U.S. 70 injunction hearing set for today

A hearing is scheduled today in U.S. District Court for a preliminary injunction against the widening of U.S. 70 through the historic and scenic Hondo Valley.

The date was bumped back from last week, according to Heather Green Anderson, an attorney with the New Mexico Environmental Law Center. The case originally was filed in the federal court in Washington, D.C., but was referred in October to the north-

ern district of New Mexico in Albuquerque.

The Valley Community Preservation Commission and several private land owners filed to stop the four-laning of the highway through the valley earlier this year. Named as the lead defendant was Norman Mineta, head of the U.S. Department of Transportation. The lawsuit contends the department violated provisions of the National Environmental Policy Act by issuing a record of decision that the project would not "use" any protected historic

properties "without undertaking adequate efforts to identify historic properties that would be affected by the project."

Representatives of the valley commission contend transportation officials are "falsely disguising the U.S. 70 expansion as a 'safety' issue."

In middle October, construction started up again when U.S. District Judge Reggie B. Walton in the District of Columbia federal court deferred ruling on the request. He referred the motion filed by the law center on behalf

of the commission back to the U.S. District Court in New Mexico.

In his September order, Walton wrote that "The Court is not prepared to agree that the preservation of historic resources outweighs the preservation of human lives."

Since Labor Day weekend, five people have died in vehicle accidents on the 38-mile stretch of U.S. 70 scheduled to be widened to four lanes. The route already had a reputation as one of the deadliest roads in the state.

The motion, which was originally filed in Washington, D.C., will be heard at U.S. District Court in Albuquerque.

Johnson fires horse racing commissioners

Proposed Hobbs track vote nixed

With a hearing on a new track near Hobbs looming and the fate of a state gaming license uncertain, Gov. Gary Johnson ousted members of the state Racing Commission Monday to halt its pending hearing Tuesday which would have considered an application by Ruidoso Downs owner R.D. Hubbard.

Hubbard's application, if passed, would allow him to open and operate a proposed race track in Hobbs.

Johnson removed Commission Chairman Greg Drake and Commissioner Russ Moore of Alto, and received the resignation from Commissioner Michael Harbour. That leaves two members, Susan Vescevo and Harley "Beaver" Segotta.

Ruidoso Downs Race Track president Bruce Rimbo was


less than pleased with the governor's actions.

"As far as I'm concerned, it's a travesty of justice for him to have fired these people who have a passion for horse racing and have worked so hard for horse racing," Rimbo said. "It's horrible the way they were treated."

The absence of three members leaves the commission unable to hold a quorum, thus making any future meetings impossible until new members are appointed. Agency director Julian Luna said all future meetings have been canceled.

"Johnson could have sent a representative of the governor's office to the meeting to ask for a delay," Rimbo said. "He likely would have been given some deference. Instead, the AG's office is telling them they couldn't delay, and the governor told them if they didn't delay,

Then and now

A Depression-era program left its mark in the county

During World War II, men all over New Mexico found employment through the Civilian Conservation Corps.

While earning and possibly learning a trade, they left behind buildings and improvements that survive today, such as the fire lookout tower at Monjeau Peak in Lincoln County.

The 70th Anniversary of the CCC will be celebrated March 29, 2003, at Hyde Memorial

State Park Lodge in Santa Fe, and organizers are looking for people who participated in the program to join the reunion.

New Mexico, with its thousands of acres of public lands, reaped the benefits of the program with more than 100 CCC camps over the life of the program. As many as 40 at one time were active, according to Dirk Van Hart, president of the Roadrunner Chapter of the CCC. About 55,000 men served in New Mexico CCC camps, more than 32,000 of them residents of the state, he said.

Among other accomplishments, they built

Budget outlook is bright

Most of Ruidoso's revenues and expenditures are right on the mark for the first quarter review, according to a summary prepared by Village Manager Lorn McKnight and Elaine Beltran, her replacement as village finance director.

A few departments even are ahead in revenue collected, they told village councilors Tuesday.

Expenses in the general fund hit \$1,653,520, or 24 percent of the budgeted \$6.8 million. Last year, the village was at 23 percent. Revenues sit at 22 percent of budget, the same as last year.

The village won't receive its share of property taxes until the second and fourth quarters of the fiscal year, McKnight explained.

Gross receipts tax revenue through the first quarter is running at 29.23 percent of the budgeted \$7 million, an increase of \$30,828 over last year.

Water revenues sit at 25 percent, sewer at 26 percent, offset by overall utility expenses at 20 percent.

Other comparisons include:

- Revenues for solid waste are at 23 percent, with fees at \$364,174 this year compared to \$327,050 last year. Expenses are listed at 25 percent of the target budget of \$2,091,091.

- Airport fund revenue is 36 percent of budget and expenses are 26 percent of the budgeted \$1,069 million.

- Recreation Fund revenues are 31 percent of budget with expenses at 25 percent. Pool expenditures accounted for \$29,139 of the total \$156,548 in expenses, with



Hudak to remain in custody

The president of a counter-terrorism training company will remain in custody pending the outcome of charges that he lacked proper permits for 2,400 warheads and other weapons found at a training complex in Roswell.

David Hudak, head of High Energy Access Tools, which also operated a compound north of Tinnie in Lincoln County, was arrested Aug. 15. A Canadian citizen, he was denied bail by a fed-

eral magistrate judge in Las Cruces at the time of his arrest and again last week by U.S. District Judge John Conway. The judge said Hudak appears to have no ties to the United States, that he is in the country illegally with an expired visa and that he could be a flight risk.

No date was set for Hudak's trial. If convicted, he faces up to 10 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine.


Hudak's attorney, Tim Padilla of Albuquerque, contends Hudak violated no laws personally and that the licensing problems lie with other companies or individuals.



Enjady appeals election ruling

Oliver Enjady, well known artist and a member of the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council, is asking the Tribal Supreme Court to set aside two elections and include his name on a new primary ballot as a candidate for re-election to the council.

He also is asking the court, which is composed of members of the Tribal Council, to rule that a resolution issued May 28, 1999, was a temporary measure, as opposed to a permanent ordinance, and the effects of removing him from office as vice president then does not affect his ability to run for office in 2002 or at any other date.

Enjady was allowed by the council to run for tribal president in late 1999 and won a two-year term on the council in 2000.

As an alternative, he asked the Supreme Court to refer back for trial all of the original issues he raised in a September petition to the tribal court after the Election Board refused to put his name on the ballot. But he wants a three-judge panel appointed from other tribes to rule on the issues because he contends the current panel is serving illegally.

