Ruidoso's manager to vacate

After almost 10 years with the village, a new job in Colorado has lured Alan Briley away.

Ruidoso Village Manager Alan Briley submitted his resignation Monday, effective Aug. 9.

Briley joined the village in September 1992 as deputy manager under then-top man Gary Jackson. When his boss left four years ago, Briley was hired as manager as former mayor Robert Donaldson took office.

He is leaving Ruidoso to take the position of city manager in Frisco, Colo., which is located off Interstate 70 about 75 miles west of Denver.

"I've tried to notify all of the village councilors," Briley said Monday. "My wife and I are really excited about the move, but we will be sad to leave the area and all of our friends."


Mayor Leon Eggleston, who was elected last March, objected two months later when the council awarded Briley a raise and a contract. But contacted Monday, Eggleston spoke positively about Briley and said the manager told him about the resignation that morning.

"I told him I wish him well," the mayor said. "I will miss Alan. I think he's done well, but he thought it was time to move on. He's very fortunate, he told me he only sent out one resume right after the election and it just worked out."

Eggleston said he planned to be at his municipal office most of Tuesday in preparation for the council meeting that night. The manager's position will be advertised and he will propose that two councilors join him on a selection committee, because three or more councilors would constitute a quorum.

"I definitely will be involved in the interviews because I will spend a lot of time with (the replacement)," Eggleston said. Members of the committee will recommend a pared down list of applicants to be interviewed and probably will single out their top choice, he said.

On a mission

St. Joseph Apache Mission in the midst of a facelift

While the Fourth of July weekend excitement was focused on the annual Mescalero Apache parade, rodeo and maiden puberty ceremonial, restoration work quietly continued one of the reservation's main landmarks, St. Joseph Apache Mission.

Since fundraising started in February 1998, more than \$342,000 has been raised to restore and preserve the church started in 1920 by a young friar, Father Albert Braun. According to Brother Peter

A. Boegel of the Franciscan order that operates the old mission, the money is targeted for the replacement of crumbling mortar between the large stones quarried locally and hauled to the site for the 50-foot high walls of the church that took 25 years to build.

The amount raised equals about 22 percent of the total projected cost, with 36 percent coming from foundation grants, 54 percent from private grants and the remaining 10 percent from the hard work of individuals and small groups that con-

Forest open to the public come Friday

Campfires and charcoal grilling banned as restrictions remain

Outdoors enthusiasts around Ruidoso will pull out their hiking boots and dust off their tents this weekend with the news that the Lincoln National Forest will reopen Friday morning.

But fire restrictions will remain in effect, including no campfires or charcoal grilling.

Brian Power, fire management officer in the Alamogordo office of the U.S. Forest Service, said Tuesday that during a meeting the previous day, forest officials agreed to lift the forest closure imposed May 22.

"We've had enough moisture to relieve the potential for a really large fire, but not sufficient to reduce the threat with so many points of possible ignition out there, if fire restrictions weren't in place," Power said.

Although Ruidoso received about three-quarters of an inch of rain last week, showers have been spotty. Some areas of the forest haven't

seen any rain or so little that a high wind would wick moisture away, he said.

"When you're 10 to 12 inches behind (the average rainfall), it will take more than an inch or two to get beyond the point of worry," Power said.

Since the closure in May, Ruidoso has recorded about 1.5 inches of rain, he said.

"Normally, our monsoon season starts around July 4th," he said. "It started on time and everything is looking good. The dew point has been over 55 for three days and the wind is out of the southeast, which are good indicators that the monsoon pattern is taking effect."

Monday, foresters will meet again to evaluate conditions for the possible removal or lessening of fire restrictions, he said.

"I'd like to see campfires allowed at least in the supervised campgrounds," he said.

Besides a lagging precipitation count, manpower is another worry if a fire breaks

County joins state in new voting system

Lincoln County was the last to sign on, but with a roster of all 33 counties in the state now in place, a new centralized voting registration system promises to eliminate registration duplications.

Secretary of State Rebecca Vigil-Giron announced the new system last month after the Lincoln County Commission finally gave County Clerk Martha Proctor approval to move ahead.

