Developers of a proposed La Quinta hotel in Mid-town say they will alter plans to conform to Ruidoso height standards and include other modifications in a new application.

Members of the village Planning and Zoning Commission Tuesday denied an application by Jayshree Inc. for a variance to the village's three-story rule. The developer then withdrew a proposed commercial site development plan and will resubmit later. The denial could be appealed to the village council.

Agent Hemal Patel said the original concept covered a four-story structure, but village planner Darrell Bremner pointed out that three motels built in town within the past – ability of the local fire department to

In his analysis of the application, Bremner also noted that aesthetics are involved. The site is to be surrounded by mature trees on three sides, but the hotel site on Chase Drive off Sudderth Drive abuts a residential district to the south and onestory residences are on the west side.

One of those residents, Jo Hudson, said she lives in the Chase Townhouses adjacent to the project and she objected to a height variance.

## Fort board needs applicants

■ Hopefuls will have to convince the governor on their own merits.

People who want to serve as one of three Lincoln County citizen representatives on the newly approved Fort Stanton Development Commission will have to convince the governor on their own

Following the advice of county manager Tom Stewart, county commissioners Tuesday decided not to

endorse any of the applicants for the appointed positions. "We've been inundated

with names," Stewart said. The board, which was created to guide the development

and preservation of the 1855 fort northeast of Ruidoso, will consist of seven members, including the county commission chairman or designee, the mayor of Ruidoso or designee, the Secretary of the state Office of Cultural Affairs or designee and the state historic preservation officer or designee. The other three will be citizens appointed by Gov. Bill Richardson.

Application forms are avail-

able at the county commission office in Carrizozo or from the governor's office in Santa Fe.

"There's no time limit, but the law goes into effect July 1," Stewart pointed out "They (applicants) probably need to run on their own merit."

Nisha Hoffman of Fort Stanton Inc. submitted 12 names to consider. The list included long-time fort booster Trink Edmunds, Fort Stanton inc. president Tony Hoffman, soil conservationist and historian Hollis Fuchs, rancher Sid Goodloe, educator Cynthia Orozco and County Probate Judge and rancher Stirling Spencer.

## County, station struggle with interference issue

A local FM station was off the air this week. County officials say the black out is linked to the station's interference with emergency services communications. The station manager says an antenna was damaged by the wind.

KNMB FM 96.7 is licensed in Cloudcroft, but is heard in Ruidoso and maintains offices here. Writing on White. Mountain Communications, the owner of the tower, Lincoln County manager Tom Stewart said the continued operation of the station "causes significant degradation to public safety and emergency services.

"You are hereby advised of the significant liabilities that you are assuming for continued operation. If the interfer-

were at the transmitting tower on Buck Mountain Monday trying to fix the problem, but it wasn't resolved, "So I asked that they close the station down."

John Norlander with Key Communications, the Roswell firm that handles the county's radios, said he spent two or three hours on the mountain Monday with station representatives trying to locate the source of the problem.

"They are running at full April 9 to Ken Letcher with power a 10,000 watt transmitter," he said. "Your repeater on Buck Mountain is rated 100 watts max."

> But at this point, he thinks the problem is either a frequency issue or an antennae problem.

"They're running 30 watts into their antenna today (Tuesday) and it's still causing interference with everybody on the mountain," Norlander

"We have been working with county the and Kev Communications to fix any said. "It's not just the county's interference problems that we may be causing. There is all sorts of radio stuff up there. "We're being a good neigh-

bor and making sure we do not cause trouble with anyone else's transmissions, but we haven't been able to solve the problem."

High winds prevented the working at tower Tuesday, he said. The wind damaged the KNMB antenna and other radio equipment there, Keithley said.

"We're off the air because of antenna damage, but we're continuing to work with the county to fix the problem," he said. "We're going back the first of next week to work on it again. Of course, emergency services come first, so we are willing to work with county in any way."

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

Bill Richardson knows how to keep promises, whether he carried Lincoln County or not in the general election — which he didn't.

The governor has signed off on some \$1.7 million for capital outlay projects in Lincoln County, a substantial amount, considering he got just 2,575 votes to Republican John Sanchez's 3,303 votes in last November's general election. That comes to a \$660 return to the county for each of his votes. And \$400,000 of it was by the governor's own doing for renovation of Carrizozo's falling-down town hall. Another bill added \$20,000 to the kitty.


