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A Ruidoso woman said the man who kidnapped and robbed her never scared her: He just made her "madder than heck — so mad I could squeeze a grape." Ruidoso police are looking for the man who abducted 79-year-old Bessie Ellis between 10 a.m. and noon Thursday.

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like a gun against her. She had looked around the car before unlocking all the doors, but apparently he was hiding behind it, she said.

"He said, 'Don't do anything foolish and you won't get hurt.' I said, 'I'm hurting already,' and he loosed up," Ellis said.

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Capitan mayor under fire as LCSWA chairman asks him to leave board

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by advertising for a manager and telling other applicants they were over-qualified, then selecting Ingle under the lesser title of operations supervisor, which unlike the manager, cannot be fired at the will of the board.

Coleman responded that then-chairman Modesto Chavez said no applicant was told he or she was over-qualified. Out of five applicants, only Ingle was qualified because of the requirement for at least one year of solid waste experience. That included her time on the board.

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Coleman responded that Ingle, as chairman, oversaw the operations from May 16 to June 30, 2001, to Nov. 16, received only paid expenses based on \$20,000 designated in the budget. She was hired with that same figure until Jan. 1 when Chavez and other authority members performed a mid-year budget review and increased the salary. The same action would have occurred for Ingle in the position, he contended.

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Slot machine supplier sues tribe

■ Gaim-Ko Inc. is claiming breach of contract over several machines at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Gaim-Ko Inc. is suing the Mescalero Apache Tribe, the Tribal Council and tribal attorney Gregory Quinlan for civil rights violations and breach of contract.

The company, which supplied slot machines for the tribe, is asking the court to order the immediate release and return of gaming equipment leased from Gaim-Ko and for money damages based on an amount that would have been paid if the lease continued until the return of the equipment.

The case was filed on Nov. 22, 2002, in the U.S. District Court of New Mexico and assigned to U.S. Magistrate Judge Karen B. Molzen, but was transferred Dec. 5 to U.S. District Judge Martha Vazquez.

Also named as defendants were the National Indian Gaming Commission, tribe treasurer Tom Gallagher, tribal administrator Ferris Palmer and tribal police officer Alfred La Paz.

The suit was filed several months after the Internal Revenue Service denied Gaim-Ko's claim of \$18.66 million in deductions for losses and expenses and rejected \$1.5 million in deductions claimed by owners Raymond A. and Charlotte S.

Gallegos. The agency ruled that an additional \$2.2 million in taxes is due from 1997 and 1998.

According to the lawsuit filed by Gaim-Ko in federal court, the tribe leased the gaming equipment on Dec. 29, 1992, but stopped paying in November 1998 through the end of the lease period of Dec. 19, 1998. Long-time tribal president Wendell Chino died in November 1998. A new administration took over and started buying its own machines for the Casino Apache operation.

"After the expiration of the lease, (tribal officials) unlawfully converted to their own use and the use of the tribe, the property of Gaim-Ko, including numerous gaming machines, resulting in further lost profits and business opportunities for Gaim-Ko," the suit states.

The tribe never exercised an option to buy the machines, according to the suit.

The suit also accuses the tribe of conspiring with federal officials in the confiscation of Gaim-Ko equipment without compensation and without due process of law, and in the unlawful search and seizure of Gaim-Ko's equipment and records located at the tribe's gaming facility.

The suit contends the Gaming Commission and its inspector, Ken Billingsley, acted unlawfully in those actions, violating the New Mexico company's civil rights and other federal laws.

On Nov. 25, 1998, without notice or due process and without following provisions of the tribal constitution, tribal and federal officials "acted jointly to remove Mr. A. Raymond Gallegos, president of Gaim-Ko, and his wife from the (reservation) through a tribal council resolution," the suit states. No action was taken to rescind the lease. Company representatives also were banned from the casino and their keys seized without notice or warrant, the suit claims.

The Gaming Commission never issued a subpoena or other process allowing the tribe to maintain custody of the machines, the suit contends. Tribal officials have refused to release the machines, although the NIGC no longer has any need for them and rescinded the request for the tribe to retain possession, according to the suit.

Although no dollars figures were included in the lawsuit, previous reports indicated that Gaim-Ko received \$40.8 million in lease payments from the tribe from 1994 to 1998 and that Gaim-Ko received 35 percent of the take on each slot.

Mescalero officials declined comment on the lawsuit.

The tribe currently is renovating The Inn of the Mountain Gods Resort and the main casino, and is building a smaller gambling operation on U.S. 70 near Ruidoso.

around the hospital he lost him," she said.