The new system, called VREMS or Voter Registration and Elections Management

System, is designed to organize and update voter registration information for county clerks and the secretary of state's office.

"Our goal is to create a first class, standardized statewide system that will make it easier to update voter information and create another barrier for fraud," Vigil-Giron said. "We anticipated the need for a centralized voter registration more than three years ago and were successful in receiving funding from the state Legislature. The system we are now implementing is also part of proposed federal election reform."

The legislature set aside \$2 million for

the project. Vigil-Giron's office budgeted \$55,186 to install the Power Profile voter registration system in Lincoln County, according to an April letter from the secretary of state urging the county commission to commit to the program.

"Money budgeted is based on the county size and includes needed hardware, licensing, data conversion and training," she wrote.

At that time, the county was one of nine not signed up.

"It's very important to complete this project with all 33 counties included so that we



ducted raffles, food sales and concerts, Boegel said.

"We recently decided to use the Apache burden basket as a symbol of this restoration project," he said. Used in the puberty ceremony for young maidens, the contents of the basket are poured over the head of the girl becoming a woman as a sign of the blessing for good health and long life, he explained.

"Some days I see this church and veterans memorial as a burden," he said. "This restoration project will take an enormous amount of money and work. But when I step back, I see that St. Joseph Apache Mission is so very much needed and appreciated as a carrier of burdens."

Volunteers and workmen still are looking at about 12 years to complete the restoration work at the current rate of progress, he said. Four people comprise the work crew - a project administrator, Mary Serna, and three masons - under Boegel's supervision. Besides the mortar work, plans call for installation of a better heating system and other improvements, such as the total removal of bats from inside the mission.

"It seems that the bats love our mission as much as we do," he said. "Although we have blocked their access holes, a few have managed to sneak back in. This goes to show that we are correct in thinking that the entire church will need to be repointed inside and out before we manage to keep the bats out entirely."

Deanna Oberheu with Caprock State Park in Texas suggested building bat houses to help control the unwanted visitors. High school shop classes have been asked to adopt the structures as a project.

Giving an update on the work on the impressive structure, Boegel said in November, Territorial Scaffolding of Albuquerque set up a scaffold bridge about 60 feet to 75 feet above the sanctuary floor to give access to the stonework in the arch, which was in "terrible" condition. While the bridge was up, the crew installed a new stained glass window donated by a parish family and created by Teresa Thompson of Cloudfroft.

The new seating and altar arrangement organized below for safety reasons proved to be popular with parishioners and visitors, he said.

Sun Tours of New Mexico put the mission on one of its tour trips. Usually, short tours of the mission are guided by Boegel and visitors have proved to be generous, he said.

In December, a medieval musical troupe called Crisol Bufons performed a free concert inside the mission to benefit the restoration project, raising \$775 on a chilly winter night. Periodic enchilada dinners put together by parishioners raised

\$2,085.

Over the past six months, working with the Otero County Native Plant Society and the Mescalero Apache Tribe, landscaping on the hillside in front of the church has started with the help of

Judith Phillips, author, educator and nursery owner, who specializes in native plants. Wynn Anderson, a native plant specialist and administrator at the University of Texas-El Paso also contributed her ideas.

Phillips drew up a landscape design for the group to follow in the months and years ahead, Boegel said. The project will be accomplished through grants and volunteer effort.

To date, the hillside has been tilled, large boulders and rocks set in place and, some planting has started.

The mission group also continues to work on the Restoration Project Information Center, gathering pictures and histories. The exhibit opened to the public in May.

"In the fall, we are planning to send out announcements to invite all of the schools in the area, including El Paso, to consider our Mission and Information Center a place for history field trips," Boegel said. The project has received

some good exposure through the media and special programs such as a presentation by Boegel to the joint Arizona-New Mexico Historical Society Convention in Las Cruces last April.

The crew also attended the International Seminar for the Conservation and Restoration of Earthen Architecture that month. The hands-on training workshop focused on lime mortar technology at the Acoma Pueblo and was a joint effort of Cornerstones Community Partnerships and the National Institute of Anthropology and History of the State of Chihuahua, Mexico.

