marketing approach.

"I know there have been problems, but it's a start-up airline, exactly what the DOT is looking for," said Mike Rice with the Aviation Division of the state transportation department. "There are going to be hiccups and bumps."

But Councilor Deborah Marcum-Bayars said what occurred this past year was more than hiccups, and the village paid the bill.

Planning head says new rules will take time

Mike Runnels explains some of the ins and outs of the new fire codes.

Just because four fire-hazard-based ordinances were swiftly passed into law last week, residents in Ruidoso shouldn't expect to see an army of enforcers prowling the streets, says village planning and zoning director Mike Runnels.

"First, we've got to identify the high-hazard areas," he said during an interview after the village council meeting. "We

have a lot of groundwork to do. It will take time. We are planning on getting (urban forester Rick DeIaco) an assistant and possibly, three temporary employees next summer - forestry majors to go out and do assessments and work with people on what they can do.

"It also will be necessary to work closely with private (lot cleaning) contractors doing the work so they understand our approach and we're comfortable with what they're doing."

Reacting to the light turnout at a public hearing on the ordinances Tuesday, Runnels said, "I think generally people understand this is a

Game officials: Don't feed bears

They're wonderful to watch from a distance, but Ruidoso's black bears aren't pets and shouldn't be fed by visitors or residents, say the staff of the New Mexico Game and Fish Department.

Despite tough prospects for natural sources of food because of the prolonged drought, game officials warned that feeding bears can lead to their deaths. Once they lose their fear of humans, they can be branded nuisances and have to be destroyed, as happened last month to one of 25 orphaned cubs given a second chance by the department.

The cub was released into the Gila National Forest in December as part of Operation Bear Den. The bear was destroyed after it appeared in an unsecured barn north of Glenwood and about 15 miles from where it was released. The barn contained some dog food and several empty dog food bags.

"It's unfortunate that the drought conditions that helped orphan these bears have continued this year," said Don MacCarter, chief of Public Affairs for the department. "But we didn't release these

animals to become nuisances bears. We had hoped they would make it in the wild."

A lack of natural foods drove a record number of bears into human communities during the spring and summer of 2001. The orphaned bear cubs were restored to health at the Wildlife Center in Espanola, then released to artificial bear dens on the Gila and Carson national forests in December.

Although supplemental feeding may be an alternative for other species, several reasons dictate the policy of no bear feeding, game officials said. They include:

Bears throughout northern New Mexico entered their dens in a weakened condition last fall and winter because of a lack of natural forage. Their acorn and berry crops nearly were eliminated by a late spring frost. Because emerging bears are emaciated and concentrating mostly on finding

food, they represent an increased risk to anyone who encounters them.

Once a bear finds food, it becomes territorial and may become more aggressive. Females with cubs attracted to food piles can be killed by large, dominant males.

Bears are naturally adapted to times of drought and females do not give birth

Ruidosoans stock up on newest postage

On the first day of sales for the new 37-cent stamp, customers created Christmas time-like lines.

But Ruidoso Postmaster John Quemada said he ordered a half million of the new stamp, as well as 200,000, 3-cent stamps for those using up leftover 34-cent stamps, and 20,000 post cards featuring Carlsbad Caverns.

"I think we'll have plenty for everyone," he said Tuesday. "We're a hub office. Another office can call us and we can help so they don't go without stamps."

"Yesterday we sold

50,000 of the new stamps and today I issued another 20,000. We have plenty."

The new stamp comes in two designs, the American flag and a commemorative that comes 20 to a page and features antique trucks and toys.

A clerk at the Ruidoso Downs Post Office described business there Monday as "brisk."

"We had a lot of people coming in to try to exchange rolls of stamps that weren't open and we sold a lot of 3-cent stamps," he said. "We told people about this more than a month ahead, but I guess some still ended up with the old stamps."

ing, 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 9. Wear your T-shirts.






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Evacuation Warnings and Alerts

Evacuation warnings and alerts will take place by several methods depending on time availability: Local Radio and Television, by government officials, emergency services, or through the Emergency Alert System.

National Weather Service announces weather warnings and all hazard alerts via NOAA Weather Radio. This unique radio service provides continuous weather information and features a tone alarm that automatically activates to alert you of hazardous conditions.