Although Ellis could only identify the man from his rear end, she said, several employees of the hospital saw him streak past their windows, and Ruidoso detectives were able to come up with a computer-created composite.

The man was described as being between 35 and 45 years of age, about 5 feet 10 inches, medium build with sandy blond collar-length hair. He may wear prescription eye wear, according to a release by the Ruidoso Police Department. He was wearing a ball cap and his hair may be in a small pony tail in the back. He was wearing a dark-and-light colored plaid shirt, dark pants and a work-type boot at the time of

the kidnapping.

Detective Doug Babcock said the composite was created with the hospital employee who got the best look at the man.

If anyone recognizes this person, noticed an out-of-place vehicle parked in the Nob Hill area, or saw the man running, contact the Ruidoso Police Department at 258-7365.

Ellis said the man took her cell phone apart and threw it at her, but it worked when she dialed 911 after she jumped out of her car.

About taking the risk of trying to communicate with the bank teller, Ellis said, "I'm nearly 1,000 years old. What difference would it make?"

The following day, Ellis was back doing line dancing at the Ruidoso Senior Center.

ed. Sederwall wrote that paying mileage to the supervisor "without one board member checking that mileage" was wrong.

Coleman replied that Ingle's mileage is logged daily and turned into the Authority financial coordinator every two weeks. The board chairman signs the checks and verified the mileage with the finance person, who has been with the Authority for 11 years.

But Sederwall said, "Why should I trust that finance person now if they're saying (former manager Rick Simpson turned in unverified expenses)

and she didn't catch it."

Sederwall contended the joint powers agreement signed by each authority member doesn't provide for proxy votes.

Coleman countered that on Nov. 16, 1992, the authority board adopted a vote-by-proxy provision.

Sederwall questioned why Ingle wrote it would cost \$47,988 to handle billing for the village, when it only costs Capitan \$3,552.

Coleman responded, "The joint powers agreement states, 'there will be no duplication of services,' and that the \$47,988 was the total cost to the LCSWA." The amount quoted as cost to the village would be \$15,521.

Other points in Sederwall's letter not covered in Coleman's response included his contention that a recent vote to retain Ingle was illegal because the joint power agreements require a majority vote of those present. Only two of the five at the meeting voted "yes," he wrote. The others abstained.

The mayor wrote that he also is worried that if any of the applicants who competed with Ingle decided to sue the Authority over her hiring, Capitan would be dragged into the legal battle.

He pointed out that he couldn't attend the last meeting because he was out of town connected to an illness in his family. He wrote he'll be at the next

meeting and "I shall bring my personality with me. We should stop playing the political game, wear our fighting clothes and get down in the dirt with this and end it. Do it legal. Let people apply for the operational supervisor job, do it fair and above board, in an open meeting, looking at applicants, and we will not have this 'personality thing,' as Mr. Martinez says we have."

Martinez previously said he supports Ingle because she brought the Authority out of the red and into a positive cash flow, and is increasing its reserves each month. He also isn't receiving complaints as he did under prior managers, he said.

Downs ETZ aims for April 15 wrap

At least one member feels the board is sacrificing preparedness.

Despite objections from board member Larry Mulligan about rushing to finish an Extraterritorial Ordinance, the Ruidoso Downs ETZ board continued work with two meetings last week.

Mulligan claimed in a memo given to board members that there is "(in)sufficient research or thought" and the need for a briefing from a representative of the Roswell/Chaves County Ordinance, which the Downs ETZ is using as a model. Also suggested is the development of a list of areas that need to be addressed, and that "the ordinance should address the requirements to be considered in planning the development," instead of doing the planning.

Rancher Leonard McCutcheon complained that trespassing was a major problem where his land meets residential development. Again, he voiced his concerns that the board was trying to tell him what to do, and stated he wanted to remain agricultural use.

Chairman Wayne Faircloth and board member Susan Garrett assured McCutcheon that a grandfather and legal non-conforming use clause has been adopted, and that "whatever you're doing today, you can continue doing tomorrow."

McCutcheon asked to come to the next meeting with zoning requests for his land that borders U.S. 70 east of the city.

At the next meeting, McCutcheon asked for C-4 zoning. Because the board has not yet precisely defined those zoning requirements, it was suggested McCutcheon come back at a later date.

A letter from city attorney Dan Bryant identified May 12

as the deadline for the final ordinance to be presented to the joint powers. Faircloth instructed the board to have the document ready for the April 15 county commissioner meeting.

Garrett moved the maximum fine for violations not to exceed \$300, in compliance with the county ordinance. Mulligan suggested the board write a letter to the county commissioners urging them to require mobile/manufactured homes to have a permit before being moved onto a lot.

