One dead in U.S. 70 accident

Highway claims fifth fatality since Labor Day weekend in 2-car crash

An 83-year-old passenger in a car heading east on a two-lane portion of U.S. 70 was killed Monday when a pickup crossed the center line, hitting the 2000 Ford in a head-on collision.

Five others were injured. Dead at the scene near Riverside at the eastern edge of Lincoln County was Mildred Thomas of Slaton, Texas, who was sitting in the rear seat behind the driver. She is the fifth fatality on that stretch of highway east of Ruidoso Downs since Labor Day weekend. Liquor was involved, according to New Mexico State Police Officer Robert Eshom.

The officer reported that at 12:04 p.m. Filemon Aldama, 50, of Amarillo, Texas, was driving a 1995 Chevrolet pickup west on U.S. 70 when he veered across the center line, striking the Ford driven by Kaye Smith, 58, of Slaton.

Aldama was listed in good condition at the Eastern New Mexico Medical Center Hospital in Roswell. His passenger, Jesus Soto, 43, from Canutillo, Texas, was in fair condition.

Smith was airlifted to Covenant Medical Center in Lubbock, Texas, where she was in surgical intensive care Tuesday. The passenger in the right front seat, Joanne Lancaster, 58, was listed in serious condition in Roswell Tuesday. Pauline Maxey, 82, who was in the right rear seat, was listed in serious condition Monday and was transferred from Eastern to Covenant.

Eshom reported that seat belts were in use. The investigation is continuing. The accident occurred about two miles inside a construction zone of a project aimed at widening the scenic, but deadly, highway to four lanes.

Former judge arrested on 1987 charge

A former Ruidoso Downs municipal judge, who left the area in 1987 after being charged with fondling a child, was arrested in Levelland, Texas, on a 15-year-old warrant from Lincoln County.

Martin G. Valenzuela, 55, was confined Monday in the Hockley County jail in Texas. According to District Attorney Scot Key he will not fight extradition and will be brought back to Lincoln County as soon as possible.

"We're trying to get together transportation for him," Lincoln County Undersheriff Rickey Virden said Monday.

Levelland, a town of about 14,000 people, lies 20 miles west of Lubbock.

Valenzuela was elected municipal judge in March of 1986, but left either in June or July of 1987, according to town records. Harrold Mansell was appointed as acting municipal judge and later was elected.

Key was working in the area as a private attorney and public defender at the time of the incident.

"It's a real old case," he said Tuesday. "Over the years, this was a warrant we made sure was kept current in the National Crime Information Center. Our information was that he went to Mexico."

"We're going to have to make sure we can find the child, who obviously now is an adult. This case will be a challenge, but we refuse to let someone benefit from hiding out successfully."

His staff in the county seat of Carrizozo is researching the case file, Key said.

"We want to put together a case that we can win," Key said. "He skipped because of these charges. That's fairly plain to us and we think it's an indicator of guilt."

Mescalero board member asks superintendent to go, cites test scores

A Mescalero school board member has asked for the resignation of the superintendent of schools and the high school principal, citing decreasing test scores and eight violations of accounting standards, seven of which were repeated from the previ-

ous year's audit.

The yearly goals reports of the school show decreasing proficiency in math and language art from 1999 to 2001, with 40 percent of the high school testing at 40 percent proficiency in math and 38 percent proficiency in language arts in 1999, and only 2 percent proficient in math and 7 percent proficient in language arts

in 2001.

Harlyn Jeronimo, who was appointed to the school board in May by the executive committee and is a former Tribal Council member, presented letters to superintendent Ray Sweeney and Lynette Kanseah on Sept. 11 asking for their resignations.

"Using objective test scores as the standard, the current school adminis-

tration is a failure," Jeronimo wrote. "If the Mescalero Apache school were a state public school, the school would be facing a takeover by the State Board of Education."

Jeronimo said he will present the letters to the Tribal Council soon, and that the council and the school board both have the ability to hire and fire school personnel.

The goals report showed improvement in staff proficiency in "new assessment use" from 65 percent in 1999 to 95 percent in 2001, with the yearly dropout rate decreasing from 34 percent in 2000 to none in 2001.

Jeronimo's letter to Swinney and Kanseah also referred to eight reportable violations of accounting

Highway archaeological project reveals history of the region

Standing in one of the areas excavated in connection with the proposed widening of U.S. 70, archaeologist George Arms enjoys talking about his work and explaining the historical significance.

As a contract archaeologist with Parsons Brinckerhoff, an Albuquerque consulting firm on the project, he shared information earlier this month as part of a tour and open house put together by the state Highway and Transportation Department and Sierra Blanca Constructors, the design-build team handling the 38-mile project.

After 28 prehistoric and historically significant sites were identified, a team of about 14 people, working three to four at a time with a crew

chief, excavated five sites recommended by the State Historical Preservation Office. The sites range in age from the Late Archaic (1000 B.C. to A.D. 750) to the Jornada Mogollon (A.D. 750 to the late 1400s) and through the historic period of 1542 to 1952.

As he explained in a handout sheet to those taking the tour, the Hondo Valley was occupied by small bands of nomadic hunter-gatherers and later by large groups of prehistoric farmers. Beginning in the mid-19th Century, Hispanic and Anglo farmers and ranchers settled in the area east of what later became Ruidoso. Several of the original camp sites, villages and homesteads established by those early settlers still stand in the valley, he said.

But one of the most interesting sites excavated by the team is a former encampment situated on top of a hill overlooking the valley.

The site originally was identified and partially excavated by a state highway team in the early 1970s for the last major improvement to the highway. Artifacts and data gathered then suggested it was occupied by Jornada Mogollon groups between A.D. 900 and 1100.