The Village of Ruidoso is equipped with an interactive communication system called "THE COMMUNICATOR" this system is activated at the Ruidoso Police Department notifying you via telephone advising of an emergency in the area. If an evacuation is necessary in any part of the Village, the Communicator will notify you of such events. If you do not receive a phone call from the Communicator, please listen to the local radio stations listed below. If you receive a phone call advising you to evacuate, if time permits calmly advise the neighbors on each side of you, as they might not be equipped with a radio, phone, or may be hearing impaired.

If you have an immediate life threatening situation or emergency, Dial 911

Law Enforcement or other emergency personnel will announce evacuation by sounding sirens and will give information over public address loud speakers, as well as door-to-door contact. The Village of Ruidoso will activate seven emergency alert sirens to notify you in the case

of evacuation is necessary. If the sirens warn you to your local radio stations at 101.5 FM KRRS / AM 1240 KRUI OR AT 101.5 FM KRRS / FM KNRRS 101.5 DR AM AT KRUI 1400

WHAT IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY?

WHAT DO I NEED TO DO?

- Most importantly, REMAIN CALM
- Follow closely the evacuation instructions given in the evacuation alert and by emergency personnel.
- Close heavy drapes and blinds.
- Lock doors and windows.
- You MAY be instructed to tie a white towel or large white cloth to the front door knob to advise rescuers that your residence has been evacuated.
- Turn OFF gas/propane service, if you know how.
- DO NOT turn off electrical service. Electricity may aid emergency crews providing lighting and power for fire fighting efforts.
- Be sure to check your homeowners/renters insurance policy for fire loss information and any special clauses related to disasters.

NO ONE WILL BE ALLOWED TO RE-ENTER THE EVACUATION AREA UNTIL IT IS SAFE TO DO SO.

WHAT TO TAKE

Important papers and valuables
Driver's license/ID cards

Medications

Prescription glasses and dentures
Personal toilet articles and sanitary needs
Sleeping bag or blankets
Cash
Special dietary needs
Baby food, diapers, etc.
Checkbook, credit cards, cash

FOOD AND SHELTER

In the event of a disaster, evacuees will decide where they will go. You may stay with family or friends, in a hotel/motel, or in a Red Cross Shelter. Meals for those in shelters will be provided.

The safest evacuation routes will be identified by the appropriate agencies and will be made public during the evacuation warnings and alerts.

Evacuation routes cannot be pre-established. The location of the hazard, the behavior of the problem, and conditions such as wind direction will determine safe travel routes. Pay close attention to the evacuation signs and/or personnel assigned to direct traffic. Stay on designated evacuation routes.

TRANSPORTATION

Residents will be expected to use personal vehicles. Pre-planning should be made with family and neighbors to transport individuals with special needs, children, pets, livestock, or those without a means of transportation. Persons with special needs, such as a medical condition that prevent normal transportation should make prior arrangements with family, friends or with your local emergency services. When school is in session, transportation of school children will be conducted by local school districts.

PLAN FOR SEPARATED FAMILY MEMBERS

Every family should establish plans for times when families may be separated. Include the following:

- Establish a relative or friend as an emergency contact where all family members can call or exchange information.
- Determine who will transport family members unable to drive, or if no vehicle is available.
- Meet school children at designated registration/reception center.

WHAT ABOUT THE SECURITY OF MY HOME?

Law enforcement personnel will provide security for evacuated areas. The nature of the emergency and the safety of personnel will determine where perimeters will be established.

WHAT ABOUT PETS AND LIVESTOCK

Planning for care of pets and livestock should be included with the family evacuation plans. An animal's best protection is to be with the owner, however, this will not always be possible.

- Locate a safe place for your pets before disaster strikes.
 - Ask friends or family to provide pet care.
 - Check availability of boarding kennels to shelter pets during emergencies.
- Pets are not allowed inside shelter buildings except for service animals.

Engineer's worries not drying up

■ Bill Midkiff says that drought and growth are combining to wring out Ruidoso's water.

For engineer Bill Midkiff, preaching the gospel of sustainable water yield and the relationship among wells, streams and lakes drives him to public meetings and college classrooms.

He methodically reviews data he has collected for the past two years, along with anecdotal information from long-time residents; charting the disappearance of natural springs and the drying up of streams and wells.

In recent appearances before the Ruidoso Village Council and the Lincoln County Commission, Midkiff emphasized that taking a realistic approach to the problem of prolonged drought could help the council, developers and real estate agents find ways to ensure a sustainable yield from year to year.

"Ruidoso has the rights to water, but what is the right thing to do in a drought?" he asked.