The bounty also can be credited, we suspect, to recent redistricting of the House and approaching redistricting of the Senate. Three representatives looking to future elections have triple the clout of one, even if that one is our own Dub Williams.

Letters to the editor remain an enduring part of newspaper publishing, because they unequivocally give readers a

chance to express their own viewpoint their about community, their life, the society we live in... The ground

rules for letter publication are ASIDES printed in every edition **KEITH GREEN** on this page,

but as with any rules, no list can cover every eventuality.

To review the key "don'ts": We don't knowingly print falsehoods. We don't publish letters that aren't signed. We don't print addresses, with rare exceptions, but we do print the hometowns of the writers. We don't permit the use of pseudonyms or first names only, because we believe a writer should stand behind his or her statement...that they shouldn't try to hide their identities. It has happened, on occasion, that the content of an unpublished letter has become the springboard that leads to a substantial news story. In that context the newspaper welcomes any letter - signed or not – but with no promise to publish. Almost every newspaper has as part of its mission the duty of "government watcher." That role, in fact, is very nearly mandated in the First Amendment of

the Constitution; it is one small edge that the public has in dealing with the overwhelming power of government.

(No wonder, then, that between government and press there always will be an adversarial relationship.)

The flip side of that coin, however, is that the press in turn should not abuse its power. That is why we don't accept for publication letters attacking individuals or private businesses.

For example, we do once in a great while receive a request that a letter be published "exposing" service or conditions at a particular shop or restaurant. We don't publish them, period.

Why? Because - unlike government – patrons have recourse in other ways — in the courts, through refusal to pay, through chambers of commerce or better business bureaus.

And that really hurts.

The Ruidoso News encourages letters to the editor, especially about local topics and issues. Each letter must be signed and must include the writer's daytime telephone number and mail address. The phone number and mailing address will not be printed; the hometown will be. The telephone number will be used to verify authorship. No letter will be printed without the writer's name. Letters should be no more than 300 words in length, of public interest, and free of libel; editing will be for length, grammar or spelling. 

When we worked our way into the emergency room, the physician's assistant diagnosed my wife's ailment very quickly and put in a call for an orthopedist, Dr. Richard Bergsrud, who came immediately. Since X-rays were also required, the PA called the X-ray technician, who also showed up on what was a vacation day to her.


All this expert treatment resulted in our being released after the wrist was put into a cast and further X-rays were made. Dr. Bergsrud was very careful to explain how cautious my wife needed to be and that she should report to our orthopedist in Midland when we returned, which was the next day.

# P&Z gets strict concerning river health

.-. The tenuous health of the Ruidoso River may rule out future industrial uses of land along its shores, even in sections where heavy industry already exists.

Applicant Tommy White, represented by agent Wyatt A. Sparks, asked the village Planning Zoning and Commission for a zone map amendment from commercial to industrial. He also wanted approval of a site plan for the 5.6-acre property near an existing road paving business and the village's street department yard on Close Drive off Gavilan Canyon Drive.

Both items were tabled. Mike Runnels said the

rules of the game have changed since the village is in negotiation with the state Environment Department to improve the condition of the river. If lower phosphorous standards are not met, Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs may have to cough up \$21 million to expand and improve the regional wastewater treatment plant they share. The plant discharges into the river and complaints are numerous downstream about nuisance algae growth.

Mike Runnels, deputy manager for planning and development, pointed out that the land is proposed for a concrete plant, warehouse, outdoor landscape material storage area, aggregate stockpile area and shop building - all

allowed within an industrial district.

But the property falls within the flood plain, he said.

"We're really under the gun in terms of what happens to that river and the way to provide the greatest protection," <sup>\*</sup>Runnels said.

Zoning board attorney Charles Rennick proposed a rezoning to an Industrial **Planned Unit Development to** allow the board more control over what occurs on the land. If simple industrial rezoning was granted, any use under that category would be legal, he said.

"We've been put on notice that suspended solids contribute to the phosphorous levels in the river and that's a concern to this community, to Ruidoso Downs, to the water quality bureau of the state ED and everyone else downstream," Runnels said.

ning and zoning decisions. It's easier to prevent damage to the river than to repair it."

Rennick said the board doesn't have enough information to rezone the property to industrial use, which is the most intense usage classification in the village code.