But the results of the more recent excavation suggest an earlier occupation, between 1000 B.C. and A.D. 750, Arms said, adding that more analysis will be conducted to try to explain the apparent differences.

Working within the existing U.S. 70 right of way, excavators found 27 pit features, three of which may have been used for habitation, Arms said. The others are large storage or cooking pits that were later filled with trash. Most are circular, dug into the bedrock and contained flaked stone artifacts, buried animal bone, plant



standards.
"Seven of these eight reportable violations were again repeated after having been reported in the audit for the previous year. These continuing violations concerned inadequate inventory controls, failure to maintain adequate record keeping in regards to receipts and deposits, failure to budget revenues, failure to properly calculate per diem rates, inadequate record keeping of employee savings accounts, a failure to document payroll withholding taxes resulting in noncompliance with federal regulations and incorrect withholding amounts from employee paychecks, and a com-

plete failure to correctly post grant revenues."
Jeronimo's letter ends by telling the superintendent that he is responsible for the academic and financial performance of the school, and that he has failed in spite of the Tribal Council's "unprecedented" financial commitment to the school, specifically, \$30 million for the new school facility and more than \$3 million on the interim school.
Asked for his response to the letter, Sweeney said he would not address his comments publicly until after he has discussed them with the remainder of the school board. He did say he has already discussed these matters with the school board before.

County manager wants smaller group to decide public land case

Working out a compromise between the U.S. Forest Service and miner Jerry Fennell should be delegated to a few individuals, not the entire Lincoln County Commission, says County Manager Tom Stewart.
That's his recommendation to be considered at the commission meeting that begins at 8 a.m. Thursday in Carrizozo.
After reviewing the case in September, members of the county's Public Land Use Advisory Council asked for a special commission meeting to hear the case of the Forest Service versus Fennell. But Stewart said a smaller group could work more effectively with the two sides to come up with a gradual compromise.
Stewart summarized the situation, saying Fennell has a mineral claim to the land, but also lives there in Jicarilla. Service officials contend that he should not be allowed to stave the property and have stated they will attempt to maintain the historic buildings.
In other items on the agenda, five new requests for water rights transfers have been

requested from the State Engineer's Office. They are:
• The Alto Lakes Water Corporation filed July 10 to change the location of a well by ceasing the use of an existing shallow well in Alto and drilling a well 8 inches in diameter and about 1,200 feet in depth in Alto for the continued diversion of up to 615.69 acre feet per year of shallow groundwater for domestic and subdivision use. An acre foot equates to 325,851 gallons of water.
• David J. Hall and Alice Warder on Aug. 9, applied to the State Engineer for a permit to change a point of diversion from Glencoe and place or purpose of use from surface to groundwater by ceasing the diversion of 2.88 acre feet per year of surface water from the Rio Ruidoso via the Prospero Gonzales Ditch, and a supplemental shallow well. The applicant proposes to begin the use of an existing shallow well to irrigate 0.9 acre of land in Hondo.
• Ruidoso Downs Racing Inc. asking for a permit to temporarily change the location of a well and place or purpose of use of 17 acre feet of shallow groundwater by ceasing the diversion from wells within the limits of Ruidoso Downs, and

ceasing the irrigation of 5.3 acres of land at the racetrack. The applicant wants to begin the diversion for irrigation of 5.315 acres at The Links Golf Course in Ruidoso. All rights would revert back to the original wells and place of use on Oct. 31, 2003.
• Todd R. Russell of Tinnie on Aug. 12, asked to change the location of well by ceasing the diversion of 69.2 acre feet of shallow groundwater from a shallow well in Arabela to drill a replacement well about 100 feet in depth and six inches in diameters within 15 feet of the existing well for the continued irrigation of 19.8 acres of land.
• Ken Nosker and John Brown of San Patricio asking for a permit to change the location of a well within the Tularosa Underground Water Basin. The applicant proposed to discontinue the use of a well and to drill a new one on property owned by the applicant to divert 564 acre feet for the irrigation of 188 acres on 188 acres of irrigated land in Oscura. The old well won't be plugged because others use it.
• Lucinda Loveless of Hondo asked for a permit to drill a well 12 inches in diameters and about 100 feet in depth to sup-

plement surface waters. The current points of diversion are the Bradstreet and Vorwek Ditch and the Rio Bonito. The supplemental well is for the combined diversions of up to 38,188 acre feet per annum of groundwater for the irrigation of 11.75 acres of land 1.5 miles northwest of Hondo.
Other agenda items include:
• A discussion of a jail diver-

sion program by Les Olson of Rio Grande Behavioral Health Services Inc.
• A discussion of future courthouse construction and bonding by Commissioner L. Ray Nunley
• A discussion of Southeast Big Game recommendations for 2003-2005 by Roy Hayes, area supervisor for the state Department of Game and Fish

- A public hearing to consider combining PLUAC with the Agricultural and Rural Affairs Committee.
- A discussion of the county's involvement in Nogal Townsite roads.
- Possible certification of tax rates for 2002, if the documents are received in time from the State Department of Finance and Administration.

remains and stone grinding materials.
He explained that "pit features" is a broad term essentially covering large holes in the ground such as post holes, cooking hearths and roasting pits. They can be cylindrical, bell-shaped or basin-shaped.
The Jornada were agriculturists, Arms said. They may have practiced seasonal foraging, planting crops in the valley during growing seasons and retreating to the mountains for other resources. They also probably traded for some items, he said.
More than 50 people visited the site throughout the day to learn about Hondo Valley archaeology and to hear the process of recovering and interpreting information about past cultures.

Allsup's clerk injured in effort to stop theft

A clerk at Allsup's Convenience Store, 2823 Sudderth Drive, tried to stop an alleged shoplifter running off in a truck with two 30-packs of beer, and was run over by the driver about 8:30 p.m. Sunday.