During the summer, work will focus on the exterior north-east wall where the group left off last fall.

"When this repointing is finished, it will give us an entire wall inside and out completed," Boegel said. "This is a great milestone because it was the wall that was in most need of repair."

The mission is open seven days a week and is easily accessible from U.S. 70 on a main exit in Mescalero.

Albuquerque switch to blame in Valor long-distance hangup

Phone customers flooded Valor Telecom offices with complaints midday Monday that they could not make or receive long-distance calls.

By afternoon, callers in Ruidoso, Alto, Capitan, Ruidoso Downs and Bent were hearing the message, "All circuits are busy," when trying to call locally.

Faulty equipment in Albuquerque caused the long distance problem, said a Valor Telecom representative, and customers could complete local calls, including 911.

"Usually when we have a situation like this, when people can't make long-distance calls, it increases local traffic," said David Duran, community relations director for Valor Telecom.

In an effort to find out what was wrong with the phone system by calling their neighbors, people jammed the local lines.

Valor tested their own system and could find no problem, so they contacted Qwest and started joint testing.

Qwest, the largest phone company in the state, found the problem in its switch in Albuquerque, which manages a lot of long-distance traffic, Duran said.

"It's not that uncommon to have a problem somewhere else in the state affecting calling in Ruidoso because all of the networks are interconnected. It also makes it sometimes harder to isolate the problem,"

Duran said.

Most of the long-distance traffic in New Mexico is routed through Albuquerque, including toll calls.

Qwest repaired its equipment, restoring service by 5 p.m.

"Despite our best efforts to ensure that our networks operate reliably, problems in other areas can affect us locally and, in those cases, we work very closely together with other telecom carriers to restore service," said Joe

Champion, area operations manager for Valor.

This week's equipment failure is unrelated to the long distance trouble residents experienced on June 28. In that case, a programmer with one of Valor's equipment vendors entered an incorrect code, causing callers to hear a recording instructing them to dial zero to complete a call. Once it discovered the problem, Duran said, Valor instructed the vendor to recode the system.



informed along the way," Eggleston said. "Once we've narrowed it down, all councilors, more than likely, will visit with those on that list."

Briley's wife, Jean Vinson Briley, resigned from her position as head of Lincoln County Hospice about three months ago.

Councilor L. Ray Nunley said he's disappointed that Briley is leaving, but would never begrudge a person trying to improve his situation.

"I'm glad the mayor said he's going to advertise the position, but I'm disappointed that he couldn't rely on the entire board for a selection committee to pick the best," Nunley said. "I have no problem having all selection sessions as public meetings. I want to make sure

we pick the best person we can get because we have so much work to do in the next three or four years."

Councilor Deborah Marcum-Byars said she just found out about Briley leaving.

"I wish Mr. Briley well and I understand the nature of city managers," she said. "They typically change jobs and that gives them new opportunities to see new things."

Councilor Frank Cummins hadn't heard the news.

"I thought he was a very good manager and I hate to see him leave, but I can understand," Cummins said. "He's had some pretty tough times."

Councilor Bob Sterchi said, "I think Alan's done an incredible job for us the last four years. I had my

doubts when he took over for Gary, because I thought so much of Gary, but (Briley) far exceeded my expectations. We're losing someone who's done a heck of a job for the village, but I don't blame him for leaving when he has a mayor who doesn't support him."

Councilor Ron Hardeman said, "Mr. Briley has been a dedicated village employee for the last 10 years and has helped the village through some trying times. I wish him well in his new position in Colorado."

"The village will immediately begin the process of finding a well-qualified person to follow Mr. Briley as our manager. I'm confident there will be no shortage of qualified applicants."

Councilor Ron Anderson could not be reached for comment.

Dam removal started, more to do

Some smaller manmade dams in the Rio Ruidoso were removed after initial general warnings to property owners, but dozens more remain, some that will require special steps approved by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Mike Runnels, director of Ruidoso Planning and Zoning, said Tuesday that his department's next move will be to walk the entire river for a complete survey of remaining dams and to check ownership of adjoining land where they are found.

