60-day delay in Posey case

Attorneys agree to postpone indictment

Although a Lincoln County grand jury was convened Wednesday in Carrizozo, an agreement reached between the prosecution and defense attorneys in the Cody Posey triple murder case prompted a premature end to the process of seeking an indictment.

District Attorney Scot Key said Thursday that he and defense attorney Gary Mitchell agreed to a 60-day extension to

schedule a preliminary hearing on the seven charges facing the 14-year-old former Capitan student.

Stipulated orders extending Children's Court time limits were approved by a 12th Judicial District judge, Key said. A preliminary hearing will be set for sometime within the next 60 days, although the defense could choose to waive that hearing, he said. That

County: Addicts treated at taxpayer expense should pay

People addicted to alcohol and drugs who receive treatment at taxpayer expense should be required to repay that debt, Lincoln County commissioners contend.

They voted during their meeting last month to send a letter to State Rep. Dub Williams, a Republican from

Glencoe, asking him to draft legislation that would require reimbursement once a person is working, in much the same way as student loans that must be repaid.

Commissioner Rick Simpson proposed the action as a follow-up to a vote in June that included the New Mexico Rehabilitation Center as an eli-

When voters might not be voters

■ Signing up with a registration group does not automatically put individual on official voter rolls

A pleasant-looking woman sitting outside the entrance to Wal-Mart Wednesday offered to register anyone who wanted to vote in the Nov. 2 general election.

A former California resident, she said she is paid by a non-partisan registration group called Choose to Vote. She

turns in the forms, which are to be forwarded to the state Elections Bureau.

But can voters who sign up with unfamiliar registration groups be sure their registrations will be recorded?

Cassandra Romero, an elections bureau official in the Santa Fe office, said Thursday that about 40 voter registration groups are operating in New Mexico besides the familiar League of Women Voters and drives by specific parties. But the bureau has virtually no way of tracking if all of the people who register at those booths and tables will end up appearing on the voter rolls in

November.

The message from Romero and Lincoln County Clerk Tammie Maddox is that voters who do not directly register with the state or their county clerks should wait 28 days and then check with their respective clerks to be sure their names appear on voter rolls.

The deadline to register to vote in the November general election is Oct. 5.

New federal laws, primarily the National Voters Rights Act and Help America Vote Act, aimed at easing the process of registering to vote, could be an invitation to altering future election out-

comes. A group with an agenda could move into a county with a predominant registration of either Democrats or Republicans, sign up hundreds of people and not turn in those registered with the political party they don't favor, altering the final vote.

The 2000 presidential election in New Mexico was decided by 366 votes.

Romero said voters with concerns about their registration would be better to register twice than take a chance, because county clerks have computer

A peace of advice

■ Area youngsters learn conflict resolution at camp

Local children spent the week at a unique summer camp dedicated to teaching peace, nonviolent conflict resolution and tolerance for diversity.

About 35 children from ages 6 to 13 participated in Peace Village at High Mesa Healing Center in Alto.

The camp itself is a model of multicultural cooperation. Four staffers from Peace Village Inc. of Eugene, Oregon, came to set up the camp and facilitate it. Robin Baka, the director of the Mescalero Boys and Girls Club arranged for nine children from that club to

attend. Father Larry Gosselin of St. Joseph's Mission helped out with the camp. The First Baptist Church of the Downs arranged for children from that church to attend. High Mesa Healing Center provided a beautiful space for the children. The Wild Herb Market provided healthy snacks at cost, and Thriftway provided watermelons at cost. And about 30 community members volunteered to help out.

"The adults are learning as much as the youth," Barbara Mader, director of High Mesa Healing Center, said.

The children are divided into three groups by age — 6-7, 8-10 and 11-13 — and rotate through three workshops in the mornings: nonviolent conflict resolution, yoga meditation and storytelling.

The afternoon schedule was different every day, with two or three workshops each afternoon in art, music drumming, nutrition, storytelling and hiking or canoeing.

Father Gosselin led a class

on St. Francis Tuesday, and that day children learned about sweat lodges and various religions that teach peace.

Today the Peace Village culminates with a storytelling workshop and performances, a candle ceremony and a graduation ceremony in the afternoon.

Darren Reiley, the coordinator and executive director of Peace Village, said the camp started in Lincoln City, Ore., nine years ago, founded in conjunction with the

Universal Church of Christ, Pacific University and the Native Youth Council of the Siletz Tribe on the Oregon coast.

Later it grew to include Jewish, Islamic, Buddhist and Baha'i groups, and last year, Peace Village incorporated as a non-profit organization.

Now the staff employs the curriculum to help other communities start their own camps — all grounded in grassroots efforts.

"This is very different," Reiley said of the Alto camp. "It's a much stronger multicul-

tural reality here. Every camp is dedicated to being multicultural, but in a lot of communities so far, it ends up being mostly white kids, while here there's a more diverse group."

The biggest camp is the Lincoln City one, he said, and a lot of kids later volunteer as team leaders.

"The main reason I wanted to start one here was that we wanted to create a forum for kids to come together to learn about each others' cultures and histories," Reiley said.

Reiley knows the area because his family has been coming here for summers for the past 26 years.

Although he's lived in Oregon the last 12 years, he still comes to Lincoln County for summers.

He tapped some of his local contacts to pull together this Peace Village, including Dave Anderson, who taught a class on nutrition, took the children on a hike and provided snacks all week. Myra Romero, a yoga instructor, and Barbara Mader, director of High Mesa Healing Center.

"This project has come together so smoothly," he said.

gible health care provider to be reimbursed from the county's indigent care fund. The money for that fund comes from a county gross receipts tax.

Simpson said those receiving the treatment are "drug addicts and alcoholics the judge is tired of looking at and commits into the system. The state previously paid for it, but now they want to take the money out of the county indigent fund."

The program is expensive, he said, at a cost of \$7,000 for 21 days. However, county indigent fund coordinator Rhonda Burrows said the county has a cap for that treatment of \$1,000 per patient in a physical year.

But Simpson said whatever government entity provides the money doesn't really matter, because the same taxpayers cough up the money.

"Although I didn't then and still don't approve of it now, I voted for (adding the center to the list) anyway because we don't have a better system in place," he said. "The fact that there are people out there who need this treatment is a given. I'm not saying they should be denied treatment. The problem I have is with using tax money to do it."

If addiction truly is a disease, Simpson said it's a self-inflicted disease.

"This is not like West Nile virus where you get bitten by a mosquito and after an incubation period, you're one sick puppy," he said.

"This starts out with people out partying and doing drugs, some of them probably illegal, and after they've done that for several years, they develop a habit they can't break."

"There are some of us who accepted responsibility, went home early so we could get up in the morning and go to work. Some won't touch alcohol or illegal drugs. Yet, these are the kinds of people who end up paying for the treatment of those who do."

While government can't deny giving a "hands up" to someone to help them become a productive member of society, the person should be held responsible, the commissioner said.

Students who use federal loans to attend college are required to pay back that money with interest after graduating and becoming employed, he pointed out.

"The (federal) government will do whatever it takes to collect that money," he said. "Why does one group get a free ride while another doesn't? Whatever happened to fair and equal treatment for everyone?"

He said he talked to Williams about proposing a similar system for addiction treatment and the state representative said he would help draft and then carry the bill to the state Legislature.

Although Commissioner Leo Martinez said he supported the concept and would like to see prisoners in the county jail also be required to

reimburse for their care, he added that the effort probably is futile. We can't even get dead beat dads to pay (child support). However, Commissioner Maury St. John successfully offered a motion to send a letter asking for the legislation.

"A year ago people said we couldn't get indigent health working (in the state law) changed to say outpatient (care would be included as an eligible reimbursement), but we did," St. John said.

"I think it's worth a try."

Simpson said it may take a long time to get results, but the letter would be a start.

Burrows said although she doesn't disagree with the request to Williams, other issues may surface such as if a county employee would be asked to pay back insurance premiums paid by the county, if addiction treatment was sought.

The county would end up paying less to put an addict in treatment with the \$1,000 cap for 21 days than keeping them in county jail, she pointed out.

On the other side, "There's a lot of literature that says if you make people take responsibility, they will do better," she told commissioners.

Even if another government entity pays, such as the state, taxpayers are the ultimate source, Simpson said.

Ken Nosker of San Patricio recalled that in the past 20 years, the state increased taxes on alcoholic beverages three times "and sold it by saying that money would take care of people with alcohol problems for treatment."

The state continues to collect 9.5 cents for every ounce of beer sold, he said. "Yet they need more money," Nosker said. "Ask them what happened to that tax earmarked for alcoholics."

St. John requested that question be included in the letter to Williams.

extra time allows Key to decide whether to pursue Posey as an adult or a juvenile.

The case, in which Posey is accused of killing his father, step-mother and 13-year-old step-sister on July 5, is complicated and time is needed for more investigation and psychological and psychological evaluation, Key said.

The difference for Posey being tried as a juvenile or as an adult could be seven years as a juvenile versus 102 years as an adult, if found guilty. He is charged with three open counts of murder and four counts of tampering with evidence.

Since the three bodies were found in early July on a ranch near Tinnie where his father was employed as foreman for ABC newsman Sam Donaldson, many family and friends of Posey have stepped forward to support him and to relate incidents of abuse by the father on the son.

According to a sheriff's report, Posey told deputies that he was slapped across the face by his father July 5 because he wasn't cleaning Donaldson's stables quickly enough. The boy is accused of firing a .38 caliber pistol, shooting his stepmother, Tryone Posey, 44, twice in the head, his father, Delbert Paul Posey, 34, and his stepsister, Marilea Schmid, 13.

If sentenced as an adult, he could face a maximum of 30 years each on the murder counts and three years each on tampering. As a juvenile, he would be held in custody by the state Department of Children, Youth and Families until he is 21.

Mitchell said Thursday that since a prosecutor conducts a grand jury, he was not at the session in Carrizozo.

"I suspect what happened was at some point during the grand jury proceeding, Scott decided there was a better way to handle this," the Ruidoso attorney said. "He and I talked today and both agreed that we need far more investigation and particularly, psychological evaluations."

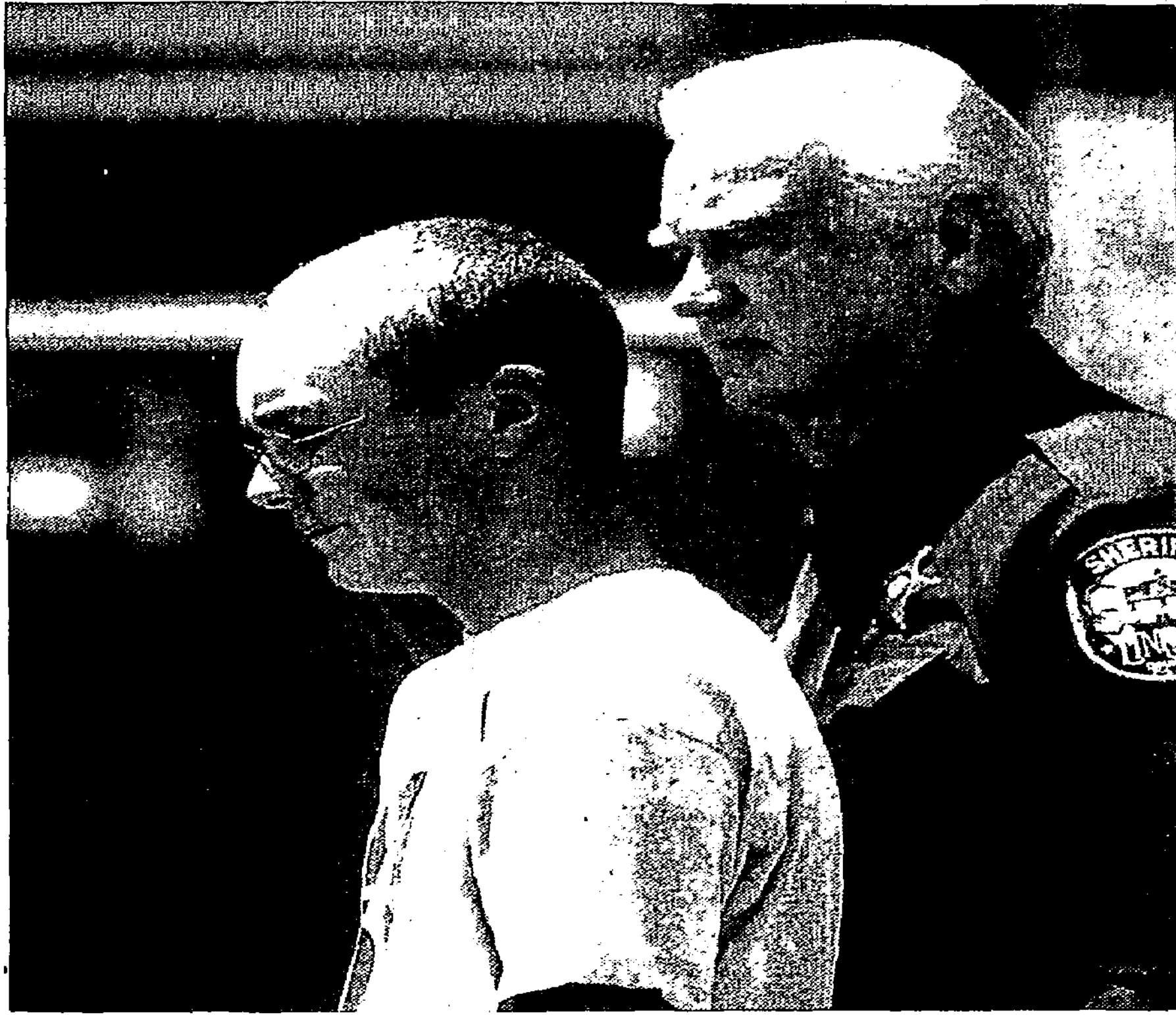

"It was imperative we get that done before any decisions affecting this young boy's life are made. In children's cases, it's the absolute obligation of the defense attorney to do what is in the best interests of his client" and that could include extensive psychological counseling, the attorney said.

"The prosecutor also has an obligation to protect society," Mitchell said. "I think we both realize in this case, getting him help would be the best way to protect society and hopefully, at the same time be the best thing for him. I obviously think he will get all the help he needs within the juvenile system and we shouldn't continue to victimize him."

Mitchell said the case is unique in that unlike most criminal cases, both attorneys are trying hard to get facts and information before anybody makes decisions.

"I think that's the right thing to do," Mitchell

said. To date, he has logged 270 conversations with different people in the case.

"That's a lot of people," he said. "That's how extensive an investigation this is and should give an idea of the amount of work involved. The state should have even more than that."

Yearly rainfall total drops after dry July

A dryer than normal July landed Ruidoso in the red for annual rainfall at the start of August.

Dave Scheibe, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service, said Thursday that on average 3.59 inches of rain falls in the area during July, but Ruidoso only received 2.17 inches this year.

That dropped the village from being ahead of average for the calendar year at the start of July to 93 percent of normal by the end of that month, he said.

Ruidoso averages about .14 of an inch of rain per day in August, which would put the village at .70 of an inch on Thursday, he said. But the Ruidoso Police Department, the official measurement agency to the national weather service,

reported 1.26 inches, a sign that Ruidoso may beat the average for the current month.

With severe thundershowers forecast Thursday and today, the weather service is warning of the possibility of flash floods in the south central mountains of New Mexico.

Fire restrictions remain suspended on the Lincoln National Forest, in the village and on state and private land.

systems to catch double registrations. People can call the clerk's office or the state bureau for a registration form to be mailed to them, or pick up forms at their local Motor Vehicle Divisions, city halls and banks. If they don't want to drive to county courthouses.

Maddox said she isn't notified when a voter registration group is operating in Lincoln County.

"There used to be sworn deputy registrars, but that was years ago," she said Thursday. "Now anyone can pick up a form and mail it in. They can even download a form from the Secretary of State's Web site. We're at the mercy of those doing the voter drives not to try

to influence. It's pretty wide open. It's up to a voter to take responsibility for ensuring their registration reaches this office, if they don't handle it personally."

Maddox said she has no way of knowing how many people are signed up by registration groups or if all forms are submitted. As a precaution, she suggested prospective voters could accept a registration form from a sign-up booth, but fill it out and mail it in themselves to her office.

Romero said when an individual or group comes into the bureau to ask for registration forms, she starts by giving out 200. While the forms contain numbers, they are random, so tracking can't be done using

sequential numerals, she said.

When the forms are returned, more can be issued and a log is maintained. One man brings in 1,000 registrations at a time and is given 1,000 more blank forms, she said.

Registration groups are not licensed or registered by the state, she said. If someone checks with a county clerk and finds their registration never made it to their home county, they also can call the bureau, which maintains a statewide registration system. A new form can be mailed out, Romero said.

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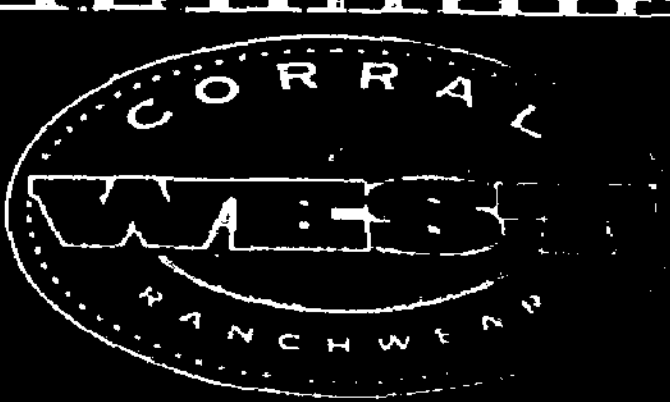

It's really a case
of 'grin and bear it'

Or, embarrassing times in Village Hall

Much too often, we slip into a familiar trap, which might be summed up in the phrase "that's the way it's always been done."

