## More than a dream

While all the other schools but Corona in the county took a day off on Monday, Capitan Schools celebrated Martin Luther King Day by learning about King's nonviolent protests and the civil rights movement.

"The whole student body decided to create a museum to spread the beliefs of Martin Luther King: Nonviolence, taking a stand against racism and to judge people by their character and not the color of their skin," said Grant Hambrick, math teacher and Student Senate sponsor.

The high school Student Senate took charge of organizing a poster and essay contest for the elementary and middle schools and setting up displays from these and projects from individual classrooms. Then on Monday, members of the Student Senate gave presentations from their own projects to groups of students from all of the grade levels, with Stephanie Kelsey as tour guide for the museum presentations introducing the visitors to the presenters.

Presentations were on the racism existing



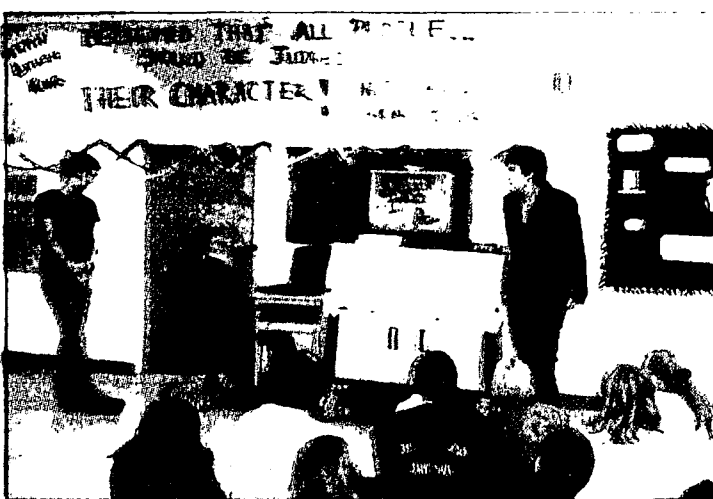

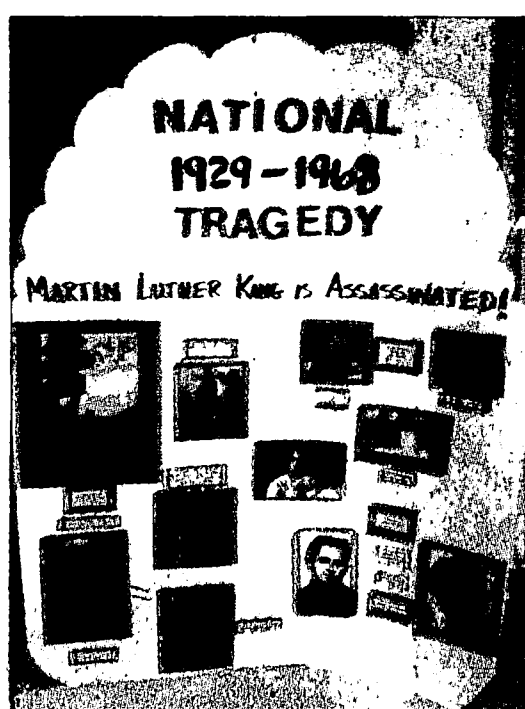
at the time that spurred the civil rights movement, the Ku Klux Klan, the nonviolent demonstrations and speeches of King, and his life and death.

Students watched footage of King's famous "I Have a Dream" speech in Washington, D.C. in 1963, and then pledged themselves to continue the struggle to keep his dream alive by tracing their hands on a large banner and signing, Kelsey said.

"We decided that since we don't have the day off, we wanted to educate the kids," said Nicole Murtaugh, president of the Student Senate, who also gave a PowerPoint presentation.

## Ruidoso balks at county official's street names suggestion

Ruidoso councilors say they're not interested in changing street names in the village that other areas of Lincoln County want to

use.

The village embarked on name changes several years ago at its own expense to eliminate duplications for the Enhanced 911 emergency response system and local dispatchers know the territory,

they said at a Jan. 14 meeting.

It wouldn't be right to disrupt mail delivery at the 36 homes along Nogal Place with a name change, said Councilor L. Ray Nunley.

Connie Stone, who is handling

the county's street naming and E911 reconciliation program, asked councilors two months ago to consider giving new names to five streets, Pine Lodge Road, Nogal

## No locals appointed as racing regulators

■ All five new commission members live north of I-40, as does new racing director India Hatch

Now that a new governor has taken office, five new members have been named to the New Mexico Racing Commission, and at least two are ready to get to work.

Gov. Bill Richardson has appointed Jack Cole of Farmington to act as chairman, Arnold Rael of Rio Rancho, David Sanchez of Belen, Ken Corazza of Albuquerque and Penny Rembe of Rio Rancho.

Additionally, the commission staff has also been notified that commission director Julian Luna has departed, and will be replaced by India Hatch of Taos.

Hatch had yet to report to her new position by Tuesday and was unavailable for comment.

Sanchez, however, was available for comment, but was unwilling to discuss anything specific about the job, particularly about the fate of a new racetrack near Hobbs.

"That's about all I've been asked about since I was appointed," Sanchez said. "But I have no thoughts or opinions. We'll know after our first meeting."

The commission is scheduled to meet in executive session Jan. 29, then in a regular session Jan. 30.

Sanchez said he had been following the Hobbs track situation, but only as an interested horse breeder, not as a potential member of a governing body which would make decisions on the situation.

Ruidoso Downs owner R.D. Hubbard and track president Bruce Rimbo were in

## Local reservist gets call to move

Linda Affuso also a Ruidoso firefighter

Linda Affuso's family, friends and co-workers gathered Sunday for a big barbecue-cum-birthday party. Monday, she lunched with her mother.

Time together suddenly is more important than just a few weeks ago.

Affuso, 32 and a firefighter with the Ruidoso Fire Department, was notified Jan. 12, that as a member of the Army Reserve, she was being called up, possibly within a week.

"They said to get my affairs in order, that mobilization orders could come within a week. It's been that already and I'm still waiting. The Army tends to give the worst-case scenario," she said. "It's hurry up and wait."

She's been gone before to train or instruct in the reserves, but usually only for seven days at

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# U.S. 70 program to review project enhancements

■ The open house will be held at the Hondo Valley School this weekend.

Concepts and costs for a community enhancement program associated with the U.S. 70 widening project will be reviewed with the public at an open house set for Saturday.

"This program includes a budget of \$750,000 for community enhancements within the Hondo Valley,"

explained Mary Ann Wootton, community relations liaison.

The Sierra Blanca Constructors (SBC) Team has narrowed down a list of proposals to:

- Community gateway signs located in Ruidoso Downs, Glencoe, San Patricio, Hondo, Tinnie, Picacho and one for East-bound traffic heading into the Hondo Valley.

- Automated radar speed detection and speed activated flashing lights located in project areas where speed limits are reduced.

- A scenic pullout in the vicinity of the existing John Tunstall Historic

Marker.

- A career day at the Hondo School to provide students with exposure to career opportunities in highway engineering, and construction as well as natural and cultural resource management.

- Hondo Valley School improvements. Details will be covered at the open house. The State Board of Education is funding the alternate access route into the school compound.

- Additional law enforcement after construction of the project is complete. "All the (proposed) enhancements

can be developed within the available budget," Wootton said.

The original list of enhancements also included additional parking for roadside businesses. SBC is evaluating the roadside business parking issue, she said.

The development of community enhancements is an ongoing effort and community input is encouraged, Wootton said.

"If you have ideas for additional community enhancements, please attend the January Open House and/or the next U.S. 70 Task Force meeting or contact me toll-free at

(866) 653-4069," she said.

The open house will run from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Hondo Valley School.

"We will be viewing 'in-progress' plans and designs for the construction segments west of the U.S. 380/70 junction to Ruidoso Downs," Wootton said. "Some of the key areas of landowner and community interest will be left-turn lanes, treatment of irrigation ditches, community enhancements, aesthetic treatments, individual property owner impacts, and construction impacts on local and through traffic."

## Former LCSWA employee sues over firing

A former Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority employee is suing the garbage collection coalition and its operational supervisor for breach of employment contract, retaliation and violation of procedural due process.

Charles Marrujo contends in the suit filed in U.S. District Court Jan. 2 that he worked for seven years at the authority without a disciplinary write-up until Debra Ingle was appointed the operational supervisor.

Beginning in May 2001, he was subjected to a "continuing pattern of harassment by Ingle regarding the terms and conditions of his employment," the suit states.

"Marrujo was written up for checking in with elected or appointed officials of the village of Capitan and the town of Carrizosa regarding matters of public concern regarding complaints or other comments on the quality of service being rendered by LCSWA. Such matters were relevant to his employment, matters of public concern and protected speech."

He is asking for actual and punitive damages, back pay and benefits, reinstatement to his prior position with no loss of seniority, a permanent injunction against future violations by the defendants and for a jury trial.

Don Dutton, attorney for the authority, said he could not comment because he hasn't seen the lawsuit or previously heard the allegation about protected speech. The case will be handled by the authority's insurance company, he said.

In the suit, filed on behalf of Marrujo, attorney J. Robert Beauvais asserts that the plaintiff has reason to believe that Ingle told more than one person employed by the municipalities receiving service from the authority that she intended to fire Marrujo as one of her first acts after moving into a management position.

The suit states that Ingle "harbored unfounded resentment and bad feelings toward Marrujo...prior to any of the allegations of poor performance or other pretextual reasons given for his termination."

Marrujo claims on Nov. 12, 2002, he met with Ingle to go over a list of allegations about his conduct as part of a pre-termina-

tion hearing. At the conclusion, he was ordered to turn in his equipment and was terminated.

The suit contends Marrujo was denied the right to any legal counsel or representation and when he requested a post termination hearing, he was not given any hearing procedure information as required by the authority's own policies.

Beauvais wrote in the suit that the tribunal consisted of Ingle, two supervisory employees and one non-management employee, all subject to her direct control.

"The lack of an impartial tribunal...one day's notice of the post-termination hearing and a constitutionally inadequate pre- and post-termination hearing resulted in violation of Marrujo's right to procedural due process by defendants," he wrote.

