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

County OKs flood plain plan

3-2 vote draws ire from some audience members

After months of debate, Lincoln County commissioners Tuesday approved an ordinance 3-2 regulating construction in flood plains and opening the way for participation in the National Flood Insurance Program.

The decision didn't sit well with several people who testified that the state requirement for counties to pass Federal Emergency Management Agency flood plain ordinances is unconstitutional and that commissioners who voted for approval were violating their oaths of office.

Tony Seno, a member of the county Libertarian Party, said during a break in the meeting he collected \$60 to file a lawsuit in district court challenging the ordinance.

In offering the motion to approve the ordinance that was revamped five times in the last few months by county attorney Alan Morel — to the point where FEMA officials would not consider any more cuts — Commissioner Earl Hobbs said he was not happy about the action.

But he said, "It has to be done." Voting with him were Commissioners Leo Martinez and Maury St. John. Voting against the motion were Commissioner Rick Simpson and Chairman Rex Wilson.

Oscura resident Jerry Carroll led off by saying "this thing is atrocious."

"You took an oath to uphold the Constitution," he reminded commissioners, asking if they could produce any document showing he signed over his private property rights to them. He contended an unfunded mandate is unconstitutional.

He should be allowed to be "as junky as I want as long as I don't hurt my neighbors," he said. He objected when a timer limiting his minutes at the podium rang. He said most of the time during meetings is consumed by "verbose commissioners who don't know what they're talking about."

Carroll said the issue is being pushed by "county seat wannabes," and others who stand to gain, such as Realtors and insurance companies. They are using the ordinance to "extort" money and to "promote economic slavery," he contended.

Seno said although the government claims it won't cost the county any money, the county attorney's time, the commissioners' time and the multiple hearings cost something. The state hasn't imposed a deadline or a penalty. The commission could draw out the process for perpetuity, he said.

Speaking in favor of the ordinance was Larry Mulligan, who said property rights don't give a person permission to build a drug lab or to pollute the land.

The commission is compelled by state law to pass an ordinance. If the law is to be challenged, let the courts decide, he said.

Wilson asked what he would have to do if he wanted to build an outhouse on his land and had environmental approval.

Morel said he must contact the county to determine

Waters: Spring at record low

■ Drought is causing the low flow, according to the city's administrator.

The flow from Ruidoso Downs' main water supply stands at historically low levels.

That was the sobering report by City Administrator John Waters at Thursday's City Council meeting.

The average flow from Griffith Spring during January 2004 was measured at 241 gallons per

minute, compared to 278 GPM a year ago and more than 400 GPM five years ago.

The 241 GPM is the lowest in history, Waters said. He termed the situation an emergency.

"This is a serious situation," he said. "Things haven't gotten any better. We've now gotten to the point to where we're at the line. Supply and demand are starting to go in the wrong direction."

Drought is to blame, he said. "Unfortunately, we haven't seen the kind of snowfall that we would have liked. The spring is showing a serious depletion problem."

A hydrogeologist will do an analysis of the spring to determine if the low flow is a "blip" or a trend, Waters said.

He added that the reduced flow will force "some serious pumping of the Denton wells. I assume Public Works is planning for that, because with it this low, Denton is going to have to be used quite a bit."

Denton, however, is in need of rehabilitation. "Probably toward the end of the year we're going to be asking to go ahead and do rehabbing on it," Waters said. "We haven't been able to do it yet to this

County projects get more pricey

Lincoln County officials were looking for the tar and feathers Tuesday after learning that a project they already considered overpriced just grew by another \$67,300.

County Commissioner Leo Martinez said, "The county got screwed." Taxpayers are paying \$233 per square foot for a new building to house the state public health office when most commercial construction falls within the \$150 per square foot range, he said.

"People in Ruidoso were critical of the police department when they

bought the (former bank building on Mechem Drive) for \$1 million, but they got 14,000 square feet for their money. We're getting 4,616 square feet."

County manager Tom Stewart said the additional money covers the cost of changes in the parking lot to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act, an increase in the architect's fees, and increases in taxes and construction.

He recommended with this big a price tag that commissioners not spend an anticipated \$20,000 for equipment and furniture.

"I think we're more than justified in telling the state to find its own

furniture," he said.

The building is being constructed on Kansas City Street in Ruidoso next to the public library and the existing county substation. Stewart reminded commissioners that about \$800,000 of the cost was awarded from state and federal sources. The county chipped in about \$228,000.

"It's all tax money," said Commissioner Earl Hobbs, who echoed Martinez's outrage at the cost.

Part of the impact comes from higher labor costs because federal money is involved, Stewart said.

"This bugs the heck out of me,"

24 candidates in county primary

The race for sheriff, the top paying county job at about \$45,000, and for county commissioner from District One drew the most candidates.