Such was the case recently when Ruidoso's village manager remarked, after contention over budget signatures and such, that "we never had an issue with the final budget before."

When something different raised its ugly head, none of the professionals at Village Hall knew quite how to handle it. Some council members didn't want to sign that final budget; didn't like it, didn't want to approve it.

Somehow, the word got out that individual councilors might be fined if they didn't

sign it — maybe upwards of \$25,000.

Well, it turned out, after some councilors contacted the powers-that-be in the state's Local Government Division, that: no, only the mayor's signature was required on the budget submitted to the state; and, no, there is no fine of any kind for a councilor's failure to sign the budget. But a late budget might force auditing action.

All this, despite many man- (or woman) years of municipal service by the village manager and finance director. Even Mayor Leon Eggleston had served years as a village clerk.

Assumption of truth because it's always been that way is a dangerous thing. We doubt Ruidoso will soon forget that fact of municipal life.

Where do you find a suitable
building lot in Ruidoso?

"What is so rare as a day in June" ... or maybe July or August? Poet James Russell Lowell had his ideas. I've got mine.

I'll tell you what's so rare, and getting rarer — a south-facing, level-access, residential building lot in Ruidoso.

Some confirmation came from an official source this week, when village planning director

Charles Rennick was quoted in these pages to the effect that most of the better buildable land in the village has been developed. Later in the story about how to rescue the aging Cree Manor property it was noted that every buildable lot in the village will be developed in the next 14 years.

That opened up another spirited discussion about the possibility of building on steep slopes. As if there weren't already dozens — maybe hundreds — of residences perched on stilts and hanging over canyon walls, a skinny little parking place on the high side providing some sort of allegation that indeed there is level access.

In the world of real estate, such elevated-perch houses often are not get advertised with a "magnificent Sierra Blanca view" or some such verbiage. And that's sometimes true, even if the view is from a top deck and you find just the right angle to see through the ponderosas.

Of course our Texas friends of the "summer home" variety don't worry too much about things like level access; their May-September romance with the beauties of Ruidoso preclude most worries about (as happened to one former *Ruidoso News* publisher in January) sliding backwards down a hundred-yard-long

north-facing driveway in a SUV and landing in a ditch. Well, nobody was injured, but...

There is an upside to all this landscape negativity: As buildable sites decrease, existing home values should remain solid. Realtor Don Lincoln remarked this week that in his 13 years in the business locally he'd never sold a home that didn't turn a profit when it was resold. And he sees no likelihood that such a course will be reversed.

By extension, that also bodes well for real estate values in outlying areas — where, believe it or not, there remains considerable southern-exposure property with level access, and some of it with magnificent Sierra Blanca views.

But we're talking Ruidoso, right? That's the paradise with tall timber, wild animals in close co-habitation and a summer climate to die for...

So what's the solution? Please, developers, let's not level any mountain tops to make buildable sites for housing.

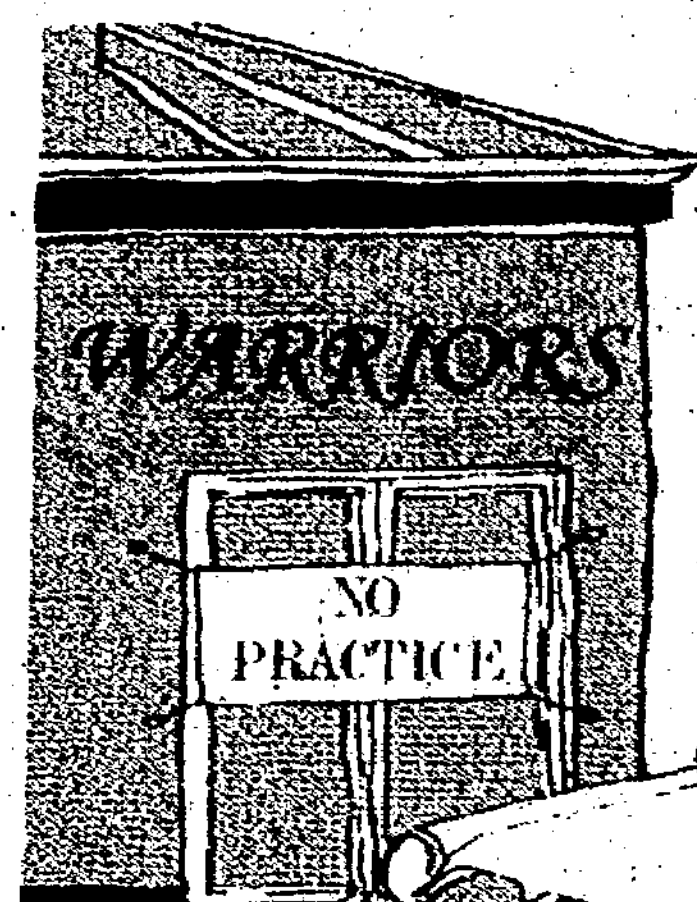

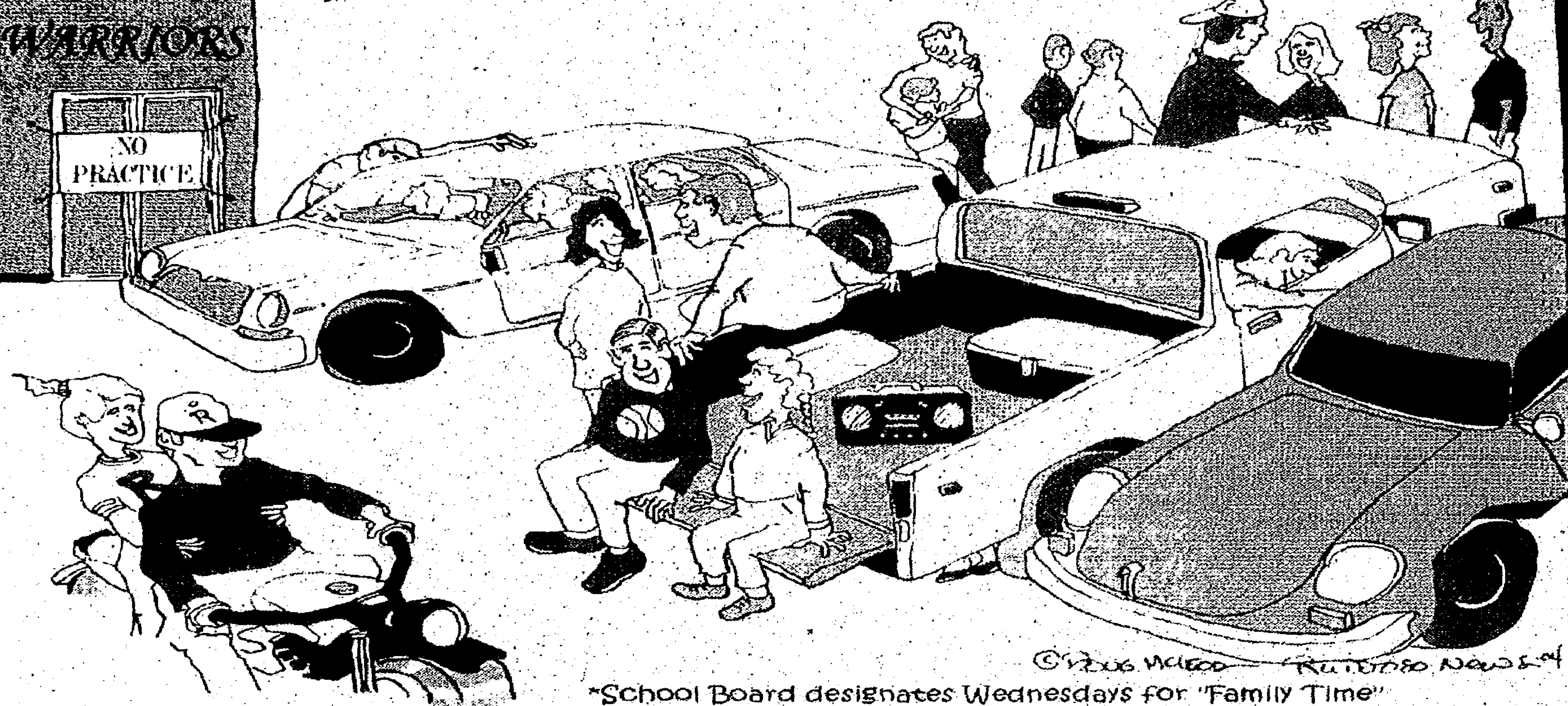

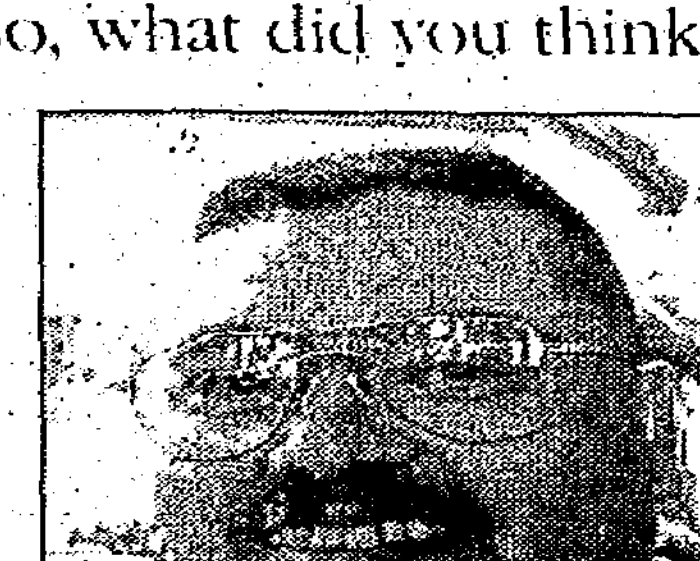

Webster's dictionary defines a plan as "a method for achieving an end." The thinly-veiled specific end sought after in the Village's new 40-year Water Plan (40-WP) appears to be to more than triple the present population of our mountain paradise by 2040. Unfortunately, outside of some creative legerdemain and a lot of wishful thinking, the plan doesn't begin to tell us how we are going to acquire the water supply to achieve that end, especially in view of the fact that the current water system is already arguably maxed out. Either the village has to acquire the rights to more wet water to support growth, or it has to limit growth to the known and realistic supply until it acquires more wet water. It's that simple. This is not an anti-growth opinion — it's a fact that is fall-down obvious. Village administrators cannot afford anymore to accept the pabulum from its Water Task Force that we will somehow be able to acquire more water down the road, or that "the problem will disappear with some rain." As the village has found out over the past five years, all of the realistic wet water around here is more than spoken for, and little of that is for sale.

In this direction, the recently-completed 40-WP, written by long-retained village consultants under the auspices of a newly-appointed Water Task Force, does little to shed light on a serious problem that current village administrators must deal with. Its authors are the same people under whose watch the current dilemma has taken shape (See "Water, Water Everywhere," *Ruidoso News*, 12-13-84). As written, the 40-WP is actually a disservice because it presents an unrealistically rosy supply picture that obfuscates the problem by creating a false sense of security.

It is no secret that the crux of the Ruidoso's water problem is that it has rights to thousands of acre feet of water in the Eagle Creek Basin that isn't there and only minuscule rights to water in the Ruidoso Basin where the wet water is. Counting rights as available "supply" in the Eagle Creek Basin and then counting available water (whether we own it or not) as "supply" in the Ruidoso Basin, as the 40-WP does, is like counting apples as oranges (think Enron). It does not give an accurate picture of the supply side of the equation. I assume that those on the Water Task Force know this, yet they keep confusing water rights with wet water. A "water right," as you know, does not guarantee that the water is actually there, nor does

the presence of "wet water" mean that you have a "right" to take it.

Presumably to suggest that an extrapolated population growth rate is realistic, the 40-WP states that the current water system is "capable of producing peak production capacity of 6,721 acre feet per year." This is "obtained," the report goes on, "by the constant pumping of Cherokee and Hollywood wells essentially year round." Since we only need a total of 2,500 acre feet per year now, and since these prolific wells are together capable of producing 2000 acre feet per year alone, this statement seems reassuring. The only problem is that the assumption is impossible, and for at least two reasons, 1) the village only has the "right" to take 486 acre feet of water per year from this basin, and 2) if it took all of those Ruidoso Basin rights from the wells, it would have no rights left to divert water into the Grindstone Reservoir and Treatment system. Nor is this statement followed by the inclusion of a mitigating fact — Hollywood and Cherokee water doesn't taste good and would need expensive treatment for extensive municipal use.

The same kind of sleight-of-hand is employed to make effluent credits look more reliable than they really are. Effluent credits are perfectly legitimate "extra" water rights that arise when waste water that has been treated is discharged back into the waterway. The problem is that at the present time this extra credit is limited to the surface flow of Eagle Creek, which has, of late, been minimal and intermittent at best. Despite the fact that the average annual effluent credit allowed over the past 13 years is only about 150 acre feet per year and the fact that the credit has only exceeded even 300 acre feet per year just once, the 40-WP unabashedly includes 800 acre feet of effluent credit in its list of available water supplies, as if Eagle Creek were always flowing at its historical maximum, rather than not at all.

Getting back to the Rio Ruidoso Basin, the village only has the right to take 486 acre feet of water per year from both the Rio Ruidoso and the Hollywood and Cherokee wells combined, regardless of what flows by in the river. This amount could be increased in perfect times by the aforesaid effluent credits to as much as 1,286 afy. The rest of the flow-by is owned by downstream users (Are you listening, Al Junge, et al?) The village cannot take any more water than it owns. The rest, by definition and law, must flow by. The

accounting for this legal diversion is on a five-year basis. In point of fact, at the end of May the village has only 92 acre feet of water left in its five-year draw from the Ruidoso Basin which has to last until November 1, 2006. Rights in the Ruidoso Basin are so overdrawn that the Village, under a rarely-used procedure, just requested and received approval from the State Engineer Office for an emergency effluent credit transfer to cover the period between now and November, 2006. The failure of the water plan to even mention something that is so germane to the Ruidoso Basin rights is worrisome. To assume by omission that the SEO will allow this kind of emergency transfer on a regular basis to support a growth agenda is sophomoric.

Incidentally, another fact which needs mentioning is that drilling more wells to tap the water you own doesn't give you the right to more water — it only puts more straws into the cup.

The legerdemain in the 40-WP reaches a crescendo when it insinuates that the Village's minimum flow agreement with the Ruidoso River Association has the effect of denying the village of "all of the flow it may have rights to from the Rio Ruidoso." This statement is deliberately disingenuous. It is based, again, on the "sound-bite" assumption that the Village of Ruidoso owns all of the water that flows by in the

Rio Ruidoso. Here are the facts, you decide:

The report states that "...the average yearly flow of the Rio Ruidoso is 6,892 acre feet per year" (we think closer to 5,000). As stated above, the Village only has the "right" to withdraw 486 af (1286 af in a perfect world) of water in the whole Ruidoso Basin, which includes the downstream wells. Even if all of its rights were taken from the surface water of the Rio Ruidoso and none from the downstream wells, that would still leave 6,406 (5,606) acre feet of river flow that must be left in the Rio Ruidoso each year because other people own it, not because the agreement with the Ruidoso River Association precludes it.

Furthermore, since the minimum flow agreement was signed in May of 2000 the Village has diverted all of its rights and then some. To wit, it diverted 1,099 af from the Ruidoso Basin in 2000, 1,703 af in 2001, 1,044 af in 2002, 1032 af in 2003, and 814 so far in 2004. As a matter of fact, as stated above, this over-diversion has created a drastic run-down of rights in the current 5-year accounting period. In the light of these facts, the inference that the agreement with the RRA has in any way affected Ruidoso's right to take water from the Rio Ruidoso is a non-starter for blame. The proof is

in the pudding. The minimum flow agreement has been in effect for the last four years under drought conditions and the management of the diversion has worked perfectly: the river has flowed by continuously at the same time that the Village has taken all of its water rights.

Etcetera, etcetera.

