2 indicted for vehicular homicide in 'Zozo

A grand jury brought down charges for the drivers in the July death of Cassandra Parra.

Two people were indicted for vehicular homicide last week by a Lincoln County grand jury in connection with the death July 17 of Cassandra Parra

in Carrizozo.

Jahney L. Woods, 44, of Alto was the driver of the vehicle that prosecutor Roxa Anne Matise says pulled into the path of a motorcycle on which Parra was a passenger. Woods was indicted for homicide by vehicle, a 3rd-degree felony; great bodily injury by vehicle, a 3rd-degree felony; no proof of financial responsibility, a motor vehicle misdemeanor; and vehicle entering

highway from private road or driveway, a penalty assessment misdemeanor.

Andrew D. Sandoval, 27, of Carrizozo, who was driving the motorcycle, was indicted on homicide by vehicle, great bodily harm by vehicle, having no license and no proof of financial responsibility.

The indictments state that the two accused people killed Parra "in the

unlawful operation of a motor vehicle while violating state laws against driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or drug."

The two also are accused of injuring Sandoval while they were violating the same state DWI statute.

The 3rd-degree felonies each carry a basic sentence of six years in prison and a fine of not more than \$5,000. The motor vehicle violations are pun-

ishable by up to 90 days in jail and a fine of not more than \$300.

Testifying at the grand jury session Wednesday in Carrizozo were New Mexico State Police officers Sam Huston, Robert Eshom and Tom Green, Dr. Sarah Kerrigan, Dave Vermilion, Slyvia Barela, Veronica Pacheco, Ray Aguilar, Ben Davenport,

Hotel will pay \$7,500 in lieu of property tax

For the first time since the Hawthorn Suites hotel project was initiated, Lincoln County will collect an annual payment for the furnishings and other improvements not covered in the original \$8.7 million industrial revenue bond issue.

An agreement for the company to pay \$7,500 each year in lieu of taxes was hashed out over the last few months by County Assessor Rick Silva, County Attorney Alan Morel and company officials. The agreement specifies the payments are not to be considered an admission by the company that any personal property taxes are due. It also would not prevent a future county assessor from seeking a definitive court judgment on the issue.

Construction on the Hotel Ruidoso complex next to the village convention center off Mechem Drive started in April 2000 and was finished in October 2001. The hotel was built with proceeds from a 1999 tax-free bond issue. The company filed claims for exemption from property tax in the years 2000, 2001 and 2002.

But after he took office in January 2000, Silva learned that about \$2.3 million was spent on the hotel in excess of the revenue bonds.

"Rick came to me and asked, should it be taxable or not," Morel said Tuesday. "We contacted Hotel Ruidoso and we worked with their attorneys and had meetings over this. They steadfastly took the position that, as part of an industrial revenue project, neither

13 to run for 4 tribal positions

Three incumbents on tribe's council ballot

Three incumbents are running for re-election in the Mescalero Apache primary election Tuesday.


Thirteen candidates signed up to compete for four seats open for election on the tribal council.

Incumbents Glenda Brusuelas, Arthur "Butch" Blazer and Alfred G. La Paz are trying for another two-year term. It would be a third term for Brusuelas and Blazer, who ran unsuccessfully last year for vice president, and a second for La Paz, former Bureau of Indian Affairs police chief.

Oliver Engady, an artist, former tribal vice president and a current council member, is not listed as running for a second consecutive term.

ETZ votes to allow cellular tower on edge of village

The new structure off Squaw Trail will replace a similar one near Sudderth Drive.

After two previous hearings in the past month and an hour more in front of the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Authority Monday, representatives of Verizon won approval Monday to install a cellular tower on property off Squaw Trail.

A vote on the issue was postponed two weeks ago because one member of the authority was absent. The three-person board is composed of one Ruidoso councilor and two county commissioners.

Last month, the ETZ Commission, a larger board with several non-elected representatives from the two entities, split on the application from Verizon Wireless, kicking an appeal to the ETZ Authority.

ETZA chairman L. Ray Nunley, who is a county commissioner and a village councilor, said at the earlier meeting he wanted a postponement because the decision could again end up in a split, if a vote was taken with only two members present.

