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Council OK with manager selection role

After being assured they will be included in the selection of a new village manager, members of the Ruidoso Village Council seemed comfortable Friday with a scoring and committee review process proposed by Mayor Leon Eggleston.

But the session started with some councilors showing concern that they might be excluded.

Eggleston and Village Attorney John Underwood pointed out that state statutes charge the mayor with selecting a new manager and taking that name to the council for approval.

"I'd like two councilors to help on this if they choose to," Eggleston said. "And I'd like to know how many people the council wants in the final selection group."

He also asked councilors to submit questions they would like applicants to answer.

But when Councilor Ron Anderson, who was picked by the mayor to be one of the two consulting councilors, suggested more involvement by the full board, Eggleston made it clear the final decision on who to propose for hiring will come from the mayor.

Anderson said, "I think we have a fairly diverse council here and we represent a lot of different (interests). I know it takes a lot to look at all the different (applicants), but I think you need to ask everybody right now if they'd like to be involved in the selection. I think if they do want to be involved, we don't need to narrow it down like that."

"It's my decision to make these

appointments," Eggleston replied. "I make recommendations and this council ratifies it, if it chooses to. I've asked for two councilors' help because I don't want a quorum. If you choose not to help, I can ask for somebody else; there are citizens out there."

"So there's no discussion on this subject?" Anderson asked.

"This is the way I'm going to do it," Eggleston said.

"Well, gosh mayor," Councilor L. Ray Nunley interjected. "You know we got elected by the same people you did."

"That's correct," Eggleston said. "But I believe state statutes say the mayor will appoint with the advice and consent of the council."

But Councilor Deborah Marcum-Byars said that if she doesn't understand the selection process, she'd have difficulty seeing the whole picture.

"I don't want us to find ourselves in a position where the mayor is recommending names and the council doesn't feel comfortable with them and then we're contentious," she said.

Nunley asked for more information about how the applicants will be scored. As an example, Eggleston said someone might be scored higher if they come from a mountain community or have a master's degree.

Trying to assure councilors they won't be left out of the process, Eggleston clarified that:

- They will be given copies of all applications, but until the final group is selected for interviews, the information should remain confidential.
- That an objective scoring process and questionnaire will be used to

An agreement made 45 years ago is in jeopardy, making five Capitan-area families wonder if they will stay

Watered down

For 94-year-old Cora Dutton, the issue is simple.

In August 1957, she granted a right of way for an untreated water transmission line to the village of Capitan in exchange for \$1 and the right for a tap onto the pipeline from Bonito Lake.

For years, she's been paying 1.5 times the monthly charge for water users who live in town. Her first monthly bill was \$4.50, a rate she contends was to be permanent because the water was untreated. The bill she paid July 8 was \$49.28.

But an agreement is an agreement for both sides, she said.

That's why she was alarmed when she heard from a neighbor that Capitan village officials were contacted last March by the city of Alamogordo, which owns Bonito Lake. Alamogordo officials warned that the pipeline water would be cut off July 31.

"I've never received a letter yet from

anyone," Dutton said. "I went to one (Capitan village) meeting and they said we were grandfathered in. I didn't want a lawsuit with them."

The water is used mostly for her livestock. She pays for treated water to be delivered to her home, although Dutton also has a small well.

"Sometimes it's real good, but right now, it's smelling bad," she said.

Thursday, Pat McCourt, Alamogordo city manager, said as long as Capitan's Board of Trustees is making headway to work out an agreement to serve the five families, the city will be patient.

"What really started this was the State Engineer's office," McCourt said. "They asked what was going on with the agreement. I pulled it out and realized that the agreement initially was temporary in 1992, to provide them some water until they could take steps to fix up their system, but they just continued to use it."

"The State Engineer wanted to know

what we were doing about closing out the agreement. It's raw untreated water. They've had plenty of time to make provisions for customers up there."

Although Alamogordo's action is not directly tied to the four-year drought that has dragged down the level of Bonito Lake, "if it continues, every drop of water will be valuable," McCourt said.

He didn't know the exact number of gallons supplied to the five or more taps, the manager said.