The clerk, Todd Fuqua, 31, of Ruidoso, told police he saw the man, later identified as Jonathan W. Bremer, 22, of Ruidoso, leave the store with two cases of beer he hadn't paid for, and ran to the parked truck.

Fuqua stood in the driver's door area and confronted Bremer. The truck took off for Sudderth Drive and Fuqua fell back, the rear truck wheel running over his right leg and left arm.

The truck then crossed the street at a high rate of speed, witnesses told police,

and struck the wall in front of Santino's Restaurant. Another person went to the passenger side of the truck, attempting to stop it, but Bremer allegedly put the truck in reverse, hitting this second person with the truck door and knocking him down.

The truck then struck a no-parking sign and stopped, and a case of beer fell out of the truck.

One of the witnesses took down the license plate number of the vehicle. Police apprehended the truck with the driver in it at 11:11 p.m.

Bremer was arrested and charged with larceny under \$100, aggravated battery, use of a deadly weapon (a 1997 Chevrolet pickup truck), unlawfully touching or applying force to Fuqua with intent to injure, reckless driving, failure to stop when an accident results in great bodily injury or death, a

fourth-degree felony, failure to give information and render aid during an accident, failure to give information when striking fixtures or other property on a highway, and failure to give immediate notice of an accident.

A passenger in the truck, age 18, was arrested and charged with allowing himself to be served alcohol.

Fuqua since has undergone two surgeries for the open fracture of his right ankle and may have to have a third surgery.

Fuqua said he had chased after the suspect and asked if he planned to pay for the \$32 worth of Keystone Light beer, and the suspect responded, "I wouldn't have done it if I hadn't been so broke," then drove off, running over Fuqua's right leg and left arm.

Fuqua also is employed as sports editor of the Ruidoso News.

Another reason to get on with U.S. 70

\$130 million in construction has an economic spin-off

Not to be sneezed at, when considering that U.S. 70 highway widening project, is the economic impact on the county for the two years-plus to be spent in construction.

Some people moaned and groaned, rightly, over the impact on small businesses of that much smaller project on State Road 48 through Ruidoso. Yes, some businesses closed, others saw declines in activity.

Yes, that strung-out project by the late, unlamented Meadow Valley crew was a pain in many respects. But it added substantially to Ruidoso's employee base and gross receipts tax revenue during a period when tourism and winter sports conditions

weren't exactly sparkling. Today, the main complaint is that it wasn't made full four-lane all the way.

The \$130-million, 38-mile-long U.S. 70 project awarded to a consortium called Sierra Blanca Constructors will help prop up the area's revenue and payroll in the same fashion, only more so, as the nation struggles out of the economic doldrums.

Lives saved as a result of the project remain the primary benefit, but sheer economic impact can't be ignored in a project of this scale.

Now, if that federal court in Washington will just do what's reasonable and dismiss the valley dissidents' suit, *everybody* can benefit.



The way New Mexico water is controlled

To the editor:

I read with amusement the recent letter from Bob Johnson of Capitan. The amusement stems from his many flawed "facts." Although the present Governor is "somewhat controversial," the State Engineer is not "his." The State Engineer is an autonomist individual with jurisdiction over water matters in New Mexico. By statute (72-2-1), the State Engineer is appointed for a two year term or until his successor is confirmed. The Governor makes the appointment with the consent of the full Senate. The person must be technically qualified and a registered professional engineer. Historically, the State Engineer has been independent of the appointed Governor.

In the scenario which Mr. Johnson poses, there were in fact several days of hearings at the State Engineer's office in Roswell. The hearing was conducted by an independent hearing officer with the assistance of the State Engineer's staff. The applicant, protestants and the State Engineer's office all were represented by competent attorneys.

The hearing officer examined all testimony by both expert and lay witnesses as well as the many exhibits introduced into evidence. After a thorough study and review of the evidence, the hearing officer recommended that the application be denied. The State Engineer adopted the recommendations of the hearing officer and the application was denied. There is an appeal pending in the Twelfth Judicial District Court.

Another "flawed fact" is that the Governor could arbitrarily sell "that old fort down stream." Even if the state were interested in selling the fort, there are statutory procedures which must be followed. No Governor can just "sell the fort."

As far as contributions to both gubernatorial candidates are concerned, they are both receiving money from out-of-state contributors. I am concerned that over one-third of Mr. Sanchez's money came from the National Republican PAC in Washington, D.C. But Ben, please...New Mexico is not for sale. So Ben, the next time you write to "Mabel" know your facts before you start pointing accusatorial questions.

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Ruidoso approves wastewater plant improvements contract

Instead of delaying a project, at the regional wastewater treatment plant while the Ruidoso Downs officials decide whether to approve money for their portion of the improvements, Ruidoso councilors have moved ahead.

Delay could have resulted in having to prepare a new environmental impact study, the council decided during its Sept. 10 regular meeting.

They accepted the low bid submitted by Carl Kelley Construction in Ruidoso of \$217,972 for drying bed improvements and polymer

injection system installation.

The village received four bids on Aug. 29, ranging up to \$308,068. The money for the project will come from the Environment Department Clean Water Revolving Loan Fund. Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, which are partners in the plant, have \$114,899 remaining as a balance from a \$1.2 million previous loan at 2 percent interest.

A request for an additional \$200,000 is being processed for the same interest rate to cover the cost of project engineering and project construction.

Although the Regional Waste

Water Facility account has a balance of \$272,635 and could cover the contract award, councilors were reluctant to drain that special fund.

Cleatus Richards, acting director at the waste water plant, said he had expected Ruidoso Downs to take action authorizing the new loan before the council meeting, but received word from that town's manager, John Waters, that he was deferring action until Sept. 24.

