## Lightning sparks multiple wildfires

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Lightning triggered a number of fires Wednesday in southeastern New Mexico, including the Riverside Fire in eastern Lincoln County. The mostly grass fire was reported about 5 p.m. Wednesday. It had gone on to burn 1,742 acres in 24 hours.

The initial incident commander, Lincoln County Emergency Services Director Travis Atwell, said there were thunderstorms in the eastern part of the county when the fire started.

"We're waiting for it to warm up," Atwell said Thursday morning. "We'll have a bunch of them (fires) start popping up because we had a pretty good lightning

storm go through."

Atwell said about one-tenth of an inch of rain fell in the fire area, helping with the initial suppression work.

More than three dozen firefighters were on the Riverside Fire Wednesday night. Crews from the Hondo, Arabela, Glencoe and Bonito volunteer fire departments, as well as an engine from

New Mexico State Forestry and two engines from the Bureau of Land Management, dealt with the flames. At 9 a.m. Thursday the fire was turned over to New Mexico State Forestry with the agency's Capitan District Forester Eddie Tudor in command.

About 100 people were assigned to the fire Thursday,

including resources from the Bureau of Land Management, New Mexico State Forestry, the Mescalero Apache Tribe, U.S. Forest Service and some area volunteer departments. The flames, in steep, rocky and inaccessible terrain, were burning private lands.

## Former Oso's GM involved in shooting

Incident in 2005 led to manslaughter plea deal

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The recently resigned general manager of the Ruidoso Osos has been on probation for a fatal shooting at Elephant Butte Lake in August of 2005.

Clyde R. Woods, who was a state parks ranger at Elephant Butte, shot and killed the man who had refused to pay a \$14 camping fee.

A park volunteer said the 58-year-old man had become belligerent and officer Woods

was called. A scuffle reportedly took place and the man was shot twice. Police said the victim was unarmed.

Woods was initially charged with second-degree murder. He agreed to plead guilty to a reduced charge of voluntary manslaughter and was sentenced to probation until Oct. 17, 2013.

The Osos, which inaugurated play in Ruidoso on May 10, is owned by the Pecos League of Professional Baseball Clubs, said Ruidoso Parks and Rec Department Director Debbie Jo Almager. The league had leased the Ruidoso Osos franchise to Woods on March 1, which made him

## Village of Ruidoso pushes for ETZ viability, enforcement

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The future of a one-mile development transitional zone around the village of Ruidoso in the unincorporated area of Lincoln

County remains uncertain, but village councilors urged their staff Tuesday to reforge a cooperative relationship with the county and to establish a realistic enforcement arrangement. County commissioners

and County Planner Curt Temple have discussed the possibility of dissolving the extraterritorial zone, because the county has no zoning or staff to handle enforcement. With the downturn in the economy,

the ETZ Commission, composed of representatives from the village and the county, hasn't met for more than a year.

"We heard of the possibility of some (development) activity in the ETZ

that would require a meeting, but the ETZC has no members," said Village Acting Planning Director Bob Decker of the seven-seat board. "To generate a

## Ruidoso could take over building inspections in Capitan

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To better serve local building contractors, Ruidoso municipal officials offered to take over responsibility from the state for building and trade inspections in the village of Capitan.

Ruidoso Building Official Shawn Fort said he spoke briefly about a possible arrangement during a Capitan Board of Trustee budget session May 16, but no official action occurred.

"I'm trying to get back on the regular meeting agenda (for formal action)," he said Tuesday. "The services (of the Construction Industries Division) are extremely slow for contractors in Capitan and

last session, the New Mexico State Legislature passed a law, Senate Bill 262, that allows municipalities to help to relieve the pressure."

Capitan would be treated the same way as others within a three-mile zone around Ruidoso within which inspections already are conducted by Ruidoso's three building officials, who are certified in multiple disciplines that sweep in plumbing, mechanical and electrical, as well as structural issues.

"This is an attempt to provide better service to contractors in the area," Fort said. "We can provide next-day service and it doesn't cost them. We already drive to the bottom of Angus Hill."

Unlike many other jurisdictions that deferred to the CID, three

years ago, when the agency demanded entities either handle all or none of the inspections, Ruidoso councilors decided to expand the department and cover all the trades.

Acting Village Planning Director Bob Decker elaborated that the extraterritorial zone schedule of inspection fees has a built-in 10 percent surcharge to cover mileage.

Under the previous situation, all of Fort's state certifications were restricted to the village and the ETZ.

"The state changed the law and now (certified inspector) can work any where in the state," Decker said. "We had talked to (Ruidoso Downs) and others over a period of

time and the state kept trying to block (broader application of certification).

But the state also was having trouble finding inspectors, and they had to drive 400 miles to rural communities, and if follow-up is required, contractors have to sit and wait another week until they returned."

Building inspector organizations lobbied for a change for several years to improve service, Decker said.

"The change of administration changed people within these departments and they did a 180-degree change in the way the state is interacting with local inspectors," Decker said. "It's a difference of philosophy."

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**Celebrate Flag Day**

**District meeting**

The Alpine Village Water and Sanitation District will meet at 4 p.m. Monday, in the district's building, 114 Alpine Meadows Trail.

This meeting will cover regular business for the district, such as paying bills and reporting on the operations of the water system. The agenda also may contain discussion regarding committees to address the Conservation and a Drought Contingency Plan, Capacity Assessment, and revising the bylaws and regulations. All residents of the district are welcome to attend. Agendas are available at least 24 hours prior to meeting time.

**AmeriCorps funds**

The Sovereign Nations Service Corps on the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation will receive \$133,000 to support AmeriCorps work.

The New Mexico Commission for Community Volunteerism announced last week that seven projects around the state will benefit from the

\$1.6 million grant. The AmeriCorps funding comes from the Corporation for National and Community Service. It will finance 412 positions in New Mexico. At Mescalero, 10 positions will be covered by the grant.

**OPD meeting set**

Two topics will be covered at the Tuesday's meeting of Huff n Puff, a Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease support group for residents of Lincoln and Otero counties.

Eddie Reeves, certified tobacco treatment specialist, will be a guest speaker on smoking cessation and Steve Haydu, Tai Chi instructor, will teach some "old" exercise techniques.

The meeting is from 1 to 3 p.m. at the Alamogordo Senior Center. A pulmonary therapist from Gerald Champion Regional Medical Center will be there, as will local home care representatives.


**Road work planned**

An anticipated 14-month road construction project is getting underway on U.S. Highway 54 in the Corona area.

The New Mexico Department of Transportation reported the nearly 12 mile section of work will realign the existing roadway and rehab a bridge (railroad overpass) about four miles north of Corona. Rock blasting and excavation will be a part of the approximately \$20 million dollar project.

