Those temporary used-car sales lots aren't legal in Ruidoso

In Ruidoso, nothing in the planning and zoning rules allows temporary car sales. Two automotive dealers found that out last week. Both withdrew their applications for conditional use permits and approval of commercial

site development plans. Thirty-five days earlier, Leon Fink of Western Chrysler conducted a multi-day used-car sale at the site of the former Burger King on U.S. 70. But when he attempted to secure approval for the same activity from the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission Nov. 5, he was told he


had to buy or lease the building, complete any needed changes to comply with codes and submit a site plan with an engineer's seal. "It's a used car sale promotion," Fink said. "We display cars with a tent and I have staff there. I received a special permit from the city at the same location a few months ago. I

have some equipment waiting there now for this board's approval." But Chairman Glen Barrow said a conditional use can't be granted on a temporary basis. Board attorney Charles Rennick said, "I do not believe the code contemplates used car sales as a mobile vending stand. I don't believe duration

is relevant. Like any other business, it must meet code for a commercial site plan whether they sell for one day or 365 days." Fink said he was confused. He filled out the applications with the assistance of the planning staff and

Ski Apache sets sights on Thanksgiving opening

Four to six inches of snow fell on Ski Apache over the weekend, and with light snow falling that should translate to a Thanksgiving opening of the ski resort. Roy Parker, manager for the past 30 years of the resort operated by the Mescalero Apache

Tribe, was at the Lincoln County Commission meeting last week securing approval of the expansion of a liquor license for the resort lodge. He reviewed some of the ski area's history, saying it was purchased by the Tribe in 1963 after it was opened by oil man Robert O. Anderson. At that time, the entire resort fell within Lincoln County. Today two lifts and a

smaller lodge, called the Elk Lodge, at the lower end of the parking lot are inside Otero County, he said. "The line is 50 feet up the parking lot from chair lift 8 and the lodge," he said. "But 85 percent of the skiing area is in Lincoln county." "And you follow the same in each county," Commissioner Leo Martinez quipped.

Juvenile paid \$500,000 by village jailed

Girl faces multiple charges after violating house arrest

The 17-year-old girl awarded \$500,000 earlier this year in a lawsuit against the Village of Ruidoso and two police officers, was arrested Saturday for violating her house arrest, ordered the day before.

That order had been issued pending a trial on charges of auto burglary, receiving stolen property, forgery and stolen identification.

Susanne N. DiPaolo appeared in Ruidoso Municipal Court Tuesday for a detention hearing with District Court Judge Karen Parsons presiding. Parsons had issued an arrest warrant Nov. 8 after she called the judge two or three times and the Ruidoso Police Department five times, asking that she be allowed to leave with friends.

"I told her at the first appearance Nov. 8 that if she disobeyed the court's order of house arrest, she would be arrested," Parsons said in court Tuesday before ordering her sent to a detention facility.

Assistant District Attorney Pam Dobbs told the court that DiPaolo does not believe she has to listen to the court any more than she has to listen to her parents.

Dobbs played a recording of the five telephone calls DiPaolo made to the police department, one made to the answering

One alternative to Ruidoso's cemetery plot shortage isn't far away

Offering another alternative to Lincoln County cemeteries, Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Memorial Cemetery is situated along the Ruidoso River next to a horse farm and framed by foothills.

"It's really beautiful in the summer," said Susan Edwards, who owns the cemetery created by her late husband, W.R. "Stormy" Edwards. She lives in a house on an adjoining piece of property.

A recent replat of the cemetery created more than 3,300 spaces, ranging from 4x8 feet to 5x10 feet.

"My husband saw a need and we had the property, but then he became ill," she said. He died after a lengthy illness, and Susan Edwards went back to work. But she knew the cemetery was something that is

needed in the county and recently decided to focus on that instead.

"It was difficult at first," Edwards admits. "I would cry at every death. But as I lost more family members and friends, I could see the inevitable for everyone and I decided I just need to be here for them."

A shrinking supply of burial plots in Ruidoso was brought up recently by Danny Sisson of La Grone Funeral Chapel. He said only 20 burial plots remain open at Forest Lawn Cemetery there, the only village-owned cemetery. The plots sell for \$300.

"There are 70 cemeteries in the county," he said. "It's not a county issue. It's really a Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs issue. Carrizozo has two cemeteries, Capitan has one, Hondo has a couple and Lincoln has one."