The approval followed a wait of more than a year for the two boards to come up with a revised ETZ ordinance that dealt with cellular towers, previously restricted to industrial sites. None of those sites fit the height and location criteria for conveying and receiving signals, company officials said.

ETZ Attorney Charles Rennick and Mike Runnels, who heads the village planning and zoning department that oversees the ETZ, assured the two board members that the application met all of the requirements to approve the tower. Aesthetics and a reluctance to see more towers go up at the site or to increase the height of the proposed tower to accommodate the antennae of other companies remained the two major points of debate.

At the earlier meetings, representatives of Verizon walked ETZ officials through the steps taken to check out public land options and co-locations on existing or planned towers as preferred options. They then explained why the knoll on the mountain would fill the service gap with a 70-foot tower and would result in the removal of a less effective 125-foot tower behind Radio Shack off Sudderth Drive.

Opposition during the process came

mostly from two neighbors, including Barbara Willard, who said she plans to create a residential development in the area. She recalled that the site first was debated in June of 2000, although no official application was filed. Verizon subsequently received approval of a tower in town on Whitlock Street as a temporary measure from the village planning and zoning commission. The Squaw Trail site falls within the one-mile ETZ area of transition around the village, but lies in the unincorporated portion of the county.

Willard pointed to the requirement to first try to use public land and existing structures or towers before approving new towers on private land. A residential district is the least desirable option, as outlined in the ordinance, she said. But Nunley noted the area, because it falls within the county, which has no zoning, is not designated as residential.

Richard Parkinson, who owns the land, said in his opinion, one tower visible above the tree line would be less offensive and constitute less of an environmental impact than new homes. The lease will be for 40 years with a provision for the speedy removal of the tower should it become obsolete.

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Shooting incident leaves Downs man in critical state

A 35-year-old man was shot sometime before 3 a.m. Monday and was airlifted to University of New Mexico Hospital, where he was listed in critical condition as of 2 p.m. Tuesday.

The Ruidoso Downs Police Department was dispatched to Cowboys Trailer Park, 1776 Highway 70 west, shortly

before 3 a.m. Monday concerning a possible robbery that had occurred, said Police Chief Robert Logan.

The officers responded to a 911 call placed by the victim's brother and, at the scene, determined that Manuel Medina, a resident at Cowboys Trailer Park, near the Ramada Inn Express, had been shot, Logan said.

Medina was transported to Lincoln County Medical Center

and then airlifted to Albuquerque.

Logan said the case is still under investigation by the Ruidoso Downs Police Department with assistance from the Ruidoso Police Department, and they are working on some leads. He said he doesn't know Medina's occupation or how long he has been in the area. Also under investigation is whether or not there was a robbery, Logan said.

Bust nets \$65,000 worth of coke

A six-month narcotics operation resulted in the arrest of two individuals from Anthony, N.M., and 2 pounds and 11 ounces of cocaine confiscated at 9 p.m. Friday, Sept. 20.

The operation was headed by Ruidoso Police Department narcotics agent Randy Spear with assistance from the FBI, agents of the New Mexico State Police and agents of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, according to Ruidoso Police Chief Lanny Maddox.

Maddox said agents bought the cocaine, with a street value of \$65,000, with funds from Rocky Mountain Information Network of Phoenix, Ariz., a law enforcement intelligence agency, through the Department of Justice.

"I think with that type of quantity and the players arrested, it's going to have an impact on future narcotics trafficking in Ruidoso," Maddox said. "It was a great team effort."

The case is still under investigation and Maddox said he couldn't give the suspects' names at this time, but said they were taken to Roswell by the FBI after their arrests.

Rival bike gangs cause no problems

Although two rival motorcycle gangs were in town last weekend for the Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally, the Ruidoso Police Department rallied other law enforcement agencies to monitor the increased population and violence was averted.

Chief of Police Lanny Maddox said all of his law enforcement personnel were on duty - 25 people - in addition to 25 from other agencies: New Mexico State Police, New Mexico Motor

Transportation Division, Rio Rancho Police Department, Alamogordo Department of Public Safety and Lincoln County Sheriff's Department.