Mulligan also suggested that phrases like "in accordance with state and federal codes" be more specific. Additionally, he brought up that Lincoln County refuses to participate in the FEMA program, and in doing so recognizes no flood plains. Ruidoso Downs, on the other hand, recognizes flood plains.

He recommended including FEMA maps in the ordinance, and then describing what ETZ will allow in those areas.

Discussions on density, drainage, and the need of hillside and forest protection in zoning district requirements led to the replacement of the Village of Ruidoso's example with the City of Ruidoso Downs ordinance.

Unanimously aiming to avoid the pitfalls of pushing city ordinances onto the Downs ETZ, the board will now look through the Downs ordinance as a format with "some exceptions and simplification."

Mulligan said that the ETZ ordinance should be a "one-stop for the consumer" showing "what we want and what they need to show."

In the development requirements of low-density residential zone requirements, Mulligan pointed out that Lincoln County did not adopt the State Engineer's guide to proving a subdivision has

enough water.

Garrett pointed out that his point needs to be discussed in the subdivision, rather than development, requirements.

Faircloth stated the board just needs an inclusive statement, and that accordance with state and federal codes had already been voted on.

Jointly owned swimming pools and tennis courts were moved from accessory to conditional use, requiring a variance.

The board moved to finish going through R-1, with later discussion. Mulligan dissented, suggesting more preparation.

Development requirements for re-subdividing were moved to the subdivision section. Four houses per acre was adjusted to one house on 3/4 acre throughout the zoning requirements. Setbacks, yard requirements, and minimum width and height standards were examined. City code enforcer Tom Armstrong mentioned that ordinances and subdivisions are expected to upgrade as the state requirements change through time.

"Building area and parking (ordinance requirements) will influence the size of the lot someone wants to buy for that conditional use," Armstrong said.

Mulligan questioned the necessity of regulating landscaping in the ETZ. Garrett suggested regulating run-off, and requiring clean-up of areas disturbed by construction.

Public parks will be allowed by the ordinance in single family residential districts if the county will agree to maintain them. Otherwise, private parks will have to be maintained by a subdivision.

Hillside protection was still noted by Mulligan as not well enough defined.

Meetings were cancelled for this week in honor of the death of former mayor Jake Harris.

YMCA out; rec center alive

The YMCA is out and a government-funded community center is back on the drawing board.

The consensus of the vocal community members at the YMCA meeting Jan. 9 was to abandon the idea of establishing a YMCA - due to lack of corporate backing - and pursue a village and county joint agreement for a community center.

Village councilor Ron Hardeman said he would talk to the village council to set up a workshop with councilors and members of the organizing committee that has been working on the YMCA idea for the past eight months.

"Governmental agencies: Knock, knock. We're on our way," said Paul Wirth, a member of the organizing committee, at the close of the meeting.

About 100 people attended the meeting for the results of 8,000 surveys questioning what the recreational needs of the community are. About 334 replies came back and the biggest needs were for aquatics, especially for swimming laps and teaching lifesaving skills; health and fitness, weight and stress management

and CPR, as well as sports teams and health education.

YMCA representatives conducted 22 interviews with key citizens of Lincoln County and from these rose a concern about the ability to raise operating funds without hurting existing charitable projects.

"Dues only cover 50 percent of the operating expenses, because the Y turns nobody away," said Rick Lurix, who opened the meeting.

Capitan Municipal Schools sent back 78 surveys, showing the need in the county for a community center, and Lurix said a major of the senior citizens who returned the survey said they were "very anxious to use the facility."

Joan Zagone said that the bond issue for community center failed two years ago "out of fear and anger," but it's time to bring it back.

"The Village Council would like to see it coming from the public," Hardeman said. "I think we can do better. As a councilman, I would put my name on the list."

Joe Zagone said the state gave \$200,000 to draw up plans for a community center and those plans are at the Parks and Recreation Department. Joan Zagone said they need to be reviewed to see if they're still viable and costs have changed.

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

Maybe the governor got some bad advice

An end-run around the state Constitution isn't working

Among the irksome problems that have faced would-be activist New Mexico governors since statehood has been the state's biased Constitution.

A problem for governors, you understand — not legislators. The state's constitution writers had a healthy fear of too much power in the hands of one person, so they fixed it so that the Legislature had the real power, the governor left as something of a "chief operating officer," not a CEO.

This has been irksome to many governors, not the least new Gov. Bill Richardson, who asked for resignations from

every regent of every state college and university, even if the Constitution says "regents shall not be removed except for incompetence, neglect of duty or malfeasance."

