Input sought on septic change

Proposed changes to New Mexico's septic system regulations will go to a public meeting tomorrow in Ruidoso.

The New Mexico Environment Department has scheduled ten meetings around the state, seeking input on the possible changes before filing a formal petition of regulation changes with the Environmental Improvement Board.

The potential amendments involve the liquid waste disposal and treatment regulations and the liquid waste treatment and disposal fees.

A draft of the proposed regulations recommends one minor change to septic system designs based on minimum lot sizes. And systems that use seepage pits could see some increased environmental standards.

Plans for treatment units could require a stamp from a professional engineer.

"We've worked to incorporate minor changes necessary to bring the regulations up to date," said Environmental Health Division Director Carlos Romero.

"The regulation changes include tweaks to language and adopting guidelines and specifications that have been recommended by the Wastewater Technical Advisory

Committee."

The department's environmental health manager Dennis McQuillan said the number one goal is to protect public health and water quality while providing an efficient and fair permitting process.

He said five meetings already held around New Mexico have seen small turnouts, "but there has been good participation."

"It's very beneficial to us to have the discussions with local communities," said McQuillan.

What he said has proven to be a controversial change would redefine what are "waters of the state."

In the current liquid waste regulations those are described as all

interstate and intrastate waters including natural ponds and lakes, playa lakes, reservoirs, perennial streams and their tributaries, intermittent streams, sloughs, prairie potholes and wetlands.

A proposed amendment would add mudflats, sandflats, wet meadows, and any "waters of the United States," which are detailed in the federal Clean Water Act. Surface waters of the state would exclude private waters that do not combine with other surface or subsurface water.

McQuillan said that was an expansion of the list of waters of the state.

Klingman named new finance director

In debating whether to leap from her municipal job in Texas to Ruidoso, Nancy Klingman said the enthusiasm for and devotion to the village by the new manager were key in her decision.

Klingman said Tuesday she hopes her first day on the job as the village's new finance director will be Nov. 19, and she plans to move next week.

Born in Woodville, Minn., Klingman was raised on a dairy farm. She attended a one-year course in accounting at a technological school, married, began her family and worked a variety of jobs in the private and public sector.

Klingman handled payroll for a canning company and then took over accounts receivable for a clinic with nine physicians. From there, she moved to Texas and worked in day-care to be close to her children.

In her early 30s, circumstances changed and she became a single mother raising four children from ages 2 to 17. She also enrolled in college.

"It was the hardest

thing I ever did, but a fabulous time in my life, because I love to learn" she said. "It was good for the

children, who saw that their mom also carried around books."

After earning a Bach-

elor of Business Administration-Accounting degree from Southwest Texas State University, she went

to work for the state of Texas, where she stayed

Lincoln County to lose state money

Looks like Lincoln County will lose \$146,743 in unspent state allocations as state legislators and the governor attempt to reel in every extra dollar they can find.

With contracting state revenue and commitments to some huge state projects over the last few years, New Mexico is looking at a possible deficit in 2010 of \$650 million.

Counties and municipalities received warnings that unspent allocations

from the state legislature, the governor or grants might be recalled.

Lincoln County Manager Tom Stewart e-mailed county commissioners Monday with the bad news locally.

"Commissioners, Just love these e-mails sent on Friday at 4:55 p.m.," he wrote, referring to a communication from State Department of Finance and Administration official Barbara J. Romero. "This will probably remove the following three appropriations:

- STB 06-L-G-444,

Severance Tax, Fairground construction, \$64,000, 73 percent complete with \$46,743.43 owed from the state Department of Finance and Administration.

• 07-L-G-5317, Glencoe Fire Station, \$35,000 awaiting property.

• 08-L-G-4338, Glencoe Fire Station, \$65,000 purchase."

He wrote the county may save \$200,000 for a fire tanker for the settlement of Lincoln, due for delivery in April, and \$100,000 for the Glencoe Fire Station purchase

agreement.

"The five are the only appropriations we have remaining as of this date," Stewart said. "We will probably lose the remainder of the Fair Ground appropriation. The ARRA (American Recovery and Reinvestment Act) funding of \$327,000 probably won't be granted as well for the Copper Ridge substation."