Maddox said the Hell's Angels and the Banditos, who had had problems in Laughlin, Nev., and Albuquerque, were expected, and extra law enforcement personnel were brought in specifically for that reason.

"We prepared for the best and hoped for the best and succeeded," Maddox said. "Two outlaw rival biking groups at war, and our

presence was a deterrent."

Over the weekend of the rally, there were 31 arrests, 14 accidents with three injuries involving motorcycles and other types of vehicles, 15 arrests for driving under the influence of alcohol - eight locals and seven visitors - and three arrests for battery against a household member, he said. In all, there were 102 calls for police assistance.

Maddox said the number of incidents during this year's motorcycle rally was down considerably from other years.

include Joseph Geronimo, a fire spotter, teacher of traditions and a frequent candidate for president, vice president and tribal council, and Harlyn Geronimo, who previously served on the council and currently is on the school board.

Christie La Paz Jr. and Larry A. Shosh, who both previously served on the council, are candidates, as is former vice president Frederick Chino Sr. and Carleton A. Naiche-Palmer, a former tribal council member, a grant writer for the tribe and previous presidential candidate.

Thora Walsh-Padilla, who

heads natural resource protection for the tribe and was a close contender last year, is on the ballot again. Other candidates are Charles Shanta Jr. and Albert Platta Sr., with tribal housing, and former council member Samuel Cooper Sr.

Incumbents whose two-year seats on the council will be up next year are Raymond Kirgan, Gregory Mendez, Sandra Platero and Michaelene Ahidley. The positions of president and vice president also will be elected in 2003.

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Capitan OKs fix to area residents' water worries

CAPITAN - Six Capitan-area water customers no longer have to worry if their taps will work, thanks to a compromise reached with the village of Capitan.

Mayor Steve Sederwall broke a split vote by the board of trustees after coming out of executive session Sept. 17 to supply the extrajurisdictional customers with water by installing a pump to replace Bonito Pipeline water

soon to be shut off. The village will split the cost of the pump with the residents in question and will pay for operation of the pump.

Sederwall called an emergency meeting of the village's board of trustees involving an executive session on the pending and threatened litigation concerning the trustees' previous decision to not provide water to the six customers.

Gary Mitchell represented five of them at the meeting, and John Underwood represented the sixth

plaintiff. Don Dutton represented the village, and all the plaintiffs were present.

Throughout the three-hour meeting, the attorneys came and went and when questioned as to the progress being made, they said that three trustees were adamant in their opposition to providing water to the six customers.

Five of these plaintiffs granted easements to the Village of Capitan in 1957 for a pipeline from Bonito Lake to bring water to Capitan. At that

time, Capitan was without a reliable source of potable water. The sixth plaintiff had granted easements on his property at a later date for various improvements to the water system.

The three trustees who opposed the purchase of a pump gave various reasons for their objections, ranging from not wanting to set a bad precedent to not wanting to pay \$6,000 for the pump.

Mitchell and Underwood had placed the village on notice that they would sue on behalf of the plaintiffs

for actual damages, punitive damages, and removal of the asbestos concrete pipe that constituted the Bonito water line.

Despite this liability, three of the four trustees refused any compromise until Sederwall suggested that the village pay half of the cost of the pump (\$3,000) and the plaintiffs divide the remaining cost (\$3,000) among themselves. The plaintiffs' cost was to be amortized over two and a half years. The village agreed to install the pump and pay for the electricity to run it.

the personal property nor any of the assets were subject to tax.

"If they have stayed within the industrial revenue bonds, I would absolutely agree, it was completely tax free - but they did not."

The two sides argued back and forth. While the state offered moral support for the county's position, it didn't get into the fray, with officials acknowledging it was an area they hadn't confronted or tested in court, Morel said.

"We were at the point of instituting litigation to answer the question because it had never been addressed in New Mexico before," Morel said.

"Then the other side came up with the suggestion that instead of litigating the issue and spending thousands of dollars on attorneys fees to see who is right, they were willing to pay \$5,000 in lieu of taxes, not admitting they owe any taxes. If this assessor or another in the future disagrees, the agreement terminates and we can all litigate it at that time."

The county countered with a figure of \$10,000 and the two sides settled on \$7,500.

