A Visit to Roswell.

[Continued from last week.]

I paid a visit to the furniture store of Mr. Clark Dilly. If you have never been in Dilly's furniture store, the first time you go to Roswell you should go through that immense establishment, whether you wish to buy anything in the furniture line or not. Mr. Dilly showed me through all the departments of his store and every line pertaining seemed full and complete. The thing that impressed me most, aside from the size of the establishment, is the superior quality of the goods. In that store everything that bears any relation to the furniture trade can be found and the prices are right in all lines. Mr. Dilly took me to the rear portion of his store, where there are several separate departments, among which is his undertaking business. There is a dressing room, a chapel for the use of funeral services, both elegantly furnished. There I saw burial caskets of beautiful designs, with prices ranging as high as \$1,500. Mr. Dilly has a large trade and it is continually extending. He told me that he had recently sold the full outfit to furnish the large hotel now being built in Carrizozo and of several other large bills at a distance. He is one of the most pleasant gentlemen with whom you can come in contact and to meet him is to appreciate his social and business qualities. Clark Dilly is a "live wire"—he believes in Roswell and I doubt if there is another man in that city who has done and is doing more for its progress and prosperity than he. I saw evidence of this when I was there. He was leading movement towards raising a bonus to bring another railroad into that city.

The Roswell Hardware Co., which has an advertisement in this paper, is one of the big mercantile institutions of that city. It has a great local trade, and also does a fine wholesale business. You can find everything in that store which such an extensive establishment is expected to carry, and those who deal there say that their prices are most reasonable. I met Messrs. Johnson and Pruitt, members of his firm, two of the most courteous gentlemen to be found anywhere and who gave me an ad to be placed in the Mountaineer.

I dropped into the Huff Jewelry Store. There I met Mr. Hugh M. Huff the manager, who is a very pleasant gentleman and appears to be a fine business man. This house carries a fine line of goods, consisting of diamonds, watches, jewelry and does fine repairing. This is a splendid place to buy anything wanted in the jewelry line and when you are in Roswell and wish to purchase you can find no better place to go.

I also paid the jewelry establishment of L. B. Boelner a call. This house carries a large line of goods to meet its wholesale and retail trade. Its stock of watches, silverware, etc., is very extensive, and general repair work is done there; besides, Mr. Boelner is an optician and can fit you up with glasses, according to the requirements of your eyes.

The Owl Drug Company is another house I visited. I met Mr. W. E. Wilson, one of the proprietors of the establishment, and had a pleasant talk with him. In speaking of range conditions in the country, Blackleg among cattle was mentioned. In his office in the Citizens National Bank I met Capt. John W. Poe, president of the bank. He is the best known citizen in Roswell and has done a great deal towards making that city what it is. He is not only a man of local reputation, but is well known throughout the state of New Mexico. Capt. Poe is a Missourian and first set led in Texas, but it is said at the instance of Chas. A. Siringo, author of that popular book entitled "A Cow Boy Detective," Capt. Poe moved to Lincoln county, New Mexico. At that Lincoln county embraced a vast territory, and which history

says was a wild, lawless country. Capt. Poe was here during the Lincoln County War, and was with Pat Garrett when he killed Billy the Kid. He succeeded Garrett as sheriff of Lincoln county, and served nearly two terms, resigning to look after his private business which required all his time. He had then acquired the VV Ranch property in this county which was afterwards purchased by the Grees. He established a ranch on the Pecos, just east of Roswell, which became known as the LFD's, and it was while owning this ranch that Capt. Poe planted the trees that now so beautifully adorn a stretch of highway leading into Roswell, known as "Lovers' Lane." Capt. Poe is largely interested in Roswell enterprises. He organized the First National Bank and was elected its president; he afterwards sold his stock in that institution and organized the Citizens' National Bank, of which he was the first and only president that bank has ever had. Capt. Poe has never been an office seeker. I am told that he could have had the democratic nomination for Governor before now, but he refused to let his name be used in that connection, preferring to continue an active business career. I will say this much, if he could be induced to accept the nomination for Governor by the democratic party in the next campaign he would be a standard bearer who could. He possesses all the qualifications to give the people an able, clean, business administration.

At the Citizens' National Bank I also formed the acquaintance of State Senator J. S. Lea, who is vice president of that bank. Senator Lea is also a native of Missouri, being born and raised in Johnson county that state. If I have a partiality for any class of people it is for Missourians, because I was raised in that state, and when I met Senator Lea I soon felt as though I had met an old acquaintance in whose friendship I could confide. Johnson county, Missouri, has the distinction of being the home of many prominent families, some of whose members greatly distinguished themselves in war, statesmanship and in the legal profession. Among them may be mentioned Capt. J. C. Lea, cousin of Senator J. S. Lea, founder of Roswell the man for whom Lea county is named, and whose memory is held sacred by every old settler in eastern New Mexico, was born and raised there, and from there went into the Confederate army. It was the home of the Cockrell family. Francis M. Cockrell, who served more than thirty years in the United States Senate from Missouri, was born, raised and made that county his home until his death a few months ago; his brother, the late Judge J. V. Cockrell, of Abilene, Texas, who represented the old 13th district of Texas two terms in Congress, was born and reared in Johnson county, as also his two sons, Fred and Joseph E. Cockrell, prominent lawyers in Texas. The list of prominent Missourians, natives of Johnson county, could be largely extended, but that is unnecessary here. Senator Lea settled in Lincoln county about the same time that Capt. Poe came here. He served as deputy sheriff during "Pat Garrett's" terms of office as sheriff; and was continued in that capacity during the terms of Capt. Poe. He knows all the old settlers in this part of the country, and knew many of those now dead whose lives form an important part in the country's history, and his reminiscences are intensely interesting. Senator Lea has been very instrumental in the

building up of Roswell, has served the people as mayor, and is now that districts representative in the state senate.