To be worth its cost, and much more importantly, to be helpful for those depending upon it to make current deci-

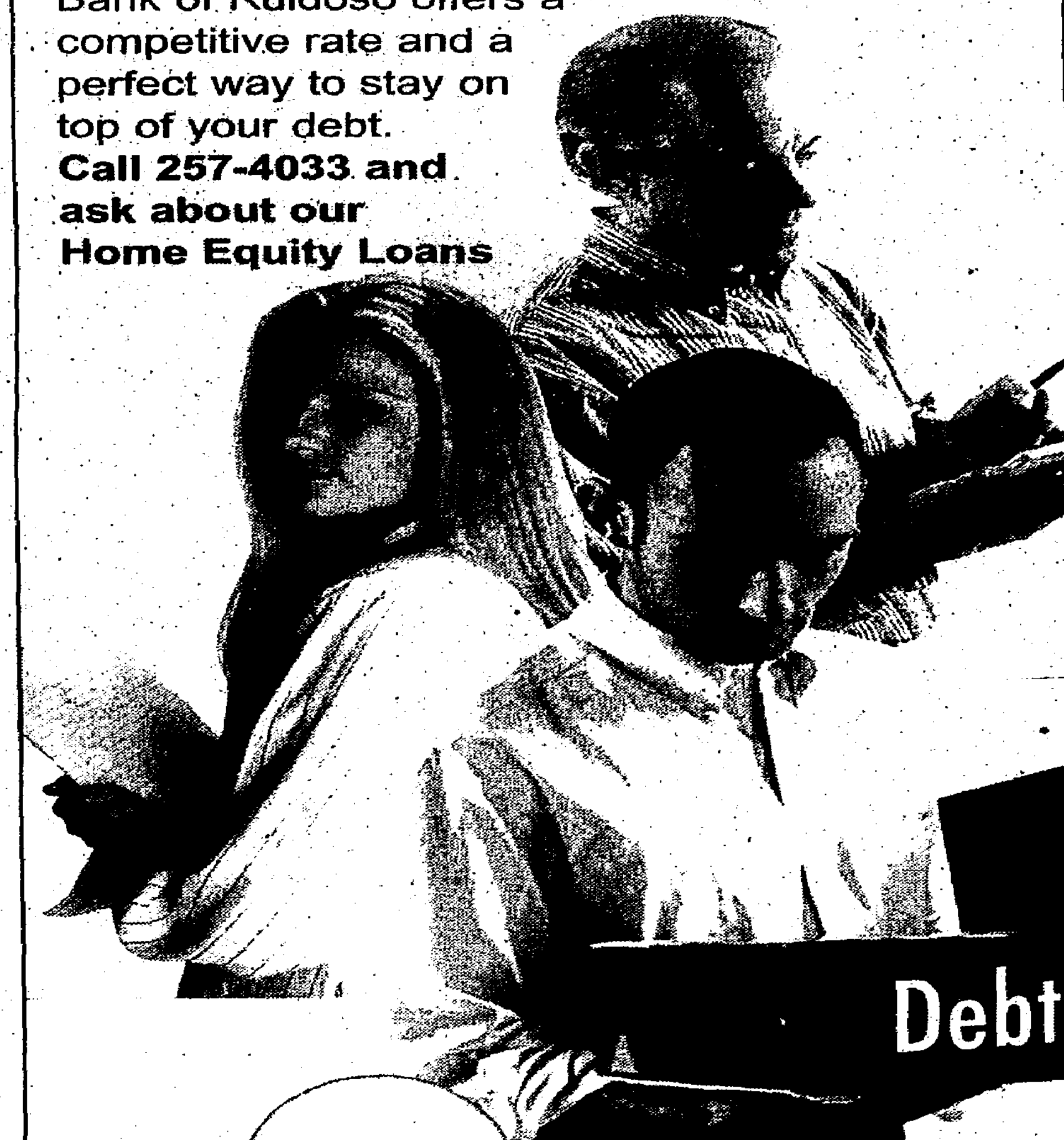
sions based on assumptions about the future, including developers, the Water Task Force should be ordered immediately to revise the 40 Year Water Plan to present an accurate picture of our water situation.

After all, who are we kidding? It would be devastating and inexcusable, would it not, for Ruidoso to run out of water on a holiday weekend when the facts to avoid it were there in black and white for all to see?

Buying power: Up or down?

There are at least three measures of income. First, average hourly earnings adjusted for inflation for low income workers have fallen from a year ago. Second, wages and salaries after adjusting for inflation, which include bonuses for higher-income individuals, have been rising. A third measure of buying power, compensation, has risen at a faster rate than either of the two measures mentioned above. Compensation includes benefits such as the high cost of health care, which has prevented a faster rate of wage increases. Compared to a year ago, wages and salaries have risen 2.5 percent and benefit costs have jumped 7.2 percent.

The differential in income gains is one of the reasons department stores have fared better than discount stores. In addition to the gap in income gains, other factors limited retail sales recently. High gasoline prices have hurt the pocket books of consumers. Stores had fewer clearance sales as inventories were under control; this hurt sales, but helped margins. Cool weather in the Midwest has affected sales of air conditioners, pool supplies, bicycles...

The Bush tax cut, especially the child-care tax credit, helped retail sales during the summer months of 2003, but the effect has been diminishing in 2004. Going forward, the temporary factors won't restrain retail sales as much. The gains in wages and salaries will be substantial.

Bond: Why higher yields?

The economy, inflation and monetary policy continue to point to higher bond yields. Sometime in 2005, the core inflation rate could be around the upper range of Chairman Greenspan's comfort zone of 1 to 2 percent, encouraging the central bank to hike the interest rate at a faster clip.

In 2003, foreign central banks purchased \$441 billion of U.S. Treasury securities, accounting for 80 percent of America's negative cash flows (or current account deficit),

Unfortunately, foreign private interests in U.S. securities have waned. The Bank of Japan has been purchasing Treasuries in order to prevent the dollar from depreciating. If foreign central banks reduce purchases of Treasuries, the dollar could fall further and bond yields would go higher.

These are tough environments for investors, but there are some options. For Corporates, positive economic fundamentals will help offset the negative effects of higher interest rates. Mortgages also are relatively attractive, based on the reduced volatility of the interest rate, less prepayment and the shrinking supply of mortgages. Rising mortgage rates should reduce the supply of new mortgages, supporting the price of mortgages.

Stocks: A tired bull

The recent soft economic data, rising interest rates, geopolitical concerns and high oil prices, the upcoming election, terrorist threats, etc., are weighing down on the tired bull market. To make matters worse, earnings are expected to decelerate in the future. In this environment, investors are emphasizing quality (large caps) and income (dividends).

What the market needs is a helping hand in the form of lower price of oil and reduced political and economic uncertainties.

Nevertheless, the underlying economic factors support equities. The economy will be on a firmer footing. The Federal Reserve will live up to its pledge of gradualism. Earnings will decelerate, but from a higher base. The price of oil should fall if geopolitical uncertainties diminish. In a nutshell, domestic economic forces will help equities, but the external environment continues to be a main source of uncertainty.

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Village meets budget goals

■ Departments hold fast on the expense side to avoid showing a shortfall in the year just ended

The village collected 100 percent of budgeted revenues of \$7.6 million for its general fund in fiscal year 2003-2004, and spent 94 percent of what was projected.

That's good news, said village finance director Elaine Beltran.

Even better, gross receipts taxes collected through the end of the year, June 30, totaled \$7.92 million, 106 percent of the budgeted \$7.45 million and last year's \$7.43 million.

The gross receipts tax came in about \$483,600 more than the previous fiscal year, she told village councilors last week.

Faring the best was the Utility Fund on the water side, where revenue was up 107 percent of budget at \$2.63 million, and \$140,906 over last year. However, sewer revenues pulled down the overall percentage, coming in at 82 percent of budget, or \$1.1 million, up \$15,419 from last year.

Revenue for the airport fund, recreation fund and solid waste fund were down between 88 percent and 97 percent of last year. But mak-

ing up that hole was revenue from lodgers' tax, which came in at 118 percent of the budgeted \$861,225 at \$1,016,942.

The increase approved last year in lodgers' tax generated some \$57,129 additional dollars, Beltran said.

Total revenue for the year, exclusive of capital improvement projects, sat at \$21.5 million, or 91 percent of the budgeted figure.

Saving the village from facing a major deficit, department heads pulled their budget belts as tight as possible, action recognized by Councilor Ron Hardeman. They turned in expenses that fell from 80 percent to 90 percent of their original budgets, Beltran said.

"Even though the budget was tight, the department heads were frugal," she said. "The directors all sat down and planned with me."

Some major accomplishments included the destruction of 20 years of old records in the warehouse, buying an automated fingerprint program hooked into state and FBI systems;

purchasing three police patrol cars, three trucks for the fire department and three for the street department, and using a block grant to install a new computer-assisted dispatch system.

Five hundred new units were purchased to replace 500 old water meters with a type that can be read without employees opening the meter box and reading the figures.

Lincoln's employment scene still bright

Lincoln County's employment picture had a comparative glitter in May, according to just-released data from the New Mexico Department of Labor.

May preliminary figures indicated a county labor force of 8,871 with 308 people on the jobless list, for an unemployment rate of 3.5 percent. That jobless rate put the county at sixth lowest in the state.

The agricultural counties of Curry, Roosevelt and Union, and the Santa Fe Metropolitan Statistical Area (including Los Alamos) were the only areas with lower unemployment.

Those counties with the highest jobless rate — Luna, at 26.6-percent; Mora, at

13.3 percent; and Taos, at 12.2 percent — perennially lead the state unemployment list.

The unemployment rate in southeastern New Mexico counties in general hovered around the statewide rate of 5.4 percent. Neighboring Chaves County in May stood at 6.4 percent unemployment; Otero, 5 percent; Socorro, 4.4 percent; and Torrance, 4.1 percent.

Lincoln County's revised unemployment rate in April was at 3.6 percent.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics of the U.S. Department of Labor placed New Mexico's jobless rate at a hair below the United States rate of 5.6 percent, considerably improved over the year-earlier figures, when the nationwide rate stood at 6.1 percent while New Mexico was at 6.3 percent.

Among all states, Hawaii had the lowest jobless rate, 3 percent in May, while the District of Columbia was highest, at 7.5 percent. A year earlier, Oregon's 8.6 percent jobless was the highest in the nation.

The Department of Labor reported total nonagricultural employment of people earning wages or salaries stood at 792,100 in May. Just 100,000 people were engaged in goods-producing jobs, while 692,100 were in service roles.

Government — federal, state and local — provided the largest number of jobs, at 100,100 — or 25.2 percent of the total.

Lincoln County's strong tourism-based economy falls in the "leisure and hospitality" sector, which statewide employed 84,200 people, or 10.6 percent of the total.

Mark Twain would like a river upgrade

If Mark Twain were writing today for a newspaper near his boyhood home of Hannibal, Mo., he would be admonishing Congress and the Army Corps of Engineers to get started on the project to upgrade navigation on the Mississippi and Illinois rivers and improve the river ecosystem.

Across the river from Hannibal at Quincy, Ill., is Lock and Dam 21, a perfect example of why the 'modifications' are needed. On a day he was preparing to do a television interview, lockmaster Roger McElroy had grease on his shirt from making emergency repairs on the lock, which was closed to traffic for two hours.

"It is just more maintenance all the time," said McElroy. "They don't have money to repair what's already broken and damaged, so they are going to have to do something or we are going to have a major catastrophe."

The locks and dams on the Upper Mississippi River system were built in the 1930s. Michael Klingner, an engineer and

vice chairman of the Upper Mississippi, Illinois and Missouri Rivers Association marvels at how they were built with mule-power technology in just seven or eight years. He's dismayed that it has taken 12 years now just to study improvements.

"We need to modernize our lock and dam system to meet the size of barges that are being run today," said Klingner.

The average river tow is 15 barges, but they won't fit together through the old 600-foot locks. The towboat crew has to uncouple the barges to go through in two sections. It's a costly, time-consuming maneuver that requires an alert crew.

The Army Corps of Engineers is proposing to build new 1,200-foot locks and extend a few older ones. One barge has the capacity of 15 rail cars or about 60 trailer trucks, so if the locks aren't built and the system has to shut down, one can imagine how many more trucks will be on the highways.

"It's not rocket science, it's pouring concrete and making gates," said Brent Hoerr who farms at Palmyra, Mo., just three

miles from the river. He's anxious for the work to begin because it will take years to complete. If there is a bottleneck along the system, farmers know it, because grain prices are affected immediately.

"If the elevators can't move any grain and storage becomes a problem, they'll drop their bids," he added.

If Congress approves the Corps going ahead with its preferred plan, the multi-billion dollar project would include river ecosystem restoration. Jim Mentesti, president of the Great River Economic Development Foundation, believes it will stimulate tourism and outdoor recreation.

"There's also the impact on the front end with the job construction that would come with these particular projects," said Mentesti.

You don't have to know and love the Mississippi like Mark Twain to realize this project makes a lot of sense. The economic and environmental benefits are almost as grand as the mighty river.

Council seeks to engineer successful search for water chief

As of Wednesday, the village received about 25 applications for the vacant position of water director.

No date is set to end the search for a new director, said human resources head Debbie Rogge. Applications will be accepted until the position is filled, she said.

On a motion by Councilor L. Ray Nunley last month, the village council agreed 5-1 to use the description selected by village manager Lorri McKnight to advertise for a new water director with a \$53,097 to \$56,000 salary figure, depending on the person's qualifications.

Holding out for an engineer to head the water/waste water department, Councilor Michele Rebstock cast the only dissenting vote on the proposed job description.

McKnight told the council that Rogge helped her gather information on similar positions and salary ranges in other cities using the New Mexico Municipal League's Salary Survey.

At issue for the council was whether to create a public works director's position or to limit supervision to water and wastewater, whether to require an

engineering degree, and if so, in what particular field, or if actual experience operating utility plants with a high certification should be the most important qualification.

As researched, the water director and public works director/general manager were the job descriptions most similar to the village position of department director in terms of responsibility and authority, McKnight said. But the water director doesn't cover the extended oversight for streets, airport and planning involved in public works, which in Ruidoso is handled by the deputy manager.

The council went with McKnight's preference, which was that the minimum qualification may include a bachelor's degree in environmental science, water quality management or related field, and six to eight years of experience. Required is a licensing or certification as a water system operator IV.

The village manager said several of Ruidoso's consultants are engineers. To be able to afford an engineer with experience, the salary would have to be increased to \$125,000 a year, said Nunley. He'd be reluctant to hire anyone just out of college, he said.

But Rebstock said she thought if a highly qualified person with engineering experience was hired as water director, the village might be able to eliminate one or two of its water consultants, or hire one as the water director. The person then would work strictly for the village and not for developers.

"The goal would be that the person was loyal 100 percent to the village," she said. "We're paying lots now for consultants."

"It's a good goal," Nunley responded. "But I don't know if we can get that. We know what we have works now."

Councilor Deborah Marcum-Byars said although village officials said an engineer isn't needed, "We have three engineering firms consulting and we paid about \$80,000 to one in 11

months and about \$300,000 with the two other firms."

Mayor Leon Eggleston asked what type of engineer would the councilors want — mechanical, hydrological or some other specialty?

Byars said she prefers a hydrologist who is an engineer. The neighboring Mescalero Apache Tribe has a hydrologist on staff, she said.

"We say this (water) is the most important thing before us and yet, we only are willing to pay \$52,000, but we hired consultants and spent \$300,000," she said.

A water director would be a more appropriate point person to work with water consultants than the village attorney, she contended.

Hardeman said such a person probably would be paid more than the village manager and her salary might need to be adjusted as well as others. Eggleston agreed that it wouldn't be

right to pay the village manager less than someone she manages.

Byars suggested bumping the annual salary of the water director/engineer up to a maximum of \$70,000, which is lower than McKnight's salary.

Councilor Don Williams said as a former engineer he saw many cases where a scientist was paid more than a supervisor.

Deputy manager Cleatus Richards doubted that the village could hire a qualified water director who is an engineer at the salaries mentioned.

"Wasn't our last director an engineer?" Rebstock asked. Richards said he was, but Hardeman interjected that, "There are engineers all over the map. We have one with the street department. There are all sorts of specialties."

"We have a water system with 42 pressure zones and it is a terribly complex and aging infrastructure. I think we need to hire a director and then if needed, we can address engineering."