"Capitan always did the actual billing for the people on taps," he said. "We've been working with the village to ensure a smooth transition and for folks not to just be suddenly cut off. We've had no more communication lately, so apparently, they're working something out. As long as we know they're working hard to accomplish this, we will work with them on the time limit."

Commission to move on vacant clerk position

Lincoln County commissioners are scheduled to decide Thursday who will serve as interim county clerk after incumbent Martha Proctor is sworn-in as the new Division I magistrate judge.

County Manager Tom Stewart listed several options for the board:

- Appoint Tammie Maddox, the winner of the Republican Party's primary election. She faces a Libertarian Party petition candidate in the general election.

According to Stewart, Maddox is willing to do the job on a part-time basis by taking leaves of

absences from her Ruidoso village clerk position. She has received the endorsement of the chairman of the county Republican party.

However, Stewart noted that her time would be split between the two jobs and she has one more election to go.

• Appoint the current principal deputy, Loree Vallejos. Stewart pointed out that action would minimize the disruption in the office and that Proctor offered to assist the office as needed from the judge's quarters across the street.

Vallejos is reluctant to assume the position because the action wouldn't offer any additional manpower for the operation and

she essentially would be doing two jobs without help, Stewart wrote.

• Allow Proctor to continue serving as clerk at least until after the November general election, which is the option preferred by Stewart. That also would minimize the disruption in the office and would provide continuity of leadership, he noted.

But Proctor would have to divide her time between her role as judge and her clerk's position, something that may not be permitted by the Office of Judicial Standards, Stewart said in the memorandum.

He received the answer to that question in a July 10 letter from Frank H. Allen Jr., judicial advi-

sory committee chair.

"The answer to your question is no, Ms. McKnight-Proctor may not be a magistrate judge and county clerk at the same time," he wrote. "Such dual office arrangement would be in violation of the Code of Judicial Conduct."

That code charges a judge to conduct his or her extra-judicial activities to minimize the risk of conflict with judicial obligations, and that includes not holding any other paid position that conflicts with the hours and duties of the judge.

"In no event shall other paid employment or compensable activity hours be performed simultaneously," the code declares.



select finalists based, in part, on the questions submitted by councilors.

• That the entire council can sit in on the person-to-person interviews of the finalists.

• That a minimum of 10 applicants or 10 percent of the those applying, if that is larger, will be in the final group for interviews in line with the request of councilors.

The selection committee, composed of Eggleston, Anderson and Councilor Ron Hardeman, will focus on eliminating obviously unqualified applicants and scoring the rest

to come up with the best, the mayor said.

During the meeting, councilors also agreed with Eggleston to name village finance officer Lorri McKnight as acting manager until a replacement is found for Alan Briley, who leaves next month to become city manager in Frisco, Colo.

Briley departs for a significant boost in salary, from \$72,000 he recently received as a raise, to \$90,000. Frisco, a mountain town of about 3,200 people about 75 miles west of Denver, is a main shopping point for those living and visit-

ing nearby Breckenridge and Copper Mountain ski areas and Dillon, according to a town official.

Unlike Ruidoso, one of the problems Frisco is not experiencing is a water shortage, the official said.

McKnight will receive the same salary as Briley during her period of service as acting manager.

Some of the qualities councilors said they will be looking for in a new manager is knowledge of New Mexico water law and an ability to write successful grants. The salary will be negotiable, but the advertise-

ments will list Briley's current paycheck as an indicator of the range.

The council agreed not to pay the traveling expenses of those coming for interviews, but possibly consider accommodations once they arrive and reimbursement for the person hired.

Anderson said he wants it clear that other members of the board can be involved to whatever extent they prefer.

Nunley told Anderson he's comfortable with the arrangement, but asked to be updated on the pros and cons of candidates and those Anderson thinks are qualified.

Eggleston said he will keep the entire council informed.

Applications will be accepted through Friday, Sept. 6. Councilor Bob Sterchi said the council should aim to have someone selected by Oct. 1,

since it may take another month for them to move into the job.

