Engineering official against Rainmakers

■ The subdivision's 40-year water supply is being questioned by a supervisor.

A supervisor with the office of State Engineer Tom Turney recommends that a favorable opinion not

be issued for the scaled-down Rainmakers subdivision in Lincoln County.

In a memorandum to Brian C. Wilson, chief of the water use and conservation bureau of the department, engineer John T. Romero wrote that the subdivider failed to prove a 40-year water supply.

Doug Rappuhn and Tom Morrison of the hydrology bureau

reviewed a report submitted by Atkins Engineering Associates Inc. attempting to show that sufficient water will be available to meet the current and future needs of the proposed subdivision near the Spencer Theater for the Performing Arts on Sierra Blanca Airport Road.

"They both concluded that the subdivider will be unable to provide a 40-year water supply to existing

customers and to the proposed subdivision," Romero wrote.

John Underwood, the Ruidoso attorney representing the developer, and Mike O'Brien, project point man, could not be reached for comment Tuesday.

The Rainmakers Golf and Saddle Club initially was proposed as a 1,024-acre gated community with 664 lots, 60 patio homes, five tracts

for multi-family development and commercial use, a golf course and 3.6 miles of walking paths with a equestrian hub.

But in November 2001, the County Planning Commission rejected the proposed first stage of the development in large part because of water concerns.

Snowfall bountiful for area ski resort

"This is perfect," an excited Riker Davis said Tuesday morning of the 10 inches of wet snow that fell at Ski Apache in the prior 24 hours.

"It's exactly what we were hoping for, not only the quality of snow, but the timing," the resort marketing manager said. "This gets us a whole lot

closer to opening the top of the mountain. It's a good heavy snowfall that we can pack into a base.

"The crews are out packing the mountain now. It's heavy snow and much more valuable than powder at this time."

The ski resort is operated by the Mescalero Apache Tribe, north of Ruidoso.

Rain started in the village about

5:30 p.m. Monday and continued until 3 a.m. Tuesday, when the temperature cooled and snow replaced droplets. By 9 a.m., Sierra Blanca Regional Airport reported one inch of the white stuff and a total of 35/100th of an inch of moisture between the rain and snow.

The forecast for Ruidoso contained the possibility of the same conditions overnight and continuing through today.

U.S. 70 work continues east of Ruidoso Downs

While federal and state transportation officials fight a preliminary injunction in U.S. District Court aimed at stopping the four-laning of U.S. 70 through the Hondo Valley, work continues on the highway east of Ruidoso Downs.

Shoulder and lane closures for geotechnical probes, culvert construction and equipment crossing are scheduled throughout the month. Officials advise allowing an extra 15 minutes for travel in that area.

Highway closures for rock blasting also are scheduled on weekdays between mile posts 285 and 289

and between 299 and 303. Blasting begins at 1 p.m. and can last up to an hour. During that time, the highway will be closed in both directions at those sites.

No blasting or lane closures are planned for Dec. 23, 24 and 25 because of the Christmas holiday.

Up-to-date blasting closure and travel information is available at the U.S. 70 Information Center, via the hotline at (866) 653-4069. Roadside electronic message signs and local radio stations also carry alerts.

The Valley Community Preservation Commission and several private land owners filed to stop the four-laning of the highway through the valley earlier this year. Named as the lead defendant

was Norman Mineta, head of the U.S. Department of Transportation. The lawsuit contends the department violated provisions of the National Environmental Policy Act by issuing a record of decision that the project would not "use" any protected historic properties "without undertaking adequate efforts to identify historic properties that would be affected by the project."

Highway officials point to the scenic two-lane road's lethal history as one of the deadliest routes in the state and contend widening the road will create a safer highway.

Judge LeRoy Hansen of the New Mexico Federal District Court last month said he needed more information before ruling on the injunction motion.

New forest mascot is all Reddy to go

Smokey Bear still shares similar messages

An icon of forest fire prevention for nearly 60 years after being rescued from a blaze in the Capitan Mountains in Lincoln County, Smokey Bear is being challenged by the new mascot of an environmental group.

Reddy the Squirrel, a symbol of the newer fire management approach of learning to live with and prepare for forest fires, was created by Mark Blaine with Forest Service Employees for Environmental Ethics.

Blaine, who is editor of Forest Magazine published by the group, said members for a long time saw that property owners who don't clear their yards and create defensible space around their structures often lose their homes to fire despite efforts of firefighters.

The group also stresses that fire is a natural cycle in the life of a forest, he said.

A squirrel was chosen, "because it was something everyone sees" and less exotic than a bear. The Reddy character carries a rake, is wearing work boots and a hard hat.

The FSEEE group's Web site explains that Reddy and his family "have lived in these wildlands for ages, and she understands the rhythms of nature. She knows that fire can be a frequent and unannounced visitor to her natural home."