The suit states that Marrujo was charged with the infraction of discussing company business with people in Capitan and "turning in a copy of the company payroll budget he received..."

Beauvais pointed out in the suit that the report is a public record under New Mexico law and any citizen has a right to the information.

Albuquerque in November about to learn the fate of their application to run the track, when then-Gov. Gary Johnson either fired or forced out three members of the Racing Commission — thereby keeping it from making any decision on a new Hobbs track until at least this month, when Richardson would take office.

Because the commission hasn't had a regular meeting since October, Corazza said the body will review pressing items such as proposed race dates.

"The Hobbs track isn't up for discussion," Corazza said. "We're just reviewing

rulings to be made for the last two months since there hasn't been a meeting in so long."

Corazza also refused to comment on the Hobbs situation, citing that he would reserve any judgment until presented with all the available facts in an official meeting.

Both men are horse breeders, but neither have had much of a relationship with Hubbard.

"He's such a big breeder compared to me," Sanchez said. "I've only bred a couple of his horses to our mares, and that's the only business I've had with him. I just want to have an open mind."

Place, Arabela Road, White Oaks Road and Cedar Creek Court. The towns or communities bearing those names should have the use of those street titles, she contended.

But Police Chief Lanny Maddox insisted any trained dispatcher should be able to distinguish between an emergency call from a street named Nogal in Ruidoso with a telephone prefix of 258, 257 or 630, and a call from the community of Nogal with a 354 prefix.

Councilor Ron Hardeman offered the motion to take no action on Stone's request and to allow the names to remain. The motion was seconded by Councilor Frank Cummins, who was critical of the coun-

ty's request.

"They should have come before we did (the initial renaming project)," he said. "Why should this hold them up? It doesn't make sense to inconvenience (homeowners) where it's not a problem to look at the prefix."

Village planning director Mike Runnels said the situation isn't a crisis and that the streets have existed for at least 25 years.

Mayor Leon Eggleston explained that Stone said the problem lies with the county dispatchers and that they might be confused with duplications if Ruidoso's power went down and they had to field emergency calls from the village as well as the rest of the county.

"Our dispatchers don't get

confused," Runnels said of Ruidoso's crew. "Why should we be the only county in the United States with no duplicate street names? There would be no confusion if they would look at the prefix. The

problem doesn't seem to exist anywhere else in the state."

Councilor Ron Anderson added that if the call registers as being long-distance, that should tell the dispatcher it's out of the immediate area.

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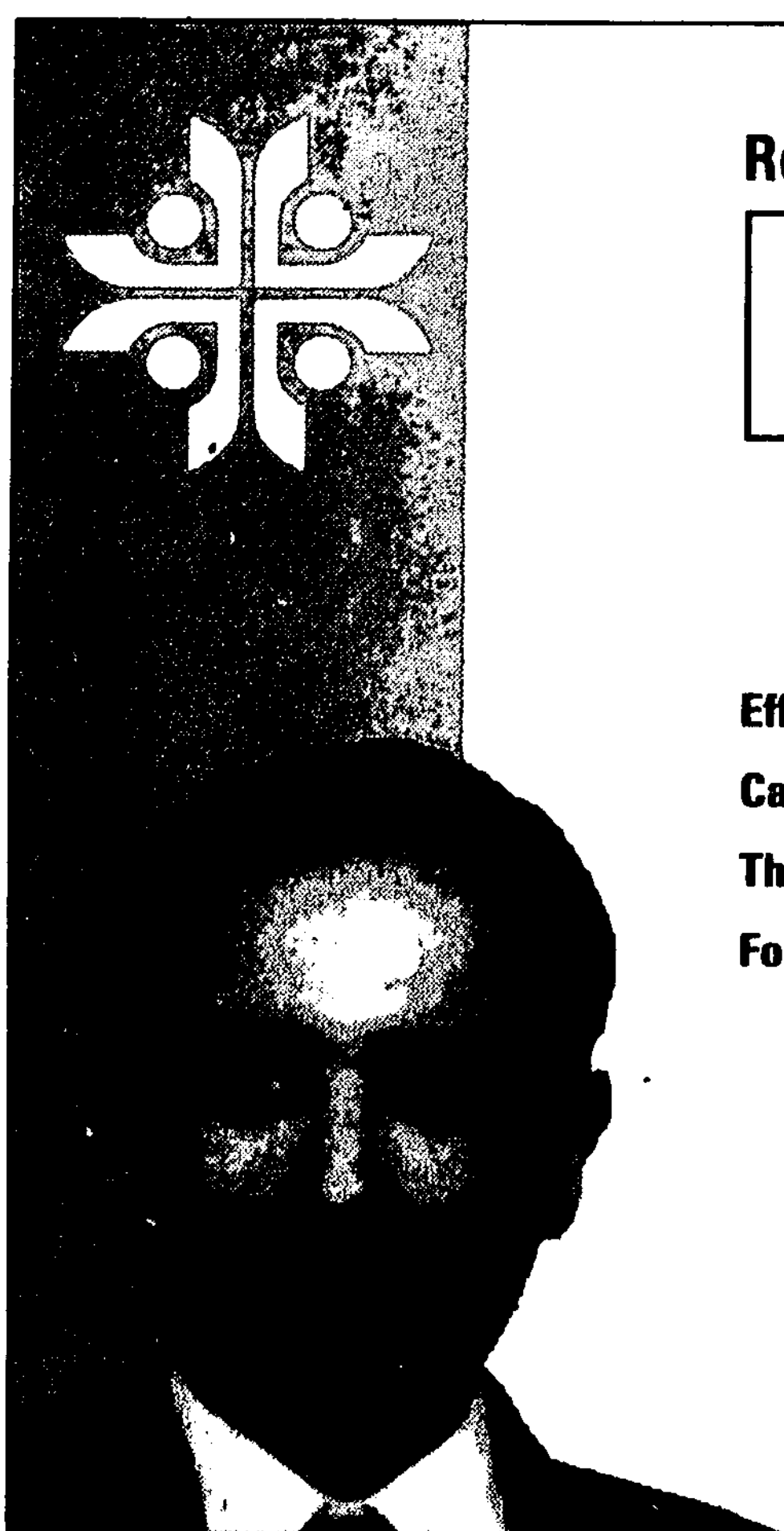

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# RESERVE: Local firefighter ready to serve her country

a time. The family has the routine down. If husband Julian was away with the Smokey Bear Hot Shot firefighting crew and Affuso was called, her mother, Lupe Zamora, took over care of granddaughter Miranda, 11, and grandson, Caleb, 8. The school district knows the drill and accommodates the family by changing bus stops when necessary. All the legal paperwork is signed and stored in a safe place.

"I told the other firefighters it's good and it's bad news," Affuso said. "You don't want to be away from your family, but what if you trained 13 years to fight fires and then never got to. It's like that now. This is the chance to use what I've learned."

"I knew this would happen sooner or later."

Affuso was born in Ruidoso. Her father, the late Roland Zamora, was a career Army officer. After he returned from Vietnam, the family was stationed in Italy, Germany and Kentucky.

Affuso attended the New Mexico Military Institute, where she earned her commission in the Army. She graduated from Eastern New Mexico University with a degree in sociology and history.

She only joined the Ruidoso Fire Department last year. Her husband had been a U.S. Forest Service hot shot firefighter for 10 years and when the Fire Academy offered courses last year, Affuso decided to find out what the job entailed to better

understand the demands on her husband. After that, she signed up as a volunteer with the Ruidoso Fire Department and almost immediately, a paid position opened up. At first she had reservations, as she would be the only woman on the force, "but it worked out great," she said Monday.

During her 13 years in the Army Reserve, Affuso specialized in nuclear, biological and chemical warfare. She always showed a talent for science in general and chemistry in particular.

"That's a high priority job right now," she said, explaining that she chose that specialty

after taking several tests to help her fit talents to a particular expertise.

"It's a small branch and highly specialized," she said. "I was looking ahead. I saw a real need and I wanted a path less traveled."

For the past three years, Affuso, a captain, has commanded the 369th Chemical Company at Fort Bliss in El Paso, Texas, a mechanized smoke unit.

"They generally obscure a scene with smoke to cover troop movement or bridge-building efforts," she said.

But this time Affuso will be the commander of a unit in

Tennessee, which does the same smoke work as well as decontamination.

"We clean up troops if they are hit with biological or chemical agents," she said. "The unit in Tennessee already has been transferred, so they are not giving me much time to get them ready."

Affuso said she always knew she would join the military like her father, but she chose the reserve because it allowed more freedom and a second or third career as student, wife, mother and firefighter.

"I've been alerted before, but never mobilized," she said.

Affuso said she resents the term "weekend warriors" for those in the military reserve.

"We have to be as proficient as (full-time soldiers) and do it with two days a month and summer training," she said. "(Reservists) have completely different lives somewhere else, but they have to be as good as those on active duty."

Affuso said the Army's current approach is to create task forces composed of slices from the Army, Air Force, Marines and other branches.

"So if you need air support or ground pounders (Marines), they're right there," she said.

She favors the volunteer army concept instead of a draft.

"You need people who are committed to a task and purpose and know why they are there," she said. "Attitude is a big part and no one likes to be forced to do something, especially military service, where it could be a life and death situation."

Affuso doesn't know how long she'll be gone.

"They don't give a specific time period. They say from six months to two years," she said. "Right now all I know is that I will pick up the Tennessee unit and move to Fort Hood, Texas,

the mobilization site and last chance for training and weapons qualification. From there, we ship to wherever we're assigned."

Keeping in touch with family has become easier over the years with E-mail and the Internet on ships and special free telephone service on weekends in Saudi Arabia, she said.

Her children are proud of their mother, but don't want her to be gone, she said.

"We've always played it straight with them and said it could happen; Mama could go, that's her task, her purpose," Affuso said. "Because of that, they pay a lot more attention to CNN and other news than most children."

The governor bucks city hall with part of his tax plan

While everybody professes to hate taxes, few in government want to make the hard choices about how to cut them.

Gov. Bill Richardson already is running into that sad fact, even if he is sincere in wanting to cut income and capital gains taxes and eliminate gross receipts taxes on groceries and medicines.

Leaders of neither party in the Legislature are expressing much optimism about meeting all the governor's goals during the just-convened 2003 session.