The advertisement, which will appear in trade magazines and newsletters, is looking for "a high energy professional," who understands the nature of resort towns and the vagaries of budgeting with gross receipts taxes. They must be prepared to manage a \$24 million budget and 180 full-time employees.

Answering forest health questions

Questions about Ruidoso's new forest health ordinances have been flying around the village lately. Urban Forester Rick Delaco recently took the time to answer some of them and submitted the responses to the Ruidoso News:

Q: Do the new ordinances require removing all trees within 30 feet (Zone 1 and Zone 2) around a structure?

A: No. What is required is that native fire species (Ponderosa pine, piñon pine, junipers, cedars, douglas fir and white fir) are pruned, pine needles are raked and ladder fuels are removed. Ornamental trees and shrubs, including blue spruce, are not considered native fire species.

Q: What are ladder fuels?


A: Ladder fuels are bushes, small trees, piled-up lumber or low-hanging branches

that allow fire to spread vertically from the ground to the top, or crown, of a tree.


Q: Do I always rake pine needles down to bare dirt?

A: Usually not. The layer of needles that are fully in tact and not broken should always be removed 30 feet around a structure. Leaving the decomposing layer (1/2 to one inch) helps minimize erosion. This decomposing layer should, however, be removed two to three feet around a structure or if a property owner is going to install grass or other ground covers.

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
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Lincoln County Fair needs more participation

■ No flashing lights or shady games here; the fair is for local people and products.

Once a year, Lincoln County residents have a special chance to show off their artwork, livestock, leather craftsmanship, juicy vegetables, yummy pies and other handiwork.

The annual Lincoln County Fair, set for Aug. 5-10 at the fairgrounds in Capitan, is a great opportunity to compete for ribbons and rewards in one of the few old-fashioned county fairs around. The emphasis is on community, not a neon light-lined midway with loud barkers trying to separate children from their weekly allowances.

Run by community volunteers and people with the county extension and home economics office, the fair is a showcase for children in 4-H and FFA who have tended to animals in the hope of winning top accolades and a good price at the annual livestock sale.

But another part of the event occurs inside the main fair building, where the awards usually are tied to the details and care put into a project, whether it's photography, canning, knitting or flower arranging.

For Sharon Bundick, the focus this year will be the annual art competition and she's hitting local classrooms to encourage participation at all age

levels and using all types of media. It's important to generate interest in young children to ensure the tradition of the county fair is carried on in future generations, she said.

Last year, participation inside slipped and she fears, without a rebirth of interest, the traditional celebration of craftsmanship may slip away.

To up the ante, Bundick is gathering some great prizes to hand out to participants and has made sure that age groups are separated into their own competitions.

"Every young child who enters will receive a ribbon," she said. "I've stopped at the schools and told them

to enter something whether it's in crayon, chalk, pencil or whatever.

"But this isn't limited to children. Everyone who does art should get involved. Or, there are plenty of other categories like canning and flowers they can enter. It's not just animal related."

Her friend and art teacher, Lorene Kaywood, lured Bundick, who also is an artist and teaches, into the fair last year and now she's trying to do the same with others.

"I just want people to get involved on the inside," she said. "There's a real excitement with a county fair. I love it. And remember, this is a real county fair and that means work from anyone, anywhere in the county is eligible."

Some of the art categories waiting for entries include oil painting of all

styles, water color, pastel and acrylic, each with a commercial division too: pen and ink, charcoal and pencil, crayola and colored pencil and sculpture.

No picture will be accepted unless it is framed or matted and wired ready to hang. The public will vote for the best picture. Each piece must have been completed since the 2001 county fair.

Judging will be separated for ages kindergarten through sixth grade, seventh through 12th grades and adults and older students.

All exhibits are due from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. Monday, Aug. 5, and from 9 a.m. to noon Aug. 6. They must remain in place until 3 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 10.

Assessing the cost of local government

The village council faces uncertain economic times

"Why Me, Lord?" candidate John Sanchez hums. Our heart goes out to him this week. John must be feeling like he is carrying a water pistol into a gun fight.



because the board of trustees passed a 1994 moratorium on providing new water taps outside of the village limits. All five affected families live in the unincorporated portion of Lincoln County.