Precipitation for the past three years has lagged behind historical averages, but to keep up with growth and consump-

tion, it should increase each year, he said.

The cities of Santa Fe, Española and Las Vegas are in states of emergency — yet few places in the nation have ever tied new development to water availability, Midkiff said.

State Engineer Tom Turney has warned that groundwater supplies in Albuquerque and Santa Fe are not sustainable, that more water is being removed than can be replaced, Midkiff said. While reducing the number of trees and vegetation would play a positive role in making up for lost precipitation, the biggest impact is human consumption, he said, adding, "But as long as water flows from the tap, there are no visible symptoms."

Ruidoso wells on Eagle Creek were deepened because the water table dropped and the amount of water being pumped declined, he pointed out. That action violates the sustainable yield premise, he said.

As examples of how Ruidoso's demand for water affects residents outside the village, Midkiff said when exploratory wells on Eagle Creek were shut down by the village after neighbors complained about the effect on their domestic wells, production in residents' wells went back up in 72 hours.

Water pumped from Eagle Creek is transported to a filter plant and then is exported to Ruidoso, outside of the basin. The Alto Lakes Water Company also has wells on the

North Fork to allow the aquifer to fill up and surface water to start flowing again. The stream then could supply Alto Lake and saturate the stream bed, keeping old walnut trees along the shore alive, he said. Len Stokes, a village water consultant, told village councilors at the meeting that he doesn't disagree the flows in Eagle Creek are diminishing.

After the turn of the century, every drop in Eagle Creek was appropriated by the railroad, he said. "If there's a tragedy, it's that (the village) and Capitan ever allowed other wells to be drilled, sucking it out from under us and we have to dig deeper."

"We're not the bad guys here." The village acquired water rights long before anyone else lived there, he said. The drought also aggravated the situation.

"Developers sold lots and domestic wells went in," Stokes said. The village actively is looking for answers by hiring one of the finest hydrologists in the state, he said.

He urged village officials to stop pumping the wells at

Enough rain fell until last year for Eagle Creek to show some flow, but it's been dry for about two years, he said.

"Consumption clearly is exceeding the sustainable yield," Midkiff said. "If you keep doing the same thing, you'll keep getting the same answer."

The current approach "encourages development that gives us 30-year mortgages and 10-year wells," Midkiff said.

He urged village officials to stop pumping the wells at

The Fourth of July in a changing nation

Court rulings will rock our schools

When the nation celebrates its birthday tomorrow, it's worth taking note of the fact that ours isn't a static nation. We're doing things, like them or not. Just last week, our judicial system did these things:

- The Supreme Court ruled that Ohio may issue school vouchers, giving parents taxpayer money to send their kids to private schools.
- The Supreme Court also ruled that public school students may be tested for drugs if they are engaged in any sort of extracurricular activities, not

only in athletic programs. And a federal appeals court in California ruled that the pledge of allegiance to the nation's flag is unconstitutional. (In this instance, the uproar was so loud that the presiding judge delayed execution...perhaps before somebody executed him.) Those Supreme Court rulings on constitutionality opened the door to arguments and turmoil in every state in the union, including New Mexico, for a long time to come. Fires, drought, scalding temperatures, other common conversation topics around New Mexico evaporated like a sweat drop on a sidewalk the moment on June 26 the Appeals Court ruled unconstitutional the Pledge of Allegiance.

In Newdow's dictionary, the words "he" and "she" would be replaced by the word "re," "His" and "hers" would become "rees," and "him" and "her" would become "erm."


Now, isn't this the type of fellow with whom you would like to waste away a lazy summer afternoon? Not really. Re is a jerk.

The purpose is to award the "Harvey" to the employee of any city, town or hamlet who has done the most to further restrict, hinder or harass private property owners.


Harvey Keck has since passed away, but his spirit will live forever in the hearts of officials, even in such a lovely place as Ruidoso.

Despite Supreme Court, school vouchers not legal in N.M.

The U.S. Supreme Court agreed last week to allow Ohio taxpayers to subsidize religious instruction and practice. This moves that debate to the New Mexico state legislature and it will surely be an issue in the Governor's race too. Politics aside, vouchers still won't be legal in New Mexico because they violate our State Constitution, including the anti-donation clause.

Just because vouchers may be legal in some circumstances doesn't make them a good idea. The National Education Association-New Mexico hopes that policymakers will turn toward educational issues, like teacher quality, class size, more parental involvement and high expectations for every child.