"He states he'll make a positive recommendation," Richards said, but added, "There is urgency in the award of the contract, as the environmental study finding of no signif-

icant impact for the proposed plant improvements will expire on Sept. 15.

"If the contract is not awarded by that date, a new environmental study will be required which will cause additional expense and substantial delay." A new study could cost as much as \$40,000, he said.

Councilor Ron Anderson wondered if the population growth in Ruidoso Downs should trigger an evaluation of whether that town should begin to bear more of the financial burden of the plant. Currently, Ruidoso is responsible for 85 percent and Ruidoso Downs for

15 percent.

Richards said that's not an issue with this project, because the loan extension is based on the existing split percentages.

Speed also is important because the plant is operating on a thin line of capacity and the polymer injection will speed up the sludge drying process, he added.

Councilor Frank Cummins suggested awarding the bid with the available facility budget and then once Ruidoso Downs approves the project, go for the additional loan money. "We have to do it anyway," he said.

Word of mouth boosts forest health project

The public understands the importance of ground fire management, says the urban forester.

Ruidoso's urban forester is handling about 30 calls a month to perform forest health and fire prevention assessments on private property in the village.

But this past month was different because about a half dozen of the calls resulted from a satisfied homeowner passing along the information to a neighbor, urban forester Rick Delaco told councilors Tuesday.

"The standards are being accepted real well," he said. "They understand the importance of ground fire management."

Delaco was referring to a set of ordinances adopted by the board two months ago that set

up standards to evaluate and reduce fire risks, to improve forest health and to ensure fire-resistant building materials are used in new construction or major renovations. Many homeowners are taking advantage of federal dollars available for cost sharing on the work.

He reported that because of thinning of trees in the Grindstone Reservoir area last year, native grasses and forbs are growing in areas previously blocked from light and rain.

"It's a lot greener," he said. The next project on village property will be thinning and hand-piling trees on a 170-acre tract along Eagle Creek, Delaco said.

Mayor Leon Eggleston pointed out that many smaller contractors can't bid on the village projects because they fall under a public works designation that requires following federal minimum wage guidelines and posting a bond.

"They can't afford all that," he said. He suggested several

smaller contractors go together and bid as a team for the larger jobs.

But Delaco said under the cost-sharing program on private land, smaller contractors are kept busy by homeowners who hire them.

"I've heard all the smaller contractors are booked through the summer with a waiting list," Councilor Ron Hardeman said.

Councilor Deborah Marcum-Byars asked acting village manager Lorri McKnight about the status of two new grappling trucks to be purchased to speed up collection of yard debris piled along roadsides by home owners. Two older trucks already are in service.

McKnight said no bids were received on the first truck because no one could meet the 90-day delivery requirement. The truck was advertised for bids again with a 150-day delivery time period, she said.

Eggleston said no action

was taken on the second truck because revenue from the increased rates land owners are paying for the service have to accumulate before the village has enough money to cover the purchase.

Delaco said he hopes to see the start of a massive public awareness campaign on forest health and the reduction of fire risk in March.

James Mason, public information officer for the Ruidoso Fire Department, said he is trying to form a Firewatch Neighborhood program, in which neighbors join together in the fire hazard reduction effort. He is selecting one or two neighborhoods as pilot areas and plans to showcase them the second week in October.

He also announced that controlled burns of wood piled during thinning operations last year will be conducted in October around Grindstone if weather conditions are right and moisture is sufficient.

Hudak trial scheduled Nov. 2

The president of a counter-terrorism training firm is scheduled to stand trial Nov. 12 on charges of illegally possessing about 2,400 warheads at his Roswell compound. Daniel Hudak, a Canadian national and president of High Energy Access Tools Corp., which also owns a complex north of Tinnie in Lincoln County, pleaded not guilty Thursday in U.S. District Court in Las Cruces. He entered the same plea to a charge of being an alien illegally in the United States in possession of firearms.

The government contends the warheads confiscated during a search of the Roswell compound in late August were not registered to Hudak in the National Firearms Registration and Transfer Record. Attorney Tim Padilla countered that the devices don't fit the definition of missiles because they are disabled and were rejected by the military.

Hudak has been denied bail because he is considered a flight risk and is confined at the Doña Ana County Detention Center.

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
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

Mescalero grant

U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici hailed the award of a \$180,000 Department of Education grant to the Mescalero Apache School, which the lawmaker confirmed would be utilized to better prepare students for college-level curricula.

The five-year grant, designed to increase undergraduate educational readiness, was awarded to the rural, tribal institution through the Department of Education's

Gear-Up program, which will provide students with advanced math and science programs.

The grant is geared toward improving Mescalero Apache students' self-determination and professional development through exposure to challenging mathematics and science courses and by increasing parental involvement and partnership collaboration. Domenici has been working for years on the problem of dilapidated BIA school facilities and lauded President Bush's commitment to sustain current funding levels to replace deteriorated BIA schools through new construction.

Funding in fiscal year 2003 is maintained at the 2002 level of \$292.7 million, Domenici said. The deferred maintenance backlog has been reduced to an estimated \$636 million compared to more than a billion a few years ago. Continued funding at this level will eliminate the current repair and maintenance backlog in 2006.

Preventing dropouts

As the U.S. House prepares for debate on the most contentious of the 13 annual appropriations bills — Labor, Health and Human Services and Education — U.S. Representative Tom Udall said he is seeking \$100 million in the bill for high school dropout prevention and reentry programs.

Udall argues for the inclusion of \$100 million to fund the School Dropout Prevention program as authorized in the No Child Left Behind Act, signed into law in January, in a letter to the chairman and ranking member of the House subcommittee responsible for funding education programs.

