German Propaganda.

The chronic sore-head and tinker who is at all times more or less opposed to the existing order of things in so far as our government and administrative officials are concerned is at the present time a valuable assistant and an active ally of the German government and unconsciously doing a class of work free of charge that is very difficult for those in charge of the task of spreading German Propaganda to ever give down. The local sore head is most likely of American parentage and would be insulted if accused of being a German sympathizer and most likely thinks he is really a loyal American citizen. But when he neglects to purchase a Liberty Bond, or some Thrift Stamps (all are able to do something along this line), refuses to subscribe the Red Cross fund, or to comply with Mr. Hoover's requests in the matter of food conservation, or makes disparaging remarks regarding any of these matters, or in any way by deed or act obstructs measures deemed necessary by our government for the proper prosecution of the war, he is doing a valuable work for our enemies by showing them that there is to some extent a division of opinion here amongst our own people. If every adult in the United States who has the means was the owner of a Liberty Bond, if all of the balance of the adult population and all of the children would buy Thrift Stamps, if Mr. Hoover's recommendations were being generally observed, in fact if the German Kaiser and officials knew it to be a fact that the entire population of our country were squarely behind President Wilson without any division of opinion whatever in so far as the prosecution of the war is concerned, it would give them a worse chill than the loss of a bunch of U-Boats. The local grouch usually professes his remarks by claiming that some things in our government are not fair or right. It may be true that there are some minor matters of this nature, but if so, this is no time to argue them and thereby embarrass our officials who are engaged in directing our affairs at present. If the war is prolonged for a number of years we will all be compelled to make such sacrifices before it is over that the things we are now asked to do will seem very trivial and were it possible by one. Selfishness and lack of support of our government to allow the Germans to win the war, we would never again have the opportunity to discuss our imaginary grievances, but we would be up against some real ones, and without an opportunity of relief. It would seem, therefore, to be the plain duty of every loyal citizen at this time to try and induce the knocker to bury his hammer for the present and to support all of our war measures to the best of his ability and thereby hasten a satisfactory conclusion of the war.

From the Dark Corner.

Editor, Mountaineer:—This is sent you from the "Lone Hiding Home," which I will hereafter call "The Dark Corner," and from where I will try to send you such news as I may be able to gather.

Well, I took a considerable trip the other on the north side of the Capitans. I found many new gates on the road, and I found Jesse VanWinkle with a bunch of people working the road. He had hands working from seven to seventy-five years old. The little ones looked like ants, pulling and rolling rock out of the road, and it was the happiest crowd I have seen in a long time. I just supposed that they had a big appropriation made them by the Commissioners for the road. But listen, I found out that there was not a dollar for the road. Jesse said it took all the money for the south side, but the people here are not "Shackers," and like the "Field Lark" are going to have a road if it takes every man, woman and child on this side of the mountain to do it. If the court don't help us, we will not sit down and give up having roads, but we will help ourselves, and we will have roads just the same. So, hurrah for Jesse and his crowd.

We expect a little sensation on the first of February. It is to take place in Judge Pendergrass' court, and I will report it for the Mountaineer.

Yes, it looks like we have had snow on the mountain.

Seed for Distribution.

Washington, D. C. Senator Jones has received his allotment of flower and vegetable seed and will be glad to furnish a quantity to those desiring same upon request.

The Department of Agriculture has also advised Senator Jones that they propose to have available a small amount of Kansas Alfalfa, Pendergrass, White Milo and Sudan Grass seed. These seeds are for experimental purposes and are furnished with the understanding that the recipient will report the result. Each package contains a sufficient quantity of seed for a satisfactory field test, and in view of the limited supply not more than one package of any variety can be furnished to an individual. The Senator will be glad to honor all requests so long as the supply is available.

Wheat Storage in France.

According to the Food Administration, shortage of wheat in France is becoming more and more alarming each week. The minister of general reveuening indicated recently that a further reduction of 20 per cent in the bread ration would soon become imperative.

Denmark is now looking forward to a reduction of wheat rations. Final figures for the cereal show a total of about 12,000,000 bushels, which is 20,000,000 less than in 1916 and about 10,000,000 less than was estimated in the summer, when the population was put on bread rations. The authorities are already considering a further reduction in the allowed consumption.

The food situation in Switzerland is rapidly falling to the danger line. A ration is far below the consumption in many of the countries at war has already been ordered. Under the new regulations the Swiss may have only a pound and half of sugar per person per month. The bread ration has been fixed at about half a pound a day, and the butter ration at one fifth of a pound a month.