In a petition presented on his behalf by Joseph Geronimo, Enjady stated he is appealing a decision by the Mescalero Tribal Court of Appeals entered by Chief Judge Sharon Begay on Oct. 9. He contends the Election Board acted illegally when members refused to qualify him for the ballot after he properly filed, and that the court "committed egregious legal errors in dismissing the case."

Specifically, Enjady claims in the lawsuit that:

- His name was removed without notice to him of a meeting on the issue and that when he challenged the decision, Election Board Chairman Carmen Mendez, "neglected, failed or refused to allow a meeting with him present," although at least one other candidate was allowed to argue his cases and was reinstated on the ballot.

- The actions of the election board were illegal and denied Enjady his right to due process under the law.

- That Mendez should not have ruled on or participated in the debate on Enjady's candidacy. She had a serious conflict of interest because she testified against him in May 1999 before the Tribal Council.

- It was the intention of the Tribal Council in 1999 to allow Enjady to run in future elections, a decision reaffirmed in two subsequent elections.

- That the Tribal Council had no jurisdiction to remove Enjady from office and that he never was charged, tried or convicted of a crime. The resolution passed by the council on May 28, 1999, was never legally approved by the Secretary of the Interior as required by the Mescalero Apache Constitution.

- That the meeting in May 1999 was illegally presided over by Gregory Quinlan, who is not a member of the council or the tribe and does not live in Mescalero.

- "No law, ordinance, constitutional provision or precedent permits such action," the lawsuit states.

- The court illegally refused to exercise jurisdiction over Enjady's appeal of the

Election Board decision because constitutional issues were raised and should have been decided. That left Enjady with no place to assert his rights.

"Judge Begay herself created the situation which caused the lack of issues being raised, then blamed the plaintiff for not raising the issues," the lawsuit states.

- That a three-judge panel is required to hear such cases, but Begay acted alone. Even if the three sitting judges had presided, Enjady contends none are in office properly, because their appointments by President Sara Misquez have not been confirmed by the Tribal Council.

- As trial judge, Begay should not sit on the appeals court.

- That the court of appeals allowed Enjady to be represented by Quinlan and his law firm although a serious conflict of interest existed and that Quinlan should be disqualified from representing any party in the case.

- "Mr. Quinlan had given legal advice and representation to Oliver Enjady in this very case, even wrote out in his own handwritten notes on issues and how Mr. Enjady should argue them," the lawsuit declared, adding that a copy of the notes was attached, "(Quinlan) cannot then appear to represent the other side in the same case."

Citing professional conduct rules, the lawsuit states that a lawyer shall not represent a client "if the representation of that client will be directly or substantially adverse to another client."

Quinlan did not return a call to his office and representatives of the tribal administration declined to comment.

The judge also ruled that the commission and other plaintiffs failed to demonstrate a likelihood of success on the claim that the federal agency violated federal regulations by using an engineering firm with a conflict of interest.

But a supplemental memorandum in support of the motion for an injunction cites a review of eligibility for the National Historical Register conducted by David Kammer, Ph.D. He concludes that many properties would be eligible for the Register, including structures, Civilian Conservation Corps projects, historical water supply ditches and Devil's Canyon Road.

The memorandum also contends Judge Walton erred by failing to take into account the highway project's impacts on historic properties and cited shortcomings of the cultural resource studies, including that the Federal Highway Administration "arbitrarily refused to undertake any assessment whatsoever of the historic significance of numerous potential historic resources deemed to be located more than 150 feet of the edge of the pavement on either side of the existing U.S. 70."

The suit contends the FHWA continues to refuse to address the issue of impacts on historical properties. It also states that Judge Walton erred in his view that the public interest doesn't lie with the plaintiffs because of the possibility of future injuries and fatalities on the road.

Representatives of the valley commission, including Luis Jimenez, point to a study of the accidents on the highway that notes police assigned fault for the deaths "not to the road design, but to speeding tourists, late-night drivers, malfunctioning vehicles and truck drivers."

They said that state and federal transportation officials ignored "expert opinion and other states' experience that four-lane roads are almost invariably more dangerous than two-lane roads designed to slow traffic."

The group hired Walter Kulash, a highway engineer, to create a "Super 2" design as an alternative to four lanes. It would improve the existing highway with turning lanes, passing lanes and shoulders.

But Kulash's recommendations "have been largely ignored," they said.

the Bosque del Apache Wildlife Refuge, Bandalier National Monument, about 800 bridges, 660 dams and planted 6 million trees.

In Lincoln County, CCC camps were established in Ruidoso, Carrizozo, Capitan, Corona and Hondo.

Johnston, Carrizozo, Carrizozo was in high school during the CCC era, but remembers the camp as a good addition to the community.

"They did a lot of erosion dams and fences," he said. "About five men came with the camp from out of town, but married local girls. All that remains of the camp today is a stone fireplace outside of town."

Baca Campground by Lincoln served as a CCC camp and then later a camp for young women, he said. Some foundations still are visible.

The most famous camp locally was built at Fort Stanton. Just before the United States joined Europe in World War II, the camp became an internment facility for a German liner crew that lost its ship to the British Navy. They enhanced what already was there with a gymnasium and pool. Some walls and foundations of those structures still stand outside of the fort's main complex about 15 miles northeast of Ruidoso.

Van Hart, who also is a CCC historian, said President

Franklin Delano Roosevelt proposed the formation of the corps two days after his inauguration.

"More than 5 million young men and World War I veterans were out of work," he wrote in his summer of the CCC. "The CCC was intended to give the destitute young men of America a sense of purpose, to build them physically and morally, and at the same time, to restore much of the public lands that were in poor shape due to years of erosion and neglect."

The corps was approved by Congress on March 31, 1933. Initially called the Emergency Conservation Work. In 1937, it became known as the CCC

The men primarily worked on projects for public agencies on public land. The U.S. Department of Interior and Agriculture was responsible for planning and supervising the 4,500 camps established throughout the nation and the Department of Labor coordinated signing up participants. The U.S. Army handled administration, supply, shelter and medical needs. At its peak in 1935, enrollment reached about half a million people in 2,514 camps in every state and

several territories, Van Hart said.

The enlistment period ran six months, but men could sign up again for a total of two years, he said.

Companies consisted of 200 men, each unit assigned a number that stayed with that company wherever it moved and through all of the changes in enrollees, Hart said.

Camps were designated with letters and numbers that showed the sponsoring agency such as "F" for the U.S. Forest Service.