The frustrating fact on Copper Ridge was that the project was "shovel ready" in August when the county applied, but DFA officials sat on it, he said at a previous commission meeting. If

the \$327,250 in ARRA money is not released, Stewart recommended last month the county proceed on its own to build the emergency services substation.

He attached a letter from Robert M. Apodaca, director of the Local Government Division of the DFA, noting the legislature passed the state's solvency plan in House Bill 17 during a special October session.

"It mandates that the Legislative Council



Any live evergreen tree up to ten feet in height can be cut down or dug-up, in the Smokey Bear, Sacramento, or Guadalupe Ranger Districts as designated by a map accompanying the permit.

What will we name our federal courthouse?

New Las Cruces hall of justice needs a label

What's in a name? That which we call a federal courthouse by any other name would smell as sweet. Or, however a federal courthouse smells.

With apologies to William Shakespeare, now that construction is almost complete on the \$91.2 million Las Cruces federal courthouse, speculation has started as to what to name the new hall of justice.

Jude McCartin, a spokeswoman for U.S. Sen. Jeff Bingaman, D-N.M., said Congress will get the final say on what to name the building, and there aren't any plans to do so immediately.

The new building will replace the current federal courthouse named for Harold L. Runnels, who served in the U.S. House of Representatives from 1970 until his death in 1980.

Runnels represented Ruidoso along with most of southern New Mexico.

While Runnels also served Las Cruces in Congress, he wasn't from there.

He moved to Lovington in 1951, and is buried there today.

Runnels was replaced by Joe Skeen, another native of southeast New Mexico, who served 10 terms in Congress. Subsequent representatives

Steve Pearce and Harry Teague have continued the trend.

It's been reported that an effort has been started to name the building for Edwin Mechem, a four-term governor who was appointed to the U.S. Senate following the death of Dennis Chavez.

Mechem was a graduate of what was then New Mexico A&M, now NMSU, and practiced law in Las Cruces.

He was appointed to the federal bench by Richard Nixon in 1970, and served for 32 years until his death in 2002.

The problem with any such initiative is that it inevitably results in an airing of one's dirty laundry.

In Mechem's case, his opposition to the Civil Rights Act while serving in the U.S. Senate stands out as a large blemish on his record.


Bingaman, along with Sen. Tom Udall and Teague — or whoever may hold those seats in the future — will likely have the final say of who, if anybody, the building is named for.

Right now the plan is simply to name it United States Federal Courthouse — Las Cruces.

That sort of has a nice ring to it. Everybody gets included and there's no fighting.

ADA dictates privacy for medical files

To the editor:

ON PAGE 4A of your paper, dated Oct. 21, 2009, in your 'Our Opinion' column, titled "Personnel files should be accessible," you state, in relevant part: "The obvious solution is to simply remove medical records from the personnel file."

They should be kept in a separate envelope or, better, put in a secure location elsewhere. Capitan Clerk Kay Strickland says either is doable."

Apparently neither the editor nor Ms. Strickland have read the Americans With Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA), or at best have only done a cursory reading of the ADA. What the ADA does say, in relevant parts: "Confidentiality: Information from all medical examinations and in-

quiries must be kept apart from general personnel files as a separate, confidential medical record, available only under limited conditions specified in the ADA," the ADA also states: "All information obtained from post offer medical examinations and inquiries must be collected and maintained on separate forms, in separate medical files and must be treated as a confidential medical record."

Therefore, an employer should not place any medical related material in an employee's personnel file.

Employers should take steps to guarantee the security of the employee's medical information, including: keeping the information in a medical file in a separate, locked cabinet apart from the location of personnel files;

and designating a specific person or persons to have access to the medical files."

It should also be noted that the ADA only applies to employers with 15 or more employees.

While I am appalled by the paper's lack of legal knowledge, this shouldn't really surprise me since the Village of Ruidoso and the majority of businesses, especially those in mid-town, in Ruidoso are not ADA compliant.

It might behoove the editorial staff to check their information, if need be with an attorney specializing in Civil Rights, prior to publishing their 'Opinion' for the uniformed public to read and quite possibly misinterpret.