If the water from the lake is cut off, but the village continues to supply the five residences and a fire hydrant for a planned Nogal Volunteer Fire Department substation from one of its wells, a pump would be needed to pressurize the old water line. That cost could hit \$6,000.

Trustee Leroy Montes contends the cost shouldn't be at taxpayers' expense and Trustee

John Whitaker says Capitan's water should stay in the city.

But Trustee Bobbi Shearer said Capitan officials have a moral obligation.

"I proposed a motion to negotiate a contract with the property owners on the line so that we could continue serving them with water, but it died for a lack of second," she said. "I finally got one through to allow the mayor to negotiate with them."

"We would sell them municipal water, running it in the other direction (from the town south to the properties instead of the lake north to the properties), keeping the line wet. They'd be receiving treated water. We're looking at a cost of

\$6,000 to put in a pump."

She thinks the five users are grandfathered in and should not be affected by the 1994 moratorium, Shearer said. At the time of the moratorium, existing users outside the city were assured they would never be cut off, but now some board members are considering that action, she said.

"Yet in the past eight years, the board has granted some taps (outside the village) to a baseball field and to others for easements so they have not truly honored the moratorium," Shearer said.

To avoid falling under new environmental requirements, the old asbestos concrete pipeline must be kept wet, she

noted.

"It becomes a Superfund issue, if it goes dry," she said.

Mayor Steve Sederwall said Alamogordo officials told him they were worried about the liability of delivering raw water, but that city has been doing it for 57 years.

"The day I took office, the let-

ter was waiting," he said. "We've had it on the agenda every month and we called a special meeting."

"We are looking at every angle. The board is kind of split on the deal. My feeling is those people were there for us in 1957 and we need to be there for them now. We're looking for options."

The village needed the water line in 1957 to run water from the lake to the village until it could provide its own wells. Don Brewer, who owns one of the ranches with a tap, pointed out that when he was asked, he granted easements for water lines and for two million-gallon storage tanks.

Simpson repayment schedule to be reviewed by DA's office

A repayment deal worked out with former Solid Waste Authority manager Rick Simpson will be forwarded to the district attorney's office for review.

Members of the authority board agreed Tuesday that District Attorney Scot Key should determine if any laws were broken when Simpson collected expense reimbursement without supporting documentation and that isn't their role. The board referred the issue to authority attorney

Don Dutton, who is to forward the information to the district attorney.

Reached late Tuesday, Simpson said there was no wrongdoing on his part and he's confident that "it will all come out in the wash."

In January, auditor Dan Austin pointed out that Simpson collected \$3,450 in reimbursement for expenses without submitting documentation and that he should either produce verification or repay the money. Last month, the authority board insisted Simpson satisfy the auditor's criticism and Dutton was directed to contact him personally.

A repayment schedule of about \$400 a month was presented to the board Tuesday,

but the county's representative on the garbage collection coalition, Leo Martinez, who, like Simpson, is a county commissioner, said the board should pass the issue to Key.

"My thing was in view of the national scene with CEOs getting let go, I don't want people to say to me later we white-washed it," Martinez said. "The auditor said it should be referred to the district attorney. Let him make the determination."

"I left the previous meeting not liking what we did and halfway down the road, I realized we were wrong."

Martinez was commended by one observer at the meeting, who said it's not the board's function to determine guilt or innocence.

Code violations could cost county

Electrical deficiencies and the possible presence of asbestos wrapping could peel some big bills out of the Lincoln County Commission's wallet.

County manager Tom Stewart's comments on the situation are part of the manager's report, one of 35 items on the agenda of Thursday's commission meeting.

The session starts at 8 a.m. in the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

Stewart wrote in his report that on June 27, a representative from the State Fire Marshal's office inspected the courthouse complex and found numerous code violations, mostly electrical. The deficiencies must be corrected, but "nothing is serious enough" to close down the courthouse.

However, the presence of asbestos is suspected in wrapping around some heating and cooling pipes in the basement of the annex, the former magistrate judge building. The material was tested July 8 and if the result is positive, the old wrappings will have to be removed in a negative-pressure-sealed environment, he advised.