Miscellaneous work, such as fence construction, began in late May. Work that will impact traffic is scheduled to begin in August. Motorists are asked to slow down, be aware of construction workers, and observe detours and temporary lane closures. During rehabilitation of the bridge, which is scheduled to begin in August, a temporary traffic signal will be in place to direct one-lane traffic across the bridge.




# Land swaps, purchases pave way for new bridge

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The details still are cloaked in secrecy under an exemption to New Mexico's Open Meetings Act, but apparently some land swaps and purchases are underway to accommodate installation of a permanent bridge on Eagle Drive.

The bridge was one of 13 torn away or badly damaged by a massive flood on the Rio Ruidoso in July 2008.

Most of the money to replace the structures will come from the Federal Emergency Management Agency. Eagle is the main bridge in Midtown connecting both sides of the town.

Village officials awarded a contract to FNF Construction based in Albuquerque to install the span-type bridge, but work was held up when they discovered some of the needed land belonged to property owners on the north side of the river.

When councilors emerged from closed session Tuesday, they unanimously voted on a motion by Councilor Gloria Sayers to authorize Village Manager Debi Lee to negotiate for and finalize a land trade with the owner of The Sanctuary on the River, Debbie Haines Nix, for land needed to install Eagle Drive Bridge.

A companion motion

authorized the same negotiations with the owner of the Ruidoso River Resort, William "Sunny" Van Haselen to obtain land for on-street parking, sidewalks and a park for village-owned land.

A third motion element authorized negotiation to purchase in line with its appraised value the Opfer Tract for park, sewer and roadway purposes. All three properties are in the Eagle Bridge area.

In other action after the closed session, councilors

voted to approve a motion by Sayers to allow up to \$3,500 for excavation and soil analysis for a possible cemetery site.

The village's Forest Lawn Cemetery has little usable land remaining, most appropriate only for cremation memorials. But efforts to secure others sites have fallen through. One piece of village land on Ski Run Road turned out to be situated on a rock ledge and negotiations broke down on another along U.S. 70 West.

## Gas prices view fueled by naiveté, misinformation

To the editor:

A recent lengthy opinion piece regarding the high price of gasoline was so naive and misinformed that I thought a response was required. In general, the opinion piece was more of an instrument to bash the president than an intelligent appraisal on the reasons for high fuel prices.

To begin with, new sources of oil take many years to develop. How could the current administration's actions affect the price of oil after only two years in office? Also, price volatility not only affects the U.S. but Europe, Japan and the rest of the world, where gasoline sells for well over four bucks a gallon in many places. I suppose Obama has something to do with the high price of gas in Europe, too. The price of petroleum is set by the world market. Even if more crude was to be produced domestically, do you think oil companies (many of them foreign owned) would sell it for less here than the world market price? Not without government intervention or subsidies.

Most experts agree that we could not rapidly increase production and in such volume here to have a dramatic impact on the market. Unfortunately, the U.S. has identified or developed most of our large domestic petroleum reserves. Experts do not expect to find many more large sources of crude oil within the U.S. or even offshore. The largest oil field in North America is in Prudhoe Bay, Alaska, which currently produces about one million barrels of oil per day. To put that number in perspective, Prudhoe Bay's output is about 5 percent of our daily consumption. Reserves in ANWR are not expected to exceed those in Prudhoe Bay. The author of the opinion piece also mentions the Bakkan Formation in North Dakota. Experts estimate that the entire Bakkan reserves could supply our petroleum needs for six months to three years. Actually, the largest recoverable deposits of crude in North America are the oil sands in Alberta, Canada, and these

reserves are largely beyond our control.

Additionally, Canada is our largest provider of crude, they are completely self sufficient in their energy needs and have over a hundred years of supply. The price of gasoline in Canada is higher than in the U.S. Mexico, our third-largest supplier of crude, is also self sufficient in petroleum. Gas prices there are cheaper than here only because of government subsidies.

America long ago exhausted its ability to provide a significant majority of its own petroleum. The "drill baby drill" crowd, egged on by the politicians, just use environmental regulation as a straw hodgepodge for the reason for high fuel prices. The only proven method of stabilizing or reducing fuel prices is through increased oil production by OPEC or decreased worldwide consumption.

## What is government supposed to do?

Some things are outside the proper scope of government. That much is clear to me. But like what? Specific examples are easy.

At the federal level, there are ethanol subsidies, nearly everything that happens in the bedroom and specification of the graphics for street signs in neighborhoods. For the latter, see my post at [www.capitolreportnm.com](http://www.capitolreportnm.com).

At the state level, I've been making suggestions for a couple of years in the largely unsuccessful hope of inspiring what is now the Martinez administration.

One is closing, for cost reasons, the El Camino Real International Heritage Center, located four miles off Interstate 25 in the middle of nowhere.

At both the state and federal levels, quasi-governmental entities are good candidates for elimination or recasting into the private sector.

Federal examples are Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac.

State examples include New Mexico Magazine and the Railrunner.

In fairness, though, the Martinez administration deserves some credit for actions that, if not quite bold, certainly are interesting.

My cleverness award goes to the two-year halt of construction of college buildings paid for by state government.

The move addresses the result of college money being

tied to square feet of buildings. So what happens? Colleges build buildings. During the two years, the administration will review the funding formula.

Trying to get out of part of the rail track purchase and dumping the Commission on the Status of Women are two other worthy actions.

At the federal level Rep. Paul Ryan has been talking very big picture reform for several years.

Those ideas have come together in the House budget proposal. At the state level, though, and certainly within the administration, so far as I can tell, little consideration exists at the level

of asking just what is the proper role of government, overall. On the left, Think New Mexico is a self-proclaimed "non-partisan... results oriented think tank." Certainly little broad based thinking shows there.

Think New Mexico would dispute my placing the organization on the left. Their board has a couple of Republicans, but look at the rest. See [www.thinknewmexico.org](http://www.thinknewmexico.org).

The Rio Grande Foundation carries the conservative, er, libertarian banner. I worked with RGF.

It was a happy relationship. RGF is serious, for sure, but seems hidebound in that libertarian ideology.

Former state Rep. — and likely congressional candidate — Janice Arnold-Jones is a major exception, a Paul Ryan of sorts for New Mexico. From the con-

servative side, she does think seriously about government.

See [www.Janice2012.us](http://www.Janice2012.us). Arnold-Jones also seriously considers details, sometimes getting buried by her geek tendencies.

Unaddressed by nearly everyone, even sometimes Arnold-Jones, are the questions of what government should do, and, within the "should" category, what ought government to do. The distinction is that no person or organization can do everything it should do. The libertarian gods, Friedrich Hayak and Joseph Schumpater, are one place to start the "ought" question. My long ago economics text, "Economics," by that good Keynesian, Paul Samuelson, is another. In the ninth edition, Samuelson blithely accepts "the trend toward greater government authority."