"Then we need to tell the owners to get with the Corps on a plan because some could create more problems than they solve, if the removal isn't

handled correctly," Runnels said. "The enforcement attitude of the Corps is that once owners have been told to take them down and that they may need a permit, their approach to enforcement will escalate."

Probably less than a dozen of the dams will require special "best practice" steps for removal to mitigate any negative effects, he said.

Once the notification goes out to landowners, the process of enforcement and monitoring removal will be in the Corps' lap, he said.

He credited media exposure and a warning in the newsletter of the Ruidoso River Association for alerting some landowners about the requirement to remove dams. Many who had smaller and less intrusive dams complied, he said.

Fall injures Capitan woman prior to 4th of July parade

Lori Lobb, 25, was still unconscious in a Lubbock, Texas, hospital Tuesday, but was listed in stable condition.

The Capitan Fourth of July Parade was marred during the line-up when a woman fell off a horse and subsequently was injured by it.

Lori Lobb, 25, of Capitan was transported to Lincoln County Medical Center by ambulance and then flown to Covenant Hospital in Lubbock, Texas, where she remains in the Surgical Intensive Care Unit. She has not regained consciousness, but hospital staff said Tuesday she was in stable condition.

"Nobody knew what happened," said Gail Allen, Lobb's mother-in-law. "She was on my husband's horse, he got Lori situated ... then he saw the ambulance fly by and she was on the ground."

"What we've pieced together is the horse got scared. Some said he was standing in an ant bed,

reared up, she fell off and hit her head and was knocked out, and he came back down and fell on her chest."

Allen, a nurse in the employ of Dr. Walter R. Seidel, said Seidel was at the parade and followed the ambulance, giving directions to call ahead to get the air evac ready to fly to Lubbock.

Lobb had not been responsive Tuesday, she said.

Siedel said Lobb had a closed head injury and that all bleeding had been stabilized.

"Everybody feels she'll have a recovery back to normalcy, but it'll take a few months," he said.

Collections are being taken up for the family in Capitan because Lobb and her husband, Randy, do not have medical insurance, and Allen said it means a lot to the family that people care and want to help.

"In these times when there is so much negative news around us, we sometimes forget that the majority of people are really wonderful," Allen wrote in an e-mail to the Ruidoso News. "Lincoln County has shown us that we have more than our share of these people here."

Program to teach about weed control

People who want to learn more about noxious weed control and those who want to pursue a license to eradicate invasive species are invited to a July 29 program in Ruidoso.

The all-day session called "Improving by Removing and the Other Side of the Story," starts at 8:15 a.m. with registration at the Ruidoso Convention Center. The meeting is sponsored by the Lincoln County Cooperative Weed Management Area, the Otero County Cooperative Weed Management Area and the Chaves Soil and Water Conservation District.

The registration fee includes lunch and is \$15 in advance or \$20 at the door.

"Awareness concerning undesirable vegetation is reaching an all-time high," said vegetation management specialist Sally Canning. "Unacceptable levels of noxious, invasive and toxic weeds are affecting very

resident, landowners and producer. Species are reproducing faster than our efforts to control them.

"Our crops, forage production, wilderness, wildlife habitat, recreational opportunities and land values are being affected negatively as these invasive plants take the lead in damaging numbers."

Sponsors of the workshop hope to prepare an army to fight the invaders, Canning said. The presentation will be a nuts and bolts approach with a first-hand introduction to many of the targeted species. The workshop will familiarize participants with plant identification and specific control measures based on an integrated management plan, she said.

Participants will hear about herbicide mixtures and applications, will examine how to select and reintroduce native vegetation and the sponsors will administer the New Mexico Department of Agriculture's private applicators examination for

The morning sessions will begin at 8:45 a.m. with several experts in plant identification and removal treatments speaking, as well as giving information about restoration and revegetation.

Lunch is scheduled for 12:30 p.m. to 1:30 p.m., when an overview of requirements for a license will be given, followed by a question and answer period. At 3 p.m., those who are interested can take the examination for an applicant's license.