Hart said the average camp consisted of 24 prefabricated buildings and was headed by a regular Army or reserve off-

cer. For the first two years, work was restricted to National Parks, National Monuments and state parks. Funding was extended for two more years in 1935 and projects broadened to include work under the Soil Conservation Service, the Bureau of Reclamation and the Department of Grazing.

"Toward the end of the 1930s, the program wound down as the defense industry cranked up because of the conflict in Europe and jobs became more plentiful," Van Hart said Tuesday. "It became difficult to recruit young men and the remaining projects often were airfields or other defense-oriented work."

The CCC was shut down on June 30, 1942, seven months after the surprise attack on Pearl Harbor by the Japanese. All the equipment was transferred to the military, Van Hart said.

When the common good requires compromise

It's a bumpy route to mutual satisfaction

When property rights bump into a governmental desire to regulate for the common good, expect no easy road to mutual satisfaction.

That road is bumpy all the time.

It was bumpy in Ruidoso when a developer named Orville McAllister, from Albuquerque, sought to create a series of multi-family townhouse complexes in the Camelot area.

McAllister's plan is to swap some acreage, zoned for lower density, for one with higher density, trying to convince the village fathers that this will be easier on the water.

And Lincoln County commissioners are getting antsy about efforts around the county to turn big ranches into smaller chunks for resale as multiple-acre home sites.

In both instances, the elect-

ed officials' concern has to do with water.

Is there enough water for a high-density development on that particular mountain?

Can rural developers demonstrate the availability of water for drilling, the impact on the aquifer in the long term, the possibility of pollution?

Then Karen and Ken Payne want to combine two lots they own along Meander Drive, put a double-wide on one and remodel a cabin on the other to create a studio.

No particular water issue there, but a substantial - perhaps arbitrarily restrictive - Catch 22 in the village's regulations. It boils down to definitions and interpretations.

In all three instances, the property owners want to do one thing, the regulators insist on something else.

But, for now, they're willing to consider compromise.

Village looks toward master plan

Village officials will meet Dec. 2 to start the process of selecting a firm or several companies to compile a comprehensive master plan for Ruidoso.

Led by village planning director Mike Runnels, they'll be looking at responses to requests for proposals from 10 firms at 2 p.m. at the village administration center on Cree Meadows Drive. Also serving on the review committee will be Glen Barrow, chairman of the village planning and zoning commission, and Village Councilors Deborah Marcum-Byars and Ron Hardeman.

"We will look at all responses and if we want someone to be further amplified, we can do that," Runnels said Tuesday. "I

know from talking to Councilor Byars and others, the desire is to identify the very best applications received, then take the top ones and continue visiting with them.

"We want to do it right and take it easy... This will affect the village for the next 20 to 25 years."

"It may be that other interested parties eventually may come forward and we end up with a mixture of different consultants. There is no set format. If we find three firms with different strengths, we could put together a team. We want to do it right and take it easy, instead of being in hurry. This will affect the village for the next 20 to 25 years."

The process of drafting a plan will include ample public input, including public forums, surveys and demographic data, he said. The December meeting will allow committee members to review the rating system for selecting a firm and "to compare notes on how to pro-

ceed," he said. "It will be interesting to look at the master plan developed in 1987 and see where we are today in relationship to the goals then. For instance, it included a River Walk and a transportation master plan."

The River Walk proposal was dropped several years ago and Runnels said the transportation plan "has been breached more than honored."

The group's recommendation will go to the village council for final action.

Runnels said the village is looking for firms with backgrounds in tourism and mountain communities.

"We have no deadline for awarding a contract," he said. "We need to know what other communities are doing and how they are approaching their problems."

The firms that contacted the village about submitting proposals asked if Ruidoso has a drainage plan, a capital outlay program, affordable housing programs, adequate mapping and an approach to handling older sections of town, Runnels said.

P&Z commission hesitant on Camelot replatting

More information is needed before the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission can vote on a replat of a 7.1-acre tract at the entrance to Camelot subdivision off U.S. 70.

Commissioners tabled the request last week from Larry D. Strain of Fort Lavaca, Texas. The land is to be broken into three parcels, containing from one acre to 3.8 acres. The third parcel would be landlocked, but is to be sold to Don Miner, the neighboring property owner.

All of the land is zoned community commercial (C2). It is surrounded by apartments, storage buildings, condominiums, a post office and some single-family homes.

Looking at the plans, chairman Glen Barrow said the "hour-glass" shape of Tract 2 opens up the possibility of requests "for a dozen variances."

He also questioned access to that tract by Warwick Drive, which is a residential road. The

other two parcels can be accessed by Camelot Drive off U.S. 70, he said.

Charles Rennick, board attorney, pointed out that to gain access to any of the land, people will have to drive through the "castle" entry.

"I think you're boxing yourself in at least to the southwest part of the property (where a hotel is being built)," he said. He suggested that surveys of the lots also show the topography, because of some steep slopes in the area.

Barrow said, in his opinion, a better move would be to break off the strip of land facing the residential area and zone it that way, keeping the rest commercial.

In other action, the commission:

- Approved a variance for Pauline Limoges of Cree Meadows Heights, Third Addition, for a metal carport after receiving an affidavit from James Stoddard that the structure was put up in 1997. A signed statement from a man who helped the owner place the

metal carport purchased at Wal-Mart also was presented.

The village banned metal carports in 1999. The 1997 carport therefore would be grandfathered as a pre-existing non-conforming use.

- Tabled a request by Texas Land Development to annex 45.14 acres as a prelude to creating a single-family residential subdivision with village services. The El Paso-based firm is headed by Carlos Orozco Amendez. The tract is situated off Gavilan Canyon Road.

- Tabled a request for a variance by Todd Beckman, represented by Paul Van Gulick, to allow a proposed house to be built 10 feet from the front lot line in Indian Hills Subdivision, First Addition.

Commissioners suggested Beckman consider repositioning the home on Poco Loco Road to avoid having to ask for a variance, because he then could proceed by obtaining a construction permit. If he needs a variance, the board must take into consideration objections raised by a neighbor who said the house is

too small and poorly positioned. Member Mike Reveley said he couldn't vote on the issue because he owns property above Poco Loco, which meant a quorum wasn't present for a vote.

Embattled judge's husband arrested again

The husband of a former Mescalero Apache judge is back in jail, this time for violating probation on a DWI charge.

Roland H. Branham was arrested Thursday in Ruidoso Magistrate Judge William Butts's court lobby. He is being held in the Lincoln County Detention Center in Carrizozo without bond, according to court officials.