I met my good friend Judge W. W. Gatewood, but it was only for a few minutes. He was just getting ready to leave for Carlsbad to attend district court and I couldn't detain him. It is always a pleasure to me to meet this courteous gentleman for his greetings are so genial and his conversation so entertaining. Judge Gatewood is at the head of the Roswell and has long been recognized as one of the leading lawyers in New Mexico, and no other lawyer in the state

has had greater success in his practice.

After spending three pleasant days in Roswell I left on my mail car Thursday morning for Captain. E. L. Omor drove his car and his drill and original remarks kept the passenger in fine spirits all the way up the line.

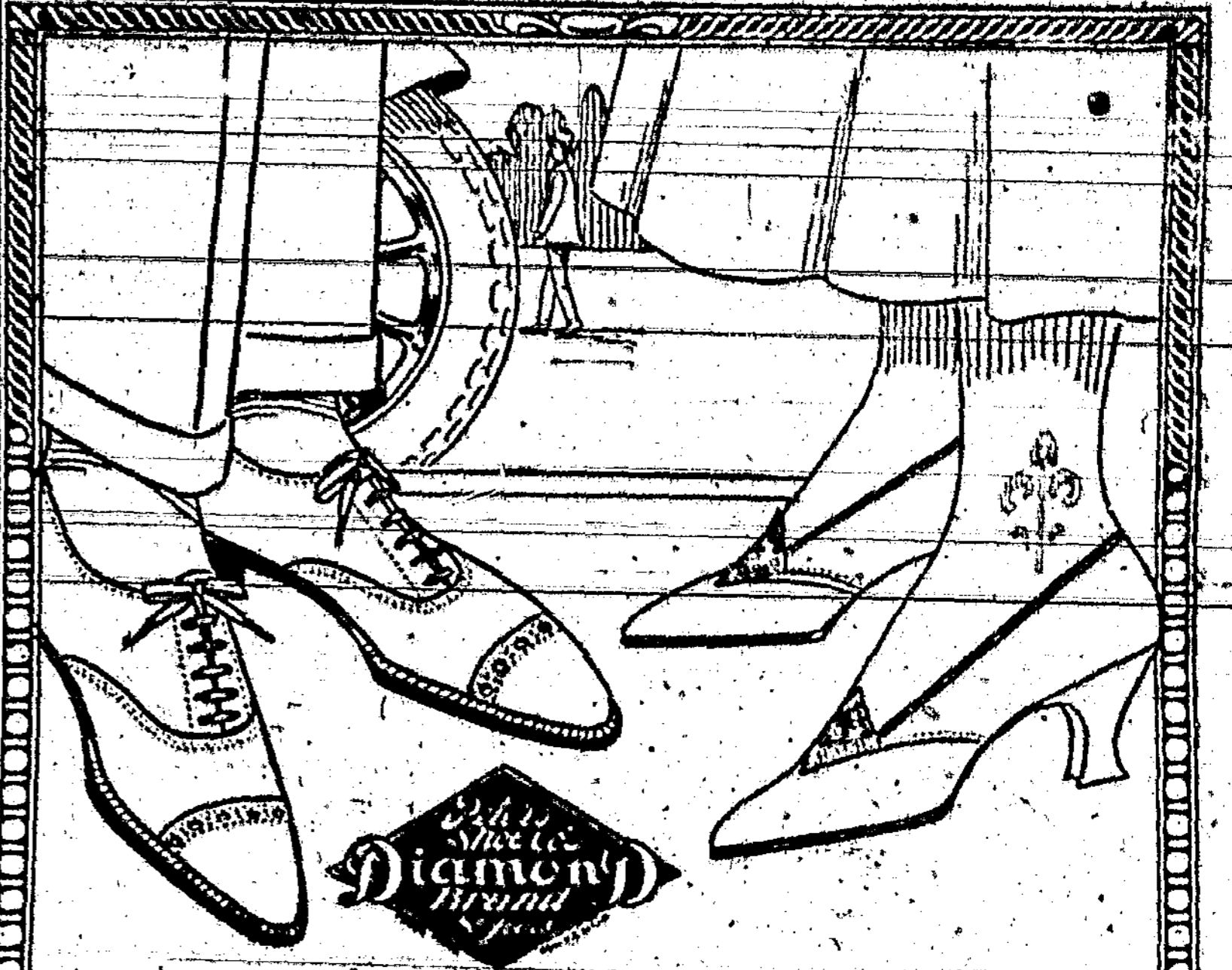
