### Open Gambling.

Some eminent legal mind has recently made the discovery that open gambling in New Mexico is no offense and the consequence is that gambling is carried on openly in nearly every saloon in the state. In the recent election the people of New Mexico voted the whiskey traffic out of the state and on the first of next October the saloon men will have to quit business—that is, the whiskey business. In the late election the prohibition cause had no more ardent supporter than our Governor, W. E. Lindsey. Now that the people have said by their votes that the whiskey traffic shall not be carried on in the state, why not take a step further and say that gambling shall also be stopped, or made an offense. Open gambling is even more detrimental to society than the whiskey traffic, and should be speedily stopped. It is surprising that our Governor has not seen the way to stop it before this time. He could readily convene the legislature in extra session, have the Attorney General, and if necessary appoint other able lawyers assist him, and let a bill be drafted that will stand the test in the courts and ask the legislature to enact it into a law, which would no doubt be done, and by this means open gambling could be made a thing of the past in less than sixty days.

### Sugar Enough For All.

Santa Fe, N. M., January—The forthcoming advent of the new crop of sugars into the market means ample sugar for everybody if the confectioners and manufacturers of non-essential food products will cooperate with the Food Administration in reducing the sugar content of their products and not forcing the manufactured articles on the market.

The Food Administration announces that with the coming of the expected ample supply, probably in a few weeks, the allowance of confectioners will be increased from fifty to eighty per cent of their normal requirements. The sugar division makes the statement as the result of the pressing demand of the manufacturers to know if it would be necessary to make wholesale reductions in their staff of workers with the consequent hardship to the reduction.

The increase in allowance, according to a statement by Food Administrator Hoover, will last only so long as the manufacturers cooperate by reducing sugar content, using honey and glucose and other substitutes so far as possible. It is stated by Mr. Hoover that eventually it may be necessary to reduce the allowance below eighty per cent, but if so it is desired to do so gradually so as to cause the least amount of hardship.

The expected ample supply through the "close approach of new crop sugars" is a vindication of the Food Administration sugar policy and the fulfillment of its promise, despite the charges of Spreckles and other refiners who through the shipping shortage and failure to get export licenses were unable to send their sugar to a \$17 instead of a \$7 market. The sugar control plan has prevented a serious shortage and there is no prospect of such shortage if manufacturers cooperate as requested and if the consuming public buys conservatively and only as needed.

Other shippers' associations and many large growers have recognized the trend of events, and have graded all their potatoes, even had the Food Administration not required it. Be up to date, then, and grade your potatoes.