Republicans would like to help, they say, because they love cutting taxes. Democrats are skirting the issue in deference to their newly elected governor, but humbly suggest that the governor's \$90 million pack-

age of tax cuts can't be recouped by streamlining state agencies.

The governor's plan to cut income and capital gains taxes seems to get some positive vibrations in the Round House. It's different with the sales tax on food and medical bills.

Municipal governments in tourist communities across the state learned long ago that the easy way to finance services without major pain to local residents is with the tax on sales — let the visitors pay the bill.

When the governor talks about substantially reducing the source of gross receipts revenue, that cuts close to the bone in every municipality in the state, including Ruidoso.

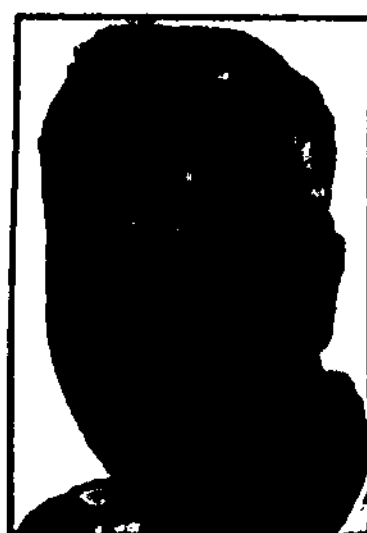
Tourist-based communities would as soon he look elsewhere.

That's valuable exposure, in contrast with the kind of attention we got when that other guy was governor, Gary what's-his-name.

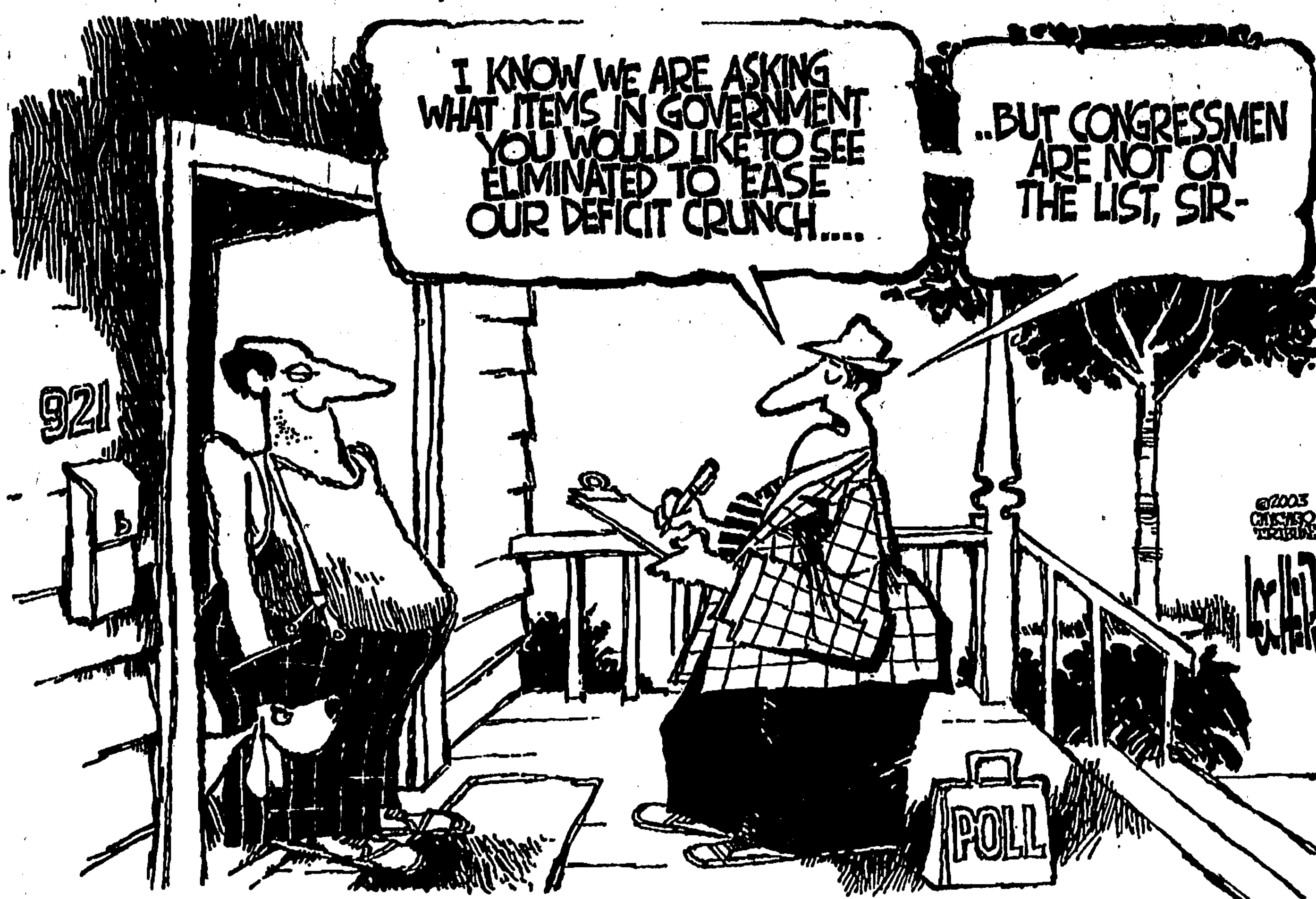

First, Mr. (Jim) Riggins was never "encouraged" nor asked by the Board of Directors to work an additional 20 hours per week. Mr. (Keith) Adkins was not hired to run shelter operations, but has been forced to step in due to "family medical leave" taken by another shelter employee.

Mr. Adkins was hired as the executive director. He just happens to have 30 years of management experience and a master's degree in finance. We feel fortunate to have acquired his skills and note that he also has a genuine love for animals.

Change is rarely easy. We have been and are taking steps to bring a professional acumen to this business and improve the care and comfort of the animals. Unfortunately, the Humane Society ... has never been a "no-kill" facility, as stated. Until this community truly embraces a spay/neuter philosophy, we must remain one that does the best it can for the 2,000-plus animals that are brought to us each year. Our spay/neuter discount vouchers are having a positive impact on the number of unwanted animals born. An additional 50 vouchers were issued in December, over and above the 45 issued each month.

We invite the public to inspect our shelter with your eyes, ears...and nose. ## GRT down in October, up for year

Revenue generated by gross receipt taxes paid in Ruidoso during the month of October was down slightly from last year, although the village is ahead of the fiscal year-to-date figure for 2002.

Village Manager Lorri McKnight said in December she received a check from the state Department of Finance and Revenue for about \$455,000, down from \$493,000 last year. The checks arrive about two months after collection.

"But we're still up \$166,000 over last year at this time," she said. "I don't have

November's check yet. I hope it's up. Based on what we saw in town in December, we think it will show an upward trend."

The weather cooperated by delivering a Christmas-week snow that enhanced skiing while allowing shoppers to bask in warm sunlight while their children went sledding.

September's tax on sales and services was the largest amount ever collected locally in that month at \$780,100. The year-to-date amount at that time was \$3.443 million compared to \$3.237 million last year, putting the village \$205,000 ahead. The September tax probably bene-

fited from the Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally, which registered the largest participation numbers in its history.

Before the start of the 2002-2003 fiscal year on July 1, McKnight - then finance director for the village - and former manager Alan Briley warned the council that gross receipt taxes were lagging behind previous years and they worried about the eventual budget impact.

But until October, the checks reflected an upward trend. Because Ruidoso is a tourist-based economy, its ability to serve residents, to pay its debts and to obtain goals rises and falls with the gross receipts tax.

## Auditor finds five county financial slips

Two special funds under the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department sparked criticism from the county's auditor in his 2001-2002 report Tuesday.

Dan Austin told county commissioners that he cited five criticisms in his current year findings from an audit conducted from August through Nov. 15, although he said the county is in "better shape than in the past."

Two departments that required transfers from the general fund to cover deficits were corrections and the road fund, he said. The road department ran a \$91,000 deficit and corrections a \$775,000 deficit of expenses over revenues.

In his first audit finding, Austin wrote that the sheriff's seizure fund is classified as a trust fund.

"I've never seen it handled that way," he told commissioners. The Government Accounting Standards Board and New Mexico statutes require the fund to be accounted for as a special revenue fund, subject to budgetary oversight, he said.

County Manager Tom Stewart said state statutes that the county was following changed on July 1, 2002, and he will bring the fund into compliance by following Austin's recommendation. Previously, the county changed the fund to the district attorney and the sheriff, he said.

Austin also disagreed with the handling of cash on hand by the narcotics unit that was not reported to the county treasurer and caused inaccurate cash balances to occur.

The treasurer is responsible for all county money, and the sheriff's department should reconcile cash records monthly and provide the information every month to the county treasurer for reporting purposes, he said.

In the county's response to Austin's citations, officials wrote that the treasurer will ask the sheriff's department to receive the annual audit of the drug enforcement grant and to furnish a monthly audit to account for cash on hand in the county's financial statements.

In other criticism, Austin cited:

- The incorrect payment of overtime during a holiday period when 40 hours was not worked during the weekly pay period. He suggested modifying the county policy to grant authorization to Stewart to pay overtime under special circumstances to protect public safety.

- Three payments for patient services under the medicare indigent fund were approved when all items required to be reviewed to determine eligibility were not present in the claim file. He suggested that a checklist be assembled and followed.

- A lack of an adequate prisoner receivable accounting system at the county jail in Carrizozo and failure to monitor past due and disputed accounts. He recommended an accounts-receivable procedure be developed. County officials responded that one requiring all departments to send a copy of invoices to the treasurer is being developed. A tracking program will be used to show outstanding receivables.

## 'Stranger' Danger program getting support from police

Doris Huskey of the Ruidoso Noon Lions Club is adamant in her support of "Stranger" Danger! programs in the Ruidoso area. She emphasizes the word "stranger" is put in quotation marks because an abductor is not necessarily someone a child does not know already.

In cooperation with police departments and other sponsors, the "Stranger" Danger! programs offer a 15-minute introduction and video of what kids should do if they're approached. The program also offers fingerprinting of children for parents to keep, update and put to their personal files.

