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## Storm surge contaminates river

■ Sewage found in the river July 11 has cleared up, but levels were high at the time.

A storm surge on July 11 apparently sent a load of fecal matter down stream, turning the Ruidoso River chocolate brown.

Unfortunately, people at Two Rivers Park and other spots along the stream weren't aware of the contamination and many were seen splashing in the dark water.

Lorri McKnight, Ruidoso village

manager, said she was alerted to the situation late that evening by assistant village attorney Charles Rennick.

A huge spike in the flow of the river, sending the volume up from 3 cubic feet per second to 45 cfs, occurred somewhere higher on the mountain, sending down sediment and sewage.

"He received a phone call about 7:30 p.m. Friday from someone who lives right below the diversion (to Grindstone Reservoir)," McKnight said. "He called me and I called Larry Wilt, the chief water plant operator. He lives on the river too and was seeing it as I was talking to him."

McKnight said she called Eddie

Livingston, whose company was hired to conduct testing along the river in reference to tracking phosphorus and nitrate contamination that is complicating plans for the expansion and revamping of a regional wastewater treatment plant shared with Ruidoso Downs.

"I asked him what to do and told him you could see all the stuff coming down the river," she said. "He told me to take water samples, mark the time and location on a label and take photographs."

She enlisted Wilt, Rennick and her husband to help. Five samples were refrigerated. They were tested Monday at the village's laboratory in the treatment plant.

"The results came back Wednesday (July 16) and they all tested high, very high" for the presence of fecal organisms and material, McKnight said.

The state Environment Department was notified Monday, along with the local office of that department, she said.

"We also notified Ruidoso Downs and the county," she said.

Fortunately, diversions from the river to the Grindstone Lake Reservoir, one of the chief sources of water for the village, had been stopped before the surge occurred, she said. However, an initial test showed the Hollywood well, another key supplier for the village, was

## St. John fights for local cancer center in D.C.

Part of a national bill would cut reimbursement for oncology care

Maury St. John flew to Washington D.C. last week to fight a "trailer" tied to the Medicare Prescription Drug bills passed in the House and the Senate that she fears could wipe out cancer treatment locally.

The Lincoln County commissioner, who also is an oncology nurse, said she was contacted two weeks ago about a workshop and a rally at the Capital to protest "hidden" changes that would cut reimbursement for oncology care.

"If they get it through, (physicians) could no longer offer that service in Ruidoso," she contended. "Everyone needs to contact our representatives from New Mexico."

St. John joined others concerned about the impact on cancer treatment to meet with key Congressional figures on the issue. Bills passed by the two houses must be merged into one document and that could take a few weeks.

"Conference is a time where we can change the drastic cancer cuts," Tonya Scheihing, practice administrator of New Mexico Oncology Hematology Consultants Ltd. wrote St. John and others in the field, calling for their support.

The provision would cut reimbursement by 30 percent or \$16 billion, St. John said. Medicare usually takes a drug or service and assigns a reasonable cost, then pays 80 percent. But under the proposed change, the system instead would establish a cost at 85 per-

## County seeks medical bill answers

Still not satisfied with the answers they're hearing, Lincoln County commissioners postponed action again on revisions to the county ordinance governing reimbursement of care for the medical-indigent.

Changes in wording approved earlier this year by the state Legislature seem to have removed the possibility of the county reimbursing physicians who treat

patients at their offices. Only treatment in a hospital emergency room or possibly, a hospital-managed rural clinic, would be covered.

The words "outpatient setting" were eliminated from the prior state definition, county manager Tom Stewart wrote Pat Larragoite, director of the New Mexico Health Policy Commission in Santa Fe.

The county's indigent health care ordinance permits payments to licensed doctors regardless of location, he pointed out.

Noting varying opinions on the

issue, he asked for a ruling from Larragoite as to the legality of paying independent physicians and practices not in a hospital setting.

Larragoite wrote back that a "definite conflict" exists in the language of the amended Senate bill.

"I am not an attorney, but I believe this language gives the Indigent Board the autonomy to operate," she wrote in reference to the phase "providing emergency services as determined by the board."

## Changes ahead for Fort Stanton roads

About 54 miles of traveled routes and two-track paths and 35 miles of active roads will be abandoned under a road designation plan for the Fort Stanton Area of Critical Concern.

But 60 miles of multi-use trails are proposed to be added, all located away from existing roads or in some cases, on previously closed roads.

Details of the route plans for the ACEC, a 26,000-acre area designated under the Roswell Resource Management Plan adopted in 1998, were released last week by Edwin L. Roberson, field manager of the Roswell office of the Bureau of Land Management, which administers 24,000 of those acres.

The completion of the plan and environment assessment process marks the beginning of the implementation phase, he wrote in a letter to recipi-

ents of the document.

"Implementation of the approved plan and environmental assessment will involve many people and much effort over the years," he wrote.

Management goals of the ACEC are to "protect the biological, archaeological and scenic qualities of Fort Stanton, while providing quality recreation opportunities," according to the plan.

In the Route Designation Plan, some roads will be closed to motor vehicle travel and reserved for non-motorized use. Other roads will be closed completely and reclaimed. Existing trails, such as the Rio Bonito Petroglyph Trail and established mountain bike trails, will be maintained or improved on an "as needed basis," the document states.

Newly proposed trails will be developed using the trail criteria set out in the plan. The criteria includes:

- Using existing trails as much as possible

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# County budget ends with big surplus

But more than \$600,000 in outlay will be considered at mid-year by the commission.

After the usual predictions of deficits, followed by a demand of 5 percent cuts from each department and slashing other requests, Lincoln County commissioners will end up with a \$686,771 surplus in excess of required reserves this fiscal year.

County manager Tom Stewart recommended and three county commissioners agreed to live with the department cuts, the level of external agency funding, and to postpone until mid-year considerations of \$600,085 in capital outlay, raises and other requests. They agreed to place the surplus in the county facility fund as a capital improvement line. Combined with a \$66,294 carryover, the fund sits at \$751,294.

Among the few additions to the 2003-2004 budget of \$17.25 million recommended by Stewart and approved by the commission was \$8,044 to cover a federal bullet-proof vest grant that requires a \$4,022 match. Sheriff Tim Sullivan, responding to questions from Commissioner Earl Hobbs about the type of vest and reasons for changing from the current model, brought in an example of the bulky and heavy vests now worn by deputies. The new type will be lighter and more effective, he said.