But Eddie Tudor, manager of the Smokey Bear Historical Park established in 1979 in Capitan, said the two symbols deliver equally valuable messages and can live in harmony.

"This is only the second time I've heard of Reddy," he said Tuesday. "The first time was about two weeks ago when a woman visiting the park asked about him. I don't know much about him, but whatever the icon is they use, we as fire managers over the years have realized you do need to have fire in the environment."

"There is good fire and bad fire and Smokey's message always is to prevent unwanted, human-caused fires."

Tudor, who has worked at the park for 11 years and managed it for the

past four, said he doesn't consider Reddy a challenge to Smokey, who is buried at the park.

"I think the two can go hand in hand with one another," he said. "When we upgraded the park and exhibits, we included both messages. We're teaching forest health and fire ecology and we're also teaching the prevention methods, which is Smokey's message."

Reddy's message mirrors much of what local U.S. Forest Service representatives and Ruidoso officials have practiced for years.

Smokey Bear Ranger District foresters worked for nearly a decade to establish a fire break from the Lincoln National Forest and the village with forest thinning projects and controlled burns.

The Ruidoso village council hired an urban forester and appointed a forest health group, which led to the adoption of new fire-resistant construction and landscaping standards to reduce the fire hazard within the village on developed and undeveloped land.

Cost-sharing grants for work on private land continue to be pursued by the village and by the Lincoln County Commission to help property owners with the expense of tree cutting.

A tree-removal industry has developed locally. In Glencoe, a company is using the small-diameter trees that are no good for commercial lumber as the source for animal bedding. Sawdust from that enterprise is used to dry the shavings and other wood byproducts fire a biomass generator under a federal pilot program.

Reddy preaches that forest fires are part of nature and don't have to be destructive to homes.

"She knows that if homeowners take a few precautions, they have an excellent chance of saving their homes from the regular cycle of fires that burn through wild areas," according to a summary on the squirrel.

Some of her tips include creating defensible space around a home and building or renovating with fire resistant materials. It looks like Reddy would be right at home in Ruidoso.

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More forest thinning set

Additional cutting projects are open for commercial work.

Forty-four acres in the Capitan Mountains of the Lincoln National Forest are targeted for timber stand improvement projects.

Smokey Bear District Ranger Gerald M. Hawkes signed a decision memorandum Tuesday to permit the activities to improve watershed and wildlife habitat on the north side of the mountain range.

Primary emphasis will be on management of wildlife habitat and production of fuel wood in the Peach Tree area.

"This is a fuel-wood cutting area," he said Tuesday. "It will be cut commercially, which will improve the wildlife habitat and demand on the water-

shed. It opens up dense juniper-piñon stands, which allows other plants to grow and creates forage for wildlife and livestock."

The cutting on this project will be handled by the owner of adjacent private land, Hawkes said. The owner has a grazing permit and will do it in conjunction with some other work.

"We have other projects available for people who would like to bid on fuel-wood cutting," Hawkes said. "There are quite a few around the district."

On this project, the cutter has one year to complete the cutting and then the Forest Service will burn the slash.

"That kills smaller trees and reduces the invasion and allows the understory plants to come in, and that's what protects the soil (from erosion) and provides the forage," Hawkes said.

A few areas in the district remain open for individuals

who want to cut fuel wood for their private use by obtaining a permit from his office on Mechem Drive in Ruidoso, but Hawkes said the heavy snow Tuesday may force closure of the roads that access those areas.

"We have to consider the safety of the people and the possible damage to the natural resources once the snow settles in," he said.

Hawkes said the project is consistent with management direction and standards documented in the Forest Plan as amended in 1996.

The decision is not subject to appeal and may be implemented immediately after publication. Texas district attorney arrested in Ruidoso on DWI charges

Ruidoso police arrested a district attorney from Kress, Texas, and charged him with aggravated DWI for refusing a blood test and driving left of the center line at 7:57 p.m. Nov. 27.

Terry D. McEachern, 52, the 64th District attorney covering Swisher, Hale and Castro counties in Texas, was seen first by Ruidoso Downs police "all over the roadway and driving erratically," as he headed for Ruidoso, according to police reports.

A Ruidoso police officer pulled McEachern over in the 200 block of Paradise Canyon, after observing the vehicle cross the center yellow line on Paradise Drive near Meander Drive and then move to the left side of the road approaching a blind hill.

McEachern first told the officer he had not been consuming alcohol, then later said he'd had a beer. A second officer arrived to help

administer field sobriety tests, which he was unable to perform "to the satisfaction of the officer," the report states.

McEachern said he had taken Valium at 7 p.m. When asked if he felt he should be driving in his condition, he said no twice. At the police

department, he refused to submit to a breath test and asked that a lawyer be present while he was tested. He did ask to take the test later, the report states.

Scot D. Key, 12th Judicial District Attorney, said it's "settled law" that no one has a right to an attorney at that stage of an investigation.