New Mexico has received high grades in standards and accountability, according to Education Week. More students are completing high school and there's a higher percentage going on to college.

NEA-NM president Eduardo Holguin says the good news must be

considered with caution. "Until now our teaching force worked hard and got results. Increasingly, we can't compete in keeping these folks in the state. If we don't address basic problems such as salaries and recruitment, we can't assume there will be good news in the future. As an organization, NEA-NM believes it's critical to accelerate our efforts with all students. Quality schools begin with us because it takes highly trained professionals in each classroom to make a difference and get results as well as achieve success. We believe in working with other education partners to strengthen teacher preparation and professional development."

Ninety percent of American students attend public schools. Most parents don't want vouchers. They want to see efforts to improve the quality of schools their children attend.

Vouchers are a divisive and expensive diversion from continuing progress in these areas. Make no mistake, vouchers are not reform.

If policymakers want to act on the issues that parents care most about, they will address teacher quality, class

size, making sure all schools have high expectations for every child, and providing the resources to help students succeed.

The Ruidoso Education Association, NEA-Hondo Valley and NEA-New Mexico will continue to fight for public schools and against vouchers at the ballot box and in the legislature. We will continue this fight in allegiance with the vast majority of American parents who want good schools in their communities. And we will continue this fight with the best interests of children foremost in our minds.

Welder cited for June fire

A Ruidoso Downs man pleaded no contest Monday to improper handling of fire in connection with a blaze last month that burned three acres off Sierra Blanca Airport Road.

Tory Irons was assessed a \$500 fine, plus \$51 in court costs, by Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean Jr. in Carrizozo. He was placed on 182 days of probation and was given six months to make restitution for fire fighting and related costs. No exact figure was attached to the order and may be determined by the district attorney, according to a court clerk.

Irons was cited by Lincoln County Deputy

Sheriff Robert Shepperd, who is part of the area arson task force.

In the charging documents, Shepperd wrote that when he arrived at the scene of the fire, Irons told him he was welding a fence, a fire started and got away from him. Shepperd determined the cause to be welding slag, he stated in the report. He also determined that Irons didn't have adequate resources to suppress any fire that might have occurred from the welding or to prevent the spread of fire.

Fire fighters battled the flames for several hours with some staying on-site to ensure any embers were extinguished before they could flare up again. No one was injured and no structures were affected.

Two local companies get grants

Sherry Barrow Strategies and Blue Skies got help with their forest thinning ideas.

Sherry Barrow Strategies was awarded a \$58,000 grant from the Four Corners Sustainable Forests Partnership toward purchase of equipment for more efficient handling of small-diameter wood.

With her husband, Barrow put together an operation in Glencoe that produces wood shavings for animal bedding using the small-diameter trees cut during community and private forest thinning to reduce the fire hazard and improve forest health.

Using a previous grant from Four Corners, the company developed the successful wood utilization model by introducing technology and practices for the production process, according to information from the Four Corners staff.

Hauling contractors in the area were unfamiliar with methods of handling small

diameter wood. The addition of a sling loader on a fork lift purchased with the latest grant will substantially increase the amount of wood that can be handled.

Partners with Barrow include the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Forest Service, Lincoln County, the village of Ruidoso and the New Mexico Forestry Division.

Another \$38,000 grant was awarded to Blue Skies of Ruidoso to buy a trailer with a grappler and an all-terrain vehicle to economically retrieve, transport and deliver small-diameter materials to small sawmills and wood yards in the area that are selling rough-cut lumber and firewood to the local market.

Barrow also can use whatever additional materials Blue Skies can deliver for the animal bedding product that is planned to be marketed nationwide.

Bart Parsons, Blue Skies owner, is predicting economic success for his company with the new equipment and the market he identified. Blue Skies partners on the project include the Forest Service, the village and Ruben Reyes, a forest thin-

ning contractor.

The Ruidoso projects were among four selected by Four Corners to receive grants and to demonstrate forest restoration, community economic development and wildfire reduction. They have received about \$206,000 in 2002 from the partnership.

Four Corners was formed four years ago by state foresters in New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado and Utah with the support of the U.S. Forest Service and many other organizations. Since then, grants funded by the federal government have been awarded to non-profit organizations, entrepreneurial and tribal enterprises in each of the four states.

More than \$760,000 was awarded in 2002 for all four states while project sponsors provided matching funds of more than \$363,000 for a total program of about \$1.1 million this year.