The programs would be specifically tailored by local officials and schools qualifying for grants must implement dropout prevention and reentry strategies that are scientifically based, sustainable and have been widely replicated.

"If our goal is to ensure that in fact no child is left behind, then we cannot proceed without making a real and substantive commitment to addressing the nation's dropout rate," Udall said.

Ruidoso's dropout rate is 4.3 percent, or 32 out of 736 students enrolled at Ruidoso High School in 1999-2000.

The most recent statistics compiled in the New Mexico Department of Education's Dropout Study 1999-2000 show that the number of students dropping out of public schools is continuing its five-year decline. In 1999-2000, a total of 5,775 students out of an enrollment of 95,915 in grades 9-12 dropped out of school, or 6 percent.

CLASS ACT

John Hemphill has been teaching GED classes at the detention center in Carrizozo for almost three years — getting inmates "educated while incarcerated."

It's time for class and students file in quietly, one by one, taking seats at one of the three long tables in the room. A few metal shelves hold a hundred or so paperback books — the school library.

All the students wear baggy orange uniforms, but the question of school uniforms doesn't come up. The students are inmates taking the GED class John Hemphill has taught twice a week for three years in the multipurpose room at Lincoln County Detention Center in Carrizozo.

Hemphill, with a master's degree in science teaching, became the director of Adult Basic Education about three weeks ago, overseeing the programs at the Work Center in GED, English as a Second Language, Life Skills and Adult Literacy, serving about 180 students last year.

He also teaches a developmental math class for Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso at Ruidoso High School. Until this year, when the budget was cut drastically, GED classes had been taught in Ruidoso, at the detention center, at Otero County Electric Coop in Carrizozo, in Hondo, Mescalero, Fort Stanton and Capitan.

Now classes are only in Ruidoso and at the detention center, he said.

Of his students at the detention center, Hemphill said he has a higher retention rate because "students here don't have the social constraints that they do on the outside; they don't have an opportunity to drink a beer and cut class here. Some may sleep in, but it gets them out of their cells and gives them an opportunity to become educated while incarcerated."

The classes average between four and 14 students at any given time. Most are in their early 20s, Hemphill said. The only drawback to the program is the turnover from inmates being released or transferred.

One of his students dropped out of school at age 16 and wants to earn a high school diploma so he can go on to college to get a degree in counseling, law or the ministry; trying to "fit in," he said. He finds reading difficult and math fairly easy — sometimes — but he isn't able to work on his studies outside of class because, "So much goes on around me, I'm lost. They just keep moving me around a lot."

Another student, who's been in the class for about six weeks, said he wants to further his education so he can get a bet-

ter job when he gets out. He plans to take the GED tests and puts in about an hour a day on homework.

"It's easy to focus," he said, "because I'm in my room by myself. I get back (from working in the kitchen) tired, read some problems and it puts me to sleep, puts my mind at rest."

Center administrator Mike Borrego said he lines up guards to take inmates to ENMU-Ruidoso to take the GED tests when they're ready.

One of them took two tests a couple of weeks ago. That student was kicked out of school when he was a senior, he said, and he's been in detention for three months. Before that, he'd attended classes at Otero County Electric Coop.

"I went from a 17-year-old gangbanger to a 23-year-old father of three boys and had a responsibility I had to take care of," he said. "Education that I had at 17 wasn't enough. I want to get a better job, not only for myself, but for them. When they come home from school and have trouble with homework, I'd like to help them. I've got to have an education for them. I want to be a role model for them. I wasn't the person I am now before I met my wife. I want to make myself happy because I didn't do it when I had the opportunity."


He said Hemphill and the GED book help a lot. He does homework outside of class.

A female student said she'd taken GED classes three years ago in Ruidoso and stopped because she was working. She attacks her book with enthusiasm and said she spends about three hours a day on homework. She'd done pre-tests to see what she needed to work on, and found she did well in reading and grammar. Now she is working on math and spelling.

She plans to take the next GED test on Sept. 27 in science and math, which she's been studying for the last two months. She's determined to better her education, she said, hoping that she might succeed by being a manager rather than an employee.

She and another female student said they plan to have their GEDs by the time they're released, and then they'll both start college.

Hemphill said any students who earn their GEDs through the Lincoln County Work Center program will be offered a

two-year scholarship at ENMU-Ruidoso, with books and tuition paid, this designed as an incentive for participants in the program.

Borrego said when he took over administration of the old jail facility in mid 1999, there was no educational program because there was no space for it. He fixed up a space for classes and for religious and Alcoholics Anonymous programs in the waiting room. At the new facility, there's a multipurpose room, so these programs have been expanded.

"I ran into an old student from two years ago who'd completed his GED and is taking college classes. That made me feel good, because once they are released, you lose contact and don't know if they finished," Borrego said. "We try to encourage them — most are from the Ruidoso area — to go to the Work Center. We have a few who finish their GEDs, but not as many as we would like."

The jail's capacity is 222 inmates, but it averages about 110, he said. About 10 percent of those lack high school diplomas and take the classes. Most of the students are there for drug-related charges. Violent offenders or escape-risks are screened out of the classes.

"I think overall it's a genuine attempt to better themselves," Borrego said. "They see the light behind bars. They are away from drugs, street pressures; a percentage will attend the programs with a genuine attempt to better themselves."

"Hopefully the tools are there so they don't have to come back to jail. If they have a GED, perhaps they can get a better job."

Borrego said the GED classes and the religious and AA programs help manage the jail, keeping inmates occupied thinking and attending activities. The Counseling Center also sends staff once a week and inmates can request a counseling session.

Inmates stay at the jail from one to 364 days, or until they go to trial.