Stewart complimented the Zia Senior Center program, which eliminated the need to use \$19,238 from the county's gen-

eral fund, by increasing its end-of-year carryover to \$38,285 to produce a projected ending balance of \$16,238.

The capital outlay requests postponed until mid-budget year consideration include \$60,000 for two new sports utility vehicles and \$25,000 for a patrol car in the sheriff's department; heavy equipment for the road department totaling \$169,000; and renovation of the county clerk's office for \$17,000.

Personnel items delayed for consideration were for a 10 percent pay increase in the clerk's and assessor's offices for \$298,236; an additional operator in the road department for \$29,951; and a 3 percent increase for the sheriff's administrative secretary for \$898. The two categories totaled \$600,085.

Commissioner Leo Martinez voted against the annual budget as he has for many years, primarily tied to what he contends is inappropriate spending on the county-owned hospital as part of a management contract signed under a noncompetitive arrangement.

This year, he added dissatisfaction with the decision not to fund an additional \$15,000 to the Humane Society of Lincoln County for the care of lost and abandoned animals, as part of the \$27,335 not funded under "external requests" from 17 agencies and programs.

"I also was unhappy about the sheriff's budget, almost a third of our general fund budget, and the apparent readiness to

spend \$200,000 more than needed on heavily over-budget building projects without really searching for people to bid them," the commissioner said Tuesday.

Commissioner Maury St. John was in Washington, D.C., and only in touch by telephone for part of the meeting.

One of the major single sources of added revenue for the county came from the 2003 payment received in lieu of taxes from the federal government for public lands within the county's borders.

The \$956,752 PILT check was \$145,230 higher than last year. Combined with spending only 95 percent of authorized expenditures in 2002-2003, the two pumped \$595,250 into the beginning of the year cash balance, Stewart said.

The county also received an additional \$141,751 in gross receipts taxes to offset detention center operation costs after funding the bond payment for construction of the new jail in Carrizozo and after setting aside the one-quarter reserve, he said.

Hobbs asked Stewart to come back at some point with a recommendation for raises for county employees in all departments. The 10 percent requested by the clerk and assessor "may be excessive," he said. "But I think our employees should be considered when we have a reserve of this size."

Stewart said that's another subject to be reviewed at mid-year. He'll start forming recommendations in October and November.

## Bridge work on U.S. 70

## Defendants in gaming case ask judge to drop suit

Three of the defendants named in a lawsuit filed in 2002 seeking the return of gaming machines confiscated by the Mescalero Apache Tribe are asking the court to dismiss the action based on failure to legally serve them.

Phyllis A. Dow, assistant U.S. Attorney filed the motion July 11, written by U.S. Attorney David C. Iglesias on behalf of the National Indian Gaming Commission, its regional director Ken Billingsley and special agent Joe S. Magill of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The lawsuit was filed in U.S. District Court in Albuquerque on Nov. 22, 2002, by Gaim-Ko Inc., several months after the Internal Revenue Service denied the \$18.66 million in deductions for losses and expenses claimed by company owners Raymond A. and Charlotte S. Gallegos. The agency ruled that an additional \$2.2 million in taxes was owed from 1997 and 1998.

The company, which leased gaming equipment on Dec. 29, 1992, to the tribe, asked in the suit for the return of the machines and for money damages based on the amount that would have been paid if the

lease continued until the equipment was relinquished by the tribe.

On Dec. 19, 1998, after the death of long-time Mescalero president Wendell Chino, a new Mescalero administration started buying its own machines for the Casino Apache operation, according to the lawsuit.

But the tribe never exercised an option to buy the Gaim-Ko machines and unlawfully converted them to their own use, the suit states. The suit accuses tribal officials of conspiring with federal officials in the confiscation and in denying due process. The Gallegos in November 1998

were banned from the reservation.

The new motion by Iglesias states that service has not been effected on three of the defendants as required by federal law and that no summons were issued when the original lawsuit was filed or were properly executed during subsequent extensions granted by the court.

Other defendants in the lawsuit include the Mescalero Apache Tribe, the members of the Tribal Council individually and as a board, and its attorney, Gregory M. Quinlan.

## County Green Party names officers, plans state meeting

Continuing the process of state accreditation, the Lincoln County Green Party adopted its official name and nominated officers at its last meeting, June 23, in Ruidoso.

Robert Allan will serve as chairman, Ray Wilson as party secretary and James Pazeran will be treasurer.

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# ROADS: Plan aimed at maintaining natural beauty of area

- That terrain and elevation variability should not be extreme, they should be suitable for family backpacking and mountain biking
  - Routes should be suitable for long season use
  - Trails should meander to take advantage of scenic panoramas, historical and resource management situations for interpretation purposes.
  - Trails should not make great or sudden changes in elevation
  - Trail networks should disperse visitors away from fragile riparian areas and areas of environmental concerns
  - And trail locations along heavy use roads should be avoided.
- Concerning off-highway vehicle travel, the plan states that a 100-foot wide corridor measured from the edge of the Rio Bonito and Rio

Salado will be closed to OHV use to protect sensitive riparian resources, except for the use of designated roads within the corridor.

All multi-use trails, such as those marked for equestrian, hiking and mountain bike use, that are located on existing roads will be open to OHVs. The Feather Cave Archaeological Complex will be closed to OHV use, except for U.S. 380 and the Fort Stanton Cave Road.

Many of the roads that exist within the ACEC were developed or improved during the past 10 years by New Mexico State University under their stewardship of the area.

The plan noted that because of increased pressures from the public, people have driven over terrain and created new two-track roads. Other recreationalists followed and developed the trails into established roads. Part of the plan's aim is to

eliminate access to many of those roads to OHV, while allowing mountain bikes, horses and hiking.

The majority of the 40 miles of existing designated recreation trails haven't been adequately developed for recreational use. They are two-track and bladed roads not conducive to hikers who want a trail experience. Under the plan, they would be improved and 20 miles of new trails will be developed, excluding OHV from certain areas.