He talks about "public goods," those things such as national defense that the market cannot supply. He discusses "the collective conscience of the American people" as a policy basis.

With a nod to the collectivist Rousseau, he touches on "merit wants" where government regulates behavior. But whose "merit"? Whose "wants"?

"Public goods and social overhead," the latter an especially interesting idea, are the offerings from Joel Mokyr in "The Enlightened Economy."

The idea of "entrepreneurial human capital" comes from Edward Glaeser, a Harvard economist. Building entrepreneurial human capital seems to fit under social overhead.

I'll come back to these ideas on occasion with the objective of creating questions for our public dialogue.

# Village officials seek to revamp condemnation process

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Before they condemn someone's property for demolition, Ruidoso village councilors want something in writing from an engineer declaring the structure unsafe.

Councilor Rafael Salas Tuesday suggested postponing any action until early June when a letter could be submitted, and Councilor Denise Dean tried a motion, but it failed to receive a second. Without a motion to approve a resolution condemning the property, the issue died. Staff can bring it back later.

Introducing the issue on the agenda, Ruidoso Building Official Shawn Fort said the structure is dangerous and that the owner was notified by certified mail that he had 30 days to contact the village and initiate some action.

"Since then, all that I've


received is a run-around, no action," he said. "They said they were going to sell it, then tear down the decks, but there has been no action."

The property was identified by staff in February. At the time, three pit bulls were living there alone for an unknown period of time. Staff worked with code enforcement officers and the animals were removed, Fort wrote in his memorandum to councilors.

Fort said this would be the first formal condemnation and demolition in the village, although he has several more on his list. Recently, an owner of another targeted structure tore it down voluntarily.

"I like that we are getting proactive on this," Dean said.

Councilor Jim Stoddard said he noticed in an advisory letter from Village Attorney Dan Bryant that an opinion was recommended from an engineer

on the building's structural soundness.

"I've seen this council step off an edge and make decisions we should have retracted," Stoddard said. "So we need a structural engineer's opinion?"

Bryant said Fort has engineering background.

"He is confident as an engineering matter that the structure is dangerous," the attorney said. "Bob Decker (acting village planning director) also is a properly-certified engineer.

He reviewed and agreed with Fort's assessment."

"(The proposed action notification) has to be served on the property owner," he said. "It has to be a personal service. They've got to know you're planning to do this. They have the right to hire an engineer and if he says it is structurally sound, he and Decker confer. But the resolution will get the process rolling and clean up a pretty terrible piece of property."

Stoddard said once before the council was told a property was unsafe and ended up having to buy it, then later learned that wasn't the case.

"The sad thing was that those were paid, contracted engineers," who apparently improperly guided the council, Bryant said.

Salas said he would like a dated letter from staff before approving the resolution, not after approval. He suggested postponing action. Councilor Angel Shaw agreed, saying the letter should be in hand first.

Fort "respectfully disagreed" with Bryant, and said most cities don't handle condemnations with engineers. The building code designates the building official as the authority.

Councilor Don Williams still seemed interested in an engineer, but wanted one who deals specifically with structural issues. "There are a lot of different

kinds of engineers," he said. "I'm just uncomfortable with a civil engineer. We should make sure he has the right qualifications."

Mayor Ray Alborn asked how long the house has lingered in poor condition and Fort said about three years. But he said, "We need a procedure and I have three more."

"I hate to tear down someone's place, but if we have three pit bulls living there and no one caring for them," Alborn said.

If the property owner doesn't demolish the building on his own, the village can step in, contract for the work and then charge the owners, Bryant said.

But councilors still were wavering. Stoddard agreed with Salas, a letter should be in hand first. Decker contended the issue was simple, not a complicated commercial structure and a civil engineer was adequate.

Riverside Fire information officer Jennifer Myslivy said Thursday afternoon that increased fire activity was initially being observed on all sides of the blaze as the flames were running in grass and brush.

A number of air tankers were being used along with fire fighting resources on the ground. Efforts were focused on containing the

fire and stopping its movement beyond identified ranch roads. The fire had been heading towards the 2010 Deadman Fire area.

The June 2010 Deadman Fire on the Cooper Ranch consumed thousands of acres.

"We had some thunderstorms come over and had some gusty winds, but also put some moisture on the fire," Myslivy said. "So that helped extinguish the flames that were kind of pushing off toward the Deadman Fire and actually helped some of the

resources on the ground. That moisture did help a lot."

As of 4 p.m. Thursday the afternoon rains had taken fire activity to what was described as a "minimal" level.

But the potential for possible erratic thunderstorms also increased concerns for increased fire activity.

Atwell had earlier in the week cautioned that lightning could be a fire starting issue.

"We had a bunch last night," he said Thursday.

"And it's going to continue today (Thursday), tomorrow and Saturday. That's mainly why I turned it over to Eddie's Type 3 team because we know we're going to have more so at least there are teams in the area picking them up as we go."

While rain fell at a number of Lincoln County locations late Wednesday afternoon and into the evening, some areas were without precipitation.

The National Weather Service said severe weather, with hail, winds and a

lot of lightning, was reported in Lincoln and Chaves counties.

Thousands of lightning strikes were detected.

The Weather Service said marble-size hail fell east of Arabela. Sierra Blanca Regional Airport recorded a 53-mile per hour wind gust from a thunderstorm.

Additional storms were occurring in Lincoln and Chaves counties Thursday afternoon.

The Riverside Fire was one of at least seven fires recently started by light-

ning strikes in southeastern New Mexico, said Dan Ware with New Mexico State Forestry.

The Brown Lake fire, about 20 miles northeast of Roswell, was about 950 acres in size.

Three other fires were reported north of Roswell. One closed a section of U.S. Highway 285 for a while Wednesday because of smoke that limited visibility.

Another blaze was started west of Roswell. The sizes of some of the Roswell area fires were unknown.

the general manager.

"I was unaware of the Elephant Butte situation," said Andrew Dunn, the commissioner of the Pecos League. "I knew nothing of the Elephant Butte situation until it was informed to me through the village. People at the village found out about that. They researched that. I believe what happened is he

(Woods) began to get pressure about the situation and he knew that he wasn't going to be able to do it anymore. He didn't want to deal with the press and the media again. He told me that he was probably going to get out."

Woods resigned from the general manager's post on Monday.

"It was for personal reasons," Woods said Tuesday. "I have another business that I run and I felt I needed to devote more time to

Woods, who lives in Truth or Consequences, said he operates a commercial painting business there.

"I felt the team needed to get someone in there that could devote more time to it."

Dunn said the league did not force Woods out.