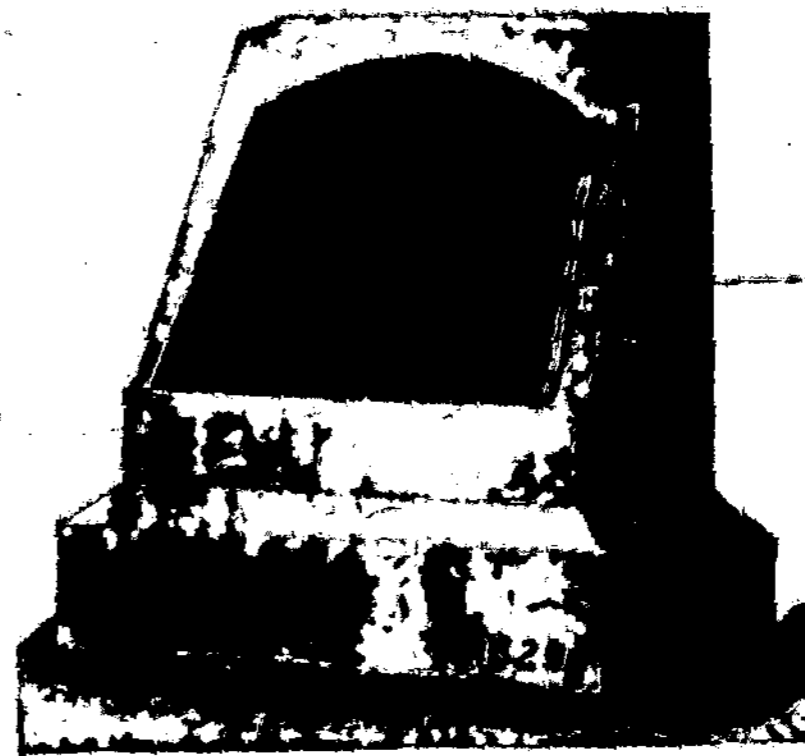

### Good Legislation.

Washington, D. C., April 20—The Indian Appropriation Bill, the conference report of which has been agreed to by both the Senate and House of Representatives, is of more than usual interest to the people of New Mexico this year.

It contains a provision that no Indian Reservation shall be created nor shall any additions be made to one heretofore created within the limits of the states of New Mexico and Arizona, except by act of Congress. This removes a question which for many years has been a most serious one in this state, and prohibits the creation and enlargement of Indian reservations by departmental action and executive proclamation, leaving the matter where it belongs, with the duly elected representatives in Congress. The provision was introduced in the Senate by Senator Smith of Arizona, and was energetically and vigorously supported by the entire New Mexico delegation in both branches.

The bill also carries an appropriation of \$98,500 for the Albuquerque School, \$85,450 for the Santa Fe School, \$25,000 for continuing work for the Indian highway extending from the Hosa Verde National Park to Gallup, \$4,000 additional appropriation to the building of a steel bridge across the San Juan River near Farmington, and \$16,000 to assist in the construction of a wagon road between Tularosa and the Mesquite Indian Reservation.

## WATER CANNOT BE DIVERTED FROM ONE AREA TO ANOTHER

### Canyon City Judge Makes Permanent Injunction.

Judge Champlon, of Canyon Colo., has issued the following order, which in effect says that water cannot be diverted from one area to another, and would apply to the situation in Lincoln county as well as that country. We copy the following from a Canyon City:

"In the district court this morning Judge Champlon issued an order making permanent a temporary injunction issued by Judge M. S. Bailey two years ago, whereby Fred Kelling, water commissioner, is restrained from diverting five cubic feet of water from the flow of Big Creek in the west end of this county to land owned by A. T. Hatley in another water shed.

"Several years ago Hatley petitioned the court for a decree conveying to him the title to the water in question but it was denied on the ground that water for irrigation purposes could not be conveyed from drainage area to another. Ranchers near Hillside in the Wet Mountain valley have opposed the diversion of this water and the settlement of the case today which for years has been in litigation, is a matter of great satisfaction to them."

### Letter from E. M. Brickley.

Carrizozo, New Mexico, May 1, 1918. Capitan Mountaineer—On April 24th, as Secretary of the County Board of Education I went to Capitan and arranged with the teachers there to close their schools on Liberty Day and their pupils devote the day to the sale of Liberty Bonds. I gave them some literature and made some suggestions as to how to proceed. Their efforts surpassed all expectations; they took hold of the thing and sold 39 bonds with a total subscription of \$2,550. I feel that some mention should be made of this, for aside from the subscriptions taken by Mr. R. E. P. Warden and myself on Liberty Day, I feel sure that they did better than any other Committee in the County. Mr. Warden and I took \$5,000 on Liberty Day, but sold to far less people.

In case you care to publish the letter I have written the teachers and the pupils on behalf of the County Board you may do so, but believe if this is not done, some comments should be made, as they deserve it. I enclose copy of my letter herein. Yours very truly,