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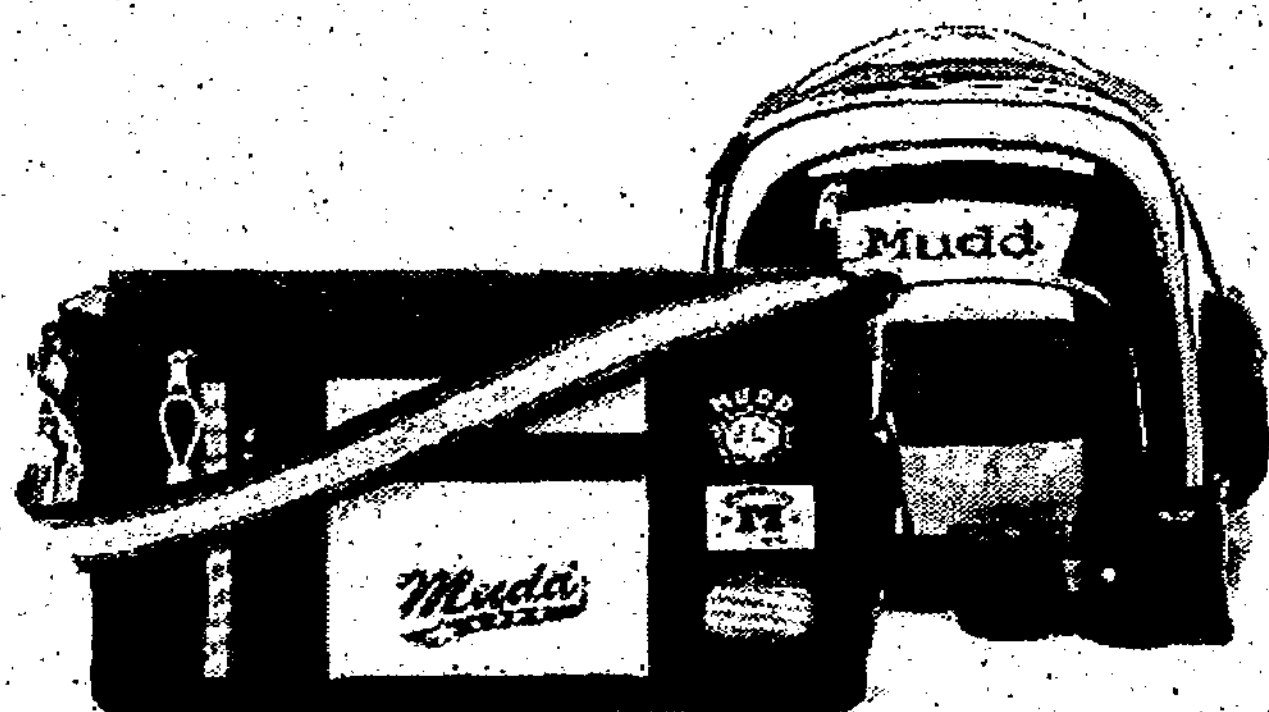
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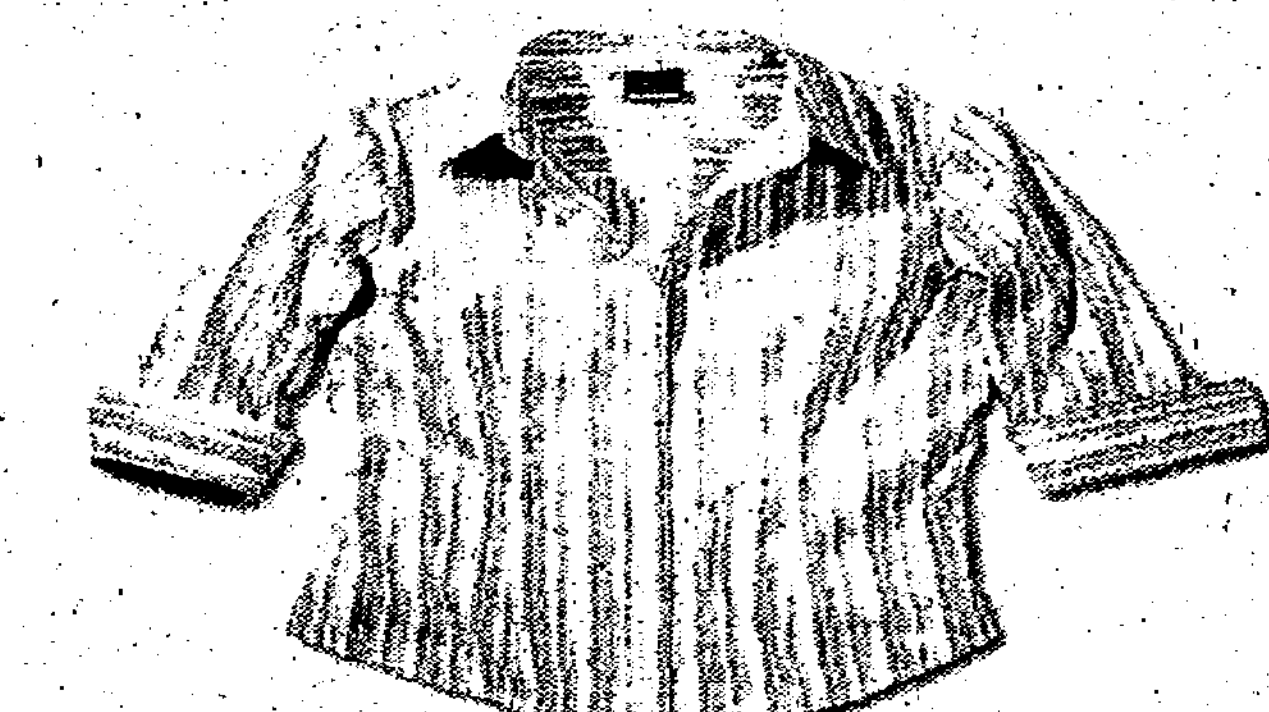

Mammoth agenda awaits village council

A whopping 16 items and two public hearings are on the agenda of the Ruidoso Village Council meeting Tuesday.

The meeting starts at 6 p.m. in village hall on Cree Meadows Drive. Seven are discussion and possible action items, some of which were hotly debated in the past. They include:

- The lease for The Links Golf Course, requested for an update by Councilor Deborah Marcum-Byars and scheduled by village manager Lorri McKnight
- A letter from the State Auditor requesting copies of the village's contract with its attorney and subcontracts with water consultants
- The future of a quarter of a

cent lodgers tax previously dedicated to the arts brought up by Councilor Ron Hardeman and scheduled by McKnight

- A request by Hardeman to revisit possible funding for community radio KEDU

• An item listed by Byars to discuss and possibly take action on issuing requests for proposals for water consultant services

- The formation of a mayor-appointed task force on affordable housing brought up by Councilor Michele Rebstock and discussed last month.

• Possible action to create an advisory board for Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

Three change orders totaling \$14,355 are requested by Carl Kelly Construction for the Eagle Creek Pipeline Crossing

Highway 48 Project.

Four task order revisions for Wilson & Company are listed for an \$8,120 increase in the design for decant basins at the Alto Water Treatment Plant, \$20,000 for water and sewer improvements, \$15,500 for the Eagle Creek Bypass Waterline, and \$10,000 for subdivision and development review.

Approval of a new task order with Wilson for \$14,395 is requested for a half-million gallon water storage tank dedicated to fire fighting at the municipal airport.

A resolution is scheduled for adoption that would change the village's personnel code.

Two zone map amendments are up for a vote, one dealing with Woodland Hills subdivision by applicant Harry Alwein,

and the other for Jayshree Inc. to build a La Quinta Hotel in the Navajo subdivision off Chase Street and Sudderth Drive. The motel application was recommended for denial by the village planning and zoning commission.

Included on the consent agenda, which the council approves in one vote without discussion are two requests for lodgers tax, a bid award for \$142,682 to Ruidoso Paving for an airport hangar access taxiway construction, approval of a \$300,000 legislative appropriation for a new village fire station, and approval of a federal grant application for \$28,209 with a village match of \$7,052 to buy a 15-passenger senior citizens center bus.

Airport hangar lease rates see slight lift

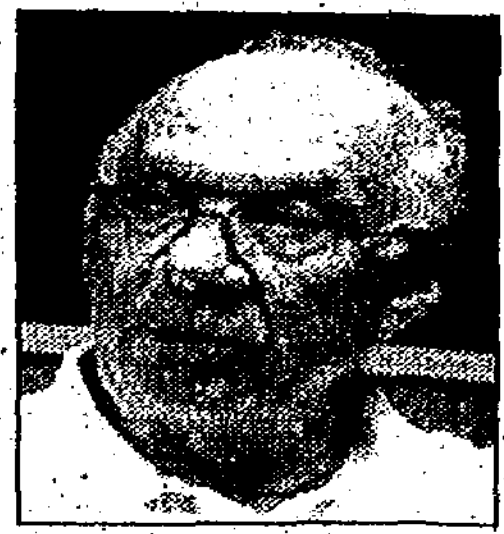
Lease rates for land to build hangars at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport keep pace with other municipal airports, says the village's airport manager.

Approval of two lease agreements were bumped from the village council's consent agenda at a June meeting to allow discussion of the items at the council's July 13 session.

The agreements are with Ruidoso Partners LLC for a 60x40 foot space and with Wood Leasing of New Mexico LLC and Seven Rivers Inc. for about 120 x 75 feet, plus footage for a septic system.

"That's \$20 more a year," Councilor Deborah Marcum-Byars said of the small revenue return, backed by laughter from the audience.

Airport manager Tim Morris told councilors that a study in 2001 by the New Mexico Department of Transportation, Aviation Division, showed Sierra Blanca with rates of 6 cents per square foot per year. The rate was adjusted after the study to 8 cents, the average of

hangars and airport officials determined that the rates should be adjusted by 2 cents more, where they now stand at 10 cents per square foot per year.

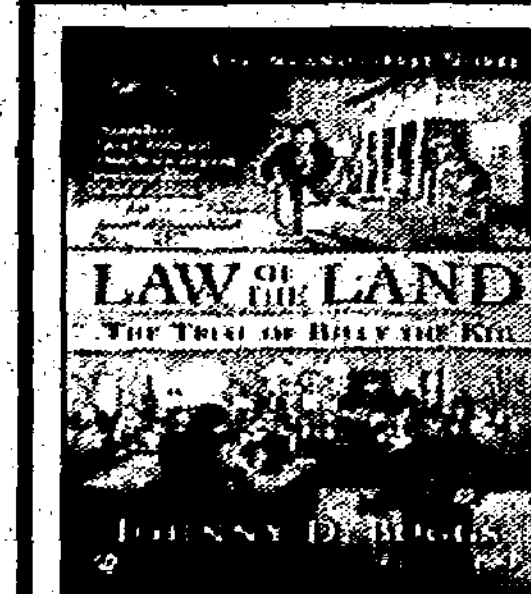
Councilor Michele Rebstock said a friend who lives in Oregon and is building a hangar at a local airport pays 13 cents per square foot each month.

Councilor L. Ray Nunley congratulated Morris for the good job of running the airport on Sierra Blanca Airport Road, calling it one of the best small town airports in the country.

On motions by Councilor Ron Hardeman, both leases were approved.

The entity leasing the land builds the hangars, which at some point falls under village ownership.

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Sneaky single-wides?

Commissioners seek to control mobiles

Lincoln County commissioners went around and around for the third time about how to track mobile homes moving into the county.

County department officials say they need help in dealing with mobiles owners who move into an area without notice, intrude on county rights of way, create traffic on roads and drainage problems, drill wells, install septic systems and form compounds without anybody in county government being aware.

At a meeting in June, commissioners decided to ask power companies to notify the county planner before hooking up new mobile home accounts. Planner Patsy Sanchez could then let County Assessor Rick Silva know to ensure that the new residents pay their fair share of property taxes.

But at their July meeting, commissioners heard objections from a representative of Otero County Electric Cooperative and were told that companies other than Otero and Texas-New Mexico Power would be impacted by an ordinance

requiring notification to the county before hooking up service.

After another debate on the issue, commissioners took no action on the proposed ordinance and told Silva to use other ways of gaining information on the movement of mobile units.

Vic Plumb, Otero manager in the Cloudcroft office, told commissioners the proposed ordinance was fatally flawed.

"I didn't intend to be confrontational, but I saw deficiencies and the (terms) seemed confrontational to me when we would be subject to a fine and jail time (for not complying)," he said. "We don't hook up mobile homes, we hook up meters."

The meter could be installed for a barn and then 10 years later, the barn could become a home, or a mobile home could be moved onto the land, he said.

"I'd be subject to a fine then," Plumb said.

Although the meters are read each month, employee's records will reflect if a mobile home or something else should be hooked up, he said.

Customers already have to fill out a lot of paperwork and this would generate more and could cause delays, he said.

Commissioner Maury St. John said she'd like Silva to look into how the county could help the state be more accommodating with the information the assessor and others need.

Resident Bill Hodges complained that mobile home owners move in, cut trees and pay no attention to the steepness of land or cut-created slopes.

"They're like a rash all over Ruidoso," he said.

Shamie Mills Huband, who serves on the county planning board, said tax collection is not the major motive in trying to locate the mobile homes. She agreed with Hodges that the issues of improper setbacks, slopes and tree cutting are more important.

"A site plan should be part of the ordinance, just as it is for a stick home," she told commissioners. "You can get a blocking permit over the Internet and a human being (from the state)

never goes and looks. I have a picture of one on top of a Texas-New Mexico Power easement."

Commissioner Leo Martinez said some type of tracking is needed because the county could be responsible if property is destroyed from improper placement that causes down drainage flooding or other problems.

"People are investing money in fixing up areas in the extraterritorial zone (around Ruidoso) and all of a sudden mobile homes move in," he said. "They're put on the county rights of way and we're responsible. We have no control over them whatsoever."

He's not worried about someone like Jerry Carroll of Oscura who opposed a new ordinance, but lives on large acreage in a remote area, Martinez said.

Sanchez said a mobile home moved onto a right of way within two hours one day and she didn't know about it. Approving an ordinance would give her a solution to avert "overnight subdivisions," she said.

Notification is supposed to come from the state Motor Vehicle Division, but there seems to be a breakdown, Silva said.

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It makes it a muddy mess to work in, but things are getting done. During the dry parts of the day, crews are working the entire west side from Ski Run Road to the top of Angus Hill getting base course in and getting ready to pave. We initially thought that we would be ready to pave the west side by August the 9th, but the rains have delayed that date...but not by too much.

At any time, trucks and equipment could be entering and exiting the roadway and there may be minor delays.

On Angus Hill, crews are preparing the slopes for a retaining wall system that are required to stabilize the slopes. Trucks and equipment will be entering and exiting the highway at various locations, and lane closures will be necessary. Delays will be minimal and be no more than 15 minutes.

The rains have played havoc with the temporary driveways, if there is any access problems, please give us a call.

No work is planned for this weekend. Regular work hours for crews are 7:00am to 5:00pm Monday through Friday.

Commission hits the roads

County to pave, improve area roadways

Lincoln County will provide the equipment and manpower, and the U.S. Forest Service will kick in \$10,000 to improve a forest road by Bonito Lake.

County commissioners last month approved an agreement with the federal agency for cooperative work on Bonito Canyon Forest Service Road.

In other road projects, commissioners gave final acceptance of private roads in The Preserve Subdivision, Phase I, and Copper Canyon subdivision. As required by county

ordinance, the road superintendent and county manager inspected the private roads to ensure they meet county standards. Because they are private, they are not scheduled for acceptance into county maintenance.

Under cooperative projects with the state Department of Transportation, with the state paying 75 percent and the county 25 percent, commissioners approved:

- \$53,222 for pavement rehabilitation on 1.5 miles on Gavilan Canyon.
- \$66,762 for the same type

of work on 1.85 miles on A007 in Carrizozo and in Gavilan Canyon.

• \$190,019 for the same type of work on 4.9 miles covering four projects in Fawn Ridge, A007 in Carrizozo, D003 and D002 on Old Fort Stanton Road.

In other action, the commission:

- Awarded a bid for a one-year renewable contract for dust control suppressant to Envirotech Chemical of Los Lunas at \$16 per square foot.
- Awarded a one year renewable contract for local

banking services to First National Bank in Ruidoso, which scored the highest of four banks that submitted proposals.

• Approved \$3,333 as a county match to a \$55,000 grant for the Lincoln County Community Collaborative. The collaborative, a non-profit group headed up by president Doug Babcock and Juvenile Probation Officer Sergio Castro, works to provide a continuum of services for county young people to avoid the costs of incarceration and criminal recidivism.

'Equitrekking' saddles up for New Mexico trail ride

■ Film crew will film in Lincoln this weekend.

"Equitrekking: Destination New Mexico," the second in a new, international travel series for Horse TV, will film three upcoming segments in the Land of Enchantment Aug. 6 to 9: The Spanish Horses of New Mexico, the Double E Ranch in the Gila Wilderness and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Posse Pony Express Ride from White Oaks to Lincoln.

"Equitrekking" will also visit nearby tourist attractions and restaurants. "This unique production gives us an opportunity to showcase often-unexplored areas of New Mexico before an international audience," said Mike Cerletti, secretary of the New Mexico Tourism Department (NMTD). "Susan Seligman and Judie Framan - New Mexico horsewomen, public relations specialists and field producers of the New Mexico segments - saw the potential of this series for New Mexico and sold us on the idea."

Viewers will experience the adventure of traveling to some of New Mexico's more rustic destinations and being a part of their history, and the thrill of doing it on horseback.

The three-day Lincoln County Sheriff's Posse Pony Express Ride will take viewers over the mountains from White Oaks to Lincoln as participants deliver the mail during the Old Lincoln Days parade. The crew will film many of the Old

Lincoln Days activities as well as the stagecoach run just outside of Lincoln. While in the area, host Darley Newman will also visit the Hubbard Museum of the American West and Ruidoso Downs Race Track. For a nostalgic look at a true "honky-tonk," she plans on learning to two-step at the Win, Place, and Show in Ruidoso on Saturday night, August 7.

The segment on Spanish horses will include interviews with Spanish Arabian trainer Jim Porcher in Corrales and Spanish Paso Fino trainer Fernando de Leon, shot in the Corrales bosque; footage of Spanish Andalusians in full regalia, filmed against the Sandia Mountains; an interview with former U.S. Ambassador to Spain, Ed Romero; and the New Mexico Horse Project which is testing DNA to search for the descendants of Onate's original horses. Scenes in and around Corrales will also be filmed, including dining at Jim White's Casa Vieja restaurant.

The segment at the Double E Ranch will be shot at the "Cowgirl Camp," where aspiring cowgirls learn how to rope, brand and move cattle, and try the sports of barrel racing and mounted shooting. The crew will trail ride through the mountains and canyons of the Gila and film the incredible vistas from the back of a horse. Next stop, the 1880's Buckhorn Saloon in Pinos Altos near Silver City, for dinner and throwing popcorn at the bad guys during the melodrama at the Opera House next door.

"Film is one of the most effective ways we have to share New Mexico with the world," said Jon Hendry, NMTD marketing director.

"Words are hard to come by when trying to describe the scenic beauty of this state to the uninitiated. Traveling the back roads of New Mexico is an experience that must be shared visually. We welcome this production to our Land of Enchantment."

Seligman and Framan are the field producers for the project, and New Mexico filmmaker Doug Crawford will join the production team.

They have been coordinating the Lincoln County segments with local film liaison, Laura Doth. Darley Newman is the host and executive producer of the

"Equitrekking" program. Veteran New York City producer, Brian Skene, will travel to New Mexico to work on "Equitrekking."

"In every episode of 'Equitrekking,' horse lovers and riders of all skill levels learn about each area's unique breed of horses while absorbing the stunning natural scenery and culture of each destination," Newman said. "Viewers receive tips from experts on how to prepare themselves for horseback vacations, on horse health, safety and a variety of other topics. For both the armchair travelers and those preparing to take their equestrian adventure, 'Equitrekking' transports viewers around the world."