"We were just barely figuring it out ourselves," Dunn said. "It all happened fast. We were going to have a meeting next Wednesday in Ruidoso to figure things out. We never got to that meeting."

Dunn said the league does not hire felons, however Woods was not an employee of the league but rather a franchisee.

"No, there was never a background check done on

him. Yes, we're going to learn in the future to do background checks."

The man who replaced Woods this week, Billy Page, urged people to look beyond Woods and be positive.

"I don't want to bash Clyde Woods," Page said. "Let this guy go out and live his life and start anew. Any more negative press about the Osos and him will only hurt us. Let Clyde go on and live his life. He has paid his dues and

whatever. I know a lot of people are upset but I personally would let that go and start fresh and let people know that we are here to stay, but we need their help."

Dunn said the situation is "horrible" for the league.

"But you know what? It is what it is. We're not denying that we might have made a mistake by leasing to him. But what do you want me to say? I mean, I'm just doing what's in the best interest of us."

discussion on whether to try to fix it or dissolve it, we placed the item for dissolution on the agenda. Right now, it doesn't function. There is no enforcement."

He pointed to a cluster of buildings being built along the creek in Gavilan Canyon near the intersection with New Mexico Highway 48. The developer went through the ETZC and his application was denied, but when he began the project anyway, nothing happened, Decker said. The way the current ETZ ordinance is written, "We can't enforce it," he said.

Councilor Gloria Sayers offered a successful motion not to dissolve the district. Councilor Rafael Salas directed staff to fix the relationship with the county and reinvigorate the district. The ETZ was designed to allow alignment of roads between the village and county, and to ensure compatible housing or business development as it moved from the village, which operates under a zoning code, into the county, which has no zoning,

only a subdivision ordinance. Standards are significantly different in the town and county for lot size, road construction, central water supply and sewage collection.

After listening to the background of the district, councilors told Decker and Building Official Shawn Fort to "definitely fix it." Several of the councilors are relatively new to the board and have never encountered an ETZC case or an appeal to the Extraterritorial Zoning Authority, composed of two county commissioners and one village councilor.

Sayers said residents along Gavilan Canyon are worried about the side of the hills there, if development is not regulated. She said in another location within the district, an amphitheater was developed without adequate parking.

"It may be that nothing was happening (before), but it needs to be dusted off," she said.

Councilor Don Williams said just because an area has a low crime rate, residents don't get rid of their police department. "It was good that there was very little action," he said.

Decker explained that in the county, village code officers had no authority to enforce ETZ rules, and the county used the sheriff's office. However, Fort as a building official has the authority to crack down on building code violations.

If revitalized, the ETZ ordinance needs to be beefed up, he contended. Village officials need to get with the county planner or Planning Commission members to rewrite the ordinance, he said.

"Last time (former deputy village manager Bill Morris) and (County Attorney) Alan Morel tried and it didn't work out," said Williams, who previously also served on the county commission. Decker added that former commissioner Earl Hobbs from Alto also pushed to either change the ordinance or fix it.

Councilor Denise Dean asked if the village could substitute its own Planning and Zoning Commission as the hearing body in the ETZ. "Then if there are problems, they could go to the ETZ Authority to decide," she suggested.

Village Manager Debi Lee told the councilors that state statutes dictate the membership of the ETZ

Commission and Authority. Village Attorney Dan Bryant said the village could appoint some of its planning and zoning commissioners as representatives to the ETZ Commission.

"Historically, the breakdown in relationship occurred because a number of years ago village folks were imposing village rules, although that was not in the program," he said. "The county threw up roadblocks. It was dysfunctional as (Decker and Fort) described."

"You don't get curb and gutter and sidewalks in the ETZ, but you can line up roads and zoning, so there is continuity. It allows people to be in the country. You always hear, 'I didn't want to live in the village. I wanted to be in the country.'"

Bryant explained that the difference between zoning and subdivision rules is that zoning deals with land use and subdivision rules with design.

Often the ETZ district is a prelude to an area being annexed into a municipality, but that won't happen easily along Gavilan, because it weaves in and out of the village bound-

aries, Decker said. Any annexation would go through the Municipal Boundaries Commission and would involve many small pieces of private property instead of large tracts.

Williams said staff should approach county officials and ask for their opinion on re-establishing the ETZ. Temple attended the council meeting, but had to leave before the items came up on the agenda.

"I spoke to a county commissioner this morning and (the person) said it would be to Ruidoso's advantage to keep it, and that's our job," she said.

Lee also advocated keeping the district as an overlap zone, where growth could be encouraged and utilities extended. Mutually agreed upon subdivision standards could be

enforced.

Fort said with his current staff couldn't cover the additional area.

"I see a lot of work to do this," Lee said. "It's really proactive and beneficial, as for enforcement, maybe the county and village could hire someone and share the cost, she suggested. The first step could be for Morel and Bryant to meet."

But Councilor Angel Shaw said keep attorneys out of the mix initially to hold down legal costs. "If their planning department also is not interested, we need to know first before run up legal costs through two attorneys," she said.

Sayers said the county is receiving complaints and might be willing to cooperate.

Councilor Denise Dean said Sayers alluded to "a lot of stuff going on," and, "We need to get control of it."

# PNM falls short with PRC

New Mexico's largest electricity company faces a showdown this week with state regulators over how little renewable energy it produces.

Jason Marks, a member of the state Public Regulation Commission, on Tuesday said Public Service Company of New Mexico had failed to meet government requirements for solar energy development.

Worse still, the giant with 500,000 customers had come up short while two electric companies with smaller market shares were complying with the state's rules for renewable energy, he said.

"How can these guys not do it affordably when the other two companies are?" Marks asked.

Marks, a Democrat, wants an order in which the commission would press PNM to take specific steps to generate more electricity through wind and solar power.

The five-member Public Regulation Commission had scheduled a vote on Marks' proposal for Thursday. In an interview, he predicted that he had the necessary three votes to get his measure approved.

But Marks also can expect opposition from Republican Commissioner Patrick Lyons.

Lyons said government should not meddle in corporate operations.

Cathy Garber, a spokeswoman for PNM, declined comment. She said the company preferred to wait until Thursday before reacting to any order by the Public Regulation Commission.

The state has mandated that 10 percent of electricity be produced through renewable energy sources. Solar must account for 2 percent of that total.

Marks said PNM's desire to litigate the requirements and its resistance to even small matters - such as implementing rooftop solar programs -- had stalled progress on alternative energy.

"It's been much more tortured with PNM" than with other electric companies, he said.

He said he wants the commission to tell Public Service Company to seek business proposals that would increase its solar development and create a wind farm.

This strategy, Marks said, amounts to the state providing "guidance" to the company.