Burglary suspects arrested after pursuit

Ruidoso police arrested three more suspects of residential burglary on July 7 and 8, after arresting a burglary suspect a week earlier who may have been involved in five burglaries.

After a high-speed chase July 8 from White Mountain and Hull drives to Highway 70 in Ruidoso Downs, police caught two suspected burglars shortly after two residences on McBride Drive had been broken into.

A Ruidoso officer arrived at one of the residences to find the door open,

the alarm sounding and a television stand without the television and VCR. Other officers were called to the scene and one saw a television in the back seat of a vehicle and tried to make a traffic stop. The vehicle sped on to Paradise Canyon, traveling between 50 and 60 mph, the report states.

The vehicle went through a red light at Paradise Canyon Road and Sudderth Drive, and sped on to Highway 70, traveling east, where Ruidoso Downs police and State Police officers joined the chase. By this time, the vehicle was traveling at least 80 mph and was in the westbound lane.

"At one point, the driver went head on with an 18-wheeler and refused to give up the lane or move

back into the eastbound lane," the report states. "The driver continued east in the westbound lane, forcing other vehicles off the road."

A Ruidoso Downs police officer threw spikes but the driver managed to avoid them and continued on.

The driver made a left turn at Short Road, but lost control of the vehicle, crashing into a stop sign after jumping the curb. The driver got out of the car and officers pursued him on foot to a fence at the end of the field, finally managing to handcuff him, despite his attempts to fight and resist the officers.

Police arrested Freddy Ray Baca, 26, of Ruidoso and Misti C. Anderson, 32, the passenger, of Colorado Springs, Colo. Baca was charged with burglary, criminal damage and larce-

ny. Charges against Anderson are pending.

Bear research meeting Tuesday

A summary of information gathered during an eight-year study of New Mexico's black bears will be presented by two researchers July 16, in Ruidoso.

Cecily Costello of the Hornocker Institute and Don Jones of the state Department of Game and Fish will present items from the study at 7 p.m. in

the Ruidoso Village Council chambers at 313 Cree Meadows Drive.

The study followed radio-collared bears in the Gila National Forest, the Philmont Ranch and the Colin Neblett and E.S. Barker Wildlife areas from 1992 to 2000.

Researchers found differences in bear habits and habitat between northern and southern regions of the state and studied nutritional needs of bears entering and leaving their winter dens.

Costello and Jones also will present information on bear/human encounters and precautions for homeowners, hikers and others.




For the sixth consecutive year, the New Mexico Lottery is expected to report record sales.

Mescalero's 'dream school' near completion

The public will get a close-up look during an open-house and celebration July 19 and 20.

The 217,000-square-foot "dream school" for the Mescalero Apache is near completion, with a crew of 25 unpacking and assembling classroom furniture and Centex Construction Company completing the final details on the six school buildings.

Superintendent Ray Swinney said he's hoping to have everything ready for the ribbon cutting ceremony, open house and two-day traditional blessing and feast July 19 and 20, though that may be a stretch. He'll start moving into his office in the central administration building next week, he said.

The public will be invited to all the open-house events and ceremonies.

"We hope to be set up by Aug. 5," Swinney said. "The teachers will be in by Aug. 12 and school starts Aug. 19."

The school has a capacity for 1,600 students, but it's not known yet how many will choose to attend this first year. For start-up, the school is staffing for between 800 and 1,000 students.

"We wish we knew," he said. "We tried to underestimate. We'd rather do that and have to hire new teachers later than hire them and have to let them go."

The central administration building will house the principals of each of the schools, the library, audiovisual production room, conference and study rooms and the textbook room, as well as his own modest office.

Swinney proudly showed off the closed-circuit television studio, control booth and teaching classroom in that building. Librarian Bonnie McBride was shelving the 16,000 books that would go into the library for the middle and high school and another 12,000 for the elementary school. Tables and chairs will be set up in the airy corridors on both ends of the library, she said, with magazines and newspapers in another room. McBride said the library will have a "huge Accelerated Reader" section by grade level.