Running for sheriff are Republicans R.E. Rick Virden, who is current undersheriff; Roxane Butts, wife of Ruidoso Magistrate Judge William Butts, former sheriff James C. McSwane, Nogal resident Richard Alvarez, deputy sheriff Bobby Angermiller, and Ruidoso Police Chief Lanny Maddox. They will face off June 1.

Judge sentences Stinnett to five months in prison

Alfred Clyde Stinnett Jr. was sentenced Tuesday in U.S. District Court to five months in prison and five months under house arrest for obstruction of justice in the investigation of an assault on a teenage girl in a Ruidoso police holding cell.

Assistant Attorney General for Civil Rights R. Alexander Acosta and U.S. Attorney David C. Iglesias for the District of New Mexico announced the sentencing by U.S. District Judge LeRoy Hansen.

They said that on Oct. 7, 2003,

Stinnett, 40, pleaded guilty to one count of obstruction of justice by witness tampering for convincing a fellow police officer to misrepresent the facts concerning an incident where Stinnett entered the girl's holding cell and "threw her to the ground," causing injuries to her face. The assault occurred on Nov. 7, 2001.

A Stinnett family member said Stinnett traveled to Albuquerque thinking he was going to be assigned another attorney since his had resigned. Instead, he was sentenced.

"The media knew before we did," the relative said.

Stinnett still was on his way home at press time, but May 17 may be the date

when he begins his sentence. Officials did not know what prison would be selected.

Acosta said, "Lying to impede an investigation is reprehensible behavior, especially when committed by someone charged with upholding the law. Today's sentencing sends the message that individuals who tarnish the service of their fellow officers through criminal behavior will be held accountable."

Iglesias said he considers obstruction in relation to any crime a serious matter that will be "vigorously pursued and prosecuted."

The sentence came more than two

years after an encounter between a then 16-year-old runaway, Suzanne DiPaolo, and the former Ruidoso police officer, who resigned from his position.

The village council last year authorized a \$500,000 settlement of a related civil lawsuit against the village and its police department by the girl's family. The incident was captured on videotape.

Since the incident, DiPaolo, now of adult age, ran afoul of the law on two other occasions. According to 12th Judicial District Court records, on Jan. 14, 2003, she pleaded no contest to receiving stolen property, auto burglary, theft of identity and forgery. On

July 18, she was declared in violation of her probation for not staying at a designated residence in Albuquerque, for associating with prohibited persons, for not obeying a curfew, for leaving the county without court permission and for using or being in the presence of someone using alcohol, drugs or a weapon, the records show.

The Stinnett obstruction case was investigated by Special Agent Brian Russ of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and was prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorney Chuck Barth and Attorney Allison Jernow of the Criminal Section of the Department of Justice's Civil Rights Division.

point because I believe we even used it into the fall and winter, so we haven't been able to give it a break to rehab the well.

"But eventually, hopefully when usage drops down toward the end of this year, maybe we can get back in there and rehab that well."

City Attorney Dan Bryant said there is a limit to pumping Denton.

"We can't just pump the hell out of the Denton wells and make up the difference. We can on a short-term basis, but (not) as a long-term water plan."

Waters said the city is "aggressively seeking" water rights as outlined in the city's Infrastructure and Capital Improvement Plan. "We have been fortunate in purchasing water rights," he said.

Bryant said a recent water-rights purchase will add about 5 million gallons of water to the city's supply.

The city is working with the State Engineer's Office to study water availability in the new water-rights field. A hydrogeologist, Waters said, will look for areas that "have water-producing strata."

"With the hydrogeologic study, we will know where to

locate the well to tap into that," Bryant added.

Waters also asked the public to be vigilant about water consumption.

"If you see your neighbor running water down the street or something like that, we need to use this as an educational opportunity and tell them about the water conservation ordinance that we have."

Waters is considering asking the council to implement Phase 3 water conservation. "That is a serious phase," he said.

On another front, the city has received a \$350,000 special

appropriations grant and is in the running for a \$500,000 CBDG grant to apply to a proposed 2.5 to 3 million-gallon water storage reservoir.

"We will be pursuing all sources of funding to try to get the reservoir that the council approved," Waters said. "I believe we've got a good shot at it. We're going to be asking for some additional money to finish the project out."

The storage tank could be completed within two years.

Waters' spring flow report prompted a citizen of the newly annexed Agua Fria subdivision to question whether the city's water report to the state

Municipal Boundaries Commission had been misleading during public hearings over annexation.

"During the Boundary Commission meetings it was my understanding that this board said they had lots of excess water, and that's why you were able to annex all this area," Sue Davis said. "Now you don't have enough water."

Bryant replied that the spring is only one aspect of the city's overall water system strategy.

"We don't have a supply-shortage problem," he said. "What we have is an inability to capture, hold and distribute

the water appropriately. With that water-rights purchase, we will make up for the shortage that is flowing out of the spring currently.

"That's why your Infrastructure and Capital Improvements Plan is set up to stop the leaks, put in the storage, upsue the lines and do all those things to make the system work."