The thrust of the program is to alleviate deteriorating forest health, declining forest-based economic activity in Four Corners communities and the increasingly severe wildfire hazards.

Gas royalty suit settlement adds to N.M. schools' coffers

SANTA FE - Public schools will receive almost \$5 million in additional revenue in July as their share of a \$30 million settlement of the state's lawsuit against BP America Production Company for additional royalties, which was announced by State Land Commissioner Ray Powell and Attorney General Patricia Madrid in May.

Proceeds from the settlement also will be distributed to other beneficiaries, which include universities, special schools and hospitals that serve children with physical, visual and auditory disabilities, among others.

Public schools statewide received the majority of the allocation, which was \$4,936,483 in money distributed directly from the settlement. Almost \$4.4 million will be deposited into the Land Grant Permanent Fund account for public schools.

Water reservoirs will receive

more than \$348,000 in money from the settlement. This is money that will be helpful if the drought in New Mexico continues. These funds are administered by the State Engineer and the Interstate Stream Commission.

This additional revenue, combined with money recovered since Powell launched oil royalty audits in 1993, amounts to nearly \$50 million in royalty settlements with oil and gas companies.

BP (formerly known as Amoco Production Company) was one of four named defendants in a complaint for additional carbon dioxide royalties filed in August 2000 by the Attorney General's Office on behalf of the state land commissioner.

In all, 22 companies have settled with the State Land Office for oil and gas royalty settlements during Powell's administration.


Ruidoso's Parks & Rec people are looking for a few more kids



President rated 'most important' in World Almanac for Kids survey

NEW YORK - President George W. Bush was chosen as the most important person in the world today by kids, in the second "Kids Speak Out!" contest, sponsored by The World Almanac For Kids. Mom took the No. 2 spot, and Dad ranked third (sorry, Dads).

The events of Sept. 11, 2001, and kids' concern for safety showed up frequently in how kids responded to the contest question, "Who are the three most important people in the world today, and why?" Osama Bin Laden, Rudolph Giuliani, Vice President Dick Cheney, and Colin Powell - as well as firefighters, police, the U.S. military forces, and doctors and nurses - all appeared among the top choices.

The "Kids Speak Out!" contest was held for kids aged 6-14 and conducted between August 2001 and February 2002. To enter the contest, kids wrote in and described who they thought were the three most

important people in the world. The World Almanac For Kids sponsored a similar contest two years earlier.

The winning entry came from Scott Skophammer, a 10-year-old 4th-grader from Fort Dodge, Iowa. He chose Nelson Mandela, Rudy Giuliani, and George W. Bush.

In his essay, Scott writes that "they all took disaster and are trying as members of a team to turn those disasters into something positive."

For creating the best entry, Scott and his family will be given an all-expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C.

Public servants, both U.S. and international political figures, and past U.S. presidents dominate the full list of important people. Authors, historical figures, cultural icons, and personal friends and family appear throughout the list.

And while sports stars and entertainers are well represented, they rank surprisingly

low, just as they did in the previous contest (see complete results below).

For the second time, the President was the top vote getter in the "Kids Speak Out!" contest; however, this time President Bush was named by 69 percent of kids, while previously President Bill Clinton received only 30 percent of the vote. The events of Sept. 11 altered kids' perceptions as to who is important in their eyes - firefighters, police, military, and doctors and nurses didn't appear in the top 25 of the last contest. Not one athlete or astronaut made it in the top 25 this year, while Michael Jordan, Mia Hamm, Neil Armstrong, and John Glenn all made it into the top ranks in the previous contest.

God, ranked 6th this year, and teachers, ranked 5th, both became more important - they were previously 19 and 20. Rosa Parks and Martin Luther King Jr. both remained

in the top 25, and Mom, with 25 percent of the votes, is still more important than Dad, who got 20 percent.

"Every adult knows that the world changed on Sept. 11. What I find interesting is that young kids seem to have a real sense of that as well. Their responses provide another measure of the magnitude of those events," said Kevin Seabrooke, editor of The World Almanac For Kids. "The president is a very concrete representative of government for kids, and he's one you would expect to see near the top. It's telling that names like Giuliani, Cheney, Powell - and even Bin Laden - also appear on the list."

"And this year, firefighters and police officers made the top 10. It's reassuring to see that kids still feel that family, teachers, and faith are important. Of course, they are kids after all, so you will find the likes of J.K. Rowling, Britney

Spears, Michael Jordan, and Walt Disney on the list as well."