### Food Will Win The War.

It is becoming more apparent to all that the deciding factors in the world war will be food and ammunition, and food is the most important of the two. It is, therefore, the duty of each and every one of us to co-operate with the food administration to the full extent of our ability. It should be clearly understood that we are not asked to deny ourselves sufficient food or to give up any portion of our supplies without remuneration. We are only asked to eliminate all waste, cut down our consumption on sugar and fats and use some other staple food products instead of wheat foods, pork, beef, etc. Corn meal can easily take the place of wheat foods to such an extent as to create a sufficient surplus to insure an ample supply to send abroad. A slight curtailment of our consumption of sugar fats and wheat foods will work no hardship on any of us. It is estimated that there is 20,000,000 families in the United States. If each family would save the equivalent of one loaf of bread per day by using corn bread to that extent or increase the use of corn meal to that extent it would mean that the amount of flour necessary to make a 120,000,000 loaves of bread per week would be released for shipment abroad. If each family would reduce their consumption of sugar to three-fourths of the usual amount it would insure a supply of sugar that would be ample for all requirements. When we think of the hardships and suffering that our friends in the trenches are enduring and realize that soon large numbers of the best of the manhood of our country will soon be engaged in the terrible struggle, it seems that each and every one of us should gladly make the trivial sacrifices asked us along this line and thereby do to some extent a patriotic duty and hasten a decisive termination of the war.

