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

## Storm put ash in river, state says

Initial reports from the state Environment Department indicate an ash flow washed down the Ruidoso River by a sudden storm may have contaminated the river earlier this month.

Taylor Sharpe, with the enforcement division of the federal Environmental Protection Agency's regional office in Dallas, said Monday he met with officials of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs last week to discuss related issues on the river.

"The ED heard a large ash flow was the cause, but I would be surprised to hear (of) significantly high readings in fecals," he said, referring to the presence of organisms from the colons of humans or animals. Readings from test vials collected by village officials from the river on the evening of the July 11 event registered numbers "off the chart" for fecal contamination, the officials said at the time.

Suspended solids and sediment would be expected, Sharpe said. However, even runoff from the backyard of a person who

owns dogs could drive the fecal count into the thousands, he said.

He plans to ask officials with the Mescalero Apache Tribe's Environment Department to trace possible sources back up the river to higher elevations on the reservation or possibly U.S. Forest Service land, he said.

"They may have done that already and I'll be asking to see their report," he said. His agency will coordinate with the state to determine if a health threat is involved.

Taylor said one of the other topics discussed during his meeting last week with municipal officials was the improvements required at the wastewater treatment plant the two towns share and the possibility of a three-way partnership to include Mescalero.

That type of partnership

would be of great interest to the EPA, he said.

"Larger (wastewater) plants typically perform better than the smaller package-type plants," Sharpe said. Regional approaches are looked at favorably by the EPA.



Mescalero to replace malfunctioning treatment lagoons on the west side of the Sacramento Mountain range.

## \$1 million awarded for water plant

Gov. allocates funds for region

An announcement by Gov. Bill Richardson last week was the type of surprise municipal officials welcome.

Instead of another state mandate imposed without funding to help, the governor gave \$1 million to Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs for required improvements to the regional wastewater treatment plant they share on east U.S. 70.

"We just found out (last) Wednesday that we were getting the money," said village manager Lorri McKnight. "So it was a real surprise."

The governor delivered the news in person during a series of stops at communities sharing problems relating to water and wastewater treatment.

"There's \$500,000 for us and \$500,000 for Ruidoso Downs," McKnight said. "It's my understanding the source is federal

## Pearce to pay visit to village Monday

Stop is part of Congressional Update Tour

Two stops are planned on U.S. Rep. Steve Pearce's swing through Lincoln County next week.

With the U.S. House of Representatives in recess for the next month, Pearce will travel the state on his Congressional Update Tour. For the next few weeks, he will hit spots throughout his 64,000-square-mile district, meeting constituents and discussing topics such as jobs, the economy, Medicare, Iraq and education.

In Ruidoso, a press conference is scheduled for 3 p.m. Monday at the Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest. Pearce will focus on the Healthy Forest Initiative.

At 6:30 p.m. in Ruidoso Village Hall on Cree Meadows Drive, the congressman will conduct a town hall meeting.

"I invite everyone to come and join me and my staff for a conversation about our communities, our state and our country," he said. "This is a forum where we can gather in an organized manner as Southern New Mexicans and voice our concerns and share our visions for our state and for America."

"Southern New Mexicans hired me to represent their interests in Washington, and it is my job to remain accessible and accountable to those whom I represent. That is why I return to the state at every available opportunity."

By August, he plans to have staged a town hall meeting in every county in his congressional district.

# Downs council talks annexation, wastewater plant

They had come to discuss annexation, but citizens of Ruidoso Downs got — and gave — an earful about other festering issues at Thursday's regular meeting of the City Council.

The colorful, standing-room-only affair, punctuated by a heated argument, dire predictions and descriptions of filth and pollution, portrayed a city with numerous problems, but one with an involved citizenry working to resolve them.

Topping the agenda was the proposed annexation of areas east of town to the far side of Rocky Mountain Mobile Home & RV Park where residents receive but do not pay for city water, sewer and police and fire protection.

"This means the citizens of Ruidoso Downs are paying (through rates and property taxes) for services that are outside of the city limits," City Administrator John Waters told the room. "That is a serious issue fiscally from my standpoint in that ... we receive no revenue to pay for those services."

Police Chief Robert Logan reported his force responded to 129 emergency calls in outlying areas the past two years, about 85 percent of the department's calls.

That is not his jurisdiction, he said. "But if the Sheriff's Department or New Mexico State Police requests that we respond, then we do so."

The city is not bound to provide water for fire protection in outlying areas but does so, Waters said, as a neighbor.

Services usually dominate annexation

talk, but the Council voted 3-1, with Margie Morales dissenting, to petition the state

entire valley," Waters announced.

State and federal agencies including the Environmental Protection Agency consider the Rio Ruidoso contaminated with excess phosphorus and nitrates, which encourage formation of stream-choking algae.

The contamination results in part from septic tanks just east of Ruidoso Downs, Waters said.

"These areas are within reach of our sewer system," Waters said. "If we hook people on, the moratorium that stands from the City Council is that these folks have to be within the city limits."

Regardless, under the Federal Clean Water Act the city cannot meet EPA-mandated phosphorus standards within the time allowed. The city risks fines of up to \$25,000 a day "per incident" beginning in January 2004.

"We've been hoping that the EPA will delay the standard," Waters said. It will take up to three years to build a phosphorus facility, he said.

In the meantime, officials from Ruidoso Downs and the Village of Ruidoso, which faces contamination

issues of its own, are to meet in August with EPA officials in Dallas to explain how they are attempting to meet EPA standards. Involving the Municipal Boundary Commission in deciding annexation, Waters said, will show that Ruidoso Downs is serious about its commitment.

"We have to stand before the EPA ... to ask for a delay of that standard on the river," Waters said. "I have to take something in my hand down to Dallas. This (annexation resolution) is a serious statement by the City of Ruidoso Downs that says yes, we know there is a problem in the Rio Ruidoso, neither the City of Ruidoso Downs nor the Village of Ruidoso can afford the deadline that comes in January of 2004."

"Even if they reduce the fine to \$1,000 per day per incident, that equals \$365,000 a year; that is nothing we can afford, and all that does is go to pay for bureaucrats in Dallas. It doesn't improve the situation in the river."

If the three-member Municipal Boundary Commission, an independent body appointed by the governor, accepts the petition, it will conduct a public hearing on the annexation proposal within 60 days. It must advertise the hearing once per week for four weeks prior.

"This process does not annex anything," Waters said. "It simply allows the state to handle the process. There's going to be lots of input both ways. This is going to be the opportunity for folks

to get a neutral, unbiased (panel) to sit over this and listen to the merits of both sides.

"(The state) will make the decision whether this is viable and necessary for the citizens that live in this area and for the state."