Today is the deadline specified in the governor's "request" for those resignations, but as of yesterday there apparently had been none. Charitably, the governor might have gotten some bad advice. Or maybe he was testing the power of his perceived mandate.

But the governor must remember that every institution, including boards of regents, needs a modicum of institutional memory.

We axe only one thing of our Legislature

All over New Mexico state legislators have been meeting with town leaders in preparation for their session in Santa Fe.

They are drawing up a wish list for when it comes time to dip into the pork barrel.

A half-million dollar civic center remodeling here, new parking lots over there, funding for a comprehensive program somewhere else. And, oh, by the way, ladies and gentlemen of the legislature, don't forget to cut taxes.

Just about every New Mexican you meet is in favor of reduced spending if you reduce it by cutting the other town's project.

Gov. Bill Richardson has pledged to cut taxes. Know this about Mr. Richardson: He is a young, highly ambitious politician who intends to use the New Mexico governor's seat as a steppingstone to something. Only he knows what.

There is rampant speculation that Bill wants to be President of these United States. We'll see. Wife Barbara has seemingly put the brakes on that notion. Asked about 2008, she told the Albuquerque Journal, "I'll tell you what I tell him, 'That's another life and another wife.' Honest to God. Not by bag."

Strong words. But don't forget the celebrated right of a woman

to change her mind.

Given Richardson's promise and the fact that bipartisan support almost got the job done last legislative session, this could be the year New Mexico's idiotic food tax bites the dust.

Last year, Sen. Manny Aragon, a darling of the northern liberals, teamed up with Sen. Ramsey Gorham, an Albuquerque Republican, to abolish the tax on food purchases. If Manny is a champion of the northern sector of the state, he is hardly popular with southern conservatives.

Be that as it may, his pact with Senator Gorham was on the right track until it got derailed in the final hours of the legislative session. Getting rid of the food tax is an idea long past due.

The simple and unavoidable fact is that the food tax does not burden all people fairly. It is regressive in that it taxes people a larger amount of their income the less income they make.

Plainly spoken, that means the rich guy who just loaded his Lexus trunk with the week's groceries has paid the same tax rate as the single mom with a minimum-wage job who placed two meager bags of groceries in the back seat of a jalopy she hopes will make it home.

So how does the state replace the revenue if it eliminates the food tax? Tax the devil out of cigarettes, beer, wine, whiskey. Here's the deal: people can do without those items, probably better off if they would do without them. They cannot do without food.

Think New Mexico, an independent think tank, says taxing cigarettes at 60 cents a pack would by itself cough \$50.4 million into the state coffers.

New Mexico, which tends to rank highly on the nation's "worst of" lists, does it again in this category. We lead the nation with the highest population of hunger among our people, 15.1 per cent.

Manny, Ramsey, Bill: stick with the program. Axe the food tax.

Board of Directors, Humane Society of Lincoln County:

You've requested my yearly donation (\$100). You'll note your 2003 return envelope is empty. My many donations of money and food have been given in my belief in the "humane" society's humane treatment of animals. That belief is gone. I understand that Jim, formerly the shelter manager, was "encouraged" to accept exempt status (even after his heart attack) and work up to 20 additional hours per week with no increase in pay — he is now gone. (I would be too; how about you?) I'm told that Sandra Ford, the director, (and the gal on the commercials) was demoted in favor of a new director with no shelter experience (but a close friendship/neighbor of Wanda Muhle, board president. Coincidence?).

Since the new director took over, and all the other employees left, I believe the shelter has become a horrible shelter for animals. The new staff's lack of shelter experience is evidenced by the many recent deaths — surely due in part to the moving of adoptable animals back and forth from potentially sick quarantine areas, plus filth, waste, illness and death.

Recently: feces on the human pathways as well as huge amounts in cages, stacks of filthy litter boxes, dirty food bowls filling dirty sinks. It's just common sense, not procedure problems per your Wednesday edition. Broken washing machine? How long does that take? No one shows? Call someone else — common sense.

I brought in my beautiful cat, Harry, as he was unable to bond with my other cats. "He would go only to a non-smoking home, I could follow up, 'no-kill' policy. Animals were...only put to death upon serious illness (Harry was healthy and got along there beautifully) or if they were vicious." Then I was told that he had a cold and was killed, then that he was adopted. Then that the desk person was "...new, knew nothing, and no

one else there knew anything, either."

I am now told that three days ago nine healthy animals were put to death, and that the new director has very definite ideas about what type and breeds are marketable.