Some cemeteries are church supervised,

others are family burial grounds.

Edwards said her cemetery can handle Ruidoso's needs, as well as people from the valley.

A quarter of each plot purchase price goes into a trust fund that generates interest to provide perpetual care of the cemetery, she said. A drip-irrigation system feeds the poplars she planted to create a screen around the cemetery and keeps the lawn green during season.

The cemetery was designed for bronze flat markers, but Edwards said she saw that some families preferred granite, which is less costly.

"They can express their individuality in the design, as long as it is more flat," she said.

One white wooden cross was put up for

Medical malpractice suit filed here

A Hondo couple claim their baby suffered brain damage because of the way her birth was handled at the Lincoln County-owned hospital in Ruidoso.

Jimmy and Anna Chavez, as the parents of Quaiwna Gutierrez-Chavez, filed the medical malpractice suit in the 12th Judicial District Court in Carrizozo on Oct. 28. Named as defendants were Deborah Hewitt, an unnamed physician's assistant and Presbyterian Healthcare Services doing business as the Lincoln County Medical Center.

According to the lawsuit filed by attorney Gregory R. Kauffman on behalf of the couple and their daughter, Anna Chavez was under the pre-natal care of Hewitt in early 1999 and a due date was established as Oct. 29, 1999.

The suit contends that Chavez started

labor and went to the hospital the next day, where a monitor was connected to measure the baby's heartbeat.

"At some point between the initial evaluation, the print out of the fetal heart monitor indicated the baby's condition was beginning to deteriorate," the suit states. Attending medical staff should have known she was at risk, but without an examination in person by Hewitt, Chavez was sent home because she wasn't dilated enough, according to the suit.

They arrived home at 2:30 p.m. and returned to the hospital by 7 p.m. Hewitt examined Chavez at 8 p.m., and at 9 p.m., broke her water.

The suit charges that Hewitt should have known the baby was at risk. Labor continued until early Oct. 31 with the baby being born at 12:50 a.m.

The suit states that mucus gushed out of the child's nose and she was choking.

Paramedics used a breath valve mask because she was having difficulty breathing and she was transferred to the University of New Mexico Hospital for emergency treatment, the suit states.

The child suffered brain damage and other injuries "as a result of acts or omissions by the defendants," the suit contends.

The suit claims negligence, negligent hiring, retention, training and supervision against the hospital, negligence on the part of the assisting medical person and that Hewitt is vicariously liable.

The couple is asking for actual, compensatory, consequential and punitive damages to be determined at trial and for court costs.

A spokesman for Presbyterian said he could not comment because the company has not been served with notice of the lawsuit. A spokesman for Hewitt said the doctor declined to comment.

nothing was mentioned about being a mobile vending stand or that the applications were not acceptable, he said.

Rennick said the staff can only accept an application to put before the board. That acceptance doesn't imply the application will be approved. That's a board decision.

"I thought I was playing by the rules," Fink said. "I had such a warm reception last time. I had no intention to circumvent the rules. I wouldn't be here, 200 miles from home, if I didn't think I had my ducks in a row."

Rennick said a new site plan showing the parking spaces, the display area and the building's use is needed.

"The code doesn't allow (operating out of a trailer and tent)," he said. Without a permanent building, "it can only be a mobile vending stand, but that's going down a rabbit hole because this clearly is not a mobile vending stand."

Rennick said the city officials who granted a prior permit for a special event erred.

"That's something I was not involved in and I only became aware of it after the fact," he said. "If it was approved as a special event, then it was in error. It does not meet the requirements of a special

event. Those don't come to this commission, they go to the clerk's office. By the time it came to the village's attention, there had been a substantial investment and they didn't want to see a loss of a lot of money and they approved the last one."

Special events primarily are activities by non-profit groups, he said.

Commissioner Tim Hoyt said he was bothered by the fact that Fink was allowed to apply for something the board doesn't have the mechanism to hear.

"He should have been told that," he said.

But Barrow said the staff can't deny a person the right to apply.

"The staff can't say no, we don't think you're going to get it," the chairman said.

After hearing the discussion with Fink, John Gaffney, representing Jim Spence Autoplex, withdrew his similar applications.

"I understand it has to be the same for everybody," he said.

Rennick said because the petitions were withdrawn, the application fees should be returned. If the issues had gone to a vote and been rejected, Fink and Spence could not reapply for 12 months.