In other Council developments:

• Citizen Barbara Green accused Councilor Morales, who works for the legal firm that represents the Village of Ruidoso, of a conflict of interest, claiming that Morales is "pry to information that is confidential that can be very helpful to Ruidoso and very hurtful to us if it leaked out."

She added, "I would like to know where your loyalties lie."

Morales responded that there is a "Chinese wall" in the attorney's office that keeps her from working on anything pertaining to the Village of Ruidoso or the City of Ruidoso Downs. She also took umbrage for Green's public "attack."

A near-shouting match ensued, interrupted by Mayor Bob Miller's gavel. Local restaurateur Pappy Bell later took the podium to call for Morales' resignation.

"I object to that," Councilor Rene Olivo replied, "because Margie's been here for 10 years. And if people didn't want to elect her she wouldn't be in office."

Susan Goodrich, a resident on Burke Lane, asked the council to consider condemnation of a property on Thompson, which she claims is home to squatters living in substandard conditions without utilities, surrounded by disabled vehicles and hidden garbage.

"It's a health hazard with a criminal element up there," she said. "My neighbor is worried to let her children walk the street."

Police Chief Logan confirmed that a methamphetamine lab on the premises was raided several weeks ago and expressed hope that criminal charges will follow. He added that the landowner assured him he "is making an effort to get the property cleaned up."

Waters agreed the site is a "God-awful mess" but that condemnation is a last resort that involves "substantial amounts of money by the city" to clean, maintain and sell the property.

If the property owner does not act, or if there are code violations, the city is expected to take further action.

• The Council voted 3-0, with Susan Garrett abstaining, to allow the Downs Chamber of Commerce to use city property for a temporary building until the chamber gets a permanent location.

• After hearing citizen Warren Beavers joke that Parker Road be renamed Suicide Lane due to traffic dangers, Waters announced that speed bumps had been planned for both sides of the Parker bridge spanning the Rio Ruidoso, which recently incurred \$5,500 worth of damage from a bulldozer pulling a trailer across it. The city has taken police action and sent a bill to parties responsible.

• Waters announced that Governor Bill Richardson has awarded the city \$500,000 towards expansion of the wastewater facility. Expansion, he said, should be completed within 2-5 years and is designed to carry the plant 30 years into the future.

"The governor is very high on the Rio Ruidoso Valley," Waters said.

money that came to New Mexico as part of the President's tax cut. They were looking at areas utilizing regional approaches "to distribute the money."

The village manager hasn't see the cash yet.

"It's coming through the state Department of Finance and Administration," she said. "I talked with them last week and they said the paperwork is being readied and should be sent shortly."

Richardson allocated more than \$10.5 million for water projects for southern and southeastern New Mexico.

"There is a true sense of urgency to these efforts," the governor said. "The severe drought has created a genuine water crisis in New Mexico. We must relentlessly attack our water problems now to ensure the well being of our citizens and our continued economic growth in the future."

He pointed out that the 21-year-old regional wastewater treatment plant east of Ruidoso Downs is operating at capacity and cannot handle the growth and expansion of the area.

"These improvements (expansion of the plant) are critical to protect the public health and environment and allow for continued economic growth," Richardson said.

Other awards announced last week include:

• \$3 million for Alamogordo's desalinization project to provide an alternate source of potable water for the area. The project will process

an estimated 4 to 6 million gallons of water on a daily basis, with the ability to grow to 12 million gallons per day. This project is the only one of its kind in New Mexico and will serve as a pilot for the state and for the Southwest.

• \$142,000 for Tularosa for the next phase of the city's water system improvements project. This funding will allow the village to upgrade to meet the current water demands and plan for future expansion, as well as continue improvements to the water treatment facility.

• \$1.4 million for Las Cruces to drill and connect a new well for the city's water system. The funding will also allow the city to connect two new wells that have already been drilled. This project will improve the water system and allowed for continued growth

and economic development for the Las Cruces community.

• \$800,000 for Clovis with \$500,000 going to improvements to the city's storm drainage systems, which currently cannot handle heavy rains and create flooding problems; and \$300,000 to the city's low to moderate-income housing improvement program.

• \$1 million to Portales for conversion of 17 wells from agricultural use to city use, and to install pipelines and connect them to the wells.

• \$600,000 to Artesia for the next phase of the wastewater treatment plant effluent project. The project will equip the city to treat wastewater and build effluent ponds to provide a primary source of irrigation for parks and other public spaces, reducing use of potable water.

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# Fort Stanton history spotlighted

History buffs, public invited to take part in Fort Stanton Live Aug 9.

An easy and entertaining way to learn about the history of Fort Stanton and Lincoln County waits for visitors to the second annual Fort Stanton Live celebration Aug. 9.

From 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., visitors to the 1855 fort about 15 miles northeast of Ruidoso can immerse themselves into an era when Buffalo Soldiers were stationed at the fort and the Mescalero Apaches came to the high mesa to spend the winter.

Gen. "Blackjack" Pershing was quartered in one of the buildings and Kit Carson served at the fort. Demonstrations, living history performances, Apache dances, military music, storytellers and military reenactments throughout the day will give a glimpse into their everyday lives at the fort and nearby settlements, say promoters from the Fort Stanton Partnership.

The day will start with the raising of the colors. State Rep. Dub Williams, a Republican from Glencoe who introduced and sponsored the successful bill for the creation of a Fort Stanton Development Commission, is an invited guest, along with members of the commission and the representatives and senators who pushed the

measure. Last year's celebration brought in 2,200 people and boosters of the fort hope to double that number this year.

Visit with Lydia Lane, a military wife who was posted to Fort Stanton, said Nisha Hoffman, public relations spokesman for Fort Stanton Inc. Talk with John Ryan about a soldier's life on the southwestern frontier, and listen to the stories of Ellen Casey, a rancher's widow who ran her ranch, raised her family and sold her produce and cattle to the fort.

Move into the Marine Hospital years with Grace Laws, wife of Dr. James Laws, a patient/doctor at the hospital. Hear stories of a German seaman who sat out World War II at an immigra-

tion detainee camp at the fort. Watch Apache dances that have been part of the Mescalero culture for centuries, Hoffman said.

Walk the grounds, talk to the people, feast on a kaleidoscope of foods from the Apache, Hispanic and Anglo cultures, she said. View period craftsmen at their work, she said. Take home a souvenir.

The Fort Stanton Museum and Visitors Center will be open throughout the day.

The event is sponsored by the Fort Stanton Partnership composed of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, Fort Stanton Inc., the Roswell office of the Bureau of Land Management, the Lincoln County Historical Society and the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

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## County seeks to protect LCDC booking guard

Commissioner expresses fear over possible hostage situation

A female guard who books prisoners into the Lincoln County Detention Center outside of Carrizozo should be protected from inmates by some type of barrier, two county commissioners say.