Also in this building is the local area network system for the intercom and computer T-1 line, connecting the school's 630 computers. Two nursing quarters, one for the elementary school and one for the middle school-high school, each have an examination room and office, isolation room, shower and restroom. Separate reception areas for each school and con-

ference and resource rooms are also in this building.

In the high school building, Swinney shows off the biology classroom. Sheldon System furniture is designed for art and science, he said, and the desks can be adjusted for work from standing or sitting positions.

Each desk has rotating computer cases with the printer under the teacher's desk, cabinets for controlled environments for plant and animal experiments, and storage rooms for frogs.

"A college would be happy to have this equipment," Swinney said.

A Tech Lab 2000 room in the Vocational-Industrial Arts Complex will contain everything for a computer-driven curriculum for work in aerodynamics, desktop publishing, pneumatics, electricity, digital electronics, computer graphics, pre-mechanical engineering and many other subject areas.

"We wrote this into our program because we thought it was a good hands-on learning tool that covers a broad spectrum of interests," Swinney said. "Students will be able to design, build and test, and it even has a 70-mph wind tunnel."


The woodworking shop is complete with a classroom to design projects, computer-assisted drafting of floor plans, a painting area and teacher's office.

The auto mechanics shop would be the envy of most commercial shops, with its own drive-in controlled-environment

paint booth, hoist and areas for doing body work.

Two art classrooms are also in this building, one for graphic arts and one for fine arts. The latter has a kiln and area for clay work and a darkroom, and both have offices, storage, demonstration tables with a movable demonstration mirror, and teachers' offices.

The 483-seat auditorium, sharing a building with the two 1,500-seat gymnasiums, is near completion, with a digital projector booth and movie screen, dressing rooms, lobby and concession area. The gym area has its own lobby, ticket booth and concession area, with parking out back. It also has a weight room, locker rooms, teachers' office and trainer's room.

Girls generally make better grades than boys, but the price is anxiety

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. — Girls generally make better grades than boys, but a new study at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign shows that girls also experience more internal costs — worry, anxiety and depression — despite their academic success.

"There may be both costs and benefits to being female as well as to being male," the authors of a study wrote in the June issue of the Journal of Educational Psychology.

"Specifically, although girls may have the edge over boys in terms of their performance in school, this edge is lost when it comes to the experience of internal distress."

The long-term cost may be that as girls get older, despite their stellar academic perfor-

mance, their internal distress stops them from pursuing higher education and careers in fields such as engineering and science, said principal investigator Eva Pomerantz, a professor of psychology at Illinois. "If a girl gets to college and wonders, 'Should I go for advanced physics?' the question 'Can I handle it?' becomes a major hurdle," she said.

The study was designed to simultaneously consider gender differences in academic performance and internal distress suffered by children.

Data were collected three times from 932 fourth through sixth graders in a predominantly white school district over the course of a year (spring to spring). Researchers gathered grades in language

arts, math, science and social studies. They also collected self-reports from children on how they felt about themselves and their efforts.

Girls outperformed boys in all four subjects, although the gap narrowed slightly as children entered seventh grade. Regardless of their grades, girls reported more internal distress than did the boys. However, lower-achieving girls suffered the most.

That feelings of internal distress already were occurring in preadolescence came as a mild surprise, Pomerantz said.

Perhaps most notably, she said, the size of the difference between girls and boys in their grades was only half the size of the difference between the two in their internal distress, even

at this young age.

"In this study, even the highest achieving girls were more anxious and depressed, and perceived their abilities more negatively, than did the high achieving boys," Pomerantz said. "However, low-achieving girls did the worst. When they fail to get good grades, we think that they feel like they have really disappointed their parents, and they question their own abilities, leading to anxiety and depression."

The big question, she said, is why girls suffer more internal distress than do boys while also outperforming boys.

Pomerantz speculated that girls are more concerned than boys are when it comes to pleasing adults, such as par-

ents and teachers.

This concern leads them to be more invested in doing well. She suggests that other factors also are important.

"What are parents, teachers, the media and biology doing that make girls perform better but also experience more distress? We know, for example, that parents are more likely to exert more control over their daughters, such as checking up on their homework responsibilities more than they would with their sons," she said.