"They will pay every year for the 25 to 27 years left," Morel said.

The payment will stay the same although property can be depreciated under normal tax-

ing conditions, Silva pointed out.

"They could have depreciated some property in one year, seven years or longer. It would have been a nightmare to keep track," Morel said.

A major part of the dilemma was that company officials decided to depreciate all of the assets from the business operation at the same time for taxation purposes. They claimed the assets belonged to the village, he said.

Instead of getting mired in that issue and possibly spending \$50,000 or more on litigation, Morel said he thinks the agreement is good for the county.

Silva said he hopes the end result illustrates his tenacity and fairness. If he believes something should be subject to taxes, his office staff will contact the agent involved and explain the county's position, while allowing the other side to state its contentions.

To avoid similar situations with industrial revenue bonds in the future, Silva is working with the Bernalillo County assessor for changes to rules. Currently, an IRB project must occur in an area with a population of 250,000 or more for the county to be notified.

"We're trying to change that to require notification of IRBs of any size to the county attorney

and the county assessor before they are approved for officials to review to avoid a conflict with the property tax code," Silva said. "We want to remedy this so no one has to go through this in the future."

"In our situation, we made something happen out of nothing. It's our position, if you write off the personal property, then you need to pay taxes on it. That's clear in the state statutes."

Perry Bendicksen, the attorney representing Hotel Ruidoso, was out of town and could not be reached for comment.

Katherine Duffy and Sonya Vega, a minor, according to court records.

Matisse, an assistant district attorney for the 12th Judicial District, said beyond what was stated in the indictments, she couldn't comment

on the case.

Woods was arrested after officers said she pulled out of the Allsup's convenience store into the path of the 2003 Kawasaki motorcycle driven by Sandoval. The cycle hit the left front of Woods' 1985 Buick, according to the police report.

Parra, 22, of Ruidoso Downs, died at the scene after being thrown from the motor cycle about 9:11 p.m. The accident took place at the intersection of U.S. 380 and U.S. 54.

Sandoval was airlifted to William Beaumont Hospital in El Paso.

'Stranger Danger' program coming to schools

"Stranger Danger," a community project sponsored by the Ruidoso Valley Noon Lions with support of the Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Capitan police departments and volunteers from the area, will be brought to local schools in October.

The purpose of the project, said Doris Huskey, chairman of the committee, is to educate all members of the community about the possibility of abductions and ways to avoid them.

The group will present parent conferences Oct. 24 and 25 at the Ruidoso and Capitan elementary and middle schools, and at day cares and private schools earlier in the month, Huskey said. Books and flyers will be made available to students and families.

"The community as a whole, meaning parents,

children and residents are in denial that anything like an abduction could happen here," states a release by Stranger Danger. "It could happen here, especially with all the tourists we have, and if we as a community become alert and be aware, maybe we can avoid a tragic situation such as an abduction."

The release suggests parents keep recent child photos and information available, and said information forms for each child will be made available for parents to fill out, with finger printing to be done by the Ruidoso Downs Police Department on these forms.

The committee is open to volunteers and suggestions from individuals or organizations.

Help the hummers

To the editor:

I'd like to encourage local residents to continue to fill their hummingbird feeders until all of the "hummers" have gone south. The regulars that ate from our feeders all spring and summer may have already departed, but many are still passing through on the way to warmer winter climes.

During particularly cold nights, a hummingbird will bristle its feathers to let its body heat escape so that its body temperature will closely match that of its surroundings. Its heart rate (which normally beats 500-plus times per minutes also drops dramatically, putting the bird in a state of temporary hibernation called "torpor." At daybreak, it revs its metabolic engines and warms itself. Having nectar available for sustenance and migration is essential. A few stragglers have been seen in late October at our home in The Ranches, where they survived night-time drops below 25 degrees.

Please continue to leave feeders out until two weeks have passed since your last "hummer" sighting. Many birds will likely repay you for your kindness by visiting you again next spring.