Branham is the husband of Alta Branham, who is fighting to be reinstated as a judge on the reservation abutting Ruidoso. She contends the Chief Judge of that court, Sharon Begay, retaliated against her after she criticized Begay's han-

dling of per diem reimbursement for herself. Begay has countered that Branham acted inappropriately in trying to arrange a visitation to see her husband, who was then confined to the Otero County Detention Center on DWI-related charges.

Butts said he was reading about that situation last month when he noticed that the article stated that Roland Branham was accused of driving while under the influence of alcohol. "We weren't aware of that before," he said. "Mr. Branham was charged here and appeared in court on Feb. 20."

Court records show that Branham pleaded no contest to DWI, second offense and the state dismissed a DWI, third

offense aggravated charge and lane violation. He was sentenced to three days in the Lincoln County Detention Center and one year of probation, fined \$500 and had to pay \$199 in court costs.

"Judge Branham was in court with her husband, but never asked for anything," Butts said. "I gave him the mandatory jail time and fine."

One condition of probation was no alcohol. After seeing the article, a bench warrant was issued for Branham and he was arrested. He will remain in jail pending a hearing on the probation violation.

Mandatory sentencing was approved by the state Legislature in 1994.

marks at \$127,409. Total revenues collected for all funds on capital improvement projects sit at 5,148,925 or 25 percent of the budgeted 20.4 million, compared to 26 percent at the same time last year.

Councilors asked that in the future, money intercepted by the state to cover annual bonds payments for the purchase of the new police department building, be reflected in a paper trail on village records.

McKnight said, "We never really see the money, so we can't run it through our books," but said she would develop a tracking method for councilors to see on each quarterly report.

Councilor Deborah Marcum-Byars noticed that water revenues were down 10 percent from last year.

"But then so is water use, and that means we're not selling as much," she said.

The village stayed in a heightened con-

servation mode throughout the summer to encourage residents to conserve water. The restrictions remain in effect, although the use usually drops during the winter once lawns are no longer growing and summer visitors leave.

In other business, McKnight announced the retirement of Nancy Osterberg as library director. A reception is planned from 11:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. today at the Ruidoso Public Library, sponsored by the Friends of the Library.

ney'd be fired." Johnson is wanting to postpone any decisions about the Hobbs track because of questions about whether a new New Mexico track could create legal problems with the state's gaming compacts with Indian tribes.

Also, David McCumber, Johnson's chief of staff, wrote a letter to Johnson that the commission should wait on the Hobbs decision due to questions about Hubbard.

Those questions involve the decision of the New Mexico Gaming Control Board to review Hubbard's gaming license in the state. The board's staff recommended earlier this month that his license not be renewed in light

of his need to relinquish his gaming license in Indiana.

Hubbard and the company he was involved with paid fines stemming from allegations of entertaining guests with prostitutes and violating other gaming laws in Indiana.

Rimbo said the governor's arguments "don't hold water" and that he was confident Hubbard's New Mexico gaming license will be renewed.

As for the Hobbs track issue, Rimbo said Hubbard's application is still pending, although the issue is at a standstill and may be so until newly elected governor Bill Richardson takes office.

"Maybe that's for the best," Rimbo said.

Hubbard is hoping to open a \$27.5 million track and casino in Hobbs to be named Zia

Park. He was in competition with Louisiana businessman Shawn Scott, whose application for Lea Downs was denied last month by the Racing Commission.

Ken Newton, former owner of the now-closed Downs at Santa Fe, is also seeking a license to open a track and casino to be named Saddlebrook Park.

Suspicious confirmed

A new study measures the positive impact of education on students in the state. The New Mexico Commission on Higher Education, in collaboration with the New Mexico

Department of Labor and the New Mexico Association of Community Colleges, prepared the study.

It demonstrates that education has a positive impact on employability, increases in annual wages and sustained career growth.

The study looks at community college students enrolled in fall 1997, who completed a certificate or degree program by spring 2000. The records for all of these students were submitted to the Department of Labor.

Graduates experienced an average wage increase from \$17,558 at enrollment to \$24,678 after graduation, representing an increase of \$7,120 or 41 percent.

For low-income students who participated in the Federal Pell and State Student Incentive Grant programs, the average annual wage increased from \$6,123 to \$12,993, a gain of \$6,870 or 112.2 percent.

The top five industries employing graduates for 2000-2001 are health services, educational services, engineering and management services, electronic and other electric equipment, justice, public order and safety.

Prior to enrollment in the community colleges, the top five employers were health services, restaurants, justice, public order and safety and wholesale trade/durable goods.

Graduates in the health services and the justice, public order and safety areas were promoted within their area of employment, while other graduates moved into high-paying professions.

'Independents' may enter science fair

PORTALES - Every year school students in 8th through 12th grade show their science projects at a science fair at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales.

This school year, the fair will be on Saturday, March 1, 2003. The Southeastern New Mexico Regional Science and Engineering Fair is affiliated with the International Science and Engineering Fair headquartered in Washington, D.C.

The fair in Portales is one of six regional fairs in New Mexico. Students who enter the regional science fairs can win the privilege of showing their science projects at the state science fair at New Mexico Tech in Socorro in April.

According to the official rules, any student may enter the Regional Science Fair without previously having entered their project in a school science fair.

If a student has an adult sponsor, and an interest in something scientific, he or she should do some research and present their results using the 2003 International Rules for Pre-college Science Research.

Mescalero students preview college life

Six Mescalero students were selected to participate in enrichment programs at New Mexico State University in Las Cruces this past summer — and are reaping the rewards during the present school year.

Seventh-grader Mercedes Bigmouth attended the Dream Makers Summer Program, June 16-29, sponsored by Indian Resource Development at NMSU, and an algebra class she took has made pre-algebra this fall a breeze, she said.

She and the other two middle school students who participated mentioned making friends with students from other reservations as one of the major benefits of the program. She said she writes to some of her new friends.

Transportation and spending money for the two-week program for middle school students and the one-week program for high school students were furnished by the 21st Century Learning Centers Training Project grant for after-school programs and improving literacy.

Project director Gina Klinekole said putting together their applications was part of the learning experience for the students — obtaining three letters of recommendation from teachers, transcript releases for their grades in math, science and English, parental releases, medical history and family information and certificates of Indian blood once they're accepted.

"As an alumni of New Mexico State University, I'm in favor of summer enrichment programs for middle school and high school students because it gives them the advantage of participating, meeting people, gaining experience and socializing," Klinekole said.