"It's in the flood plain and immediately adjacent to the river," he said.

He asked for the issues to be tabled, "pending consultation with the environment department and Design Workshop as to whether it fits with the long-range planning." If it does fit, an IPUD would

give commissioners more flexibility and involvement than rezoning and a straight construction permit, Rennick said.


Now I ask you to join me in thanking our citizens for the great sacrifices they have made for us during our first 190 years of history.





# Car costs up from a year ago

**Fuel and insurance price** increases are the major contributors, according to AAA.

The average cost of driving a new car in 2003 increased 1.5 cents per mile from a year ago to an estimated 51.7 cents per mile.

The jump was the most significant since 2000, when driving costs increased 2.1 cents per mile to 49.1 cents, according to the annual "Your Driving Costs" study put out by AAA.

Most of this year's increase is tied to higher fuel and insurance costs, said officials with AAA. The organization's esti-

mate of annual automobile expenses is considerably higher than the 36 cents per mile allowed by the U.S. Internal **Revenue Service.** 

The annual study reports that motorists who drive 15,000 miles this year will spend an average of \$7,754 on auto-related expenses, up \$221 since last year. In 1993, the annual driving cost was estimated at \$55,804 per year or 38.7 cents per mile.

Operating costs such as gas, oil, maintenance and tires, increased 1.3 cents per mile to 13.1 cents because of higher gas prices. Ownership costs increased 7 cents per day from \$15.79 to \$15.86 because of higher insurance costs, according to the AAA officials.

AAA's cost figures are based on a'com-

posite national average of three domestically-built 2003 cars, a subcompact Chevrolet Cavalier LS, a mid-size Ford Taurus SFL Deluxe and a full-size Mercury Grand Marquis LS. The costs are calculated on a four-year 60,000 mile ownership period.

Other study results include that the cost of driving sports utility vehicles and vans increased. AAA officials estimated the cost of driving a 2003 Chevrolet TrailBlazer is 56.1 cents per miles, up 2.3 cents from last year and the costs for a Dodge Caravan SE are 50.3 cents per mile, up 1.2 cents from last year.

The first subdivision bill clarifies that a jurisdiction's comprehensive plan must have clear goals and objectives, and that a jurisdiction without such a plan can't

impose restrictions that are more restrictive than those in the state's subdivision act. Maddox says the bill will keep small municipalities from arbitrarily imposing restrictions on new developments.

The second bill prohibits jurisdictions from bundling contiguous lots with separate deeds, owned by the same owner.

This will keep jurisdictions from applying the state's subdivision act, which requires owners to follow development rules for larger lots, to their set of small properties.

# Carrizozo approves move to 5-day kindergarten for '03-'04 school year

In return the pool could be used by the school for physical education classes, reward parties or any other access the school deems beneficial.

Lovelace pointed out that the pool for this year will be up to compliance for opening in the summer, but major construction won't begin until after the pool closes in the fall. 

# Capitan remembers the life of one of its colorful characters

The passing of Virgil "Pappy" Hall" on April 3 marked not only the passing of a man who had lived a long and fruitful life, but also the passing of a Lincoln County icon and a Capitan "character." Pappy was 92 years old.

It was during WW II that Virgil earned his nickname, "Pappy." He, at age 30, was a tail gunner in a B-29 bomber that saw action from India to Tokyo. He was the oldest member of the flight crew.

After WW II was over, Pappy returned to Capitan and for many years owned in the sky. Hall operated and Automotive, both a garage and later an auto parts house. Pappy's fascination with automobiles, motorcycles and the maximum speed at which

they could travel led to many informal "drag races" with his contemporaries on Highway 380. As an occasional customer learned, to their chagrin, Pappy did not suffer fools lightly. As a mechanic he had few peers, but he did not welcome spectators, particularly those who offered unsolicited advice.

Pappy's other passion was flying and for many years he flew his plane in and around Capitan. It is said that when he reached the age that his eyes no longer permitted him to fly by himself, he would have another pilot take the plane off the ground and land it, while he took the controls Capitan's Volunteer Fire Station is named in honor of Pappy, who was a volunteer firefighter for 47 years and fire chief for 25 of those years.