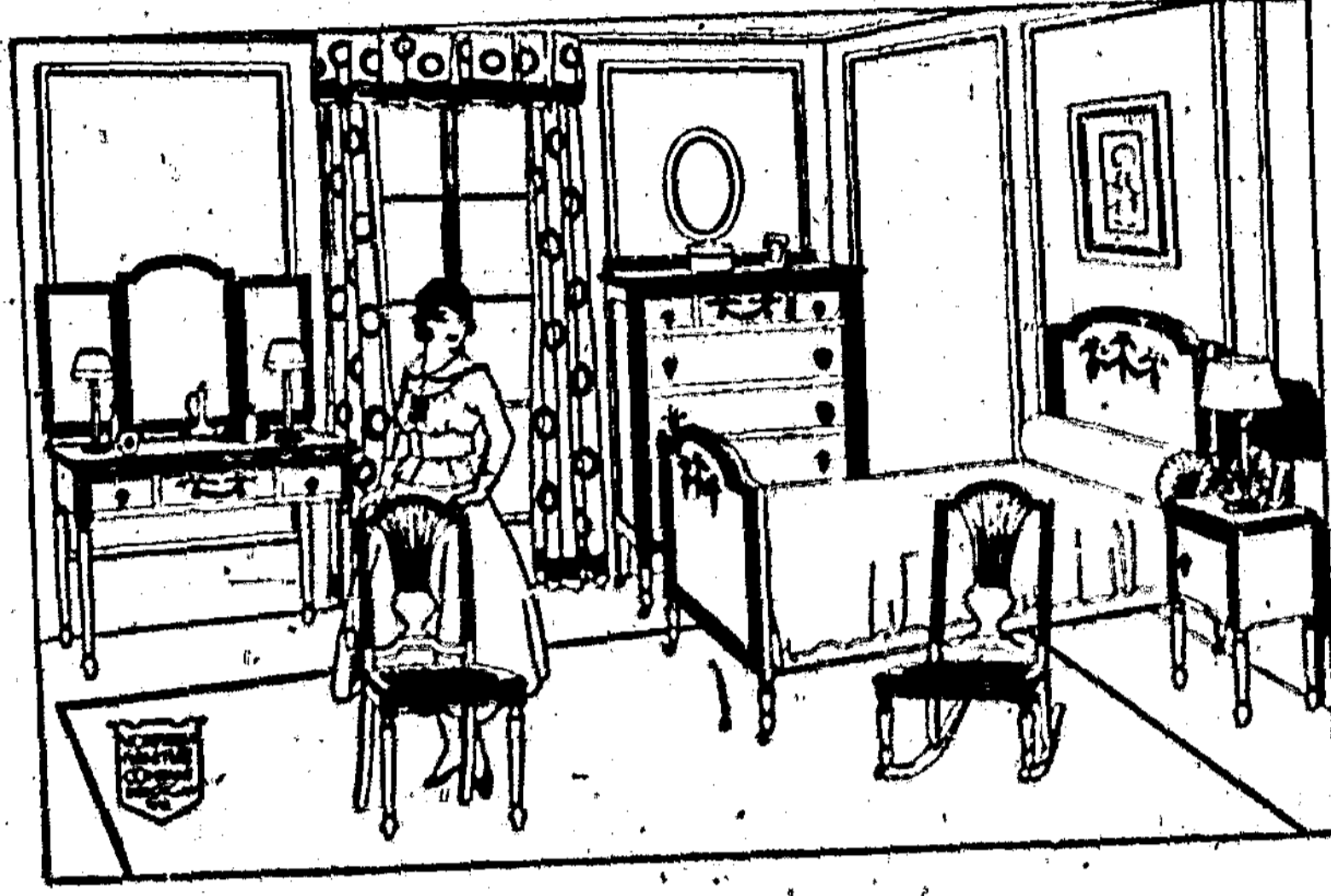

