Village to court ETZ

■ ETZ commissioner says dissolving the transition zone would be "short-sighted"

The development transition zone around Ruidoso may not prevent all mistakes, but it's better than nothing, said Kai Brown, who lives on top of a ridge overlooking Gavilan Canyon.

Although her view below was damaged by construction of metal buildings with metal roofs, "If this happens with the district, I hate to think what would happen if the district were dissolved," she told Ruidoso village councilors Tuesday.

Village officials hope to persuade Lincoln County Commissioners not to dissolve the extraterritorial zone around the village.

Councilors authorized Mayor Leon Eggleston to form a committee to try to "negotiate" with the commission, but urged those who support the zone protection to show up for a public hearing on the issue. Although the hearing is scheduled during a regular county commission meeting Aug. 17, they agreed to ask commissioners to schedule the session in Ruidoso, because that site is closer for those who would be most directly impacted.

County commissioners earlier this month voted to send a letter to the village giving a 60-day notification of their intent to dissolve the one mile radius ET Zone, which includes an additional two miles covering construction work and subdivisions. A public hearing must be conducted to take that action. The village received the


letter this week from county manager Tom Stewart. The move to dissolve the district followed a request from village planning director Charles Rennick for \$21,500 to help with the administration of the zone that the village now handles by itself, but falls within the unincorporated area of the county. Commissioners rejected the request and moved on to discuss terminating the ETZ.

Councilor Ron Hardeman said discussion of the dissolution of the ETZ was not on the county's agenda and may have violated New Mexico's Open Meetings Act.

Frank Higgins, a county appointee to the ETZ Commission who has served for 2-1/2 years, said he understands the reluctance of some county commission members when it comes to zoning.

"But we are trying to protect the environs around

Fit to be tied

Mayor, council retreating from impasse, plan a getaway to discuss differences

After three tie votes broken by the mayor Tuesday, Ruidoso village councilors agreed it's time for a retreat with a facilitator to try to work out issues and emotions dividing the board.

"Personally, I think we need it," Mayor Leon Eggleston said. "Tonight, I felt there were some issues that you (Councilor Deborah Marcum-Byars) and Councilor (Michele) Rebstock were not addressing and I think you should."

"I agree," Byars said. "I tried to, but I didn't do it the right way last time."

"It's obvious that we are falling down on communication. (Village manager Lorri McKnight) and I had a good talk today."

"I thought I expressed where I was coming from better than I (have been)."

She suggested hiring a certified mediator. Eggleston said the last retreat the council conducted was in Cloudcroft a few years ago and seemed successful.

The sessions are open to the press and the public, he said, but they allow councilors to discuss what they may perceive as personal positions rather than professional and to express "feelings," he said.

Clearing those hurdles will allow the board to work on the big issues they face in the village, he said.

They also can discuss any changes in policies that may be needed for the smooth running of meetings or on handling contracts or hiring consultants.

"Personally, I think we need it."

Eggleston said. Councilor Don Williams joked that he would vote for a retreat "on the condition that no weapons are allowed."

Village manager Lorri McKnight was directed to check on the cost of hiring a facilitator, to narrow down possible dates and places to meet.

Councilor L. Ray Muney suggested a meeting room at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Byars said based on her experience, conducting the session somewhere away from the usual environs of the council seems to result in more freedom to throw out ideas for discussion.

Distraught because the ring was given originally to her mother by her father to mark their engagement 35 years ago when he was fighting in Vietnam, Rider two days later reluctantly told mom Jan Wafful what had happened.

County reverts to last year's budget

■ Manager Tom Stewart requested the move in a protest against assessor

Bristling over the power of Lincoln County Assessor Rick Silva to hold up approval of the county's final 2004-2005 budget, county manager Tom Stewart fired off a letter Thursday urging the law be changed.

Also in protest, Stewart recommended and county commissioners agreed last week to revert to the county's 2003-2004 budget authority with some exceptions, including the increase of a special property tax levy to fund capital outlay

at the county-owned hospital. The move will not affect the functioning of departments, he said Wednesday.

Emergency services budgets also will be left intact because they deal with the public health, safety and welfare, he said. He notified officials with the state Department of Finance and Administration, but hasn't received a response.

Silva told commissioners at the meeting last week several times that he was in agreement with the 2004-2005, \$16.5 million budget as changed, but Stewart still recommended staying with the 2003-2004 budget authorization. That \$18.9 million budget included money for several major con-

Litterbugs assaulting Rio Bonito Rd.

■ Cleanup volunteer feels agencies with jurisdiction are lacking effort

The aluminum beer can flew out of the window of a passing car as Sharon Bundick and her husband worked their way down Bonito Lake Road with large black bags full of trash.

Fuming about the litter still strewn along the roadside and the taunting of the people in the car, she and Johnny Bundick sat down for a few minutes to level out their blood pressures.

"I don't understand what people are thinking," Sharon Bundick said Tuesday. "It's ridiculous. We collected 10 bags of trash that day. I had my husband dump the contents of just one bag to show what we find. Roadside and traffic signs are torn up and thrown in the bushes, but the beer cans are the worst."

She can tell by the thousands she picks up along the road each year that Budweiser is the alcohol of choice for most of the litterers, she said. The containers are

bunched near the entrance to the lake road from State Highway 37 as people toss them before they reach the main road, she said.

Out of all the vehicles that drive by while they work, only two drivers have stopped to thank them for the effort, she said.

"We have to walk down embankments because the people who throw the cans try to see how far they can go," Bundick said. "And they like to break the glass bottles on the rocks."

What especially irritates Bundick is that she, at age 63, and her husband at 70, toil several days a month to try to keep the lake road attractive but she doesn't see the two entities that benefit from the operation of campgrounds around Bonito Lake - the city of Alamogordo and the U.S. Forest Service - pitch in to help.

Richard Carlson, recreation land staff with the Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest, said his agency doesn't have any funding for an crew to police that roadway, but two employees charged with cleaning up Forest Service campgrounds and dispersed camp-

ing areas, are instructed to carry sacks and pick up debris when they spot it along the road.

The mix of ownership of the road from federal to municipal to private and back again also presents a problem, he said.

Keith Kessler, manager of the Bonito Lake Recreation Area for the city of Alamogordo, said he really appreciates people like the Bundicks and others in the canyon who pick up litter along the road.

The city concentrates its efforts primarily in the campground and around the lake, even though that part of the road is owned by the Forest Service, he said.

"We spend a tremendous amount of time picking up litter along the road too," he said. "Every now and then we run down below the dam. We don't separate what we will pick up by ownership of the road."

He'd like to see the Forest Service and the city put up signs at the turnoff from SH37 warning people not to litter and listing the fines.

"That's something neither the Forest Service nor the city has done as long as I've been here," he said.

Highway 48 construction update

The welcome rains have slowed down progress slightly, but construction continues.

From Ski Run Road to the top of Angus Hill:

All construction will be on the west side of the roadway. Detours on the east side should keep traffic from the construction and have minor delays or lane closures. These minor lane closures will be in the areas where equipment is entering and exiting the construction zones. Crews will be compacting dirt, lime treating the subgrade and bringing in base course.

Business entrances on the west side have been marked with a blue "access to" sign to identify the driveway, with barrels or orange delineators marking them.

Top of Angus Hill to Bonito Lake Turnoff:

Crews continue preparing the downhill slopes to the west for the retaining wall systems that are required to be placed. There will be some lane closures to allow equipment from entering and exiting the construction zone. The Bonito Creek Bridge has minor work on it but no lane closures are expected.

"We went over the dance area five or six times. I gave up and left about 6:30 p.m."


The next morning, Sturgeon walked into her office area and said, "Tell me once more what that ring looked like." As she began to describe it, Sturgeon

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Community Center Task Force to meet Monday at municipal schools office

The Lincoln County Community Center Task Force will meet at 7 p.m. Monday, Aug. 2, at the Ruidoso Municipal Schools administration office.

The task force has been meeting at sites throughout the county but did not meet in July due to conflicting summer schedules for many task force members.

At that meeting, governing bodies from Capitan, Ruidoso Downs and Ruidoso each appointed representatives to serve on a task force to evaluate the feasibility, financing, location and other issues related to the proposed facility.

For tribe and state, a positive outcome

After years of legal battles, the road is clear

Maybe it's the deteriorating interest rate of recent memory, with passbook savings delivering a sterling .1 percent, but right now 8 percent sounds pretty good.

That's what Casino Apache and related gaming enterprises will pass along to the state, now that a years-long legal hassle between the Mescalero Apache Tribe and the state's attorney general finally has been settled.

The last step, acceptance of the agreement by Interior Secretary Gail Norton, came through last week.

The tribe, it may be recalled, rebelled loudly over the 16 percent demanded in the original gaming compacts. Many of the state's tribes and negotiated and settled at that 8 percent of proceeds from slot

machines, but the Mescalero Apache and Pojoaque Pueblo held fast, fighting the good fight in state and federal courts, year after year.

Wisely, the Mescalero put that encumbered money in escrow (drawing some realistic interest for all those years), so when a breakthrough finally came under the auspices of new tribal President Mark Chino, the tribe was prepared to catch up on back payments and get on with a lucrative enterprise.