But Lyons said he would oppose additional state requirements for solar production by private companies.

Lyons said alternative energy sources must be increased, but the state would be out of bounds to tell a private company where to invest its money.

"Wind is so much cheaper than solar," Lyons said. "We should be looking for the type of renewable energy that is the least costly."

Companies with consumers and shareholders to account to cannot be expected to invest in solar technology when it is almost three times more expensive than wind energy, Lyons said.

Marks, though, said the cost of solar had dropped by half since the state began its push for renewable energy in 2007.

"Sunshine is plentiful in New Mexico and solar is going to get cheaper," Marks said. "Solar is a big part of the picture" in replacing fossil fuels that cannot last forever.

In addition to PNM, two other businesses are subject to the state requirements on renewable energy. They are El Paso

Electric Co. and Southwestern Public Service Co., a subsidiary of Xcel Energy.

All three were to have renewable energy programs in place by Jan. 1. Marks said El Paso Electric and Southwestern had substantially complied, leaving the commission to deal with PNM.

Marks said he would not rule out fining the company for failure to follow the law, but he hoped the approach of steering it to a more aggressive alternative energy program would work.

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# GSWA largely holds the line on rate increases

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While the higher cost of fuel began to show up on garbage bills from the Greentree Solid Waste Authority earlier this year, nearly all other bill changes will be avoided after the public entity's board deliberated on a few rate increases.

"One of the things we did way back in 2001 was for fuel so that there wouldn't be permanent rate increases to the public or commercials just because of fuel," the authority's Operational Supervisor Debra Ingle told the board on May 24.

"Even though the last rate increase for the citizens was in 2008, which was a rate reduction, based on the CPI (Consumer Price Index) we could have asked for a rate increase of up to 8 percent, it's actually

8.4 percent over the last four years. But I'm fortunate to announce that we're not here to ask for a rate increase from the citizens or the regular commercial accounts."

Charges for commercial compactor daily rentals and two special account categories, that cover non-profit thrift shops, will, however, increase.

"You have some charitable organizations, non-profit organizations, one of them being tied to the First Baptist Church here in the Downs. You have the NEST, which has Sweet Charity. You have Not Too Shabby in the Village of Capitan," Ingle said.

"These organizations end up with illegal dumping at their dumpsters. (Ruidoso Downs) Mayor Tom Armstrong brought this to my attention because the church got hit with a huge illegal dump-

ing and the one load alone coming through here was like \$100."

Ingle said the nonprofits do not have the money to pay a charge like that.

"So we asked what amount could we increase on their bill that will help offset that so that they can then dispose of that waste at a discounted rate when it's illegally dumped?"

Ingle recommended, and the board agreed, that the commercial dumpster monthly charge increase from \$58.55 to \$63.55 for the non-profit thrift shops. Any with the smaller poly-carts will go from \$22.35 to \$27.35 per month.

Ingle also wanted the ability to determine what to charge when the nonprofits haul an illegally dumped load to Greentree's yard.

"The \$5 increase to that account gives you \$60 a year for them to bring the couches, mattresses, tables and

chairs, the illegally dumped waste to our window," Ingle said. "But that \$60 (on account) could be gone in one load if we don't have a discounted rate when they come to the window."

GSWA board member Kathryn Minter said a discount for the several non-profit resale shops could reap benefits for the authority.

"It saves us from them dumping it in one of our dumpsters somewhere," Minter said. "We have to send a crew out for illegal dumping."

The solid waste authority would like to also deter illegal dumping at the non-profit second-hand shops.

"And Mayor Armstrong said one of the things that we could do to be proactive, put one of our illegal dumping cameras up there," Ingle said.

Greentree uses hidden cameras at locations where

illegal dumping has been a problem.

Another help could see the second-hand shops get the word out that they do not want junk and only accept items that someone else could use.

"And bring it during open hours so we can look at it," Minter also suggested.

Another commercial increase would affect a couple of businesses that have solid waste authority supplied compactors.

"We have compactors out there that are for commercial use that for some reason through the process back in 2002, were never implemented with that daily fee like our rolloffs (large trash containers) are," Ingle told the authority's board. "So therefore when those compactors break down, we have no money to repair them."

The daily rental charge will be \$2.50. Ingle said

there are only two businesses, the Ruidoso Downs Race Track's Jockey Club and the Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club, with the commercial-use compactors.

"If a seal goes out in the back of one of those compactors, it's \$200," Ingle said. "And because they are getting older, we are asking to implement that fee."

The commercial compactor customers do pay a trash collection charge but not a rental fee for the machine.

"It will be a fourth year of not putting a rate (increase) on the citizens of the County of Lincoln, the Village of Capitan, the City of Ruidoso Downs, the Town of Carrizozo, the Village of Corona, but only to those who have asked for our assistance and being proactive," Ingle said of the three board-approved charge increases.

## BUSINESS BRIEFS

### Circle K

In an effort to curb tobacco sales to minors, Circle K Stores, Inc. has signed an agreement with the attorneys general of 38 states, including New Mexico.

Under the agreement, Circle K will adopt specific

procedures designed to reduce the sales and marketing of cigarettes on other tobacco products to minors in all of its approximately 3,000 corporate-owned stores and about 1,000 other franchise locations. Circle K has a convenience store in Ruidoso Downs.

"Circle K has chosen to be a good corporate citizen in efforts to keep cigarettes and other tobacco products out of the hands of New Mexico children," said Attorney General Gary King. "The company is leading the way by adopting specific procedures."

The agreement, called an Assurance of Voluntary Compliance, was produced through an ongoing, multi-state enforcement effort among the attorneys general. The group consulted with public health experts and tobacco control officials. The agreement with Circle K includes provisions for comprehensive training of store personnel, compliance checks to monitor sales practices, and advising contract operators that there will be serious consequences imposed for underage tobacco sales.

# Injured wing walker dies

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Amanda Younkin Franklin, 25, died May 27, from complications connected to burns suffered in a fiery landing of a stunt plane during the Air Fiesta 2011 air show in Brownsville, Texas, March 12.

She was the wife and performing partner of Kyle Franklin, 31, a 1999 graduate of Capitan High School. Franklin was piloting the plane and also was hospitalized for his burns at the Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio. Franklin is the brother of Debbie Haines Nix, owner of The Sanctuary on the River, and one of the founders of Help End Abuse for Life and The Nest domestic violence shelter.

Funeral services will be at 10 a.m. June 7 at the First Baptist Church in Fayetteville, Ark., with interment at the Fairview Memorial Gardens Cemetery, and a reception at the Fayetteville Country Club. An online RSVP at [www.younkinair.com](http://www.younkinair.com) is requested for those wishing to attend the reception.