The program urges parents to know where their children are at all times, use a family code word, and let their children know that it is OK to

run, scream and draw attention if uncomfortably approached.

"Children shouldn't live in fear," says Huskey, "they just need to know their parents and guardians care about them."

Huskey warns about the lures that child molesters and abductors might use to get children to go with them. These include money, presents, candy and pets.

According to the National Child Safety Council, children need to know that parents are willing to talk and listen to anything a child may want to report, and to "never underestimate any fears or concerns your children tell you about."

## Forester: Burns ahead of schedule

Piles of forest slash left after tree-thinning operations on municipal land are being burned during the winter on days with low temperatures, little wind and relatively high humidity.

Plumes of smoke rising from the Cedar Creek and Grindstone areas are common as firefighters eliminate the debris in the effort to reduce the hazard of wildfire.

Urban forester Rick DeIaco told Ruidoso village councilors

Jan. 14 the work contracted for along Eagle Creek is complete, way ahead of its March deadline.

"Soon, we'll be opening up the area for people with permits to gather fuel wood for personal use," he said.

Councilors Ron Anderson and L. Ray Naylor complimented the work and Anderson said he appreciated the signs around town letting people know about the controlled burns.

About 25 acres on the south side of Grindstone Reservoir were finished last week and

about 60 percent of the Grindstone thinning and clean-up project is complete, said James Mason, public information officer for the Ruidoso Fire Department. Only the west side of the lake remains to be treated, he said.

While village officials continue to care for municipal land, a cost-sharing program also was initiated for owners of private land who want to reduce the hazard and the U.S. Forest Service is working on the creation of a "fire break" by thinning the national forest around the village.

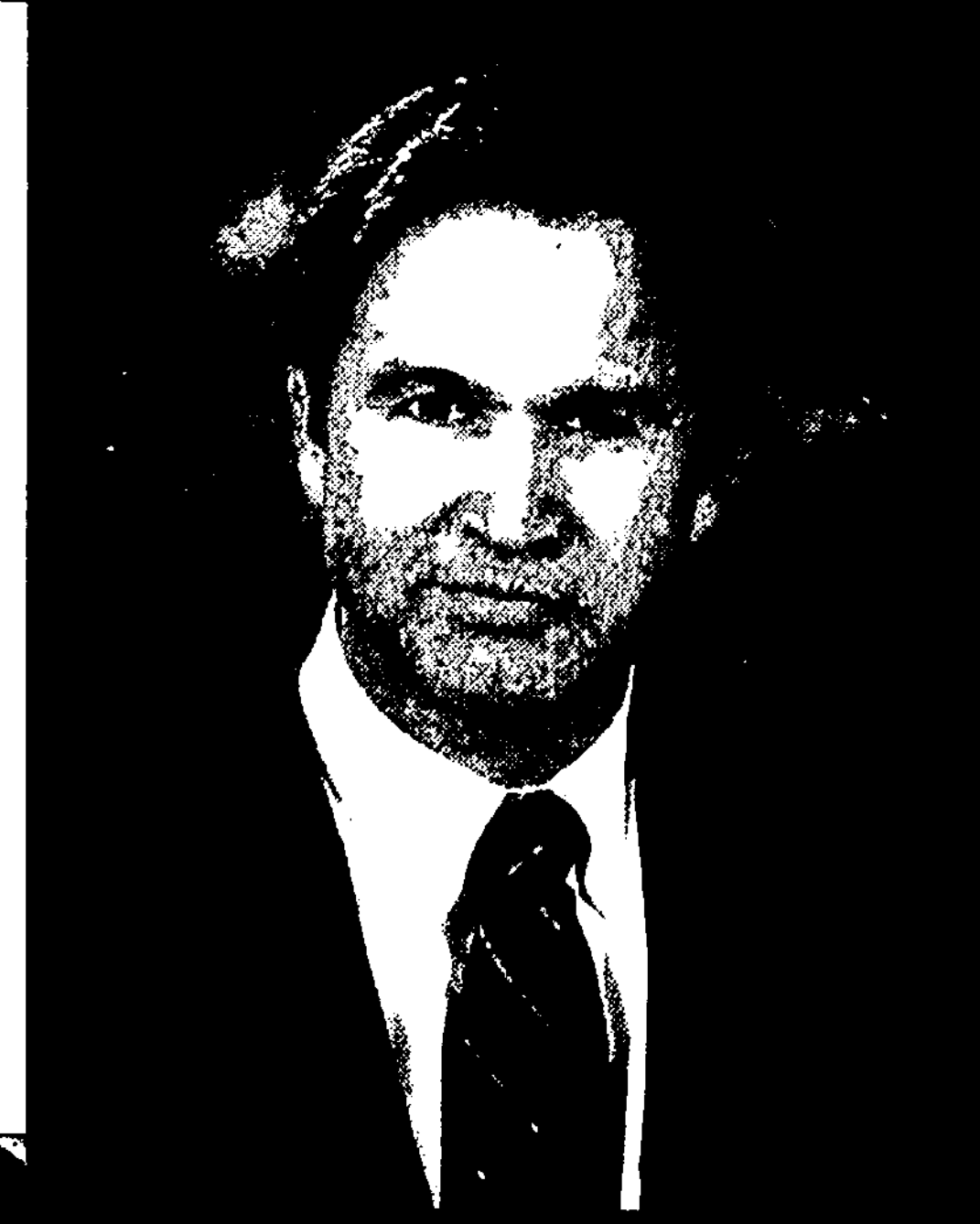

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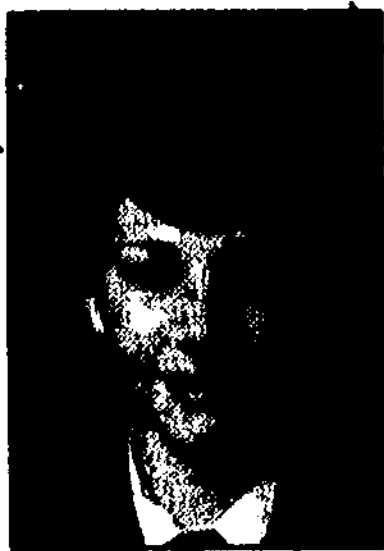

A culture of reading is what principal Frank Cannella is creating at White Mountain Elementary School - and it's paying off in higher reading scores for the whole school.

"Everybody is geared up for reading," Cannella said Thursday while watching students climb the Velcro Wall and jump in the inflated Jupiter Jump, their reward for meeting their reading goals the last nine weeks in the fall. This time, 85 percent of the students made their reading goals, and Cannella sent personal letters to the ones who didn't saying "we need to make 100 percent."

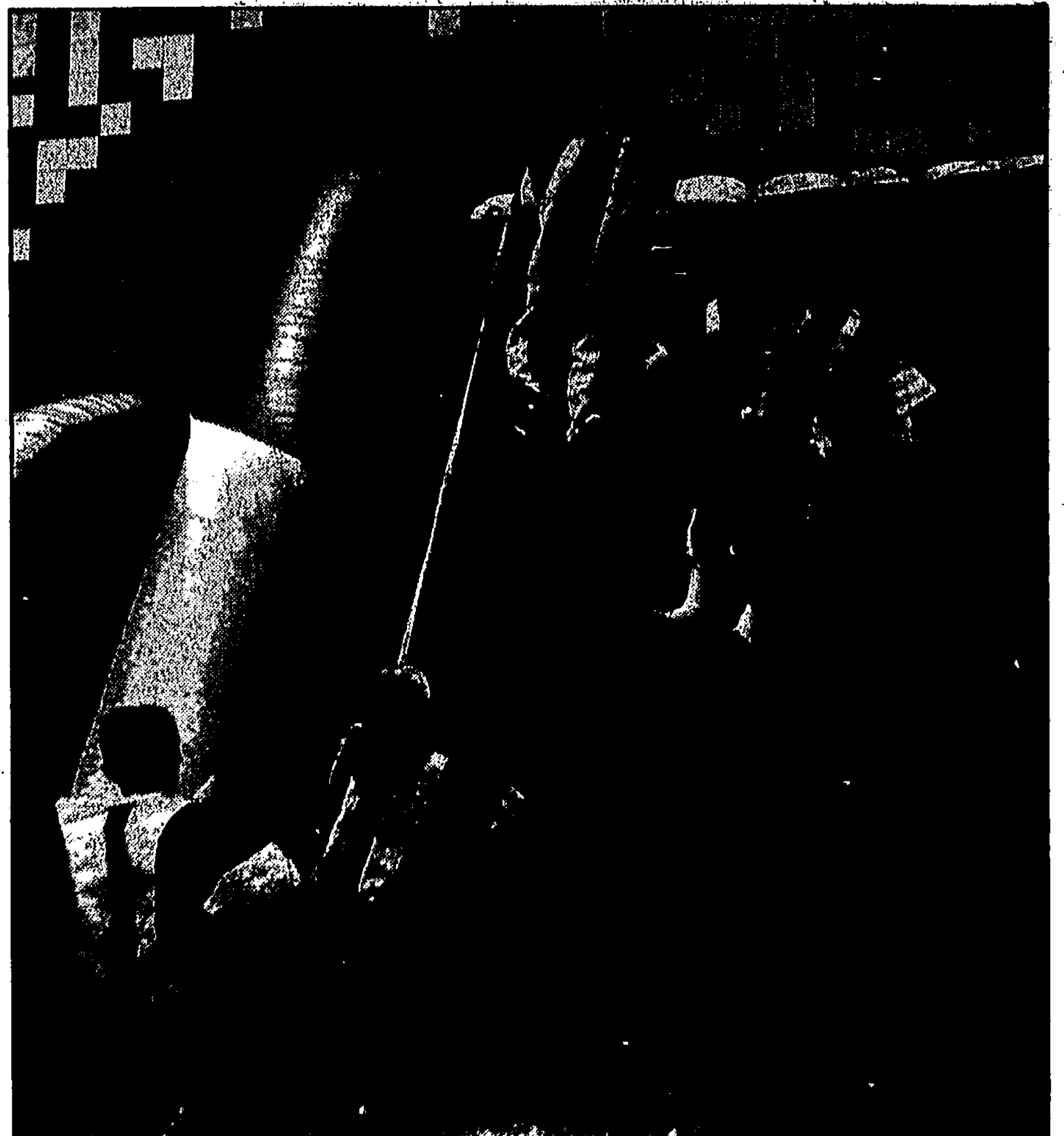
White Mountain Elementary and White Mountain Intermediate schools rented the equipment for two days from Holloman Air Force Base for \$60 per day, paid for out of activity account from selling popcorn and TCBY at school.