County manager Tom Stewart took their advice and placed the project at the top of his "to-do" list, pending the return of the handyman who handles in-house small construction projects.

"I want to talk to him about the design," Stewart said Tuesday. "I'm thinking a combination of a 4-foot tall brick wall, then fencing up to about 8 feet with a small port hole."

The subject was brought up July 17

after commissioners toured the jail during a break in their meeting. Commissioner Leo Martinez asked why there isn't at least a wire mesh barrier separating prisoners from the booking officer.

Commissioners Earl Hobbs said, "It strikes me that someone could get loose - maybe not get out of the building - but take a hostage."

He asked Sheriff Tom Sullivan if deputies worried about the arrangement.

"They have mentioned it as a security issue," Sullivan replied.

He's worked in and around jails most of his life and he said, "This is the first I've seen where there is no protection for the booking officer."

Commission Chairman Rex Wilson directed Stewart to check the cost of a barrier.

"Just as long as it's higher than a man can jump," Hobbs said.

Martinez said even if the booking officer wasn't harmed, a prisoner could damage the computers and other equipment that would cost more to fix than putting up a barrier.

"We need to make it safe and convenient for the employees," he said.

Stewart told commissioners in a related issue that the fire marshal backed away from a requirement for a second door in a prisoner pod. The architect showed the state official the regulations governing the type of design used, he said.

## Ex-Downs firefighters amend complaint

Two former firefighters suing the city of Ruidoso Downs and its council members filed an amended complaint last week in U.S. District Court in Albuquerque.

Magistrate Judge Leslie C. Smith denied a motion by Derek Brooks, the Roswell attorney representing the Ruidoso Downs council, to dismiss the case. Brooks argued that Jimmy and Don Smith failed to cite certain elements in the case essential to the requirements of law.

But the judge disagreed and allowed J. Robert Beauvais, the Ruidoso attorney representing the Smiths, to file an amended complaint. It accuses municipal officials of violating the civil

rights of the two men, of retaliating against them, and of malicious prosecution for supplying flawed documents tied to criminal charges against them. They later were acquitted.

The men are asking for a jury trial, for unspecified compensatory and punitive damages, court costs and any other relief the court deems appropriate.

The basic contention in the case is that Jimmy Smith, a full-time classified permanent employee of the Ruidoso Downs Fire Department, and Don Smith, a "partially paid" member of the department, were rebuffed when they tried to express their concerns to a new city administration. They took issue with policies enacted in reference to restrictions on use

of fire equipment and curtailment of fire response.

The suit contends that as a direct result of their exercise of free speech and asking for a redress of grievance, Don Smith was removed as the ranking officer in the fire department and termination proceeding were started against Jim Smith without probable cause.

The amended complaint contends that city officials show a common practice of interfering with the constitutional rights of people, and their actions were a deliberate attempt to "chill and retaliate" against the two firefighters for exercising their constitutional rights.

The original lawsuit was filed on Dec. 6, 2002.

## State, tribal governments to meet in Santa Fe

In a move designed to enhance the level of cooperation between state government and native American tribes in New Mexico, officials will meet at the Tribal-State Economic Development Summit Thursday in Santa Fe.

The All Indian Pueblo Council requested the summit in January.

"The request was made at our initial meeting with the governor in January when he talked about this government-to-government relationship," Gil Vigil, vice chairman of the county, said. "We signed an agreement committing both sides to have these summits on a regular basis."

The Navajo Nation and the Mescalero Apache and Jicarilla Apache Nation were invited to

join in the summit.

The All-Indian Pueblo Council includes representatives from Acoma, Cochiti, Isleta, Jemez, Laguna, San Felipe, Santa Ana, Santo Domingo, Sandia, Zia, Zuni, Nambe, Picuris, Pojoaque, San Ildefonso, San Juan, Santa Clara, Taos and Tesuque pueblos. It is a prehistoric alliance of the 19 pueblos located in what is now the state of New Mexico.

Policies will be reviewed and recommendations offered that will benefit both the state and the tribes, Vigil added.

The summit will start at 8 a.m. with a welcome and opening prayer. Discussion sessions include financing and incentives, infrastructure and water, taxation, tourism and hospitality.

The sessions are closed to the public, but concluding statements by Gov. Bill Richardson and members of the council will be open at 4:15 p.m. in the Rotunda.

## We'll preview a new voting world soon

That September special election will test electronic voting

Finally, New Mexico's voting system is moving into a more modern mode, thanks to an infusion of \$5 million in Florida chad-inspired cash from Washington — and early voters in Lincoln County will get a preview of the system for that Sept. 23 special election seeking to remove a couple of Constitutional limitations on educational control and the spending of land grant permanent funds.

County Clerk Tammie Maddox has leased two of the new computerized, touch-screen voting machines to handle early absentee voting. The state will be providing a total of 21 machines in time for the primary election in 2004.

The machine change is a part of the Help America Vote Act, which President George W. Bush signed into law in late 2002.

The new voting system is computer-based and has much more capacity than the machines most recently used in the county. The clerk's office

staff is praising the machines as being compact, lightweight and user friendly, giving a chance for voters to change their minds.

It's, as noted, a computer-based system for which software will be provided by the Secretary of State (who runs all state elections). Secretary Rebecca Vigil-Jiron has been pushing for modernized voting for at least a decade.

By Jan. 1, 2004, the state should have a full-blown computerized voter list accessible on the Web, one that can be maintained by county clerks — but also can be massaged to remove duplicated names and deceased voters at the state level.

More changes are in the wind, including identification for new voters.

But, all this electronic wizardry they're talking about entails one ancient computer caveat that we hope everybody in Santa Fe and Carrizozo's courthouse remembers:

"To err is human. To really foul up takes a computer."

But wait a minute here. This is not a lady living in the past who spends her days humming anti-war ballads. Lynette Seward is actually living the future to which most of us better log on if we don't intend to dry up and blow away.

Lynette and her Greater World subdivision neighbors are using

the water nature provides.

She has lived in her 1,200-square-foot home since October and has yet to purchase a drop of water. Instead, she catches rainwater off her roof in two 1,200-gallon tanks.

After filtering, the rainwater is used for showering, washing dishes and clothes, for indoor gardens, then to flush the toilet, and, finally, to water outdoor plants.

Sound farfetched? Not at all. New Mexico is as thirsty as Nick Nolte coming off a three-day drunk. In Santa Fe, the city is providing at cost 2,500 rain barrels for "catchment," a term that certainly will become common in years to come.