Christmas check due county government employees

Lincoln County government employees will see a special one-time merit check just in time for Christmas.

County commissioners followed the recommendation of County Manager Tom Stewart and approved a one-time payment of \$1,000 for full time employees and \$500 for part-time workers. At the suggestion of Chairman Rex Wilson, they included the chief deputies in the offices of the clerk, treasurer and assessor. The chief deputies are paid 95 percent of salary of the elected officials they serve.

In another issue, commissioners may start meeting on the third Tuesday of each month after being criticized for had timing.

A few years ago at the recommendation of Stewart, they changed from 9 a.m. on Tuesday to 8 a.m. on the third Thursday of each month to ease the burden on county staff trying to assemble information for monthly reports and the agenda items.

But Friday, Oscura resident Jerry Carroll said the timing is wrong for a weekly newspaper in Carrizozo that publishes on Thursday. The stories from the meeting aren't published until a week later, he said the perception is that it's a slam against that newspaper," he said. The issue was tabled until December.

a young girl killed in a highway accident.

"I'm not about to take it down," she said. "I'm accommodating. I do have rules about the flowers."

She prefers urns that are sunk into the stone to prevent being blown over.

She also would like to promote using the same type of flower for each holiday such as the poinsettias she saw at a flat-marker cemetery in Big Springs, Texas.

"But my problem is finding the family," she said. "They may not have anyone left in the area."

New Mexico doesn't require vaults, but if a family prefers a vault, new ones are light weight and don't sink, she said. Edwards also is considering an area for cremated remains that

would be assigned to 4x4-foot plots. The cost would be about half of a regular plot, which is \$450.

Plots that measure 5x10 feet, found along the large walkways, are \$650, she said.

Although she lives nearby and is there nearly full time, Edwards said she also plans to build a separate office, to allow families to discuss site selections and do research in the future about people buried there.

"They can plan ahead and select a site, so everything is arranged in advance," she said. "The village has a resource here that is not that far and is beautiful. I'm here year-around."

The cemetery is located at mile post 267 1/2, about six miles east of Ruidoso Downs on U.S. 70. The telephone number is (505) 378-1413.

A metal carport variance stirs P&Z's ire

Although a variance was approved to allow an existing metal carport to stay put, some members of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission are absolutely opposed to the structures.

Commission member Rick Silva said last week he'd like to review the ban on metal carports with an eye to relaxing the rules, but Chairman Glen Barrow said he would oppose any change.

"We've been through all of this," Barrow said. "The foundations don't comply. The health, safety and welfare of our citizens are at stake here. Someday, one of these carports is going to go flying in a heavy wind and kill somebody. They are not properly installed, they are not safe and they're ugly."

Phillips R. Ensminger applied for a variance to allow the carport he bought from Wal-Mart and installed on his property in Palmer Gateway subdivision to remain on the lot. He was cited for a violation a month after it went up. Metal

carports are prohibited within the village. Ensminger also asked for a setback variance.

Commissioners in a 3-2 vote required Ensminger to disguise the metal supports for the carport and use a fascia, to submit to an inspection of the foundation and to comply with any requirements laid out by code enforcement officer Larry Hill.

Ensminger said he spent \$3,354 buying and putting up the two-vehicle carport and that he called the village for advice before he purchased the carport in May. He contended someone told him he didn't need a permit and that the rule was being contested in court. He used a construction worker to help him install the structure and the man told him the work met code, he said.

"I really feel in my heart, where I live, this improved my property," he said.

Barrow said, "Even the smallest of jobs in Ruidoso requires a permit. I'm shocked to hear anyone would say it did not. I can't think of anyone in the planning department (who would say that) since these

have been illegal since 1999."

Neighbor Donna Anderson supported Ensminger's contention that the carport enhanced the property. "It's really nice," she said. "Everyone is trying to improve their property. It's hard to buy affordable homes here."

"We're across from the Gateway Center that's falling down. I appreciate that you have laws, but so many homes on our street are grandfathered in. He's very neat. He takes good care of his property."

Barrow said part of the problem is that without inspections, the board can't be sure the foundation was done properly.

Board Attorney Charles Rennick said the commission could require the carport to be removed, but it can't grant a variance because there is a flat-out prohibition against metal carports. But the carport could be allowed to stay depending on some modifications. A set-back variance could be considered separately.