During the memorial service that was held for Pappy at the Capitan Fire Station April 12, Terry Cox and Pat Huey delivered eulogies. Cox talked of Pappy's dedication to the Capitan Volunteer Department and how he was a stickler for training and a fighter for the equipment he felt was needed.

One piece of equipment, a rescue truck that is still in service, was the first of its kind in Lincoln County and due to this fact saw service throughout the county. Cox also said that Capitan's Volunteer Fire Department is as good as it is today because of Pappy Hall's dedication. Cox also noted that after 47 years of service to the community, Pappy retired from the fire department without receiving any compensation. Huey, another well-known

character in Capitan, spoke of the time that a newly elected mayor of the village called Pappy into his office and told him he was fired. Pappy's response was, "you didn't hire me and therefore you can't fire me." After much wrangling and political shenanigans, which included an investigation by the state Attorney General's Office, Pappy's response proved to be the correct one.

Another story came from when Pappy retired and turned Hall Automotive over to his son, Virgil Hall Jr. He continued to drive a truck around the village until his eyesight became so bad that service. he could no longer have a driver's license. For most people

this would have been a cata-

strophe, but Pappy continued

drive from his house to the

store and post office on one of

three tractors: A summer tractor, a winter tractor and what locals called his "sports car," which was actually a garden tractor. Local residents all knew to take great care in driving and crossing streets when Pappy was on the road. Pappy's love of speed and adventure caused him to ski Sierra Blanca until he was 75 years old.

Cox presented a proclamation from Mayor Steven Sederwall that dedicates April 3 as "Pappy" Hall Day in the Village of Capitan.



# P & Z approves request for church group

#### BY DIANNE STALLINGS RUIDOSO NEWS STAFF WRITER

If members of a church group can produce ħ. a binding agreement guaranteeing enough parking spaces will be reserved for their use, an amended site plan for their operation can be approved administratively by Ruidoso's planning staff.

Contingent on that agreement, the village's Planning and Zoning Commission Tuesday approved the application submitted by Adriana Castro as agent for Velma McCollum, owner of the Holiday House motel and restaurant.

She explained that only two to four rooms are rented in the motel, leaving ample space for church activities. The motel will have 45 spaces available, not counting parking at the restaurant or on the street and leaving 41 spaces for the church.

Officials with Communidad Christiana

church anticipate starting with a congregation of about 50 members and parking would accommodate 164 based on per car occupancy, the planning staff concluded. Castro said the current membership consists of 18 adults and 25 children.

But Charles Rennick, attorney for the commission, said the situation could change if the motel was sold by McCollum and the new owner renovated the property and started renting more rooms each night.

"I don't think the parking issue was answered," he said. "I consider this application still to be incomplete." A parking plan is needed differentiating between motel and church spaces, he said.

Castro said if at a future date, parking became an issue, church officials would find a new building.

"We need something in writing that the spaces can be used by the church as long as it is leasing the building," Commission

Chairman Glen Barrow said.

In other zoning action, the commission:

• Approved a variance to allow construction of a 350-square foot addition within 12.6 feet of the rear lot line, when the standard setback is 20 feet. The application was submitted by Shaelen Morrison of Las Cruces, represented by agent William Jakse. The quarter-acre lot is located on Catron Road in Forest Heights subdivision.

• Approved a variance to allow construction of a deck within 9 feet, 7 inches of the west side lot line when the standard setback is 10 feet. The application was submitted by Ron Burkett of White Sands Missile Range, represented by T.C. Collins. The .24-acre property is situated on Flume Canyon Drive and Black Forest Road in Black Forest subdivision.





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## \$10,000 reward offered in search for wolf-killers

RUIDOSO NEWS STAFF WRITER Officials with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service hope a

\$10,000 reward may prompt someone to step forward with information about the latest shooting death of a Mexican gray wolf in the Green Peaks area of the Apache-Sitgreaves National Forest.

The reward also is a standing offer for information leading to the apprehension of any individuals responsible for the shooting deaths of any of the wolves reintroduced into the wild since 1998, said Victoria Fox with the Southwest Region of the service based in Albuquerque.

During a routine aerial surveillance and monitoring flight on March 8, wolf recovery team members picked up a mortality signal from the Cerro Pack alpha male's radio collar, Fox said. The signal pinpointed the exact location of the body along Forest Road 117, south of Highway 60,

The killing of a Mexican gray wolf violates federal and state laws, Fox said. Violations of the federal Endangered Species Act can invoke penalties of up to \$25,000 and/or six months in jail, or a civil penalty of up to \$25,000.