"Everything is set up. Some of it is online now. Some of it will be coming online step by step as we go through each fiscal year. That is the testimony that was before the Municipal Boundaries Commission. We told them the whole story."

if the land is in a flood plain. If it is not, he will receive a certification verifying that information and nothing more is required. If he is in a flood plain, a site inspection may be needed to determine the lowest elevation at which he is allowed to build to ensure that flood water would not be impeded.

"It doesn't take away the right to build," Morel said, but a surveyor probably would have to certify the correct elevation.

"Mr. Chairman," Seno shot back. "You'll have to put that outhouse on stilts."

Wilson pointed out that the ordinance

affects more than structures, it governs mining, dredging, drilling and equipment storage.

Morel said if a person fills in a ditch in a flood plain, that would impact other property's down flow. Wilson said the ordinance would take money out of people's pockets to hire a surveyor to determine what needs to be done. Mulligan said that sounds like Wilson doesn't care how his actions might affect others.

County manager Tom Stewart said the cost to the county might be \$30,000 to hire a code person, but the employee would also be assigned other duties, such as helping with

the historic preservation district and with weed and litter violations.

Speaking as a resident, Doris Cherry questioned why this ordinance is so obnoxious compared to the weed and litter ordinance. She recalled that after the last flood, people clamored for the commission to help and to declare an emergency. But if the ordinance is not adopted, that help might not arrive.

Hobbs said the commission has a duty to comply with the law and to its citizens who have property in flood plains and can't buy insurance or arrange mortgages until the law is passed.

Planned burn set this week

If weather conditions remain favorable, the U.S. Forest Service plans to burn forest debris piles throughout the week north of Cedar Creek and at the top of Musketball Drive.

The project is part of a wildland/urban interface fuels reduction burn of hand-piled slash from previous tree thinning on the land. The area will be monitored after the burn, but smoke may be visible for several days, said a spokesman for the Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest.

Martinez said. "We squeeze every dollar on other items and then just watch (as big chunks of money are absorbed by construction projects and architectural fees)."

Martinez said the project architects probably don't care about increases because their fees are based on the total cost and go up with each addition. On the next project, the commission should hire a local architect, he said.

Hobbs agreed, saying, "This is beginning to get to me."

Commissioner Maury St. John said the situation already "has gotten to" the county manager.

Stewart said he's beginning to worry about the \$901,000 reserve he thought the county would have at the end of the fiscal year. He's watching it be whittled away, he said. The state health office should be completed by July, he said.

The news wasn't much better for two other projects. A 2 percent increase of \$21,489 is need-

ed for the ambulatory surgery wing at the county-owned Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso managed by Presbyterian Healthcare Services. The money will come from a special tax levy designated for the hospital and the county's rural health clinics. The extra dollars are needed to cover an increase in the architect's fee of \$39,491, Stewart summarized.

The total price of the project hit \$1,075,024, with PHS paying for change orders up to \$80,000 and for \$188,812 of work.

Another \$36,298 is needed for increases in architect fees, reimbursable expenses and two change orders on the expansion of the county's Carrizozo Health Clinic, which should be completed this month. The total project price is estimated at \$394,685, and the increase is 10 percent, Stewart said, adding that he told the architect, "This is it."

Stewart explained that the architect's fees for the projects haven't been adjusted since March 2002.

"At that time, there were only very rough budgets upon which to base their fees," he said.

Lining up for the District 3 position on the commission are incumbent Leo Martinez, who owns a restaurant and a stucco business; Nora T. Midkiff, who is involved with water issues; and Tom Battin, who is with State National Bank in Ruidoso. They are all Republicans.

County Assessor Rick Silva is running unopposed for reelection as a Republican.

Three Republicans will face off for county probate judge. They are William R. Hirschfeld, a Realtor and member of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission; Carrie Sue Spencer, who has law enforcement experience and is the wife of outgoing probate judge Stirling Spencer; and Doug Fuqua, an educator.

The winner will face Democrat Charles H. Lane, an Alto resident, in the Nov. 2 general election.

County commissioners are nominated from geographical districts and are elected only by voters within their districts. The sheriff, assessor and probate judge are elected by county-wide vote.

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Tribal school board fires superintendent

The school superintendent of Mescalero Apache School vacated his office and is waiting for a public hearing on his termination by the school board.

Although the Mescalero Apache School Board president would not confirm it, Ray Swinney, who has served as superintendent in Mescalero for more than five years and as principal for almost two years before that, did confirm it on Tuesday.

"It is true that I was terminated, and it is true that I did request a hearing before the board as per Board Policy 4.35 that allows me to have a hearing before the board," he said.

Swinney said he was waiting for verification on the hearing, but he said he had been informed that it may be Thursday. He said he requested an open meeting. Parent-teacher conferences are also from 1:30-7:30 p.m. Thursday.