Albuquerque offers a \$500 rebate to city water customers who reroute their plumbing to harvest gray water. The New Mexico legislature passed a bill encouraging the use of gray water. I found that laughable only in that it is one more instance of double-speak. The water is not "gray," it is "dirty." Dirty or not, though, the water can be treated and used.

If you think these last several years of scant rainfall have been abnormal, think again. The period from 1970 to 1990 was the wettest in three centuries. Translation: the drought we are experiencing now is normal, and we can expect more of the same.

Water strategists are putting a lot of cards into play. Certainly, the 200 million acre feet of salty water underneath Alamogordo has everyone's attention. Still, you don't need love beads to realize it makes little sense for rainwater to run down the pavement to oblivion.

## 5 Mescalero students get NMSU experience

Five high school students from the Mescalero Apache School lived in dorms and ate in the cafeteria at New Mexico State University in Las Cruces, attending a summer enrichment program on health careers this summer.

Most of the students were members of the Health Careers Opportunity Program at the school and had attended a two-day conference in Farmington in May. The summer enrichment session was six weeks, from June 1 through July 11.

Myrtii Kanseah, a senior considering a career in pediatrics, said the students were required to turn in an application and an essay saying why they wanted to go and how they would benefit. She said the main purpose was to get college experience.

Jesse Martinez said he wanted to learn how to get into college and how to become an epidemiologist. The activity that had the biggest impact on him was the job shadowing they did on Fridays. He shadowed two epidemiologists.

"It gave us new opportunities to learn how professionals at and to see what their jobs were," Martinez said. He added that it's a good experience for people who want to learn to get into college.

Jacob De la Cruz, who is considering a career as a pediatrician, said the highlight for him was meeting new people. He shadowed an emergency medical technician and a social worker.

Besides the Mescalero school,

28 other students came from Alamo-Navajo, Tularosa, Lordsburg, Hot Springs, Santa Teresa, Magdalena, Gadsden and Hatch Valley schools. They took pre- and post-tests and participated in enrichment activities in biology, chemistry, computers, medical terminology, environmental ecology, English, math and study skills. In addition, they went on field trips to White Sands, Carlsbad, Old Mesilla, Dripping Spring, and to a play in El Paso, "Viva El Paso."

The students received a stipend for attending and graduating from the program, said Donna McFadden, mother of Donnell McFadden, a sophomore who wants to be a veterinarian.

Kanseah said the teachers were trying to get them to college level, and the students were used to high school.

"Some of them got on your nerves," De la Cruz, said.

Students received special trophies and certificates for their participation: Kanseah for "Happy Go Lucky," McFadden for "Most Mysterious," Martinez for "Longest Short Story," Shaleen Evans for "Most Helpful," and De la Cruz for "Cleanest Room." Martinez also received the computer award for most-improved student, and McFadden received English and medical terminology awards for his grade level.

The Health Careers Opportunity Program is a new addition to the many health-related programs at the Southern Area Health Education Center at NMSU, funded by the

### SDE to share ratings

The New Mexico State Department of Education will announce public school ratings for the 2003-2004 school year at a media briefing Aug. 4. Ratings for 741 of New Mexico's 750 public schools will be released at the briefing.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Michael J.

Davis will be joined by Melville Morgan, Ph.D., the assistant superintendent of accountability, at the ratings announcement.

"With this year's public school ratings announcement, New Mexico is beginning its three-year phase-in of federal requirements for public school accountability. By breaking down student performance by group this first year, we have a unique opportunity to close achievement gaps and help ensure that public education serves all student," Davis said.

This is the fourth year for public schools in New Mexico to be rated. For 2003-2004, as required under the federal No Child Left Behind Act, student achievement data have been disaggregated by group of students segmented by race, income level, special needs and English-language learners. Student achievement data have been combined across grade levels by subject. Graduation rates have been added for secondary schools. If a school lacks 95 percent participation in any whole group or subgroup, that group's scores will not be able to rate above "meets standards."

## Ready to lead in Ruidoso

■ The school system's newest administrators have at least one thing in common: They're women.

Ruidoso Schools went from no female administrators to three female administrators in the past two months.

Gail Wickstrom, Ph.D., took over as superintendent of schools July 1, and Brenda A. McCary and Jane A. Thompson were hired to start Aug. 1 as principal of Nob Hill Early Childhood Center and assistant principal of Ruidoso High School, respectively.

McCary comes to Ruidoso from Littlefield, Texas, where she served as elementary principal from 1990-2003. She was assistant principal at the high school for two years prior to that and second-grade teacher for eight years before that.

Having worked with both younger and older students, McCary thinks the change to Nob Hill-age children "will be interesting ... Kids basically are the same," she said. "They're just in different size packages. They want to be treated with respect and they want to go to school where they feel safe and wanted. I think for kindergarten students, it's particularly important that those first experiences be wonderful experiences, very positive."

Besides kindergarten students, Nob Hill houses the Birth-to-Three, Parents-as-Teachers, developmentally delayed and Head Start programs.

"I was wanting to make a change and I think Ruidoso is a beautiful place to live, and everyone is so nice and welcoming," McCary said. "At first I thought I would apply to substitute teach, not thinking a principalship would open up because everything is so stable here."

Roger Sowder resigned in May as principal of Nob Hill.

McCary has friends who live in Ruidoso and she had been visiting for many years.

She received her bachelor of science degree in education from Texas Tech University and her master of education degree from Sul Ross State University. Littlefield Elementary School was recognized as one of the top 10 elementary schools in Texas in the lower-middle economic group by *Texas Monthly* in 2001, was a Recognized Campus for five years based

on academic testing results, and McCary was chosen as teacher of the year by the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture for 2002. She is a member of Texas Elementary Principals and Supervisors Association, Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development and Honor Society of Phi Kappa Phi.

McCary sees her role as principal at Nob Hill as a role model or guide for the children and an extension of the teacher more than as a disciplinarian.

"I'd heard really good things about the Ruidoso Schools and Nob Hill in particular," McCary said. "My goal is to help continue that success and to do the very best I can for these children. What's best for children is the guideline for all decisions, in my opinion."

Thompson moved to Ruidoso from Portales to replace Art Howard as assistant principal at the high school this year, after serving as coordinator of teacher education for Eastern New Mexico University since 2001.

"As coordinator of teacher education at ENMU, I worked with student teachers, placed them and worked with faculty," she said. "It gave me a different view of education."

From 1998 to 2000, she was an English lecturer at ENMU, teaching composition, writing and methods of teaching English at the high school level, and from 1992 to 1996, she taught English and theater at Portales High School.

Thompson is involved in the National Writer's Project, a "teachers teaching teachers" model, which she also taught in 1995 through ENMU as assistant fellow of the High Plains Writing Project — providing models for writing instruction in the classroom and including writing in the curriculum at all grade levels.