"We think that girls are socialized to put more emphasis on 'pleasing people,'" she said. "This has positive consequences in that girls become more engaged in their school work, more motivated, listen better to the teacher, and all of

this results in good grades. But, at the same time, they are constantly worrying about what happens if they do poorly."

Educators, parents, psychologists and policymakers need to be asking what they can do to help boys do better in school and to help girls feel less distress, she said.

Authors of the study were Pomerantz; Jill L. Saxon, a former psychology doctoral student at Illinois; and Ellen Rydell Altermatt, also a former doctoral student and now a professor at Michigan State University. The National Science Foundation and National Institute of Mental Health supported the study.

BLM officials to oversee Rio Bonito land public meeting next week

Land around Lincoln may be weeded and used for local grazing.

The next meeting of a group collaborating on future uses for Rio Bonito lands acquired by the federal Bureau of Land Management is set for 7 p.m. July 18 in the Lincoln Community Church.

The staff from the BLM's Roswell Field Office will be there to oversee the session dealing with Parcel 4, called the Spring Tract. Each acquired parcel is being reviewed separately.

This tract starts in an ungrazed area about one mile east of the center of the historic settlement of Lincoln and continues for three miles east to a large arroyo.

Although the meetings are open to the public, the people who may be

affected most by this next proposal are land owners who reside around Tract 4, said Richard Mayberry, acting Roswell field manager.

Some of the actions suggested for consideration during a May 30 meeting on Tract 3, which lies directly behind Lincoln, included clearing junipers to three to four trees per acre, leaving an open grassland savanna that should improve the watershed; leaving some non-indigenous trees such as

elm until native trees are established; eliminating salt cedar; using dikes to divert water runoff to secondary ditches; improving low water crossings; discouraging activities that would result in loss of riparian habitat and impairing the integrity of the Rio Bonito and the Rio Salado; developing a livestock carrying capacity for each field and limiting grazing to locals, using it as a tool to manage fire danger.

A common agenda to all parcels

has been to permanently close the acquired lands to off-highway vehicles, but for Tract 3, contributors suggested creating designated and clearly marked trails linking up with the U.S. National Forest Service accessing the Capitan Mountains.

They also suggested using the old wagon road behind the 10-acre area across from the Billy the Kid Pageant ground as a wagon and equestrian trail.

have a uniform statewide system," Vigil-Giron said.

If the money hadn't been encumbered by June 30, it would have reverted to the state's general fund.

The use of 200 new touch screen voting machines in Bernalillo County marked the first time the machines were used in New Mexico, Vigil-Giron said. "The new machines were a tremendous success and we anticipate their use in other parts of New Mexico," she added.

At a meeting last month, Proctor said that because of the county's reluctance, she was able to negotiate a better financial deal with the state as a bargaining point to convince the commission to approve the new system.

"My reasoning to her for not signing up was this system could not accommodate our satellite absentee voting polling place in Ruidoso and the one we have now can," Proctor said Tuesday. "I said it would be disenfranchising our voters. So she looked into that. I told her our county is very conservative and we didn't have that much money to spend and I certainly was not going to pay for anything to disenfranchise absentee voters in Ruidoso. She assured me she would have a fiber optic line in place so that it could accommodate."

Because of Proctor's effort, the state allocated about \$3,300 as an incentive to be deducted from what the county would pay in the future. Although installation and the first-year's fee will be covered

by the state, "It still will cost us a lot and I'm not convinced we actually needed it," Proctor said. "But I knew they'd force us and I'd rather that they pay than have to pay for it later ourselves."

The county clerk who takes her place after she is sworn into office as Division I Magistrate Judge in Carrizozo March 31, will be able to map out the schedule for implementation, Proctor said.

"There have been problems with other counties as they implemented and I hope the state works those out before it comes time for us," she said. "I certainly wouldn't recommend right before an election — maybe in the year 2003. But we do have the paperwork in place to receive the equipment."

Fire danger will decrease soon

In coordination with the National Forest Service, the village of Ruidoso will reduce the level of fire danger within its borders from "extreme" to "very high" Friday, when the Lincoln National Forest reopens to the public.