More law than we actually need in Ruidoso

Everyone loves the new fire safety ordinance, not because it constitutes good law, but because nobody has read it and nobody is enforcing it. Actually, it is a terrible law, in part because its size. The ordinances start with a modest 25 pages. Then they adopt by reference the entire Urban/Wildland Interface Code (U/WLIC), another 30-odd pages plus lengthy self-justification and appendices. Next, they adopt the Forest Task Force Report; meanwhile, the U/WLIC adopts several national building and fire standards. Altogether, the law now weighs over two pounds.

Please don't mistake the direction I am taking. The intent of the law is solid gold, and hidden within the blob that was enacted, there is a labor of love by the task force providing excellent standards and advice. Our new law should not be discarded, only tamed.

The U/WLIC creates the office of Code Official and grants him far more power than any unselected authority should wield. He has the powers of a law enforcement officer (Sec. 102.1), and he can demand that construction plans, calculations, and diagrams be prepared by a licensed architect or engineer even if state law does not require it (Sec. 106.1). He can also the ordinance and

assess fees (Sec. 5); he can render interpretations and can write and enforce his own supplementary regulations (Sec. 102.2). Sec. 6 provides for fines and jail time for violators of the U/WLIC.

Inflexibility allows the Code Official little room for forgiveness (Sec. 103.1) and specifically denies the appeals board any authority to interpret code requirements (Sec. 104.2). Imagine transferring interpretation of law away from the courts to the police chief, then empowering the chief to write his own regulations. Scary?

Almost every property owner in Ruidoso is already in violation of the fuel management standards and may be in legal jeopardy for years. The Task Force Report expects to achieve defensible space goals within 5 to 8 years (p. 1) or 12 years (p. 12), but the code does not allow any phase-in period. All of us are already subject to penalties.

The ordinance establishes a "Wildfire Hazard Overlay District" for properties adjacent to or near forests or undeveloped land. This District will almost certainly be perceived as a fire-hazard ghetto, and property within it will require a "wildfire hazard" disclosure in any sales offering, diminishing property value and providing a 10% net of the unscrupulous insurance firms to ratchet premiums upward. This would be unjust, because the targeted area has

not only an excellent history of fire safety and moderate premiums, but is more fire safe now than even five years ago. In the Upper Canyon, miles of 6-inch line are supporting dozens of new fire hydrants. There is a new fire station with two modern engines in the canyon, and scores of hazardous LP gas tanks have been removed following the installation of natural gas lines. Assuming that our fire department already has a pretty good idea where wildfire hazards exist, it should be debated whether the overlay district serves any good purpose or is just another really bad idea. The ordinance says it will "... facilitate an added value concept to enhance aesthetics and property values." Of course.

We need to take a deep breath and sort this law out, and maybe it will help if we acknowledge that the U/WLIC is a regional code, written for another world — California. In "Findings of Fact" (Appendix II-B), examples are provided to justify overlay districts. The first example concerns flooding which might affect emergency vehicles (in wildfire season?), another is earthquakes, and still another is "hot, dry weather typical of this area in summer and fall" (in monsoon season?). This is pure Malibu, not Lincoln County. The code has universal value where properties are large, costly

Former cop's request postponed

A hearing on a motion to withdraw the no-contest plea of a former Capitan police officer and to reconsider the sentence handed in middle August was postponed Friday when a witnesses wasn't available.

At the request of Johnny Williams's attorney, Todd Holmes, Lincoln County District Judge Karen Parsons will try to set the new date for next week, a court spokesman said.

After pleading no contest to two felony and one misdemeanor charge, Williams was sentenced to five years in prison by the 12th Judicial District judge in Carrizozo. He was given a three-year sen-

tence for aggravated burglary, a 2nd-degree felony; 364 days for criminal sexual contact, a misdemeanor; and three years for bribery or intimidation of a witness, a 3rd-degree felony.

Parsons suspended two years of the seven-year sentence, which means with "good time" on the five years remaining, the former police officer could be out in about 2 1/2 years.

Williams, who filled in when police chief Carrol Durbin ran unsuccessfully for Capitan municipal judge, had entered a no-contest plea in July to all three charges. He was arrested March 6 and jailed under a \$50,000 cash-only bond after being accused of trying to bribe a victim to drop her criminal sexual contact complaint against him. He bonded out in

April.