School Board President Alma Morgan said on Tuesday that she has no comment because there are a "a lot of things still in the air."

Bank account e-mail is a scam

"Beware 'helpful' e-mails from banks or other businesses asking for account verification.

A Ruidoso woman received an e-mail March 9 which said it was from Wells Fargo, threatening to block her bank account if she didn't verify account information.

"I replied saying 'Cease and desist,' and it went through," said Sally Burkstaller. "It probably bounced somewhere."

The Consumer Division of the Attorney General's Office received a flurry of calls and questions related to Wells Fargo on March 10, the day after Burkstaller received her official-sounding e-mail from wells@WellsFargo.com, said Paul Nixon, deputy communications director of the Office of the Attorney General.

"Because of the number of calls all of a sudden, it put up a red flag," Nixon said.

A release went out warning New Mexicans not to follow the instructions

in an e-mail they might receive with the heading "Please verify your Wells Fargo account."

The e-mails begin: "Please read this important message about security. We are working very hard to protect our customers against fraud. Your account has been randomly chosen for verification ... All you need to do is to click on the link below."

The recipient is asked to complete all fields on a verification page.

The e-mail ends with a threat, Burkstaller pointed out: "Please note that if you don't verify your ownership of account in 24 hours we will block it to protect your money."

The release states that scammers can use this information to access the account and its funds. This scheme is called "phishing," Nixon said, and the scammer tries to convince e-mail recipients to give up personal information.

"Sometimes some of these scams just go out as a blanket e-mail, and Wells Fargo is such a large bank, anyone who's not a Wells Fargo customer would delete it, and anyone who is would think, 'This is targeted towards me' and

would think this is legitimate.

"Banks would never contact you via e-mail for this kind of information," he said.

The release advises people to be suspicious of any e-mail asking for personal information, requesting authentication or indicating a problem with one's accounts. Delete the e-mail and do not open attachments in e-mails like this. Instead call the Online Fraud Prevention Hotline at (866) 867-5568 to verify the e-mail's legitimacy. To file a complaint about a suspicious e-mail or for further information, contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division at (800) 678-1508.

Burkstaller said she called the Fraud Department of Wells Fargo and received a reply - by e-mail - thanking her for diligence and saying that customers of other banks are getting similar fraudulent e-mails. The real Wells Fargo e-mail advises people who might have released account information, opened attachments or noticed an unknown file in their computer to call (800) 956-4442, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Roll-over wreck injures 6 on U.S. Highway 380

A roll-over at 3 a.m. Tuesday on U.S. Highway 380 at State Highway 37 resulted in the injury of six people, with two people critically hurt.

A pickup truck with a camper shell driven by 35-year-old woman from Las Vegas, Nev., was westbound on U.S. 380, when the driver overcorrected, lost control of the vehicle and rolled three times, according to New Mexico State Police.

A 15-year-old female in the cab of the pickup suffered head trauma and severe facial and neck lacerations and was airlifted to Thomason General Hospital in El Paso, Texas. A 7-year-old male, riding in the camper shell in the bed of the pickup, suffered head trauma and was airlifted to University of New Mexico Hospital.

Transported to Lincoln County Medical Center for treatment were four others: in the camper shell, a 3-year-old female suffering minor bruises and abrasions and a 17-year-old male with facial injuries. In the cab, a 13-year-old female in the center of the

front seat incurred minor scrapes and bruising, and an 18-year-old male in the rear of the extended cab incurred leg and shoulder injuries and were taken to LCMC for treatment.

It was believed that the driver was the only person in the vehicle who was not injured and that she walked across the highway to a ranch house and called for help, a State Police dispatcher said.

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

The village did ask for an arts-promoting RFP

Ruidoso has a long history as an "artsy" community, dating back to the 1950s and '60s, when notable artists conducted summer workshops.

Fast-forward to the new century, when the village established an arts commission to get serious about developing Ruidoso as a tourist-attracting arts community of the likes of Santa Fe and Taos.

Times (and administrations) change, and not long ago the village council decided the Arts Commission should fly on its own, as a non-profit, self-sustaining entity.

The purse strings were drawn taut. Meanwhile, questions have been raised about the legality of using lodgers' tax revenues for the arts. Those

questions remain unanswered.

Recently the village sent out a request for proposals to - guess what? - provide "fine arts services ... advertising, promotion, marketing."

So, the renamed and reconstituted Ruidoso Regional Council for the Arts responded (the only respondent) and was asked by the council to explain its proposal. That opened, as former New Mexico Gov. Bruce King once said, "a whole box of Pandoras."

The village, it now seems, wants to be dipped in so much paint thinner and be cleansed of the arts. The matter was tabled.

It seems to us that if you don't want an RFP, don't ask for one.

There are prior claims on Bonito water

To the editor:

Re: *Water plans*. In my opinion, the "Planners" need to realize that the rights to the majority of the water impounded in Bonito Lake really belong to water right holders along the Rio Bonito and the Rio Hondo by virtue of the priority dates for water going to Alamogordo is 1916 while the priority dates for many date back to the 1850s, '60s, '70s and '80s.