The 30 students chosen for the program took classes in science, math, business, communications skills, surviving the col-

lege experience, and careers in engineering, agriculture, electrical and computer engineering.

Most of these colleges gave presentations, and students toured student services departments as well as participating in recreation and sports activities. They went on field trips to the Very Large Array radiotelescope near Magdalena, the Natural Science Museum and Planetarium in Albuquerque, the New Mexico Museum of Space History in Alamogordo and White Sands Missile Range, as well as to movies.

To participate, students had to have a grade point average of 2.5 or better, plan to go to college, have an interest in a natural resource-related career and demonstrate leadership abilities.

Samantha Chino, now in the ninth grade, said the students took interest assessments, and she rated high in services and instructional, although she's considering a career in computer engineering. She and one of her new friends won a virtual reality game in which they had to design on a computer protective containers for eggs so they wouldn't break when dropped from the highest floors of the dormitory — a simulation of dropping food to starving people from an airplane.

Corado Dela Cruz, an eighth-grader, liked the campus swimming pool best, but made four girlfriends while he was at NMSU.

For high school students, NMSU's American Indian Program offered its fifth annual Future American Indian Schools summer program, June 9-14, at NMSU.

Geared for students who would be juniors and seniors this school year, the program orients students to campus life, the admissions and financial aid processes, student resources on campus, classes, lectures and field trips.

Emily Blake, a junior, said it gave her an idea of what college is going to be like, and she met people from other Indian reservations. The drawback, for her, was that the dorm rooms didn't have television or VCRs — just two beds and two desks, curfew was at 11:30 p.m., lights had to be off then, and everyone had to get up by 6 or 7 a.m.

Laura Shosh, a senior, said it was a "fun and new experience," but what was unexpected was that students had to write three-page essays on Native Americans and drugs, doing the research and then reading the essays to the other participants.

"They showed us ways to find sources and use the Internet, and to find books in the library," she said.

Valerie Mendez, a junior, talked about learning teamwork through some of the activities, but most of all, she said, "I learned how to get to know people."

This was the first year for Mescalero students to participate in the summer enrichment programs, Klinekole said.

"I wanted to promote what's in our back door — experiencing college life, the opportunities they can look forward to — and it gives them the exposure to meet other students."

Destination known: 'Zozo OKs slogan

Sending a message to tourists and visitors to stop and shop in Carrizozo, "Destination Carrizozo" was approved as the official town slogan. Presented to the trustees by the Zozo Chamber of Commerce, the phrase will be used in future advertising campaigns.

With all trustees except LeeRoy Zamora present, the council tackled a short but loaded agenda at the meeting held on Thursday evening. Rescheduling of the meeting from the Tuesday to Thursday night seemed to be a conflict for regular meeting goers as the guest count was less than five.

Cathy McAlister again asked the city to act on promises to get a working fire hydrant in legal proximity to her home. She has been unable to qualify for homeowner's insurance under the current situation. It was decided the city would purchase a new hydrant and place it at the end of the line on that street which would remedy the need.

Police Chief Angelo Vega reported 42 citations, 18 cases of which 12 were closed, four arrests and one criminal summons. In other business, he advised the board of exotic bird kennels located on C Avenue. The city has not vacated C Avenue so the property is still a designated street. The owner of the kennels will be notified to

move them off C Avenue proper.

The swimming pool repairs and renovation costs will be on the agenda at next month's meeting for a definite vote for funding options and approval. The decks and plumbing need to be redone and are to the point that temporary fixes are no longer a viable alternative.

Jim Payne brought to the attention of the board the work being done by the water department in the H, I and J streets area. Because the streets have been paved, the pipeline extension requirements to provide taps to the properties and avoid tearing up the pavement, is requiring considerable extra material. He suggested the additional costs be passed on to the new homeowners and proposed a new ordinance.

Jim Mack's report on the Recreation Center outlined a steady profit level for the both the cafe and recreation side of the center.

The new wastewater treatment plant plans are in the final stages with the engineers. Cathy Eisen reported the effluent water from the Wastewater Treatment Facility Agreement with Stirling Spencer is in the process of integrating points from Spencer, city attorney David Stevens and the Environment Department. The council set a Nov. 30 completion date and gave Eisen

and City Clerk Leann Weibrecht executive permission to do whatever is necessary to get all parties gathered and the matter closed.

In general business, the council:

- Heard Sergio Castro, Lincoln County juvenile probation officer, who informed the council of a countywide initiative called the Lincoln County Creative Cooperative. In a presentation, Castro outlined the revolutionized services to the youth so successful in Luna County, and Lincoln County's plans to mirror that success.

- Denied a request for alleyway closure behind Pete King's 803 5th Street property and request for mobile home placement on Mabel Candelaria property.

- Approved P & Z recommendations for Jim Penrod to place a building on his property, Carrizozo Municipal Schools request to place a new building on its property and conditional use and variance for Cathie Eisen to build a barn and shed on her property.

- Tabled Merten's Investments' request to place a mobile home on property until all previous requirements are met.

- Approved additions to the Surplus Property Resolution for the Town of Carrizozo's Surplus Property auction to take place at 8 a.m. on Dec. 7.

Village code questions continue for Capitan

Organization of the Capitan Village Code was approved at the Nov. 12 Board of Trustees meeting, although changes to the language of some ordinances could still take place.

Trustee George Tippin expressed his dissatisfaction with the language in several of the codified ordinances during a public meeting and proposed numerous changes to the draft that had been published by Sterling Codifiers, a firm that specializes in writing such documents.

Tippin also noted that the codification only went through ordinances that had been passed prior to the year 2000. But it was pointed out that ordinances passed after the last one in the codification would be published so that they could be included in the ordinance book.

The public hearing ended without any apparent consensus of the board of trustees.

The codification project is funded by a planning grant that has been hanging fire for two years and which is preventing Capitan from applying for additional CDBG planning grants.

When the item was brought up in the regular meeting, the trustees voted to accept the ordinances as codified, but reserved the right to make changes in them. Whether this action will permit the closing of the CDBG grant or, for that matter, the codification of the ordinances, remains unclear.

At the beginning of the meeting Village Attorney Don Dutton passed out a letter of resignation, which states in part "...your actions (Mayor Sederwall) have the potential to cause a severe conflict of interests between my representation of the Village of Capitan and Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority."

During the regular meeting Connie Stone, the Lincoln County rural addresser, presented a list of 26 streets that potentially needed to be changed in Capitan, to conform

with the county's ordinance that disallows street name duplication in the county.