"You can't manipulate the system by refusing the Breathalyzer test on the one hand and allow a significant amount of time to elapse and then say 'I'll take the test now that my BAC is probably lower.' It's a pretty transparent defense.

"We treat every DWI defendant in the same fashion; the fact that he's a D.A. doesn't really matter," Key said. "It's business as usual for us."

mitted new, scaled-down plans this year, but during an initial review, planners took no action waiting for comment from the State Engineer and other state department reviewing the development. No new hearing date is scheduled, said county planner Patsy Sanchez.

"We decided to do nothing until they clear all of the agencies," said planning commission chairman Wayne Negley. "And it looks like the State Engineer isn't going to recommend it."

Romero issued his memorandum Oct. 22, but no final letter from Turney has been received, Sanchez said.

On many points, Romero wrote favorably about the new plan, which shows 230 parcels on about 149 acres with another 111 acres of green space.

A 266-acre golf course is proposed, but is not part of the current application for the subdivision on a site

about seven miles north of Ruidoso, he noted. The smallest lot would be less than a quarter of an acre and the largest, 1.56 acres.

Romero noted that county subdivision regulations state the maximum annual water requirement for indoor and outdoor purposes per parcel is a half-acre foot, unless a detailed water demand analysis justifying another number is approved by the State Engineer. He agreed that a detailed water analysis submitted by the developer justified using a figure of .21 acre-foot of water per household per annum as the amount to be consumed. An acre foot equates to about 325,000 gallons of water.

Romero added that the subdivider adequately covered water conservation measures in the disclosure statement that would go to prospective buyers and in the restrictions and covenants attached to the land.

"Besides encouraging xeriscaping and requiring

low-flow water appliances, the subdivider also has limited the amount of irrigated turf to 800 square feet," Romero said.

Meters would be installed at each parcel, which would allow the county to monitor and restrict the amount of water used, he wrote. The subdivider also is required to provide stored water of not less than 3,000 gallons for fire protection prior to construction.

He noted that the Water Supply Plan states the water system has a 100,000 gallon storage tank with a fire hydrant at the tank and that an addition 500,000 gallon tank, a new pressure system, a distribution system, water mains, fire hydrants and utility building will be installed.

Negley said the state Highway and Transportation Department staff also raised a few problems the subdivider should address, including the design at the two access points from Old Fort Stanton Road and from Airport Road.

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Mechem served as governor, judge

Edwin L. Mechem died Nov. 27 at the age of 90.

Born the same year New Mexico was accepted as a state, Edwin L. Mechem went on to become its governor four times. He died Wednesday, Nov. 27, of congestive heart failure at the age of 90.

Mechem Drive, one of Ruidoso's main streets and also known as State Road 48, is named after the well-known Republican, who was reared in Alamogordo.

A long-time reporter in the state said Mechem, who had been with the Federal Bureau of Investigation and was district attorney in Las Cruces, established a high profile during a murder investigation of a girl named Cricket Coogler.

The case involved a professional football player with the Pittsburgh Steelers. Although it was never solved, the case propelled Mechem's name into the news across

the state. That recognition, coupled with his sense of humor and the record he amassed in office, won Mechem four, two-year terms as governor from 1951 to 1954, 1957 to 1958 and 1961 to 1962.

"About the only political gaffe in his career in some people's opinion was when U.S. Sen. Dennis Chavez, a Democrat, died. Mechem resigned (as governor) and was appointed by the lieutenant governor to finish out the term," the reporter said. "He was appointed to the federal bench in 1970 by President Richard Nixon and was handling cases until the week he died."

Mechem, born July 2, 1912, worked in counter intelligence as an FBI agent during the 1940s. He was only 38 when first elected as governor and was the state's first Republican governor in 20 years. His support crossed party lines.

Some of his more notable cases on the U.S. District Court bench included the protection of the silvery minnow when the flow of the Rio Grande was threatened this summer, and a ruling that Albuquerque Public

Schools failed to provide and appropriate education for the handicapped.

In a case directly affecting Ruidoso, he ruled in 1978 that the state game and fish laws were not valid on the neighboring Mescalero Apache Reservation.

He is survived by his wife of 27 years, Josephine; daughter, Martha Vigil; sons John and Walter; numerous grandchildren and great-grandchildren; and Josephine's children, Ann Galloway Leigh, Beth Galloway Horyna and Christin Galloway Dobbeck. He was preceded in death by his first wife, Dorothy; his son, Jesse; Josephine's son, John; and granddaughter, Jennifer.

The family opted for a private funeral, but a public memorial service was conducted Tuesday, at the Old Airport Terminal.

Memorials may be made to the Jesse Mechem Scholarship Fund at the New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell or the Jesse Mechem Scholarship Fund at New Mexico State University Foundation in Las Cruces or to the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

Water, drainage projects top Ruidoso Downs' to-do list

Ruidoso Downs' Griffith Ruidoso Levels Drifted from a record low from an historical monthly average of 400 gpm (gallons per minute) to 287 gpm in May 2002.