To the best of my knowledge, Alamogordo has not released a drop of water into the Rio Bonito in the 32 years I have had water rights. In fact, the only time water flows below the dam is when it flows over the spillway or it rains enough.

The only reason the water from the lake was diverted into another watershed was due to the power, influence and money of the railroad in order to furnish water for the steam locomotives.

There are no more steam locomotives running.

I don't know the reasons why the water right holders along both streams haven't risen up and insisted that a proportionate share of water flowing into the lake be released into the Rio Bonito.

Various groups keep casting covetous eyes on Bonito Lake waters, but in the case of Ruidoso, the water would again be diverted into another watershed.

This, I think, will not be tolerated by the senior water right holders along both streams.

Oh yes, there is such a thing as a "Priority Call" upon water. Such a call could very well take place, what with the continued drought and the fact that a proportionate share of the water is not being released.

Now it's 'Low Income'

To the editor:

This information is from the Planning & Zoning meeting held on March 2: The "Affordable Housing" is now known as "Low Income Housing"; 100 percent of the housing has been set aside for low income. This is to secure the amount needed for the loan. Persons wanting to rent this housing can qualify, if the tenants, combined, make less than \$10.22 per hour or earn less than \$25,200 per year. They can come from any town, state or country, and they have to show proof of income when entering upon or applying for a rental agreement.

They do not have to be employed within the Village limits. The Village cannot control how many persons may live in each living area, or how many vehicles are allowed per unit. A family of four renters per unit would increase the population of this area by 720 persons and possibly 360 vehicles.

At this time the majority of the population of the Grindstone area consists of second homes, not primary residences. They pay taxes and utilities based on full-time occupancy, but are using the residences on a part-time basis. This greatly reduces the water usage. We are instructed to conserve water and restrain watering trees or yards, yet the addition of possibly 720 additional persons will increase the water use considerably. I doubt if there are 720 persons living full time or part time in this entire Grindstone area at the present time.

The area of land use has been reduced from 26 acres for 222 units, to 16 acres for 180 units. This will, of course, increase the density on the 16 acres proposed for this type of use. There will be "no impact fee" imposed for the new construction, which is to take place in 2005. The construction will be done in three phases, 60 units per phase. The area zoning was changed to RPUD, in spite of considerable opposition, which will even allow additional neighborhood commercial development. I believe the original zoning was PUD, then R-1.

I agree with Mr. Steve Carri and others that were present for this meeting, that this type of housing should be in the county, not in the village limits. Just look at all the more level land available for this type project - Fawn Ridge, Homestead Acres, Dry Eagle, Agua Fria and Eagle Creek areas - and there are many more.

When asked if the R-1 zoned lots in this area could be purchased for residential, single-family development, the Village advised that they were not in the real estate business... The Village was able to sell many lots in the Grindstone Canyon Resort Subdivision area two and one-half years ago. Many of these lots were located on Oak Grove and Oak Grove Place. I even bought one. The sale was handled by broker

County nixes community center grant

Planning for a multi-generational Lincoln County community center doesn't qualify for a \$25,000 Community Development Block Grant, county commissioners were told Tuesday.

Because the county doesn't have a comprehensive plan or has not updated a comprehensive plan in the last five years, if it applied for a planning grant, the only purpose that would be eligible is for a master plan, said county manager Tom Stewart.

At a meeting last month, backers of a county community center asked commissioners to investigate the possibility of using the CDBG source.

Stewart said he wrote executive director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development Council and the Council of Governments, for advice.

Elias told Stewart that the planning grant can't be used for an individual project until a county comprehensive plan is completed.

Joan Zagone, part of a task force trying to put together a community center plan and financing source, said she was aware of the

"We are looking at other grant possibilities," she said. "We are just as sincere and committed to this need for Lincoln County as we ever have been. This is a process we have to go through to make sure when the facility is finally built, we've covered all bases. Our intention is to leave no one out."

The majority of the county commission previously indicated they did not support putting the issue to a vote of residents to designate a special tax or to issue bonds.



Playing for strength in grade school

Students at White Mountain Elementary and Intermediate schools educate their bodies twice a week with Debbie Thomas, who's been teaching in Ruidoso for 19 years.

When the weather is good, students go to the soccer field and do lead-ups to tennis, softball and baseball, and during the last nine weeks of school will work on practicing for the track meet at the end of the school year.

When the weather's not as pleasant, students jog in the gym or work at stations for the President's Physical Fitness Tests in the gym. The first semester, they received a score in five exercises, and they're working at improving these, Thomas said.

If they get a score in the 50th percentile in all five, it qualifies them for a National Physical Fitness Award.

If they score 85 percent or better, they get a President's Physical Fitness Award — a certificate stamped with the president's name and bumper stickers for their parents.