However, fire restrictions remain in place banning charcoal grills, fireworks of any kind and open burning, said James Mason, public information officer for the Ruidoso Fire Department.

Smoking will be allowed outdoors, but only in designated areas defined as any outdoor public right-of-way, public or private property or area open to the public and declared as a designated

smoking area by the owner.

Designated smoking areas may be any fixed area that is devoid of combustible debris within a 10-foot diameter and has provisions for safe disposal of used smoking materials, Mason said.

"The Ruidoso Fire Department would again like to ask the public to exercise caution when utilizing any potential ignition source," he said. "The beautiful forest in and around our community still is at risk. We would also like to thank the public for their cooperation during the extreme fire danger we faced this summer. Together, we all made the difference in keeping Ruidoso safe from fire."



Bassett, Badilla team to beat in Rainbow trials

One name was on everyone's mind heading into the trials for the Rainbow Futurity Friday at Ruidoso Downs.

Zip First.

At the end of the day, a different name was on everyone's tongue. Actually, you better make that two names.

Zip First — winner of the Ruidoso Futurity earlier this year — did qualify for the second leg of the Quarter Horse Triple Crown to be run July 21, but everyone at the track that day learned they'd better think twice before betting against trainer John Bassett and jockey Jose Badilla again.

The pair won six of the 20 trials and finished in the top three in 14 races Friday, easily outdistancing any other trainers or jockeys in terms of total winnings on the day.

Bassett also has three horses in the Rainbow Futurity, including Slew Ta Fame, who turned in the fastest qualifying time of 19.543. Other qualifying horses ridden by Badilla were First To Flash with a time of 19.655 and One Corona For Me, qualifying in 19.798.

First To Flash got his win in the 19th race, outdistancing Zip First and handing the Leon Bard-trained horse only his second loss in seven races.

Zip First and jockey James Brooks did not win the race, but still managed to qualify in the time of 19.832 for trainer Leon Bard and owner Gary Hartstack, meaning he is still eligible for the \$4 million All-American Quarter Horse Triple Crown bonus.

Change in weather

On trial days, the most common remark is: "Welcome to the mountains, where the weather can change faster than a snap of the fingers."

The Rainbow Futurity trials were no different, with the first part of the day having a head wind and the track a little heavy due to rain from the night before.

By 5 p.m., however, the track was drying, the wind changed to a tail wind, and the times just kept on getting faster with multiple horses qualifying from just a few races. The 18th and 19th races qualified three horses for the finals alone.

Now that the trials are completed, the preparations begin for the Rainbow final, and a very good field of 10 horses will be vying for the title.

Other horses qualified for the futurity include Tricky Dust, ridden by Roy Badillez and trained by C. Dwayne Gilbreath, which turned in the second-fastest qualifying time of 19.575 for owner Joan Dale Hubbard.

Another trainer with multiple horses in the Rainbow is Blaine Wood, who along with jockey James Gonzales II and owner Johnny Trotter qualified two horses. One Famous Lady and Romance Will Return qualified in the time of 19.852 and 19.855 respectively for the trio.

Ritz Cartel with jockey Sam Thompson qualified out of the last race of the day for trainer Russell M. Harris and owners Patricia and Barney Newsome. Ritz Cartel qualified in the time of 19.724. Royal Streakin qualified in the time of 19.739 for trainer Jack W. Brooks with jockey Jacky Martin aboard. Ronald Shalz and William E. Smith own Royal Streakin.

Rounding out the qualifying list is First Dashaway and jockey Freddie Martinez who quali-



that goes into working a ranch, Newberry admitted a ranch rodeo was a great deal of fun.



Capitan's team is basically made up of the Capitan girls varsity team, with the exception of Clarissa Silva of Ruidoso. Capitan head coach Rusty Wilcox led the team in the first two tournaments before turning over the reins to Mitchell for the rest of the summer.

The team is young, too. Tully-Mitchell is the only senior listed on the squad, while juniors Silva, Jessica and Melissa Becker and Alyx Sheehy round out the