This steady decrease since April 2000 has been monitored closely by the city administration and water department staff. Last summer, the city council had to implement a water conservation ordinance. This was the first time for water restrictions in the city's 54-year history.

Three emergency priorities have been recognized by the city's recently completed 40-year Water Resource Plan and Water Distribution Master Plan:

- The reduction of the approximately 25 percent water loss due to system leakage
- The development of an

alternate source of water to supplement the city's water

If necessary, replace Griffith Spring and increase water storage capacity to handle increasing population and peak demands during the summer and provide additional firefighting reserves

The city has other pressing issues too. The recent reinstallation of almost 5,000 linear feet of water pipeline, damaged during the highway construction project three years ago along Highway 70, carried a cost of \$164,260.

On Nov. 11, the extension of the sewer system to 41 homes on East Circle Drive began with a projected cost of \$300,000.

The inspection and interior coating of the Redman Reservoir leaks is scheduled to begin January 2003 at a cost of \$40,000. Funding will come from the Water and Sewer Improvement Fund and State Special Appropriations Grant.

The replacement of 29,000 linear feet of leaking, undersized water lines and installation of new pressure-reducing stations and fire hydrants will begin in February 2003 with a completion date of December 2004. If funded, the project has a projected cost of \$1.2 million.

Drainage improvements in the River Park Subdivision are needed. If funded, design and construction will begin February 2003 with a completion date of November 2003 with a projected cost of \$590,000.

The All-American Park Pedestrian Walkway design has begun and grant money has been applied for, with a construction date of May 2003, and a projected cost of \$81,000.

Finally, the reconstruction and widening of Allison Lane from Reservoir Drive to Spring Drive includes curb and gutters, asphalt overlay

and proper drainage. This has been funded by a State Co-Op Grant from the highway department with design and construction beginning in January 2003.

Downs senior center offering events, services

Tommy Hood, manager of the Ruidoso Downs Senior Recreation Center, reminds seniors of available services and activities.

"We serve lunch Mondays through Fridays from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., throughout the year except on holidays. Reservations can be made daily up to 10:30 a.m., and drop-in visitors are welcome."

Senior-citizen transportation provided by the center is limited, but includes weekday pick-up and transport to Center for lunch, from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m., with transport home from 1 to 2 p.m.

On Mondays and Fridays, the center offers errand transportation to home-bound seniors from 2 to 3:30 p.m.

In addition, from 2 to 3:30 p.m. on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays transportation is provided for shopping, post office, hair appointments, bank, etc. with scheduling 24 hours in advance.

This is on a first-come, first-serve reservation basis, and the center requests that seniors try to schedule all errands for a single day.

Medical transportation needs are available as needed for doctor and dentist visits.

The center suggests seniors schedule transportation at the same time a doctor appointment is made, with at least 24 hours advance to avoid conflicts with other regular or scheduled transport services.

Carefully consider those government promises

Our oldest veterans are seeing them broken

Government promises have a way of being broken, as almost everybody should know by now.

Consider the Indian treaties of the 19th century — promises made by Uncle Sam to tribal leaders; promises kept until the "manifest destiny" of the nation got in the way.

Privately owned ranches covering thousands of acres in southern New Mexico were borrowed by the federal government early in World War II, with a promise that the land would be returned "after the war."

It's more than half a century after the war now, and those ranches remain a part of what we call White Sands Missile Range.

And now we hear of the survivors of the "greatest generation" of World War II and of the Korean War, who were promised, because they were needed, that health-care benefits would be guaranteed for life if they served for 20 years.

A federal court of appeals ruled last week that those lifetime-care promises could be legally broken.

Why? Simply because there is nothing in federal law that requires a government to act morally, and today's "needs" are more important.

Those veterans are dying off now, at 1,200 a day, and despite all, few are outraged by the country they served.

Now all we need is an 'Official ... So-What?'

In two months the 2003 New Mexico State Legislature will convene to do important things to us...I mean, for us.

Already the jockeying for power has commenced. Manny Aragon, still smarting from Richard Romero's coup two years ago, is trying to figure out how to dethrone Richard and regain his status as Senate President Pro Tem.

Manny must be figuring that if Heather Wilson can beat Romero, so can he.

Every year, for either 30 or 60 days, our legislators work down to dusk on weighty matters such as whether to grant their constituents a tax cut and whether to attend that night's booze party sponsored by the New Mexico oilmen or the one being thrown by the state's race tracks.

It is not an easy job.

Somehow, into their hectic pace our lawmakers manage every session to take up less crucial matters, such as should we have a state cookie and should any citizen in the entire state be able to spell it?

Back in 1963, for instance, legislators adopted an Official Salute to the Flag, a 20-word tribute written by a bunch of folks in Portales. Here it is: "I salute the flag of the State of New Mexico and the Zia symbol of perfect friendship among united cultures."