"The proposed trails all have been ridden, Global Positioned and designed by equestrian riders," the plan states. "The American Endurance Ride Conference, Lincoln County Sheriff's Posse and many other interested riders have volunteered thousands of hours to mark, design and ride the proposed trails," the plan states. "Three national endurance events have used the trails under BLM special recreation


permits to try out the trails for equestrian purposes."

About 1.5 miles of the Rio Bonito National Petroglyph Trail was developed by volunteer help, but needs modifications and annual maintenance, according to the plan. The Tlaloc trail is mostly old two-track and bladed roads and also needs modifications to attract mountain bikers to continue to use the trail.

Throughout the area, some vehicular traffic may be allowed to access wildlife watering mechanisms, existing pipelines and other resource facilities in the ACEC.

Some of the proposed closed roads will be narrowed by mechanical means to lessen the trail width and OHV use.

New signs have been designed to indicate the level of approved use on trails and roads, and obstacles will be constructed when roads are closed, as well as signed posted.

# INDIGENT: Morel warns of lawsuit if county doesn't change code

Without that leeway, nursing homes, drug rehabilitation centers and many others would not be eligible because they could not provide services in a hospital setting, she contended.

County attorney Alan Morel disagreed, saying that by inserting the particular language, "life-threatening" and "in a hospital," he believes the legislators intended the words to mean something.

"I believe this definitely limits what you can pay," he said. "To determine otherwise gives no legal affect to the new language."

Commissioner Chairman Rex Wilson directed Morel to contact State Sen. Tim Jennings, D-Chaves County, about his intent.

"If he understands the dilemma, he can communicate to the governor to put the issue on his call for the special fall session," Wilson said. "He's our representative."

Teresa Montoya, indigent claims administrator, said she's holding claims by independent physicians because she doesn't know if the county will pay them.

Commissioner Leo Martinez noted that Larragoite said the wording is ambiguous enough to pay.

"He's not indemnifying you," Morel said. "And if you pay and the payments are not legal, you're personally liable."

"You want me to sign the checks?" Martinez asked.

But Wilson pointed out that two signatures are needed and the county treasurer isn't convinced.

"It's my opinion that they intended us not to pay doctors in an outpatient setting," Montoya said.

Another opinion saying the county has the authority to pay is based on the old legislation and comes from a lobbyist, Wilson said.

Martinez said the law was "worked" to serve the interests of hospitals.

"If you go by the letter of the law, indigents have to go to the emergency room to be treated and that's way more expensive," he said. "That could gut our indigent fund."

Patients can't take advantage of lower cost care at a doctor's office or possibly at a clinic, he said.

Montoya agreed that waiting for a "life-threatening" emergency also drives up costs. But care provided at the county-owned hospital in Ruidoso

would be paid out of the annual "sole community provider" fund, said the county indigent fund, she said. Every year, the hospital receives \$3 in federal money for every \$1 it pays into that fund. The payment comes from a special property tax levy. The new law will require a more detailed accounting of the sole community figures.

Morel kept ringing the warning bell.

"If you don't change the ordinance to comply with state statutes, that sets up a lawsuit, because we have a contract with doctors who still are submitting bills," he said. "Either we change the ordinance or we may have to pay the bills out of our general fund."

Physicians have been fairly understanding about the dilemma, Montoya insisted. They're waiting to see what

the county does. She has 10 claims to date.

Commissioner Earl Hobbs said he's worried about residents in Corona who may need treatment and would be forced to drive to the Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso to be treated.

"That's just not right," he said. "This is one of those mandates some clown came up with and it really grates on me."

"We need clarity" on the clinic issue too, Wilson said.

Morel said he doesn't think the situation is subject to a quick fix. It probably will require the legislature to reconsider and change the wording, he said.

Another public hearing will be scheduled for next month's commission meeting.

contaminated and it was shut down. Subsequent tests cleared the well and it is back on line, she said Tuesday.

Steve Baumgart with the state environmental department said Taylor Sharpe with the enforcement team of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's water quality division, was at a meeting Monday with village officials on the wastewater plant.

The EPA enforcement people were

here yesterday and they're beginning an investigation" to pinpoint the source of the sewage, he said. The federal agency has the authority to access property of the U.S. Forest Service and the Mescalero Apache Tribe, which have operations above the village, he said.

Dave Barry with the EPA's Dallas office said Sharpe and by Thursday, he may have some feedback on the situation.

Baumgart said if another surge occurs and the river is polluted again, his depart-

ment will alert media outlets in the area to warn residents and visitors they should stay out of the water and if a "boil water" order is issued.

The village also has the option of getting together with the Ruidoso River Association to post signs warning people not to enter the river if it appears dark brown after a storm because of possible sewage contamination, he said.

Dick Wisner, executive director of the association said his group "absolutely" would cooperate on posting warning signs.

# CANCER: Commissioner fights to keep local clinic alive

cent of wholesale and pay 80 percent of that, she said.

"They would take away reimbursement for administration or supplies," she said. People suffering from cancer in Ruidoso may be forced to go to clinics elsewhere for treatment, she said.

Chris Gallegos, spokesman for U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici said last week the senator has heard "from quite a number of oncologists and New Mexicans with cancer, who are concerned about the outcome of the final Medicare Prescription Bill.

"He has shared those concerns with Senator Grassley, who will lead the Senate negotiating team that will craft the final package. He is confident Grassley will work hard to try and find a solution that is best for cancer patients."

"St. John said local cancer treatment is threatened.

"I took the job I have seven years ago because my husband and I felt if we came down with cancer, we didn't want to have to go somewhere else," she said. "I could retire and stay at home, but I don't want to do that to the people of this county."

Dr. Barbara McAneny has

been coming to Ruidoso for 13 years to work with cancer patients, St. John said. She could make more money staying in Albuquerque, but wanted to provide something here, the commissioner said. Last year, the physician formed a clinic.

"If this goes through, that can't stay open," St. John said. "Sen. (Sam) Brownback (R-Kan.) has introduced S1303, a Senate companion bill to HR1622 as an amendment to the prescription drug benefit legislation under the title Senate Amendment 1022. We're hoping our senators will support that amendment."

However, at this point, the amendment isn't up for a vote, she said.

"The conference committee is given the task of putting the two bills together and we have asked they look at Brownback's proposal to come up with things we can live with."