Since 2001, she has been the legislative liaison for the High Plains Writing Project, lobbying for funds at the state and national levels, and

she will continue that involvement while in Ruidoso.

Thompson served on the Portales School Board from 1997 to 2002, serving as president from 2000-2001.

Receiving her bachelor of science degree in English with a minor in communications/theater from ENMU, she also obtained her master's degree in English from ENMU.

Thompson intends to be a very visible assistant principal at Ruidoso High School and considers that visibility an important part of the job.

"Discipline is part of my role, but it's a team effort, working with teachers and students," she said. "I'm very proactive. I plan to be out there getting to know students. I believe we can alleviate a lot of problems if we get to know them and what's going on with them. Seven hundred (students) is not an unreasonable number when you have several administrators."

Thompson became acquainted with Ruidoso over the years while working with student teachers and school teachers as the teacher education coordinator for ENMU. Last March, she finished her administrative license, and applied in schools in Clovis and Ruidoso. With one son attending school in Portales and two in Las Cruces, Ruidoso puts her in a strategic location for visits among them.

"I really liked it here," she said. "The people are so friendly and I thought it would be a good place to live. I like the outdoors."

## E-learning yet to find niche with children at home, study finds

LONDON — Despite the expectations that surround it, e-learning is still an uncertain market, particularly when it comes to children in the home, according to new research funded by the Economic & Social Research Council.

A study led by Professor David Buckingham, of the Centre for the Study of Children, Youth and Media at

the Institute of Education, University of London, found that few companies are really sure how they will make money from the web. Different providers with different motivations and constraints are jostling for position in an insecure yet competitive market.

For several reasons, the large and established educational websites are in a very strong

position. There is not yet much sign that the Internet will foster a "cottage industry" of smaller, independent producers. Branding is important, given the difficulty in reaching the target market and the diversity of content available, and this also favors existing companies. But the websites currently available are quite limited, both in terms of content and interac-


tivity, says the report.

Professor Buckingham said: "This is partly a matter of money — it costs a lot to make an engaging website that will compete well with other computer-based entertainment. But the market in home learning is also currently dominated by the imperatives set by central government, which are all about testing."

Kallea and her 4-H leader/mom, Velma Ward, milk the goats two times a day. They pasteurize the milk to then feed back to the babies. They also make cheese from the milk and sell some of it for pet milk. Kallea works four to five hours a day with her animals. Beside the

exercising they need, the feeding and pen cleaning is a daily requirement.

C-Mountain 4-H'er Sara Rush is a role model to Ward. She looks to Rush for the patterns set in working with her animals as well as the leadership role Rush fills. Ward is the treasurer for C-Mountain 4-H. She says the most important part about 4-H is the personal skills you learn and the responsibility. "I have something to go forward to, not just lay on the couch. And to have fun too."

## 'Zozo council awards power plant lease

In a special meeting Monday night, the Carrizozo City Council gave representatives of the Carrizozo Heritage Museum an unanimous thumbs up for a long term lease on the old power plant building.

The council's vote to lease the building instead of selling it on the open market brought to a close months of efforts by the museum representatives to lock up the use of the sister building for future museum expansion. Plans are to annex the old power plant to the museum, expand display areas and add a renovation space, storage, and a stage as funding is found.

Council members' only stipulations for the museum group were for the roof tin on the old building to be secured in the immediate near future and for quarterly progress reports to be made to the council. A legal agreement for the lease with stipulated terms will be drawn up and signed.

Ray Dean, representing LCSWA, advised the board that money had been budgeted by LCSWA to move the roll off that services the town of Carrizozo to city property. The money would cover the clean up costs of the old site as well as fencing and securing a new location. Naming a location will be on the agenda for the next regular council meeting.

The council approved the concept of a joint powers agreement (JPA) with Lincoln County to construct an animal facility near

the county detention center. County Manager Tom Stewart outlined the proposed concept to be funded by money from the county and staffed and managed with existing resources. The plan came on the heels of increasing cost requests from the Humane Society of Lincoln County and the repeated reports of dissatisfaction with the apportionment of costs between government entities of the county.

Presbyterian Medical Services representatives presented council members with an outline of their services in rural and small town New Mexico as a courtesy prior to the upcoming proposal PMS will make for the operations of Carrizozo Health Clinic. Focusing on family and community care, PMS outlined the services they offer and the benefits they bring to residents with or without insurance or program coverage.

In other business the council:

- Approved adoption of Resolution No. 2003-12 Infrastructure Capital Improvements Plan.

- Approved adoption of Resolution No. 2003-09 Clean-up Resolution for the fiscal year 2002-2003.

- Approved the appointment of Rolland Caster to the Planning and Zoning Board.

- Approved changing the building insurance to High Country and naming Dave Parks as agent of record. The change represents a \$6,000 savings to the city.

The next regular council meeting will be Aug. 12 at 6 p.m.

## Suspect in high-speed chase finally apprehended by campers near Bonita

A wild chase "over the hills and through the woods" ended with the capture and arrest of Roswell resident James W. Bullard Saturday after Bullard led members of four different law enforcement agencies into the Bonito Lake area.

Shortly after 1 p.m., officer Steve Minner, of the Capitan Police Department, was notified by the Lincoln County Sheriff's dispatcher that an automobile was driving in an erratic manner towards Capitan on State Highway 48. Officer Minner positioned his police vehicle at the edge of town and when the

vehicle described by the dispatcher arrived in Capitan, he drove behind it and attempted to stop the vehicle, using his flashing lights and siren. The driver — later identified as Bullard — sped up and did not stop. However, Minner managed to get the license plate number of the car and while chasing the suspect vehicle, he called it into the dispatcher. A few minutes later the dispatcher informed him that the license plate was registered to a different car. By this time Bullard had executed a U-turn in front of the Capitan School and began retracing his steps at a high rate of speed.

Chuck George, the Capitan police chief, was at home moni-

toring his radio. He left home in his police vehicle and joined in the chase. So did units of the Lincoln County Sheriff's office, who set up a road block at the intersection of State Highway 48 and State Highway 37. During the chase to the area of the road block, Bullard reportedly drove in an extremely reckless manner, forcing other motorists off the road and at one point when he was blocked both fore and aft, aimed his car at George's vehicle. George ducked out of his way and the suspect continued towards Ruidoso.

When Bullard reached the roadblock, he allegedly pulled off the road at high speed to the right and managed to get on

Highway 37. From there he proceeded to the Bonito Lake Road again reportedly traveling at a high rate of speed and forcing other vehicles off of the road. He continued around Bonito Lake and entered Kraut Canyon, at times becoming airborne on the berms that have been placed there to slow drivers down, according to the police report.