What is particularly interesting about the Official Salute is that in its nearly 40 years of existence, no one has filed a lawsuit in any court to prevent someone else from saying it. What is also interesting is that in those same 40 years, only three people have ever repeated the Official Salute.

Coming up with the Official Salute may have been relatively easy. Not so with the Official Cookie. Eloquent debate attended the decision on cookie selection, and, then, would it be spelled "the biscóchito" or "the bizcochito"?

Although we cannot confirm the report, one frustrated legislator is said to have suggested "how

about we call it 'the oreo' and get on with business?"

Some years later legislators got all heated up about this burning question: should the Tarantula Hawk Wasp be designated the Official State Insect? No, said some, because (picky picky) there is no such insect.

A university professor was summoned to testify the insect does not exist. "Oh, yeah," said a debate opponent, "then what was it that just bit me on the butt?" The debate was feverish, but to this very day our Official State Insect is the Tarantula Hawk Wasp, even if there isn't such a thing.

New Mexico has it all: a State Flower, the Yucca. Three state songs, none of which I can hum. A State Grass, but not the grass Gov. Gary Johnson wants to legalize. A State Tree, the Piñon. A State Bird, the Roadrunner. A State Fish, the Cutthroat Trout.

We even have an Official State Question: "Red or Green?"

It is the 1975 Legislature we owe for coming up with the Official State Slogan. We would bet this one was first written on a cocktail napkin at the Bull Ring: "Everybody is Somebody in New Mexico."

Order another round. This column is Officially Over.

Open Meetings

In recognition of the fact that a representative government is dependent upon an informed electorate, it is declared to be public policy of this state that all persons are entitled to the greatest possible information regarding the affairs of government and the official acts of those officers and employees who represent them. The formation of public policy or the conduct of business by vote shall not be conducted in closed meetings. All meetings of any public body except the legislature and the courts shall be public meetings, and all persons so desiring shall be permitted to attend and listen to the deliberations and proceedings...

What's the cost/benefit status of a cold-water fishery?

To the editor:

Much has been written about the cost (\$20 million-plus) to modify the waste water treatment plant to keep the designation of a "cold water fishery" for Rio Ruidoso.

Yet, very little has been written on the benefit/detriment of keeping this designation. Is this another incidence of the vast majority paying for the benefit to a small minority group? Information access and government Web sites

Research and library groups protest a proposal to remove from a Web site materials that don't reflect the goals of the Bush administration.

WASHINGTON - The American Educational Research Association (AERA) and the American Library Association (ALA), in concert with 12 other national organizations, have joined in an effort to retain documents on the U.S. Department of Education's Web site.

In a letter to Education Secretary Rod Paige, the 14 professional organizations have requested that all U.S. Department of Education materials retain the level of accessibility now available.

The groups have expressed concerns about the fate of information scheduled to be removed from the publicly accessible Web site. "Because the Internet has become, by far, the method of choice for disseminating information and research, data widely and efficiently, we are concerned about efforts that would diminish access and use of these records," they

wrote.

They are equally concerned about actions that would remove from access research, data, and other digests of information that otherwise have been publicly available, regardless of administration. They advocate that educational stakeholders be included in the Web revamping process.

The effort was triggered this fall after the library, educational research and related social science communities learned of an internal memo, "Criteria and Process for Removing Old Content from www.ed.gov," that the Education Department issued to staff members on May 31, 2002. According to the government memo, the federal initiative strives to remove from public access information that either is outdated or "does not reflect the priorities, philosophies, or goals of the present administration."

Dr. Felice J. Levine, AERA executive director, emphasizes the importance of access to research reports and data. "Sound policy depends on solid science," she notes. "We need to ensure that research materials remain accessible so that analysts can interrogate them fur-

ther and compare new results with prior data. We need to resist policies or procedures that remove such information or make it difficult to find."

"The American Library Association supports Education Secretary Paige's effort to improve the functional usability of the Department's Web site - by making it more user friendly to the general public," says ALA Washington Office Executive Director Emily Sheketoff. "However, we strongly believe that education information should be continuously accessible to educators, researchers, families, and children - and must remain permanently available to the public," she concludes.

In their letter, the professional societies state, "We, as well as the general public, need Internet access to the research, data, reports, and other digests and information that may be removed from the Department's Web site."

A WALL for the challenge of it

Kids were climbing the walls at White Mountain Intermediate School last week — at least during physical education class in the gym.

Thanks to four Sundays of work donated by P.E. teaching assistant and coach Dave Anderson, the gym now has a climbing wall, and that sport will be incorporated into the curriculum.

The 9-foot by 16-foot wall can handle four climbing children at a time. Although

it is geared for fifth- and sixth-graders, Anderson plans to put in additional blocks lower in the wall for third and fourth grade students.

"Deb (Thomas, the physical education teacher) and I were looking through some catalogs and I presented the idea to the school a year or two ago, but they didn't think we had enough money."