So there appears to be a clear road ahead for our neighbors to the south; legal issues eliminated (to the tune of \$27 million going to Santa Fe), a huge new Inn of the Mountain Gods nearing completion...

Looking ahead, it truly does appear to be a win-win situation for the tribe and the state.

Consider the value of an eighth-grade education

Standby, ladies and gentlemen: I'm in a bit of a schoolmasterly mode at the moment, so if you're turned off, just go on to the letters column next door and I'll try something more entertaining next week.

What got me in that mode was the report, leaked ahead of time, that about half of last year's New Mexico high school juniors can't read or do math very well: As the educators might say, they're not proficient in a criteria-referenced test.

That has some people upset, especially the PhD who heads the state's Public Education Department. But the upset appears to be mostly because the state's big daily paper got hold of some results of the first New Mexico High School Standards Assessment while it was embargoed — or, as Education Secretary Veronica Garcia said, while "we're in the process of validating the information," whatever that means.

But it shouldn't be that upsetting, or surprising. After all, the same sort of test given earlier to fourth- and eighth-grade students around the state showed roughly the same result.

Consider the eighth graders: Forty-nine percent of them were less than proficient in language arts. Fifty-four percent of them were inadequate in math.

Well...every class has its top half and bottom half, I guess. But I don't recall any time in recent years when a student was held back a grade because of lack of proficiency; the rule seems to be, move 'em out, let somebody else worry about them.

Not so before the glories of "phonics" destroyed spelling, and before it was determined some-

how that memorizing multiplication tables was bad for a student's health. Memorizing was rendered pointless with the electronic calculator, anyway.

So how did people manage in the days before computers and phonics and such?

They took tests, and passed or failed. If they failed, they were held back.

Consider a few selected questions taken from a six-hour-long written examination required of the Salina, Kan., public schools for students to pass the eighth grade, the examination divided into five parts — grammar, arithmetic, U. S. history, orthography (spelling), geography.

Grammar — Write a composition of about 150 words and show therein that you understand the practical use of the rules of grammar.

Arithmetic — Find the interest of \$512.60 for 8 months and 18 days at 7 percent.

U. S. history — Who were the following: Morse, Whitney, Fulton, Bell, Lincoln, Penn and Howe?

Orthography — Use the following correctly in sentences: cite, site, sight, fane, fain, feign, vane, vain, vein, raze, raise, rays.


Geography — Describe the process by which the water of the ocean returns to the sources of rivers.

Those are just five of the 48 questions asked in that exam. Each of the five sections of the exam took from 45 to 85 minutes.

If you passed it, you could state proudly that you had an eighth-grade education and could go on to high school.

And that was the way of education in the Salina, Kan., public schools in 1895, according to archives in the Salina Library, as published in the *Salina Journal*, and hence to the internet, almost a century after the fact.

No wonder our great-grandparents took pride in an eighth-grade education.

The mixed blessings of huge billboard 'Spectaculars'

The county commissioners were asked to put a freeze on billboard erection in Lincoln County at their June meeting, but instead a packed chamber was sent away with advice on how to "get along with your neighbor."

I understand that the issue (was revisited) on July 20, but in the meantime the outdoor company is putting up 14x48-foot boards (called "Spectaculars" in the industry) at record speed with a threat to sue if anyone orders them taken down after the fact.

struction projects that either are completed or close to a finish date.

The county's general fund last fiscal year was \$4.3 million, compared to the proposed \$4.4 million this fiscal year that started July 1.

Writing Sam Montoya, executive director of New Mexico Association of Counties, Stewart stated that there apparently are three elected officials in the country with veto power over legislative budgets. They are the President, governors and county assessors in New Mexico.

The county's preliminary budget was rejected when officials with the DFA honored Silva's contention that his funding was inadequate, although no specifics were cited, Stewart wrote.

"An appeal was made to the DFA when the inconsequential shortfalls were identified and fixes were proposed by the county," he wrote. "DFA did not act on the appeal."

Although in this case, the assessor's final requests were reasonable, county commissioners were "concerned with the precedent established by yielding to any single elected official's complaints and more importantly, the process of registering dissatisfaction without considering the impact on others."

He asked that the association consider a legislative initiative to restrict the ability of the assessor to protest under state law.

"County government should be based on teamwork among elected and appointed officials, not disgruntled officials appealing to state bureaucrats who fail to examine the facts in their decisions," he wrote.

Commissioners, he said, "decided that no single elected official at the local government level should have the ability to so easily veto and hold hostage a legislative budget."

Silva insisted Monday that it's not just his opinion his office is underfunded. An inspection performed in March by appraisal specialist Joe Behnke with the state Appraisal

Bureau came up with the same conclusion, contained in a July 20 letter from Tim Eichenberg, director of the state Property Tax Division.

Behnke stated in his report that the assessor's office is inadequately funded for reappraisal and is understaffed in the appraisal division. It also lacks a Computer Assisted Mass Appraisal system, something requested in this year's budget by Silva. Behnke praised the staff's competency and performance.

During the commission meeting last week after a presentation on the new \$173,777 computer program system to be

used by appraisers, Commissioner Maury St. John said if the system saves as much time as touted, Silva doesn't need more staff.

Silva agreed, saying he would drop a request for one employee if the new system was approved for purchase. But commissioners said the purchase will have to wait until the mid-year budget review. Silva asked but didn't receive any assurance that it will be approved then. He said his office would have to prepare for the conversion.

Silva said after meeting with Stewart and St. John, he has no more disagreement with the budget. When visiting state officials saw the commission's resistance at a meeting in June, they called DFA that day to ask for the budget to be put on hold, he said.

Commissioner Leo Martinez pointed out that any elected official who thought his or her department was underfunded also could hold up the budget by filing an action in district court.

Commission Chairman Rex Wilson said Silva's office received a \$95,000 increase over last year and went up at a healthy rate in prior years.

Martinez suggested that State Rep. Dub Williams, a Republican from Glencoe, be asked to carry a bill to the legislature in January proposing changing the law and returning control to the counties, as he did with the hospital management contract issue.

Silva predicted that assessors all over the state would unite to fight any change.

Higher inflation risks?

Over the past year or so, the rising costs of energy and lodging away from home accounted for a major portion of inflation. Gasoline prices jumped at a 75 percent annual rate during the first half of this year. Lodging costs, which were depressed through 9/11 and the recession, rebounded as demand improved.

Fortunately, productivity gains have kept unit labor costs down. Reflecting a slack labor market and rising healthcare costs, wages and salaries have risen slowly. Unlike in the 1980s, the rising cost of energy has not kicked-started the wage-price spiral, limiting the effects of higher energy costs.

In coming months, price increases should moderate as oil prices are expected to fall. Excluding speculative forces related to geopolitics, the price of oil should be below \$30 a barrel, instead of \$40 a barrel. After a significant jump, the cost of lodging has begun to decelerate. However, the risks of higher inflation remain. The fundamental drivers of inflation, slower productivity gains and rising labor compensation, will start adding to inflation. After surging 5.4 percent in 2003, productivity gains will be cut in half in 2004 and 2005.

Bonds: Trending up

The recent soft patch in economic activities depressed Treasury yields. With tentative signs of the economy coming out of the doldrums, bond yields should be trending up again. The recent dip in mortgage rates has stoked activities in home purchasing and refinancing.

After weak sales in June, Detroit has increased incentives, reinvigorating vehicle sales; production schedules have been raised accordingly. Shipping prices (the Baltic Index) and scrap steel prices have jumped. Other economic indicators in coming weeks should confirm that the econ-

omy is on a firmer footing, pointing to higher bond yields.

Assuming the rise in the price of oil is transitory, the headline inflation rate should decelerate. However, the core rate, which Chairman Alan Greenspan prefers, will trend up based on productivity and compensation trends mentioned earlier.

Stocks: Earnings up

Equities face a number of headwinds. Interest rates could rise more rapidly than anticipated. Political turmoil in the Middle East and terrorism concerns approaching the election keep oil prices high. The economy ran into a soft patch that could turn into a prolonged weakness. In the short run, the key to equity strength is a lower price of oil and a reduction in the fear of terrorism.

However, economic fundamentals still support higher equity prices. Economic growth should boost earnings. Businesses have excellent cost controls. The dollar depreciation helps foreign earnings. High oil prices bolster earnings in the energy sector. Low interest rates and higher stock prices are good for the financial sector.

Despite some disappointments, earnings for the second quarter have seen more positives (71 percent) than negatives (6 percent). Winners include energy (46 percent), materials (42 percent), information technology (38 percent), consumer discretionary (25 percent), financials (20 percent), healthcare (20 percent), consumer sales (15 percent), etc. Laggards include telecom and utilities, both recording no increases.

PNM acquiring TNMP

■ State's largest power supplier sees little impact on local workforce

The acquisition of one of the major power suppliers in the Ruidoso area by the parent company of the Public Service Company of New Mexico was announced this week.

But customers of Texas-New Mexico Power shouldn't even notice the change, officials said, adding that they should benefit as the best practices of both organizations are shared.