Commissioner Phillis Barnett said she has a problem

with approving metal carports after the fact. "We should either stick with our ordinance or throw it out the door," she said.

Board secretary Tim Vega pointed out that Ensminger can't enclose the carport because it then would become a garage, with different standards to meet. But the metal supports could be boxed in wood and fascia added.

"I'll work with Larry to do whatever he tells me to do," Ensminger said.

Rennick said the board faces two problems with the ordinance - a lack of awareness that the metal carports are prohibited by law and the failure to apply for permits.

machine of the judge and one made by her father, Phil DiPaolo, reporting that his daughter had left.

At one point, Parsons interrupted the recording to make a comment on DiPaolo's demeanor.

"I want it on the record that Miss DiPaolo is grinning and laughing and smiling," the judge said.

DiPaolo's attorney, Tim Rose, agreed that his client had "thumbed her nose at the court," but asked the judge to consider the best interests of the child, who had completed one rehabilitation and paid \$30,000 of her own money "from this horrendous crime ... to better her life" in a boarding

school in Tucson, Ariz. He said she had a plane ticket to Tucson to return to school and rehabilitation and could be gone by 6 p.m.

"If she's in jail, she's out the \$30,000," Rose said.

Parsons replied that "If she's blown that \$30,000, she's blown it. It's time for that young lady to take responsibility for herself and her blatant attitude toward the court ... When I don't have any confidence that she'll comply with my court orders and will run away ... it's her fault, nobody else's."

DiPaolo had run away four times between November and August 2001, police reports show.

Parsons said she would try to get a hearing set within the next 30 days.



Let the chips fall in Hubbard's favor

Gaming has Ruidoso tourism under the gun

The economic dependence Ruidoso has on tourism was brought into sharp focus last week when the staff of the state Gaming Control Board recommended that R. D. Hubbard's gaming license not be renewed.

The owner of Ruidoso Downs Race Track and Billy the Kid Casino was under the gun because of problems with a casino in Indiana in which he had an interest. He voluntarily paid the fine and severed his relationship with the facility.

The bottom line is that the Gaming Control Board should not accept the staff recommendation. Hubbard helped resurrect a dying industry in the mid 1980s and early 1990s. Pari-mutuel horse racing went into a decline as legal Indian gaming spread across the nation. After intense lobbying

by the horse racing industry, the state authorized slot machines at tracks. Billy the Kid Casino was opened to help provide bigger purses for the racetrack, and during the years since it opened it has done just that, as well as quadrupled its payroll as it brought bigger crowds to boost our economy.

The board should look at the entire period of ownership and licensing for Hubbard, not just one incident outside the realm of this board.

The State Racing Commission on Tuesday will review Hubbard's application for a new Hobbs race track. Regardless of what happens to that, Hubbard and Ruidoso Downs Race Track & Casino largely impact Lincoln County and its economy and that must be considered.

Has no rhyme nor no reason.



Making the water clearer

To the editor:

My first reaction to Al Junge's Nov. 6 letter to the editor regarding water was to throw up my hands and say, "Where in the world is he getting his information?" My second response (tempered, as usual, by my better half's counsel) is take advantage instead of Al's misunderstandings to shed some light on this complex issue.

Point No. 1 - There is a difference between available water and "water rights." The Ruidoso waterworks does not have the "right" to divert all of the flow of the Rio Ruidoso and it never did, even when Al helped build the dam. By order of the State Engineer's office, the village has the "right" to divert about 10 percent of the normal flow of the Rio Ruidoso (which is reduced, incidentally, by any water taken from the downstream wells).

The volume of water flowing into Grindstone Lake, therefore, is limited by these "rights," not by the village council. In order to adhere to these rights, a control gate was installed when the pipeline was put in, which opens and closes this gate.

How and when this limited amount of water is withdrawn is the prerogative of the waterworks, so long as the total amount is not exceeded. The only thing that has changed in recent years is that

the Village Council has determined that it is in everybody's best interest if this water is taken when river flows are high and not taken when river flows are low. This, to maintain the health of the river, so long as it did not threaten the municipal watershed supply.

Since it took effect three years ago, this agreement has been an unmitigated success. The river has stayed as healthy as possible under mostly drought conditions and the Grindstone complex has functioned more efficiently than ever before. I have no idea how Mr. Junge hatched the idea that the infiltration/treatment plant was closed down recently for lack of water. In point of fact, the Grindstone complex was able to carry the water load last summer when the North Fork wells failed.