When he reached the dead end of Kraut Canyon, Bullard abandoned the vehicle and ran into the woods where he managed to elude the officers chasing him. George ordered a tow truck to take the suspect's vehicle to the Capitan Police Department and then returned to obtain a search warrant allowing him to

search the car. Officers from the Sheriff's Department went to the campgrounds surrounding Bonito Lake and warned campers to be on the lookout for the suspect, who was now afoot. By this time the New Mexico State Police, the U.S. Forest Service Police and the New Mexico Game and Fish enforcement officers had joined in the chase.

While George was waiting for the search warrant to be approved, he received a telephone call from the Sheriff's dispatcher informing him that Bullard had been detained by three campers and held until Sheriff's Deputy Ken Cramer arrived to take him into custody.

After obtaining the search warrant for the car, George found more than a pound of marijuana in the trunk, drug paraphernalia and open containers of alcohol.

Bullard was transported to the Lincoln County Detention Center and charged with possession of marijuana with intent to distribute; reckless driving; resisting, evading or obstructing an officer; and driving on a revoked driver's license. Bond was set at \$15,000 cash only by magistrate judge William Butts. Other charges may be brought against Bullard as the result of a continuing investigation.

No one was injured and no vehicles were struck.

The 15th DWI charge against a New Mexico man is not shocking. It is common place. Charged 14 times,

and having spent five years and two months in prison for assorted drunk driving episodes, the man is a public danger and should never be allowed behind the wheel of any vehicle again.

How can our judicial system be so fouled up that people, who are proven threats to the public and who have been convicted of crimes against the state, are allowed to go free?

Gov. Bill Richardson is getting on the band wagon of "closing loopholes" in the laws dealing with sex criminals and DWI offenders. Albuquerque mayor Martin Chavez wants a city ordinance that would require sex offenders to notify prospective employers of their convictions.

I applaud the governor's rhetoric and the mayor's proposal, but I expected the ACLU's stance for the criminal and against the victim. I hope that the governor will do something more than just talk and that the Albuquerque mayor will not bow down to the ACLU. For some reason

or the other, I believe that it will take more than "closing the loopholes" and publicizing sex offenders' crimes to correct the problems.

I believe we are in the circumstances that we are because judges who have sworn to uphold the law, don't. The bleeding-heart liberals, who want to blame the criminal's acts on the way they were treated as children, want to excuse criminal behavior. And they pressure our judges. The ACLU brings threats against judges if they do not interpret the law favorable to the criminal.

We need judges who have the

courage to judge rightly according to the law, no matter what. We need legislators and political leaders who care more for what is right than their political futures. Those needs will be met only as we, the people, elect men and women of character and conviction to represent us in state government and to sit on judicial benches.

# Eight signs that could mean your teenager is using drugs

**QUESTION:** I am suspicious that my 16-year-old son may be using some kind of illegal drugs. He's just not himself lately, and his friends are some of the weirdest guys you ever saw. Can you summarize the most common symptoms of drug abuse? What should I look for?

poor. Weight loss may occur.

4. The personality suddenly changes; the individual may become irritable, inattentive, and confused, or aggressive, suspicious and explosive.

5. Body and breath odor are often bad. Cleanliness is generally ignored.

6. The digestive system may be upset - diarrhea, nausea and vomiting may occur. Headaches and double vision are also common. Other signs of physical deterioration may include change in skin tone and body stance.

7. Needle marks on the body, usually appearing on the arms, are an important symptom. These punctures sometimes get infected and appear as sores and boils.

8. Moral values often crumble and are replaced by new, avant-garde ideas and values.

Let me caution you that some kids are able to hide their drug use better than others. You might stop by to see the officer in charge of narcotics enforcement for your local police department.

He or she may be able to give you more specific information applicable to your son.

**QUESTION:** What about snooping through my son's room to see what he might be doing? Do you think parents should do that?

**DR. DOBSON:** There are definitely times when mothers and fathers need to conduct their own quiet investigation, even though it might invade the privacy of the teenager. This issue was discussed widely in the media some years ago when comedian Carol Burnett discovered her teenage daughter was a drug user. When the problem finally came to light, Carol was regretful that she hadn't taken steps to inform herself of what was going on. She appeared on many talk shows to say, in effect, that kids desperately need their parents to "catch them" in a moment like that. Don't let your respect for their privacy cause you to stick your head in the sand and fail to notice what is going on right in front of you. I strongly agree.

Of course, parents have to "know" their children, too. There are some who would never do anything illegal or harmful. It's just not in them. In those cases, I would not

recommend snooping through their room and private stuff. But in situations where a secretive boy or girl is doing suspicious things, running with the wrong crowd, and then demanding utter privacy at home, I would gather whatever information I needed in order to know how to respond.

**QUESTION:** My 14-year-old boy is flighty, mischievous, irresponsible and lazy. If I don't watch him very carefully, he'll find ways to get into trouble - not really bad stuff, just stupid kid behavior. But I'm afraid I could lose him right at this time. What can I do to keep him on track?

**DR. DOBSON:** It is most important to keep your rambunctious youngster moving. If you let him get bored, he'll find destructive ways to use unstructured and unsupervised time. My advice is to get him involved in the very best church youth program you can find. If your local congregation has only four bored kids in its junior high department and seven sleepy high schoolers, I would consider changing churches. I know doing that could be disruptive to the rest of your family, but it might help save your volatile kid. This can be done

not only through church activities but also by involvement with athletics, music, horses or other animals, and part-time jobs. The hope is that one of those options will grab his fancy at some point, and his boundless energy will be channeled into something constructive. Until then, you must keep that energetic kid's legs churning!

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# Roots of ranchmen's religious camp start in Europe

The Nogal Mesa camp was held for the 64th time earlier this month.

On July 20 the 64th consecutive annual Nogal Mesa Ranchmen's Camp Meeting came to a close after a sincere and thought-provoking service led by Pastor Curtis K. Shelburne whose pulpit is the 16th and D Church of Christ in Muleshoe, Texas.

Many historians believe that the American West in the 19th century, with its vast distances between settlements and ranches and the primitive road/trail system that connected these settlements, was the reason that religious camp meetings became a popular way for people to get together for a week or so of preaching and praying and visiting with neighbors and relatives who were seldom seen.

This, however, was not the genesis of the religious camp meeting. It began in northern England along the Scottish border, where people, known as

"Borderers" developed a strong antipathy towards state churches, religious taxes and established clergy. On both sides of the Scottish and English border and in the back country, the common people held the Anglican priesthood in contempt for their lack of piety and subservience to the landed gentry.

The disaffected Scots, Scotch/Irish and even some Englishmen sent for learned clergy of faiths other than the state-mandated Anglican Church, and while these clergymen may not have had the benefit of a college education, they were well versed in the Bible, oratorical skills and appeals to reason with strong emotions. This led to the establishment of outdoor "field meetings" and "Holy Fairs."