"Equitrekking's" first program, "Destination Ireland," is

A poor choice of words led to the impression that the August 14, "Fort Stanton Live" event is tied to a rally of Lincoln County Democrats.

Party chairman Doris Cherry said Wednesday she wanted to clarify that in a recent press release, the word "rally" should not have been used.

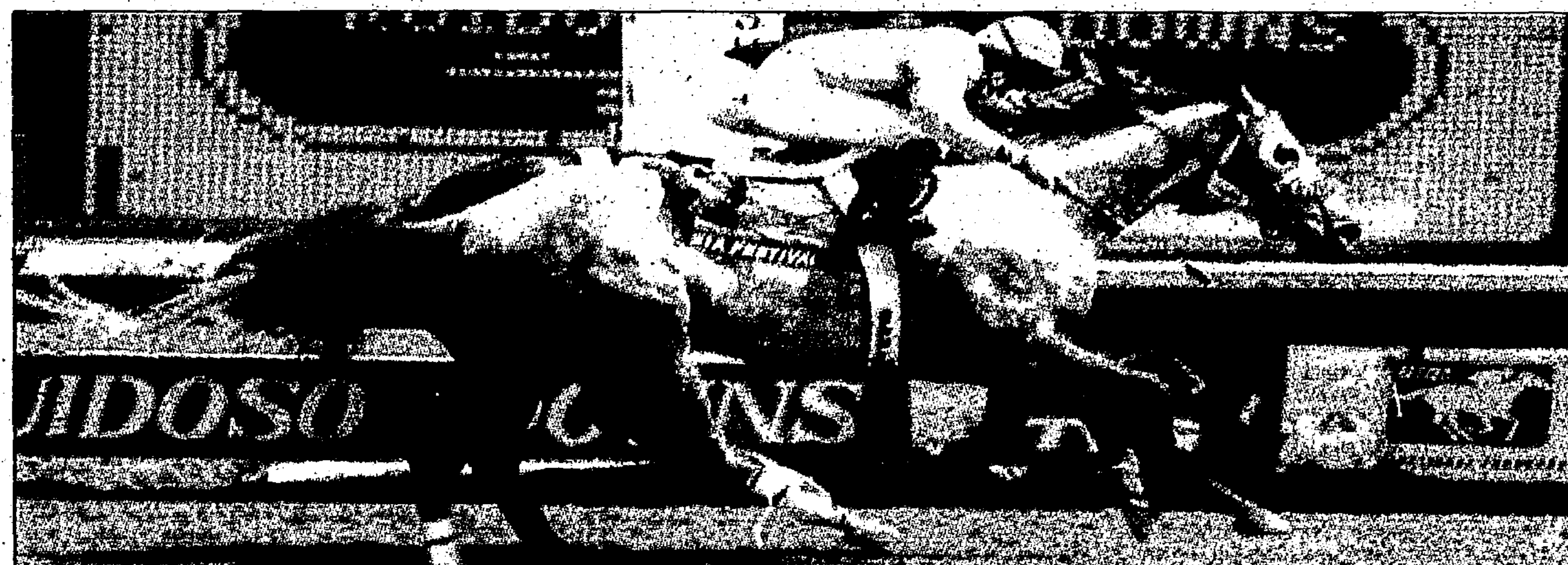
same time on field C.

Jockey Martin Bourdieu was elated with his mount's effort.

"That was one of the best races I've had a chance to ride in," said the tired jockey. "My horse and Local Case were so close the whole way. I had to work much harder than I thought I would. Local Case made my horse earn his win today. It's fun to ride a race like that."

Cancer research benefit run returns to Ruidoso

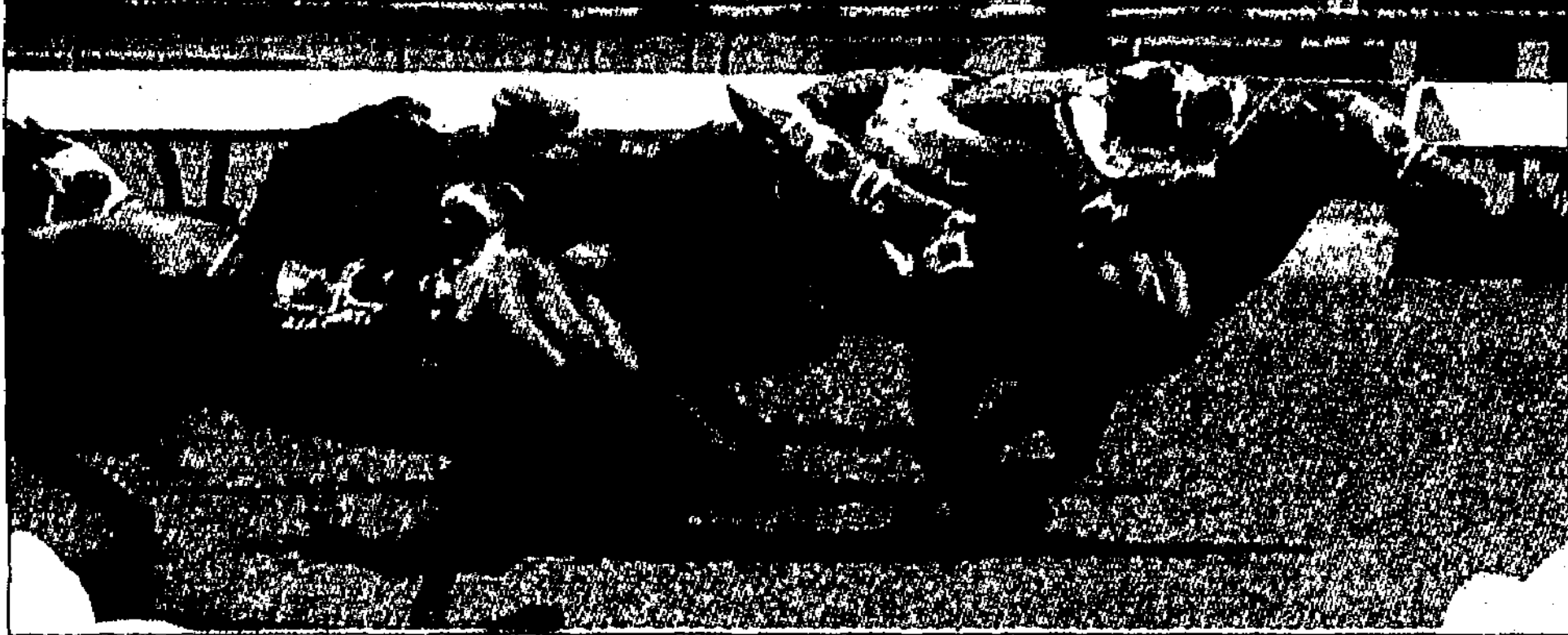

Sierra Starlet Handicap

Everyone knows the shortest way around the racetrack is close to the inner rail. Latenite Special used that route to score an easy victory in the Sierra Starlet.

Patience was the only thing going through the mind of jockey Ken Tohill as he rode as he tracked the early leaders in the 5 1/2 furlong sprint. Sitting in third place and on the rail for much of the race, Latenite Special appeared to lack racing room as there were horses surrounding her but at the head of the stretch, early pacesetter Excessive Reign carried Janna's Gold while opening a clear path for the race favorite to continue her unencumbered trek along the rail.

That was all the winner needed as she quickly put 3 1/2 lengths between her and runner up Janna's Gold by the time she hit the wire.

Zia Quarter Horse Handicap

XS Nitro is quickly making his owners look like some of the smartest people in quarter horse racing. The \$20,000 claim has proven to be a wise investment. Since then he has won three stakes races and finished second in another, earning White Glove Ranch LLC more than \$110,000 over the four races.

Trained by Fred Danley for owner W. T. Stradley of Hobbs,

New Mexico, Shemoveslikeaghost has now won more than half of her lifetime races. Her career record now stands at nine wins, three seconds and a third place finish in 16 starts. With the win in the Lincoln Handicap, Shemoveslikeaghost increased her lifetime bankroll to more than \$366,000.

I'll start at the beginning. The herd of cows had been moved out of the pasture a few days earlier. One mama and her very big should-be-weaned "baby" were left behind. Whether she was actually left behind or had escaped without notice that day is up for a vote.

We unloaded the horses at the top side of a six section pasture. She and her calf were seen in the distance, already traveling in a high trot. So we loped after her, easing around to the front to turn her toward the nearest corrals.

She took it well. Not ever slowing down much she and we were headed in the right direction. Several miles later we were almost there. We figured the easy part was over but we proved it within the hour.

This cow - I use that term only for propriety because I can and did call her many other things - had absolutely no intention of going near the corrals let alone in them. With just two of us horseback we did all

we knew how to convince her she was surrounded. She wasn't fooled; not for a second.

After she made tracks right over the top of us three times in her determination to leave, we reassessed the situation. The washed out gullies, rocks and hillside looked like a war zone and was about as easy to maneuver through. Our horses were worn out and the cow wasn't.

All hope of having a real "woman power cowgirls rule" kind of day was gone. We needed reinforcements and preferably ones that could rope.

I had considered that option during the battle but knew I was outgunned—one very big cow and one old woman with a rope riding a very tired horse is not fair fight.

We reconvened after church on Sunday. Church was one of our better ideas in this whole thing. It definitely needed prayer.

We had let that cow get away three times. That is a hanging offense in most cowboy circles. And because of it, she was going to be considerably harder to gather the second day.

Reinforcements came in the form of two cowboys with ropes. Things were looking up. Took quite awhile longer to find her, and true to what I thought, she didn't let us drive her even as close to the corrals as she had the day before.

Her calf took off with eyes glazed over and no convincing would turn him back. He soon wore a nylon neck tie (catch rope) and was tied up to await the arrival of a trailer.

Mamma Cow refused any negotiations for a peaceful capture and soon wore not one but two ropes. Her desire to drag us off, horse and all, made the added rope an easy decision.

After some huffing, puffing and a few tense minutes, the pair was loaded in the trailer and hauled off to the cull pen at the headquarters.

Now before you cowboys get too puffed up over the fact we cowgirls needed some help. Let me point out a couple things.

First, it took less than an hour for us to figure out we needed help. And second, we were smart enough to ask for it. I could write several stories about how that is different than the "cowboy way."

Lydia and Marines Perez are new to Carrizozo industry but not new to the marketing of products purchased from the indigent peoples of the world.

With two stores in Santa Fe, the Perez's fell in love with the building at 110 central in Carrizozo several years ago. The couple has purchased several turn-of-the-century houses in Carrizozo and were delighted when they could finally settle on a deal for the 1880's building that houses Fourth World.

Fourth World offers imports from around the world.

Wounaan Tribes of the Province of Darien in Panama are one source of some of the imports for sale.

They make hand woven baskets from fibers of the "chunga" palm.

Other items are from the Maya Indians in Guatemala, the Inca's in Peru, and the Hill Tribe of Thailand.

The Perez's do all their own product line buying.

They buy to sell but sell to give back. They fund projects in nearby communities.

They put teachers in a school to maintain the culture and

language of the Mayan Indians. They are working with two orphanages in Indonesia and a rehab center for lepers in Northern Thailand.

Their product line includes handicrafts produced by indigent peoples, textiles, pottery, jewelry, clothing, accessories, baskets, wood and metal sculpture and folk art.

Their goal is to buy from the fourth world, giving them a position in the art world, rais-

ing the conscience of the world, and selling the items at inexpensive prices to keep the turnover regular therefore increasing the volume of goods purchases.

Palla Duncan, White Oaks artist, is managing the Carrizozo store and will also have her art studio in house. The Fourth World Cottage Industries in Carrizozo is open Monday-Saturday 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

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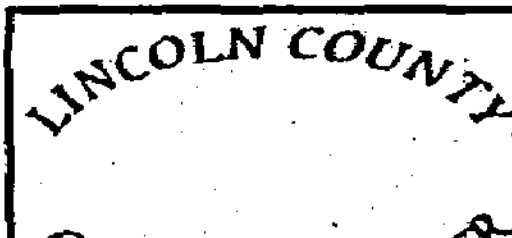
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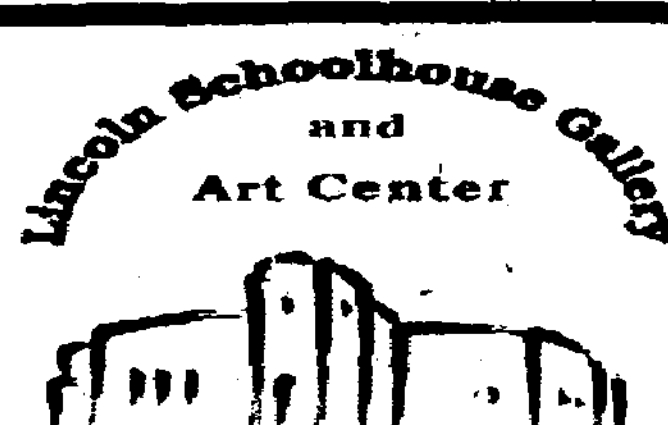


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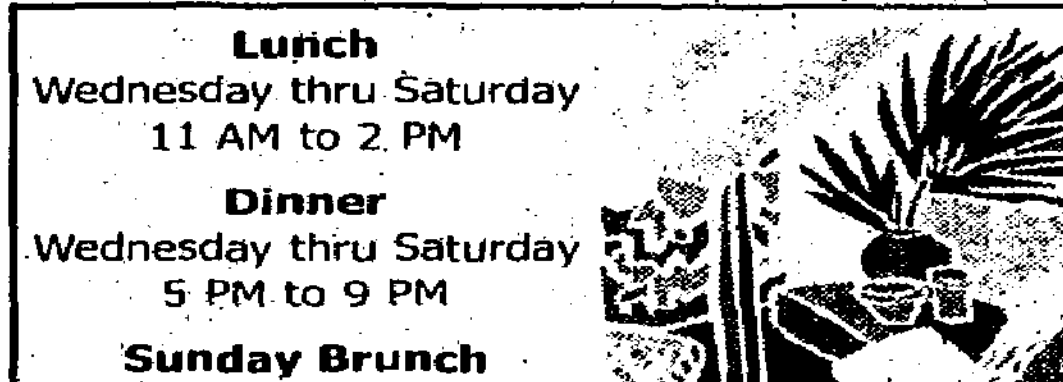
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2004 Lincoln County Fair kicks off next week

Delinquent property auction set for Aug. 18

It is one of the things no one wants to see happen. A delinquent tax property auction is scheduled for Aug. 18 at 10 a.m. in the commissioner's headquarters of the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

Once a property is three years tax delinquent, the State of New Mexico puts it on a delinquent tax sale list. People who come forth with hardship cases can be set up on Hardship Case Payment Agreement with the State of New Mexico.

Efforts are ongoing by the local treasurer's office to help property owners get paid up prior to the three year deadline for the state mandated auction list.

As of July 30, Beverly Calaway, Lincoln County Treasurer, said the list has been brought from 72 properties to 42, simply by diligently seeking the property owners. Often the owners were unaware for various reasons that a property was delinquent.

Calaway cited a situation where an elderly man in a rest home in Texas has owned a piece of property in Lincoln County.

When he died the notices were returned undeliverable from the rest home, and the heirs were not aware the property even existed, let alone was tax delinquent.

With some detective-like work by the treasurer's office, the heirs were located and the property saved from a delinquent tax auction.

"We don't want anyone to lose their property," said

Delinquent mobile homes headed to sale list

Prior to April of this year, the Lincoln County Treasures Office had 162 mobile homes that were at least two years tax delinquent.

Through dedicated efforts by the office staff, that number was at 129 in June when notice letters were mailed. In July notices were down to 68.

"We are trying to let people know they are in danger of having their mobile homes put on a tax sale list," said county treasurer Beverly Calaway. "Right now there is a staff member from the treasurer's office and one from the assessor's office out physically locating mobile homes that we have had no response from the letters we sent."

Like with other property, the county treasurer's office will consider hardship cases and offer a hardship installment agreement for the owner to make payments for amounts due.

Calaway stated that mobile homes delinquent in taxes will be put on a sale list as well as have a lien put on the property through the Department of Motor Vehicles.

Like many of the vacationers we travel with (two-thirds of all American households will own at least one digital camera by the year's end, according to the research firm IDC) we've finally jumped aboard the digital photography bandwagon.

We've long envied the immediacy that digital cameras provide travelers.

Perhaps we first noticed the benefits of a digital camera on a trip to Burma, three years ago, where a few of our traveling companions carried digital cameras.

You could always spot the digital photographers by the

throng of children, excited to view themselves in the camera's LCD screen, who surrounded them.

We next realized the advantages of traveling with a digital camera while yacht cruising in Alaska, when one passenger, a keen digital photographer, plugged his camera into the yacht's large screen TV and treated us to a digital 'slideshow' of our cruise's highlights.

Another passenger amazed (and annoyed) us as he casually wielded his credit-card sized digital camera to produce professional-quality images, often while smoking a cigar in one hand and sipping whisky in the other.

While these travelers made digital photography look appealing and easy, our own transition has taught us that there's a lot more to the picture than we realized.

Decisions, decisions...

First, like anyone in the market for a digital camera, we had to decide which model would work best for us (we chose the Canon EOS 10D).

Doing so required learning a new language. Pixels, megabyte, jpeg, tiff, white balance, compact flash, digital media reader, etc., have become (whether we like it or not) common words in our newly acquired digital vocabulary.

Talk to anyone who's bought a digital camera and you'll learn that buying the camera is only the tip of the money-gobbling iceberg.