The next reward for making reading goals will be ice cream sundaes at Kids Connection in mid March for this nine-week period, but individual classes often have their own rewards, such as pizza parties.

"They like to eat," Cannella said.

Holloman Air Force Base also has a dunk tank and a water slide, which are possibilities for future rewards, and the traditional reward for the last nine-week period is a water fight.

"We're making progress. I look at the percentile rank of kids and it's come up on average 9 percentile points just this first half year," Cannella said.

"I think parents are reading with their kids more. I had parents show the (school) newsletter to their kids and say, 'The principal says you have to read 20 minutes a night at home.' But there are 20 or 30 things we're doing to improve their reading."

One of the things the school is doing to improve reading is working with a text called "Open Court," a research-based reading program. Cannella said the rest of New Mexico will go to this program next year, but Ruidoso didn't want to wait, and now is a year ahead of the rest of the state.

"This is a brand new series based on research the federal government has been collecting on what makes for a successful reading program," Cannella said.

Three White Mountain Elementary School teachers were selected to train other teachers in the state by the publisher, Science Research Associates: Nan Wierwille, Sharla Bishop and Terri Flores.

They'll attend a four-day workshop Feb. 26 in Seattle, Wash., to receive training so that they'll be able to train other teachers in the state before school starts next August. SRA pays to fly the teachers out, and the school will have those trained teachers as resources in the building.

Cannella said it takes a special kind of person to train other teachers: One who is "really good at teaching it in the classroom and good at relating to their peers."

## LCSWA, street names debated in Capitan

**CAPITAN** — Last week's meeting of the Capitan Board of Trustees began with a public hearing to consider changes to the cemetery ordinance. The chairperson of that commission is George Tippin Sr., a relative newcomer to Capitan. The changes requested were not substantive, but rather to clarify some of the language in the original ordinance, by-laws and rules.

This provoked a speech from Angeline Provine, who has been a resident of Capitan since 1946. She stated that the cemetery once had wild flowers in the spring and summer and that she and her children along with her late husband had brought in topsoil to make this possible; however, due to the way the cemetery is currently being cared for, it has become a bleak and barren place.

After about 30 minutes of debate, it was pointed out that the agenda allowed only for change in the ordinance itself and not in the by-laws or rules. The council, after deliberation, realized that the approval of the ordinance was on the meeting agenda. The changes in the by-laws and rules were put off until a later date and the regular meeting commenced.

Things proceeded smoothly through the approval of the agenda, minutes, accounts payable, a presentation by Sergio Castro, who represents the Lincoln County Cooperative, an organization concerned with at-risk youths and juvenile delinquents and the approval of the previously discussed cemetery ordinance.

The fifth item on the agenda was discussion/action on possibly renaming three streets in Capitan. Patsy Sanchez, head of the planning department of Lincoln County, and Connie Stone, the county rural addresser, stated that in order for the enhanced 911 system to work it was necessary that Capitan change the names of four streets.

One of these resulted from a misunderstanding, and the street that was recently renamed Tiger Drive in honor of the Capitan girls volleyball team winning the state championship, passed with no problem. The same was true for the

street named Dockery, which was a misspelling of the name of the developer of this addition to the original town of Capitan. The name was changed to Dockery.

Problems arose when Sanchez suggested that the names of White Oaks Street and Nogal Street be changed. Both the public and the trustees loudly demurred and Don Brothers, who retired from MCI and knows something about how enhanced 911 systems work, evoked the fact from Sanchez that the problem was not the street names, but had to do with problems in the Valor Telecom database.

Sanchez said that Valor's database contained 79 addresses on Lincoln Avenue in Capitan, a street that has four residences on it. The remaining buildings are either governmental or are businesses.

This prompted Mayor Steve Sederwall to suggest that perhaps the problem lay with Valor and not the village of Capitan or Lincoln County and perhaps it should be Valor's duty to fix it.

It was also pointed out that though Capitan does not have home mail delivery, Valor is aware of the physical address of everyone of its customers, since the first thing asked is a physical address when service is requested. Officials with Valor could not be reached.

Item nine, which gave signatory authority to the village clerk to disperse excess rural utility service grant/loan money to chip seal some of the roads that were severely damaged by the contractor when new water pipes were put in, was passed without discussion.

The 11th item on the agenda was a discussion of the benefits of a village lodgers tax to promote the village and other good works. This provoked another storm of pros and cons, despite the fact that lodgers tax does not impact residents of a municipality. Since it was a discussion item, the council elected to have the planning committee discuss it and make recommendations concerning it.

The final issue on the agenda was Lincoln County Solid Waste, which was styled as a discussion/action item. The LCSWA operations supervisor, Debra Ingle, and Don Coleman,

Payne outlined that the cost to pump the McBride Well was no less than tapping into the hydrants to load bulk loads, and the convenience of the hydrants was obvious. All well water goes straight to storage and not to the filter plant. The filter plant is used only for Bonita water

and is currently out of operation, waiting on ordered parts for repair.

Payne was also concerned with the well for the golf course. He said the well is going bad because it's the last of the old turbine wells from the 1970s. Winter watering has been enabled from another well, but in summer when the demand is high, a submersible pump will need to be put in the well at a cost of about \$7,000. Payne also reported that the meter for the courthouse is in hand and should be installed within the week.

During the audience participation portion of the agenda, Cathy McAlister requested the results of the inquiry on the street behind her property. Chief Angelo Vega reported that documentation revealed sections of that street were given to the party in question. Vega indicated that McAlister would be receiving documentation from the attorney.

Vega also reported that the investigation into the possibility of a loading zone at 12th and Central requested by the business located on that corner was denied because of the hazard to through traffic.

Vega's report revealed 76 citations issued in the past month, 53 of those for speed-

ing. Total penalty assessments were \$3,704. Twelve cases were logged, with 10 closed and two pending. Five arrests and one juvenile referral were made.

Also present were Stephen Lee and his wife, Kate Hoover, of the Walking Hat Forge in Estancia. The couple stated they have recently purchased a ranch in Bingham and are looking into the possibility of leasing/buying the old power building in Carrizozo for an architectural blacksmith shop.

The city council discussed options and decided selling was not an option but that a lease would be. They asked Lee to put together a proposal of what he thought he could offer and what repairing the building would cost, and at that time they would meet and try to come to some sort of agreement.

The recreation center report by Jim Mack showed a small loss for the overall center, restaurant side included. Mack pointed out January is traditionally a very slow month, but that things were picking up. He is installing a sound system the end of this month and a light system the end of February. At that time he will open up the center two nights a week for a three- to

four-hour period to the youth for unlimited bowling and pool at a minimal cost.

Mack also reported that Feb. 1 is the first day of the kids' bowling program on Saturdays. He has put in a bid for the Ruidoso Women's Bowling tournament for Feb. 8-9, which will bring in 120-130 women to the town for the two-day event.

In general business, the council:

- Approved the 11 business registrations listed.
- Approved the conditional use application for Glen Mochel with a 90-day parameter to meet code.
- Approved P&Z's application for conditional use for Les Olson to initiate a nursery business at 1001 B Avenue.
- Approved going out for bids on the swimming pool upgrade and repairs.
- Approved of the Open Meetings Resolution.

A presentation by David LaFave and Walter Hill outlined the necessary hydrant repairs and replacements to get an upgraded ISO rating for the fire department and the community. Higher ratings would lower insurance rates for residents as well as the city.

The council then went into closed session with Vega. After the meeting, council recorded complete agreement with Vega to dismiss a mega could of police department. Vega could not be reached for comment on the issue.

## Don't let elevation get you down

"Oh, no my cake just didn't rise to the occasion." I'm sure you have experienced this if you live in the mountains like we do. It takes a little adjustment to make a cake when you live at 5,000 feet or higher.

High altitude presents several challenges when baking. Leavened products, using either yeast, baking powder, baking soda, egg whites or steam, rise more rapidly and often collapse.

The following guidelines will reduce the number of baking failures or partially cooked foods frequently experienced by those living at high altitudes with low humidity.

Leavened Cakes and Breads: At altitudes above 3,500 feet, increase the oven temperature 25 degrees over the temperature required at sea level unless using glass pans, when no increase is needed.

A scant decrease in flour or an additional tablespoon of liquid per cup of flour will often bring a batter or dough to the correct consistency.

Remember these four principles to assure success at high altitudes:

- Decrease leavening in cakes
- Either decrease yeast or allow bread to rise a shorter time when making yeast-leavened breads
- Foods cooked in liquids must be cooked longer
- Cook candy, frosting, and jelly to lower finish temperatures.

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# Mild weather, record tally highlight local bird count

■ The effort was part of a national event to track feathered friends.

Anita Powell was prepared for a repeat of 2001 when she was whipped by frigid winds during the annual Audubon Christmas bird count, but this time, she was rewarded with bright sunshine and a moderate winter morning.

Powell and 18 other volunteers, most members of the Lincoln County Bird Club, recorded the highest number of individual birds in the group's eight years of participation.

"Some were new to the activity, but most were involved with the club," she said. "It's that dependable group that shows up every year."

"We found two new species this year, the Band-tailed pigeon and the Inca Dove. We saw 3,442 birds and 67 different species. That's right in the middle of previous years when the number of species ranged from a high of 71 to a low of 54."

The most frequently sighted bird was the Junco, with various types totaling 954 birds. A good count also was recorded for Pygmy nuthatches at feeders, 54, which is unusual, she

said. Another extraordinary sighting was the Pyrrhuloxia, which is the Western version of a cardinal, with a tufted brown head.

"We had one two years ago. This is only our second one," Powell said.

The tally also reflected that during the expanded week period, not the single counting day, a Golden Eagle, an American dipper and a Sharp-shinned hawk were spotted, Powell said.

A few birds were missing this year, she said.