Her delegation met with New Mexico's three Congressional representatives and two senators on the issue.

"They were all very supportive and said they had not understood - that it had not been brought out what this would do to us," St. John said.

"I feel good about the visit. It was exhausting, but I feel it was well worth it for our Lincoln County residents."

She is urging residents to contact the county's congressional delegation and the leaders of the House on both sides of the aisle.

## That Hobbs track goes down to the wire

The Racing Commission might choose a consultant today

**H**obbs is one of those towns with a not very New Mexican name, a landscape notable for its extreme flatness, an industry whose residue — sulfur gas — can be smelled downwind for miles (with an economy that rises and falls with every twitch in the price of a barrel of oil) — and a hankering to get into the gambling business.

It's doubtful that Hobbs, once a rootin' tootin' wildcat oil boom town, would even be interested in a horse track if tracks didn't come complete with a state license to run 300 slot machines.

That, along with the fact that Hobbs is less than 10 miles from the Texas border, barely 90 miles from Lubbock and not all that far from Midland-Odessa, has made a license to build a track in Hobbs one extremely hot ticket. With four bidders in the running, Ruidoso Downs' R. D. Hubbard, former

track owner Ken Newton, Santa Fe art dealer Gerald Peters and Nevada businessman Shawn Scott, the State Racing Commission has chosen to do a typical bureaucratic dance — hire a consultant. That lets them cite their great deliberation and even-handedness in selecting the best of the bunch.

Unfortunately, this being New Mexico, whoever is chosen will be tarred with the "politics won out" brush.

Whether it means anything or not, the racing commission is meeting at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track and Casino this morning, and the consultant issue is on the agenda.

Upwards of \$50 million could be invested in that Hobbs track, so it's not a poor man's game. But if the racing commission's executive director is to be believed, we'll know who gets to spend all that money before the end of 2003.

We can hardly wait.

## State workers' nest eggs are scrambling taxpayers

The gift is in the form a new law effective this month that puts the old retirement program on steroids. Gov. Bill Richardson allowed the bill to become law without his signature and promises that he had "agonized" over it. Well, that's helpful.

Legislators work — for the record, free — in annual sessions that alternate between 30 and 60 days. And they serve on various committees during the year. For that service, they have awarded themselves the following pension plan:

For current legislators, \$957 a year times the number of years served after the lawmaker contributes \$500 for each year served. So a 20-year veteran of the Santa Fe wars collects \$19,140 a year as long as he lives. OK, not exactly like winning the Powerball lottery but, nonetheless, not a bad deal.

Former legislators had a similarly sweet "thank you oh so much" written into the law. They can collect \$10,000 a year for 20 years service.

By and large, these legislative folks aren't scrapping by. They aren't skipping their meds every third day to get through the

month. Mostly, they are successful business types and professional people who can afford to take the time to go to Santa Fe each year.

That fact rather pooh-poohs the idea of a democratic citizen legislative body, but it is not all bad. I mean, you want your accomplished people leading the charge. You don't want to send to Santa Fe a guy who is still working his way through "Dick and Jane Go to the Supermarket." You want a woman who has more going on upstairs than, say, Anna Nicole Smith.

Whatever intellectual genius one may attribute to the current crop of legislators, it is certainly outshone by their sheer sense of generosity to state and local government workers. They've got more people double dipping than a convention of Baskin-Robbins counter girls.

Thanks to a provision in the same law that made their own golden years shine just a little bit more brightly, public employees can now retire, collect full retirement pay, return to the job they vacated with no loss of retirement benefit. Check your wallet, New Mexico taxpayers, you've just been pickpocketed.

You just know that on the day the legislators met to quadruple their own retirement benefits and shower blessings on state and local government retirees, they had to be wearing Santa Claus outfits. I see Manny Aragon over there hanging tinsel on the tree. I hear Republicans going ho-ho-ho.

Next session, when you hear legislators whining about how strapped for cash is our fair Land of Enchantment, remind them how we got there.

## Inn work includes treatment plant upgrade

To the editor:

This reply is in response to a letter recently published in the Ruidoso News, "Progress is great, but remember the river." Construction of the new Inn of the Mountain Gods resort will indeed include substantial improvements to the wastewater treatment facilities, to the tune of \$1.2 million. A state-of-the-art activated sludge treatment plant will be installed, utilizing membrane technology and ultra-violet disinfection, with construction planned to begin in September 2003. Plant capacity will exceed currently designed resort needs, in order to allow for any future expansion.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe, Division of Resource Management & Protection monitors quality of all surface waters on the reservation, including a sampling point at the Mescalero Inn, downstream of the current and future wastewater treatment facility. In May 2003 samples were taken from this location, and ammonium levels were 0.7 mg/L (temperature 13 degrees C; pH 7.5), far below the chronic level of 2.2 mg/L and acute level of 12 mg/L indicated in the State Water Quality Standards.

Furthermore, according to the *Nutrient Assessment Protocol for Streams*, developed by the NMED Surface Water Quality Bureau, "algal biomass is the most important indicator of nutrient enrichment." The document further states that watercress "may be an indicator of springs in the area that is naturally occurring." There are three separate locations where springs originate within the reach from Lake Mescalero to the reservation boundary. The proliferation of watercress at springs has been observed on other parts of the reservation, including Head Springs, Church Springs, and North Springs. None of these locations have a wastewater treatment facility nearby.

The Division of Resource Management & Protection welcomes any inquiries regarding environmental concerns. In the spirit of good, neighborly cooperation, a direct question will go much further than "Jumping to conclusions" and "pointing the finger."

### Looking to collect

To the editor:

Does the village of Ruidoso have to pay bills?

On Aug. 29, 2002, I went to the city hall to pay a property re-plat file fee of \$25, as I had my property surveyed and re-platted. While I was at the city hall I was told that there is also a \$100 deposit above and beyond the \$25 re-plat fee, just in case your surveyor

does not get a microfilm of the re-plat made and turn it in to city hall. If the surveyor does not turn in this microfilm the city has to get a microfilm made and it costs \$100.

My surveyor, being a reputable surveying company, turned in my microfilm to the city hall on Oct. 31, 2002. It has been nine months since the microfilm was turned in to the city hall by my surveyor and I have yet to receive my deposit of \$100 back. I ask you city hall, do you give citizens nine months to pay a water or sewer bill? City hall would probably have filed a lien against any normal citizen's home within nine months of non-payment.