In any such transaction, some staff redundancy may be detected, said PNM Resources spokesmen, but they indicated that no significant workforce reduction is expected. Shareholder approval is not

required and completion of approvals is anticipated in nine months to one year.

"PNM Resources supports the local communities it serves," according to a statement from the company. "The company has a commitment to local management, home town service and local investment."

PNM Resources is an energy holding company based in Albuquerque. PNM, the principal subsidiary of the company, serves 459,000 natural gas customers and 405,000 electric customers in New Mexico.

TNMP was created in 1935 and provides electric service to more than 252,000 customers in Texas and New Mexico, including the communities of Alamogordo, Ruidoso and Silver City.

PNM Resources will acquire all the outstanding common shares of TNP Enterprises, a privately owned holding company for Texas-New Mexico Power

Company and First Choice Power, for about \$189 million in equal amounts of PNM Resources common stock and cash. PNM Resources also will assume about \$835 million of the company's net debt and senior redeemable cumulative preferred stock.

PNM Resource officials expect the transaction to generate at least a 10 percent annual accretion to the company's earnings per share in the first full year after closing and 20 percent to free cash flow.

The transaction is subject to approvals by the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission, the Public Utility Commission of Texas, the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission and antitrust review under the Hart-Scott-Rodino Act.

Existing-home sales continue to set records

WASHINGTON — Sales of existing single-family homes set another record in June, with an improving economy and favorable affordability conditions helping to satisfy a strong market demand, according to the National Association of Realtors.

Existing-home sales rose 2.1 percent in June to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 6.95 million units from an upwardly revised level of 6.81 million units in May, which was the previous record. Last month's sales

remained very healthy and are likely to stay quite strong, even with some easing expected in the second half of the year.

According to Freddie Mac, the national average commitment rate for a 30-year, conventional, fixed-rate mortgage was 6.29 percent in June, up from 6.27 percent in May. It was 5.23 percent in June 2003, which was the lowest since Freddie Mac started tracking mortgage interest rates in 1971. Housing inventory levels

at the end of June slipped 0.8 percent from May to a total of 2.40 million existing homes available for sale, which represents a 4.1-month supply at the current sales pace.

Regionally, the existing-home sales pace in the West increased 3.1 percent from May to a record annual rate of 1.99 million units in June, and was up 22.8 percent from June 2003.

The median existing-home price in the West was \$267,600, up 10.6 percent from the same month a year earlier.

Elsewhere in New Mexico, AHP grants were approved for projects in Albuquerque, Belen, Los Lunas, Bernalillo, Las Cruces, Truth or Consequences, Lordsburg, Deming, Jemez Pueblo, and four projects in Santa Fe.

Established in 1932, the Federal Home Loan Bank of Dallas is a wholesale bank made up of commercial banks, savings institutions, credit unions and insurance companies in New Mexico, Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, and Mississippi.

Since 1990, the bank has contributed more than \$18.2 million in grants to New Mexico for 107 projects supporting the development or rehabilitation of more than 3,050 housing units.

Roswell Habitat Project wins HUD help

WASHINGTON — U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici has reported that nearly \$1.75 million will be used to support affordable housing projects in 11 New Mexico communities, including resources to support the Roswell Habitat Project.

Domenici, who serves on the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee that funds the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), said the grant funding is being provided through the Federal Home Loan Bank in Dallas as leverage to support local affordable housing initiatives. In all, the funding will be used to support 367 housing units in New Mexico.

The Affordable Housing Program (AHP) grants are used by local organizations to purchase, construct, or rehabili-

tate single-family, transitional and multifamily projects for very low- to moderate-income families. The grants will be issued through financial institutions in New Mexico that are members of the Federal Home Loan Bank.

"These grants represent the recycling of profits as investments in communities. In New Mexico, they will be put to use to give low-income families a chance to have a home," Domenici said. "I'm pleased with these awards and commend the Federal Home Loan Bank for continuing to direct these resources to our state."

In Roswell, a \$10,000 AHP grant will be issued through Pioneer Bank of Roswell to support a \$107,000 Roswell Habitat Project to provide two housing

Fructose corn syrup doesn't cause obesity

If you check the label on a bottle or can of soda pop, the second ingredient listed after carbonated water is high fructose corn syrup (HFCS). It accounts for more than 40 percent of caloric sweeteners added to food and beverages and is the only caloric sweetener now used in soft drinks.

With such a conspicuous role in the American diet, it was only a matter of time before obesity sleuths made high fructose corn syrup a prime suspect in the crime of what's making Americans overweight.

At the very least there was circumstantial evidence. Dr. George Bray, an authority on obesity and related medical conditions from the LSU Medical Center, summed it up in a paper published in the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition.

"The increased use of HFCS

in the United States mirrors the rapid increase in obesity."

What Bray and his colleagues noted was that consumption of high fructose corn syrup increased more than 1,000 percent between 1970 and 1990 as it began to replace sucrose (sugar) in many foods and beverages. They also said that studies on rats indicated that sweetened beverages appeared to enhance caloric consumption, and that beverages containing HFCS are sweeter.

Thus, the motive for the crime was established. Beverages sweetened with high fructose corn syrup were increasing our cravings for soft drinks and adding to the calories we consume. Bray didn't offer conclusive proof but called a "distinct likelihood" that increased consumption of HFCS sweetened beverages may be linked to the increase in obesity.

It didn't take long for Bray's

commentary to be vigorously challenged, however. The Center for Food and Nutrition Policy at Virginia Tech recently issued a rebuttal. Its distinguished panel concluded, "There is no credible scientific evidence to justify singling out high fructose corn syrup as a unique contributor to obesity."

Not only that, the panel suggested that "experts" who single out HFCS are undermining public policy because they essentially lead us down the wrong path to solving the obesity problem.

In a thorough examination of scientific literature, the panel concluded that HFCS and sucrose are virtually the same in composition and metabolism. "At this time, there is no scientific evidence to suggest that the body utilizes either HFCS-42 or HFCS-55 any differently than sucrose, invert sugar or honey."

The panel's report disputes

the oft-stated notion that HFCS is sweeter than sugar. This punches a huge hole in his argument that the increased sweetness level is somehow triggering an over-consumption of beverages and calories.

According to the Virginia Tech panel, the name high fructose corn syrup leads to some misunderstanding. High fructose implies it is sweeter, but its fructose level is actually about the same as other caloric sweeteners.

For farmers, the exoneration of this sweetener is a good thing. Around five percent of the total U.S. corn crop is used to make HFCS through a wet milling process. The alternative for consumers is generally seen to be more consumption of artificial sweeteners.

Village Council seeks to renegotiate terms of golf lease

Links course contract discussed by council

At the same time Ruidoso village councilors are asking for an outside opinion on the legality of a golf course land lease, they want the village attorney to try to negotiate a change in some of the terms.

Allhub Investments Inc., headed by Ruidoso Downs Race Track owner R.D. Hubbard, notified the village the company was exercising its right to automatically renew the contract approved in October 1989, to lease the land for The Links Public Golf Course next to the Hawthorn Suites and the Ruidoso Convention Center.

Agenda item

Councilor Deborah Marcum-Byars asked that the lease be included on the agenda Tuesday and for a legal opinion about the automatic renewal clause, which grants sole authority to Allhub to renew the contract as it stands.

Village attorney H John

Underwood said the first term of the lease was for 15 years with a \$1.5 million revenue threshold before the company had to pay the village any money — a level never reached. Those terms were included to allow the developer time to recoup his multi-million investment.

The first option for renewal is for another 15 years, followed by a third 15 years and a fourth term of 20 years, he explained. With the second 15-year term, the village will be paid 10 percent of revenue from the golf course and 6 percent from the pro shop and food sales.

Underwood said he's received several calls since a newspaper article on the lease pointed out that 25 percent green fee discounts were to be given to residents when they play the course. A former village manager required that residents present their driver's licenses and voters registrations to prove they live in Ruidoso, he said.

"I don't think the discounts were well publicized and I think they should be," Councilor Ron Hardeman said. Byars said long-term lease of

Councilor Michele Rebstock questioned how a lease could be approved for 15 years and tie the hands of future councils. Underwood responded that similar long-term leases were used for the chamber of commerce building and the land for the Hawthorn Inn Suites.

"That's a 99-year lease," he said. "We own it and lease it."

Deals involving real property are the exception to the general rule of not being able to enter into long-term agreements, he said, adding, "Otherwise, no one would enter a deal because the next council would not be bound by it and it could be terminated when a new council was elected."

Lease 'enforceable'

Although Underwood said in his opinion and that or two

public real property should result in some service to citizens, such as a hospital, or should generate revenue. other previous village attorneys, the lease and unilateral renewal is enforceable, he agreed to contact the legal council of the New Mexico Municipal League for another opinion. To obtain an opinion from the state attorney general, a state representative must submit a request and the process takes a long time, he said.

Shortly after they approved the lease in 1989, that council was voted out, he said. Former councilor Al Junge, who voted against the lease then, has raised several issues, including the need for more review of the percentages paid to keep pace with inflation and the receipt of payments on a more frequent basis.

Councilor Ron Hardeman agreed, saying he'd rather see quarterly payments than annual.