The latest reports available indicate that the Xmas Drive for ten million new members for the American Red Cross has resulted in addition of fully sixteen million names to its roll. This number added to the more than six million members before Christmas campaign makes the total present enrollment fully twenty-five million. This is a magnificent fact; an expression not alone of patriotism, but of the fine sympathy and idealism of the whole American people. The Red Cross War Council congratulates and welcomes every new member of the Red Cross; likewise it congratulates the officers and the old members of the organization who have given unstintingly of their time and effort to make this membership campaign a success; but the wonderful achievement of enrolling one-fifth of the entire population of the United States as members of the American Red Cross is less a triumph than it is a call to greater service. The Red Cross is not merely a humanitarian organization, separate and distinct from others, but it is the mobilized heart and spirit of the whole American people. 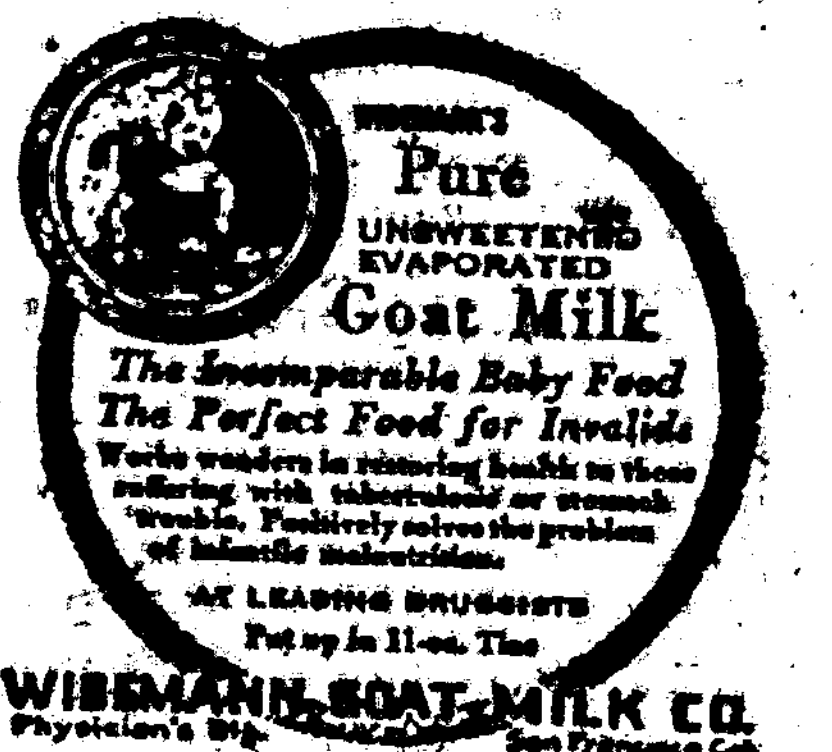

Obituary of Mrs. Lola Sisneros Norman.

Sunset and evening star,
And one clear call for me?
And in my there be no moaning
Of the bar,
When I put out to sea,

In Albuquerque, on the 12th day of January, 1918, at 10:30 a. m. the beloved wife of W. O. Norman passed to the great beyond--beyond the pathless mountains that lift their peaks into the fading distance, where lies a charming valley, dotted all over with flowers of every hue and shade and from which the mellow sunshine of spring never departs.

Mrs. Norman was born in Lincoln, New Mexico on the second day of June, 1867, and was the daughter of Juan Sisneros and Lupe Sanchez Sisneros. Her father was one of the first to settle at Mesquite, now known as the Diamond A Ranch, where he died and was buried in 1872. The mother was born at Manzano, Torrence county, this state, died and was buried at Lincoln.