I have made several attempts at collecting the \$100 deposit back from the village of Ruidoso by calling numerous officials, including the city manager, with no success. At one point I sent a formal letter demanding my deposit back from the village office manager of planning and zoning only to get a very hateful telephone call in reply stating how busy planning and zoning stays. In the hateful phone call I received, the planning and zoning office manager also told me how rude it was to write a letter to him or to even expect the money to be paid back with in a years' time.

Village hall, do you mean to tell me that your computer that prints checks is that far behind in returning deposits or is it possible that maybe you are utilizing the combined deposits of fine citizens to draw interest for a year? All I want is my deposit back and in a timely manner as you would expect a citizen to pay his or her bill.





**Former Cree GM claiming age and sex discrimination**

The former manager of Cree Meadow Golf and Country Club is suing the club for age discrimination and for violation of her civil rights.

Attorney Michael Cadigan filed the lawsuit in U.S. District Court in Albuquerque last week on behalf of his client, Gail Dix. He states that she is more than 50 years old and protected by the Age Discrimination in Employment Act and by the New Mexico Human Rights Act.

Dix exhausted all administrative remedies, including filing a charge of discrimination with the New Mexico Human Rights Division and the United States Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, according to the suit. She received a right to sue letter from the EEOC on June 23, and a notice of waiver of hearing from the state division dated June 19, the suit states.

Dix is asking for an award of past wages, lost benefits including health insurance and other fringe benefits, lost future earnings and reduction in earning capacity, compensation for emotional distress, attorney's fees, court costs, punitive and liquidated damages.

Cloudcroft attorney Roger E. "Ernie" Yarbro, who represents the club, said Monday he has not seen the final version of the complaint, "so it is difficult to comment, but I believe that after the judicial process is over, the judge or jury will find that Cree did not do anything wrong."

Dix was employed by the club from 1991 until June 10, 2002, all but the first year as general manager of the club,

the suit states. During that time, she was subjected to "extreme and outrageous harassment based on her gender and age," according to the suit.

When Dix rebuffed the sexual advances of a member of the board of directors, a pattern of harassment ensued based on her age, gender and as retaliation against her, the suit contends. Actions included refusal to grant pay raises despite increased responsibilities, worsening harassment and threats of termination, the suit claims.

Her work environment became hostile, officers of the club engaged in sexual innuendo and humor and on at least one occasion, the president of the club apologized in the club newsletter for an incident, where, in the presence of Dix, the president "made sexually humiliating remarks toward an employee of the club," the suit states.

Formal motions to remove Dix as general manager followed that incident, but none passed. However, "Several board members explicitly stated that they intended to make Ms. Dix's working conditions so undesirable that she would be forced to quit," according to the suit.

She was accused falsely of misusing club funds, of mismanaging the club's finances and was subjected to remarks indicating a male would be better qualified for the general manager's position, the suit states.

"In fact, the club's finances improved during and as a direct result of Dix's employment," the suit claims.

Dix contends the high cost of her insurance coverage

because of her age was one of the reasons some board members wanted her to leave.

On June 10, 2002, the suit states Dix "was forced to resign from the club because of, among other things ... constant threats from board members to terminate her, harassment, humiliation and insults by board members. Members of the board of directors admitted openly that Dix was forced to quit."

Immediately following Dix's resignation, the club hired a man in his late 30s as general manager and paid him \$18,250 more a year than Dix, the suit states.

The suit claims violation of the age discrimination in Employment Act, violation of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act, violation of the New Mexico Human Rights Act, intentional infliction of emotional distress and wrongful termination. The suit claims Dix was damaged by "the outrageous conduct of the club, including emotional distress and medical expenses," and that public policy and state law and regulations prohibit the activities reported by Dix and encourages individuals to report them.

**Woman sues village over faulty door**

Ruby M. Wells is claiming back injuries and mental stress from the 2001 incident.

A visitor to Ruidoso is suing the village for injuries she contends were suffered when a door in a public restroom broke loose and fell on her.

Ruby M. Wells filed the suit late last month naming as defendants the village, Hadrian Inc., an Ohio company, and Robert Lopez, doing business as Roberts Construction.

Wells, who is represented by David T. Rupp of Alamogordo, wrote that she suffered severe, painful and permanent injuries to her back, as well as emotional and mental stress. She is asking the 12th judicial District Court in Carrizozo for compensatory damages to cover the cost of her medical care and for punitive damages.

According to the suit, on June 30, 2001, she entered the public restrooms in mid-town with her 9-year-old granddaughter, Blair Wells. As her granddaughter walked into a stall, the door broke from the bottom plastic hinge and fell on Mrs. Wells, knocking her to the floor.

A Ruidoso police officer was dispatched and an accident report filed. The Parks and Recreation Department was notified to repair the door, the suit states. Mrs. Wells was taken to the Lincoln County Medical Center by ambulance.

The suit charges that the village failed to keep the restroom safe, failed to inspect the premises and failed to operate with reasonable care. It also contends the product is flawed by design, manufacturing and testing and that the inferior materials were susceptible to failure.

The suit contends the defendants are guilty of negligence and breach of implied warranty. No insurance representative for the village could be reached for comment on the lawsuit.

## Dyslexic kids improve quickly with treatment

ST. PAUL, Minn. — After only three weeks of reading instruction, brain scans in children with dyslexia develop activation patterns that match those of normal readers, according to a new study published in the July 22 issue of *Neurology*, the scientific journal of the American Academy of Neurology.

These findings indicate that children with dyslexia use the same regions of their brains as other readers, and that specialized instruction can rapidly compensate for some types of reading deficits.

Dyslexic children in this study had above average intelligence but scored approximately 30 percent lower than average on standard reading tests. The dyslexic children and a group of good readers of the same age underwent functional magnetic resonance imaging (fMRI) to map their brain activation patterns during two types of reading tests. The children with dyslexia then received a three-week training program based on principles outlined by the National Reading Panel (<http://www.nationalreadingpanel.org>), convened by the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development. Both groups of children then underwent a second brain scan. The experiment was conducted during the summer, to avoid confounding effects from school instruction.