Underwood said Allhub officials are not bound to renegotiate any of the terms, but a letter from Hubbard indicated that they would like to sit down and discuss some issues, including water conservation.

Village water consultant Frank Potter, a former village

manager, said under the lease, the village was to provide 200 acre feet of effluent credit in water rights to the golf course each year, unless needed for the health, safety and welfare of residents.

The village failed to meet that delivery during the first five-year reporting period to the State Engineer and Allhub transferred 472 acre feet of water rights from the race track to golf course to cover the deficit. More than 125 acre feet are left as a carryover into the second five-year reporting period, he said.

"You almost have to wait until the end of the five years to see where we are," he said. "But we are looking at it. I don't think the village worked as closely with The Links as it should have, but we are now."

"Unfortunately, the third five years fell in a period of severe drought and we couldn't deliver the effluent credit as we hoped." A subsequent attempt of the golf course company to

transfer more rights was protested and remains unresolved, he said.

An acre foot equates to about 325,800 gallons of water.

Responding to questions from Byars and Rebstock, Mayor Leon Eggleston said the village will receive a percentage of any revenue collected, even if it is a "golf package" split with the Hawthorn.

Realtor Joe Zagone said the lease in this second term should generate about \$300,000 for the village and he urged councilors to put the money into a fund to expand recreational opportunities in the village as a draw for tourists and new residents; as well as for current residents.

Underwood thanked Byars for her suggestion that councilors jot down their ideas and questions about the lease and give them to him before he meets with Allhub officials. Councilor Don Williams said he's been inundated with questions about the lease that he can't answer.

Trigger happy: Council discussing automatic changes for water conservation phases

No answer was reached Tuesday on whether specific triggers should be defined to throw Ruidoso into an emergency water conservation phase or to leave the move up to village council discretion.

Councilor Deborah Marcum-Byars asked for a discussion of what conditions should trigger moving into the fifth and most severe emergency stage of water conservation.

Mayor Leon Eggleston said a declaration of an emergency by the council is required, but he wasn't sure what conditions must be met.

Phase V questions

Councilor Ron Hardeman said he understood the fifth stage was reserved for some occurrence that hadn't been anticipated.

Village manager Lorri McKnight finished his sentence, giving the example of an equipment failure.

"I don't know if we want to define it, because we don't know what's coming," Hardeman said.

"If we hit all four triggers (for Phase IV) for an extended period, I would bring it up," Byars said.

Eggleston agreed, saying village staff can track conditions and ask for an emergency meeting if jumping into the next and final stage is needed.

Production up

McKnight said the village

was at 103 percent of last year's water production on July 13 and dropped to 101 percent Tuesday,

which is good because last year was significantly lower than previous years. The figures indicate that conservation restrictions are working.

The village remains in Phase IV of the five-stage conservation restrictions, but now meets three of the four triggers for the fifth stage as the water supply dwindles.

McKnight said little has changed from the council meeting earlier this month. Alto Lake has no usable amount of water.

Grindstone lake Reservoir dropped one foot to 17 feet below the spillway. Wells at North Fork and Eagle Creek are producing about 785 gallons per minute and the 5 million gallon storage tanks sit at 47.4 feet.

Water sale effect

"We weren't pumping into those tanks until we sent (1 million gallons of) water to Ruidoso Downs," Nunley observed about the council's decision to help out its neighboring city that is experiencing a water crisis.

Byars said the only thing between meeting all triggers is the storage in the village's 5 million gallon tanks.

"You're not suggesting we go to Phase V?" Nunley asked McKnight, who responded that she was not recommending that action.

"I don't know if we want to define (Phase V), because we don't know what's coming."

Phase IV prohibits lawn irrigation by sprinklers, but allows hand-held hose watering of flowers and tree wells any day of the week.

McKnight also reported to Nunley that the electronic mes-

sage signs stationed at the entrances to the village on major streets and at School House Park to warn of fire dangers and list restrictions were returned to the company after 53 days of use.

Signs may be purchased

The village budgeted for 60 days, but rain reduced the danger of wild fire.

Next year, the signs may be purchased instead of being leased. That way, they could be used to promote other events or to deliver messages in other types of emergencies, she said.

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Council approves size, nixes screen, for resort sign proposal

A change to Ruidoso's rules on signs aimed strictly at resorts will allow huge structures, but no video display.

The Village Council Tuesday voted 5-1 to approve the new regulations dealing with resort signs with Councilor Deborah Marcum-Byars casting the lone nay. Councilors voted 4-2 to approve an amendment offered by Councilor Ron Hardeman that prohibits video displays on resort signs. Streaming messages are allowed. Voting

against that amendment were Councilors Don Williams and Michele Rebstock.

Village planning director Charles Rennick said currently only the Inn of the Mountain Gods qualifies under the resort definition, which requires 200 rooms or more and seven out of a list of amenities such as multiple restaurants.

The village Planning and Zoning Commission in its recommendation for approval added a provision that all resort signs be considered a conditional use to ensure applications are reviewed by that board.

Brian Parrish, marketing director for the \$200 million reconstructed and expanded Inn and casino set to open next

year on the neighboring Mescalero Apache Reservation, said the tribe is spending millions on advertising to bring people to the area.

Existing signs are inadequate and new, larger signs are needed at key access points that include U.S. 70 outside of the village on the reservation, and at the Sudderth Drive intersection with Carrizo Canyon Road and the Evergreen Street intersection at Ruidoso Office Supply; both inside the village limits. They want the signs to be "tasteful and informative," he said.

The signs could be up by October.

No resort signs are allowed in the old mid-town section of

the sign at Carrizo might interfere with a village project to realign that intersection, but was told the work would occur in the public right of way, not on private land.

Rennick said the existing sign there is 24 feet high and the new one will be 35 feet. The old one is marquee type on a pole, the new will be a solid con-

struction. The new ordinance as drafted allowed video screens.

Hardeman said he's worried such screens might be distracting to drivers.

"I realize that's the whole point," he said, adding that they also might not be aesthetically pleasing.

Byars said she didn't object to the office supply sign, which also will advertise that business, but she'd prefer something smaller at Carrizo.

Councilor L. Ray Nunley offered the motion to approve the ordinance changes, which was seconded by Byars, Hardeman then offered his amendment.

He said if the ordinance is approved with the video screens included, "We will be dealing with this on a regular basis. If we delete, it will be taken care of now."

Local retailers in other commercial district using smaller, regulated signs outside the resort category can use video screens, Nunley pointed out.

"It's a catchy technology," he said. "It's hard enough to make a living in Ruidoso. I'd hate to rule it out. As a conditional use, we could pass on it as (requests) come up."

Mayor Leon Eggleston reminded councilors they would only deal with appeals from the Planning and Zoning Commission. "Signs have always been a headache (in Ruidoso)," he said. Rebstock said the village could use the video-type screens for messages during emergencies.

Resorts could decide to downsize a sign and use video screens, as allowed for other businesses under commercial zoning, Rennick said.

Williams seeks ruling on two-thirds majority

A ruling is being sought on what constitutes a two-thirds majority when a mayor breaks a tie vote of the Ruidoso Village Council.

Councilor Don Williams asked for the written clarification from the village attorney and requested that minutes from a budget workshop July 15, be changed to more accurately reflect what happened.

He quoted the New Mexico Municipal League as defining debate as an orderly discussion on the merits of a pending question.

"Every member of the assembly has the right to speak on every debatable motion before it is acted upon," he quoted. "This right cannot be interfered with, except by a two-thirds vote."

Williams wrote in a memorandum to Mayor Leon Eggleston that in the midst of a discussion during a budget workshop, Councilor L. Ray Nunley called for the question on his motion to approve village attorney H. John Underwood's contract with an increase to 100 hours per month at \$120 per hour and \$140 for special projects. Nunley did not receive a second on his call for the question.

The mayor asked if there was any objection and Councilor Michele Rebstock objected. Williams contends the mayor called for a second to her objection and he answered.

But Eggleston applied Williams' second to Nunley's call for the question, which ended in a tie vote, broken by the mayor. Rebstock, Williams and Councilor Deborah Marcum-Byars were on the losing end.

"The motion, or call for the question took away the rights of councilors for debate and therefore, required a two-thirds vote," Williams wrote in his memo. The league's position on voting is two thirds is two

thirds of the votes cast. By breaking the tie, the mayor increased the total number of votes to seven, not six.

"Applying simple mathematics, two thirds of seven is 4.6666, not four," Williams wrote. "It would appear the passing of the motion was lacking the full two-thirds required."

The workshop isn't the only time the technique was used on motions that required a two-third vote, he insisted.

Williams also questioned whether any vote should have occurred because Nunley's call for the question did not receive a second, and he wondered if Eggleston acted properly in applying his second to Nunley's motion.

At a council meeting Tuesday, Eggleston said he forwarded Williams' request for a change in the minutes to the league for an opinion. The council postponed action on the

workshop minutes until a response is received.

The mayor, who gives training sessions on parliamentary procedures as outlined in Roberts Rules of Order, stuck to his position that Williams' second related to Nunley's call.