One of Borrego's goals is to open up communications with instructors at other detention facilities to try to track students and see how many actually complete their GEDs after they're transferred.

Councilors mixed on theme park idea

Before a rash of unfounded rumors take root, officials with a development company looking at Moon Mountain for a possible theme park should brief the Ruidoso Village Council on their true plans, councilors said last week.

Mayor Leon Eggleston said he will contact representatives and ask to set up a presentation for one of the council's meetings in October.

Resident Pat Swindler said she was disturbed when checking the Web site of the Houston, Texas-based America's Christmas Village to see a presentation that sounded like the proposal "was a done deal."

"Before the State Land Commissioner considers leasing this land, I think there should be a public meeting," she said.

Patric Pearson, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, said from bits of information carried by news outlets, some people thought a theme park with rides is being proposed. Although a theme is part of

the plan, no rides are envisioned, he said.

"All they're doing is looking at the village and other suitable areas," he said.

Mike Runnels, director of village planning and zoning, said he talked last week with Don Britt, the assistant land commissioner handling the issue.

"There is no agreement," he insisted. "They had a discussion and gave a tour. They are talking. But he also stated that no water is available for the project at present. They would be open to annexation by the village because it would be mutually beneficial."

"The state can't sell public land, but they can grant long-term leases and they are anxious to see some use of this land."

No one from the Houston company has contacted him, Runnels said.

The mountain lies between Paradise Canyon Road and Gavilan Canyon Road outside the village boundaries. However, it falls within the

extraterritorial zone around the village where development is governed by boards of representatives of Lincoln County and Ruidoso.

Sterchi pointed out that the same firm proposed a similar development a few years ago in another Lincoln County location, but it never materialized.

He said this plan will have to be impressive to convince him it would benefit the community.

Councilor Ron Hardeman agreed, saying "I'm not at all at ease with what I've seen or heard."

Pearson said such remarks make him nervous before the council hears what the company has to say.

"You need to be open minded to see what it could do for the village," he said.

But Hardeman said part of the problem falls on the company.

"What appeared in the paper generated a lot of heat for us," he said. "These people

need to give a presentation before a lot of negative opinions are formed."

Sterchi said even though the company canceled a scheduled meeting on the project when not all councilors could be present, officials could have left some material for the board to review.

Councilor Ron Anderson said he wants to see a presentation and that Pearson shouldn't assume remarks from other councilors mean the board is against the project.

"I have no problem with a theme park in Ruidoso in the proper location," Councilor L. Ray Nunley said. "But I have a real reverence for public land. Leasing or giving it away is not the right use of a public place where you would have to dig 1,000 feet to even get close to water. I would support it in another place."

Pearson said the company may have delayed appearing before the council because of some internal restructuring.

"Ruidoso is just one possible site," he said. "Arkansas is another. The Christmas village is just a piece of it, of the whole concept."

Annexed area hearings set

Ruidoso village councilors last week set public hearings for Oct. 8 on seven parcels annexed into the village that are proposed for a zoning designation. They include areas in Upper Canyon, Gavilan Canyon, Carrizo Canyon, Lookout Estates and along U.S. 70.

The council also:
• Approved a special dispenser's permit and crowd control banner for the Annual New Mexico State Open Chili Cook-off at Tall Pines RV Park.
• Approved an allowed a one-year extension, the last of a four-year maximum contract with American Linen Supply, and a one-year extension on a service contract with Key Communications.
• Approved a new restaurant

beer and wine license for Restaurant Jozebel at 2117 Sudderth Drive on a request from Debra Santos. The building is owned by Lawanda Jean Rhoten.

• Postponed action for the third time on an ordinance covering a proposed franchise agreement with Valor Telecommunications.

• Approved the adoption of the state Uniform Traffic Code, which provides for doubling of fines in road construction zones, clearing terminology connected to driving while under the influence of alcohol or illegal drugs, established a requirement for an interlock device on a vehicle ignition for persons convicted of aggravated DUI first offense or subsequent offenses and creates a new littering law.

The action will allow police officers to cite drivers on either the municipal code, sending them to municipal court, or state code, going to magistrate court.

• Adopted a resolution memorializing Sept. 11, 2001.

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

Observant clerk saves woman's assets

A CrimeStoppers award was presented to Pioneer Bank's Dawn McCarty for her alertness in observing unusual withdrawals from an account that turned out to be a scam.

When an elderly Ruidoso woman significantly changed the pattern of withdrawals from her account at Pioneer Bank, a teller stepped in and helped protect her savings.

Last week, Dawn McCarty was honored for her extra effort and alertness by Ruidoso CrimeStoppers with a plaque acknowledging her role in an investiga-

tion that ended with the arrest of two people.

According to Ruidoso Police Chief Larry Maddox, Uvaldo Baca, 44, and his wife, Darla Baca, 34, of Tularosa, were indicted by a Lincoln County grand jury last week. They each are charged with fraud from \$2,500 to \$20,000, a third-degree felony.

Mary Ellen Stewart, 84, was approached by the couple to do some work and repairs around her house. The work completed was estimated by another handyman service as being worth \$566, but the Bacas received about \$5,900.

Stewart's normal pattern of withdrawals was modest, usually in \$10 increments, but on May 13 and May 15, she took a total of \$3,000, police reported. On May 21, after she withdrew more money, bank staff members were alerted by another customer that it appeared

Stewart was being forced to go inside the bank against her will.

When Stewart returned on June 4, McCarty did not complete the withdrawal and police were notified. Cpl. Corky Condon and another officer located the vehicle driven by Bacas and contacted the victim, Maddox said.

They determined that no structural work was completed by the Bacas at Stewart's home, the yard hadn't been raked and the only work that may have been performed was cleaning the gutters and painting the back porch, he said.