The reading tests during the brain scan measured the ability of the children to decide whether

certain letter combinations could stand for certain sounds (for example, could "ow" and "oa" make the same sound?) and whether certain letter patterns in words created meaningful relationships between words (for example, does the "er" in "builder" make it related to the word "build"? does the "er" in "corner" make it related to the word "corn"?). Both skills are key elements of the reading process.

Both dyslexic children and normal readers used the same specific parts of their brains to perform these tasks, said lead study author Elizabeth Aylward, Ph.D., with the department of radiology at the University of Washington in Seattle. However, the activation of these regions was much weaker in dyslexic children, reflecting their poorer performance on these tasks.

After the three-week reading program the levels of brain activation were essentially the same in the two groups. Aylward says these results indicate that instruction doesn't "rewire" the brain of the dyslexic child, but instead strengthens the normal circuits which are already in use.

One of the most encouraging results of the study, she says, is that "we can document changes in the brain even after a fairly short training period," suggesting that appropriate in-school training has great potential for improving the reading ability of dyslexic children.

## Circus of life

### Giant puppets unite with kids at educational event

It's circus time in Ruidoso — not a traditional circus but a "Thirsty Circus" performed by about 50 local children depicting forest animals, dragons, flowers, river and other elements tying into the thirsty theme.

The community is invited to this spectacular and imaginative circus at 6:30 p.m. behind White Mountain Intermediate School on White Mountain Drive — and it's free.

All week the children from summer programs in Ruidoso and Tularosa have worked on costumes and skits, made signs and practiced acrobatics, dances and stilt-walking with people from Wise Fool and the All Species Project of Santa Fe, as part of the Bridging to the Arts partnership of New Mexico Office of Cultural Affairs, New Mexico State Department of Education and New Mexico Human Services Department.

The circus begins with a fire out of control, followed by colorful and dramatic representations by the children in imaginative costumes — including clowns who dry up the wells of the farmers — through to the finale, when things turn around and begin to look good for the watershed.

John McLeod, project developer for the summer-based programs, said Thirsty Circus was created in the Las Vegas Schools from a 10-week production, part of the Acequia Festival.

"The circus becomes a venue to explore issues of water," McLeod said.

The circus characters — a 15-foot-tall hummingbird, a 10-foot-long rattle snake, ladybugs, beavers on bicycles, clowns and more — are the heroes and sometimes the villains of the endangered watershed. Dancing dragons represent uncontrolled fire, and later, in controlled burns, as boons to fire safety. The huge hummingbird represents the thirst for beauty and nectar. The rattlesnake evokes dryness and thirst.

"In Vegas after the fire, the soot headed to the river with the rains, and the beaver dams stopped the soot and have been principal technicians of watershed management — holding back water and increasing the biological edge for various species ... Beavers are often seen as the bad guys," McLeod said.

The children, from kindergarten to fifth grade, will help create the acts, and

the Santa Fe crew brought other acts and will train the children to perform them.

Gigantic three-person puppets of farmers, representing Cesar Chavez and Dolores Huerta, founders of the United Farm Workers, will illustrate the theme of corn corps dying from thirst.

Local musicians Waynta Wirth, Slick Graham and Hoyte Graham will lend musical support for some of the Thirsty Circus acts.

This circus might be considered a rain ceremony — "It poured in Pecos," McLeod said — and if it does, the circus will move into the cafeteria.

Ann Flaherty and Deanna Wright work with the RASCAL Club summer program in Ruidoso, which meets from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. weekdays. This week, they worked from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. with the professionals from Santa Fe and about 20 children from the Wildcat Club of Tularosa, rehearsing for the circus on Thursday.

During the summer, children involved in these programs joined the reading club at the library, enjoying a specially designed crafts program on Tuesday mornings. They also swim two afternoons a week and take daily walks at the Links.

This summer, in keeping with the theme "Exploring Thirst," the RASCALs and the Wildcats built a water fountain, made terrariums to show water cycles, caught water in a water barrel, and designed and painted a mural under the direction of artist

Chrissy Orr.

Ruidoso children also planned summer field trips to the Albuquerque Zoo and Aquarium, New Mexico Field and Ranch Heritage Museum in Las Cruces, and made trips to the Oliver Lee State Park Riparian Exhibit, the Eagle Ranch Pistachio Farm in Alamogordo and Cedar Creek in Ruidoso.

Bridging to the Arts integrates the arts into after-school and summer child-care programs. Ruidoso and Tularosa are one of 12 sites in New Mexico that participate in the program. The parade begins at 10 a.m. This year's parade will feature a special section for "pioneers." Nettie Martin Bradley will be Grand Marshall. Also featured will be the oldest living graduate of Corona High School, Zelpha Atkinson, a 1930 graduate. The class of 1953 is meeting at the Corona de La Cocina Restaurant at noon to celebrate their 50th class reunion.

Street booths will be displaying and selling an assortment of items from food to crafts. Tom Perkins will have a booth selling sacks of pinto beans in honor of the many families that were part of the bean farming days in the Corona area.

The Corona FFA will be serving a mid-day meal at the school cafeteria from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Plates of beef, beans, salad, dessert and drinks, all for \$6.

On May 25, 1903, the townsite of Corona, embracing 59.4 acres, was dedicated legally and

The restaurant seats 45 inside and 30 outside in an enclosed back garden. Dinner is served daily except for Wednesdays from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. Walk-ins are accommodated although reservations are suggested. The phone number is 257-5883.

Chef Parind has shared the following recipes:

**Shrimp and Grits**

1/2 lb. Carolina white shrimp (medium) Raw and with shells peeled, tail on and divined.  
2 tablespoons of any kind of firm sausage that you like (I like andouille) sliced thin  
1/2 of a medium yellow onion finely diced (some people also add green

pepper minced with the onions)  
1/2 teaspoon old bay seasoning  
1/4 teaspoon minced garlic  
Juice of 1/2 lemon without seeds  
2 tablespoons of bacon drippings  
2-3 tablespoons cold unsalted fresh butter  
Salt and pepper to taste

Get a sauté or fry pan hot over a medium heat and add the bacon drippings and the sliced sausage. As the sausage gets a little color add the onions and garlic. As the onion is starting to get soft add the shrimp and cook until their gray and become pink on one side. Add the old bay and sauté for a minute until the other side is just pink.