About 20 of the 400 fifth and sixth graders at White Mountain have qualified so far for the national award, and about five have qualified for the president's award.

The exercises are: flexibility on the stretch board, sit-ups, shuttle run, pull-ups or flexed arm-hand on bars, and the one-mile run.

Thomas said the fitness tests motivate the students.

Physical education "is not a high priority in the state or school," she said. "The focus is on fine arts, reading and math. Nationwide, we're not focusing on fitness. It was a little better 10 to 15 years ago. I don't know of any states that have mandatory daily PE."

Students said they'd like PE every day if they could have it, and they look at many of the activities mainly as fun, especially the climbing rope and climbing wall. More hand-holds were added to the climbing wall and knots removed from the climbing rope as students became more physically fit.

"I try to keep all the kids really active and make it enjoyable for them," Thomas said. "Research shows that it stimulates the brain and helps them with their academics."

Because arm strength is a general weakness of children in third through sixth grades, Thomas encourages pull-ups, the play buoy, the climbing wall and ropes and the Power Climb — wooden pegs on the wall. The Arm Mat has 10 different things kids can do while in a pull-up posi-

tion. "I love PE because it's good for me and it's fun," Melissa Beltran, a sixth grader, said. "I love climbing rope."

Brequel Corman received another "Top Dog" certificate for "Top of the Mountain," which is having gotten to the top of all three ropes.

"It's fun to do and helps you get your strength," Brequel said. "I would do PE every day if I could."

Climbing the ropes is a popular activity, and Thomas gives out about 75 certificates every nine weeks.

Combining physical fitness with charity, the students just finished the American Heart Association's Hoops for Hearts, raising \$8,000 and competing in three-on-three basketball tournament during lunch recesses since February. This is their last week.

Spencer looks to replace husband as probate judge

A third-generation resident of Lincoln County and a certified law enforcement officer, Carrie Spencer is running in the Republican primary for the position of Probate Judge being vacated by her husband.

She grew up in Carrizozo and moved to Texas with her family when she was 17. She graduated from high school with high honors, she said, then attended New Mexico State University, earning an associate degree in criminal justice.

Mexico and Texas, first as a patrol officer and eventually as a detective.

She attended the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy and was the first woman in the history of the academy to earn the title of valedictorian of her graduating class.

Spencer has worked for various law enforcement agencies in New Mexico and Texas, first as a patrol officer and eventually as a detective.

She said her experience in law enforcement has prepared her for this job of probate judge, having spent many hours preparing documents for the judicial process and many additional hours in the courtroom.

"I have a high respect for the judicial system," Spencer said. "There is a right way to do things, which is set forth by the law, and one must respect these guidelines. Procedural integrity and a high standard of ethics are essential when coming before the court."

Spencer raised two sons, who also live in Lincoln County. Her husband,

Stirling Spencer, is not eligible to seek reelection because of the two-term limit for the office.

Having watched him deal with numerous people during his terms, Spencer said she realized the need for compassion and understanding when someone is faced with a probate situation.

"You have to understand that you aren't just talking about property when handling a probate," she said. "You have a person's life's work in your court and are in direct contact with the person's loved ones who are sometimes still

in shock at finding themselves in probate court. A little empathy and compassion makes the whole process a little less traumatic."

"I have devoted the past 20 years of my life to enhancing the quality of life in our community

through personal involvement, education and professional law enforcement techniques," he said.

A graduate of the 176th session of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's National Academy, he is the national president-elect of the FBI Law Enforcement Executive Development Association, being a member since his graduation from the FBI Law Enforcement Executive

Development Southwest Command College in 1996.

Maddox earned a bachelor of science degree in criminal justice at Southwest Louisiana University and continued his education in graduate school in the masters/doctorate program, first at the University of Virginia through the FBI, and currently at the Louisiana University.

He was certified as an adjunct instructor through the New Mexico Public Safety Law Enforcement Academy in 1986.

"Education is an ongoing cri-

teria for a law enforcement executive," he said Monday. He sets an example for his officers in the Ruidoso Police Department by continuing his own education and training, the chief said. If elected, he will strive to elevate the education and training in the sheriff's department, he said.

Maddox is in his third year as chairman of the Rocky Mountain Information Network, serving eight states in the southwest region of the United States, and has been on the executive board since 1994. The agency provides intelligence to law enforcement entities. Maddox also is president of the New Mexico Association of Chiefs of Police for a second term.

In community activities, Maddox has been coordinator of Ruidoso-Lincoln County CrimeStoppers since 1985. He

serves on the Board of Directors for Camp Sierra Blanca juvenile rehabilitation. He plays the Native American flute and sings and plays guitar at festivals and fundraising events. He is involved with the Ruidoso Arts Commission's annual musicals, the Festival of Lights Committee, the Smokey Bear celebration and is a member of Rotary, among his other community activities.