There are backup batteries, portable card readers and battery chargers, LCD screen protectors, computer software and upgraded hardware, to be purchased.

That said, the camera's pre-programmed ability to compensate for any lighting condition - daylight, nighttime, cloudy or hazy, heavy shade, tungsten or florescent - make it all worthwhile.

Never again will we be limited by having the wrong film at the wrong time; a benefit even the most ardent film aficionado can appreciate.

However, returning home from a trip with scores of snapshots packed in our new digital camera, we were faced with a problem common to all digital camera neophytes: What to do with all those photos?

Handy Web site.

Rather than deluge the e-mail in-boxes of relatives, friends, travel companions and business associates (guaranteeing that they'll never open our messages again), we took the recommendation of a colleague and logged on to smugmug.com, a Web site for storing and sharing photos.

We were soon compiling a virtual album featuring some of our favorite shots, e-mailing invitations to friends to come view

and swapping snapshots with faraway vacationers whom we've met while traveling. How nice!

This is a far cry from years past when trip photos sat neglected in slide boxes, gathering dust, unable to be enjoyed, let alone shared.

Better yet, if (god forbid) our computer crashes, the photos are stored, in perpetuity, on smugmug's server.

As with a handful of the top dozen or so Web sites that offer similar photo-sharing service (Webshots, Yahoo, Sony's ImageStation, Microsoft's MSN Photos, Snapfish, Ofoto and Shutterfly), smugmug gives users space on its site and a number of things to do with their photos once they've uploaded them.

The difference is, smugmug charges for its services (\$29.95 a year for unlimited photos).

In our opinion, the service is worth the money. Uploading was easy, the photo presentation is more elegant than most and, what sold us, there are no advertisements, no 'buy prints now' pop-ups to clutter the viewing, or required guest registration to clog our friends' in-boxes with unwanted spam.

We invite you to view our smugmug gallery (<http://www.barones.smugmug.com>) and hope you'll share your own digital expertise and advice with us as we emerge in to this exciting new phase of photography.

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Still time to enroll in Part B of Medicare

Q. I did not enroll for Part B of Medicare when I turned 65 last year, although I do have Part A. Could I still enroll now even if almost a year has gone by?

A. Yes, you can still enroll for Part B. Every year, you have the opportunity to enroll in Part B. You can enroll during the General Enrollment Period which is between January 1 and March 31. Your coverage starts on the first day of July of the same year. In your case, it would start on July 1, 2004. The monthly premiums increase by 10 percent for every year you could have enrolled and didn't. So the sooner you enroll, the lower the cost of the monthly premiums.

Q. I have only lived in the United States a short time. I want to comply with my obligations and pay my taxes, but I don't have a Social Security Number. What can I do to pay the taxes on the earnings I had this year?

A. Even though you don't have a Social Security Number yet, you can still file your tax return and pay your income taxes. The Internal Revenue Service or IRS will assign you an identification number which you can use to file your tax return.

Q. I retired this year at the age of 67, but I am still working. My boss told me I still have to pay FICA taxes on my earnings. I thought that when I retired, I would no longer have to pay FICA taxes. Who is right, me or my boss?

A. Your boss is right. As long as you continue working, you and your boss have to pay FICA taxes although you have retired. The positive side of this is that your additional earnings may increase the amount of your Social Security benefits.

Q. I get cash tips at my work as a waitress. I have heard I can get credits for Social Security purposes based on these tips. What can I do to get these Social Security credits?

A. If you earn \$20 or more in tips, you can earn credits for Social Security purposes. You should declare your earnings from tips when you file your tax return if your tips add up to \$20 or more a month. You and your boss must pay the FICA taxes based on these earnings. You should keep a daily record of your tips.

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State plans to shift indigent care funds to cover uninsured workers

■ County unhappy with the change, calls state fiscally irresponsible

State officials recently revealed plans to dip into indigent medical care funds operated by counties to cover uninsured employees in New Mexico.

Rhonda Burrows, Lincoln County Indigent care coordinator, told commissioners at a meeting last month that a recent presentation by state health department officials put counties on notice that they want county indigent funds to help pay for employee health care. A legislative initiative may be launched.

Under three different

options analyzed by Burrows, such use would consume an estimated 32 percent to 48.6 percent of the indigent gross receipts tax generated in the county.

"It will have a major impact on the county indigent health program to benefit a state estimated 435 employees from businesses in Lincoln County," county manager Tom Stewart said. Statewide, enrollment was projected at 40,000 individuals.

Burrows said historically the governor and state have tried to take advantage of county indigent funds.

"You seem to be fiscally responsible and they seem not to be," she said.

Although the health department secretary since resigned, Burrows said she's unsure if

the state initiative died with her departure. The plan had many flaws, state officials acknowledged, and was being redesigned.

The carrot for counties is that money collected by the state would generate a return of federal dollars, but Burrows said those dollars should be returned to the counties to administer for the most positive impact.

Burrows said smaller counties are doing a good job with their indigent care funds. Apparently, large counties such as Santa Fe and Bernalillo are pushing the initiative, she said. They are the ones most affected by the statistic that 21 percent of the total state population was without health insurance in 2002.

The percentage was higher

at 28 percent for people ages 19 to 64 because Medicaid picks up some children and Medicare handles most people 65 and older.

Stewart said the state Legislative Finance Committee is auditing county indigent funds and queried him on Lincoln County's reaction to the proposal. Burrows' observations will be forwarded to state officials and to Williams. St. John said to tell state officials "We are handling our fund well and don't want interference."

Stewart said he keeps the indigent fund under half a million dollars each year because previously, state law said if money was not used, it would be removed to the state.

"It seems like this is just another way to get to our funds," he said.

Tobacco cessation targets hospitals

To help New Mexico hospitals provide tobacco cessation counseling to patients who use tobacco, the New Mexico Medical Review Association has been working with seven hospitals throughout the state.

Hospitalized patients are often more receptive to making behavior changes to improve health status when they realize the connection between their tobacco use and their illness.

Hospital staff use the teachable moment that a hospitalization offers to provide brief bedside counseling for patients who use tobacco.

The program is funded through the New Mexico Department of Health, Tobacco Use Prevention and Control Program.

Since November 2003, participating hospitals have provided cessation counseling to 316 patients, and 95 patients set quit dates after their counseling session.

Tobacco use takes a heavy toll on New Mexicans. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 2,100 New Mexico adults die each year from smoking.

Child safety-seat checkup set for Aug. 28

■ Car seats for infants prevent deaths but are frequently misused

In response to New Mexico's 97-percent car seat misuse rate, Lincoln County Medical Center OB Department in conjunction with Safer NM is hosting a car seat checkup for the families of Lincoln County.

On Aug. 28 we will meet with the community from 1-3 p.m. in the LCMC parking lot at 211 Sudderth Dr.

Our goal is for each child to leave safer than they arrived, whether that be with a new, more appropriate seat for their age and size, or with parents more informed about proper use of child safety seats.

According to the National Highway Transportation and Safety Administration, research proves that car seats are 71 percent effective in preventing infant mortality when installed correctly before a crash (www.nhtsa.dot.gov).

The simplest error, however, can prove deadly.

At the checkup, trained car seat technicians will inspect seats and educate parents on safe practice, positioning, and installation.

We will visit with anyone interested in learning how to better protect their children in the case of a crash.

Last year's event a success

Last year's checkup was a huge success. During the clinic, 16 seats were inspected. Of these, seven were found unsafe and were replaced. Installation errors were corrected on each of the other seats.

The safest location for a car seat is the most common dilemma for parents who have to install more than one seat. The contour, composure, or size of a seat may also pose a challenge.

Additionally, the vast array of seat belt retractors and latch plates vary from vehicle to vehicle. Each situation presents different needs and challenges.

Our team not only wants parents to learn the safest installation for their child's car seat, but also wants each child to leave in a seat appropriate for their age and weight.

Rear-facing seats

Car seats for children younger than one year and weighing less than twenty pounds should always be rear facing.

Some children, however, exceed the weight limit for infant only seats but should still be facing rear. They should be in a rear facing convertible seat.

Once a toddler reaches one year and is over twenty pounds, they should be secured in a forward facing convertible seat.

After a child exceeds the weight recommendations for a forward facing convertible seat, a lap-shoulder belt is still not adequate.

In the interim between the forward facing convertible and the lap-shoulder belt, children require booster seats to provide the height needed to prevent lap belts from riding too high, positioning the shoulder belt at the best place to minimize upper body forward excursion upon impact.

Lap-shoulder belts

Once a child reaches eighty pounds and can comfortably bend their knees over the edge of the seat, they can graduate to the lap-shoulder belt. All children under the age of twelve however, should ride in the backseat away from airbags.

As OB nurses and servants to our community, we hope that every ride for children in Lincoln County will be a safe ride—even after the first ride home from the hospital.

Politics and the Irish Theater: 'Juno' preceded by 2 events

Library will host discussion of the play

Dublin native and retired professor Alan Hudson will be the featured speaker at a special brown bag lecture at the Ruidoso Public Library. Part of the library's ongoing Adult Awareness Program, the free event is set for 11:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. on Tuesday in the main library hall.

The subject is politics and the Irish theatre tradition, centered on the upcoming production of "Juno and the Paycock" by Sean O'Casey. The play, set in 1920s Dublin, addresses tragedies both personal and societal in the chaotic aftermath of the Irish Civil War. Hudson is playing a lead role in the Lincoln County Community Theatre presentation of "Juno," which opens Aug. 13. Also on hand for the discussion will be director Malcolm Sharbutt, a Ruidoso High School graduate who has a passion for O'Casey's work and Irish history.

Raised in the crowded tenements of Dublin, playwright Sean O'Casey spent his youth as a union activist and a member of the Irish Citizen's Army. His ability to reproduce the language and comic sense of working-class Dubliners made him a stalwart of pre-Depression Irish renaissance. Although they inspired riots in their time, his tragicomic trilogy, including "Juno," "The Plough and the Stars" and "The Shadow of the Gunman," are still the most popular works in the Abbey Theatre repertoire.

The brown bag lecture will be free and open to the public. Beverages and cookies will be provided.

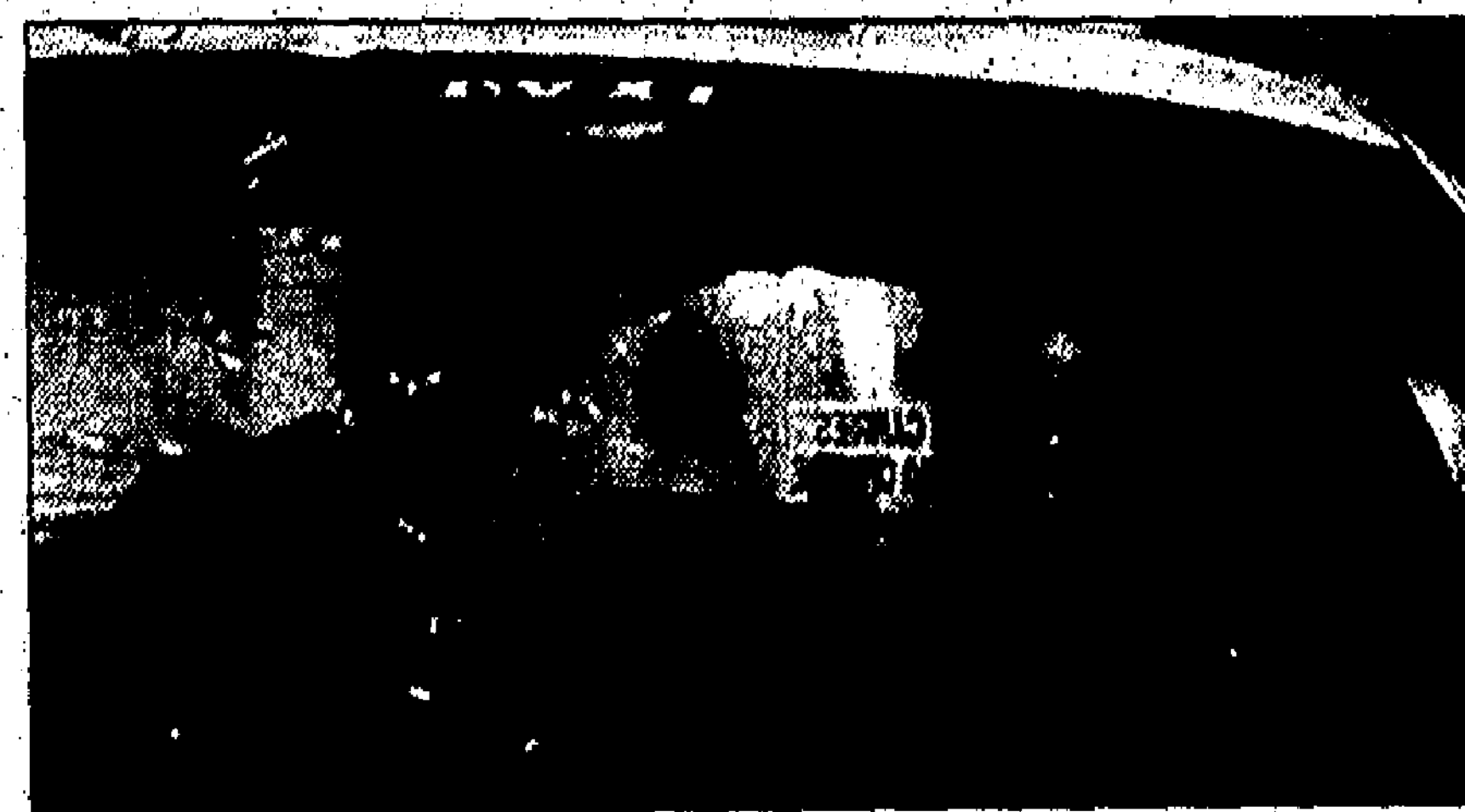

Ol' Lincoln Town brings its roots to the surface this weekend with Western dramas and music, square dancing, book signings of Western books, living history groups, storytelling, demonstrations, and arts, crafts and food.

• Ruidoso Community Concert Association plans to use \$2,122 in funding for the annual season of professional musical programs, including four concerts and a school program;

• Ruidoso Regional Council for the Arts' \$7,678 funding will be used for the annual program, which includes exhibits, concerts, street performances and an outdoor sculpture exhibit;

TASTEMAKERS: CASA DE SUEÑOS

Open your eyes to Casa de Sueños

If you're hungry for distinctive Mexican cuisine like red chile pork chops and stuffed sopapillas, dream a little dream as you drive west on Sudderth and take a right on Mechem. But then the reverie must stop or you'll miss it: Casa de Sueños, our own House of Dreams, is just around the corner.

This new restaurant is a little hard to find, tucked behind The Fire Place at 202 Mechem, where the Deck House used to be. Once you're there, you'll find an inspired menu of Northern New Mexican food surrounded by antiques from Guadalajara.

The business is the vision of Keith Kaplan, a New Yorker who moved out west in the 1970s, managing Mexican restaurants in Albuquerque and falling in love with the region's specialties. He moved three years ago to Tularosa, where he built the first Casa de Sueños, at Hwy. 54 and St. Francis Drive.

He created a menu with unusual flavors like adovada, a red chile marinade that makes ordinary pork chops a succulent delight. This chile puree also dresses Kaplan's favorite dish on the Casa menu: Carne Adovada Ribs, marinated in the red chile puree and served in half and full rack sizes.