Amanda Younkin Franklin, born in Neosho, Mo., was wing walking when the plane's engine failed. She received 3rd degree burns over 70 percent of her body, as well as broken bones in her face, and was expected to remain in the hospital for up to six months. She was on top of the upper 30-foot upper

wing of their modified bi-plane 1940 Waco UPF-7, when Kyle Franklin was coming out of a maneuver.

"As I pulled up, the engine quit," Franklin said after the accident. "We have a procedure. She looks over her shoulder for my signal. I assessed to be sure everything looked right and decided she had to come in. I gave a nod for the front cockpit and she starts moving immediately. She's lightning fast getting down. You don't want a walker out in a forced landing, because if it hits hard, the plane could go on its back and crush her. I tried my best to keep it in the air. I was low and slow, about 35 mph with a headwind that was slowing me down.

"I knew I wasn't going to make the runway and hoped I could hit the grass,

but I couldn't. I found an open square and went for that. We were running out of air fast. I planted it right where I wanted it."

He didn't think the plane hit that hard, but must have been knocked out briefly, Franklin said.

"The next thing I remember, I see fire in my face and I have a hold of Amanda and I'm trying to pull her out and I can't. The next thing I know, guys

have me pinned on the ground, because I'm still trying to go to Amanda. Other guys are spraying the plane with foam."

He found out later that the cable so vital for his wife's safety while wing walking, became wedged or hung up in the front cockpit on landing. The rescue team had to cut the cables to remove her from the plane.

The couple met at an air show and both lost their fathers on July 10, 2005, when the two men, Jimmy Franklin of Ruidoso and Bobby Younkin, were killed in a mid-air collision while performing together at the Saskatchewan Centennial Air Show in Moose Jaw.

Amanda, who began flying solo at age 16, became his manager in 2005, and also managed her brother, Franklin said. In 2009, she began wing walking and "was awesome at it, one of the best in the world," he said. Their company operated under the name of Franklin's Flying Circus.

In lieu of flowers, Franklin said Amanda would insist donations to a person's local ASPCA, Humane Society or animal shelter.

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# Serious damage averted with quick response to garage fire

Serious fire damage was averted at a Ruidoso home Thursday thanks to immediate action from a neighbor.

Interim Fire Chief Harlan Vincent said a man trying to start a car, first by using a starting fluid, and then gasoline, triggered the blaze in a garage at 236 Country Club Drive.

"The neighbors came in and put the fire out," Vincent said. "When we got there we just went ahead and finished putting it completely out and then we evacuated all the smoke out."

No one was injured. The fire burned some of the car. The garage was damaged by smoke.

Craig Goodman, who with his wife was doing yard work at his parents'

home, heard a backfire at the neighboring residence.

"He was working on a car in the garage," Goodman, who is from the Fort Worth area, said. "And by the time I got up there, there were some flames coming out. I just ran over and grabbed the hose there at the house and hollered for him to get out of the garage and call 9-1-1. I just started putting water under the car because

that's were I saw the flames coming from. When I got that put out I noticed there were some coming from under the hood. I started trying to get water on that. I just did what anybody would have done being there near to the water hose."

The man who had tried to start the car was told to leave the garage.

"He just wouldn't come out of the garage,"

Goodman said. "I was kind of spraying him down because he wouldn't come out, so I was hoping by spraying him down he would come on out of the garage."

Goodman said the fire department arrived in minutes.

"I was really, really impressed. It seemed like two or three minutes and they were already here."

Vincent said everyone is

on edge because of the fire conditions.

"They kind of get together and motivate themselves," Vincent said of his department's members. "They say we have to have an at least four-to-six minute response time to anything or we're not going to catch it."

Vincent applauded the neighborly help.

"I'm just thankful that people are diligent. I tell everybody it takes a village to run a village, and it's not just us. It's everybody and the community has really stepped up on a lot of different levels and helped us out and got things going before we got there."

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





## Canine provides invaluable service overseas

From an outside perspective, Bill is your typical dog.

While not apparent to an onlooker, however, the 8-year-old German shepherd, formerly known as Military Working Dog Bill J149, is not your typical dog.

Bill is a highly-trained detector dog, certified in patrol work, a veteran of two overseas deployments, and as of recently, a retired Air Force canine living out his dog days in relaxation with his adoptive owners, Lt. Col. Jeff Krienke, 49th Wing Safety chief, and his

Today, hundreds of Department of Defense military working dogs are deployed worldwide, working next to their human counterparts and providing critical services, explosive and narcotic detection, security and patrol, deterrence and much more.

Although the concept of employing "man's best friend" has been around for centuries, the canine's natural talents and keen senses may have never been more in-demand than after Sept. 11, 2001.

"It's very common for the dogs to deploy frequently," said Tech. Sgt. Thomas

Henzl, 49th SFS Kennel Master. "Post 9/11, it's almost a rotating door for our working dogs. They are in very high demand because the dogs are needed with every branch of service."

Unlike their human

counterparts though, it is not necessarily "work" in the dog's eyes.

"The dogs have such an eagerness to please and what we call work is actually playtime for the dogs," he explained.

MWD Bill J149 was one of many working dogs that possess a vital ability when it comes to these deployments, which he demonstrated in Southwest Asia in 2008 and in Afghanistan in 2009, the ability to detect explosives. His records show four real-world finds.

"They are definitely invaluable to the airmen, the soldiers and the sailors that the working dogs are helping to protect down range with every [improvised explosive device] they find," said Sergeant Henzl.

Looking at Bill today, an easygoing dog who's no happier than when he's playing tug-of-war, it's

hard to tell he has saved lives, and by the standards of military members serving down range, that makes him a hero.

"He deserves to live a comfortable life because of what he's done," said Krienke as he sat in his living room, petting Bill's ears. "He did his job. I don't know all that he's done but I know he's deployed at least twice and he deserves (all that) he gets at our home."

As Gen. David Petraeus, commander of U.S. forces in Afghanistan, stated in February 2008, "The capability they bring to the fight cannot be replicated by man or machine. By all measures of performance their yield outperforms any asset we have in our inventory."

Happy Birthday, Ike. It was nice knowing you.







## La Mesa seeks injunction

ALBUQUERQUE — La Mesa Racetrack and Casino filed for an injunction in district court Thursday, asking the court to stop the New Mexico Racing Commission from giving away its license to another racetrack operator.

La Mesa was awarded a license for a racetrack and casino in 2009 and has spent several million dollars on the construction of a temporary casino on the site in Raton, NM, with plans for a permanent racetrack, hotel and casino. However, the petition states that the Racing Commission has breached the terms of its Order by refusing to issue race dates in 2010, causing La Mesa to sue in state court. Earlier this month, the Racing Commission announced that it would put the license out to bid again, which is the cause of this petition for an injunction to stop that illegal process and risks breaching the terms of the 2007 Tribal-State Gaming Com-

pacts. "There are only six licenses permitted in the state of New Mexico," said La Mesa attorney Sam Bregman. "The sixth one was issued and we believe, belongs to La Mesa. We are respectfully asking a judge to stop this process until the appeals can be resolved in court."