"I checked our results and found that no one saw any Mountain Bluebirds this year," she said. "We have recorded this species on past CBCs for seven years. Members have seen a decline in both Mountain Bluebirds and Western Bluebirds during the past three or four years. We do not know if this is the result of the ongoing drought or loss of habitat."

As with the other more than 50,000 volunteers nationally, in Canada and parts of Central and South America, they confine the spotting to a 15-mile circle covering 177 square miles. The same circles are used each year, although the number grew from 25 circles in 1900 to 1,823 in 2000.

The primary objectives of the activity is to monitor the status and distribution of bird popula-

tions. The data collected is combined with other information, such as the Breeding Bird Survey, to develop an accurate picture, Powell said. The Christmas count started as an alternative to a traditional seasonal bird hunt. On that first effort, fledgling conservationists were led by an ornithologist.

Groups have a window of Dec. 14 to Jan. 5 to stage their counts, which are not a reflection of true winter bird population, but are considered an "early winter" survey, including migratory activity.

Last year, the birders recorded only 54 species and 2,347 individual birds during the 2001 Christmas Bird Count sponsored by the Audubon Society. They said at the time the strong wind probably kept birds from moving around, making them difficult to spot for the teams that divide up the territory.

Besides Juncos, some of the other frequently recorded birds for 2002 included Mallards at 290, Ring-necked ducks at 117, Pinyon Jay at 136, the Common Raven at 305, Mountain Chickadee at 80, Red-winged Blackbird at 175, Pine Siskin at 135 and House Sparrow at 136. One Great Blue Heron also was sighted.

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# Pearce meets with fort officials

Newly installed District 2 Republican Congressman Steve Pearce, back in his district for the first long weekend since the 108th Congress convened, is setting up a constituent service network that includes offices in Roswell, Las Cruces, Hobbs and Socorro.

Pearce, accompanied by his chief field assistant, Bob Carter of Lovington, was in Ruidoso Monday after opening the Roswell office, located at 1717 West 2nd, Suite 100 (telephone 622-0055).

Pearce met with some Ruidoso supporters of Fort Stanton preservation Monday evening, expressing support for a unified local, state and federal effort, and suggested that they consult with people at Colonial Williamsburg, Va.

"It seems to me Fort Stanton has some of the potential of that preserved location; it's like a living museum," he said in an interview prior to the meeting.

The Congressman also said he intends to make regular tours of the district, to keep in touch with people, and to report on

progress in resolving concerns raised during an earlier tour, made up of hours-long hearings about local concerns.

"We're putting all that information into a computer data base, and we'll track progress in resolving them," he said.

Pearce said he is pleased with his committee appointments - Transportation and Infrastructure, and Resources - and believes they will be important in resolving a number of issues in the district, from continued highway upgrades to endangered species. Pearce also is an assistant Republican whip in the House of Representatives, with a responsibility to help get party votes in line on key issues.

"I've had some good conversations with Sen. Jeff Bingaman about the Endangered Species Act, and I'm convinced that there's a chance to make some bipartisan legislation that will at least ease the conflict," Pearce said. "I believe there's a chance to work together. Heather Wilson (R-N.M. Dist. 1) and Tom Udall (D-N.M. Dist. 3) and I will be getting together to talk about issues and solutions."

Pearce said there had been some

"noise" about a party-line vote removing some restrictions on ethics rules on the first day of the session, but that he had examined the changes closely and felt that they were "reasonable." The floor vote overturned earlier recommendations from the House's ethics committee.

He also acknowledged that his sprawling district makes for a travel challenge.

"I've tried to set up a schedule for every trip, flying into Lubbock for meetings in the southeast, to El Paso for the southwest area, and Albuquerque for the northwest." His district includes Cibola and parts of McKinley County in west central New Mexico.

"And all those frequent flyer miles I'll accumulate really belong to the government; how I use them will have to pass the smell test," Pearce said.

Employees in the Roswell office are Francesca Contreras and Cindy Willard. Contreras said Tuesday that primary constituent services will be through the Roswell and Las Cruces offices. One-person offices in Hobbs and Socorro will provide more immediate contact for constituents in those areas, she said.

# Suspect locks up clerk, robs store

An armed robber locked the clerk of Rebekah's, 2519 Sudderth Drive, in a storage room about 12:30 p.m. Sunday and fled after taking money from the register.

Det. Doug Babcock of the Ruidoso Police Department said that a man entered the business, showed a small-caliber, black-colored semi-automatic pistol with pearl grips to the clerk and

A release by the police department states that other local business owners

He is described as being a white, possibly Hispanic, male between the ages of 35 and 45, 5 feet 5 inches tall and weighing about 150 pounds. He has dark brown, collar length hair, and a mustache, but no beard. At the time of the robbery, he wore brown, tinted sunglasses with

# BLM to auction oil, gas leases today in capitol

Oil and gas leasing rights on 113 parcels totaling 143,813 acres will be offered today by the Bureau of Land Management.

The leases are located on federal land in New Mexico, Oklahoma, Kansas and Texas. The oral auction is set today in Santa Fe.

Interested parties can obtain a bidding number starting at 8 a.m. and the sale will begin an hour later. Only oral bids offered at the sale will be accepted.

Leases will be awarded to the qualified bidder offering the highest acceptable bid, with a minimum price of \$2

per acre. Leases will be awarded for 10-year periods and as long thereafter as there is production in paying quantities.

The government receives a 12.5 percent royalty on production.

The majority of the land for lease is located in New Mexico

with 92 parcels totaling 129,174 acres.

The breakdown for other states is two parcels for 1,875 acres in Kansas, 18 parcels for 12,606 acres in Oklahoma and one parcel of 157.6 acres in Texas.

The sale will be staged at 1474 Rodeo Road in Santa Fe.

# Regional hay producers to meet locally next month

Hay producers from across the Southwest will have an opportunity to see the latest hay and forage equipment and spend an evening with famed cowboy poet and author Baxter Black at the 25th annual New Mexico Hay Association conference in Ruidoso Feb. 6-7.

The conference is sponsored by the association and New Mexico State University's Cooperative Extension Service.

"It's our 25th year, so this will be a conference like never before with a trade show and special entertainment," said Doug Whitney, association president. "We're reaching outside the boundaries of New Mexico to include all hay and forage producers in the Southwest who share common interests and concerns."

Participants will discuss farmer-designed equipment during a workshop session titled "I Built My Own." Other scheduled topics include successful alternative forage crops, how New Mexico water

issues affect crop production and reducing equipment compaction effects on hay stands.

"The heavy equipment farmers use in their fields causes soil compaction and hurts the growth of the plants," said Bill Gomez, NMSU Extension economist. "This session will be particularly important to alfalfa farmers to help them learn how to prevent that from being a major problem."

Lowell Catlett, a well-known futurist and NMSU agricultural economics professor, will give a keynote address on the new farm bill and New Mexico forage Feb. 6 at 1 p.m.

Other presenters that day include Dan Undersander, Extension agronomist with the University of Wisconsin, who will talk about optimizing quality and quantity of hay, and David Peterson, an agronomist with Pioneer Hybrids, who will discuss tillage and farming under pivots irrigation systems.

Black, a humorist who is often featured on National

Public Radio, will perform later that evening.

The following day, Donald Miller with ABI Alfalfa in Nampa, Idaho, will give an overview of southwestern alfalfa pests, weeds and diseases and conduct a pest identification contest. "This display and presentation are phenomenal," Gomez said. "Miller actually shows nematodes in alfalfa roots with a telescope and video camera."

The conference will also feature a look at the future of alfalfa by Peter Reisen with Forage Genetics International in Nampa, who will lead a session on Round Up-ready alfalfa.

A trade show highlighting exhibits of hay and forage products and accessories will be open both days of the conference, which will be held at the Ruidoso Convention Center. Other conference sponsors are Farm Credit of New Mexico and Dow Agrosciences.

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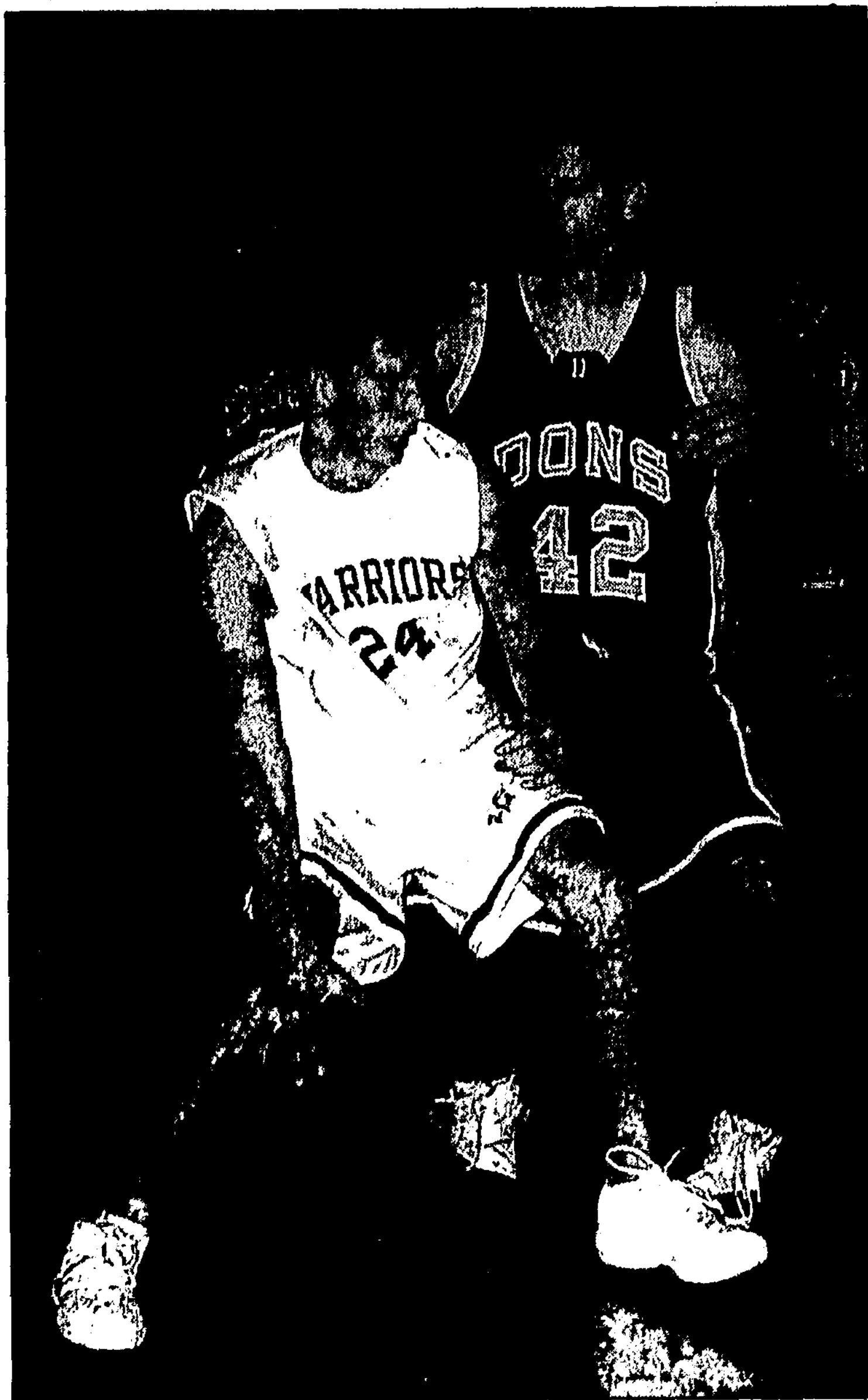
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## Ruidoso can't close, Dons take win in OT