Anderson went out and found the supplies, at minimal cost to the school district.

Foxworth-Galbraith Lumber Company donated most of the wood, Thomas donat-

ed one panel, the school bought the mats and donated some of the paint, and Anderson bought the ceramic hand-holds and the rest of the paint and supplies.

He ordered the hand-holds from REI in Albuquerque, where he also received advice and a diagram for the wall, and Ruidoso police officer Eric Ament also helped with the design. Anderson painted the plywood to smooth over the rough spots, creating a mountain scene for the children to climb. The mats will be attached to the wall to protect them when the wall isn't being used.

"It's a real challenge for the kids," Anderson said. "They were surprised at how much harder it is than they thought it'd be."

The ceramic hand-holds are made specifically for climbing walls "to give them the actual feeling of a rock. Some will be coarse, some smooth, some lifted up, some the other way."

Using the climbing wall builds strength in the upper body, particularly the shoulder and arm, and in the fingers, as well as overall stamina, he said.

Several levels of difficulty for climbers are created by the wall's design: The outside panels are the easiest, and the center two the most difficult. The bar at the bottom is used for traversing across the wall. Above the traverse bar, the footholds follow the clouds, so once they're on the wall, children can traverse across the clouds using only the small hand-hold handles.

"It's an extremely technical climb," Anderson said. Later on, a perpendicular board can be placed at the top so the children will have a three-dimensional object to climb on.

"The principal wants to put a pulley system to go up to the top of the orange mountain (above and behind the climbing wall) and hook into a rafter, so students can 'belay,' or be hoisted, by the pulley, giving them suspension so they won't fall down."

Meanwhile, students are challenged to develop the muscles it takes to climb the wall as is.

Curious in Corona

At 95, Geraldine Perkins is still leaving her mark on her corner of the world

CORONA - For the past several years, Geraldine Perkins has made a New Year's resolution to stay curious.

That resolve now spoken has been lived in a life that is a testimony to that inquisitiveness. Born to Franklin and Mary Du Bois on a "cold winter midnight on Dec. 4, 1907 in Longton, Kan.," as she described it, Geraldine Du Bois began her lengthy journey through a life that landmarks people and places recorded in history.

Following her grandfather, who came to Corona ahead of the railroad and put in a general store, the young Du Bois family stayed on a while. They left for other places for a short time only to return in 1916 when Geraldine was in the fifth grade. She proudly declares she has lived in Corona in every decade of the century.

The family sent Geraldine to Silver City by train to live boarding-school style for her high school education. Mary Du Bois felt her daughter needed to graduate from an accredited high school, which Corona did not have at the time. She visited home on holidays only and graduated at the age of 15 - "and I wouldn't recommend that," she said.

At the University of New Mexico, majoring in biology and chemistry, Geraldine had plans for a career in medicine. On a visit to Kansas to see her grandparents, she discovered her eyesight was not as it should be and the diagnosis would change her path forever.

Retinitis pigmentosa is the name given to a group of disorders of the retina, all of which result in a progressive reduction in vision. Geraldine was going blind. Her dreams of study for surgery at Johns Hopkins ended with that reality. "It just threw me," she said. "I gave up a teaching fellowship at the University of Nevada and came home. I took a job teaching at little school over the hill we called Punkin Center for \$100 a month for nine months, plus a \$5 janitor fee. Then I taught in 7th and 8th grade in Tatum for a year.

"I like to say those two years of school teaching drove me to drugs," she says with a slight smile. "And I stayed with the drugs 43 years 10 months and six days."

At the age of 21, Geraldine bought a drug store. She borrowed the down payment money from a bank in Vaughn in an era when that boldness from a woman was uncommon.

"After I bought the drugstore, I found out you had to be a registered pharmacist to own a drugstore so I went to the Woostera School of Pharmacy in Wichita, Kan. My certificate is dated Nov. 30, 1930." Geraldine was the fourth female pharmacist to register in the state of New Mexico.

The pharmacy was as close to the medical field she could get. Still



today, the Du Bois Drug Store stands as a landmark on the main street of Corona. Even with degenerating eyesight, she continued as the pharmacist until 1973.

"As long as I could read the fine print I could fill prescriptions, and doctors aren't known for their fine handwriting, you know," she said. "In all those years, there were only two prescriptions I could not see to fill."

Geraldine Perkins
Corona resident

A young man by the name of Archie Perkins who worked at the Corona Trading Company, and later went on to UNM to play football and become a teacher, caught Geraldine's eye and they were married. Archie taught and coached at Corona Schools as well as tending to the family ranching interests. Archie and Geraldine had two children, Sherrill (Bradford) and Rand, both of whom live, ranch and teach in Corona today. Archie died in 1994, 10 days short of his 86th birthday.

Most of her life has been dedicated to involvement in service organizations and improvement in education and health care in New Mexico. She spent many years on the committee of the Health System Agencies, an organization that regulated hospitals in the state

I can't write the checks but I sign them."