Stewart also noted that Bill Martin, who has more than 28 years of experience in public safety, was hired July 1, as the new emergency services coordinator for the county.

Martin was selected from a field of eight applicants and spent 15 years as a local government emergency manager and as a private management consultant. He is moving from Nashua, N.H.

In another issue, Stewart reported that on June 20, Eddy Paulsgrove from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers code enforcement visited the Moore Avenue crossing in Nogal. He determined that the arroyo bed crossing is not considered "waters of the United States" since it doesn't feed a navigable river and the corps has no jurisdiction.

Nogal property owners who want to build an access across the arroyo can consult with county road superintendent Albert Hernandez on an acceptable crossing design, Stewart wrote.

Final plat approval for Windmill Ranches subdivision near Carrizozo is listed as Item 17 on the agenda, just before commissioners break for a semi-annual inspection of the county's detention center.

Staff members of the school

Study sheds new light on students' views of themselves, the U.S.

WASHINGTON - High school students substantially agree that inequity, freedom, and diversity are predominant themes in their images of America, according to new findings on the substance of students' knowledge and beliefs about the United States and its history. These and other results are published in the summer issue of the American Educational Research Journal.

The study provides new insight on culture wars, student knowledge, student diversity, and teaching U.S. history. It is part of a larger project on what it means to be an American and the focus of a forthcoming book, *Hearing America's Youth: Social Identities in Uncertain Times*.

For most of these students, America is more complex than

a sound bite, a banner slogan, or a bicentennial minute," says Catherine Cornbleth, professor of education at the University at Buffalo. She conducted this research at three high schools in upstate New York. At least one third of the students interviewed voiced three additional themes: the United States as better than other nations, progress, and the American Dream.

Twenty-five juniors and seniors of diverse racial, ethnic and socio-economic backgrounds volunteered to participate in this in-depth study. They ranged in age from 16 to 19. This fall, she plans to interview more students.

What major sources shape these high school students' ideas about America?

"Overall, school, including

specific courses, was the most frequently noted source of students' images of America (23 of 25 students)," Cornbleth reports. "After school, personal experience was the next most frequently cited influence (15 students); followed by family and/or older people, and TV and other news media (11 students each)."

"Although not overly positive, what students do know about the United States is both realistic and generally supportive of the nation-state," Professor Cornbleth writes. "The students are both critical and hopeful," adds this professor, who also notes their relative sophistication. "By critical, the students say that America is not living up to its principles and promises in the Bill of Rights; by hopeful, they see

that good things exist and could be better."

One comment by an African-American, male student exemplifies her findings:

"America's not like it should be...it hasn't been for a long time. And until America decides that it's going to be, or live by the principles that it was built on, it will never be what it should always have been."

"Although students frequently mentioned freedom, often as their first response to our questions about what comes to mind when you hear the word U.S. or America, few had much to say about it," Cornbleth writes of her pre-Sept. 11 interviews.

"Most commonly, freedom was described as simply having the right, or being able, to do

what you want. For some students, freedom meant having opportunities and choices, for example, about what to do with their lives."

Cornbleth, who previously taught social studies at high schools in Texas and Connecticut, points out that "social studies curriculum may be missing opportunities."

She notes that history in secondary schools focuses on people, places and events, "often competing with other, often more powerful sources, and missing opportunities to help students comprehend and think critically about the information they encounter in and out of school."

Based on her findings, Cornbleth offers suggestions for reforming ways that history is taught. "Instead of one

damn thing after another, school history might help students to see connections and longer term processes, such as industrialization and post-industrialization, and struggles, like civil rights and environmental protection."

She recommends that by examining the dynamics of collective experiences, such as social class and gender, as well as individual accomplishments and frustrations, students will be able to see "both the societal forest and its various groves and trees."

In Cornbleth's view, "a strong case could be made here for more cross-cultural education and experience, especially for students in largely White schools."