She pointed out that county dispatchers, despite being able to view the telephone number and address of any 911 caller, become confused when contacting an appropriate emergency response agency due to the duplication of street names.

Capitan does have several street name duplications within the village limits that likely should be changed. One of these was changed during the meeting at the request of Capitan resident Ed Vinson from Crestview to Promise Lane.

However, when learning that the names that Stone requested to be changed included virtually all of the street names in the original plat of the village, the trustees and the public were less than enthusiastic. This resulted in Mayor Steven Sederwall declining to sign a memorandum of understanding with the county that would have permitted the change of these names.

Sederwall said that "the village police and fire departments know all of the addresses in the village, and since we have an ambulance but no drivers or EMT volunteers, ambulances from Carrizozo or Ruidoso should contact the village police if they are unable to locate an address."

Anna Gail Grassie, a representative of Zia Natural Gas, was on the agenda to explain Zia's gas rate. While the rate does represent an increase in the cost of natural gas, which is passed along to the customer, nothing else in their billing has changed.

The percentage increase in Zia's customer's bills represents only an increase in the cost of gas. Cost of service and transportation costs remain the same, thus the figure of a 55 percent increase in their service is erroneous, she said.

Items on the agenda, including a request for extra-territorial water, an increase in gross receipts tax, and lodgers tax were either denied or tabled.

Caution best when cooking Thanksgiving dinner

A large crowd to cook for, a big bird to eat, and too many cooks in the kitchen can lead to foodborne illness from holiday dining. But handling and cooking a turkey shouldn't be an illness waiting to happen.

Following basic USDA recommendations will help ensure safe, content cooking and prevent foodborne illness for diners.

A whole turkey is a large bird to handle; however, the steps of thawing, handling, and roasting it to a safe temperature are easy things to do.

Safe Thawing

There are three safe ways to thaw food: in the refrigerator, in cold water, and in the microwave oven. Store frozen meats in the freezer until time to thaw.

While frozen, a turkey is safe indefinitely. However, if the turkey is allowed to thaw at a temperature above 40 degrees, any harmful bacteria that may have been present before freezing can begin to multiply unless proper thawing methods are used.

When thawing a turkey in the refrigerator, plan ahead. Place the turkey on a platter and place in the refrigerator. For every 5 pounds of turkey, allow approximately 24 hours of thawing in a refrigerator set at 40 degrees.

For thawing in cold water, allow about 30 minutes per pound. Be sure the turkey is in leak-proof packaging and submerge it in cold tap water. Change the water every 30 minutes until the turkey thaws.

When thawing in the microwave, follow manufacturer's instructions. For both roasting in cold water and in the

microwave, cook the turkey immediately after thawing because conditions are not temperature controlled.

Stuffing a Turkey

The safest way to cook stuffing is in a casserole, not inside a bird. Bake the casserole in an oven set no lower than 325 degrees - or in a microwave oven - until the internal temperature reaches at least 165 degrees on a food thermometer. Harmful bacteria can survive in stuffing that has not reached a safe temperature, possibly resulting in foodborne illness.

Cooking a stuffed turkey is riskier than cooking one not stuffed. However, if both the stuffing and turkey are handled safely and a food thermometer is used, it is possible to cook a stuffed turkey safely. Mix wet and dry stuffing ingredients just before spooning it loosely into the turkey cavity, and roast the turkey immediately. Check the temperature of both the stuffing and the turkey. Do not remove the turkey from the oven until the stuffing reaches 165 degrees.

Cooking a Turkey Safely

Thawing and stuffing a turkey safely are the first two basics. But cooking is the only way to destroy bacteria. The oven temperature must be set no lower than 325 degrees. Overnight cooking of a turkey at a low temperature can result in foodborne illness.

The internal temperature, on a food thermometer, of a whole turkey must reach 180 degrees in the innermost part of the thigh. If the turkey has a "pop-up" temperature indicator, it is also recommended

that a food thermometer be used to test the turkey in several places. To read more "Turkey Basics" and print a cooking time chart, go to www.fsis.usda.gov/oa/pubs/tbcook.htm.

Precooked Dinners and Leftovers

Some cooks forego home-cooking a turkey altogether and choose to purchase precooked dinners. There are also basic safety measures for the safe handling of these holiday meals. If the dinners are to be picked up hot, keep the food hot.

Keeping foods warm is not enough. Harmful bacteria multiply fastest in the "danger zone" between 40 and 140 degrees. Set the oven temperature high enough to keep the internal temperature of the turkey and side dishes at 140 degrees or above. Eat the food within two hours of pickup.

When picking up cold turkey dinners, refrigerate them as soon as possible, always within two hours. Serve the meal within one to two days. Turkey may be eaten cold, but reheating a whole turkey is not recommended. To reheat, slice breast meat (legs and wings may be left whole), and heat turkey pieces and side dishes thoroughly to 165 degrees.

Perishable foods should not be left out of the refrigerator or oven for more than two hours. Refrigerate or freeze all leftovers promptly in shallow containers. It is safe to refreeze leftover turkey and trimmings even if they were previously frozen.

Deming, not Luna County, bans cockfighting

DEMING - Although Luna County and the City of Deming's revised animal control ordinances are nearly identical, one item that's struck a chord with some residents differentiates the two - cockfighting.

The county unanimously approved its revised animal control ordinance last week at its meeting, which coincides with the City of Deming's that was approved in September. However, some residents felt cockfighting should have been an item worth adding to the county's revisions, as it was to the city's.

During the board's public hearing regarding the ordinance, a few individuals spoke in favor of banning cockfighting, and some spoke in favor of allowing it.

County Manager Scott

Vinson said the county's ordinance prior to its revisions didn't have cockfighting listed as being prohibited.

"That issue was not addressed in the previous ordinance or this one because it's not our target," Vinson said. "Our target was to tighten up regulations concerning animals running at large and vicious breeds."

"The county did not believe it (cockfighting) was a priority at this point, in making it an illegal activity," he added.

Vinson said the county's administration is behind the Board of Commissioners' decision 100 percent against prohibiting cockfighting, and said their modified ordinance is a good one.

"Cockfighting's been a cultural tradition in parts of the southwest, and I think the board's decision had more to do with it not being a priority in Luna County to regulate it,"

Vinson said.

He said he doesn't see the animal ordinance changing in the next four years to address the cockfighting issue.

Deming City Administrator John Strand said the city was not aware of any cockfighting going on within city limits, but added the ban to its ordinance, which was adopted in September by the council.

"It was submitted to the city council, and research was put together by members of the Humane Society. It (ban) wasn't there before, but the banning of cockfighting is part of the revised ordinance," Strand

said.