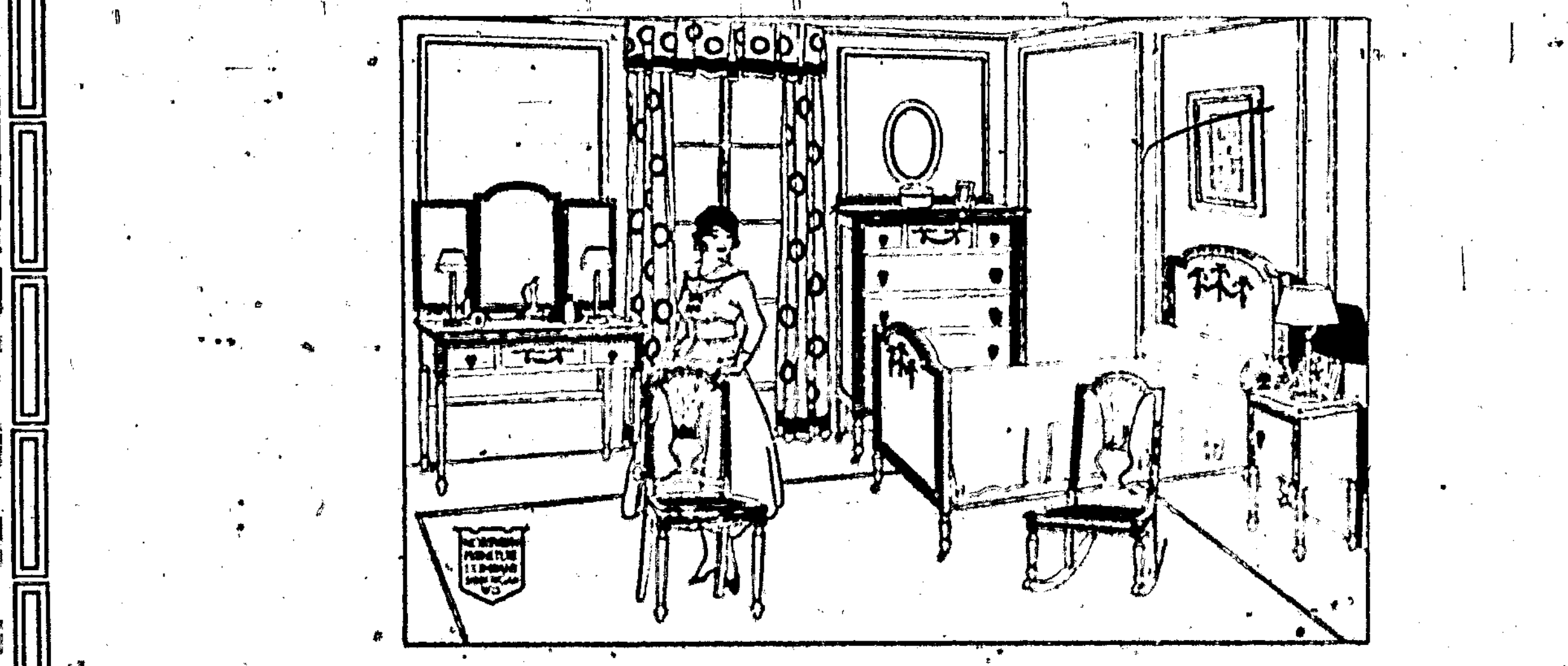
Mrs. Norman's people were among the first settlers of New Mexico. Her great grand parents, on her mother's side, obtained and settled on the Manzano Grant in the now famous Estancia Valley. On the 25th day of May in the year 1892, at Lincoln, Lola Sisneros became the kind and loving wife of W. O. Norman.

Mr. Norman came to New Mexico in 1870 with a party of thirteen photographers, then known as the Norman-Jewell family, of which he is now the only living member. Mr. Norman entered the mercantile business at Lincoln in 1908 and last year he established his large mercantile business in Capitan where he moved but still retains his business in Lincoln.

Mrs. Norman was the mother of eight children. Six of these, Mrs. Cora Gallegos, of Albuquerque, Mary, Willie, Harry, Lupe and Rita, together with Mr. Norman, remain to mourn her loss. The other two children, Ola and Bessie are dead.

Besides her immediate family, Mrs. Norman leaves two sisters, Mrs. Charles Fritz and Mrs. Rebecca Gonzales, and a large number of nieces and nephews, some of whom are as follows: Chas. Fritz, Tillie Fritz, Bessie Fritz, Willie Fritz, Harry Fritz, Eva Fritz, Godfrey Gonzales, Geo. A. Sisneros, of Roswell, Manuel Sisneros, of Carrizozo, and the sons of Ex-Gov. Geo. Curry, namely, Frank Curry, Charlie Curry and Clifford Curry.

The late M. A. Sisneros, who was active in Democratic politics, and was Interpreter for the State Legislature in the early days of New Mexico, was a brother of Mrs. Norman. His widow is now Mrs. S. Anderson of Carrizozo, where his son Manuel also resides.