Geraldine now is faced with hearing problems. She says she could deal with the loss of her eyesight but losing her hearing is "killing her." Her mother's theory, and one she adopted, was that you had to be smarter than your children. She works at it constantly still today. "I wish I didn't think I needed eight hours of sleep," she says. "I don't have time to sleep. If I had more time, I would walk more and I would type more."

The personification of courage and encouragement, at 95 years young, Geraldine Perkins is what everyone should want to be when they grow up.

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Ruidoso returning to state title game

Ruidoso uses ball control, timely scoring to win their Class 3A semifinal match against Hot Springs.

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES - For a while Saturday, Ruidoso's game against Hot Springs in their Class 3A football semifinal was almost a replay of a week before. The only difference being that the Warriors threatened to lose a halftime lead.

Ruidoso went up 33-14 at the break, and used several big plays to withstand a determined Hot Springs team to win 59-45 and secure their first state championship appearance since 1998.

"It was going to be anyone's game, it's just whoever had the ball the longest and made the fewest mistakes," said Ruidoso coach Ridge Bowden. "We got a couple of stops on defense and were able to convert."

Ruidoso scored often and controlled the ball enough to keep the Tigers (8-4) from building any kind of momentum, although they continued playing hard until the very last snap. The offense defined the game, as the two teams combined for more than 1,000 yards from scrimmage and traded two kickoff returns for touchdowns.

The Warriors (8-5) got started early, as quarterback Josh Adams took the ball on the second play of the game and ran 75 yards for a touchdown with barely a minute elapsed in the first quarter.

Adams was Mr. Everything for Ruidoso, as he ran for 225 yards, passed for 119 more and had a hand in seven Warrior touchdowns - including a 92-yard kickoff return in the fourth quarter which stopped a Hot Springs comeback before it got started.

"Nobody touched me, everybody got their block and it turned out to be a big play," Adams said of the run back. "That helps on special teams, a lot of the game is based on that. It just came out that we ran it, and got a lot of momentum with it."

Momentum was something Ruidoso needed at halftime. Although they were leading by a healthy margin, they got that lead at the expense of Tyler Line, who went down with a knee injury near the end of the second quarter and was taken off the field by ambulance. Line finished the game with 57 yards rushing and one touchdown, and the Warriors were left with the question of how to fill the hole he left behind.

"Tyler has been a big part of our offense, but we have had to play without him quite a bit this year," Bowden said, referring to an ankle injury suffered during a pre-season scrimmage which kept Line off the field until just before District 4-3A play. "The guys that were in there like Jaime Urban and Casey Mirau, they picked it up in the second half and kept our offense moving."

Mirau moved 108 yards on 11 carries in the game, while Urban had 18 yards to take the pressure

off of Adams.

Pressure is just what the Tigers placed on Ruidoso from the beginning. After the Warriors' first score, Hot Springs answered with a 47-yard kickoff return by Roman Sanchez to the Ruidoso 33-yard line. Later, on a 4th-and-2 play, the Tigers scored on a 25-yard run by quarterback Zach Gerleve to tie the game at 7-all.

Gerleve was the Tigers' leading rusher with 99 yards, and passed for 172 yards in the game while contributing to four Hot Springs touchdowns.

They tried to get closer near the end of the first half, as the Tigers were at the Ruidoso 27-yard line with five seconds left, but Gerleve threw an interception to Steven Stroup to end the threat.

One of Gerleve's scores was a 46-yard pass to Sanchez, which put the Tigers down by 12 with 8:44 left in the third. But on the ensuing kickoff, Adams blew through the


"It worked better in the second half," Page said of the game plan. "We weren't getting a good reputation on our press in the first

It turns out Ames' father, Gerald, was a long-time wrestling coach at Ruidoso High. And after he had married Sarah, Brown eventually came to Ruidoso to follow in his father-in-law's footsteps.

That journey continued this year when Brown was named the new head wrestling coach at RHS, and Brown has some high hopes for several individuals on the team.

"Team-wise, I don't know how we'll do," Brown admitted. "I want to improve individually at first."

In a sport that's as individually driven as wrestling, it

stands to reason that any improvement made by certain Warrior grapplers will translate into a better team performance.

As a team last year, Ruidoso finished third in Class 1A/3A at the state dual tournament, defeating Shiprock 32-30. At the individual tournament, the Warriors had two medalists in Patrick Hodges and Shawn Gurule.

Gurule has put some more muscle on his small frame and returns this year as a senior in the 125-pound weight class as a favorite to medal again this year. He'll be joined by a number of talented hopefuls such as Dave Hall at 119 pounds, Greg Crow at 130 and Cody Huffman at 140.

"We've still got a lot of freshmen, so we're still young," Brown said. "But most did wrestle under me in 7th and 8th grade."