JUB board representation may not change

Officials from Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs may never agree about changing the representation on the board that governs the regional wastewater treatment plant.

During a meeting Friday of the Joint Use Board, members were miles apart on the issue.

Ruidoso Downs Mayor Tom Armstrong, who serves on the JUB, was adamant that his council is not interested in changing the composition of the board or relinquishing any control over rates and the ability of the city to grow in the future.

Chairman Greg Cory, Ruidoso Mayor Pro Tempore, was just as adamant that while the village bears 85 percent of the financial burden, is fiscal agent and operates the plant, it should have more weight on the JUB. Currently, the board membership is split with two representatives for each of the municipalities and one from Lincoln County.

Ruidoso Village Councilor Jim Stoddard, the village's other representative, said he couldn't figure out why the county has a seat on the JUB, because it does not provide any utility services. With no bylaws for the JUB, members could find little guidance in determining the original concept for the board, but County Commissioner Dave Parks, the county representative on the JUB, surmised the fifth person, without a direct interest from the plant, was there

to break ties.

Attorney Ned Kendrick from Montgomery & Andrews law firm based in Santa Fe, went over three scenarios for the future of the JUB. The were to continue without change in membership, but look for ways to smooth the operation and possibly eliminate the requirement of the two municipal councils to approve every major move; to dissolve the JUB and have the village take over the entire operation with the city of Ruidoso Downs as a customer, with some protections such as rate caps; and to create an independent authority with taxing powers and the ability to decide issues without conferring with the two councils.

Cory said in previous discussions, the councils didn't seem interested in the third option. He said they were uncomfortable with concept of individuals who were not elected setting rates or taxing.

"The council chose not to pursue that," he said. "Not to rule it out all together, but I understand there are other (models) out there where the governments can maintain control."

After an hour of discussion, Kendrick was asked by Cory to investigate

more in-depth some by-laws that might help guide the JUB, the possibility of increased village representation on the board and the option of the village operating the plant with the city as a customer. Both of the latter two approaches should include protection for Ruidoso Downs that rates be tied to the consumer price index or a percentage cap applied.

Stoddard repeated his idea to change meeting dates to eliminate what amounts to a month's lag to secure approval from both councils after the JUB acts.

Kendricks took notes, saying he wanted to hear what the JUB members liked and didn't like so that he could build on the points. "I could look at starting from scratch or take the existing structure and improve it," he said.

Cory said from the village's viewpoint, the two major issues with the current structure are representation, which councilors consider unfair base on the village's larger role. The options could include three members to Ruidoso Down's two, or increasing membership to eight or 10 with more weight for the village.

The second issue is how to handle council ratification of JUB decisions.

Stoddard said he was upset shortly after being elected to the council when an issue came to the village from the JUB and he challenged the action.

"I was told I had to vote for it," he said. "I wasn't aware of the makeup or by-laws. No one explained what we could and couldn't do. Then I was appointed to the JUB. I'd like to smooth (the operation) before I leave it. I don't understand why there is a county representative. It must have been placed here as a tie-breaker. That's unfortunate."

Ruidoso Downs Village Clerk Carol Virden, a JUB member, said she has been unsuccessful in finding council minutes about how the JUB was created in 1974. "I've only been involved with the JUB for 20 months and it's a learning experience. There are times when its hard to make decisions, We represent our community and you do yours. Our council has trust and is comfortable with the decisions of JUB members."

"That's not the case in Ruidoso," Cory said.

Armstrong said he thinks the JUB must be strengthened, but as mayor is not willing to give up the power it has now in setting rates and the control over the city's ability

to grow through providing utility service.

"These things are very serious for the citizens of Ruidoso Downs," he said. "I think the JUB has shown what it can achieve by working together 50/50 with the additional county vote. I worry about the county vote, but I don't know how it could be any different. I wouldn't want representation to be one-sided."

The process may need to be tweaked, but not thrown out, he said.

"We are working with Ruidoso on every step and in every way," the mayor said. "We're doing our part. Everybody wants to pay for what they put in. We're not giving up the control we have."

When loans and grants were needed for the new court-mandated wastewater treatment plant, Ruidoso Downs stood up and did its part, Armstrong said.