"The motion to call for a question has high ranking and there is an implied second if no objection is (registered)," he said. "In this case, (Williams) seconded. You thought you were seconding her objection, but it wasn't a motion, so the second was for the motion on the floor. There was confusion on your part."

Williams countered, "I believe you misunderstood my vote. I seconded her objection. I believe the motion still is open."

The question on Underwood's contract became moot by the end of the Tuesday meeting as the council approved a third renewal and a rate increase lower than

requested. The vote again was a tie with Eggleston breaking it in favor of approval.

With a mayor-council form of government, the council votes on issues and the mayor only casts a vote in cases of ties, Eggleston pointed out. But differences of opinion exist on what constitutes a majority and he didn't object to seeking a league opinion, he said.

Resident Jack McGrann also raised the two-thirds issue during the meeting. He said he consulted Roberts Rules of Order and agreed with Williams' interpretation.

"I think a point of order should have been raised when (Nunley) called for the question to end debate two weeks ago," he said. "The debate should have been allowed to continue."

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ROAD WORK AHEAD

The project has received significant rains, but this hasn't slowed us down too much. Crews are still working the entire west side of the project. From Angus Hill to the south, to Airport Road is in final stages of getting base course applied. The rest of the section from Ski Run Road to Angus Hill is being prepared for subgrade. The rains have slowed down the lime treatment but it should be dry enough to continue the end of the week. As most of you know, after the subgrade, base course is placed, and after the base course is in, the pavement is placed.

At any time, trucks and equipment could be entering and exiting the roadway and there may be minor delays from time to time.

On Angus Hill, crews are preparing the slopes for a retaining wall system that are required to stabilize the slopes. Trucks and equipment will be entering and exiting the highway at various locations, and lane closures will be necessary. Delays will be minimal and be no more than 15 minutes.

The rains have played havoc with the temporary driveways, so if there is any access problems, please give us a call.

No work is planned for this weekend. Regular work hours for crews are 7:00am to 5:00pm Monday through Friday.

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2004-2005 final budget approved by margin of one vote

Another vote, another tie: Mayor deciding factor on budget

The answers they received didn't satisfy three Ruidoso village councilors who questioned parts of the \$35.7 million final village budget for 2004-2005 and actions leading up to its preparation.

The board split on a motion by Councilor L. Ray Nunley for approval and Mayor Leon Eggleston broke the tie in favor of passage Tuesday.

Finance director Elaine Beltran explained that from the preliminary budget approved in May, revenues went up by \$6.2 million from \$23.8 million, and expenditures increased by \$7.58 million from \$28.1 million.

Councilor Michele Rebstock, who voted against approval with Councilors Don Williams and Deborah Marcum-Byars, started off tentatively, pointing out that during a prior budget workshop, discussion was shut down.

Eggleston said anything budget-related could be discussed.

Byars then said she wanted to discuss issuing requests for proposals for water consultants. She has asked village manager Lorri McKnight to place the issue on the council's Aug. 10 agenda for possible action.

"Some are paid out of the water utility fund," she observed. "Is that just for engineering?"

Village manager Lorri McKnight responded that consultants also are paid from a gross receipts tax bond issue dedicated to finding and buying or leasing water rights. Some of that money flows through village attorney H. John Underwood, point man for the consultants, Beltran said. McKnight said the only billing under Underwood's contract for Wilson and Associates of Alamogordo is to maintain the attorney-client privilege on water-related work products from Dennis Brand.

While Rebstock lauded Beltran and her staff for a good job on the budget, she said she couldn't vote for the document, because, "I have some administrative concerns due to the lack or decrease of RFPs, task

Council approves rate and hours increases for attorney

In a tie vote, broken by the mayor, the Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday approved a third and final renewal of a contract for village attorney H. John Underwood.

As a compromise suggested by village manager Lorri McKnight, the rate of reimbursement and number of hours, although increased from the previous years, were reduced from Underwood's initial proposal. The motion by Councilor L. Ray Nunley was for an increase from 75 hours per month to 90 hours or 1,090 per year at an hourly rate of \$110, up from the current \$100, for a total of \$118,800.

Underwood had proposed 100 hours a month at \$120 per hour and \$140 for special projects or hours over the basic legal fee. Underwood will be paid the basic flat fee, even if he works fewer than the 90 hours per month, and McKnight said she'll be sure that doesn't occur.

Councilor Michele Rebstock, who voted against the motion with Councilors Deborah Marcum-Byars and Don Williams, said when she worked for a large corporation, the managers didn't receive larger percentage raises than the other employees. She couldn't support the hike proposed by Underwood or the compromise when village workers are getting a 3 percent cost of living raise, she said.

Rebstock offered an amendment to keep the hourly rate at \$100, but it failed to pass when the board split 3-3 with Mayor Leon Eggleston breaking the tie.

McKnight said she initially suggested increasing Underwood's number of hours under the basic fee because this year those hours ran out and she had to scramble to come up with more than \$20,000 to cover the additional time at the higher rate of \$120 per hour. He turned in 510 hours of special project work for a cost of about \$66,000, she said.

She didn't want to face the same crisis again at the end of the current fiscal year next June.

Underwood said he charges \$200 an hour in his private practice and when he devotes more time to the village, he has to balance the lost income, although it's also good to have a guaranteed amount coming in each month to cover overhead.

John Caldwell, who said he is an attorney and local taxpayer, strongly objected to the action, saying competitive bids should be sought.

"The cost is unbelievable," he said. "It's a waste of taxpayer money. I'm not debating Mr. Underwood's ability, but it's a big decision. You're paying too much money — way too much money."

orders and work products. I agreed with (Byars) that it doesn't make me comfortable in a business sense."

Byars said she hoped some changes in procedures occur in the next few months, but she also was voting against the budget.

Eggleston pointed out that a budget can be changed by a simple resolution and that's done frequently throughout the year as things change. If the council decides to go out for RFPs on water consultants, a

resolution could reflect that change, he said.

Williams said he didn't think Rebstock and Byars received answers to their questions and he also would vote no.

Eggleston said the staff was at the meeting to answer questions and encouraged councilors to talk about the areas of concern.

Rebstock said council minutes reflect when Charles Rennick, who was under contract to Underwood as assistant village attorney, was hired as interim planning director, he was to be paid at the same rate as the director who left.

"On my review, I saw he was

paid at \$120 per hour," she said. "I believe the council voted he be paid at \$30. In two months, he was paid \$24,000," and he was splitting his hours between legal duties and the planning department.

McKnight said that salary was in last year's budget, not the budget before the council Tuesday.

"But it's part of the justification for the expenditures this year," Byars said. "It was really confusing and I know (former councilor Bob Sterchi) was concerned."

Rebstock said she found it difficult to determine if an error occurred because expenses were spread throughout the budget.

Williams said he reviewed the tape of the June 10, 2003 meeting when Underwood's contract was modified to eliminate task orders. That move was represented as only being an interim measure while Rennick was acting planning director, he said. Rennick later was hired full time in planning, "but task orders never were implemented in John's contract," William said.

McKnight disputed that interpretation. "We still use

task orders," she said.

Byars and Williams insisted task orders were discontinued in dealing with consultants through Underwood.

McKnight and Underwood said the elimination of the task orders was narrow in scope to the Rennick situation, which was an emergency.

"I was directed by the council when it terminated the previous water team to be the point man and to secure additional people," Underwood said.

"It was an emergency situation. One day we had a water team and the next day we didn't. I don't have the power to hire if not directed by council."

Councilor Ron Hardeman said the three new councilors aren't responsible for what the board did last year before they were elected.

Rebstock, Williams and Angel Shaw were elected in March.

"You're responsible for this budget," he said of the 2004-2005 document.

Eggleston agreed, saying the previous council decided to handle the consultant a certain way. If the new council disagrees, it can change the policy.

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"(The budget) doesn't make me comfortable in a business sense."

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Village sells water to Downs at cost

The city of Ruidoso Downs will be charged \$6,484 for the 1 million gallons of water sent to its storage tanks from Ruidoso's water supply.

Village councilors agreed Tuesday only to go with the exact cost of producing the water, not with what a residential customer would pay for the water used at home.

Village manager Lorri McKnight said city officials, who asked for the water last week because of a crisis in

well, which they hoped would alleviate the problem.

Ken Mosley, the city's water director, told her that afternoon they may have to move to a different drilling site, McKnight.

said. The village pumped 669,600 gallons to the city, with 500,000 gallons filling the Redman storage tank and the rest going to the Spring Tank. The remainder will be pumped as needed, she said. Without the Denton well on line quickly, the additional water probably will be necessary, she said.

She asked water consultant Frank Potter about a statement from Ruidoso Downs' municipal judge that 15 years ago, that city bailed out Ruidoso during a water shortage. He questioned


if Ruidoso ever paid for the water.

Mayor Leon Eggleston, who worked for the village at the time, said he never recalls Ruidoso asking for water and Potter, a former village manager, agreed.

"We bailed them out, not the other way around," he said.

McKnight said the cost of production takes into account staff, operating expenses and depreciation. If the water was billed, the price would be \$9,773, a figure favored by Councilor Michele Rebstock.