Brown was the wrestling coach at Ruidoso Middle School for four years prior to being elevated to the post at RHS, and has had several of this year's juniors and seniors when they were in middle school, making the transition

from prior coach Jerrett Perry to Brown a relatively smooth one.

The Warriors start their season Thursday with a quad meet at Roswell High, starting at 5 p.m. While it's called a quad, there will actually be five teams there; Ruidoso, Roswell, Goddard, New Mexico Military Institute and Tucumcari. After that, the team travels to Belen Saturday for another tournament.

Most of the wrestlers Brown has out right now are in the smaller weight classes. Many of those in the middleweight divisions are still on the grid-iron with the football team, and will miss the Belen tournament as they play for the Class 3A state title at Portales.

Those Brown is currently doing without include Jeremy

Pritchett, Josh Rue, Josh Pior, Justin Huffman, Case Forrest, Elisha Hedin and Bruce Herrera.

"These first few tournaments will be kind of sketchy," Brown said. "Hopefully, the football guys will jump right in with both feet and come around by January."

The Warriors are in District

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
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Aggies hold off Lobos in men's basketball action

In 2000 and 2001, the New Mexico State Aggies had lost close games to in-state rival New Mexico in the Pan American Center.

Saturday night, the Aggies got redemption of sorts, scoring the final four points of the game, the final two coming on a Jason Fontenet layin with 21.9 seconds left to win 69-58.

NMSU is now 3-1 on the year, while UNM falls to 1-2.

"We hung in there," NMSU guard Brandon Mason said. "We struggled offensively, but we made some defensive stops and made some baskets to get back in the game."

Mason set up the game-winning basket by stripping UNM's Ruben Douglas from behind, then dishing the ball to Fontenet as the Lobos couldn't get back on defense.

"Ruben does some different things to get shots, I just figured he'd drive, he did and I was able to get him from

behind," Mason said.

Said Douglas of losing the ball: "Brandon anticipated the play well. He just made a really good play."

The Lobos had a chance to win the game after calling timeout with 16.7 seconds remaining.

But NMSU came out in a zone, forced Douglas, who scored 20, into passing the ball by double-teaming him. Douglas found freshman Mark Walters who drove into the paint and launched a running jump shot, but it was well off the mark, failing to draw iron as time ran out.

"They surprised us by coming out in a zone," Douglas said.

Said Mason: "There was no way I was going to let Ruben shoot the ball to beat us. Coach Henson drew up the play and that's why he has won as many games as he has."

On a night when the Aggies struggled to find the mark from the field, making just 18-of-51, it was Mason who lifted the Aggies. He went 7-of-12 from the field, 4-of-5 from the 3-point

line and hit both free throws for 20 points, tying Douglas for game's top honors.

Mason's back-to-back treys trimmed UNM's 44-36 lead to 44-41 with 8:57, but it was his 3-pointer with 3:45 that may have been most crucial.

Down 52-47 with 4:09 left and the offense seemingly going nowhere, Mason's triple cut the lead to 52-50 and seemed to give NMSU new life.

The two teams traded points in the next three minutes and UNM still lead 57-55 after a Jamaal Williams free throw. Douglas made it 58-55 with a charity toss, then missed the second shot and what turned out to be a break for NMSU, Mason was fouled by UNM's Mikal Monette with 40.9 seconds left. Mason canned both shots and the Aggies were down one, setting up Mason and Fontenet's heroics.

Douglas missed two free throws Saturday after making his first 22, including his first three against NMSU.

"Brandon did a good job tonight, he came up big," NMSU coach Lou Henson said. "He does a lot of good things. He scored well, he had to defend Douglas all night. We struggled offensively. When you have to depend on the perimeter shot like we do, that will happen. We couldn't get the ball in to James Felder and he was in foul trouble early, which also hurt. We're just not very big."

Said Mason: "I felt comfortable with my shot tonight. I didn't shoot well against Colorado on Wednesday, but I had been getting in some extra practice the past couple of days and that helped. UNM defended really well. They forced us to do some things we didn't want to do. But we were able to spread the ball out later in the game and that helped some and we got a couple of good looks."

The Lobos stayed in the lead in the second half behind Williams, who scored 11 of his 15 in the second 20 minutes and Douglas, who had nine.

"We didn't have an answer to Williams or Douglas," Henson said. "Both of them are very good."

The first half saw UNM hit 12-of-25 from the field to take a 32-29 lead entering halftime. Douglas hit for 11 points, while Javin Tindall had eight to lead the Lobos. But UNM also had 12 of its 20 turnovers to hurt its cause.

The Aggies struggled in the first half, hitting just 10 of 29 shots and 5 of 10 free throws. Four players scored five points for NMSU in the first 20 minutes.

"Turnovers hurt us," Lobos coach Ritchie McKay said. "Twenty turnovers is too many."

Said Douglas: "This one hurts. Last week we had a lead late against California and lost. Tonight we had another lead and couldn't hold on. We have to execute better."

difference in the ball game."