In the case of the Nogal Mesa Ranchmen's Camp Meeting that is held annually in July, some of these historical factors may come into play.

In 1939, the first year of the Camp Meeting, New Mexico was a different place than it is today.

At that time it probably resembled more the New Mexico of the frontier days than it does the present. Roads were scarce and difficult to travel, and while the automobile had made its presence felt, a significant amount of travel was still on horseback or by horse and wagon.

The telephone had made its appear-

ance, mainly as local PBX boards, one of which still exists in the back yard of 107 South Lincoln Ave. in Capitan. However, its use was largely within the municipalities and their immediate vicinity.

Though the Ranchmen's Camp Meeting was not begun in reaction to a state-imposed religious tax, churches were still largely centered in the small rural towns and were in many cases a long way from the large ranches which dominated the rural areas. The annual Ranchmen's Camp Meeting provided two of the most important functions that such meetings had always provided: A week of formal religious services, and Bible study under the tutelage of learned preachers, and formal prayer meetings. It also provided a week for friends and relatives who saw one another infrequently to visit with one another and admire new additions to families.

Thanks in large part to Opal and LaMoyné Peters (LaMoyné has attended all 64 of the Nogal Ranchmen's Camp Meetings) and all of the old-timers and such newcomers as are inclined, the meetings still draw a

crowd. Thus it serves the same purpose it has always served — a week where old friends renew their friendships and worship together in the beautiful setting.

There are no strangers at the Ranchmen's Camp Meeting. Everyone is anxious to meet newcomers and draw them into what seems to amount to a large family. The size of this year's meeting is attested to by the fact that from July 16 through July 20, 3,500 meals were served, all at no cost to those who consumed them, though donations were accepted.

The familial attitude of the people attending the meeting coupled with the spectacular setting on the escarpment overlooking Carrizozo and the Tularosa Basin, as well as the gentle sermons delivered by pastors visiting from great distances and the emotional catharsis the sermons, Bible study and prayer meetings provide, serves its purpose. One leaves feeling renewed and at peace with both himself and the world.

When this feeling is added to the sincerity of the new friends one meets, it makes the world seem not as harsh a place as it sometimes appears.

## Piecing together frontier fashion

White Oaks woman makes new wardrobes old again

In the old territorial house at the end of town a late-night glow shines from the attic window. Folks in White Oaks, few as they are, know that tonight Valarie Thomas is at work.

Thomas, a seamstress who makes custom, authentic Victorian clothing for her own Ghost Rider Apparel line, is the most exacting historical clothier in Lincoln County, and perhaps the state.

"She's researched all this to see what really would have been realistic and what isn't," says her friend Jamie Tate, who with her husband Rip lives in a canyon above White Oaks.

"What makes her stuff so unique is the fact that Valarie is not just an expert in period costumes, she's an expert in the reality of what they would have worn in White Oaks, Lincoln, the Hondo Valley, Roswell or Santa Fe, because each city was a microcosm."

Thomas is expected to wear her duds on horseback in the Old Lincoln Days parade this Sunday. On Aug. 9 she will observe Fort Stanton Days at the old fort with an educational presentation and historical fashion show depicting period and regional clothing from the late 1800s.

A military brat, Valarie learned to sew at age 5 from her mother, an "excellent seamstress and quilter." As a teenager, while most of her peers chased the latest fads and styles, she developed an acute appreciation for antiques and "anything old."

"I know that sounds strange to most people," she says. "I guess I was an odd one. But I've always loved old things. My grandmother had a lot of things that I admired. I just saw how prettier they were than new things."

She translated that admiration into her sewing,

though not in clothing.

"I did a lot of hand-sewn dolls and Christmas decorations, seasonal-type things, and would make them look old. Dyed the fabric and so on. I did fairly well at crafts shows."

When she began a nursing career, however, she found little time to sew.

While working as a paramedic in Alamogordo Valarie met her future husband David, an Otero County Sheriff's Deputy. They married 17 years ago moved to Tularosa.

Five years ago David joined the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department. Though his pension was secure — the state administers the retirement plan — he had to move to Lincoln County. While on patrol one day he came upon a territorial adobe for rent in White Oaks.

"The owner apologized that he was asking so much — \$200 a month," David says, laughing. The couple subsequently bought the property.

It is an historic house, fit for an historic seamstress. White Oaks doctor Melvin Paden built it in the 1890s and vacated it when he moved his practice to Carrizozo. After retiring in the 1930s he returned to the house, living alone until his death in 1943.

About a year ago Thomas, who works at the Carrizozo Health Center, began sewing period clothing in earnest.

"She's living the lifestyle," Tate says of the frontier trappings.

"I never really thought much about pioneer life until I moved here," Thomas says. "You have to be very organized, and I guess it's kind of similar to the way they lived. It's not like going to Wal-Mart on the corner and picking up buttons."

The two women dressed in black came to mourn the passing of J.W. Bell, the deputy murdered by Billy The Kid during the Kid's 1881 escape from the Lincoln jail.

The burial service, a belated tribute to the fallen deputy, occurred in early July at the White Oaks cemetery before curious onlookers, law enforcement personnel, photographers and those dressing the part.

The women in black were Valarie and Jamie. The outfits were Valarie's, and they had a familiar look.

"The Victorians were pretty superstitious people," she said, "and they considered it bad luck to wear mourning outfits more than once. That's why a lot of the garments that you see in antiques shops are black. Whereas the [colored] clothing that they wore everyday, they wore out."

After the service a few friends gathered in the Thomas' home. In the kitchen two new old outfits were draped on clothing stands. One was a Navy

blue and burgundy natural-form, multi-layered cotton dress, a type popular for several years in the 1800s after bustles went out of style.

Despite the layers, the outfit would have been quite scandalous, because the front of the dress, tied inside against the legs, revealed the contour of the woman's figure.

Yet it was a fussy dress, a "visiting dress" worn on special occasions, often with a neck-covering chemisette and a hat.

Women in public had to dress up, Thomas says. "They were very concerned about what other people thought."

Requiring a half hour and the help of a family member to get on, the dress was not overly comfortable, especially on a hot day.

"Things were different out here. You did what you had to do. If you had to ride a horse wearing your good clothes to get somewhere, that's what you did. Probably she couldn't wait to get it off."

Such a dress might have been made in White Oaks; some of the town's wealthiest ladies brought fashions, patterns and materials from St. Louis.

"Unlike today, ladies

knew a great deal about sewing," Thomas says.

"Valarie knows what was available in Lincoln County in the 1870s and 1880s," Tate says. "It was very limited. And that's why her outfits are based on fabrics that could be found or brought here."