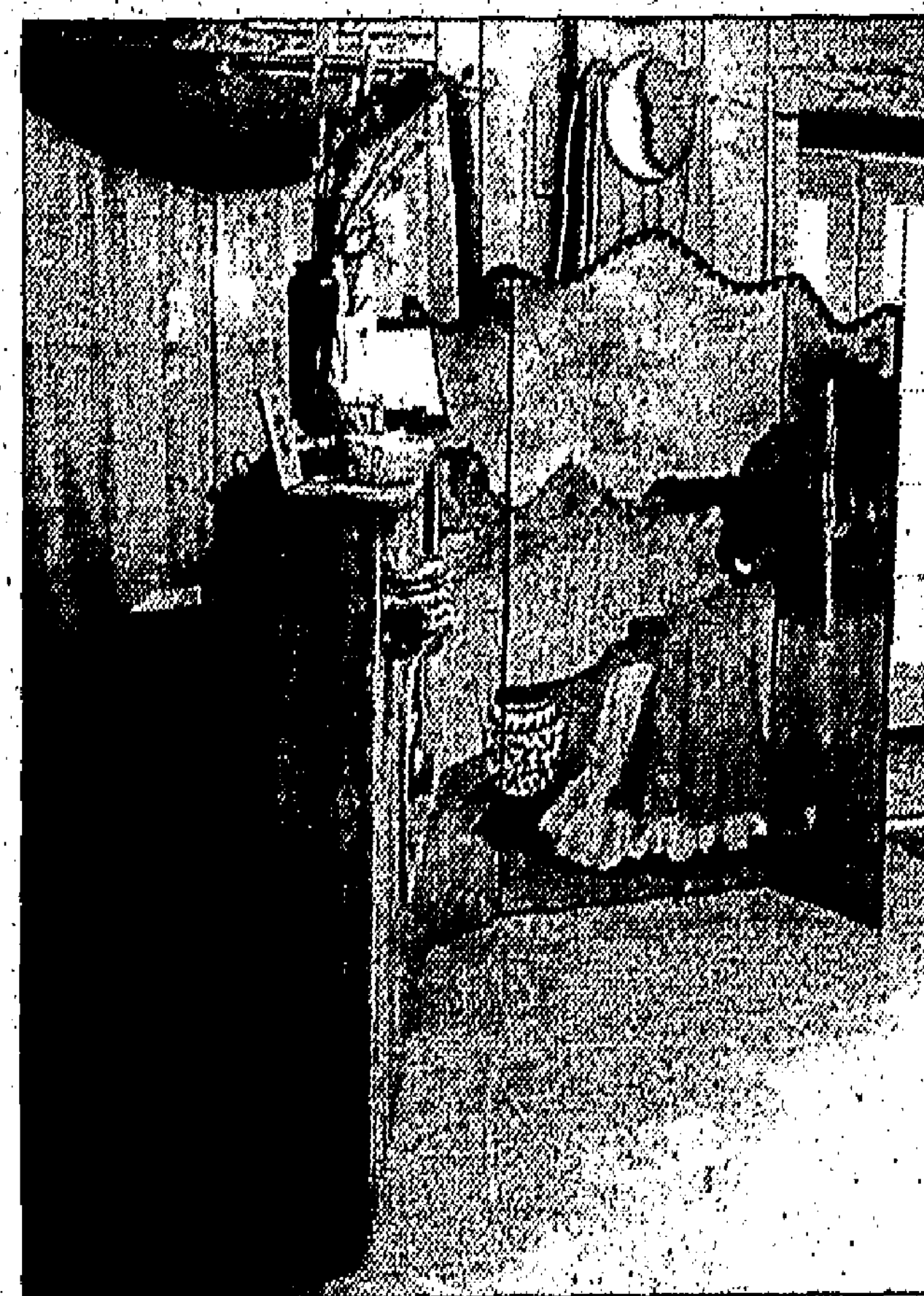
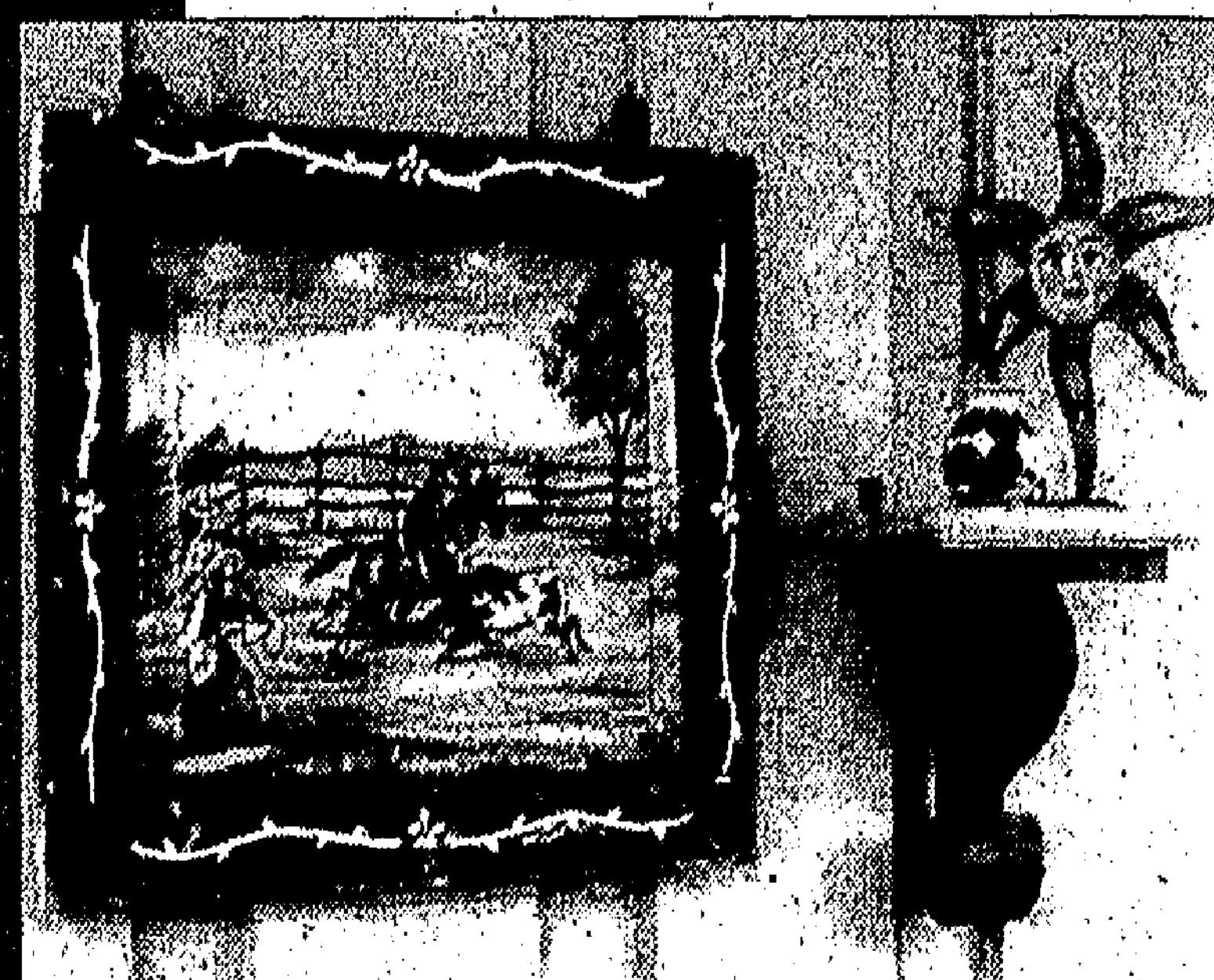
For a lighter adovada experience, try the Chicken Adovada Salad, with fresh romaine, parmesan cheese croutons and Firecracker Caesar dressing.

Kaplan is also proud of Casa de Sueños' take on sizzling fajitas, with a tequila lime marinade and a plate piled high with guacamole, cheese, pico de gallo and fresh tortillas. This, plus many New Mexican staples like albondigas soup, green chile stew, burritos, enchiladas and taco plates. Most everything is stacked – and the tortillas are only rolled on request – and the sopapillas are stuffed, with your choice of meat and chile.

"Our menu also has vegetarian items that are different. We have the chilibilles, which is very good, with layered blue corn and red corn tortillas, mushrooms, roasted tomatoes and jack cheese," Kaplan said.

Other meatless entrees include the calabacitas, a mixture of squash, zucchini, onions, corn and diced green chile, and served enchilada or burrito style, and the rellenitos, stuffed with shrimp, spinach, beans and jack cheese, and topped with avocado cream sauce.

The appetizer menu features nachos, stuffed jalapenos and quesadillas, along with harder to find specialties like chimichangas (grilled mini chimichangas) and avocados "borrachos": Deep fried avocado quarters with a beer batter coating and jalapeno ranch dressing. Another first for this writer: Prickly Pear Salad, a chicken breast served with fresh greens, nopolitos (cactus), jica-

ma, chayote squash and corn, and topped with a prickly pear dressing.

Since June, the Casa de Sueños menu has been available in Ruidoso.

"It's been very successful in Tularosa, so we decided to give it a shot up here. It's going very well – we have a lot of local support already," Kaplan said.

So Kaplan took over The Deck House, what used to be a favorite breakfast hangout for Ruidoso residents. Deck House regulars will recognize the windowed dining room and the relaxed atmosphere, but little else: Kaplan and his crew installed double doors off the parking lot to create a new entrance and improve the room's efficiency.

The interior is a bright turquoise, embellished with charming murals by Sharon Higgins, decorative Mexican mirrors and religious artwork. Kaplan buys the wall décor, along with all the items for sale in the adjoining gift shop, during his twice-yearly treks to Guadalajara.

"I love Guadalajara. I go shopping twice a year to fill both restaurants with original things and have a lot of fun doing it," he

said. "I fill the restaurant with antiques and religious antiques that people enjoy – just a touch of Mexico."

Casa de Sueños has already been discovered for lunch, thanks to its user-friendly buffet

that features a taco bar and the chef's daily specialties, but its dinner menu is starting to pull a crowd, too. On Sundays, the brunch buffet offers huevos Mexicanos and other breakfast favorites along with lunch entrees.

So wake up and smell the adovada. Casa de Sueños is open for business.

Casa de Sueños New Mexican Restaurant and Gift Shop, 202 Mechem, is open from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through



Saturday, and 10:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Sunday. For information, call 257-0196.

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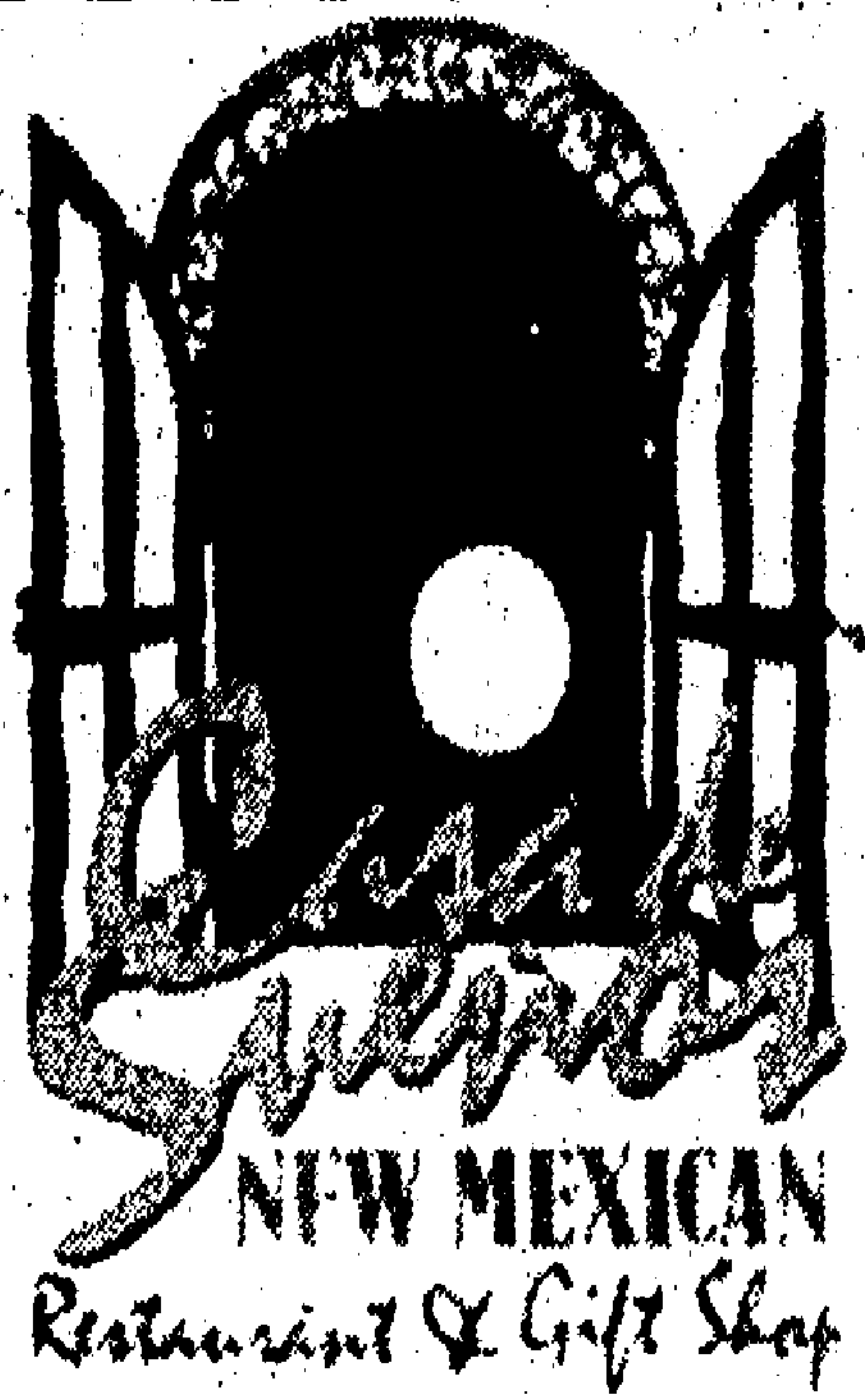

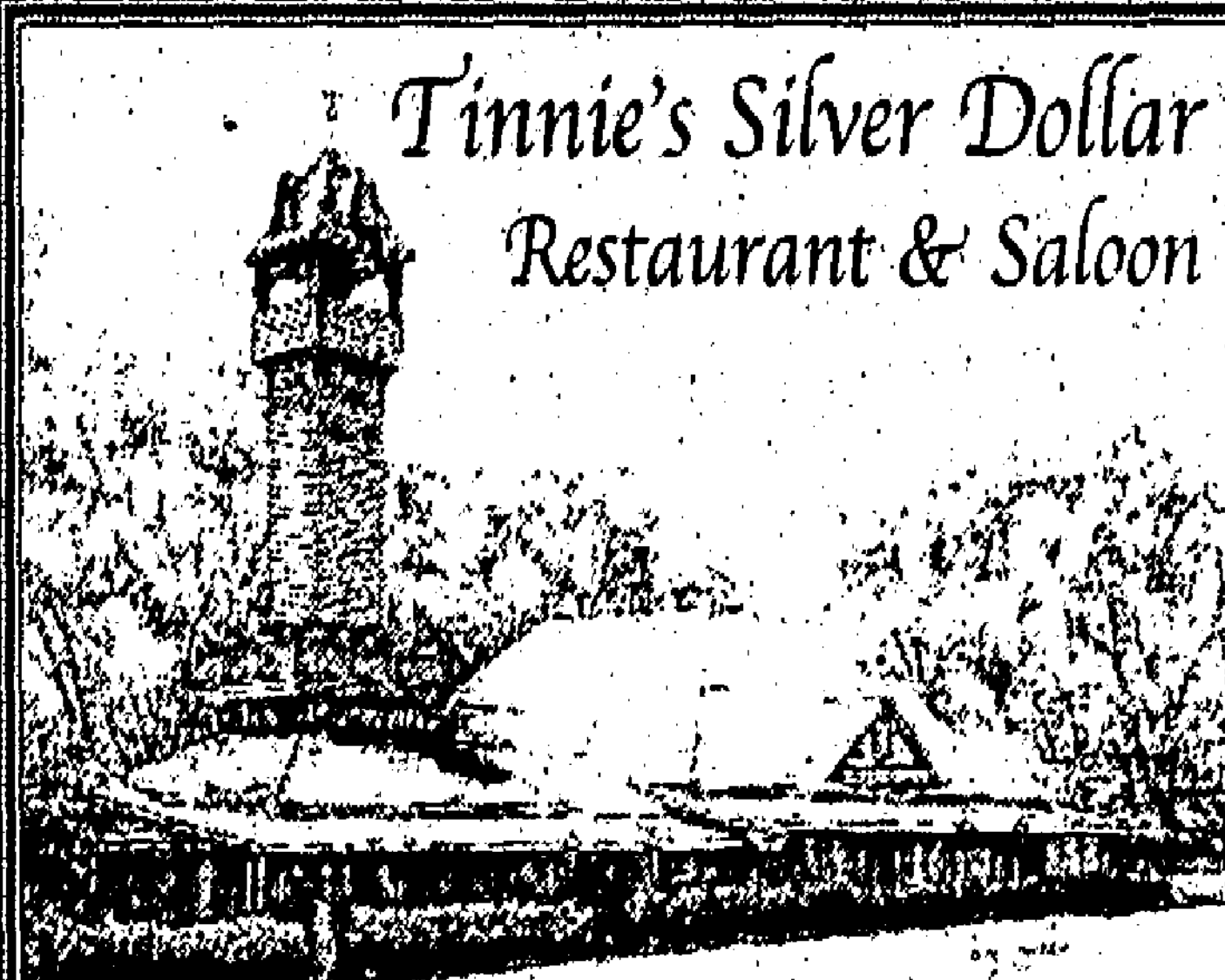

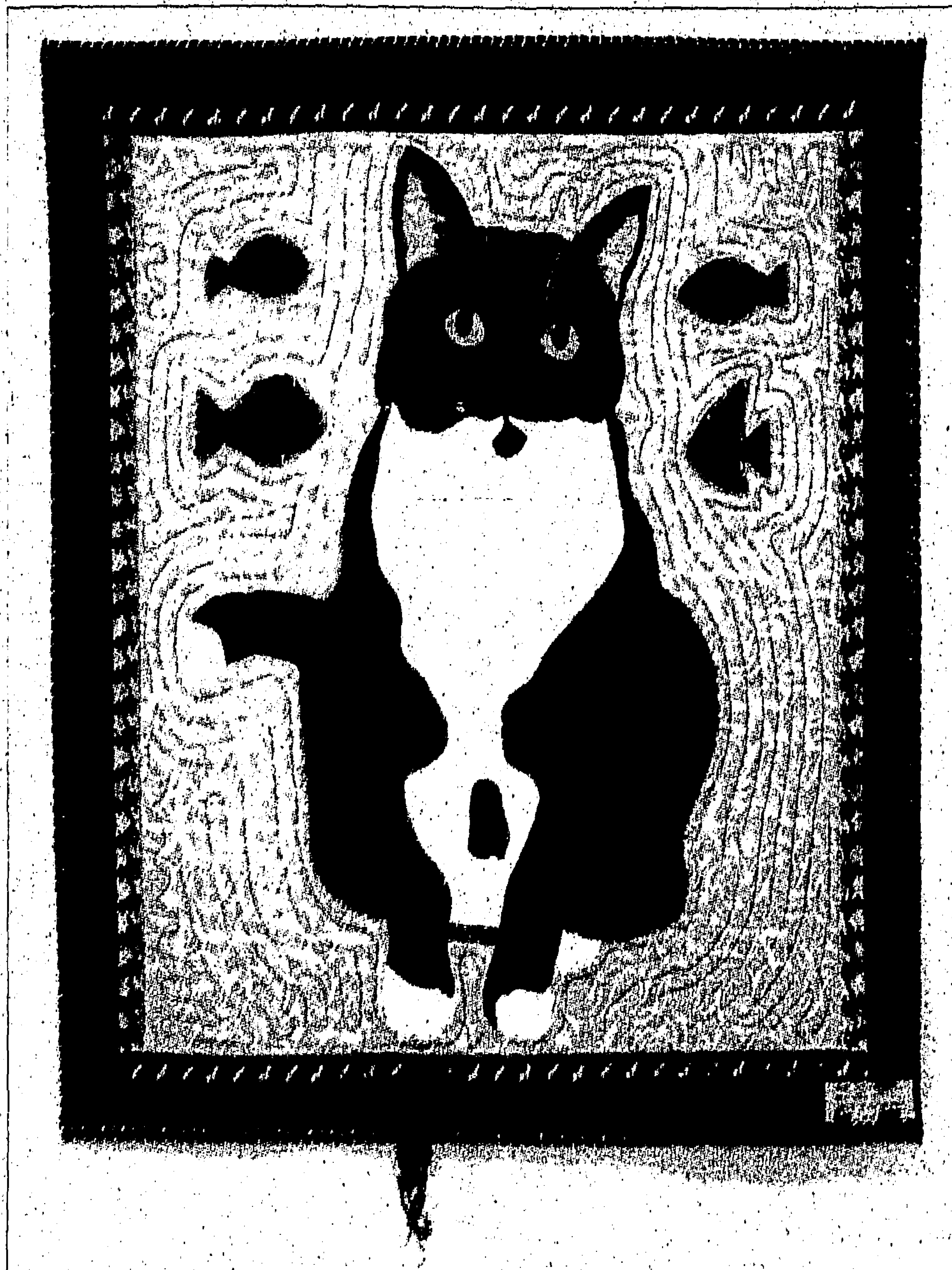
The range of work in the tour is wide, although painters make up almost half of the artists, with woodturners and woodcarvers coming in second. Besides these, there are metal workers, gourd