Zia Festival now bigger than ever

When the Ruidoso Downs management first came up with the idea of a day devoted entirely to New Mexico-bred racing, it was hoped the attention and money lavished on the program would eventually lead to a better quality of racing in the state.

All trainers at the Downs agree that goal has come to fruition.

The Zia Festival — a day showcasing the best in New Mexico-bred racing, statewide arts and food products of all kinds — is now in its fourth year, with eleven stakes races scheduled for Sunday.

The Zia Derby and Futurity for quarter horses, and the Thoroughbred Rio Grande Señor and Señorita futurities are the premier races of the day, but almost every other race has an impressive purse for locally-bred horses, adding up to almost \$1 million in total purse money.

That's more than double the total amount awarded in 2001. The total purse for the Zia Futurity alone has increased from an estimated \$150,000 to more than \$300,000 this year.

All that money means more owners — and more importantly, breeders — are looking to this state as an attractive location to breed and foal new race horses.

"It's improved probably 80 percent," said trainer Fred Danley, who has seven horses headed to the gate Sunday. "Of course, the money from the casino really kicks the purses up. We're getting better mares in the state all the time, and it really helps the program."

With seven horses racing Sunday, Danley will be one of the busier trainers at the Downs during the Zia festivities, and can boast of the fastest qualifier in the Zia Futurity, Jackspots. He's also leading It's Miller Time in the Señor and Hollywood Gone, Ladymour and

Hollywood N Divine into the Señorita. While an event like the Zia Festival is unique to Ruidoso Downs, there are several other state-bred races — with higher purses — at other tracks in the state. But Danley noted that you can't always choose which race in which you can run your horse.

"There's good money in all of them," Danley said. "You hate to miss one of them, because you don't know if your horse will be good enough for the next one. They might sore up on you or something. So when they're right, that's when you have to go."

Jackspots may have been the fastest

qualifier for the Zia Futurity, but he'll have a lot of competition in the final, including New Mexico Spring Futurity winner Famous Phoebe. He defeated Famous Phoebe in their trial on July 15, but the filly was fast enough to qualify.

Gooch defined golf in Ruidoso

The shootout for this year's Leroy Gooch is Monday at Cree Meadows Golf Course, with the first round of the match play tournament to take place on Tuesday.

The tournament has become a regular stop for amateur golfers in the state, and is quite popular. But most people might not realize the significance of the man for whom this tournament is named.

It's no exaggeration to say Leroy Gooch, who passed on in 1997, is responsible for the current state of golf in Ruidoso. From the number of golf courses to the very existence of a golf program at Ruidoso High School, Gooch has had a hand in it all.

Indeed, the former Ruidoso High School band director had little trouble at anything he attempted, according to those who knew him.

"Mr. Gooch was an extraordinary man," said Dub Williams, a state representative from Glencoe and a close friend and colleague of the late coach. "He was a gold-plated band master, a great golfer and a good friend that was just like family."

Gooch first came to Ruidoso in 1950 to become the RHS band director, and remained in the school system until retiring in 1983. In that time, he started the Warrior golf program.

While the school has seen success on the

links, it was a struggling system when Gooch first tried to get it off the ground.

"Those were the formative years, and he ran it on a shoestring," said Grants golf coach Tom Spears, who played as a student for Gooch in 1968-69. "They gave him \$50-100 to coach golf and take care of us. We each took turns borrowing our parents' car to get to each tournament."

Spears credits his life-long love of golf to Gooch's influence, saying his mentor's even-tempered manner made a deep impression.

"The closest he ever came to cussing was 'Lord-o-blues,'" Spears said. "He caught me slamming my club on the ground after a bad shot, and told me if I ever did it again, he'd have to kick me off the team."

"He showed me to hit the heel of my shoe instead, and that way the club, the course, nor my shoe would get hurt," he added. "A week later, I hit a bad shot, hit myself on the ankle and I realized it wasn't worth it to get that mad anymore. I walked with a limp for a week."

That Gooch has had so much influence over the golf scene in Ruidoso is surprising in light of the fact that he didn't take up the sport until he moved to Ruidoso. He had been a semi-pro baseball player before coming to Lincoln County, but with no baseball program here, he began playing golf instead.

"He was an athlete, and that was the sport

It was a mistake! I swear!

Everyone makes mistakes. Nothing too earth-shattering about that revelation, is there? Unfortunately, some people's mistakes are much more visible than others.

Such was the case with Wednesday's edition of the *Ruidoso News*. It was an edition which had, on the front page of the sports section, a story on Ruidoso youth tennis player Heather McDougal.

We've been running stories on Ms. McDougal for some time now, with good reason. She's been a force on the court — both in area youth tournaments and for the Ruidoso High School tennis team.

Wednesday's story — graciously submitted by her grandfather Marchand "Mac" McDougal — was no different. It told of her exploits at various tournaments throughout the state.

Now here's where the mistake comes in, and my explanation of exactly what happened.

You see, the story "jumped" to page 2B, and, as with all sto-

ries that are too long to fit on one page, the "jump" required a second headline, something to cue the reader as to where on the page the story continues.

Now to explain how we put pages together: We use a computer program called Quark XPress, which we use to build the pages digitally before they're printed. In this program, you can build libraries from which you can pull oft-used templates — photos and cutlines, standalone photos, or maybe even a jump box.

You see, my particular library has a jump box template, in which I've typed a headline that says "JUMP: Blah, blah, blah."

Obviously, that's not how I intend the page to be printed. I've merely typed something into the headline to preserve the font and style. My method is to type something different — something referring specifically to the story — once the page is built.

Anyone who's read Wednesday's paper probably knows what I'm getting at by now. I made the mistake of not finishing the jump headline correctly. Oh, I put in McDougal's



Winning at the track requires good bankroll management

The secret to a potential winning approach to wagering depends on good knowledge of selecting contenders in a race and separating those from the rest of the field. If you don't have that skill, follow a handicapper with a proven history of selecting a high percentage of contenders in a race that produce wins at good odds.

With your knowledge, or following the handicapper's knowledge, you are ready to wager to win. That's the name of the game. Manage the bankroll so you can make the wager you want to make whether you win or not.

This seems easy but it's a problem with

time walking away with a profit. If they start to win they leave the plan that got them there and start wagering without a plan. Try to train yourself to stay with the plan.

So what have we concluded? First, you have to have the knowledge of the business. You have to know how to separate the potential winners from the most likely losers in a race.

So you have the skills...now what? While the key to handicapping is separating the horses we think have a chance, then selecting the horse we think can win would be the most logical step. In my opinion that is not

the winning step. If selecting the winner in the race were the most important step the general public would be ahead of the game. The best percentage of selecting winners is the wagering public. The public favorite wins about 33 percent of the time. This is better than almost any other handicapper. The problem is that the average mutual payback to the general public is \$5.50. If you are betting \$2 and winning 33 percent of your bets and your average return on investment is \$5.50, you are losing about \$8.35 every 10 wagers made. Rather than worrying about selecting the winner we should be looking for the horse that has a chance to win at the best value on our investment.

Third place went to a Corona local ranch team who entered this event for the first time. The Brunson Ranch team was Ron



available for him to play," said Kerit Beatty, golf coach at Western New Mexico who played for Gooch in high school. "He's the reason Ruidoso is so dominant now in golf. All the success of the junior golf program and all the state titles are because of him."

Before going to WNMU, Beatty was the RHS golf coach, and named the state's largest high school tournament after Gooch.

The story of Gooch's life is also one of service. A lifetime member of Lions Club, Gooch always found ways to give back to the community, and never looked for recognition.

"We'd hear about someone needing a ramp built, and he'd

go out, get the wood and build it himself," Williams said. "The next week, we'd talk about it in our meeting, and he'd mention that it was already done. He was just that kind of guy."

Gooch's time in Ruidoso also parallels the story of golf in Lincoln County. When he first arrived, there was one nine-hole golf course — Cree Meadows. He worked for that course his first few years, then served as the acting golf pro at the newly-built Alto Lakes course, again just nine holes.

Since then, of course, the number of courses has swelled to 4 1/2, Ruidoso High has had one of the top programs in the state, and the sport has become synonymous with a vacation in Ruidoso.

Of flashlights, water gaps and grandma's junk food

Those same handcaps will not slow down a crazy mad heifer trying to leave her hoof prints up your back. Enter the Maglite as a weapon. A right smart smack on the nose gives the weapon wielder just enough of an edge to get through the gate, alone. There are as many Maglite weapon stories as there are Maglites. Ask any owner.

Grandma style

Grandma had her own idea of how to eat things sweet. Besides the home baked goodies that were available daily there were the morning pancakes. Every day at grandma's started with pancakes, eggs, bacon or sausage and oatmeal. The size of that breakfast was directly proportionate to the work planned for the day ahead.

To be or not to be?

A water gap, as it is

referred to by the rancher, is that part of a fence that crosses a draw, gully or other low lying area that would ordinarily run water during a hard rainstorm in the country above it.

That part of the fence is usually engineered and anchored to drop low into the draw to prevent cattle from passing underneath it. But the design makes it a catch-all for logs, weeds and other debris that would wash down the draw in a storm. That force of nature often tears out that part of the fence leaving a passage way for errant livestock to leave their assigned pasture.