Virden's reluctance to pay some invoices was to ensure it was not paying for services not connected to the treatment plant. "The staff is working well together," she said, complimenting in particular new Village Manager Debi Lee.

Parks said while as the county official, he would hate to have to break a tie-

vote and tell one of the municipalities it must comply with something it opposed, the key is that historically friction has existed between the two towns, characterizing the concern as "the 900 pound gorilla telling the little guy what to do."

"It's the best it's been right now," he said. That's not usual for neighboring entities, he said, adding in this case, "Fairness is the issue." When changes are being considered, perhaps a new determination of percentage of produced wastewater to strike an exact allocation would be timely, he said.

Cory said village officials don't think someone with no vested interest in the treatment plant should be the entity to break a tie. He's not surprised village officials feel Ruidoso is underrepresented on the JUB and the city is satisfied with its representation.

"I don't know about the city, but the village can't afford to incur any more operational expense than we have," Cory said. "We just can't afford it."

Stoddard agreed that the current personalities involved work well together, but elections will change the people serving

Services, the Legislative Finance Committee and the DFA identify a minimum of \$150 million of voidable capital outlay projects," Apodaca wrote. "To that end, and based upon Gov. Richardson's Oct. 26 directive ordering a freeze on all capital outlay projects, this state agency hereby, terminates all grant or other forms of intergovernmental agreements that were entered into between the state agency and your public entity utilizing state general or severance tax bonds funds for capital projects."

The termination is effective Oct. 30, but county officials have until Nov. 15, to demonstrate to the DFA there are legally binding written agreements with a contractor, a third party or vendor to purchase professional services, nonprofessional services or items of tangible personal property. If the county is successful, the DFA will initiate a new grant or other form of intergovernmental agreement up to the amount encumbered by the third party contract on or before Oct. 30, with no interruption in reimbursements.

Apodaca said the grants are being terminated to address the solvency issues for Fiscal Year 2010. If an entity makes any expenditures against a terminated grant or agreement after Oct. 30, it may or may not be reimbursed, he warned.

Stewart wrote his response to the state detailing the obligated money before the end of the workday Monday.

What does that mean for the attending seniors? Learning patience, guidance and planning as they teach and work with

kindergarten and first graders.

With the little ones, they find the big gingerbread man and then bake and decorate more of them. A trip to the Pumpkin Patch in Estancia netted pumpkins that were then baked, seeds cleaned out and roasted and the making of pumpkin cookies as the final project reward.

They made mini-pumpkin pies to celebrate fall and while studying apples

in their classroom, the first graders then made individual mini-apple pies with a crumb crust and served them with ice cream.

Each team of seniors has to plan an activity and have come up with the likes of math bowling and musical ABCs. They plan the process, the materials needed and the lessons they expect the young students learn from the project.

Science projects includ-



ed a Halloween potion involving lagoon water (vinegar), dragon's blood (red food coloring), a frog eye (marble), five drops of pond scum (green food coloring), one snake skin (paper shreds) and three pinches of powdered dinosaur bones (baking soda).

The lesson, of course, was to help students see what results when vinegar and baking soda are mixed and the ensuing chemical

reaction.

Shafer said it is interesting to see how most of the senior students have a natural instinct to know who to work with the younger students. "Sometimes they dread it at first and they don't enjoy it when the children misbehave," she said, "but it really pleases them when realize how much the little ones admire and look up to them."

When the older and younger students complete

a cooking project they take the food to the table and along with eating the food, learn lessons on table manners and proper eating (chewing with mouth closed, etc.).

Ruidoso Municipal School District H1N1 update

After seeing absentee rates soar at the end of September and start of October, the level of Ruidoso Municipal School District students out because of flu-like symptoms has fallen.

"There's been a clear decrease," said Superintendent Dr. Bea Etta Harris.

The most recent attendance report for the district's six schools is right around 10 percent. In early October it had topped 20

percent.

"They're telling us it will go back up over the winter," Harris said of information from health officials. "It will probably be mid-winter, sometime after Christmas. We're being careful because there will be another peak."

Nearly all of the influenza cases in the schools were attributed to the H1N1 virus.