Add the lemon juice to deglaze the pan and scrape up any brown bits on the bottom of the pan off the heat. Add butter and stir on the heat until the butter is thick liquid but not separated and clear. Quickly take off the heat. Tasty sauce and adjust seasoning as needed and pour over creamy grits.

Note: peeling the shrimp is optional; at the restaurant I

serve the shrimp peeled but, at home I leave the shells on. Three words about grits every southerner knows. Never add sugar.

**Salad recipe from Europe**

Any salad that you like on individual plates (I like fresh garden tomatoes and boiled Yukon gold potatoes just sliced and lightly salted.)

1/2 to 1-inch thick boneless skinless filet of any fish that you like. (Halibut and salmon are excellent for this dish.)  
A fruity extra virgin olive oil (I like Spanish or even Sardinian oils); enough to completely cover the fish.  
Salt and pepper to taste.

Heat the olive oil under a very low heat until it is warm - slightly hot like bath water (trust me).

Add the fish and turn off the heat (trust me).

Leave alone for about 7-12 minutes depending on the thickness of the filets.

With a spatula remove from oil and put directly on top of your salad (it will probably still look raw but again trust me).

Sprinkle sea salt and coarse grind whole pepper on the fish and the salad to taste.

**PLURAAC wants public hearings on flood plain building ordinance**

Members of a Lincoln County advisory board want to play more of a part in reviewing all applications for new construction or changes to existing buildings submitted within the Lincoln Historic District.

The Public Lands Use and Rural Affairs Advisory Council also asked county commissioners not to take any action on a flood plains management ordinance unless public hearings are conducted across the county. The third request, prompted by problems one member is having with a restriction on his own land, asked the commission to investigate the Lincoln Scenic Byways designation along U.S. 70.

County Attorney Alan Morel said last week that he is looking for more legislation of intent from those legislators who pushed the measure that now requires counties to adopt flood plain management ordinances.

Commissioners told him to keep researching the issue and not to hurry.

Commissioner Leo Martinez said he wants the county to do the least required and to keep it simple.

"Put the burden on someone else," he said, adding that those wanting to build in a flood plain could be required to gather data and prove their positions.

"This whole thing is like a pinball machine," Commissioner Earl Hobbs said of the proposed ordinance presented by Morel based on a Chaves County model. "It bounces all over. I can see the county become liable for a huge settlement if there's a flood in Hondo Valley. I dislike the whole ordinance."

"I do too," Morel said. Commissioners suggested because Chaves County legis-

lators sponsored the state bill, that county's ordinance might not be a good one to use as a model.

"I'd like to delete 80 percent to 90 percent of the regulations, but that may cut the ordinance to the point that we can't do what the state requires," Morel said.

As written, the county would be responsible to determine if property falls within the flood plain and what additional construction standards have to be met.

"The whole thing really grates on me," Hobbs said.

Tony Seno, a PLURAAC member, said that PLURAAC that, "Once you start dealing with the feds, there are strings attached and they will be watching you like a puppet."

In reference to the historical preservation district request, Jerry Carroll, an Oscura resident and alternate PLURAAC member, said that PLURAAC's mission is to protect private property rights on public and private land.

"Is it appropriate for PLURAAC to examine citizens' complaints that the ordinance you create is being violated capriciously by certain individuals and if they determine that is true, send a recommendation to you?"

Commission Chairman Rex Wilson said the district already is governed by a preservation board.

"I have some concerns about creating a parallel bureaucracy," he said, adding that public hearings on a revamped historical preservation ordinance are coming up and that would be the appropriate time to discuss the possible need or cover complaints.

PLURAAC is an advisory board, he emphasized.

Carroll asked if PLURAAC should refuse to hear complaints.

"No, because not hearing

would go against the public process," Wilson said. But an appeal is more appropriate to the county commission, he said.

Morel said PLURAAC is not an investigative instance. If an issue comes to that council, members should ask commissioners if they want the advisory board to pursue the details of a complaint before wasting their time, he said.

Carroll agreed that checking out each application could become cumbersome to the exclusion of other assignments.

Martinez said PLURAAC could request copies of the minutes of the preservation board meetings to stay informed.

The scenic byways issue wasn't discussed.

## Planet Holland still the fastest in Rainbow

Planet Holland proved his track record time was no fluke and bucked the conventional wisdom that the fastest horse in the time trials does not always win the final.

He did it with a time of 19.419 in the running of the Rainbow Futurity Sunday at Ruidoso Downs, and made all his connections very happy.

Probably happiest of all was Ruidoso Downs owner R.D. Hubbard, who is part owner of Planet Holland with John Jones and Butch Holmes.

"I've been trying to win this for a long, long time," Hubbard said in the winners circle after the race. "It doesn't matter if you're the track owner, winning is the most exciting thing to happen to you."

Planet Holland trainer Paul Jones was brought in by Hubbard specifically to train his horses, and the Quarter Horse Trainer of the Year has proven that to be a smart move.

Jones was a little apprehensive before the race, knowing the history of fastest qualifiers in the past, but he still took the fact that his horse owns the current track record for 400 yards as a good sign.

"You always hope he has another good show," Jones said. "This was the first time he's had a clean trip since his maiden race."

The \$300,000 won by Planet Holland increased his lifetime winnings 300 times over, and he will look to increase those winnings further with an entry in the All American trials in August.

Will the extra 40 yards in the third race prove a difficulty?


"I don't think so, that extra distance won't hurt us," Jones said. "He was finishing strong today."

Planet Holland had to beat out Cognac Kid in the final, a horse which came very close to giving trainer Jack Brooks and jockey Jacky Martin a double-win, as the two finished first in the Rainbow Derby a day earlier.

It was a difficult path for Phat Willie Sister to the running of the Rainbow Juvenile, but the filly proved to her owners she was worth all the time and money they invested by taking first on Sunday.

Phat Willie Sister won just her second race in four starts and won her second start in a

row, having finished atop the field in her Rainbow Futurity trial race.

Owner Henry Woodruff said his horse's previous trials was due to her immaturity.

"She didn't seem to have her

mind right, but I liked the way she moved when she was young," Woodruff said. "She just wasn't trying hard, just playing. I'm very happy with what Blane's done."