Since there are only six licenses allowed in New Mexico, granting a new one would place the new license holder in serious financial jeopardy if La Mesa wins the appeal.

"The new license holder stands to lose a lot of money if La Mesa prevails in the appeal and the license is handed back to La Mesa," said Bregman. "All the resources of the new license holder would be at risk."

Having more than six license holders would violate the gaming compacts with the tribes, throwing into dispute the revenue-sharing agreements.

"The gaming compacts

themselves would be at risk," said Bregman. "It just doesn't make any sense to have a new license holder until the La Mesa appeal is decided."

The petition for the injunction states that the Racing Commission revoked La Mesa's license for two inappropriate reasons; one, that it failed to obtain a license to operate gaming machines from the NM Gaming Control Board; and two, that it failed to hold live horse races by Memorial Day 2010. However, La Mesa did receive a license from the Gaming Control Board, which was later revoked for not holding horse races.

"La Mesa has built a temporary casino in Raton, and remains committed and ready to complete the racetrack," said President Michael Moldenhauer. "We have every hope that our appeal will be successful and that we can proceed with the building of the racetrack and casino."

Page said of the Osos. "I went to Rotary and talked to them about sponsorship. We need sponsors. This does not run without the support of the community."

Page said he has plans to get more community support and sponsorships.

"I think he (Woods) was charging too much, which is why he wasn't getting sponsors," Page said. "I mean \$5,000 for a four-by-eight banner is too much. I think our community can't support that."

"Right now I am looking at anywhere between \$1,000 and \$1,500 for a banner and then a half-banner and a quarter banner," he said. "We are going to have some give-a-ways. I have to go and get this, some tickets to concerts. I have to go to the Inn of the Mountain Gods."

Page talked about some target contests. "Hit the ball here and win."

"There are things that we can do to put fans in the stands," Page said.

Fans in the stands equals money to pay salaries and other expenses for the Osos. The changes Ruidoso Parks and Recreation made to restrict access to the field so the Osos could charge admission will also benefit the high school baseball team, according to Page.

"They will be able to charge a gate, which they should have always been able to do," Page said. "The changes benefit all of us. And that is what we are trying to do, benefit all of us, the community, the high school kids, the little league kids and the players in the league."

There had been some question about the Osos players getting paid by Woods.

"The players were getting paid, just not always on time," Page said.

Woods said in an interview with the *Ruidoso News* on Tuesday that the Village of Ruidoso or the Pecos League would take over operation of the team. Page said the Village has no stake in the team.

"We have a lease for the field with them and that is the only tie we have with them, as far as I am aware," Page said. "The lease was that the Parks and Rec personnel would take care of the field. As far as any other obligation, I don't know that there is one."

Page is married to the sister of Village of Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Director Debbie Jo Almager.

"She is only involved because of Parks and Rec," Page said. "She does help with promoting through facebook and those type of things. She helps us with the little functions we have here. She wants to also see it grow and develop."

Growth and development extends to the players also.

"Ultimately our goal is to get these kids out of here and let them continue to chase that dream," Page said. "For me, honestly, I am living that dream. I will never be able to play ball again."

Team supporters have been debating how to get better attendance at the games. Selling beer and installing lights are the two most frequent suggestions.

"I don't necessarily think beer is the answer, but lights, definitely," Page said. "Beer would help but I don't think you have to have it to make it go. I think there is a fun, family atmosphere without the alcohol that people can enjoy."

Page said the 4:05 p.m. start time was a problem both during the week and on weekends.

"People don't get off work until 5:30 or 6 o'clock," Page said. "Right now we are competing with the Track for the crowd."

Page said attendance was pretty good at Wednesday's game, for a Wednesday afternoon.

"Sixty or 70 people, that's pretty good for a Wednesday afternoon," Page said.

Today the Osos start even earlier. They rescheduled a Saturday game to make a double header for today with a first game start time of 1 p.m.

"A couple of reasons for that," Page said. "Alpine plays the same kind of stretch we do in their schedule. They would have to be traveling back home to play a game at their place if they played on Saturday. They did the same thing for us when we were there, so we felt obliged to help them out."

The original schedule called for a Saturday afternoon game.

"We could have had a double header on Saturday, which might have benefited us more as far as gate, but our pitchers would have less time to rest before our next game," Page said. "We decided that we would give them a day off before we start our next series."

The Roswell Invaders come to Ruidoso to play the Osos on Sunday at 4:05 p.m.

## Capitan residents question development

While a preliminary review of annexing more than 1,300 acres to Capitan for an envisioned residential subdivision was withdrawn from the agenda of the Capitan Planning Board Tuesday, some residents still spoke up about Conquest Investments' plans.

A discussion of Conquest's commercial plans along U.S. Highway 380, on the east side of the village, opened the door for some discussion of the overall development plans.

Planning Board member Tracy Allred said the village needed an annexation policy.

"What do you want to do with it?" Allred asked the developers.

Conquest Investments' development supervisor Melissa Gorham said that question was the reason the residential part of the development was removed from the board's agenda.

"We'll have a Power-Point presentation. We'll have a master plan that lays out potential land use. Roadways with a map showing flood zones."

But the commercial part of the development brought

questions from some of the about two dozen meeting attendees.

Water, sewer and visual issues were raised about the one-half acre plus business park lots. The sustainability of the development was also questioned.

"The board of trustees in determining that half-acre tracks are able to be done if the developer is able to provide the infrastructure for water and sewers," said Eric Collins, Conquest Investments' engineer and surveyor. "These will be all commercial tracts with restrictive covenants."

The visual component of the business park was also addressed by Collins.

"Myself and Melissa Gorham, who is another partner of the team helping out and kind of seeing what the community is looking at as far as within Mainstreet. And how to keep everything kind of nice and make sure that we're kind of matching with wants. There's no trees whatsoever. So we want to get some trees up."

Collins said the platted 37-lot commercial development would probably start with 20 lots.

"We're not going to build everything at once. Whenever you do any kind

of subdivision or commercial development you might plot 30-something lots but it's going to take you 10 or 15 years to actually build it out. So we'll probably do the first phase over here (on the west side of the 21-acre commercial tract) and get the utilities and water and everything to this site over here and depending on how things are going, we'll come over here and take care of this over here."

### Viability

The viability of the commercial development was questioned by several in the audience.

"Why would this be a beautiful thing?" one resident asked of potential of a sparsely used business park.