# Adolescent health often lacking

This is a continuing series of healthrelated columns from the Lincoln County Health and Wellness Council.

For the last four years, I have left my office at Region IX E d u c a t i o n

Cooperative, four days a week, to work at the schools coordinating healthcare for middle and high school students at a schoolbased health center (SBHC) at Ruidoso High School or Ruidoso Middle School, or for students all ages at Hondo Valley Schools.

It is an easy drive across town or through the Hondo valley to the schools. Yet in many ways, the distance is immeasurable. I leave my comfortable, well appointed office with a window, to work in a busy, crowded clinic whether the temperature is either too high or too low, the blare of the intercom system punctuates the day, and the office hours are too short to meet all the needs of the patients. Even further from the reality of my life are the lives of the students I see. Today I saw Freddie and his mom. Freddie is rotund, dressed in filthy clothes, sweatshirt hood pulled up over his head and hands crammed in his pockets. He isn't happy about being in the clinic and shrugs off my attempts to make him more comfortable. I glance through the chart: problems at home, getting bullied in the lunchroom, asthma, falls asleep in class, depression, anger management issues. The list is long and nothing has been resolved. I start with a thorough health history. Eventually I take Freddie in to see the practitioner for a physical exam and so that we

sonal questions. Has he ever thought about hurting himself or someone else? Does he use drugs or alcohol? Does he have any history of abuse or abandonment? He tells us about his dog

can ask Freddie some more per-

and how he likes the dog to sleep on his bed, about Mom's

boyfriend who sometimes hits her when he's drunk, and about how the kids in p.e. tease him about his belly.

We refer Mom and Freddie to the clinic behavioral health provider/counselor to further evaluate Freddie's problems. The SBHC clerk has called Medicaid to check on his insurance status and to find out who Freddie's primary care doctor is and Mom is given his name and phone number to schedule an appointment.

medication and ask him to come back for a check-up next week so he can learn more about how to treat his asthma. Mom and I sit down and make a list of things that need to get done. Our visit with Freddie and Mom has taken well over the appointed 15 minutes doctors have to see their patients - but we have covered a lot of ground. Freddie, Mom and the SBHC have begin building a relationship, and it is on this fragile base that we will work together to start to address some of Freddic's potentially very serious problems.

Students that have issues like Freddie's that aren't addressed in middle or high school might not make it through high school. If they drop out of school, their chance of succeeding in the world is minimal. Helping, a student like Freddie overcome the health and behavneeds them. School-based health centers are uniquely designed to provide this kind of healthcare.

Adolescents are typically less likely to receive appropriate health care than any other age group. Traditional models of care often do a poor job of meeting the complex needs of adolescents. Many adolescent health issues are behavioral in nature – drug use and sexual activity for example. These behaviors can result in significant health hazards and long-term chronic disease.



## Warriors qualified for state tourney

It may have taken a bit longer than coach Eric Eggleston would have liked, but the Ruidoso boys golf team got their third and final state qualifying leg Wednesday with a superior performance at the Hot Springs Invitational at Oasis Golf Course in Truth Or Consequences.

The Warriors put together a 324 as a team, nine strokes better than they needed for state, and 18 strokes better than Deming and Grants, who each tied for second place.

Deming later defeated Grants in a playoff.

"It was good to see Hot Springs (a district opponent for the Warriors) and beat them on their home golf course," Eggleston said. "We also got to see Socorro and Mesilla Valley, both of whom are also in our district."

The only team they didn't see that Eggleston would like to have played against was New Mexico Military Institute. The Colts aren't in the same district with Ruidoso, but will surely be a strong contender for their second-straight Class 3A title come May. "If they (NMMI) play like they usually play, they would have been in trouble on this course," Eggleston said of Oasis. "You've got to hit it straight out here." It was the first time Ruidoso had played at T or C, and that was a slight disadvantage for the team, but not so much that they didn't boast the two best individuals at the tournament. Ryan Shaver was the first-place medalist with a score of 76, while teammate Colby

#### Gibson was second with a 78.

Cody Sisson scored an 83, while P.J. Smith had an 87 and Garrett Born came in at 89.