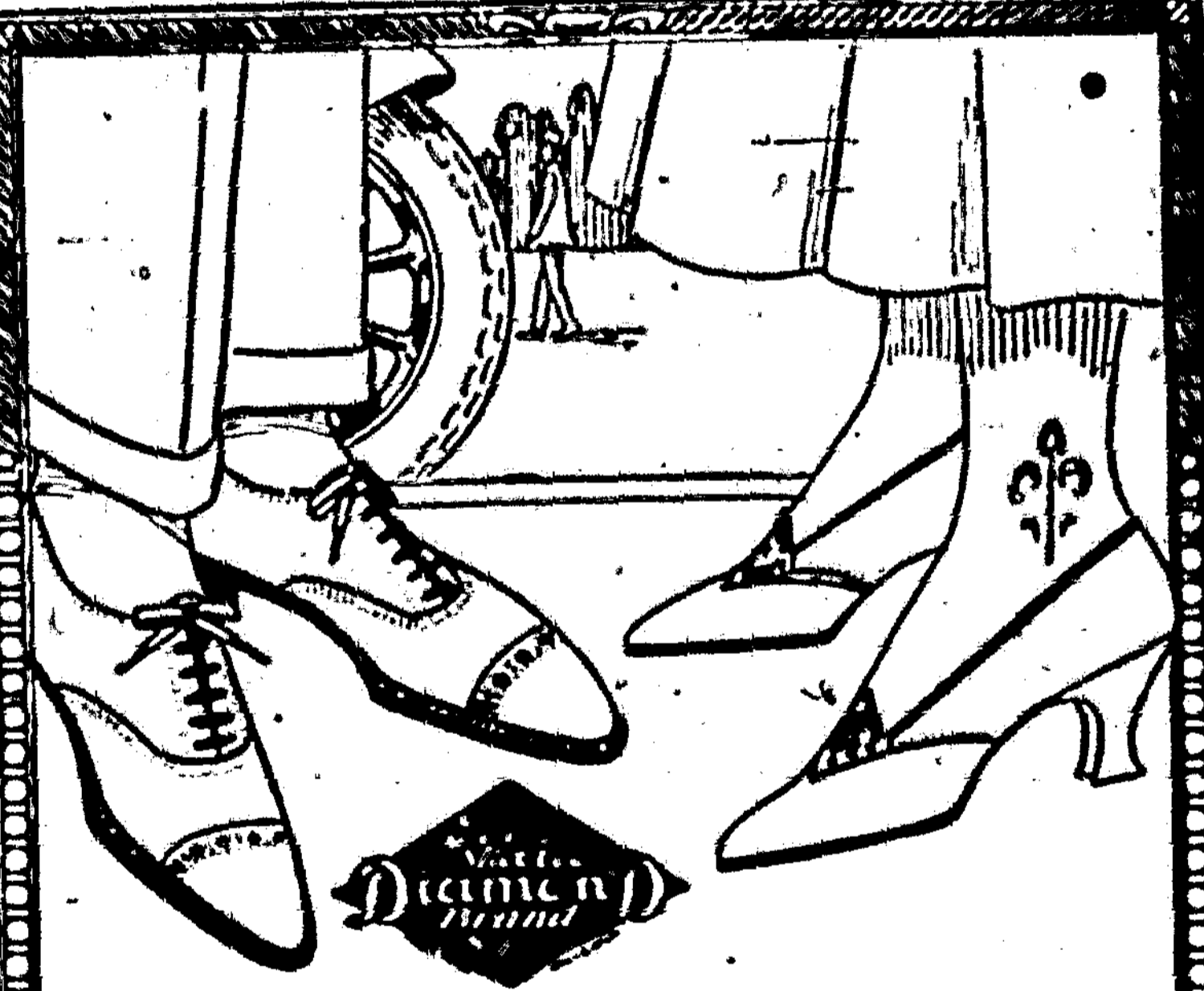

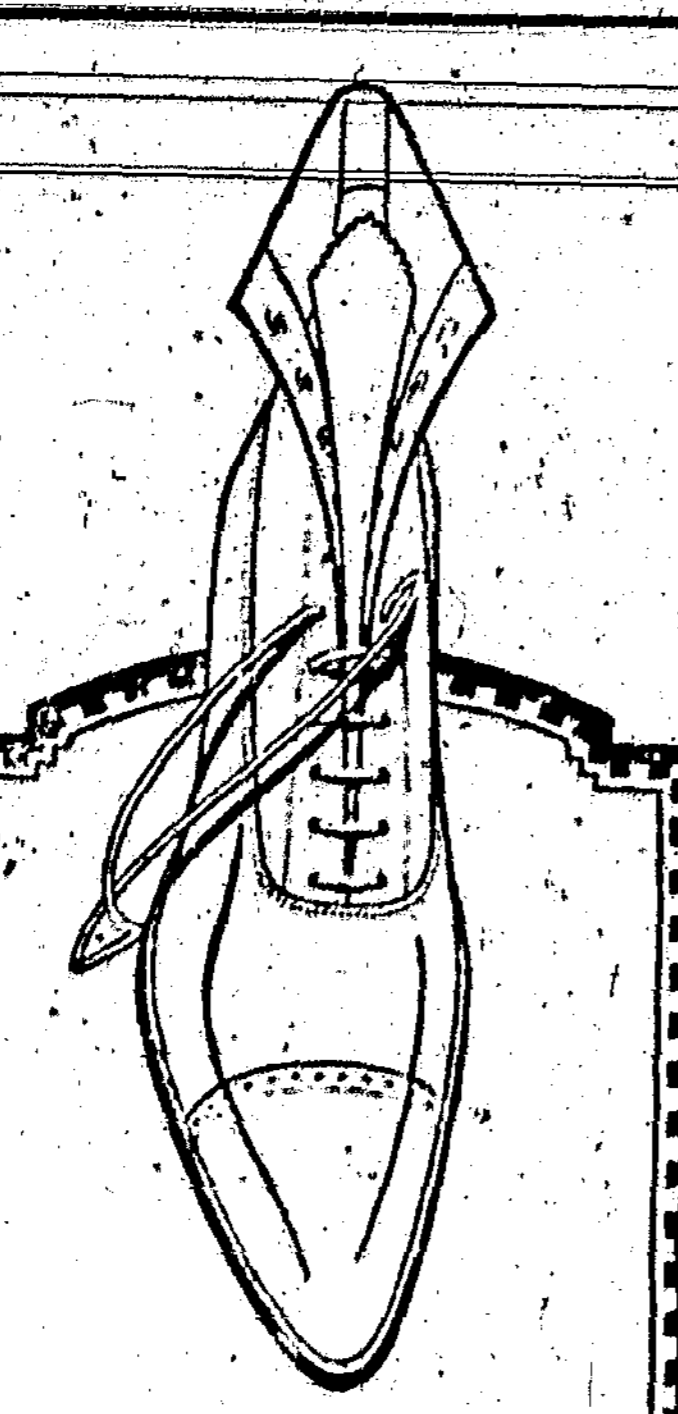