"I think that's a developer's risk," Collins responded.

"If it's the developer's risk then Capitan doesn't have to supply him with water or anything," was the audience's reply.

Collins said the developer would install infrastructure and village would take over water and sewer lines, as well as roads, following a test period to indicated durability.

"All the businesses in Capitan are dying," said

resident Harold Macaw. "I've seen it. I've been here. We've tried to promote business for 15 years and it will not happen with the system we've got going right now in our City Hall."

Macaw said he is for growth that is monitored. He contended Capitan did not have enough water or sewer treatment capacity for heavy growth.

Collins responded that Conquest Investments had put a water report together for both the commercial and residential aspects of the envisioned development and there is adequate water.

"I'm not against growth," Macaw said. "But the only thing I'm against is these people out here in this subdivision (an already established Capitan subdivision). They were entitled to sewer many years ago. And nobody put in sewers for them. They've been paying their taxes for I don't know how many years."

Collins reiterated that Heritage Trails will put in water lines and sewer collectors for its development.

"That's one thing as far as developers in the past who put in the subdivisions and didn't provide the infrastructure. We're pro-

viding the infrastructure for any lots that we're doing here. That land (commercial section) is already annexed so you're required to provide water."

### Sales

Questioned about anticipated sales of the commercial lots, Gorham said market research was being looked at.

"We're actually working on understanding if we're going to be approved," Gorham said. "It will happen in phases as the market allows it to happen. That will determine how quickly we expect it to sell."

Capitan resident Virginia Jones raised a scenario of only one-third of the commercial development sold and the remainder sitting without business for eight years.

"It's not hurting anyone except the developer," Collins responded.

Another resident questioned the wisdom of building more when there are plenty of properties for sale in Capitan.

On the idea of hundreds of new homes on the 1,300 acres of adjacent land, a resident asked where that many people would work. The developer was asked to "be realistic."

Gorham said the developer was taking all the responsibility, including looking out for the community.

"Gosh, we're going above and beyond your standards. We want to improve your community," Gorham said.

Near the end of the meeting, Jones asked to read a prepared statement about the 1,300 acres of land that Conquest has asked to be annexed to Capitan. She noted however the annexation had not really been discussed during the meeting.

Collins balked at having the statement read because the residential component was removed from the agenda.

"And the other problem I have with it is you've already made you decision on everything before even listening to us," Collins told Jones. "By putting this together, you've already made your decision. No matter how positive we were tonight, how negative you are going to be toward this whole project."

A presentation on the residential component of the development is expected to go before the Capitan Planning Board in the future.

## Learning to know what she is thinking

In ranch country where the cow-calf operations are in their most flourishing mode of branding the year's new calf crop, there is an age-old skill that goes unheralded among everyone except the cowboy crowd.

"Mammying up" baby calves is the necessary chore of helping them find their mother, or vice-versa, after being separated for any given reason such as branding. The job takes time and patience on the cowboy's part, as well as a sharp sense of reading a cow and calf's actions, intentions and natural communication.

While this event takes place, the entire herd is held in place by the crew assembled for the day's work. This can involve men, women and children of various sizes, ages and ability and usually some combination of all those.

Holding herd for a cattle-sort of any kind is often considered menial labor. I suppose if you take into account you sit for hours using not much brain power, enduring the dust, wind, heat, and laborious long hours, it can be classified as such.

What the untrained eye misses is the keen sense of "cow sense" that is exhibited by the cowman that quietly rides through the herd looking for each pair, mom and baby, as they acknowledge each other in a secret, natural language.

I happened to be a kid lucky enough to watch and learn from some of the best at that particular job. Quiet men who taught

by doing, not by saying. I never really knew I was learning anything until the time came that I needed to be in the right place at the right time. Instinct kicked in and it happened just like I knew what I was doing.

Not every momma cow cares about searching for her young and not every calf is in the mood to find his momma, especially when it's just been branded, vaccinated and maybe even castrated. It would really rather just lay in the shade and rest up. So the "mammying" takes time that means nothing to the cattle.

The hours tend to drag when you are holding herd. You'll see the pocket knives come out as herd holders begin to carve on the calluses on their hands or clean their finger nails like there

will be a hygiene inspection later. The tobacco can lids flash in the sun as chews are freshened and spitting tobacco in every direction including between your horse's ears becomes an Olympic event.

Every now and then a cowboy, not one to remain anti-social for long, will ease over to another puncher and strike up a conversation. All the while, he'll be keeping one eyeball on the herd so as not to be slack in his duty.

As a kid, holding herd was a job expected of me, not verbalized. I just knew. Endless hours of sitting, twisting around in my saddle, braiding my horse's mane, looking around, daydreaming and just generally being a kid.

Today, I know the experience to be fertile ground for learning so many things. Quiet patience came a little slower, but the ability to read what a cow is thinking before she does it soaked in like the summer sun.

Lessons learned and treasured always.

# Amanda Franklin, Princess of Airshows

Amanda Michelle (Younkin) Franklin, 25, of Neosho, MO., passed away at the Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio, TX, on May 27, 2011, due to complications from burns received in an aviation accident.

Amanda was born on March 14, 1986 in Springdale, AR., to Jeanie and the late Bobby Younkin. She was a very accomplished gymnast, musician, animal welfare advocate, and aviation enthusiast. After learning to fly at the age of 16, Amanda became an accomplished multi-engine and tail wheel pilot; she became proficient in over 15 different types of airplanes.

As a little girl, Amanda traveled with her father Bobby to airshows across the country. It was there that she was first exposed to airshow wingwalking and met the future love of her life, wingwalker Kyle Franklin. She and Kyle started dating on May 22, 2004. The couple traveled the airshow circuit with their fathers as Kyle continued his wingwalking career. They were married on October 18, 2005 and along with her brother Matt, took over the multi-family airshow business that their fathers left behind. Amanda had managed the brothers' airshow sponsors and bookings since 2005. She became Matt's full-time announcer in 2007 and Kyle's full-time wing walker in 2009.

Amanda was patriotic and had the utmost respect for those who put themselves in harm's way in order to protect our freedom. She joined the Commemorative Air Force and also participated for several years in a World War Two style pinup calendar to help preserve the heritage of our country's fallen heroes. Amanda was also a huge supporter of women in aviation. As one herself, she coached and encouraged young girls that she spoke with at airshows to pursue their dreams of becoming a pilot and to never let anyone hold them back. She was a member of the Arkansas ninety-nines, a group of women pilots that dates back to the nineteen thirties. Amanda made a huge impact in a short amount of time on millions of

aviation patrons, airshow fans, and humanity in general. She inspired millions from the young to the young at heart with her amazing wingwalking feats, charming personality, and calendar girl smile. She will be sorely missed by countless people the world over.