Up until now, the control gate was opened and closed manually, which often caused the loss of available high flows when it could not be manned efficiently. The only new "control" being installed is one which will automatically open and close the diversion gate based on river flow. This makes sense and is exactly the intent of the council.

In spite of what Mr. Junge may think, the water that New Mexico must deliver to Texas under the Pecos Compact is neither negotiable, nor subjective. The required delivery is the result of an order from the U.S. Supreme Court and has no appeal. It is ludicrous ... for Mr. Junge to imply that our council "agreed to a plan that reduces the availability of water (to us) by allowing the water to flow in to Texas."

Nor does Mr. Junge's memory serve him well. Even as he states that "very few of us know that the control plan is in effect," Mr. Junge has forgotten that he himself wrote a letter to the editor decrying the agreement with equal confusion three years ago when it was signed by the mayor with the unanimous approval of the village council.

In closing his letter, Mr. Junge promises to "rest his case." Don't count on it.

Overall EMS plan would unite county, tribe

Under a new approach to emergency medical services, Presbyterian Healthcare Ser-

vices may end up managing all of the units in Lincoln County as well as Mescalero.

County commissioners postponed action on a management agreement with Presbyterian

until some items are cleared up by County Attorney Alan Morel. The prior contract expired on June 30. Jim Stover is director of the programs for the county and the village of Ruidoso.

"I've been working with (Ruidoso assistant village attorney Charles Rennick) and the village about a countywide EMS," Morel said. "He's putting together an agreement, which probably will take a year to finish up. It would cover all of Lincoln County and probably the Mescalero Apache Tribe."

"Now Ruidoso has its own contract and we have our as separate entities, although Presbyterian manages them all."

Gary Mitchell, president of the Lincoln County Medical

Center community board, is trying to work out an approach that would allow Presbyterian, which manages the county-owned hospital in Ruidoso, to pay on behalf of the county an annual "sole provider fee."

The fee is a charge by the state and in return, the hospital receives a three-to one dollar match for Medicaid expenses.

"But the company is not sure and we may need a services agreement," Morel said.

Stover said he learned just a few days earlier of the possibility that Presbyterian could lease the ambulance service and become responsible for profit and loss, repair and replacement, in lieu of paying the sole community provider fee each year.

Wirth opts to keep RHS job



State educational changes in the works

■ The state is reviewing school accountability and licensure changes, and decisions are possible next week.

SANTA FE - The New Mexico State Board of Education is seeking input on proposed changes to its accountability regulations (6.19.1 and 6.19.2 NMAC Public School Accountability) and to its licensure rules (6.63.4, 6.63.6 and 6.64.12 NMAC Educational Diagnosis, School Counselor and Licensure of School Administrators rules).

A public hearing to take public input will be from 10 a.m. to noon today, at the New Mexico State Department of Education,

Mabry Hall, 300 Don Gaspar, Santa Fe.

The accountability changes would provide one full year for a school to demonstrate student progress through an approved local corrective action plan and allow schools rated as probationary and entering the first year of school improvement to appeal their probationary rating.

The licensure changes would split the Licensure of School Administrators into two rules and two licenses, allowing for a

school district administrator and a school site administrator.

Taking forest jurisdiction no issue for Lincoln County

Individual commissioners do support the issue being raised in a petition to the Department of Agriculture.

Lincoln County wasn't among the 16 counties in New Mexico officially endorsing a petition to the federal government to relinquish jurisdiction over national forests.

Claiming the U.S. Department of Agriculture through its agencies failed to properly protect citizens, natural resources and endangered wildlife, the petition calls for authority to be transferred to local governments.

Signing individual endorsements were Lincoln County Commissioners Leo Martinez and William Schwettmann; State Rep. Dub Williams, a Republican from Glencoe; State Rep. Avon Wilson, a Republican from Chaves County; and State Sen. John Arthur Smith, a recent Democratic congressional candidate.

The petition emphasizes the primary mandate under Senate Bill 1 is "to expedite the removal of excessive fuel load conditions from our forests that, after ignition by whatever cause, are foreseeably likely to produce fires that may quickly achieve catastrophic proportions threatening the lives and property of our citizens."