The district put in heightened safeguards in September as part of an effort to reduce the spread of the virus. Students and staff are washing hands

more thoroughly and cleaning the schools is done more often.

Registered Nurse Diane Latham, with the Mescalero Apache Elementary School, said things have slowed down on the campus.

"It's that way with us too," said Latham. "We're about the same as Ruidoso. But we're not letting down."

Vaccinations against the H1N1 influenza virus arrived last week at the state health office in Ruidoso. And more are scheduled to arrive this

week.

State public health clinic nurse Millie Smith said the supplies, for both the injection and mist vaccines, have been tight.

"I'm getting calls constantly," Smith said.

With the limited supplies of the swine flu immunizations, Smith said people more at risk of serious complications are getting vaccinated.

Those include pregnant women, household members or caretakers of infants less than six months old, children from six to 59 months of age, and

children five to 18 years old who have chronic health conditions that could be complicated by the flu. Those conditions include asthma, diabetes, and heart disease.

In addition to the H1N1 vaccines, the health clinic on Kansas City Road also has some seasonal flu vaccines.

As of late last week Lincoln County has had four people hospitalized so far this year because of the swine flu. In Otero County the number was 20. Statewide more than 600 people have been hospital-

ized and 21 have died. Just over half of the deaths involved those with chronic medical conditions.

Visits to healthcare providers for influenza-like illness dropped significantly last week in southeastern New Mexico. About 17 percent of doctor visits were for flu symptoms. Earlier in October the level had been more than 30 percent.

State Health Department epidemiologist Dr. Mack Sewell said while there is a drop in flu cases right now, the worst may be yet to come.

High scores

While many public schools in New Mexico have fallen short on student performance in recent years, the state gets high scores for setting academic standards and assessing students.

The National Center for Education Statistics rates

New Mexico 9th in the nation for assessing fourth grade reading, 9th for fourth grade math, 6th for eighth grade math, and

14th in eighth grade reading.

The report uses the National Assessment of Education Progress (NAEP) to compare state proficiency standards. It also compares the reading and mathematics assessment by looking at the minimum state scores that determine proficiency, as defined under the federal No Child Left Behind Act and NAEP.

100's at event

Hundreds of residents from the area showed up Sunday afternoon for prayer and conversation at Ruidoso High School and Ruidoso Middle School. The president of the Lincoln

County - Mescalero Ministerial Alliance, Pastor Tim Gilliland, said between 200 and 250 people attended what was believed to be the first ever ministerial alliance prayer vigil at the schools in Ruidoso.

Downs signs mutual aid agreement

A formal agreement between Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, for fire fighting and other emergencies, is approved last week by Ruidoso Downs city councilors.

The Mutual Fire Assistance Agreement had been proposed last year by the Ruidoso Fire

Department, and adopted by the village council. But some Ruidoso Downs councilors were at odds with the five year term of the accord. The Ruidoso Downs City Council approved accord is for a one year period and can be renewed annually.

City Councilor Gary Williams questioned how new members are added to the mutual aid group.

"It should be between both parties, not just the Ruidoso Fire Department," Williams said. "The agreement is between the both of us."

Ruidoso Downs Fire Chief Justin Shaw said Ruidoso is just the keeper of the document.

"We are a part of it. The fire department is a part of it," Shaw pointed to language that stated

the Ruidoso Fire Department would coordinate and document the agreement be-cause of the village's centralized location.

The Ruidoso Fire Department's Assistant Chief, Harlan Vincent, said the mutual assistance agreement will next go to Lincoln County for possible inclusion of the various volunteer depart-

ments in the area.

The agreement aims to have a formal process in place for fire protection in the event of large structure fires, emergency conditions, and other disasters. It spells out protocols for the participating fire departments, as well as liability, chain of command, adhering to the national Incident Command System, finan-

cial responsibilities, radio communications and some special provisions.

In the past firefighting help between neighboring departments had been described as "gentlemen's agreements."

Vincent said the agreement will also return before the Ruidoso Village Council, for the change that makes it an annual accord.

on the JUB and the councils. The two towns could return to a more adversarial relationship. That's why bylaws or some structure is needed for the future operation of the JUB, he said.