Kids from 46 states entered the contest. Entries also came from children in Canada, Bosnia, Croatia, Egypt, England, Japan, Nigeria, Malta, Malaysia, India, Pakistan, Philippines, Romania, Saudi Arabia, Slovenia, and Kuwait.

More than half of the entries were received via e-mail.

The contest was sponsored by The World Almanac For Kids, which is published annually by World Almanac Books. The completely revised and updated World Almanac For Kids 2003 will be in stores this month. The 2003 edition will sponsor a new "Kids Speak Out!" contest.

Village clerk replacement ready

When Tammie Maddox resigns as Ruidoso village clerk, Mayor Leon Eggleston is ready with her successor.

Irma Nava, who now is deputy clerk, is his choice for appointment to the position, Eggleston said last week during a village council meeting.

"I want to announce this to quell any rumors," he said.

Councilor Bob Sterchi applauded the selection, but said action should wait until Maddox successfully emerges from the general election. She won the Republican nomination in the primary and faces no Democratic opposition, but a candidate from a minority party still could run against her.

Village Attorney John Underwood said he is researching and seeking a second opinion on the village's stance in passing an ordinance declaring the village clerk and police chief classified employees. That move

is contrary to state statutes, which define those positions as "at will" jobs, not requiring cause for firing. A mayor may nominate, but needs approval of the council to hire or fire, Underwood said.

In other action, councilors rezoned a tract of land owned by the village in the Grindstone area. The 12 acres were designated for an affordable housing project, but that appears to be on hold because the developer said the numbers won't float. The land was rezoned from single-family residential to residential planned unit development. The action doesn't obligate the council to move forward with the project.

The council also approved a wine wholesaler license to be used at Wines of New Mexico at 2801 Sudderth Drive, submitted by applicant Jessica Green.

Under the consent agenda, councilors approved:

- A special dispensers permit for the Swiss Chalet Inn Horse Shoe tournament July 26-27.
- A professional services contract with

Nancy Luna for DWI Prevention Program clerk in the magistrate court in Carrizozo and with Tennie Swanner for the DWI clerk in the magistrate court in Ruidoso; with Kathleen Freebird and Janet Norris for DWI Program assessments and recommendations to the court; and with The Counseling Center for DWI counseling services.

Norris and Freebird are paid \$75 per scheduled client from fees charged to those clients. Luna will be paid for 10 hours a week and Swanner for up to 30 hours at a rate of \$10 per hour.

- Approved the renewal of the annual agreement with the Humane Society of Lincoln County to provide humane care and kennel facilities for animals.

- Approved a second renewal agreement for professional services with Progressive Environmental Systems Inc. for services related to water.

- Approved a second renewal agreement with Mary Lea Lane as Arts Commission Coordinator.

One of the young people charged with starting the 8,650-acre Cree Fire in May 2000 was arrested June 29 for possession of marijuana and illegally being in a declared forest area on Upper Hideaway Loop.

Smith was arrested in June with Bruce Charles Kyle, 20, of Ruidoso, who was charged with wrongful use of public property (being on a declared forest area), possession of marijuana and drug paraphernalia and allowing self to be served alcohol; and Lashla T. Rue, 18, of Ruidoso, who was charged with wrongful use of public property and allowing self to be served alcohol.

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Church add-on nixed by board

Planning and Zoning commissioners side with neighbors along Hull Road

Officials with Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church can appeal or replat, but Tuesday, their plans for an outdoor pavilion, dining hall and four cabins on Hull Road were denied by the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission.

After listening to two hours of testimony, about the same amount of time devoted to the petition at a meeting two weeks ago, members Phillis Barnett, Mike Reveley and chairman Glen Barrow voted to deny a conditional use permit for the proposed church retreat. Member Bill Hirschfeld abstained, saying that someone had questioned a possible conflict on his part because his wife was a founding member of the church.

Rev. O.E. Krohn, pastor emeritus, told commissioners that the primary goal of the retreat was to minister and nourish the spirits of those who may stay at the cabins. They want an outdoor sanctuary close to the church as part of that mission.

But Charles Rennick said the closest definition for what the church members proposed was a hotel or motel because the cabins would serve youth groups and others coming from out of town to enjoy recreational facilities and for conferences.