Other included goals are:
• The creation and preservation of healthy New Mexico forest environments
• The protection of wildlife, including endangered species and their habitats, from annihilation from catastrophic forest fires.

The petition is addressed to USDA Secretary Ann M. Veneman giving notice of the

excessive fuel load conditions in the national forests within New Mexico and requesting the immediate transfer of "limited jurisdiction" for the state and counties to "remedy the forest conditions that have created the state of emergency."

"The petitioners write that efforts to persuade U.S. Forest Service officials to take appropriate actions to mitigate the state of emergency failed in the years prior to the latest and disastrous fire seasons. They call on the state Legislature and governor to respond and note that Senate Bill 1 authorizes county commissions within the state whose counties are exposed "to unreasonable, yet highly foreseeable threat of catastrophic fire on federal lands to take such actions as they may determine are or may be necessary and appropriate to eliminate the state of emergency."

County Manager Tom Stewart said he never recommended action to the commission on the petition because the letters asking for support went to commissioners directly. The issue was brought up during a meeting by Chairman Rex Wilson.

"When Rex brought it up, it was a total surprise to me, but I agreed with what chairman recommended," he said. Wilson suggested that commissioners respond individually.

"I think the county has benefited from the issue being raised and discussed and I'm thankful for that," Stewart said. "But at same time, we have a great working relationship with local district ranger and we want to do what best for the community."

Lincoln officials often describe their working relationship with forest service officials as highly productive and cooperative. Forest tree-thinning projects were started several

years ago around the village on national forest land to create a break in case of wild fires. The Bureau of Land Management and the State Forestry Division also conducted thinning and clearing projects.

"It's really not a matter of money," Wilson said of the commission's reluctance as a body to endorse the petition. "We supported Senate Bill 1 when it passed and still support the concept. The way it was written, if the Forest Service takes no action, the forests should be turned over. But in Lincoln County, unlike an awful lot of other places, our Forest Service can show that they've taken action toward the mitigation of the problem."

"When you look at a map of the forest thinning that has taken place, I don't think you can argue that they haven't taken some action. Maybe it was not quick enough, maybe it's not enough, but you can't say they haven't done anything. That's my feeling on it. We have a good relationship and want to continue that."

If a transfer ever occurred, the natural resources could generate a budget, he said, although it wouldn't be as large as the federal agency's.

"We could do it, but I don't think you can look at (district ranger) Jerry Hawkes and say to him, 'You haven't done anything,'" Wilson said. "I've been criticized for taking that stand by some of the other people in other counties, but if they had a guy like Jerry Hawkes, they'd have to agree with me. The Forest Service locally started years ago and made things happen long before the catastrophic fires started in 2000."

Commissioner Martinez could not be reached for comment Tuesday.

Commissioner Schwettmann said the more he read the petition, he realized

that he couldn't see anything bad in it at all.

"It will make them aware we're not happy with what's going on and want something

done about it," he said. "They're not going to give (the national forest) to the county. It's more just to tell them we're not satisfied with what they're doing."

Even if they did (convey the authority), it would never be in my life time and they would have to give counties the money."

PORTALES — This certainly wasn't how the Ruidoso faithful wanted this to go at all.

Needing just a field goal to at least secure the District 4-3A championship, the Warrior football team had the ball at the Portales 30-yard line Friday night, looking to get those — and hopefully more — points.

But on a third-and-eight play, Ram safety Antonie Holmes intercepted a Josh Adams pass in the flat to give Portales the ball, the game, and the district championship.

Despite their 18-7 loss to the Rams, Ruidoso is still in the playoffs, having secured that with last week's victory over Lovington.


"It would have been nice to be the district champ," said Ruidoso coach Ridge Bowden. "The only thing this changes is we're on the road."

The Warriors (5-5, 2-1 in district) had scored first and seemed ready to claim the district title outright with a win, but Portales had different plans.

The Rams (6-4, 2-1) stiffened on defense, holding the normally proficient running Adams to just 87 yards rushing and 96 yards in the air, all while controlling the ball on the offensive end.

"We were consistent in what we were doing," said Portales coach Glenn Johnson. "Our kids knew what we had to do offensively and defensively, and they stepped up and got it done."

Portales kept Adams from

They eventually won the Class 3A title that year, as they had in 1981 and 1979, two other years in which they were the district runner-up.