The Ruidoso Police Department videotaped an interaction between the officer and the woman from Capitan on Sudderth Drive in a sting initiated by the district attorney's office that also included the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department and the New Mexico State Police, District Attorney Scot Key said at the time.

His office chose to take the criminal sexual contact case to the grand jury instead of a preliminary hearing because grand juries are secret, Key said. If the grand jury had not indicted him, the officer's reputation would not have been compromised, he explained.

But after Williams learned of Key's intent, he committed the bribery offense, the prosecutor contends.

After 14 years of employment at the school, Brown said she found it emotionally difficult to express her gratitude while accepting the good wishes from the board members. Brown and her husband, Dewey, have purchased a ranch near Socorro. She has taken employment with the Socorro school system.

With all board members present, with the exception of Eldon Offutt, the board proceeded with the agenda items.

A construction update from the architect Scott Stafford and a RebCon construction representative indicated the elementary school is complete with the exception of

a dozen punch list items. The middle school construction has a completion date of Oct. 31.

and isolated, but the concept of defensible space simply falls apart when applied to a typical urban lot.

Defensible space, defined by the code, is an area that has been treated or cleared to slow the rate and intensity of a wildfire and create an area for fire suppression. A wildfire front advancing at five miles per hour will move from my property line to my home in two to three seconds, and nothing I can do will suppress it. Our ordinance controls trees and forgets the forest — the only place where a wildfire can be suppressed.

So, what should be done with the code? First of all, we should save the core — what the task force gave us. This includes the fuels management standards, the more rigorous building code, and the position of Code Official. The U/WLIC and the Task Force Report should be retained only as advisories, and the Code Official should be given broad discretionary power to deal with properties which he considers priority hazards.

He should be empowered to

work out a mitigation plan and timetable with property owners, and if he believes that he can convince an appeals body, he should declare a flagrant fire hazard and impose an accelerated plan. It is important to allow him leeway in prescribing fuel management. Flammable litter, ladder fuel, small trees, and underbrush are the most dangerous components of fuel loading, the least expensive to control, and the obvious first targets. Large trees, especially in close proximity to structures, utility lines, and neighboring proper-

ties can be enormously expensive to take out, and strict enforcement could literally bankrupt the village. The Code Official should be required to provide solid economic justification before demanding their removal.

Our new wildfire code is simply too authoritative, foreign and generally outrageous for Ruidoso residents to live with. Let's ask our mayor and council to peel off the unpalatable parts and leave us the short, clean, and useful law that our task force made possible.

Schools get grants


Four Lincoln County school districts are among 37 who won more than \$404,000 in federal grant funding designated for improving school achievement in rural schools.

Capitan was awarded \$19,576, Carrizozo was awarded \$11,596, Corona was awarded \$9,427, and Hondo Valley was awarded \$6,174.

The U.S. Department of Education alerted U.S. Senator Pete Domenici on Sept. 18 of the grant awards ranging from \$2,991 for Mountainair School District to \$21,998 for Cloudcroft Municipal Schools. The funding is distributed through the Small Rural Schools Achievement Awards program, which was enacted as part of the No Child Left Behind education reform law in January.

"Rural school districts across New Mexico will be able to use this funding as they see fit, meaning they can apply it to areas that will best increase student achievement," Domenici said.

'Read Well' works well

I live in the sunny state of Florida. Last summer my dad, sister and I went on a long car trip.

This is the kind of thing first-grade students at Sierra Vista Primary School were able to read by the end of the school year last year — thanks to a new reading program.

Five classes piloted "Read Well," the new research-based reading program that de-emphasizes rote memorization and emphasizes instead phonemic awareness — recognition of letters and sounds, and phonics — the rules of connecting the letter symbol to a sound group.

Sierra Vista Primary principal Danny Flores bubbles over with enthusiasm in talking about the effectiveness of the program. Students scored higher reading scores than with two other textbooks used until this year, he said.

"We as a district made a decision last year that kindergarten and first grade we will all use 'Read Well' and 'Write Well,'" he said. In second through fifth grades, students will use a book called "Open Court."

This year, all 12 first-grade classes are using it. The teachers were sold on it and voted unanimously to switch to "Read Well," Flores said.