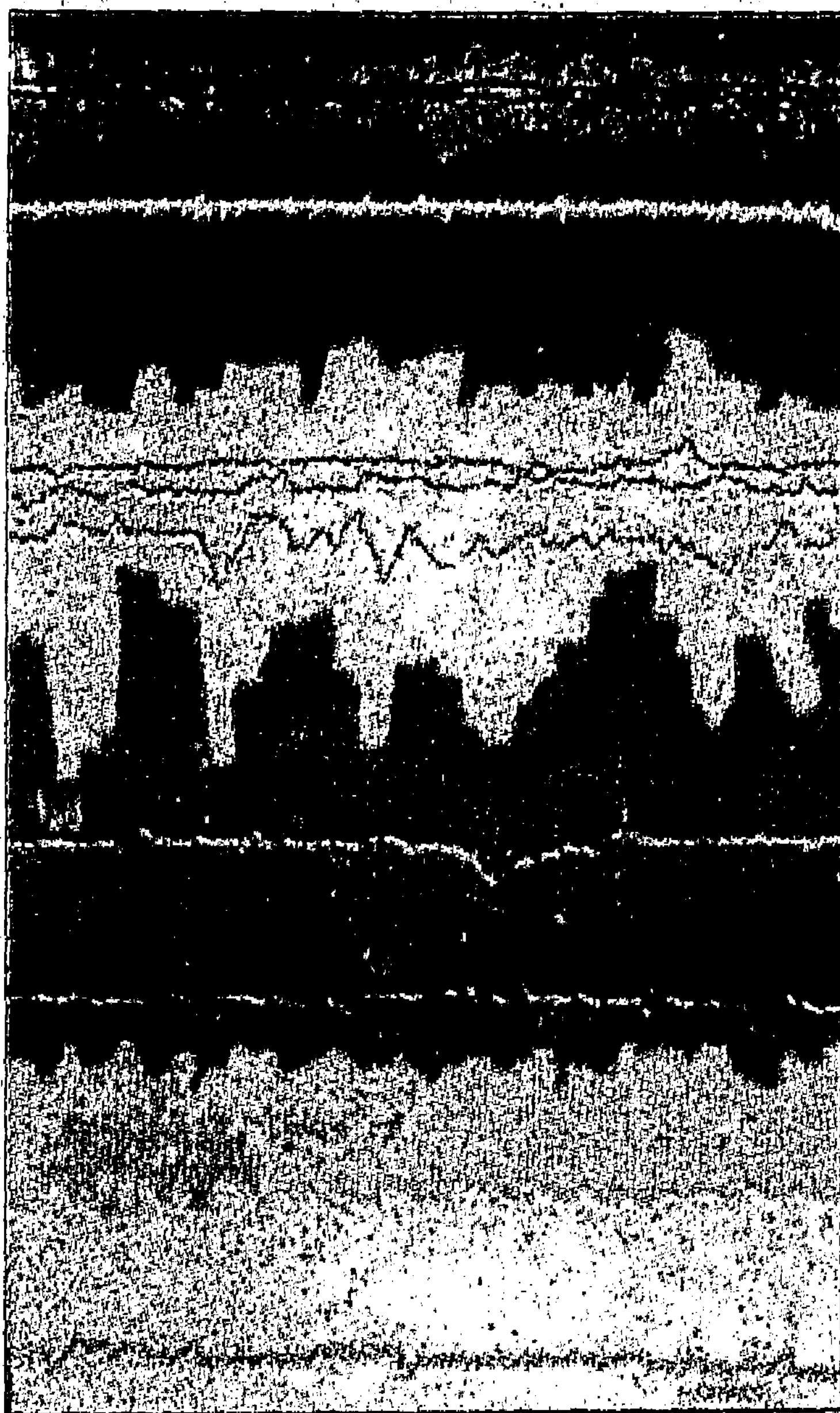

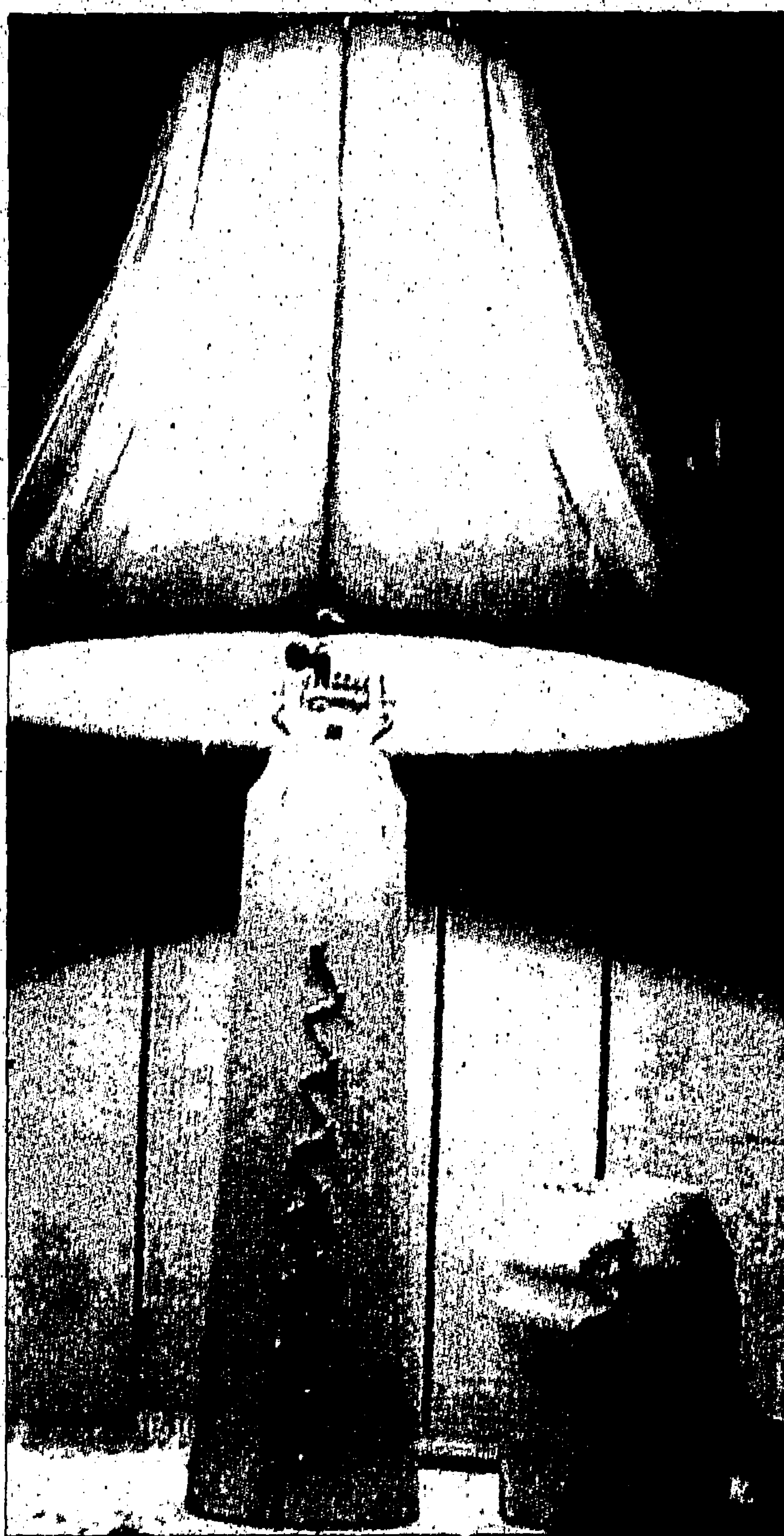
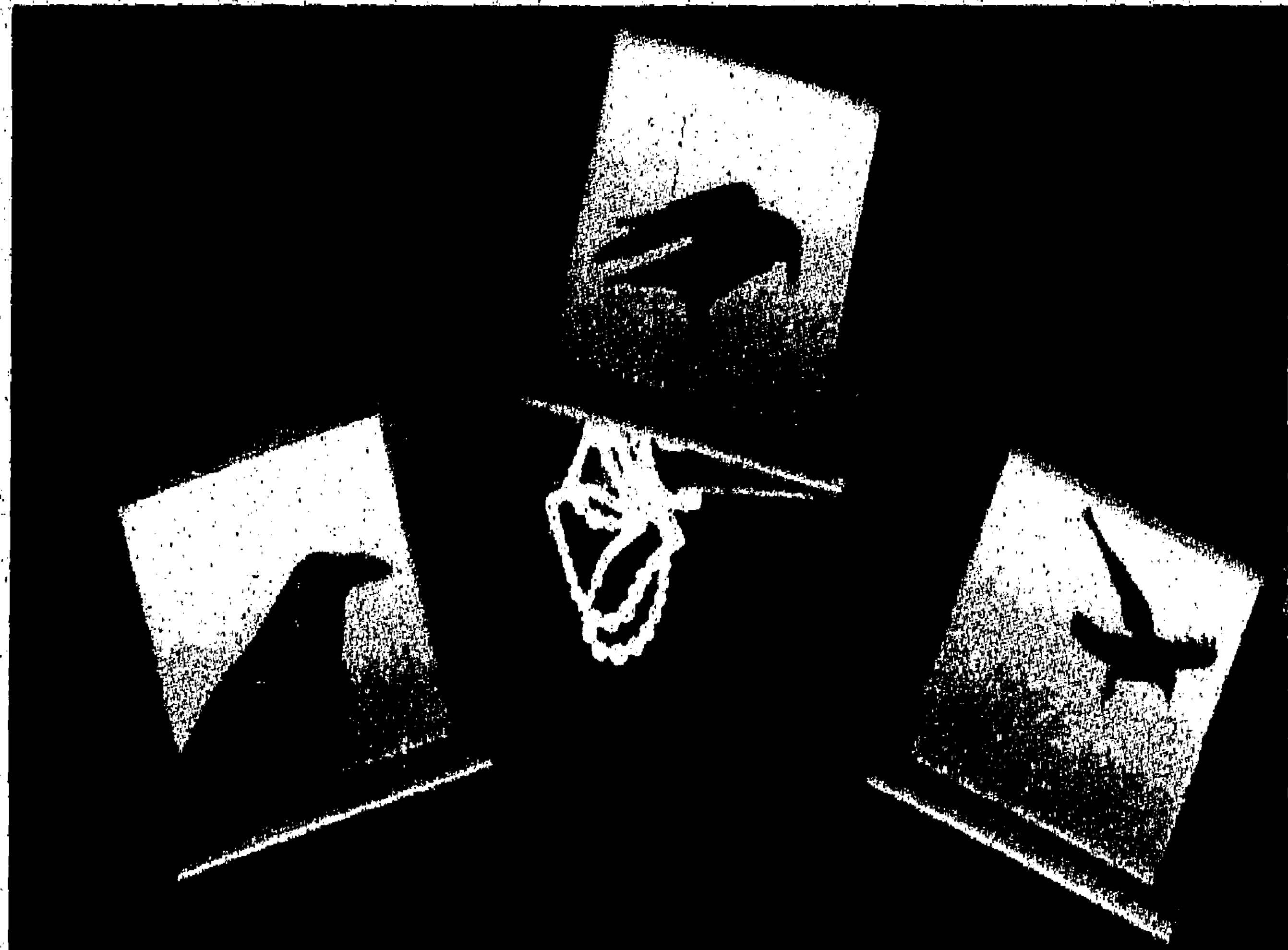
artists, and: a painted tile artist, a quilter, a sculptor, a photographer, a jewelry artist who also makes masks and wood assemblies, and a weaver.

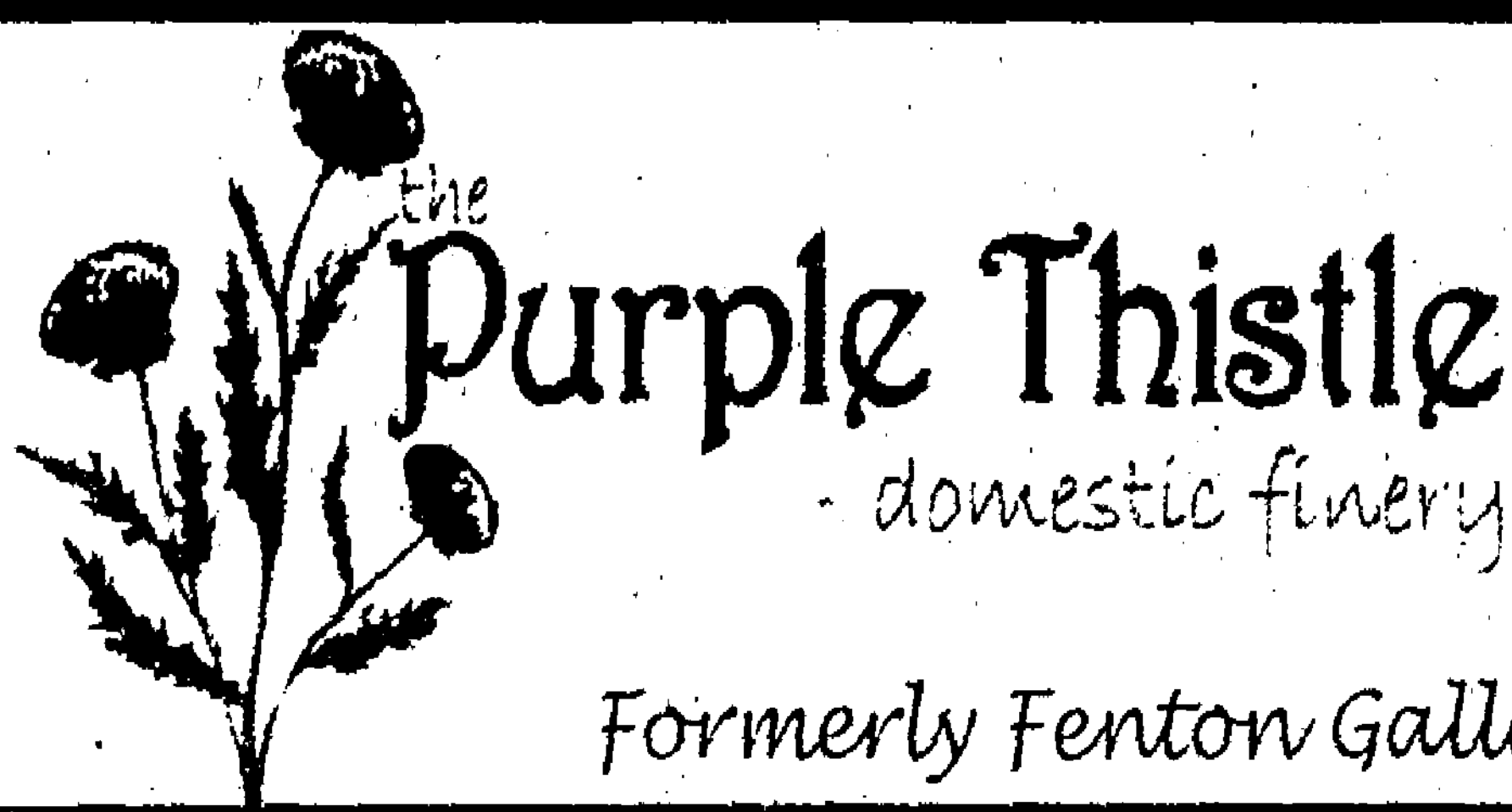