3) John Calvin (Religious Reformer): "God is the Parent of humankind and Reverend Sun Myung Moon is the Messiah, Savior and Second Coming. 5) John Wesley (Missionary and Revivalist): "I, John Wesley, proclaim that Reverend Sun Myung Moon is the True Parent of all humankind and I pledge and pledge again to live according to the direction and teachings of the True Parents."

6) Karl Barth (Modern Theologian): "Dear Reverend Sun Myung Moon! Although I am late in doing so, I, Karl Barth, wish to live a life of attendance to, and receive guidance from, the Reverend Sun Myung Moon, who is the Second Coming and Savior. America is God's Garden of Eden. Let it remain as the eternal Eden on earth. I, Jonathan Edwards, pledge to follow the will of the Lord and the will of God in America. I, Jonathan Edwards, promise to never change my heart attending the Second Coming."

9) John Smyth (Founder of the Baptist Church): "Oh esteemed Reverend Sun Myung Moon! Please allow the grace of your blessing unto the whole of humanity, so that they may start a new life. Please open the way for humankind to be able to live together as brothers and sisters in a Garden of Eden without original sin as soon as possible. I, John Smyth, shall go anywhere, if the Lord goes with me."

10) John Harvard (Founder of Harvard University, Puritan): "I, John Harvard, truly wish that not only the youth of Harvard University, but those of all the universities in the world, can be armed with Unification Principle and receive the guidance of Reverend Sun Myung Moon. 7) Ka, Jeon Yeon (One of Buddha's ten greatest disciples, the greatest at debate): "There is a section of the Unification Principle entitled 'Give and Take Action.' Second, completely clarify your way of life."

"Please receive the will of Reverend Moon completely, open your minds and build churches for the worship of God and hold worship services. Reverend Moon reflects the image of God, even though he is a man, and he is struggling intensely to save Communist countries. His thought is messianic, especially for the Communist countries. You must receive his ideology of peace immediately. I, the dictator who denied God, cry out to all the Communist countries on the Earth. Please believe in God and seek for Him." (4.19.2002)

4) Deng Xiaoping (1902-1997, the Chairman of Chinese Communist Party): "Thanks be to God for forgiving the one who committed sin. Thank you Reverend Moon for working hard to save those in Hell and the Communist bloc. I believe in the Communist Party! The word that followed me was one that made God's heart bleed. I now know that I was a terrible sinner. Reverend Moon is the one who brought to light Unification Thought and the Divine Principle, and he is the father of humankind named as True Parent by God. 
I am so happy because of you. Truly, I thank you for your hard work.

This year's celebration of N.M. racing a success

Horse racing is always the main attraction at Ruidoso Downs Race Track and Casino, but this past Sunday was also a celebration of the state as a whole, and organizers considered the 2002 Zia Festival an unqualified success.

"I thought it was great," said Neal Mullarky, director of marketing at the track. "There were a lot of people here, and a lot of vendors who were happy with their sales."

Every horse that raced on Sunday was New Mexico-bred, and in addition to showcasing the state's racing, vendors from throughout the state were on hand to showcase their wares — ranging from food and drink to art and souvenirs.

"The horsemen put their best foot forward, and 11 were rewarded for that," Mullarky said, referring to the 11 stakes races on tap for the day. "The track and the breeders should be proud of what they have to offer."

Even if you only used the total amount won on the day by the state's horsemen, the day was still a big one. Purses for the 11 races added up to \$669,732 total, including just over \$160,000 for the featured race of the day, the Zia Quarter

Horse Futurity.

Other stakes races decided on Sunday included the Zia Derby, Rio Grande Señor and Señorita Thoroughbred futurities, and the Sierra Starlet, Road Runner and Land Of Enchantment handicaps.

Zia Futurity

Dooley For Cash took the top spot in the Zia Futurity, and it marked the third such victory in three races for the sorrel gelding, trainer José L. Dominguez and owner Sandra L. Erwin.

"The way he ran in the trials, I expected him to run faster," said jockey Juan Vasquez of Dooley For Cash's performance. "Every time he gets in there, he jumps good. The farther he's gone, the faster he goes."

Sunday's earnings of \$67,578 brings Dooley For Cash's lifetime earnings to \$74,438.

