Meeting of Lincoln County Teachers Association, Capitan—April 6th and 7th.

The annual meeting of the Lincoln County Teachers' Association will be held at Capitan on April 6th and 7th, the coming Friday and Saturday. From present indications the meeting will repeat the unqualified success of the past year's gathering, which was so well and widely noticed in the papers of the state at that time. There will be many prominent speakers at the meeting, including the following: Asst. State Supt. John V. Conway, President Endeavor of the Normal School, Prof. D. A. Worcester of the University, Mr. W. T. Conway, State Leader Boys' and Girl Industrial Clubs, and Col. James A. Wilson, Superintendent of the Military Institute. The presence of these distinguished men should guarantee that the teachers of the county shall receive something of value from the meeting.

In connection with the meeting the exhibit of work from the various schools of the county, along lines similar to those followed last year, will occupy much attention and interest. Nearly every school in the county will be represented in the exhibit, which is arranged along competitive lines. Each school competes only with others having the same number of teachers unless at its own desire it enter in a higher class. The people of Capitan, with

their usual hospitality and enthusiasm, are again offering to the teachers and guests of the Association the cordial welcome given them last spring. Accommodations will be provided free for all those attending the meeting and it is the earnest desire of the people of Capitan to show the same hearty hospitality which distinguished the meeting last year. Domestic Science classes of the Lincoln County High School will give a dinner to the visitors on Friday night, and the ladies of the town will repeat the dinner on Saturday night.

One of the features of the Anti-Saloon meeting held here Tuesday afternoon, was the efficient services of Mr. Clement Hightower, who was selected as secretary of the meeting; his wide acquaintance in the county and thorough knowledge of methods of procedure were of inestimable value to the convention, which kept him busy counseling and advising on knotty problems in committee.

Rev. S. C. Vick, a young Baptist preacher, late from Jackson county, Arkansas, has been assigned to a missionary field in this county, which includes Capitan, and will make his headquarters here. Besides Capitan, he will preach at Lincoln Deeso, Mountain View, Alto, and perhaps other points.

C. L. Thompson, of the Richardson neighborhood was a delegate to the Prohibition Convention in Capitan yesterday. He made application to make final proof on his homestead while here.

Another Junior Audobon.

The school in District No. 3 sends me the following letter which speaks for itself:

"We, the pupils of the Ruidoso school met Friday afternoon, March 9, 1917, and organized The Junior Audubon Club, pledging ourselves, to abide by the By-Laws of the organization, and elected the following officers; President, Clara Hunter; Vice-President, Guy Poutch; Secretary and Treasurer, Cora Block.

A paper was read by Clara Hunter about the Chipping Sparrow, after which there was a general discussion by the pupils upon this topic.

The Club will meet each Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, at which time there will be read papers about two different birds, and then will follow a discussion about these birds."

These societies are the source of great improvement to the pupils of any school, and we are glad to see this important subject receiving attention among teachers. In the study of the various species of birds found in our midst many useful things may be learned, and the killing of offensive little birds will be prevented. If we had a greater number of certain kinds of birds, the pestiferous insects would not be anything like so numerous.

A new state bank is to open at Carlsbad.
"Dress-Up" week at Deming begins March 31st.

Two new banks at Lordsburg have filed articles of incorporation.
The Granite Peak Copper Company has been incorporated with a capital of \$250,000.

Bids for the new Clovis school building were considerably above the \$30,000 bond issue.

The contract for the erection of the new high school at Santa Fé has been let for \$30,000.

The seventh annual Northern New Mexico fair will be held in Raton on Sept. 25, 26, 27, 28 this year.

The November Mining Company is hauling lead-silver ore to the loading station at Steins for shipment.

It is understood that another big corporation is in process of formation in the Burro Mountain mining district.

Workmen have begun the repairs on the Tansill dam, which was materially damaged by floods almost a year ago.

T. J. Guilford of Albuquerque has been appointed secretary of the Federal Farm Loan Bank located at Wichita, Kan.

A flock of goats numbering about 580, belonging to Manuel Torres, burned to death near the Hutchison saw mill in Boca cañon.

The Burros Development Company, office at Silver City, filed articles of incorporation in Santa Fé, its capital stock being \$600,000.

The Australian ballot law passed by the last Legislature was signed by Governor Lindsey. It will become effective in ninety days.

Rev. A. M. Baker, lately of Silver City and now of Las Cruces, has undertaken the erection of a new Presbyterian church at Las Cruces.

Judge Colin Neblett of the United States Court has appointed J. B. McChes of Roswell as his official court stenographer and private secretary.

The home of George H. Webster, jr., on the Urracca, in western Colfax county, was destroyed by fire while Mr. and Mrs. Webster were in Raton.

The Elephant Butte reservoir is to be stocked with perch, black bass and croppies, according to the recently appointed game warden, Theodore Rouault.

Federal Judge Colin Neblett at Santa Fé fined Leandro Leon \$300 and costs for shipping sixty cases of whiskey not labeled from El Paso to New Mexico.

Irving Gibbs Stephenson, the 4-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John R. Stephenson, was burned to death at Portales, in a fire that destroyed the Stephenson barn.

The citizens' training camp for the instruction of civilians in military matters will be held in Las Vegas, on the National Guard range, July 21 to August 20.

The governor appointed Reed Holloman, C. W. Botts of Albuquerque, and J. M. Hervey of Roswell as the commission on uniform legislation, under House Bill 449.

W. M. Duke of Rainbridge, Ga., has leased a three-section ranch from R. L. Hicks of Tucumcari and has also bought 150 head of Hereford stock cattle, paying \$8,000 for the stock.

A. B. Smith, alias Dasley, was convicted at Las Cruces of murder in the first degree. Smith was one of several prisoners who escaped from the Luna county jail more than a year ago and afterwards engaged in a gun fight with Sheriff Dwight B. Stephens and a posse. Sheriff Stephens was killed.

The final figures for the wool production last year by New Mexico are given as 18,240,000 pounds as against 18,620,000 pounds the year before, according to the monthly crop reporter of the Department of Agriculture.