So you see, being second in your district — or region or divi-

try 13 yards total. "We knew we had to line up defensively because of the wishbone," Johnson said. "We just contained the receivers and didn't want to give up the big play. When you have to drive the ball 50 yards down the football field, that's hard for teams to do."

"Their tenacity was like ours against Lovington," Bowden said of the Portales defense. "And they just controlled the ball from beginning to end."

The Warriors, for their part, were able to stop Portales' big runner Les Long from gaining too many yards — he had only 52 on 22 carries. But many of those carries were within the Ruidoso 20-yard line, and two of them were for touchdowns.

The biggest damage was done by Ram back Chris Carter, who didn't carry the ball that often, but made it count when he did. Handling the ball just nine times, Carter racked up 106

yards to lead the game, and usually got his team within the red zone with his long rambles.

Ruidoso actually got on the board first, putting together a 67-yard drive that ended with a 22-yard pass from Adams to Chance Hooper for a touchdown near the end of the first quarter, but those were the only points they would get. The Warriors would get no closer than Portales' 30-yard line the rest of the way.

"When we have our possessions, we can't make mistakes against a good team," Bowden said. "That's true from now on; we'll be facing one of the best offenses in the state (in the playoffs)."

Following Ruidoso's opening score, the Rams engineered a long drive of their own, beginning from the Portales 33 and marching down the field, culminating in a two-yard punch-in by Long. The pass for a two-point conversion was incomplete, how-

ever, and the Warriors held onto a slim 7-6 lead.

They didn't hold onto it for long, as Ruidoso then fumbled on the very next play after the kick-off and the Rams recovered. Starting from the Warriors' 39-yard line, Portales engineered a clock-chewing drive that ended with another 2-yard touchdown by Long to give them the 12-7 lead heading into halftime.

The final score of the game came with 33 seconds left in the third quarter, following a 53-yard run by Carter that took the Rams to the Ruidoso one-yard line. After two runs by Carter and Long got nowhere, quarterback Seth Clabaugh got the ball across for the final 18-7 lead.

Ruidoso still had a full quarter to try for at least three points to clinch the district championship, but their first drive ended at the Portales 31 when an Adams pass fell incomplete.

The Rams later drove to the Ruidoso 10-yard line, but a

penalty drove them back ten yards, where the Warriors then recovered a Portales fumble. Ruidoso eventually drove down to the Portales 30 and seemed about to score, when Holmes came up with his game-clinching interception.

"That's only his second interception of the year," Johnson said

of Holmes' play. "He plays the underneath route well, and his timing couldn't have been better."

"We knew we'd have to come in and play four solid quarters of football, and this was the time when we came in and did it."

Bowden admitted it is disappointing to be in the playoffs as the district runner-up rather than the district champion, but pointed out that they are in the playoffs.

"It is exciting. We're in the playoffs for the first time in three years," Bowden said. "We're ready for a challenge."

"It might have been better to

lose now than later, anyway," he added. "We've got to learn from our mistakes and get it done."

Aggie football team falls in Logan, still unbeaten in Sun Belt

LOGAN, Utah — Like the sheets of snow and sleet that fell sporadically throughout the afternoon, Utah State's offense was a force of nature that New Mexico State could not stop.

The host Aggies (UtAgs) scored on seven of their first eight possessions and sent the Aggies from Las Cruces back to southern New Mexico with their first loss in six games.

The UtAgs won 32-30. NMSU, though, had a chance to tie the game late. Quarterback Paul Dombrowski took the ball across the goal line from one-yard out to make the score 32-30 with 19 seconds left. It was the redshirt freshman's ninth rushing touchdown of the season to give him the single season record for Aggie quarterbacks.

But his pass on the ensuing two-point conversion attempt hit the grass just below the arms of tight end Chris Gocke. An NMSU on-side kickoff attempt was unsuccessful and the UtAgs celebrated their third win of the season.

NMSU fell to 6-4 overall but remains 4-0 in Sun Belt Conference play. Aggie linebacker Tim Patrick said there was no excuse for the 481 yards of total offense his squad surrendered, the most total yards by an NMSU opponent all season.

"They did everything we expected them to do," Patrick said of the UtAgs offense. "We just weren't making tackles, we didn't have good angles, people left their feet."