My mistake! I thought it was a "shelter" to help homeless dogs and cats of every type, breed and size. Not a market.

My return envelope is empty. I hope others are empty, too. Return the shelter to the way it was with Jim and Sandy...a HUMANE SOCIETY. Then send me another envelope.

Tax help coming from AARP

They're gluttons for punishment, the volunteers with AARP Tax Aid, a program celebrating its 35th anniversary this year as the nation's largest free, volunteer-run tax counseling and preparation service.

The good Samaritans prepare tax returns for middle- and low-income taxpayers with special attention to those age 60 and older.

Tax Aid started in 1968 with four volunteers who prepared 100 returns. Last year, more than 30,500 volunteers helped

prepare more than 1.7 million returns at the nearly 9,000 sites across the country, said public information liaison Sherry Taylor.

The program operates under a cooperative agreement with the Internal Revenue Service through the American Association of Retired Persons.

In Ruidoso, Tax Aid also is sponsored by the Retired Senior Volunteer Program.

"Locally, we helped 766 taxpayers by preparing 302 federal and 508 New Mexico tax returns or a total of 810 returns," Taylor said. "We also assisted 231 taxpayers by

answering questions."

One major tax change this year on state returns is that persons 100 years or older will be exempt from New Mexico tax.

Three sites scheduled to receive tax aid are Carrizozo on March 5, Capitan on March 12 and San Patricio on March 19, all from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. at their respective senior centers.

Help will be available from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. each Thursday at the Ruidoso Senior Center starting Feb. 6 and running through April 11. For more information, call the center at 257-4565.

Web site created as resource for entire county

A new Web site for Lincoln County aims "to open doors for the public to utilize," says County Assessor Rick Silva.

He and deputy assessor Doug Whittaker created the site, www.lincolncountynm.net, as a "team effort" to give each department an opportunity to connect with residents in a county that covers a large geographical area, Silva said.

The money for the work came from the assessor's reappraisal fund, which is fueled by 1 percent of all taxes paid, thanks to action by the state Legislature, he said. The site was justified because it allows people to download the forms needed to render livestock, report personal property and apply for the 65-years-and-older exemption,

among other tools, Silva said.

"We also provide a place to register mobile homes," he said. "At this point, they download, fill out the forms and mail them in, but eventually, they will be able to e-mail the information directly to us."

"This is the tip of where we're going to be. People will be able to pull up maps of different sections of the county when we are finished, and check ownership and taxes paid."

Links already are set up for the county sheriff's office, the treasurer's office, the county manager, county clerk and a listing of street name changes approved by the county commission.

"We're working with the others on what they want on their sites," Silva said. "I told the county manager, this is a chance to post public notices on line and the monthly county commission agenda."

Study reveals some school lunches too heavy on fat

Despite a government mandate that school lunches and breakfasts meet federal dietary guidelines, some middle school students eat half, rather than the recommended third, of their daily allowance of fat in school cafeteria lunches, according to a recent study.

School-provided lunches had the highest fat content of the school food offerings examined in the study. But school breakfasts, "a la carte" dining items such as pizza and baked goods, and chips and candy sold at student-run stores all contributed to "excessive" fat consumption by students, say James F. Sallis, Ph.D., of the University of California-San Diego and colleagues.

"We estimated that the average student consumed about 26 grams of total fat at school, 30 percent more than the 20 grams recommended, and 14 percent more saturated fat than recommended," says Sallis.

Sallis and colleagues investigated the food environment at 24 middle schools in San Diego County, Calif., calculating the total fat and saturated fat served in cafeteria lunches and breakfasts, a la carte items, student-run stores and bag lunches brought from home. Along with collecting information on the quantity of each item sold, the researchers also surveyed children on their daily menu choices.

Their analysis revealed that cafeteria lunches contained an average of 31.1 grams of fat, cafeteria breakfasts contained an average of 14.4 fat grams, a la carte items contained an average of 13.1 fat grams and items from student stores contained an average of 6.4 fat grams. Bag

lunches had an average of 20.8 grams of fat.

The federal dietary guidelines recommend eating 65 grams of fat per day. Earlier studies suggest that students eat 33 percent of their daily food intake at school, meaning that only about 20 grams of fat should be consumed as part of the school day diet.

Based on the percentage of students who ate each category of food, the researchers concluded that cafeteria lunches contributed the most to the average daily fat intake, accounting for 42 percent of the fat eaten by students at school. A la carte items were also a major contributor, providing 27 percent of the total fat eaten at school.