After the third quarter in Friday's game against West Las Vegas, it looked as though the Ruidoso Warriors were well on their way to a big win over a quality opponent.

Ruidoso had just completed a period in which they outscored the Dons 20-4 and had a 17-point lead at the beginning of the fourth quarter.

But West Las Vegas used their laser-like outside shooting to storm back, tie the game and eventually win in overtime, 73-69.

Even in overtime, the Warriors (6-10) saw a chance to win. They had a three-point lead with 2:12 left in the extra period following a Chance Hooper layup when West Las Vegas turned on the afterburners.

The Dons (10-4) scored six points in 15 seconds on a three-pointer by Justin Gallegos, layup by Mike Martinez and free-throw by Aaron Ortiz, who was fouled after stealing the ball on the Ruidoso in-bounds pass.

"I didn't think we were losing control, it was just too fast for me to call time-out," said Ruidoso coach Billy Page. "We had our chances, but we had three turnovers in a row, and it

really cost us."

The two teams were evenly matched in the first half, as the Warriors went after WLV post Collin Reichert — who normally averages in double figures in points and rebounds, but also averages a good number of fouls per game.

"We knew he was a good player, and we knew we needed to stop him," Page said. "Our game plan was to get the ball inside and get him in foul trouble."

The plan worked to perfection, as Reichert sat on the bench the entire second half with four fouls and finished with just one point and two rebounds.

However, one of those rebounds came in overtime when Ruidoso, down 71-69, had a chance to at least tie it with about 15 seconds left. Reichert's offensive board following a miss by Andy Ulibarri gave the Dons the ball with 11 seconds left. The Warriors then had to foul to stop the clock, and Enrique Cavazos' free throws sealed the Don win.

Before that happened, West Las Vegas had a slim 32-31 lead at halftime. Ruidoso went inside to Hooper, while the Dons relied on outside shooting by Cavazos, Martinez, Gallegos and Henry Montoya.

They also had a big man inside as well in Ortiz, who fin-

Rhiannon Monnette and Audra Major each had 11 points, while Gallegos still had a field day from outside, scoring three 3-point shots.

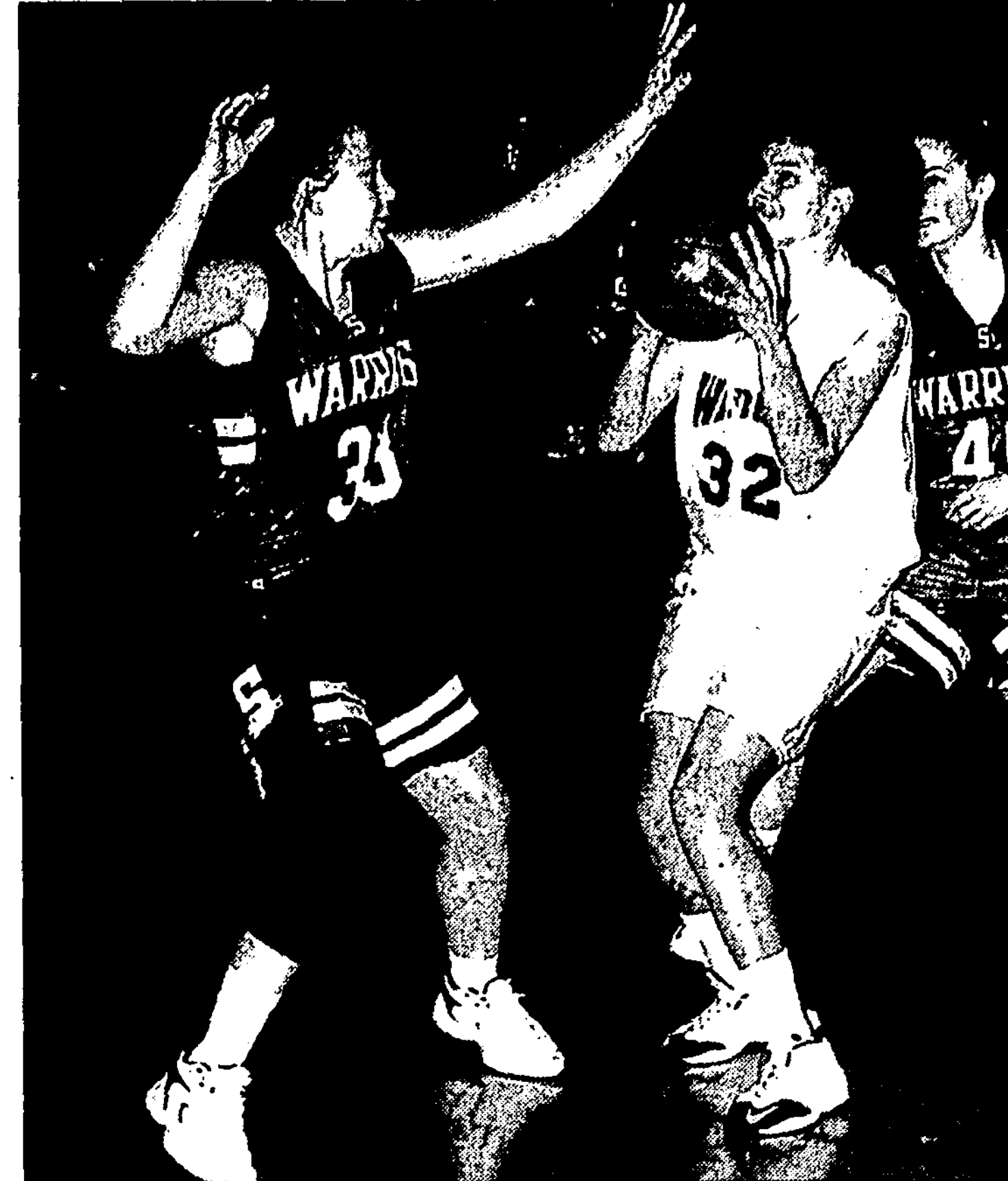
But the real damage was done by Ruidoso, who had too many turnovers to come back from behind.