In the recent years of severe drought, water gaps have faded into the memories of those days when it used to rain. I had a rancher tell me not long ago, indicative of how little it has rained; he had water gaps up on the mountain that used to need fixing several times a summer. The last eight years he has not had to fix them even once.

Enter the monsoons of 2004. No, not everyone is getting rain but those that are, are getting torrents in short periods of time. The words that become music to the rancher's ear are, "I have to go fix the water gaps." Here's to many more water gap repairs this summer.

Mary Ann Bingerman asked the board to look into required supervision for students returning from sports and field trips especially late at night. She felt that no student should be left unattended while waiting for parents to pick them up.

Castaño informed the board he had accepted resignations from Anita and Lorenzo Sambrano, Pam Allen and Teresa Burns. Cissy Gore has been hired to be the preschool head start instructor.

and the reasons for it. Twenty four students attend schools outside the Carrizozo district. Among the reasons were opportunity to take a variety of courses, family moved and a belief that Carrizozo schools were behind.

Also at the suggestion of the Parent Coalition, Carrizozo graduates for the past two years were tracked. Of the 24 graduates it was found 14 are attending college, four are married and staying home or working and five are working.

Steve Gore Transportation was approved for the activity school bus bid. Sturges Market's milk bid for the 2004-2005 school year was approved.

Teachers will have in-service days August 23-24. The first day of school for grades 6-12 is August 25. Grades K-5 will start on August 30.

The Beaver-Bond #35 American Legion post was named for the first two casualties of World War I.

The festival parade included local church youth, politicians including Congressman Steve Pearce and Lincoln County undersheriff and candidate for sheriff, Rick Virden. Other parade features were two class members and the teacher of

Giving spirit? How you can help the kids at the county fair

There are a number of ways donors can take part in the Lincoln County Fair and help participating youth — from the comfort of their home, or by participating in the fair and sale.

Not every entry is a winner, and only a small percentage take home enough cash to make the year worthwhile. The Booster Jackpot, whose source

is donations, is designed to pay money to those exhibitors that do not place high enough to qualify for the livestock sale. Often it is that very money that lets them get a start on next year's project.

Each 4-H club has a buyers club. Fund raisers and donations fund an account that allows the club to bid on and buy animals at the junior livestock sale. The buyers clubs act as purchasing agents that bid

on animals as an individual buyer during the livestock sale. All the clubs' funding goes to the youth at the sale and they often use excess funds as "add-on" for fair participants who didn't qualify for the sale.

Buckle sponsorship is a more tangible way for interested persons to help support the youth programs at the fair. Buckles are given to champion and reserve champion in each animal division including the poultry and rabbits. High point horse show buckles are given to each age group. A buckle sponsorship costs \$100.

The Cream of the Crop program is sponsored by the CowBelles of Lincoln County. It is designed to monetarily award those exhibitors that raise their own livestock for show in proven breeding program.

Anytime before or during the fair, an option to give "add ons" is open to anyone. Any youth that is entered in the fair in any division can receive add ons in their name. People often name

a youth and give, for example, a \$5, \$10, or \$25 "add-on" in his name. That money goes directly to the youth via the fair.

Applications for the event, available at the Lincoln County Extension Office, must be post-marked on or before Aug. 16.

Contestants will be carefully selected and absolutely no substitutions will be made in the par-

ticipants list after they are received by the state fair office.

Participants must have reached their 13th birthday but not their 17th on Jan. 1, 2004 and not be enrolled beyond their junior year in high school. They must weigh at least 100 pounds and be in top physical condition.

Calf Scramble winners will be awarded \$750 for the purchase of a registered heifer.

The winner then purchases and cares for the

heifer (beef or dairy) until the 2005 New Mexico State fair when they are required to show the animal in both the class of animal it is as well as a special Calf Scramble show.

The youth must make monthly progress reports throughout the year to the calf scramble superintendent.

Hence the new committee. "I'd like to see a plaque for yard-of-the-month or something like that," Miller said. "There's a lot of different things we can brainstorm."

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
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


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
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

Watermelon Time

Watermelon, the fruit that is really a vegetable, contains high concentrations of lycopene, an antioxidant that may help reduce the risks of cancer and other diseases. Watermelon is fat free, nutritionally low in calories and considered an ideal diet food.

When selecting a watermelon, choose firm, symmetrical, fruit free of cracks, bruises, soft spots or mold. Ripe watermelon will have a healthy sheen, a dull rind, dried stem, and buttery yellow underside where it touched the ground. There should be a melon-like smell or fragrance.

Avoid watermelons that are very hard, white or very pale green in color on the underside, indicating immaturity. An immature watermelon will be slightly acidic.

Once picked, watermelons can be kept for short periods of time, up to 2 weeks, uncut at room temperature. Wash watermelon with soap and

water before cutting. Once cut, package what is not eaten in closed plastic containers and refrigerate.

Make watermelon part of your 5-a-day plan. Keep chunks, slices or juice in your refrigerator. Pack a slice in your lunch, use as a snack or thirst quencher.

Watermelon Pico de Gallo

- 4 cups Watermelon, diced and seeded
 - 1-1/2 cups Jicama, diced
 - 1/4C Green pepper, diced
 - 1 Tbsp. Jalapeno, chopped
 - 2 Tbsp. fresh lemon juice
 - 1 Tbsp. Honey
 - 1 tsp. Salt
 - 1 tsp. Garlic pepper
 - 1/2 tsp. Hot-pepper sauce
- In large bowl, combine all ingredients; mix well. Refrigerate at least one hour to blend flavors.

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

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


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
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


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Limin' Virgin Island style

"I HATE the Caribbean," I shouted to my friend, Ginny, over the throbbing din of the band. "I know what you mean, it's SO boring," she shouted back.

It was mid-July; 10:30 p.m. on a Tuesday night at the open-air bar of the Bitter End Yacht Club on the island of Virgin Gorda in the British Virgin Islands (BVIs). The place was hopping. The dance floor was packed with tanned, sweaty vacationers boogying to the calypso tunes of the live band, Latitude Stars. A salty breeze floated across the dance floor carrying, as if part of the music, the faint rhythm of tinkling halyards. I couldn't remember the last time I'd let loose and had such a raucous good time.

There were eight of us; all guests of Biras Creek Resort, a luxurious, low-key hideaway just a short boat ride away. We'd come to hear Latitude Stars' lead singer, Clinton, and guitarist, Philip, both islanders on staff at Biras Creek.

A day earlier, we'd been total strangers. Tonight, we'd become fast friends, the type of instantaneous connections made easily among travelers. Our motley assortment of Latitude Stars' groupies included male and female, young and old, Brits and Americans, sober and drunk, plump and lean.

I love the Caribbean. While each island has its own particular style shaped by a unique combination of geology, historical influences, and attitudes, collectively the islands of the Caribbean represent the quintessential escape from reality. No place epitomizes laid-back escapism quite like the BVIs.

Once a pirate's refuge, today the collection of tiny rugged islands offer a paradise for vacationers happy to venture off the beaten path. Situated near the northeast border of the Caribbean Sea about 75 miles east of the northeast coast of Puerto Rico, only 15 of the 60 or so volcanic outcrops are inhabited. The BVIs treasures are simple: a friendly and honest citizenry, unspoiled beaches of powdery white sand, remote coves and bays only accessible by boat, and a rich natural world above and below the water.

In the States, working hard is expected as much as it's respected. It's not uncommon for people to brag about how much they work. In the laid-back BVIs, however, there's a more relaxed attitude toward life, referred to locally as limin'. To lime is an integral part of West Indian Culture.

"Limin' is just hanging out. Enjoyin' life," said Lennox, a congenial bartender at Biras Creek. "You bin limin' all day, takin' advantage of life, yeah

mon." he told me, slipping into the singsong patois of the West Indies. "I saw you. You a pro. You got it."

I hadn't realized it was so obvious. Truth be told, I was becoming addicted to limin'. At Biras Creek it wasn't difficult.

limin', mon!

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

Racing and arts come together again in Ruidoso Downs for the fourth annual Zia Festival, celebrating New Mexico horses and New Mexico arts and crafts at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track & Casino Saturday and Sunday.

With 11 stakes races featuring the finest New Mexico-bred Thoroughbreds and quarter horses and 28 New Mexico artisans, it's a great time to be in New Mexico — and in Ruidoso Downs in particular.

Laura Flynn, who coordinated the Zia Festival this year, scouted out the

best artisans at more than 20 arts and crafts shows around the state.

"The idea was to travel New Mexico and recruit the finest New Mexico artisans in all mediums," Flynn said.

The artisans will set up in the grandstands from 11 a.m. until the completion of racing both Saturday and Sunday.

The show has grown over the years to include artisans from all over the state, although seven of the 28 artisans are from Lincoln County.

Traditional works

The traditional work includes Native American jewelry, carvings and pottery, metal work, fine gold custom jewelry, original southwest clothing, pencil renderings of Western scenes, and hand-made Spanish American furniture and lamps, custom knives.