Reveley, after having Rennick read the requirements for granting a conditional use permit, pointed out that the board is directed to give weight to the wishes of surrounding neighbors.

The wishes of many of those

owners were expressed at the first meeting, in a petition against the application submitted Tuesday and in letters sent to the commission.

They echoed statements by Linda Flack, a neighbor, who said people buying property next to a church never envisioned that a retreat with cabins would be part of the package.

Church member Mary Ann Schweers disagreed with the contention that property values might be adversely affected if the project goes through and said that the cabins could be used by the American Red Cross in case of disasters and evacuations. If the project is denied, the property purchased in 1993 might have to be sold, she said. Then someone could buy the land and put in multi-family units.

One resident said he would prefer that to a youth camp.

Reveley said that might solve the problem. The church could sell that valuable five-acre tract of land and buy other acreage that is more isolated.

But for now, the group can appeal the decision to the village council or could submit a replat of the property, making the outdoor pavilion part of the church and the other tract green space to be considered at a later date.

Rennick and Runnels assured members of the commission that the decision with three members voting to deny and one abstaining met the test, because it still constitutes a quorum of board members. A conditional use permit is required for church activity in any land use zone within the village.

BEARS: OK to watch, not to feed

when they enter dens in an emaciated condition. Supplemental feeding of bears can result in cubs being born in habitats that can't sustain additional animals. They typically suffer and starve to death.

• Making unnatural food sources available to bears may endanger human hikers or others who unknowingly surprise bears on food piles. It is against the law to create a public nuisance by feeding wildlife.

• By not attracting bears to your community, the number of dangerous situa-

tions often facing bears is reduced. People shoot guns to chase off bears. When that no longer scares the animal, they often shoot the bear.

Not feeding bears includes bear-proofing homes and properties, game officials said. They recommended:

- Store garbage in sturdy cans inside closed metal sheds or garages until the night before collection.
- Pets should be fed indoors and pet food stored in sturdy cans kept inside.
- Barbecue grills should be cleaned after every use and stored inside.
- Hummingbird feeders must be

taken in at night. All bird seed should be consumed within a day.

• Woodpiles should be removed from houses, because they attract rodents, which are bear food.

• Compost piles will attract bears, especially if they contain melon rinds or other fragrant fruit.

• Beehives, chicken pens and other livestock should be kept away from a house. Protect them with electric fencing.

• Fruit trees should be planted away from homes and fruit be picked as it ripens. Those that fall to the ground should be removed.

Leadership Lincoln seeks participants

The directors of Leadership Lincoln are developing a curriculum focused on creating a solid foundation of fun, energetic activities and sharp speakers. They aim to make the program self-sufficient within a year, funded by grants, contributions and tuition.

The program began this year as a Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce initiative to educate and retain community leaders.

"It will encourage those

people that are strong individuals to become more involved," said Brad Treptow, Leadership Lincoln treasurer.

With a projected 12 participants per year, at an annual tuition of \$250 each, however, it will not cover its expenses. Leadership Lincoln is therefore seeking sponsors, companies whose own leaders see the importance of training involved citizens.

Employers like utility companies, municipalities, financial institutions and entertainment outlets might consider sponsoring one of their own employees with a schol-

arship, Treptow said.

In addition to providing scholarships, a sponsor can donate goods and services or cover the cost of a luncheon. For \$500, a sponsor can underwrite a program session and participate in that session. And for \$1,000, a "Founder" sponsor receives recognition in Leadership Lincoln printed material and an invitation to participate in a program session related to the sponsor's own field.

Participants will meet in nine all-day sessions from September through May, learning to network and pro-

vide teamwork within the community, to create a vision for the region, and to solicit resources for assistance.

Session topics will include health, education, government, arts and resource management.

Lincoln County and Mescalero residents interested in participating in Leadership Lincoln have until July 15 to apply. Applications are available at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, the Ruidoso News office, area financial institutions and utility companies.

LCMC awarded funds for communications

The Lincoln County Medical Center will receive \$5,998 to improve its telecommunications system.

The award from the Rural Health Care Universal Service program was announced last week by U.S. Rep. Tom Udall, D-N.M. The 1996 Telecommunications Act established the grant program to provide services to rural health care providers.

"This award will allow the center to direct more of its funding to improving the health of many residents of Ruidoso," Udall said. "Rural health care practition-

ers offer an essential service to the many citizens who live in remote areas of our state. Their costs often are prohibitive to providing necessary health care services to New Mexicans in rural areas."