"If there were bylaws written, it would have made it a lot easier for a

new councilor to understand how it all works," he said.

Kendricks said the hot button still is representation on the JUB and he wants to avoid getting hung up on that issue while trying to draft some bylaws. For now, a joint meeting of the two councils would be premature, JUB members agreed.

"I think the JUB is strong enough relationship to make this work

and that was proved by what we went through (in the last three years with the new \$36 million wastewater treatment plant). If the costs of the plant go higher, we'll be there to help."

"We'll carry our load. I don't see more representation because of the amount of sewage going in (from Ruidoso). This is one sewer plant."

Stoddard said while the existing people on the

JUB work well together, "Down the road, this issue will come up again."

"We can leave it as it and try to improve the bylaws and hope we maintain a good relationship, but people change and at some point, (decisions may have to be settled with) arbitration."

The JUB will meet at 1 p.m., Nov. 12, at Village Hall, 313 Cree Meadows Drive, or the public library next door.

for nine years. She moved to a county position for one year, but found she enjoyed city finances the best and stayed eight years as finance director in Lakeway.

But Village Manager Debi Lee's recruiting was instrumental in Klingman's decision to come to Ruidoso.

proud of Ruidoso and she relayed that to me. She's done some fabulous things in the short time she's been there. She has a lot of energy. That swayed me, her devotion to the village in the short time she's been there."

Lee issued a statement on Klingman joining the

staff, saying a committee conducted an Assessment Center process to select a new finance director from six candidates, who made it through the initial elimination.

Klingman, from Briarcliff, Texas, was picked in part because she has experience with municipal

finance, fixed asset inventory and investments of public funds.

She also is versed in other municipal functions, including debt bond financing, budget management, utility billing and information technology services supporting municipal operations.

By the end of the first half the visiting Lake Arthur Panthers took a 50-40 lead into the locker rooms but the Hondo Eagles roared back in the second period to grab a convincing 96-70 win, and with it, the 2009 D2-6M crown.

Although the Panthers had won the district title for the last two straight years, the Eagles took the state championship in November of 2008.

"Going into the game I was convinced the Lake Arthur contest was going to be decided by 2-points in OT," Hondo head coach Brandon Devine said.

"When we were down by 10 at halftime I told the boys they needed to get back out there, work hard and play their best football.

"We also found a few weaknesses in Lake Arthur's defense we felt we could exploit and subsequently made the necessary adjustments."

Devine's players re-

sponded in kind ... but the Panthers kept up the struggle, too.

At one point, in the third quarter, the score was deadlocked, 64-64. The Eagles then scored and led by six.

They promptly recovered an on-side kick and took it in and increased their lead from there.


"Lake Arthur has a superior running back in No. 5, Angelo Rivers," Devine explained.

"He has the ability to chew up 40-yards at a crack on kick-off returns. That's why we attempted eight on-side kicks against the Panthers for which we recovered four, I believe. Better to deny Rivera a consistent shot to rip off big yardage then not."

For the rest of the contest, the Eagles' defense allowed only six more Lake Arthur points.

"We tried to eat up the clock in the fourth quarter but our boys inadvertently ran out of bounds multiple times," Devine said.

The visitors pulled out all the stops, including a successful on-side kick while leading the hometown boys, 42-10, in the third quarter.

By the end of the contest, Ruidoso generated 222 total yards of offense while Ralph Miranda nearly equaled that with 173 yards on kick-off returns.

Towards the end of the first half, Albuquerque had a 28-0 lead until a 2-yard TD run by Warrior Nick Smith and successful PAT put RHS on the scoreboard.

"I told the boys at halftime a 28-7 deficit was not impossible to overcome,"

Ruidoso head coach Kief Johnson said.

And normally that's possible. But the Chargers (now 7-2, 1-1) tacked on another 28 points in the second half of the frigid evening, to win by 46.

"They were bigger and faster than we thought they were," Johnson said. "They were able to man-up on defense and blitz six defenders at a time.

"As a result, they gave our offensive line problems and were therefore able to stop our backs coming out of the backfield.

"They were capable of controlling both sides of the ball at the line of scrimmage."