"Had it not been for Dawn, Mrs. Stewart would have withdrawn even more," Maddox said. "This is a classic case of an elderly woman being defrauded by a handyman — a predator. Dawn got involved personally and gave us enough to put Baca there and we were able to stop the crime from continuing."

No runoff reaches Alto

Phase II conservation still in force

Despite recent rain that relieved some pressure on Ruidoso's water supply, Alto Lake reservoir hasn't received a drop of water yet from Eagle Creek.

In reporting that news to the village council last week, Larry Grasmick, who heads the village water and waste water department, encouraged the board to maintain Phase II water conservation restrictions, limiting mechanical lawn irrigation to before 10 a.m. and after 3 p.m. on Tuesday of each week. Hand watering is allowed on all days during the same time period.

The council agreed. "We're holding our own with production and consumption," Grasmick said. "All our facilities are working, although we've had trouble with the Hollywood booster station. In the past, it was only run about two to three weeks a year, but we've been running it straight for almost two years. We've had to repair it almost every other day."

Consumption ran about 90 percent of last year for the past six weeks, he said. But dependence on water from Grindstone Reservoir continues because the village still is having difficulty pumping water from its wells. Grindstone is about seven feet under where

he would like to see it because the area didn't receive the heavy monsoon rains that were hoped for, he said.

To help boost the level in the reservoir, Dick Wisner, executive director of the Ruidoso River Association, called to authorize a deviation from an agreed upon

break in period before water can be diverted from the river into the lake, Grasmick said. Councilor Bob Sterchi said Grindstone looks in good shape and should be all right if

the area receives a good snow melt in the spring.

But Councilor L. Ray Nunley said the village needs to consider itself in an emergency situation for water and forest health year-round.

Councilor Ron Anderson questioned why the village experienced problems with a sensor and a gate used to trigger and allow diversions during times of higher river flow. It's important that the gate is activated quickly to take full advantage of those periods when the reservoir can be replenished, he said.

Grasmick said he believed the project was well-designed and he will ensure that the needed changes and repairs are accomplished quickly and effectively.

He said the bid to deepen a well at the village's North Fork wellfield by 1,000 feet came within budget and will be accomplished before March 1, 2003.

Speeding an issue on Old Fort Stanton Road

While Fred Kinnan was talking on the telephone about speeding problems on Old Fort Stanton Road, a pickup truck roared by going at least 15 miles over the speed limit.

Point proven. "We're asking people to just take one extra minute of time to slow down to a reasonable speed," said the Alto resident of eight years. "People pass, but they are saving only a few seconds (on the two mile road)."

Kinnan and some neighbors are scheduled to ask the Lincoln County Commission and Sheriff's Office for some more help during the commission meeting Thursday. The session starts at 8 a.m. in the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

The group would like to see more speed limit signs posted,

increased traffic patrols and a ban against heavy trucks on that stretch of road connecting State Route 48 to Sierra Blanca Airport Road.

"Part of the problem is just the development and the increased traffic it has caused," Kinnan said.

No speed limit signs were posted on the road until Kinnan contacted County manager Tom Stewart, who had 30 mph signs erected at both entrances.

"But there has been no indication that they observe the speed limit," Kinnan said. "After several days of not noticing any slow down in traffic, I asked the neighbors what they thought of the new signs and they hadn't even noticed. They asked where they were."

He pointed out that although using Old Fort Stanton Road saves a bit in distance for those heading east on Airport Road to the Spencer Theater or other des-

tinations, with the faster speed limit on SR48 and Airport Road, drivers are not saving time.

Besides, Old Fort Stanton is a scenic route with many curves, wandering deer, children playing, people out walking and riding bicycles, he said.

Doing some calculations, he pointed out that driving the two miles at 30 mph — the posted limit — would take about four minutes. To cut that in half, people would have to travel at 60 mph and that kind of speed would be absolutely reckless.

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

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

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Turnovers costly to Tigers, Warriors

Lions' 10 proves dangerous for Capitan offense

CAPITAN — It's always frustrating for a coach when his team loses.

But it's even more frustrating for Capitan football coach Ed Davis, whose Tigers fell to Faith Christian of El Paso Friday in a game they should have won.

Capitan (0-3) squandered three separate scoring chances before finally getting their first touchdown of the year, while being victimized by the Lions' passing game in a 13-7 loss.

"When you get inside the 10 and the 5-yard line four times and don't score, there's something wrong," Davis said. "That's what we've got to correct."

The Tigers actually moved the ball well all night on Faith Christian (1-2), getting most of their yards on the ground thanks to Andrew Armendariz, who had 149 yards on 38 carries and scored Capitan's lone touchdown in the fourth quarter.

But every other time they got inside the Lions' 10, Capitan just couldn't punch it into the endzone.

"The one good thing we saw is that our offense started to move," Davis said. "But I'm trying to find out why we don't come into these games ready to play in the first half. We do away with the first half in these games and we'd be 2-1 right now."

"That's a mental thing, whether it's our youth or what, I don't know," he added. "I've tried everything. We'll come out and whip their butts in the second half."

The Tigers looked like they'd conquered that demon right off the bat, taking the kickoff and marching to the Faith Christian 9-yard line — almost all on the back of Armendariz.

But a Capitan fumble stopped the drive. The Lions later opened the game's scoring on a 57-yard pass from quarterback Emmanuel Ramirez to Tony Becerra to make it 7-0.

Ramirez and Becerra were particularly deadly to Capitan Friday, as the two combined for 184 yards in the air on only seven receptions. Ramirez also played catch with Ben Esparza to the tune of 100 yards on six receptions. When those two caught the ball, they made it count.

Ramirez finished the game going 16-34 with 304 yards.