"We do have an ordinance about the number of chickens/roosters that can be kept in one place, which might have prohibited it before without it being stated in the previous ordinance," he said.

Animal Protection Voters campaign manager Danielle Bays said cockfighting is just another matter New Mexico is at the bottom of. Bays is also with the Animal Protection of New Mexico

agency. "A lot of people talk about it being cultural or traditional, but culture is not an excuse for

cruelty, because that's what cockfighting is all about," Bays said.

"It's a shame because there's overwhelming support in the state from all demographics, that support a ban," she said.

Bays added that the state has not acted on the issue, or taken responsibility.

"It's our plan to address it at the next legislative session. "We should have a ban across the state, but unfortunately counties individually are going to have to deal with this," she said.

In 13 counties and 28 municipalities in the state, cockfighting is prohibited under their adopted ordinances. New Mexico and Louisiana are the only two states which allow cockfighting.

Oklahoma banned the activity this month.

Auctioned auto holds surprise in Artesia

■ The buyer found nearly 10 pounds of cocaine under the dash of a car purchased at a police auction.

CARLSBAD - An Artesia man making repairs to a car he bought at a recent law enforcement auction found a surprise under the dash - 9.7 pounds of cocaine.

Agents say the man got more than he bargained for when he bought the 1992 Toyota Camry that had been seized more than a year ago by the Las Cruces-Doña Ana County Metro Narcotics Agency.

According to a press release from the Pecos Valley Drug Task Force, the man bought the car during an auction held Nov.

9. He brought the car home to Artesia and was making repairs to the emergency brake when he discovered some packages under the dashboard console and immediately contacted a task force agent.

Task force Commander Bobby Sullivan said the illegal drugs had a street value between \$70,000 and \$440,000.

"It would be worth \$440,000 if you sold it on the street at the average price in quarter grams," he said.

Sullivan said records indicate the vehicle was originally seized in June 2001 from John Aviles, 48, of Albuquerque. Aviles was charged in connection with other drugs that were found elsewhere in the vehicle. The case is proceeding through federal court. Sullivan said Aviles may face additional charges as a result of the

cocaine seizure.

A followup investigation is being conducted jointly by the Pecos Valley Drug Task Force and the Las Cruces-Doña Ana County Metro Narcotics Agency, officials said.

Cops nab youths for Ruidoso-Lubbock crime spree

Local police work with Texas cops to solve a car arson, theft and burglaries.

Ruidoso police officers' work connecting the dots between six different crimes in Ruidoso and Lubbock, Texas, resulted in charges against three Lubbock youths and charges pending against several Ruidoso youths.

Two Lubbock youths were arrested on Oct. 22 in Lubbock and later charged with three burglaries on Third Street, the theft of a truck in Ruidoso and a Mustang in Lubbock in October.

A Dodge pickup truck was reported stolen Oct. 14 from the 2100 block of Sudderth Drive, and police discovered a burning Ford Mustang in the Grindstone Lake area Oct. 16, which turned out to have been stolen in Lubbock on Oct. 10.

On Oct. 21, Ruidoso police Corporal Corky Condon and Officer Mike Driscoll investigated three burglaries at 417, 416 and 419 Third

Street.

They found a green Mustang bumper in the driveway of 417 Third Street, Condon said, and, because the residence looked as if it might have been used for partying, contacted the owners, who said they had a 17-year-old grandson who ran away from Texas.

"We contacted Detective (Brian) McNeill of the Lubbock Police Department, and asked if a green Mustang was missing, and he said yes, it was stolen on Oct. 10," Condon said.

Also found outside of the residence at 417 Third Street was a fax addressed to the owner of the Dodge truck reported stolen on Oct. 14.

"We called McNeill back and told him this. Two hours later, he called us back and said 'We have the truck,'" Condon said. McNeill had been driving in Lubbock when he passed a Dodge truck with a Sierra Blanca

Motors sticker.

He stopped the vehicle and arrested a 17-year-old from Lubbock, and Guy Justin Dingus, 19, also of Lubbock.

Condon and Driscoll headed for Lubbock, and Driscoll interviewed Dingus and the juvenile, who confessed to stealing the Mustang and returning to Lubbock on Oct. 11.

Dingus and the juvenile had picked up Rodney James Hopson, 19, of Lubbock, and drove back to Ruidoso in the Mustang on Oct. 12, and stayed at 417 Third Street, where the juvenile said, they partied with Ruidoso youths from Oct. 12 to Oct. 14.

In the early hours of morning on Oct. 14, Dingus and the juvenile hit a bar ditch with the Mustang at the end of Monica's Court, damaging the front end and leaving pieces of the vehicle at the crash scene, Condon said.

They knew they couldn't return to

Lubbock in the car, he said, so they went down the hill, found a truck in the 2100 block of Sudderth Drive, unlocked and with the keys in the ignition, and took it back to 417 Third Street.

They then gave the Mustang to a 16-year-old Ruidoso female and a 17-year-old Ruidoso male and left for Texas in the newly stolen truck. While in Texas, Condon said, they helped themselves to checks in the truck belonging to the owner, and to a gun that was in the vehicle that has not yet been recovered.

Dingus and the juvenile were arrested in Texas, but Hopson is at large, and Condon and Driscoll believe he may have the missing gun. All three have prior criminal history, Condon said, and Hopson has a juvenile record of a violent felony.

Dingus, Hopson and the juvenile from Lubbock were charged with unlawful taking of a motor vehicle, a third-degree felony; conspiracy to commit unlawful taking of a motor vehicle, a fourth-degree felony; aggravated burglary, a second-degree felony; conspiracy to commit aggravated burglary, a third-degree felony;

larceny more than \$250 but less than \$2,500, a fourth-degree felony; conspiracy to commit larceny, a fourth-degree felony; disposing of stolen property, Ford Mustang, more than \$2,500 but not more than \$20,000, a third-degree felony; conspiracy to commit disposing of stolen property, a fourth-degree felony; retaining stolen property (firearm), a fourth-degree felony; conspiracy to commit retaining stolen property, a fourth-degree felony; retaining stolen property (Ford Mustang), a third-degree felony; and conspiracy to commit retaining stolen property, a fourth-degree felony.

The investigation is ongoing, and charges against the two Ruidoso juveniles and other area youths are pending, Condon said.

Anyone with information about the arson of the Mustang or any other aspects of this case may call Crimestoppers anonymously, and qualify for a reward if the information results in indictment of anyone involved.