"We believe that students may choose the higher fat options, the pizza over the chef salad, within the cafeteria lunch, so that the average lunch has more than 30 percent of its calories from fat," says Sallis.

"But to our surprise, bag lunches were relatively low in fat. So it does look like kids are choosing wisely when they pack their lunch," adds study co-author Michelle Zive of the University of California San Diego.

The researchers also noted an association between a la carte service and the average socioeconomic status of a school's population. In wealthier schools, students bought more a la carte items than in poorer schools. Poorer schools, however, tended to stock more high-fat items than wealthy schools.

Future studies should focus on individual daily fat consumption, say Sallis and colleagues, noting that students may have more eclectic eating habits than they predicted in their study.

SEX and its moral role finds a place in a new required class for freshmen at Ruidoso High

This year, freshmen at Ruidoso High School are required to take a 7- to 9-week sexuality education program for the first time in the history of the school.

"Reach for the Stars," part of the Success Skills class required for high school graduation, is an abstinence program, said teacher Rodney Pennington, one "that addresses sex education from a values-based or moral perspective."

Decision-making and goal-setting, building healthy relationships, sexually transmitted diseases and AIDS are covered, as well as alcohol, drugs, sex and violence, date rape, dating guidelines, knowing the difference between love, infatuation or sexual gratification.


"I bring out the statistics on unwanted teen pregnancy and how that could mean they're going to be at the poverty level ... and look at other consequences, such as STDs and how some are bacteria-based, which can be cured, and some are viruses, which can't be," Pennington said.

Students keep notebooks with exercises and activities and are encouraged to share them with their parents. Pre- and post-surveys are given to students and parents evaluating the effects of the class on how often they talk about careers, how easy it is to talk about sex and if they learned new information. The results of these will be available in April, said Suzanne Leland, nurse for the school district. The program was piloted last year, but this is the first year of full implementation, she said.

The program creator, Kathy Van Pelt, gave a workshop at Roswell Independent School District for teachers, Pennington said, and he attended. Previously, he had taught a one-semester class in Albuquerque and had been a sociology teacher for years discussing sexual issues, but he said these classes did not have as detailed a morals base as "Reach for the Stars," which is a national program initiated to reduce teen pregnancy.

"In my opinion, it's an excellent program," he said. "The students are very involved and very interested. They were very open with me."


Alison Kittrell, a junior who took the class in the fall because she transferred from Capitan and had not taken a similar class there, said what she liked best was a video, "Time to Wait for Sex," featuring Pam Stenzel — a presenter who does not mince words when she talks to teens about sex. There are 500 sexually-transmitted diseases currently, and 30

percent of them are incurable, Stenzel said. Cervical cancer is the end result of the most contagious — human papilloma virus, or genital warts, and a person can have it without knowing it. The blood test for HPV is \$1,000, and this disease kills more women than HIV, she said.

"I felt I knew a lot before I took the class because I already had a health class in Capitan and we talked about diseases," Alison said. "But I learned a lot more STDs ... The class helped me to not be influenced by peer pressure."

"It helps you really think about what you're going to do," Jeneé Romero, a freshman, said. "My parents were surprised to find out there were that many diseases out there and whenever I started talking about it, they felt kind of uncomfortable."

Both students said they agreed that the class should be required for graduation.

Leland said some of the program is being taught at the middle school and she's working with science teachers there to try to incorporate other sections.

"We had been doing sex education in health class," Leland said, "one day a nurse had always done a unit on STDs. I don't like calling it sex education. This teaches life skills and making good choices in general."

Leland talked with parents at a Parent Advisory Council meeting and said they were "very enthusiastic about the program and ... learned new information."

One of the exercises students completed with their parents related to the costs of raising a child: By 2010, when a child is 17, expenditures will total \$231,140.

A section called "Sex Express Study

Guide" urged teens to "buy your ticket early," meaning to decide ahead of time "where you want to stop" in the steps of sexual progression, with "prolonged kissing" being the beginning of danger on the progression.

The program analyzes the factors determining self esteem and healthy, lasting relationships and addresses goal setting, decision making, refusal skills and character counts exercises and includes units on teen pregnancy, "renewed virginity," drugs, alcohol, sex and dating violence.

"Many students indicated in past surveys that as a result of this curriculum they chose to wait to have sex," Leland said. "They learned new information on sexually transmitted diseases and answered 'Yes' to the question 'I feel Reach for the Stars gave me information that will help me with important issues in my life.'"

Pennington said that out of those students in his classes who had previously engaged in sex, at least half will have thought about it and will change their behavior "if for no other reason than the HPV or herpes or some of those STDs, learning that you can have an STD and not know it until it's transmitted to different partners, because symptoms differ from person to person."