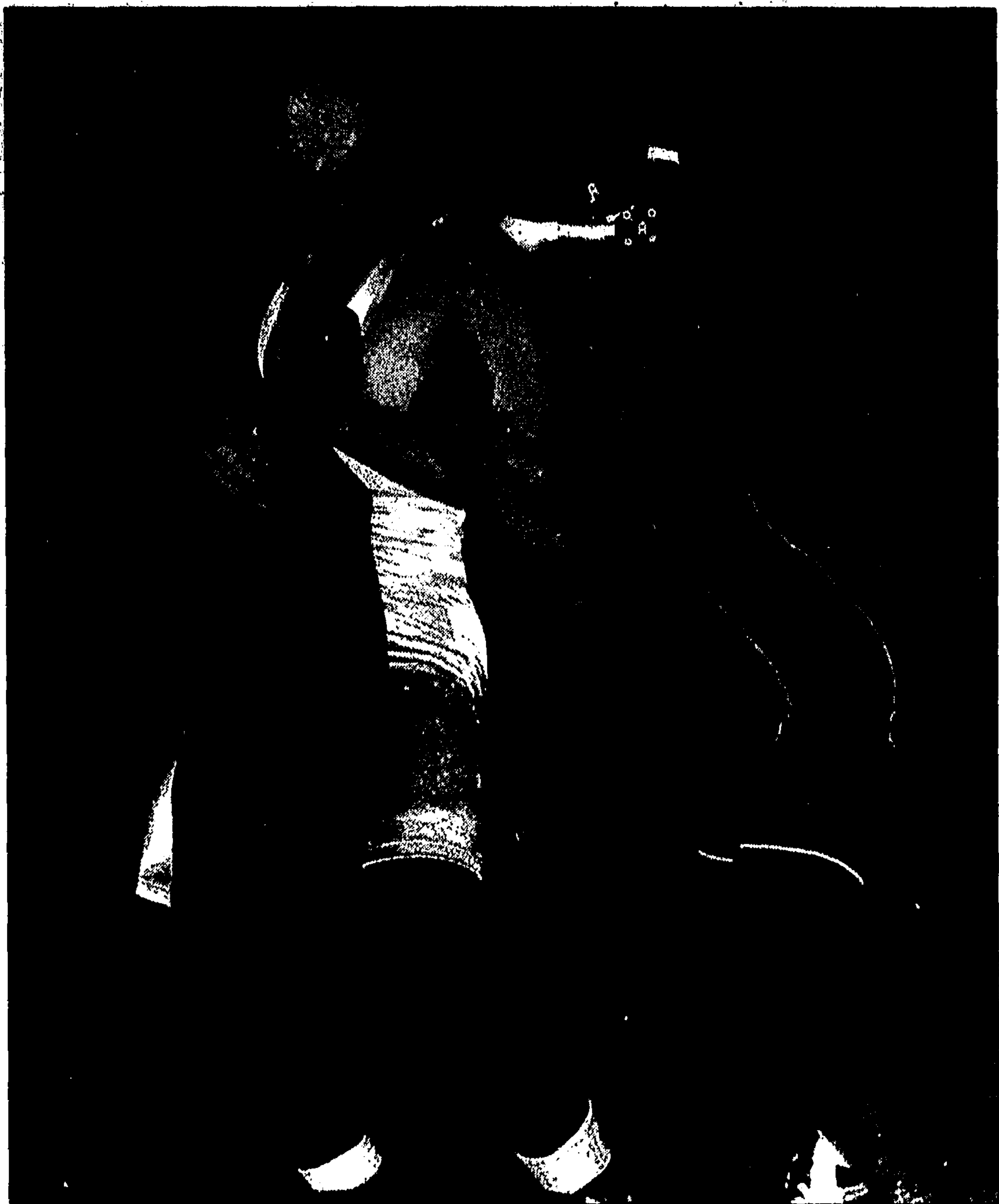

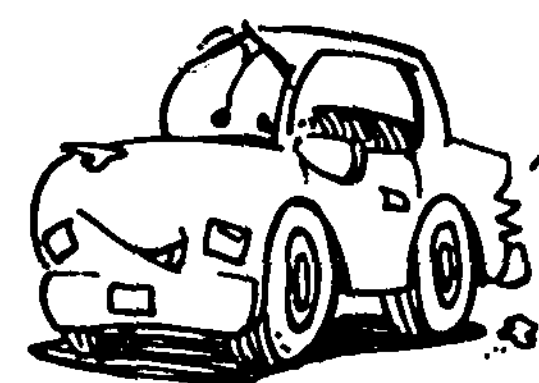
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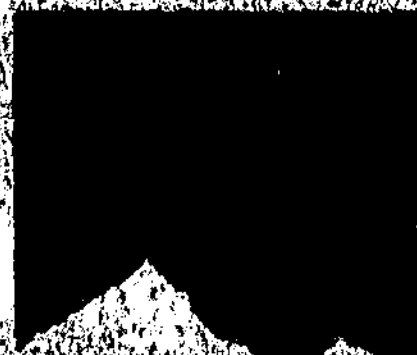
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# Capitan, Carrizozo split in second meeting

Corona played Carrizozo Tuesday, then face a road game against Mountainair on Thursday.

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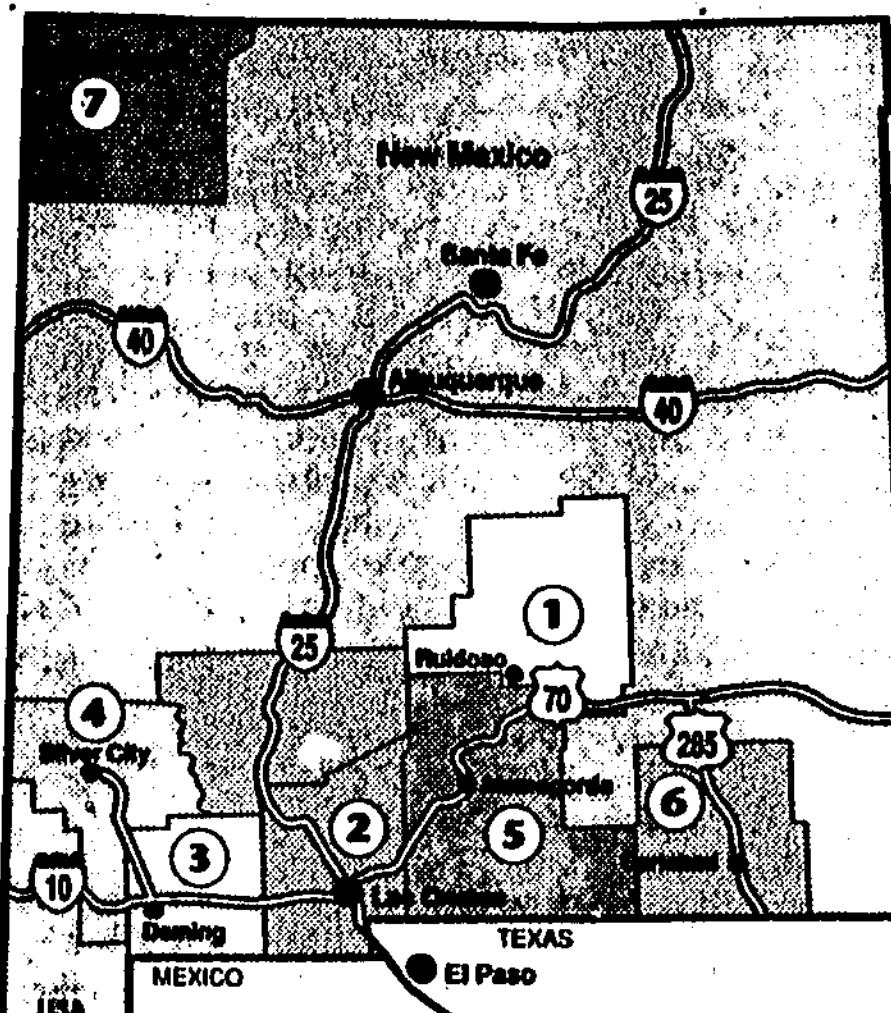

In accordance with this resolution the agenda shall be issued and circulated to the press, radio and other public information media who have provided a written request for such notice and posted on bulletin boards of the City of Ruidoso Downs Hall.

The agenda shall indicate the date, time and place of the meeting, a title of all action items to be considered at that meeting, and a list of any other specified items of business to be transacted. Except for emergency matters as defined by NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1 (F), the City Council shall take action only on items appearing on agenda.

B. Hearings Before the Council At any hearing at which a quorum of the City Council, the City Council will provide notice of the hearing as an open meeting to take formal action and shall issue an agenda as prescribed in Section III (A) or (C) of this policy. Within a reasonable time, but in no case less than 24 hours, prior to the hearing, the City Council also shall provide actual notice to all parties in that case or their counsel and to any other person who has requested such notice of the date, time, location and purpose of the hearing.

If during the course of a public hearing, at which a quorum of the City Council presides, the City Council determines that the hearing should be recessed and reconvened to a date subsequent to that stated in the meeting notice, the City Council will specify the date, time and place for the continuation of the meeting prior to recessing and will conspicuously post notice of the date, time and place for the reconvened meeting near the door of the place where the original meeting was held in the bulletin board in City Hall.

C. Other Open Meetings In between Regularly Scheduled Open Meetings.

If the public interest requires other formal action by the City Council between regularly scheduled open meetings, the City Council may conduct an open meeting at any time. Except in the case of an emergency as defined in NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1 (F), the City Council

will provide notice of each such meeting by conspicuously posting an agenda and a notice of the date, time and location of such special open meeting in the bulletin board in City Hall and by delivering a copy of the notice to the press in the Public Information Office at least 24 hours prior to the special open meeting.

#### (IV) Work Sessions

A quorum of the City Council also meets periodically in "Work Sessions". A "Work Session" is any meeting of a quorum of the City Council, which does not involve any formal action by the City Council. Such sessions include, but are not limited to:

(1) discussion related to the formulation of public policy prior to the formal discussion or adoption of any resolution or ordinance pending before the City Council,

(2) discussions of internal administrative actions concerning the operations of the City Council, and

(3) information discussions between staff and the City Council in preparation for formal discussions or action.

Work Sessions of a quorum of the City Council are open meetings and are open to the public, unless the subject of the work session is included in Subsection H of NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1 and the City Council decides to close the work session to the public in accordance with NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1 (I) and Section II of this policy. Any person wishing to attend a work session of the City Council, which has not been closed pursuant to NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1 (H) and 10-15-1 (I) and the Open Meetings Policy, shall be allowed to attend and listen to the discussions.

#### (V) Emergency Meetings

Emergency meetings will be called only under circumstances which demand immediate action to protect the health, safety and property of citizens or to protect the public body from substantial financial loss. The City of Ruidoso Downs Council will avoid emergency meetings whenever possible. Emergency meetings may be called by the Mayor or a majority of the members upon four (4) hours notice, unless threat of personal injury or property damage requires less notice. The notice for all emergency

meetings shall include an agenda for the meeting or information on how the public may obtain a copy of the agenda.

#### (VI) Council Appointed Commissions, Committees and Board Meetings

Commissions, Committees and Advisory Board of the City of Ruidoso Downs shall similarly issue their agendas by posting on the City Hall bulletin board, furnishing copies to the news media and provide such other notice as may be required by ordinance or law. Such issuance and posting are determined to be reasonable notice.

#### (VII) All other meetings

All other meetings which may be called for informational purposes at which no action is taken shall be held only after written notice is issued to the news media no later than 12:00 noon of the day of such meeting, or four (4) hours before such meeting, whichever is greater.

#### (VIII) Notice Compliance

Substantial compliance with any one of the appropriate foregoing methods of giving notice shall constitute compliance with this resolution and Section 10-15-1 to 10-15-4 NMSA 1978. Nothing herein shall prevent the use of additional means or methods of giving notice of regular or special meetings. Nothing herein shall require new notice of any public meeting for which notice has been given and which is recessed or adjourned. However, in recessing the meeting, the presiding officer shall announce the meeting, the time and place the meeting shall reconvene.

#### (IX) Accommodations

In addition to the information specified above, all notices shall include the following language:

If you are an individual who is in need of a reader, amplifier, qualified sign language interpreter, or any other form of auxiliary aid or service to attend or participate in the hearing or meeting, please contact the City Clerk at City of Ruidoso Downs City Hall at least one week prior to the meeting or as soon as possible.

#### (X) Validity

If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this resolution shall be for any reason held to be invalid or unenforceable, the validity or unenforceability of

such section, paragraph or clause or provision shall not effect any of the remaining provisions of this resolution or its application to other situations.

#### (XI) Repealer

All by-laws, orders and resolutions or parts thereof, inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency. This repeal shall not be construed to revive any resolution or part thereof, heretofore repealed.