Capitan quarterback Bo Sparks didn't have that best a night in the air. He was 9-17 with 152 yards, most to Sheldon Moor, who had five catches for 108 yards. But he also threw two interceptions, and the Tigers fumbled the ball five times, losing three on a field made wet and slippery by a downpour which ended just before game time.

Those turnovers proved costly, as they cancelled what could have been productive drives for the Capitan offense.

"We moved the ball well tonight and

executed pretty well offensively," Davis said. "But when you get the ball in the red zone, you've got to score. Faith Christian didn't stop us, we stopped ourselves."

Capitan saw another drive stall in the second quarter at their 34-yard line and were forced to punt.

But the Lions even made that a difficult proposition, as Becerra took the punt by Sparks and ran 67 yards for his team's second touchdown with 3:45 left in the half.

After recovering another Tiger fumble just two plays later, Faith Christian threatened to score again, driving to the Capitan 16.

But the fumble bug bit the Lions this time, as Becerra couldn't handle a pitch from Ramirez on the option. The ball skipped crazily into the Tiger endzone, where Capitan recovered for a touchback.

The Tigers couldn't make anything happen and punted back to Faith Christian, who made one last drive before the end of the half.

But after they got to Capitan's 9-yard line — mostly on a 33-yard pass from Ramirez to Becerra — the Tiger defense stiffened. They forced three straight incompletions in the back of the endzone, and Ramirez had to settle on a two-yard gain to Jed Knap before time ran out.

That goal-line stand got Capitan fired up, as they came out and recovered the outside kickoff. But they weren't able to score on the ensuing drive, and after getting the ball back from Faith Christian on an interception, the Tigers again found the Lions' 10 to be a danger-

ous place.

This time, Capitan got all they way to the Lions' five, where it was third-and-goal. But after Sparks was tackled for a seven-yard loss and the Tigers were called for two straight motion penalties, Capitan turned the ball over on downs at the Faith Christian 22.

It wasn't until 2:47 left in the game when Capitan finally got in the endzone on a four-yard play by Armendariz. The Tigers were unable to get the ball back on another outside kick, and a final interception by Faith Christian's Steven Lopez effectively ended the game.

Despite his team's struggles — and the fact they face another very good passing Texas team in Tornillo Friday — Davis was still optimistic.

"We're going to be OK, I believe it," Davis said. "If I can just make these kids believe it, we're going to be fine. I wouldn't trade this bunch of kids for anybody. I believe in them and I believe we're going to turn this thing around."

Strong play doesn't net Warriors win

The Ruidoso Warriors played their best football game of the year Friday night in Moriarty. They played aggressive, hard-hitting ball, pressured the pass-happy Pinto offense and took advantage of weaknesses in the Moriarty defensive secondary.

At least, they did for three quarters.

But after taking a 21-14 lead just seconds into the fourth quarter, things started to fall apart for Ruidoso (1-2), as the Pintos forced four Warrior turnovers and scored 24 points in 17 plays en route to a 45-21 win in front of a lively home crowd.

"Up until that point (the turnovers) it was anyone's ballgame," Ruidoso coach Ridge Bowden said. "Our kids went up there to play — I think we surprised them by how hard we were playing."

The Warriors proved their power early, as the defense forced Moriarty (2-1) into a three-and-out on its opening possession. Quarterback Josh Adams then led Ruidoso to its first score in just five plays, for an early 7-0 lead.

Adams, who has had more success with his legs than his arm since becoming the starter in 2001, attacked the Pinto secondary, completing 19 of 50 passes for 286 yards. He also rushed the ball for about 50 yards.

Chance Hooper was his target of choice, though, as Hooper picked up 207 yards receiving. As a team, the Warriors picked up just less than 400 yards of total offense.

"We felt like there were things we could exploit in their secondary," Bowden said. "I was surprised that a team that throws so much had trouble defending the pass."

But a nearly three-to-one penalty ratio against the Warriors, two fourth-quarter interceptions, a Warrior fumble and a botched kickoff return combined to cost Ruidoso its fourth quarter lead and the game.

"It was drenching," Bowden

Lobo defense shines in shutout

Starting HB Wright out for season after suffering torn ACL during 23-0 victory

ALBUQUERQUE - After a few unsettling performances to start the year, the University of New Mexico defense of old made its presence felt once again in a convincing 23-0 victory over Baylor University on Saturday night at University Stadium.

New Mexico stifled the Bears from start to finish, allowing just 107 yards, the stingiest effort since holding UTEP to 70 yards in 1983.

The Lobos improved to 2-2 for the first time since 1998, head coach Rocky Long's first season at UNM. New Mexico won its third straight home game, the second by shutout, and has captured five straight non-conference contests at University Stadium.

Baylor remained winless

on the road, falling to 1-2 on the season.

New Mexico wasted several opportunities in the first half. After taking a quick 7-0 lead, the Lobos drove down to the Baylor 1-yard-line, but lost possession when junior quarterback Casey Kelly fumbled the ball while attempting to stretch it over the goal line.

Later in the second quarter, sophomore kicker Wes Zunker misfired on a 43-yard field goal, followed by another miss by sophomore Matt Goldstein from 28-yards out. UNM went into the half with a narrow 7-0 lead, despite outgaining Baylor 156-82 through the first two quarters.

Of greater concern for UNM, the Lobos lost senior

running back Quincy Wright for the season after he suffered a torn left ACL in the first quarter. The injury came at the end of a 13-yard run. Wright came into the game third in the nation in rushing, averaging 158.3 yards a game. He finished the game with 21 yards on four carries.

the night averaging 36 points and 474 yards of total offense per game. Goldstein chipped in a 32-yard field goal with 2:21 left in the third, then connected again from 32 and 26 yards in the fourth quarter to cap the scoring.