"I enjoy being part of the community through participation in special events and activities," he said. "It provides an opportunity to get to know the great people who make up this community."

During the past 20 years in Ruidoso, Maddox conducted workshops for service organizations, taught classes for Eastern New Mexico University and Ruidoso High School, and drug

education classes at schools throughout the county.

"We came to snow ski on our honeymoon and knew this was where we were meant to be," Maddox said. "We purchased a five-acre lot the second time we came and then I applied for a job with the Ruidoso Police Department. The next thing we knew, we were moving to New Mexico."

At the time, Maddox was in law enforcement in Port Arthur, Texas. He started his career in Louisiana. "In 32 years, I've served with three police departments," he said.

Maddox's wife of 23 years, Tammie, was employed by the village of Ruidoso for 18 years, with 15 years as village clerk before she was elected as Lincoln County Clerk. They are members of St. Eleanor's Catholic Church.

Capitan mayor Steve Sederwall has announced his candidacy for the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners.

"I think we've got some pretty good guys in here," he added, referring to newcomers Ed Davis and Bill Martin.

In his campaign, Sederwall will stress solutions to a growing water problem, improved and safer roads, government accountability, new services to seniors and youth, strong law enforcement and private property rights.

He had mixed praise for the current county Board of Commissioners. "Rex has done a hell of a job 'down there, I think," Sederwall said. "But one thing that bothers me is that Capitan — we don't get the mill levy tax. We're the only community around that doesn't get it."

"I've been going around and around with them on that. They cut us out. They cut this district, Capitan, right in half. I think there was too much power down here in one block."

FFA judging contest a 30-year tradition in 'Zozo

The annual event, probably the biggest one-day affair in Carrizozo, starts early, ends late and goes so smoothly it somehow belies the amount of work it takes to execute it.

The annual Carrizozo FFA Judging (now known as Career Development Event or CDE) has been part of the yearly calendar for close to 30 years. The first one was put together by Danny Ware, the first teacher for a new Ag program in the Carrizozo Schools. Many of the volunteers that helped in the March 6 judging day were part of that program in the 1970s.

The event is the second largest of its kind in the state. It is one of only four contests in the state that FFA members can attend before their state and district contests.

Moriarty held a larger contest the weekend following Carrizozo's. With the timing of more contests not competing with district and state basketball tournaments, their numbers are getting considerably higher. The only larger event is the state contest.

The FFA advisor is responsible for a long list of things that need to be ordered, arranged, organized, contacted and procured. Carrizozo's FFA advisor, Wayne Shockey, started on his lists just after the Christmas holiday for this year's event.

Although the livestock supervisor arranged for the stock to be available, pigs in this area had to be imported for the day. This year's animals were gathered from Los Lunas and T or C. The lambs came from Las Cruces and the ewes were borrowed from local ranchers — Shockey drove to pick them up. All contests must have someone to set the "officials" for the contest. These are usually judging teams from NMSU when they are available.

An appreciation steak-and-trimmings dinner was served to the entire group of volunteer help the night before the event. The FFA advisor oversees the invitations as well as the food buying. The concession stand at the event serves hamburgers, sodas and candy bars to 800 people, and provisions for that must be bought. All the food is purchased locally.

Lincoln County Extension Agent Pete Gnatkowski helped with the event long before his job as extension agent. This year he spent two days getting the wool needed for the wool contest by helping Hope's Mike

Cassabone shear sheep. Cassabone let Gnatkowski pick the 36 fleeces he needed for the contest.

Mike Gaines, agriculture teacher and FFA advisor in Carrizozo for 11 years, either played host or worked all of the 18 contests held since 1981. He is the supervisor for the Ag Mech contest. He helped organize the Ag shop for the contest, brought in extra equipment and cut the metal coupons for the oxyacetylene cutting area.

Gaines also supervised the Meats contest, which has a priority in the local program. Carrizozo is the only public school in New Mexico that has a slaughter-approved meat processing unit where students can take the animals from the kill to the freezer. Last year, the Ag program processed 25 head of antelope in a 48-hour period during the antelope hunt.

Livestock superintendent Bill Hightower has had that job for 19 years. Except for an early contest held at the stockyards, the livestock event has been hosted by the Bar W Ranch headquarters. "I think it's a great opportunity for the kids. I have had Ag teachers tell me this is the best judging contest in the state."

The Pasture and Range, Homesite and Land contests was supervised by Steve Harkey. As have those in the other areas, Harkey has been helping with the contest since the inaugural one.

He had to locate an area within reasonable distance from the school, usually no farther than five miles away, where there is a variety of soil types. This year's contest was on the I Bar X ranch south of Carrizozo.

The NRCS agents offered assistance with the pasture and range contests as well. Willard Hall set the officials, as he has for many years.

Bob and Ginny Curtiss's arena has been home to the Horse contest since the very beginning, after that first start at the stockyards. Ginny has built fires, put up tents and fixed hot chocolate and cookies for hundreds of kids who, more often than not, found the judging day to be a cold miserable one, weather-wise.