One of the scary statistics students are exposed to is that one of four sexually active teens is carrying a sexually transmitted disease — whether there are symptoms or not. In comparison, one in 30 sexually active teens in the 1960s had a STD.

Pennington said at the beginning of class students protested that they'd had biology last year and didn't see the need for a 7-week class this year, but they soon saw the difference between a biological approach to the study of sexuality and a values-based approach, he said.

School assault leads to arrest

Last Wednesday evening the Carrizozo police responded to a call to the Carrizozo schools campus. Upon arrival, Officer Johnny Rivera found one juvenile, a student at the high school, with facial cuts and abrasions.

The battery suspect was 18-year-old Samuel D. Green of Carrizozo. The same suspect had allegedly battered another juvenile at a second location.

The student attack was under control immediately upon arrival of the Carrizozo police, assisted by deputies from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department. One victim was transported by ambulance to the Lincoln County

Medical Center in Ruidoso while the second went by private car.

The office of the District Attorney was advised of the situation and charges of two counts of aggravated battery were approved. Judge Martha Proctor issued an arrest warrant for Samuel Green. He was apprehended and arrested the next day by the State Police. Subsequently, an additional victim came forth and another charge of assault was added.

Green was incarcerated in the Lincoln County Detention Center pending hearings.

Carrizozo Police Chief Angelo Vega advised that the incident originated from a previous action taken at the Carrizozo Schools and investigated by school officials.

"It was determined that the subject allegations were unfounded," Vega said. "Certain factions demonstrated their dissatisfaction of the

findings through destructive behavior."

Vega is still in contact with all involved parents and other parents and citizens. "It is important," said Vega, "that we all work as a unit and show solidarity in these instances. School should be a safe environment where education be emphasized, not self defense."

Vega went on to express his thanks to the school principal and staff for their support and participation on the evening of the incident as well as the ensuing investigation.

Superintendent Sergio Castañon expressed his sincere appreciation to the police department for their prompt response to the situation and for their daily patrols there after for the safety of the campus and students.

"I look forward to the partnering with the Police Department in the educating of the students in law issues," he said.

Take your time with a slow cooker

Slow cookers can make your life a little more convenient by saving you time and money. Dinner can be ready-to-serve when you arrive home from work with just a little planning ahead.

Some tips for slow cooking:

- The moist low temperature is ideal for cooking meats. Even less tender cuts become very tender when cooked at low temperatures. Defrost meat or poultry before putting it in the slow cooker. If foods are cut into small pieces they will heat up more rapidly. Trim off as much fat as possible before placing in your slow

cooker.

- Chili, soup, stew, spaghetti sauce or casseroles are great for slow cooking. Fill the cooker no less than half full and no more than two thirds full.

- Vegetables cook slower than meat and poultry, so if using them, place vegetables in the bottom and add meat. Cover with about one cup of liquid, such as

broth, vegetable juice or water. Remember little or no water evaporates during slow cooking.

- Avoid lifting the cover to

peek to see how the food is cooking. Every time the cover is lifted you lose heat that is equal to 30 minutes of cooking time.

- To adapt recipes for the slow cooker, reduce the amount of liquid by approximately one-half. One cup of liquid generally is enough unless the recipe contains rice or pasta. In casserole recipes with pasta, or rice, reduce the amount of liquid by one-fourth.

A slow cooker can be used for other recipes that you might not have thought of. You can use it as a rice cooker, beverage server (hot punch or cider), or for warm rolls without drying them out.

U.S. 70 starts truck policy

A narrowing roadway means wide vehicles face restrictions.

A new policy restricting the size of loads traveling the Hondo Valley construction area on U.S. 70 is being tried on a trial basis.

The policy was based on comments from transporters and compiled through coordination with the New Mexico Department of Public Safety, Motor Transportation Division, according to information from

Sierra Blanca Constructors, a team handling the 38-mile design and construction.

The policy restricts oversized loads treated as normal traffic to 10 feet in width or less with a valid permit. Legal width vehicles of up to 8 feet, 6 inches also will be allowed as normal traffic.

Representatives of vehicles of widths up to 12 feet traveling under valid permits must call the SBC hotline to arrange for passage, which may be limited to scheduled dates and times at pre-arranged staging areas with SBC's traffic control personnel before proceeding through the construction area.

Requests must be received 24 hours in advance, said SBC community relations liaison Mary Ann Wootton.

Vehicles of widths more than 12 feet will not be allowed through the project at any time, she said.