In the Zia Futurity Juvenile, Slacker Spin took first to give trainer Carl Draper his second win of the day. Owned by Fredda Draper and Elmer Lee Criswell, Slacker Spin posted a half-length victory over Just Call The Barn.

Draper also trained Negro De Az to a win in the day's opening race, the Zia Handicap. In that race, Negro De Az was able to win after flying down the stretch after a

Indy Bud Bob, now riderless, immediately broke for the rail, cutting off several horses in the process. He quit veering once he got next to Chicks Goes Steppin and actually crossed the finish line first, although was listed officially in last place.

Swan was taken to the Lincoln County Medical Center for X-rays, all of which proved to be negative. Swan is reported in good condition and hopes to ride again soon. There also appeared to be no injuries to Indy Bud Bob.

But while everything seems fine now in hindsight, during the race it was a ticklish situation, to say the least.

"Most of the time, this doesn't happen, and naturally the first thing is you hope the rider's all right," said Chicks Goes Steppin trainer Michael Joiner. "You also hope that loose horse doesn't get somebody else into trouble. I was a little concerned, because I had the six horse (A Major Hand) also and he cut across her."

"It might have cost us some money," he added. "She was right there and the rider had to take up on her."

But Chicks Goes Steppin did

win, and Joiner attributed that to his ability to break better from the start.

"He broke real good in this race, last year he didn't break that sharp all the time," Joiner said. "That got him in a little bit of trouble. But in the last couple of races, he's really been break-

Understand, I'm not berating the radio station — indeed, the disc jockey remained awake the entire event, something I couldn't do. The problem is, I tend to get delirious when I've gone without sleep for a long period of time.

At about 3:30 a.m., I decided not to fight it anymore and went walking among the hundreds of luminarias set up on the perimeter of the track.

These luminarias — real ones, by the way, not electric — were sold by various teams and had the names of a cancer survivor or cancer victim on them. As I walked among them for hours on end, I thought of those I knew who had been touched by one of the varied forms of the disease.

I realized there were more than I had first thought. My great-grandfather had died of cancer in the spine, and my grandmother had had several cancerous tumors removed in her lifetime.

I also have a friend who is a cancer survivor, although I won't mention his name because he's somewhat modest about it. I've even had a dog put down due to cancer.

But of all these people, the one that made the biggest impression on me, and the one I thought of that night, was a man named Hugh Frazier.

"Brother Frazier," as he was known, was the pastor at University Baptist Church in Portales, my hometown. I was a Methodist, so I never really knew him until he was stricken with an inoperable brain tumor.

The situation was this; I had recently graduated from Eastern New Mexico University and was still searching for a job. The man in charge of instructional television at KENW-TV was also a board member at the church and asked if I would consider watching Frazier while his wife worked.

I had no other immediate prospects, so I said yes. What I hadn't bargained on was the

grief, tears, but ultimate joy at having made this wonderful man's acquaintance.

It's unfortunate I never knew him before, when he was a strong and vibrant man of God. By the time I got to him, the cancer and chemotherapy had taken their toll, and it was a struggle to get through each day.

Some days, when his wife would come home from work, we would just sit and cry — I was exhausted from the day, but it was a crushing realization to know this was the man's wife, and a major part of her life was withering away before her eyes.

I'm sorry if this is a real downer of a column, but let me finish. Brother Frazier didn't make it, becoming another cancer victim and another name on those luminarias, but I did.

I came out of that experience — it seems trivial to call it a "job" — a very different human being. I saw that, even in the face of crushing odds and the erosion of one's dignity, we can still retain a part of ourselves that made us so

wonderful in the first place.

True, I never knew Brother Frazier while he was healthy, but on some days I saw a glimmer of that person while I cared for him.

It was that person — gregarious, strong and lovable — that I chose to remember early Saturday morning on my trips around the track. And it was for him and so many others that I sacrificed my feet and knees.

I may not have been able to walk well for days afterward, but at least I knew my pain was nothing compared to that of a family that has been touched by cancer, and the pain was mitigated by knowing why I had put myself through that.