"Blane" is trainer Blane

Wood, who has been training horses for Woodruff for 25 years. In fact, Wood said Woodruff was one of the first owners he worked with and is happy to see their partnership pay off.

Phat Willie Sister was a little restless in the paddock, showing some of the problems she had at the beginning of her career. But Wood said that's more of an exception now than a rule.

"She's quiet as a mouse, and I wish they could all be like this," Wood said. "Earlier, she was a handful, but as she got older, she finally figured out what she was supposed to do."

Wood was modest about his contribution to Phat Willie Sister's improvement into a Rainbow Juvenile winner.


"No matter how good the trainer is, the horse has to be good," Wood said. "A good horse makes the trainer look good, and I look good today."

## Another track record falls in Rainbow Derby

It was almost a rerun of last year's All American Futurity, and the returning horses didn't disappoint in the running of the Rainbow Derby Saturday at Ruidoso Downs.

Silvered Eyes didn't disappoint his connections in showing his true form, as he not only won the \$318,000 race, he also set a track record for 440 yards previously held by last year's All American Futurity winner AB What A Runner.

Silvered Eyes stopped the clock at 20.963, beating out Ruidoso Derby winner Southern Cartel by 3/4 of a length and earning \$159,438.

All this after getting a relatively slow start out of the gate.

"Down the race track don't hurt this colt at all," said trainer Jack Brooks. "He did last year in the All American, he kind of stumbled away from there and at the end he made a big run. He did the same thing in the Dash for Cash (Futurity)."

The win was the fourth in a row for the gray gelding, and

surprisingly atypical of his previous starts. He may have started behind, but didn't stumble at the gate. That's something that plagued him throughout his first year of racing.

"Last year, he just wasn't a good gate horse," Martin said. "He never did anything wrong, but he'd either stumble or get

bumped. It was kind of his own fault, because he just didn't break well."

Silvered Eyes didn't enter the race as the favorite, that distinction belonged to Meteoric, who had won two of his last three starts and was

### AA champ sets another record

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# Two Ruidoso teams, two runners-up in Last Chance Qualifier

For a pair of Ruidoso-based teams, this weekend's Last Chance Qualifier was a frustrating experience.

Thunder and Nads, playing in two different divisions during the three-day tournament at Eagle Creek Complex, each finished a disappointing second.

What's even more frustrating is that they lost to non-Ruidoso teams — this in a double-elimination tournament which saw nine local teams in all competing in the two divisions: Men's D and Men's E.

The Nads needed only one win to secure the championship, but their defense broke down in one inning, which gave Comet Cleaners a 15-3 victory and forced a second game.


For a while, it looked as though the Nads would win the rubber match, spotting Comet Cleaners to a 3-0 lead early, then tying the game in the bottom of the first inning.

More than 1,500 contestants from the National High School Rodeo Association will be looking to make the world's largest rodeo the best event in the history of McGee Park in San Juan County. In its second year of a two-year stop in Farmington, the NHSFR officially got underway last Friday when the first portion of the NHSRA Queen's Contest took place at the Farmington Civic Center.

Contestants from 39 states, five Canadian provinces and Australia will compete in the NHSFR in 2003. New to the association this year is the Canadian province of Ontario. To qualify for the NHSFR, contestants in each event (with the exception of the NHSRA Queen's contest) have to have finished in the top four in their state or province. Each state or province will send only one contestant to take part in the NHSRA Queen's Contest.

Rodeo action started Monday morning with the first of 13 performances. Performances will be conducted twice a day (at 9 a.m. and 7 p.m.) each day for the first six days. Each contestant has their first-round run sometime between Monday morning and this evening. The second round kicks off on Thursday morning and runs through Saturday evening. The top 20 contestants in each event — based on

their two-round combined scores or times — will qualify to compete in the short round Sunday at 1 p.m. National champions will be determined based on their three-round total scores or times.

Lincoln County is well represented, with four top hands in the national event. Shayla Smith, Nogal, and Cheyenne Goodloe, Capitan, both qualified in the girls cutting. As this paper goes to press, Smith is competing in Tuesday evening's performance and again Friday morning.

Goodloe drew up in the Tuesday morning and Friday night performances. On Tuesday, Goodloe scored a 200 in the girls cutting, not good enough for the top 20.

Casey Sisk and Taos Muncy, both of Corona, each qualified in the saddle bronc riding. Sisk, who is also competing for New Mexico in the bull riding, got his first horse Tuesday morning and gets his second go round in the saddle bronc Friday night. He drew bulls in today's and Thursday's morning performances.

In Tuesday's saddle bronc performance, Sisk had a 66-point score, placing him sixth overall after three performances.

Muncy's saddle broncs will be in the chute on this morning and Thursday night.

There's more than just rodeo action on hand at McGee Park this week. A western-themed

trade show is free and open to the public. Contestants will also have the chance to show off their athletic skills by participating in a volleyball tournament and a three-on-three basketball tournament. The Special Kids Rodeo, which will introduce approximately 40

kids from the San Juan County Special Olympics Program to the basics of rodeo, is set for Thursday at 5:30 p.m. Nightly dances keep the two steppers in the crowds busy.

Association, the time compares favorably to the time of 17.135 set by Classy Sassy Chic at the American Airlines Challenge championship at Lone Star Park in November.

With the win, AB What A Runner remains undefeated in all five of her starts, but why the long layoff between Labor Day and now?


"We took a young embryo out of her this winter," said trainer Brett Vickery. "We gave her some time off and didn't bring her back into training until April. We didn't want to have to push her."

Pushing the horse to a good performance apparently wasn't a problem on Saturday, as jockey G.R. Carter got AB What A Runner off to a good start and was never challenged.

But for all the obvious talent this horse has, did her handlers have even the smallest doubt she would perform this well?

"You never know, with her first out, what she was going to do," Vickery said. "She was sure ready, but you never know how good they're going to do when they have that long a layoff. But we're very pleased."

Pleased enough to enter AB What A Runner in the All American Derby trials Aug. 15, where she'll try to extend her winning streak and increase her lifetime earnings of \$1,036,260.


But that aggressiveness obviously paid off, both in the final outcome of the race and in the horse's final disposition afterward.





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