Mark Dixon has been the contest supervisor in recent years and

it was his job to locate the horses needed for an assortment of classes.

Tabulation is the bottom line for all events and the job has been supervised by Wally Ferguson since the event began. With as many assistants as he can gather, he patrols the data room, making sure errors are caught and confusion is kept to a minimum.

From there, the contest tallies go across the hall to computer tabulation, headed by Bob Hemphill, for the final statistical accounting. Some contests are tallied with "scan-tron" cards, making the end result faster and with great accuracy. "I love doing this and I love seeing the kids," said Hemphill, who in his first year of retirement made sure that this was one job the Board of Education would let him keep.

Other supervisors this year were Diane Schreengost, Crops; Kayla Martin Burd, Dairy; Dr. Glen Hawk, Entomology; Lisa Dixon, Farm Business Management; Lynn Lovelace, Forestry; New Mexico Department of Game and Fish, Terry Scarafioti, Colin Duff and Ty Jackson, Wildlife.

Registration was supervised by Melody Gaines, transportation by Steve Gore and other schools, day care by Kellie Gallacher and hospitality by Shelly King. The appreciation dinner was facilitated by Matt and Becca Ferguson, and Wes Lindsey served as concession stand supervisor.

With more than 130 volunteers working in all the areas, and 650 students from 32 schools, this year's event was considered a great success. Mother Nature even shined her best on the day, with warm temperatures and only a slight breeze — unlike the traditional snowing, blowing, dusty cold days of most of the 30 years past.

For every supervisor's name mentioned here, there are 10 or more people who assisted that aren't named. It's a community effort that comes together year after year and could not happen if not for the efforts of so many.

Confronting alcoholic requires support

QUESTION: My husband drinks excessively. Aside from getting help for my family, what should I do specifically for him? How on earth am I going to get him to go to Alcoholics Anonymous or some similar treatment program? He is deep in denial and couldn't make a rational decision to save his life. How am I going to get him to cooperate?

DR. DOBSON: You're right about the difficulties you face. Begging won't accomplish anything, and your husband will be dead before he admits he has a problem. Indeed, thousands die each year while denying that they are alcoholics. That's why Al-Anon teaches family members how to confront in love. They learn how to remove the support systems that prop up the disease and permit it to thrive. They are shown how and when to impose ultimatums that force the alcoholic to admit his or her need for help. And sometimes, they recommend separation until the victim is so miserable that his denial will no longer hold up. In essence, Al-Anon teaches its own version of the "love must be tough" philosophy to family members who must implement it.

I asked Bob, a recovered alcoholic, if he was forced to attend Alcoholics Anonymous — the program that put him on the road to recovery. He said: "Let me put it this way. No one goes to AA just because they've nothing better to do that

evening. Everyone there has been forced to attend initially. You just don't say, 'On Monday night we watched a football game and on Tuesday we went to the movies. So what will we do on Wednesday? How about going over to an AA meeting?' It doesn't work that way. Yes, I was forced — forced by my own misery. My wife, Pauline, allowed me to be miserable for my own good. It was loving duress that moved me to attend."

Though it may sound easy to achieve, the loving confrontation that brought Bob to his senses was a delicate maneuver. I must re-emphasize that families should not attempt to implement it on their own initiative. Without the training and assistance of professional support groups, the encounter could degenerate into a hateful, vindictive, name-calling battle that would serve only to solidify the drinker's position.

Al-Anon Family Groups and Alcoholics Anonymous are both listed in local phone books. Also to be found there is a number of the Council on Alcoholism, which can provide further guidance. For teenagers with alcoholic parents, there is Alateen. Teens can go there and share without their parents' permission or knowledge, and it's free.

QUESTION: If a man and woman really love each other, won't that hold

their marriage steady when the storms come?

DR. DOBSON: Not necessarily — and certainly not if you are thinking of love as a romantic feeling. Feeling wonderful about each other does not make two people compatible over the long haul. Many couples assume the excitement of their courtship will continue for the rest of their lives. That never occurs! It is naive to expect two unique individuals to mesh together like a couple of machines and to remain exhilarated throughout life. Even gears have multiple cogs with rough edges to be honed before they will work in concert.

That honing process usually occurs in the first year or two of marriage. The foundation for all that is to follow is laid in those critical months. What often happens at this time is a dramatic struggle for power in the relationship. Who will lead? Who will follow? Who will determine how the money is spent? Who will get his or her way in times of disagreement? Everything is up for grabs in the beginning, and the way these early decisions are made will set the stage for the future.

More than that, in heaven you will realize just how much God loves you, and you will realize just how much Christ suffered for you. The Bible says, "He was despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows, and familiar with suffering" (Isaiah 53:3). If He suffered this much for us, shouldn't we be willing to suffer for Him?