The program, written by Marilyn Sprick, Lisa Howard and Ann Fidanque, who all came to Ruidoso for in-service trainings on teaching reading, developed out of a national movement called Early Childhood Literacy, and the authors and others on the National Reading Panel came up with a list of text recommendations in 1998, he said.

"Sprick was a kindergarten teacher in Oregon who said 'We've met with all these reading experts. There is not a book company doing things that all these experts say we need to be doing,'" Flores said. "She said, 'Heck with the big companies, I'm going to write material that meets the needs of kids.' So she did."

Sprick, Howard and Fidanque wrote "Read Well" and a related component called "Write Well," which starts with phonemic sounds and is 98 percent decodable — meaning children don't have to

guess at what a written word means, because they're introduced to letters and sounds together and can read all the words presented to them. In contrast, Flores said, Scotts Foresman's first-grade textbook is only 27 percent decodable, upping the guesswork children have to do to "read."

"There was a lot of frustration," Flores said. "First-grade teachers had been teaching 200 sight words, which is pure memorization. Kids then relied on the picture cues because they weren't sounding out the words, their eyes were not tracking."

The first day of school, children learn the letters S and I, and they read the sounds of these letters, following along in their books — with no distracting pictures to look at, Flores pointed out.

"They're flying through this, going 'I can read!' and it keeps going and building on sounds," he said.

To individualize instruction, classes are divided into reading groups of four to six children, and as they progress, they can move freely through more or less advanced classes at their own pace. Students also work with partners, reading and correcting each other. With commercial textbooks, the whole class would be on the same page, whether individual students were bored or totally confused. Students that test out of the "Read Well" text can walk next door and join a second-grade reading class, Flores said.

Teacher Kay Carter said she works with six students for half an hour, then an aide works with them on the same material for 15 to 20 minutes, in addition to writing work and partner-reading.

Children learn about "sneaky 'e'": If there's a vowel at the end of a word, such as in "cake," it sneaks around the consonant and pinches the vowel and that vowel says its name, "a," Flores explained. Sprick went through 52 revisions to come up with the finished version of the first-grade book, finished a kindergarten version in April, and now Nob Hill Early Childhood Center is piloting the first book.

She also started a second-grade book, which is the end of the program, Flores said. Her philosophy is that a child has from kindergarten through third grade to learn to read. After that, a child is reading

to learn. "Studies have shown that if they're not up to grade level at third grade, they will never catch up," Flores said.

Assessments of the 38 units that compose the first-grade reading class and one-minute fluency tests are part of the program, so reading proficiency can be tracked. Students also are tested for comprehension and prediction — what they think will happen next. This develops higher order thinking skills.

Last summer, students who had had trouble with reading in first grade attended a "reading camp" from July 15 to Aug. 3, for three hours a day of straight reading, Monday through Thursday. Flores showed with test scores that most students — except for a few special education and hearing-impaired students — had gone up dramatically: from 16 words per minute in a pretest to 100 words per minute after three weeks; from 72 to 138 words per minute, from 5 to 88, from 44 to 94.

"The dumbest person can teach 'Read Well,'" Flores said. "It's a method that has increased our reading levels tremendously, just like Accelerated Reading. Now we have a way to teach kids to read."

But the reading program doesn't end when class is over. Students take home calendars for parents and other family members to initial after spending 20 minutes reading together every night. Those who return the calendar to the school get a pencil for a prize, Flores said. Then the child's name goes in a bucket and Flores draws from it every day and one student goes to the office to pick a book. The school ordered books in bulk just for reading incentives, some in both Spanish and English.

"At the end of each semester, if they've turned in three calendars in the semester, all kids and parents are invited to a reading celebration party — banana splits for more or less 300 parents and kids," Flores said. Last year six children earned scooter-skateboards for earning 100 or more Accelerated Reading points.

"I really feel good. Last year 85 percent of our kids in first grade were at grade level or above. Ninety percent of second grade kids were at grade level or above. We've never had those kinds of results before. We're on the right track."

"They're defense was outstanding," Davis said of Tornillo. "I'd put them in the same league as Fort Sumner, they're that good."