Tele-health is the use of electronic information and telecommunications technologies to support long-distance clinical health care, patient and professional health-related education, public health and health administration.

Technologies used in tele-health include video-conferencing, the Internet,

store-and-forward imaging, streaming media, satellite and wireless communications.

They already exist, but are not yet part of the regular landscape for the nation's rural and urban underserved peoples, the congressman said.

The health care industry is about 15 years behind in the effective use of this technology, said Udall, who is the ranking member of the subcommittee of Rural Enterprises, Agriculture and Technology.

Trujillo to represent state at World Games

For any Special Olympics athlete, just getting a chance to compete can be special.

But for one particular Ruidoso athlete, the chance to compete has become that much more special.

Ruidoso's Ernest Trujillo, who ran at the New Mexico Special Olympic games May 31-June 1, has been chosen to represent the United States at the World Games, to be held in Ireland in June 2003.

Trujillo, who ran 50-meter run, 100-meter run and 4x100 relay at the state games in Albuquerque and took the gold medal in the 100 meters, was chosen after filling out an application and being reviewed by the state's Special Olympic Committee.

The reviewing process was particularly difficult because Trujillo was up against 45 other runners from the state who met the same qualifications.

"We looked at the attributes and characteristics of that person," said Special Olympics spokesman Chris Page. "Will he represent the United States and New Mexico well? We felt that Ernest would."

Trujillo is one of only nine athletes from the state traveling to Ireland, and is the only one running track.

He'll travel to the U.S. Olympic Training Center in San Diego in October to develop a personal training regimen, and will take another trip in March to meet with his teammates from across the country.

"We have to have these conferences because we're no longer New Mexico, we're Team USA," Page said.

Page said the trip will be exciting and interesting for everyone involved, not just those that will be competing.

"That's been the coolest thing out of all this, to call everybody and let them know they're going," Page said. "There's tears, laughter, and a lot of people are just speechless. It's really exciting and there are so many unknowns for us, because none of us have been to Ireland, either."

"I think this will be the best World Games ever," he concluded.

Fishing report for Ruidoso area, July 3, 2002

Ruidoso River: The rain Monday was great, unfortunately it did little to help the river flow. Pray for lots more rain on future dates.
Special note: The Ruidoso River has a new bag limit as of April 1. In the past a five fish limit was in effect. The new limit is three fish, a good move by the NMGF Department to help conservation and a quality fishery.
Fishing info for the river is the same as has been reported the last several weeks. Concentrate efforts between Gavilan Canyon bridge and the Chamber of Commerce building. In this stretch of water you should find a fair amount of fish. Toss Pheasant tail nymphs and bead head Prince Nymphs. Tie a Parachute Adams or Humpy dry fly on as a lead fly, then tie a nymph dropper about 12-18 inches behind. Use the lead fly as your strike indicator. This is an effective and fun way to fish small waters.
Remember to always wear eye protection.
Southfork: Closed due to fire hazard.
Bonito Lake: Closed due to fire hazard.
Eagle Lakes: Eagle Lakes are open for the season. Reports are that there are lots of hungry fish. The scenery here is an 11 on a 10 scale. Great place for teaching kids or beginners alike...Toss what you've got. Wear long pants and shirts and use bug dope, it's deer fly season.
Grindstone: This lake was stocked with rainbows ten days ago. Woolly Buggers, Zankers and Streamers fished fairly deep have produced fish the past weeks. For spin casters, tie on a propeller fly behind a bubble rig and enjoy catching fish with a fly. The hot ticket for propeller flies has been purple or black strip.
The lake is once again open to non-motorized craft. Dig out your float tube, air it up and go fishing.
Please remember to squeeze the barbs down on all hooks; this will reduce injury to any fish caught and returned to the water. Please, if you pack it in, pack it out. Litter continues to plague the area lakes and streams.
Lake Mesalero: The lake level is quite low, but is fishing well. Dark woolly buggers continue to take fish late in the day. A few folks have been successful with Parachute Adams, Mosquito, or Hendrickson patterns and casting to rising fish. Remember to get your day pass at the front desk.
Please practice catch and release wherever and whenever you can.

Fly Fishing Tip of the week when returning to your vehicle, do not place your rod on the roof or stand next to your vehicle. Pull up your windshield wiper and place the butt section of your rod and reel under the wiper in a vertical angle, then release the wiper blade. This will hold the rod in place and you can not drive off and forget it.