Offensively, quarterback Darrell Carr ran nine times for 39 yards and was 11 for 30 through the air for 150 yards.

Kayle Frierson caught

four passes for 46 yards and Miranda pulled in four for 69 yards.


Defensively, Smith collected five tackles with seven assists and while Frierson and Jared Lewis each had three tackles with three assists. No sacks were recorded.


Jesse Scarafiotti attempts to evade an Albuquerque Academy defender in Ruidoso's 56-10 loss.

HOBBS - The New Mexico-based Kentucky Derby winner Mine That Bird racing in the \$5-million Breeder's Cup Classic at Santa Anita Park in Southern California ensures an historic day for New Mexico racing.

It will be celebrated at Zia Park with full wagering on all Breeders Cup races

and a matchup between Song Of Navarone and Orientate Express meeting in the \$60,000 Veterans Stakes, the 10th race on the 11-race live racing program.

First post time at Zia Park is 12:15 p.m.

The 1 1/4-mile Breeders Cup Classic will run at about 4:45 p.m. on Saturday. The first Breeders Cup race on the stakes-filled program will be contested at 11:45 a.m.

The remaining races on Saturday's Breeders Cup program with \$17 million in purses continue throughout the day.

Mine That Bird is owned by Roswell residents Mark Allen and Dr. Leonard Blach and is trained by New Mexico-based Chip Woolley. He stunned the racing world when he made an incredible late rally along the rail to upset the Kentucky Derby field at 50-

1 odds. The undefeated mare Zenyatta will face males for the first time in the Breeders Cup Classic. Her 13 wins from 13 starts include 11 stakes wins in her 11 latest races.

Summer Bird could gain favoritism after winning the Belmont Stakes, over Mine That Bird, and then capturing grade 1 wins in the Travers Stakes and Jockey Club Gold Cup.

In the Veterans Stakes, Song Of Navarone returns to New Mexico after racing against the premier stakes horses in Southern California. He raced to a sixth-place finish in the Grade 1, \$1 million Pacific Classic, behind longshot Richard's Kid and major stakes winners Einstein and Rail Trip.

Antonio Castanon rides Song Of Navarone with the outside post position in the

five-horse field.

Orientate Express ships to Zia Park after winning the \$150,000 Remington Green Handicap at one-and-one sixteenth mile on the turf. On Sunday afternoon, the New Mexico Cup at Zia Park offers the richest day of state-bred racing anywhere on the stakes-filled program. First post time is 12:15 p.m. and all the NFL action will be shown.

San Jon had beaten House, 55-25, in their season-opener while the Eagles were victorious over House on Oct. 2, at Hondo, 66-33.


"Preparing for the Coyotes will be tough," Devine said. "The last time we faced them was for the state championship last year.



FSA issues program payments

ALBUQUERQUE - Salomon Ramirez, State Executive Director for USDA's Farm Service Agency in New Mexico today announced that USDA has almost completed issuing over \$18 million in Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) payments to eligible producers in New Mexico. More than \$1.7 billion in CRP payments are being made on 31 million acres across the country.

"The Conservation Reserve Program works cooperatively with America's farmers and ranchers to conserve and preserve the soil and water that we, and numerous wildlife species, depend on for survival," said Ramirez.

"These payments represent an investment in the nation's land that will pay

dividends in the form of a cleaner environment today and for our grandchildren."

The payments announced today are annual rental payments earned on the 568,253 acres enrolled in the CRP, including the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program and Continuous Sign-Up Program fiscal year 2009. Producer's holding 2,493 contracts on 1,577 farms will receive an average of \$11,813 per farm or \$32.78 per acre.

The number of contracts is higher than the number of farms because producers may have multiple contracts on a single farm.

This voluntary program helps agricultural producers safeguard environmentally sensitive land. Producers enroll in CRP and plant long-term,

resource-conserving covers to improve water quality, control soil erosion and enhance habitats for waterfowl and wildlife.

In return, USDA provides producers with rental payments. CRP contract duration is from 10 to 15 years.

Land to be enrolled must be either highly erodible, contribute to a serious water quality problem, provide important wildlife habitat or provide substantial environmental benefits if devoted to certain specific conservation uses.