Lengthy construction zones constantly are changing throughout the project and at times, the roadway may only be 13 feet wide, Wootton said.

"Passage of vehicles over 12 feet in width could not be safely allowed without stopping all traffic in the opposite direction," she said.

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




Warriors split two over weekend

It was a split decision for the Ruidoso Warriors, winning with aggressiveness 73-67 over Dexter Thursday, only to lose another heartbreaker on the road at Cobre Saturday, falling 59-57.

The Warriors (6-8) faced Artesia Tuesday, and will host West Las Vegas in a 7:30 p.m. contest on Friday.

Warriors 73, Demons 67
In a closely fought battle Thursday night, the Ruidoso Warriors' aggressive play kept them in a close contest, whose outcome could have been different if Dexter could have capitalized on the opportunities given them.

Instead, the Warriors escaped with a well-deserved victory.

From the beginning, Ruidoso's Demons several free throw opportunities — free throws they consistently missed.

"When we step to the free throw line, we missed our layups and missed our free throws," said Dexter coach Tommy Sanchez. "If you don't make them, it's just like a turnover."

If Dexter, which shot 11-of-21 from the charity stripe, had proven more accurate, the outcome would likely have been in their favor. With 10 team fouls for Ruidoso versus one for Dexter in the first half, ample opportunities were there.

"We didn't play as well as we'd like," said Ruidoso coach Billy Page. "Dexter is a very good ball club, but we didn't have turnovers late in the fourth quarter when they (Dexter) did have the turnovers."

Even with all those free throws, Dexter never led the game. The closest they got was a 13-all tie with 7:47 left in the first half.

Ruidoso's fast break proved to be the key, as the Warriors settled into a game of basket-for-basket, and the home team had a 35-30 lead at halftime.

Opening up the second half, a more determined Warriors team took the floor and the game was never in doubt.

"I don't know if there was a turning point, to tell you the truth," said Page. "They (the

Demons) were causing turnovers and were pressing; I don't know why they didn't stay in it. But I'm glad they didn't."

With ample rebounding, the Warriors — who had 40 boards to Dexter's 25 — slowed the pace down enough in the fourth quarter.

Cody Small and Patrick Valliant led the game with 10 rebounds each, while Valliant had 23 points. Nick Page added 16 points for the Warriors.

Mike Matta led the Demons, going a perfect 4-for-4 from the free throw line and scoring 16 points. Lawrence Vandenberg added 12 points.

"We couldn't stop them," Sanchez said. "Their fast break went, and when we tried to shut them down, they shot layups."

"They allowed us, there at the end, to bring the ball up the floor slow," Page added.

As for aggression, Page commented, "We were a little bit nervous, and a little tentative. We tend to get a little too aggressive. We want to be aggressive, but under control."

Indians 59, Warriors 57

If rebounding is what gave Ruidoso the edge over the Demons, rebounding was decidedly absent in their game against Cobre Saturday.

"We had absolutely no rebounding," said Page. "And we turned the ball over in the last three minutes of the game. That was the big point."


The Warriors had the lead through almost the entire game, and were in front at the conclusion of every quarter except the fourth.

In fact, it was one last rebound and put back by Chris Fierro with three seconds left that made the biggest difference. It didn't help when Ruidoso's inbounds pass was intercepted by Kyle Bess to seal the victory for the Indians.

Fierro led the game with 23 points overall, while Bess had 15. "The most crucial rebound was the last one," Page said. "Foul trouble didn't help us either."

Chance Hooper — who joined Small in leading Ruidoso with 12 points each — eventually fouled out of the game, while Valliant finished with four fouls.

Small had only two, but injured

"We did have a couple of kids step up, though," Page pointed out. "Steven Stroup did a real good job for us. But for the most part, our big guys weren't in the game a lot."

This marks the sixth game Ruidoso has led late in the game, only to fall by 10 points or less. Page said he's glad they had the chance to win, but laments the fact the Warriors' record could be better than it is.

"It's not a bad thing, losing a close game," Page said. "All I ask of our kids is to give us a chance to win it in the end. We've had several games this year we could have won."

The last time these two teams met, it was a blowout.

The Carlsbad Cavegirls may have come into Saturday's game expecting much the same thing.

The Ruidoso Lady Warriors did fall, but it was only by four points. And the Lady Warriors did have a chance to win it with time running down.

The one thing that kept Carlsbad from running away with the game was the Lady Warriors' rebounding. They had 20 boards in the second half, compared to only

six for the Cavegirls.


"We had our chances to win it, both teams did," said Mescalero coach Rol Bradford. "It was just a matter of who wanted it more at the end."