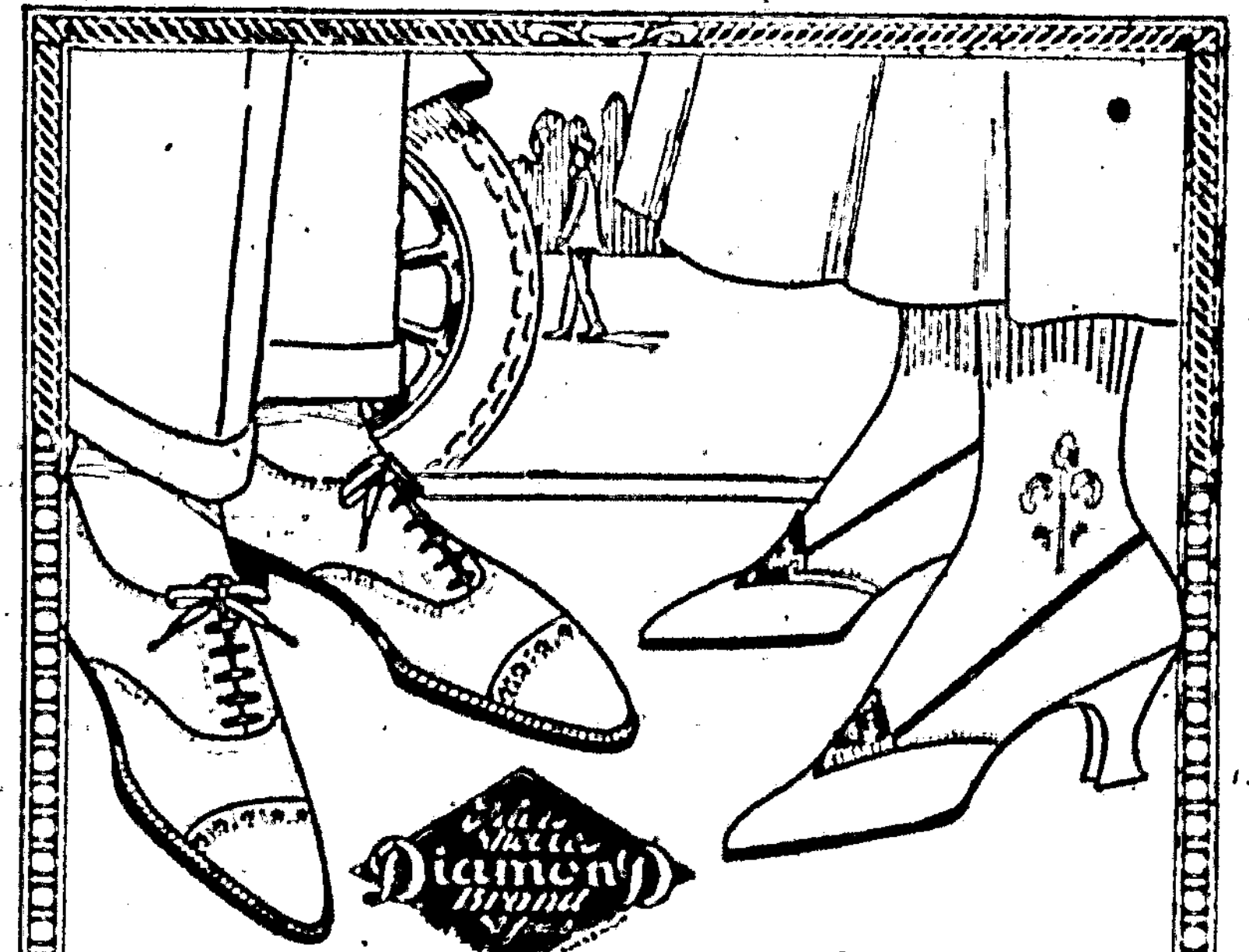

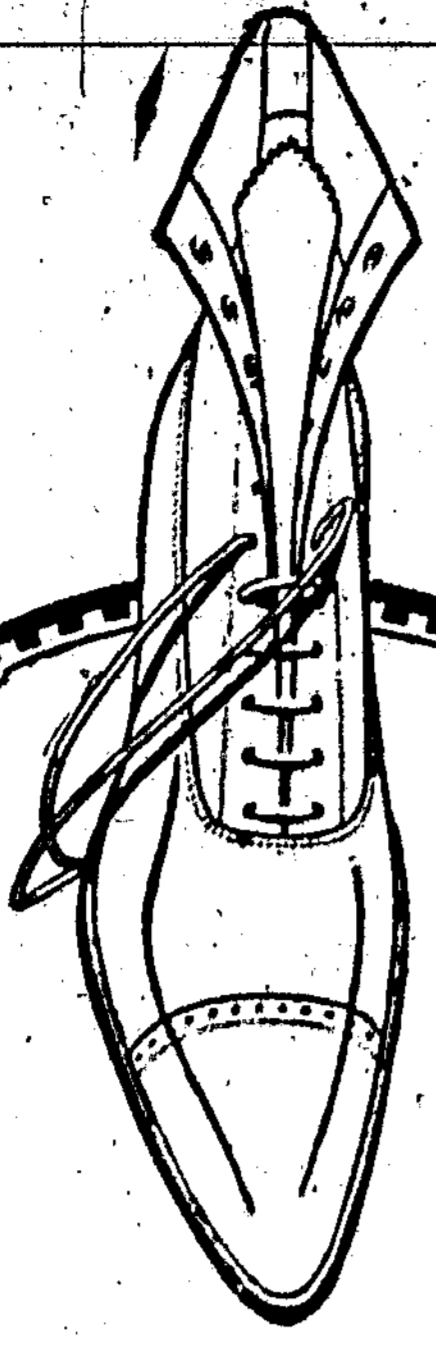
The commissioners court at a session last week made an appropriation for road improvement on the north side of the Capitan mountain which was very much needed.