Nontraditional work includes mirrors and picture frames made from ropes, soaps, wines (from End of the Vine of Ruidoso) and beers (from Sierra Blanca Brewery of Carrizozo) produced in New Mexico, plus an assortment of candies

and dried fruit.

Flynn was especially pleased to bring Lamar Green from Cimarron, a master saddle and tack maker who was featured in the July 2004 issue of *Cowboys & Indians Magazine*.

High stakes

Twelve stakes races worth more than \$825,000 will bring high-quality racing to Ruidoso Downs during the two-day Zia Festival.

The celebration is sponsored in part by the New Mexico Horse Breeders Association, which encourages breeding raising, selling, owning and racing thoroughbreds and quarter horses in New Mexico.

Last year's winner of the \$2 million All American Futurity was won by a New Mexico bred, BY BY JJ.

"The neat thing to me is the way it has grown and that Lincoln County is unique to have this kind of show," she said.

"I'm not aware of any other show of this quality of New Mexico artisans."





The weather for Zozo's Gov. McDonald Day was overcast and it threatened to rain on their parade.

The coolness of the day was refreshing. A vendor at Saturday's event was seen looking to the heavens and heard uttering: "Can we take a rain check on the rain," fearing a downpour would put a halt to festival business at McDonald Park.

At Carrizozo Heritage Museum visitors enjoyed viewing the inaugural ball attire that was worn in 1912 by Carrizozo residents Gov. and Mrs. McDonald and daughter Frances. I was at the Heritage the previous day when the exhibit was brought to Carrizozo by Louise I. Stiver, senior curator, Palace of the Governors. Stiver returned the clothing to its place in Santa Fe following the day's event.

The first statehood governor of New Mexico, William C. McDonald, moved to White Oaks in 1880. He was appointed United States Deputy Mineral Surveyor for the Territory of New Mexico. He was involved in ranching in the Carrizozo area before becoming governor on Nov. 7, 1911. He was involved in political, community and governmental activities as well. He served as governor from 1912

to 1916 and then moved back to his Lincoln County ranch with wife Frances.

The Palace of the Governors in Santa Fe houses McDonald family materials donated by members of the family.

Among the items included in the display for the one-day exhibit at the Heritage:

• McDonald Campaign Button 1911. The button reads "Our Next Governor William C. McDonald."

• From the Museum of New Mexico photo archives: Gov. McDonald in the governor's office and Gov. McDonald, A.N. Blazer and Mescalero Apaches, both photos ca. 1912.

• McDonald Reception Committee Badge 1912. The badge reads:

"Inauguration W.C McDonald First State Governor 1912."

• Governor McDonald's Inauguration Suit.

• First Lady Frances McDonald's Inauguration Gown and Gloves.

• Daughter Frances McDonald's Inauguration Gown.

The Jan. 16, 1912, Santa Fe New Mexican gave a detailed description of the gala inaugural events:

"...two thousand people attended the reception in the Palace of the Governors. The regimental band furnished music. There was glamour and yet the utmost democracy of fellowship prevailed. Political lines were obliterated in this proud hour. No one noticed that the political lion and lamb were hobnobbing. If anyone had a grouch, it was carefully tucked away. Governor McDonald had a cheery greeting for everyone and Mrs. McDonald was graciousness itself."



About the play

"Juno and the Paycock," first produced at the Abbey in 1924, is set against the Irish Civil War of 1922.

The powerful matriarch Juno Boyle struggles to keep her family together against a trio of enemies: war, poverty and drunkenness.

Her husband, the vain and posturing "paycock" of the title, hides from reality behind the bottle and a flow of fine language, while her two children and neighbors fight battles of their own.

"Th' whole worl's ... in a ... terrible state o' chassis!" blurts out Captain Jack Boyle," and indeed, the chaos will not abate in the Dublin of the 1920s.

The city's workers had won a measure of independence in the Irish Civil

War (1922), but soon had to choose between two sides: the Free Staters, willing to buy peace with a place in the British empire, and the Die-hards, who died—and killed—for complete independence.

The Boyles find themselves in the middle of this new conflict, as they fight their age-old battle against unemployment and poverty.

About Sean O'Casey

The playwright was born John Casey, the last of 13 children born to a Protestant family in predominantly

Catholic Dublin, in 1880. His father, a clerk who devoted his energy to the Protestant Irish Church Mission, died when the writer was only six. His mother, Susan, managed to keep the surviving five children together; her strength and compassion are undoubtedly the model for the matriarch Juno.

As a boy, O'Casey suffered from a painful eye disease that left him unable to read until he was a teenager. Working for pennies in the sweatshops and factories, the boy made use of his ears, memorizing the speech and man-

nerisms of his fellow not-so-willing laborers.

As a young man, the playwright saw the destiny of a free Ireland linked to Labor, and he opposed Capitalism and the power of the clerics. In his conviction that Gaelic should be the official language of his home country, he taught the language in Dublin's slums and changed his name to Sean O'Cathasaigh.

In the cause of republicanism, he served as secretary of the union-sponsored Irish Citizen's Army.

He submitted three plays to the Abbey Theatre before the directors (including William Butler Yeats) accepted and produced "The Shadow of the Gunman" in 1923.

"Juno and the Paycock" followed in 1924, and "The Plough and the Stars" in 1926.

The latter inspired riots amidst the Dublin populace, who took issue with its less-than-patriotic portrayal of die-hards and cowards alike.

Soon after the "Plough" protests, the author left Ireland for good and, hoping to make his way as an international writer, changed his name again, to Sean O'Casey.

He wrote other plays and a well-received autobiography, but O'Casey is best known for his three Dublin plays, which still are still the most popular works in the Abbey Theatre repertoire.

Sean O'Casey died in 1964.

This 'third place' is first choice for many

Do you have a "third place?"

Home is your first place, your base of operations, and work is the second place you're likely to be. But everybody needs a third place - somewhere to relax, to talk with friends, read, eat good food and, in general, enjoy oneself.

In other words: Home may be where you sleep, but does it have fresh baked bread, low carb lunches and terrific coffee?

In your quest for a third place, consider the Cornerstone Bakery Café, 359 Sudderth Drive. There, you'll find coffee drinks, pastries, cookies and sandwiches, surrounded by art and magazines, all designed to help you stay awhile, says co-owner Helen Daniels.


"We like people to come in, feel comfortable, read a magazine and linger over coffee and pastries," she said.

"In small towns, people used to sit around and play checkers at the general store. That's what we're looking for here."

It hasn't been too long since Helen and her husband, John, were regulars at Cornerstone themselves. But one day last spring, they arrived to find the restaurant closed. After two years in business, former owner and pastry chef Del Salai had decided to close her doors.

In a happy coincidence, the Daniels were looking for a small business to buy, and soon the couple was at the helm. They added tile countertops, wood cabinetry and curtains, and added a few of their favorites to the established menu.

The cornerstone of the menu, if you will, is the selection of freshly-baked breads, pastries, muffins and cookies. From the biscuit on the side of an omelette to the croissant around your chicken salad sandwich, it's all made right there.



Breakfast, which is served from 7 to 10:30 a.m., presents several Hearty Breakfasts, including the Cornerstone Omelette, the New Mexico Scrambler or the Lincoln County Eggs, two large eggs your way with a side of bacon, sausage or ham. They all come with pan-fried North Dakota red potatoes, biscuit or toast and fresh fruit.

"Our signature breakfast dish is our Sierra Blanca French Toast," John said. "It's made with our own baguettes in very thick slices, and we stack it up like the mountain. Very few people can eat it all."

The morning menu also features Blueberry Blintzes, Albuquerque Eggs Benedict and the Spinach, Egg and Cheese Trio - a crustless quiche - which is one of several low-carb options. The others, Steak and Eggs and Scrambled Eggs with Sausage, can be ordered with potatoes for those who don't like to put a label on their breakfast.

The pastry display cases start to thin out around 11 a.m., when lunch service begins. One of the Daniels' family favorites is the Green Chile Cheddar Club, with turkey, ham, bacon, tomato and lettuce piled high on green chile cheese bread. Other sandwiches worth mentioning are the Reuben (on Cornerstone rye, of course), and the Cornerstone Dip, roast beef with sauteed peppers and Swiss on a fresh Cornerstone baguette.

Lighter lunches include the Caesar, chef and spinach salads, which all come with homemade blue cheese and garlic cheddar crisps, and soup selections like tomato basil and green chile potato.


For low-carbers, there's a sandwich made on special bread and a Monterey chicken topped with bacon, cheddar and barbecue sauce. They can even satisfy their sweet tooth with low-carb cheesecake and crunchy peanut butter cookies.

For those without carbohydrates on their mind, the dessert case is filled with fruit, cream and pecan pies, as well as cakes, and specialties like ice-cream filled crepes.

After lunch is over at 2 p.m., there's still time for a late afternoon breather at Cornerstone Bakery Café. The doors stay open until 3:30 p.m. for specialty coffees, Italian sodas, chai lattes and a small plate filled with cinnamon rolls, scones, croissants or cookies.

It's all part of the Daniels' "third place" plan.

"People don't have to come in

"They go home, they go to work, then they come here. We want to be part of their social life."