Like other Western towns, White Oaks was its own world, with its own fashions. Railroad towns like Carrizozo tended to be more stylish, whereas, Tate says, "Lincoln was just a little crummy village, and they wore very, very plain things."

As for the funeral outfits, Tate adds, "Valarie not only researched the era (in which Bell) was killed, she researched what a woman in White Oaks who was wealthy enough to own a horse and a saddle and have a nice dress, what she would have worn to a funeral in White Oaks."

"That's what fascinates me about Valarie, the fact that the detail is not just authentic to 1881-Somewhere, USA, or Somewhere, New Mexico Territory."

For research, Thomas gleans old photos, books, fashion magazines, reproduction patterns, the Internet — anything but Hollywood.

Though she uses an old Kenmore electric — the historic sewing machines were treadle-operated — the intense concentration of sewing transports her to a quieter age.

"I shut everything out," she says. "People might say it's tedious and time-consuming. But I find it real relaxing."

Except in very hot weather, she's engrossed in her converted attic accessed by a steep stairwell. There, her table has a window view of her garden and the driveway leading to the road. At night, the ghost town is dark.

"Anybody who goes by or looks across can see Valarie's sewing room up there," Tate says. "Rip and I will come in late and the light will be on and we know Valarie's way up in her garret at her sewing machine, just like 100 years ago."

"We are so proud of this filly right now. She has done


such a great job in the last three races," Malenchek said.

# Salvage operation could be part of the Walker fire cleanup

Clean-up from a May 9 wildfire in the 16-Springs watershed 15 miles east of Cloudford could include a salvage operation.

The Walker Fire, which burned 2,393 acres of Ponderosa pine, piñon-juniper, shrub oak and mountain grass in the Lincoln National Forest, was contained by fire fighters five days later.

Frank Martinez, Sacramento District Ranger, said that a Burned Area Emergency Response team took care of immediate concerns involving land, channel and road treatments to preclude more impacts to resources and private property adjacent to the burned area.

But he is considering additional vegetation treatment by salvaging timber resources killed or damaged by fire on 333 acres within the area affected by the wildfire.

"The economic recovery and

availability of wood products to the local community is the primary objective," he wrote in a notice Thursday. "A concern for implementing this project lies within the time frame allotted for conducting a quality environmental analysis and balancing the short window of product quality due to the characteristics of the product.

"Much of the wood product is lower elevation Ponderosa pine that is susceptible to deterioration and loss of wood quality value over a short period of time."

No trees that are alive or show signs of green foliage at the time of salvage preparation will be marked for removal, he said.

"In addition, to provide quality cavity nesting opportunities, a portion of the largest dead trees may be designated for retention," Martinez said.

He estimated the volume of merchantable timber at 1,500 million board feet, consisting

primarily of Ponderosa pine and Douglas-fir.

An environmental assessment will be prepared, he said. About 1.62 miles of temporary road to access salvage may be needed. Of that amount, 1.3 miles occurs on existing road or rail beds and about one third of a mile is proposed for new temporary road construction.

No herbicides or pesticides will be used. The project falls within the management area direction in the forest plan.

The project could be implemented within the next 12 months.

## New water applications made

Four new water rights applications within Lincoln County were filed with the Roswell office of the State Engineer within the last few months.

On June 6, Carol and Roy Virden asked to drill a replacement well within the Tularosa underground water basin on land they own. The replacement well would be drilled within 100 feet of the original well already recorded with the state for a continued claimed diversion of 6 acre feet per year of shallow groundwater. The uses listed are for domestic livestock and for the irrigation of an acre of land owned by the applicant. The old well will be plugged.

The land is about three miles northeast of Carrizozo off U.S. 54. An acre foot equates to about 325,800 gallons of water.

On April 6, Robert and Carla Crenshaw asked to divert 1,000 acre feet per year of appropriated underground water from the Tularosa Basin to be used for municipal, industrial and commercial purposes within the Tularosa and/or Hondo Basin. The land is owned by the Crenshaws

about six miles east of Carrizozo on U.S. 380.

On March 26, Greg, Barbara and Bryce Duggar of Dell City, Texas, filed to appropriate underground water from the Tularosa Basin for domestic, livestock, irrigation municipal, industrial, commercial and environmental purposes in the Hondo or Tularosa Basins for a diversion of 500 acre feet per year from five wells. Each well will be drilled to a depth of 1,700 feet.

The wells are proposed to be located 7.5 miles east of Carrizozo on U.S. 380, then south-east for two miles into Tortolita Canyon, west of the settlement of Nogal.

On March 28, Good Sawyer Development LLC based in Ruidoso filed to appropriate underground waters of the Tularosa Basin for domestic, livestock, irrigation, municipal, industrial, commercial and environmental purposes in the Hondo or Tularosa basins for a diversion of 1,500 acre feet per year to be used from seven wells. Each well will be drilled to a depth of 1,700 feet.

The wells are proposed to be located 7.5 miles east of Carrizozo off State Highway 37 near the settlement of Nogal.

After a 3 1/2 month fight against congestive heart failure, using every type of medication and therapy my veterinarian and I could muster, my wonderful Goblin died last Thursday. A merle Australian shepherd with pale blue eyes, she was smart, funny and my constant companion for nearly 12 years. She's buried under a lovely spreading juniper right outside of my bedroom window. I found her at the animal shelter operated by the Humane Society of Lincoln County in the days before it was as large an operation. One man, Randy Basch, did most of the work. I used to walk the dogs every afternoon after work and one day, Goblin arrived, picked up stray with another dog. The first time I saw her, I fell in love with her wide-eyed expression and love of life so characteristic of Aussies. The next day when I came to see her, Basch told me he would have to put her down because she had distemper. I asked for a chance to nurse her back to health and he provided an isolation kennel outside. I visited everyday, encouraging her to eat and drink, bringing a blanket from home to keep her warm and a knotted towel for her to chew on. She pulled out of the illness and the timing was right. Two days after she was put up for adoption, I was able to offer her a home. She rode with me to work everyday - unless the heat was too intense. While other employees took a smoke break, I would walk her around the neighborhood a couple times a day, which was good for me and for her. She shared my lunches when I was on assignment. Never much of a barker, she greeted me each morning as I awoke with her version of speech, stretching her neck out and tilting her head upward as she said "hello" and pranced. She was polite, walked perfectly on leash and stayed near by when hiking. But most of all, she made me smile just to look at her expressions, which ranged from shy side glances to wide-eye alert. I was with her as she took her last breath on her own time schedule riding in the truck with me. That morning, she absolutely refused any more medication and I didn't have the heart to try to force feed her liquefied food I prepared. She told me it was time to let her go. I will miss her.