The fact that all players came in under 90 strokes was a major improvement, although Eggleston still feels they can all do even better.

"The first three did their job," Eggleston said. "Sure, we didn't have to count any 90s, but those last three can do better than that.

"Ryan still didn't make any birdies, but he played the course smart, and that's what kept him in the ball game," he added. "He had a conservative strategy, but was aggressive in the execution."

Now that the Warriors know they are going to state, the next step for Eggleston is also pretty difficult --- trying to figure out who to take to Socorro for the district and state tournaments.

Because Shaver is the only player with enough legs to qualify as an individual, Eggleston will likely only be able to take five players to both events --- and it will have to be the five playing their best come May 5. "This means two or three players will have to sit at home for state, and that's a tough decision to make," Eggleston said. "This next tournament could make it or break it for some of these kids." The next tournament is the Piedra Vista Invitational at Piñon Golf Course in Farmington. The team leaves Sunday for the two-day event, to be played next Monday and Tuesday. After that, it's on to district.



## **Cruces wants control of MMC**

City and county heads are dissatisfied with the hospital's management.

LAS CRUCES - City and officials decided county Wednesday afternoon they want to take back Memorial Medical Center from MMC Inc., the nonprofit group that now manages the hospital.

Members of both the Las Cruces City Council and the Doña Ana County Commission met in an emergency closed session at City Hall to discuss the hospital's ongoing financial problems, and both entities' growing frustration with MMC lnc.

In a short statement read by

the Board of Directors of Memorial Medical Center to develop a solution to the hospital situation and look at solutions, including the return of hospital assets to the city of Las Cruces and Doña Ana County," Curry said. 

He later clarified, saying "the final determination if the hospital will be operated by the city and county has not been made, we feel at this time the immediate first step is to get the assets back, and for the county and city to begin to operate the hospital until we can come to a permanent solution."

This could mean the city and county would retain the medical staff at the hospital in order to ensure the least possible disruption of services, he said.

Mayor Bill Mattiace, a vocal

critic of MMC Inc. manage-

City Council three years ago,

said if city and county man-

agement of MMC "is necessary


to safeguard the full services

at the hospital, we will do that."

"Whatever it cakes to ensure the care of patients. But just not with the present management," Mattiace said.

Curry said he and the members of the City Council and County Commission came to this decision in light of "the financial crisis" at the hospital resulting in the closing of Promptcare at the end of this month, the closure May 31 of the First Step Women's Clinic and the obstetrics program "and whatever else lies around the corner."

"We are concerned about their ability financially to provide a full range of services. In my mind the issue of solvency is obvious from the closure of these important functions. The real issue is the patient care for our citizens," Curry said.

HOLLOMAN AIR FORCE BASE - Twelve-year-old Nicole Toomey looks up to her father, Lt. Col. David Toomey, as her inspiration to become a pilot, she said.

Wednesday afternoon was the first time Nicole saw her father in about two and a half months, she said.

Her mood was "just happy, excited. You can't really explain it," she said to the media.

Plans for the surprise bombing, focused on Saddam Hussein and Iraqi government leaders, was "really a bolt out of the blue," he said.

Hinote was in charge of sending Toomey and Maj. Mark Hoehn, 35, on the first mission, he said. When the chaos died down and Hinote finally had a chance to sit and think, he became really tense, he said. "My heart was in my throat. I knew if things went wrong, I'd have to come back and tell their wives." But nothing went wrong. Key Spouse Lisa McKeon, whose husband is still deployed, said it just takes a little faith that they will come home safely. When husband, her Commander of the 8th Fighter Squadron Lt. Col. Matt McKeon, returns, Lisa said she wants to ask him a lot of questions like, "Who did

your 'laundry? What did you eat?"

> Toomey said all he wants to do is sit on the couch, go out to eat and spend time with his children, Christopher, 4; Lauryn, 9; and Nicole, 12.

"I want to go home and be a family again," he said.

All the stealth pilots interviewed said they were very impressed by the support from the community and base. Hinote and another pilot received a standing ovation, hugs and handshakes at **Cottonwood Christian Church** 

the morning after his return, he said.

"Alamogordo has one of the best, if not the best, community support."

And Hoehn agreed. It's awesome to drive around town and see businesses, schools and homes decorated, he said. "It means the world to us," Hoehn said.