Win in five-game thriller gives Capitan first volleyball title in 15 years

ALBUQUERQUE — Capitan volleyball coach Sherry Gowen has been here before.

Back in 1988, she was on the team that brought home a Class 1A volleyball title to Capitan, and she did it again this year, this time as the Lady Tiger head coach.

Capitan defeated Laguna-Acoma Saturday 10-15, 15-12, 13-15, 15-11, 16-14 in the Class 2A state title match, and Gowen was quick to answer which title was sweeter.

"It's more fun as a coach," Gowen said. "Just seeing them grow, you don't see that when you're young. To watch them come through all the disappointments throughout the year, and to see them pull this off, it's great."

That the Lady Tigers (21-6) won in five games came as a surprise to nobody that had followed them all year long. Saturday's championship match marked the ninth time they'd gone five, and was the

eightth time they had won.

"We play really good at that point, it's do or die," said senior back row specialist Emily Hobbs. "We know when to step up, and every point counts."

Jessica Tully-Mitchell, another senior on this experienced team, put it a bit more succinctly.

"We like to give people hope, and then crush it," Tully-Mitchell said in a decidedly tongue-in-cheek manner.

Capitan needed every point they could get against Laguna-Acoma (21-5) a team that got to the title game by defeating Capitan's nemesis Hatch in the semifinals and whose fans filled up three-fourths of the main gym at West Mesa High School.

The Lady Tigers took an initial 2-0 lead in game one and extended to 5-1 before Laguna-Acoma staged a comeback, tying the game at 5-all and taking a brief lead.

From there on, it was anybody's game, as neither team was down by more than two

points until the Lady Hawks scored the final five points to win it.

Now down by a game and facing a way-beyond-raucous crowd, Capitan had to perform.

Laguna-Acoma, however, took an 11-5 lead, and it looked for a while as though they might run away with it.

But the Lady Tigers refused to bow, responding to Gowen's prodding on the sidelines to go on a 5-0 run to take a slim 12-11 lead. From there on, they merely had to hold on through numerous side-outs to claim the 15-12 victory.

"The key is not pressing the panic button," Gowen said. "No matter what the score is, volleyball is a game of momentum. It can change and you can score five points, just like that."

Game three was a similar see-saw affair, which saw Capitan with the lead at 13-12 and their fans chanting "finish it." Unfortunately for them, the Lady Hawks put on a 3-0 run to win the game and take a

2-1 lead in the match.

Laguna-Acoma took a 4-0 lead in the fourth game, then lost that lead when the Lady Tigers scored the next 10 points of the game and roared to a 10-4 lead.

Then it was the Lady Hawks' turn, and they ran off six points of their own to take a 11-10 lead. The final run of the game belonged to Capitan, however, as they scored the final five points to secure the 15-11 win and a 2-all tie in the match.

Now it was into a rally scoring fifth game, something the Lady Tigers were well versed in.

"We've been in that situation and played that over and over and over; when it came to this game right here, it was just another game," Hobbs said. "We know when we go to five games, it's chaos, but it's something we do every day."

Ironically, Laguna-Acoma had the lead throughout much of the game, and they had match point serve twice after scoring their 14th point on a Capitan error. But the Lady Tigers were never that far out of the game, and they were able to score two straight points — one on a kill by

Jennifer Bartley — to tie it.

A hit out of bounds by Laguna-Acoma's Tecina Dineyazhe put Capitan up 15-14 and gave them the match-point serve. It was a serve they capitalized on when Tully-Mitchell got a set on the left side of the net and powered straight down for kill and the championship.


It was her team-leading 15th kill, but there's no doubt this one was the biggest.

Tully-Mitchell, a senior, had been to the state tournament before, but this was the first time she'd been back in two years. She admitted the final kill felt "really good" and said she was happy to be a leader for the girls that hadn't been on the state championship stage before.

"I was a little bit nervous, but it was great to be back, and it was great for a few of us to be out there that had been here before," Tully-Mitchell said. "I felt like we needed to lead the team through it."

Other seniors on the Lady Tiger squad included Hobbs, Stephanie Kelsey, Kaycee Gilson and Lorena Brockman.

■ UNM's gridiron victory is their first at Provo since 1971.

PROVO, Utah — The University of New Mexico went back in time Saturday, snapping a 14-game losing streak at Brigham Young University with a 20-16 victory at LaVell Edwards Stadium. It was the Lobos' first win in Provo since current head coach Rocky Long quarterbacked the Lobos to a 14-0 win in 1971.

UNM junior wide receiver Adrian Boyd enjoyed the best game of his collegiate career as he tallied 166 all-purpose yards with 57 yards rushing on eight carries and four receptions

for 99 yards. As a team, the Lobos (6-5, 4-1 Mountain West Conference) finished with 300 yards of total offense with near equal rushing (145) and passing (155) success. The Lobo defense meanwhile, held its second-straight opponent to less than 200 yards and without an offensive touchdown. BYU (5-6, 2-4) came into the game 17th in the nation in pass offense and 18th in total offense.

North Texas 38, NMSU 27
DENTON, Texas — Kevin Galbreath rushed for 175 yards, and North Texas forced four fourth-quarter turnovers as the Mean Green ral-

lied to beat New Mexico State 38-27 Saturday and win the Sun Belt Conference title.

The Mean Green (6-5, 5-0 Sun Belt) have won 10 consecutive conference games and will play in the New Orleans Bowl for the second straight season on Dec. 17.

The loss takes New Mexico State (6-5, 4-1) out of the running for the New Orleans Bowl after four straight conference wins. If the Aggies had won, it would have ended a 42-year bowl drought.

Southwestern Oklahoma 25, ENMU 14
WEATHERFORD, Okla. —

Another great season for the Eastern New Mexico University football team came to an end Saturday, and another season will pass without post-season play for the Greyhounds.

Southwestern Oklahoma didn't have the best of days statistically, but they did well enough in the only statistic that really counted, beating Eastern 25-14 to end the Greyhounds' hope of being included in this year's NCAA Division II playoffs.

The Hounds (8-3, 4-3 Lone Star Conference) actually out-gained Southwestern by almost 100 yards and led in all offensive categories

except one; time of possession.

All that time Southwestern had the ball translated into more points than their opposition, as Eastern didn't score until a Randy Montoya 2-yard rush with 6:44 left in the second quarter. Their next, and final, score came on another Montoya 2-yarder with 34 seconds left in the game.

More celebration for the team is scheduled for Saturday, Nov. 23, when the team will be the focus of a parade down Main Street in Capitan starting at 9 a.m.