Don't be sorry for me; we all have to make ends meet in this town.

While checking out customers last Sunday, I spied a man walking out the door with two 30-packs of beer.

A pack of gum he might have gotten away with, but two cases of beer? C'mon.

Anyway, I followed this man out the door with the purpose of the getting the beer back.

I wouldn't have pressed charges, honest. I just wanted the beer back. If I couldn't get that, I'd have got the license plate number and called the police.

As you probably know, that's not exactly how it happened. The perpetrator took off, and I went along with him.

I honestly couldn't tell you how it happened, but by the time I got loose, I was lying on Sudderth Street with a broken ankle.

I spent four days in the hospital, and now am writing this from my home, with my leg propped up and an inch-long hole in my ankle.

I've also lost a week's worth of work — possibly more — at the paper and won't be returning to Allsup's.

I'll be wearing a cast for at least six weeks, with regular treatments to the open wound and physical therapy thereafter. All this over \$32 worth of beer.

You'd think I'd be holding a grudge against the thief, or at least against myself for going after him.

What I did was instinct, and now I can't change it. It's wrong for someone to try and steal something while I'm working two jobs trying to

make ends meet. I won't apologize for what I did. But at the same time, I am trying to be forgiving to the young man.

While in the hospital, I had a steady stream of well-wishers call or come to visit — my parents, my aunt and uncle, Ruidoso News editor Wes Schwengels, Ruidoso News editorial advisor Keith Green, writers Diane Stallings and Sandy Suggit, Allsup's manager John O'Reilly, former Ruidoso News employee Melanie Sattler, Community Methodist Church minister Bob Sawyer, Winston and Dodi Cox, the list goes on and on.

But the one visitor that sticks out is the young man's grandfather, owner of the pickup which ran me over.

He struck me as a good soul who was deeply troubled at the actions of his grandson.

It made me realize their lives were affected as well. The young man — only 22 years old — is now facing an uncertain future while sitting in jail with a number of charges hanging over his head.

The grandfather confirmed what I had suspected, that the grandson has a drinking problem.

I now have no room to talk. I've had problems of my own in the past — not involving alcohol, but bad enough that I can't demonize this boy with a clean conscience.

Legally, all this is out of my hands. There will be court hearings and — eventually — a possible conviction and appeal.

But I hold no animosity toward the man. I just pray he doesn't let this incident destroy him, and would be willing to help him in any way I can.

POOP SCOOP

To distinguish between deer or rabbits nibbling on your trees and plants, look for a ragged, squared, torn appearance at the end of browsed twigs.

According to the authors of "Wild Neighbors: The Humane Approach to Living with Wildlife," put together by the Humane Society of the United States, deer don't have upper incisors and don't neatly clip their vegetation. They also browse at higher levels, from 3 feet to 5 feet above the ground.

The authors urge tolerance. "Deer damage can be considerably lessened and in some cases possibly eliminated all together by thoughtful landscape design that gives care to both the selection and placement of plants," the authors wrote.

"Some plants such as hollies and berries will be eaten by deer only when succulent growth is appearing, if then. Others such as popular annual plants like impatiens are almost irresistible to deer."

Check with the Lincoln County extension office of Pete Gantkowski in Cozad, the Rudoso Garden Club or local nurseries for a list of plants that are tolerant or actually resistant to deer browsing. Under heavy browsing conditions, the authors recommended enclosing the area or plants with deer-proof fencing or limiting the plants to those species that are the

most resistant to deer browsing. Using plants that occur naturally in the area are less likely to attract special attention from deer and the plants are more likely to have evolved mechanisms to deter browsing or to tolerate its impacts, they wrote.

Suggested other approaches to deer deter include:

- Fencing as a long-term solution from a standard mesh-woven wire to a high-tensile strand angled for better effectiveness. Check with local wildlife specialists before investing a lot of money.
- Wrapping trees with corrugated sleeves can prevent deer from rubbing against trees and damaging the bark. Or simply use 2-inch wooden stakes about 4 feet to 5 feet high, surrounding the tree.
- Repellents to make plants unpalatable to deer, or to create an offensive odor or sight in the area may work. But those options must be started immediately when damage is first sighted.