Utah State signal caller Jose Fuentes attempted 40 passes, with 27 completions for 299 yards and two touchdowns. Just as important, running backs James Samuel and Richard Watson combined with Fuentes to give the UtAgs 182

yards rushing.

Utah State won the time of possession by 1:15.

UtAgs coach Mick Dennehy said his team beat NMSU at its own game.

"Offensively we were as effective in keeping the ball away from them as they have been all year, in terms of ball control," Dennehy said. "I was really, really proud of the ways the guys moved the ball."

Said NMSU head coach Tony Samuel, "You have to give Utah State a lot of credit. They threw the ball well, but what hurt us more was that they ran the ball well on us. Part of it was personnel (missing hurt players), part of it was the field and weather conditions and part of it was tackling. But give those guys (UtAgs) a lot of credit."

Still the Aggies were in a position to take the game to overtime.

NMSU forced Utah State into its first punt of the game with 5:26 left on the clock, and the UtAgs pinned the Aggies deep. But the hosts were called for a penalty and NMSU forced them to punt again. Aggie safety Tyrone Gifford took the punt at his own 11-yard line, ran into a crowd on his right and then broke free to his left. Gifford took the ball 42 yards to give NMSU the ball in Utah State territory.

"I just knew if I could get them to go to the right, there would be something there if I could get past that first bullet. It was open," Gifford said. "Our guys have done a good job blocking all year."

I-back Keith Mouton came off the bench with fresh legs to spark NMSU's final drive. NMSU had 47 yards to go for a touchdown and Mouton chewed off 37 of those on six carries.

"It was a beautiful drive,"

Samuel said. "Mouton steps up really well, Paul Dombrowski is a warrior out there."

But NMSU could pull no closer than two points.

The fact the Aggies were even in position to tie the game, though, was a tribute to two long touchdown passes in the third quarter.

Trailing 20-10 when his team came out of the locker rooms at halftime, Dombrowski hit Chris Lumpkin with a 37-yard catch and run for a touchdown on an option pass and then nailed H.B. Briscoe with a 50-yard touchdown.

Utah State, though, had an answer for every Aggie score.

Fuentes connected with Kevin Curtis from 46 yards out for Utah State's only score of the third quarter and then a Dane Kidman field goal in the fourth ultimately gave the UtAgs enough points for the victory.

"We knew what they were going to do," Gifford said. "They were going to come out and hit us with the short stuff all game and they did it. Once they knew they were successful with it, they kept going to it. The underneath stuff was killing us. I don't know how many screens they ran, but everyone was successful."

The first half saw the host UtAgs score on every possession. NMSU, though, opened the game's scoring when they took the opening kickoff and marched down the field. Sparked by a 44-yard run by Walter Taylor, NMSU moved the ball to the Utah State five where Dario Aguiniga made good on a 21-yard field goal attempt.

But the UtAgs struck back almost immediately. Jerome Dennis took the ensuing kickoff back 48 yards to give Utah State's offense a short field.

UNM wins following bye week

ALBUQUERQUE — After two straight overtime games, the University of New Mexico Lobos were hoping their usual good luck following an off-week would continue.

Playing San Diego State Saturday, UNM kept its bowl hopes alive, moved into sole possession of second place in the Mountain West Conference and improved to 6-0 in games following bye weeks under head coach Rocky Long with a 15-8 win over the Aztecs.

SDSU had a chance at the win with time running out at the Lobo 6-yard-line, but on a fourth-and-two play, Aztec quarterback Adam Hall's pass attempt was batted away by UNM linebacker Billy Strother to preserve the victory.

The Lobos (5-5, 3-1 in the Mountain West Conference) used a stifling defense to hold SDSU (3-7, 3-2) to no touchdowns and 183 total yards. The Aztecs were averaging more than 400 yards per game.

UNM quarterback Casey Kelly had a season-high 16 carries for 28 yards and one touchdown and had 70 yards passing on 9-of-15 attempts. DonTrell Moore had 71 yards on 22 carries to lead all rushers.

Moore and Joe Manning each had three receptions to lead the Lobos, and finished with 24 and 20 yards receiving, respectively.

"I wish we would have played better in the first half, that would have had us in better shape for the rest of the game," Samuel said. "We can take something from this game, some things were good, some things were bad but the reality of it is we play North Texas next week and so we have to have a great week of practice."

This Saturday's game at North Texas will probably crown the Sun Belt Conference champ and give the winner a
