Some Political Predictions by an Old Timer.

Mr. Geo. Sena, of Santa Rosa, has been spending two or three days in Capitan this week meeting and greeting old friends and acquaintances. Mr. Sena came to Lincoln county in 1884 when he was nineteen years old and lived here twenty-two years, and during the time he lived here held the offices of sheriff and county clerk. Ten years ago he moved from Lincoln to Guadalupe county, New Mexico, and was the first clerk elected in Guadalupe under statehood and held the office a five year term.

Mr. Sena is now in the Internal Revenue service and is assigned to the Income Tax Department and has a territory composed of Lincoln and Guadalupe counties. He will spend next week in Carrizozo, instead of Mr. Stamy, who was advertised to be there, to assist parties who may need help in making out their schedules. He is well qualified to fill the place he holds and received the appointment on recommendation of Senator A. A. Jones.

Mr. Sena called on the Mountaineer during his stay here and spent an hour or two talking over old times in Lincoln county, the political situation as he sees it at this time, etc. He knows all the public men in New Mexico and has recently traveled over the state a good deal and has had fine opportunities to gather information to form correct conclusions. He predicts that Hon. Thomas B. Catron will be the nominee of the Republican party for United States Senator to succeed Senator Albert B. Fall. He said that it is a delusion to believe that H. O. Burson is politically dead; that it will be seen that Burson will be a very strong factor in the Republican party when the campaign opens and that his nomination for Governor is already forecast.

When asked as to his conclusions regarding the Democratic outlook, Mr. Sena said, we have one man who would be a sure winner if the party should nominate him, and that man is Felix Garcia. You remember he was on our Presidential ticket in the last campaign and added much strength to it, and it was cast for Wilson and Marshall. The three-doubtful electoral votes in New Mexico looked mighty nice on the Wilson side when the margin was so narrow, and Garcia's strength contributed much to that result. Mr. Garcia is clean, able and very popular, and if the Democrats nominate him for Governor he will be, a sure winner.

Mr. Sena was asked if his name would go before the Democratic State Convention for Secretary of State; that such a report has gone out. He said he could not answer that question at the present time. Some of my friends are urging me to make the race for the nomination for Secretary of State, and it's possible I may conclude to do so, but that will be determined later on. I have had public office a good deal of my life, and have gone through the exciting experience in politics for more than thirty years, and I have felt that I would like to live a more quiet life. I own a farm near Santa Rosa, and I want to let on it live the life of a farmer.

The Bank Situation.

It now looks like Capitan may get two banks instead of one. Messrs. Ray and Colby, of Roswell, returned early in the week and have been taking subscriptions for stock and report about \$10,000 subscribed. In the mean time Messrs. Ulrich and Sager of the Exchange in Carrizozo have been here, and we understand also propose putting in a bank in a good building. It will be seen from a statement in this paper, signed by Messrs. Ray and Colby, that a meeting of both parties was held in C. C. Merchant's office today, but no understanding could be reached. A statement from the other side will probably be published in next week's paper, and the situation as it exists will be fully understood by the people.

John B. Burch and Col. W. D. Evans, well known citizens of Pumkin Center motored swiftly through Capitan yesterday en route to Carrizozo where a very important business was taking place. Bill says "Uncle John" has learned to start and steer the car pretty well, but hasn't learned to stop the thing, and has to let it run till the gas burns out.

Another Noble Mother Gone.

Mrs. A. H. Tully died at the home of her son, Senator J. V. Tully, in Glencoe, this county, at 8:30 a. m., February 8th, 1918, was buried in the Glencoe cemetery.

Mrs. Tully was the widow of John Tully, an Architect and Civil Engineer, formerly of Chicago, and lived many years at Aztec, San Juan county, New Mexico, the family being among the early American settlers in the Animas Valley. She was the mother of Mrs. Frank B. Cozend Senator J. V. Tully, of Glencoe, and Kivas Tully, a Civil Engineer and Architect, who died in St. Louis, about two years ago, and had been living with her son J. V. Tully a good many years.

Mrs. Tully was a very devout member of the Episcopal Church, and was often visited by the Rector of the Church in Roswell during the last few years of her life. She was a woman of culture and much reading. The writer met Mrs. Tully nearly two years ago, when she was more than ninety years old, and was deeply impressed and surprised at the brightness of her intellect and the retentiveness of her memory. Few people reach such age and retain their intellectual powers.

A Statement.

G. B. Ray and L. L. Colby, the bank organizers who have secured about \$10,000 in subscriptions for a bank to be named the Bank of Commerce of Capitan. These men came here about three weeks ago in the mean time the officers of the Exchange of Carrizozo came over to also start a bank, and G. B. Ray and L. L. Colby were invited by Mr. C. C. Merchant to come to his office to meet the Carrizozo bankers, Mr. G. L. Ulrich and Mr. S. J. Sager, also Mr. Tidsworth of Capitan, to join with them in the organization of one bank instead of two banks. G. B. Ray and L. L. Colby proposed to meet them half way on the proposition as talked to those who have subscribed stock, and proposed for their work of organization to charge the stockholders eight and three fourths per cent. But Messrs. Ulrich, Sager and Tidsworth said that a commission for time and work was legal and fair, but they would not allow any commission at all. They further did not want only a few stockholders; they apparently wanted the large share of stock and control in the proposed bank. G. B. Ray and L. L. Colby will take stock in the bank and believe in a bank "for the people, for the people, by the people."

Ed Robinson.

On Wednesday afternoon at 5 o'clock, Ed Robinson passed quietly away from this world at the County Hospital. Ed, a friend to every man in town, had been taken ill last Friday night, and went into a coma from which he never recovered. He had been staying at the Missouri Hotel, but Tuesday was moved to the County Hospital for better care and attention.

Friends from the mountains, realizing his serious condition, phoned his brother, Lee Robinson, at Capitan, and the latter hurriedly drove to Roswell, from where he completed the journey by local freight and car from Lakewood, reaching his brother's bedside just an hour before his death.

Interment will be in the City cemetery, Saturday afternoon, at three o'clock, and the services will be conducted by the Rev. H. W. Lowry. Messages have been sent to two brothers, John, at Rising Star, Tex., and Will, at Patterson, New Mexico. It is hoped that either one, or both, will be able to attend.

Ed Robinson was nearly fifty-two years of age. He was born in Winsboro, South Carolina, and at an early age moved to Arkansas. In 1889 he married Doyce Pendleton, who died with him in the year. Ed soon after moved to Eastland county, Texas, and later to Fisher, coming to New Mexico and Eddy way in the winter of 1897 with Ed Pendleton and family.

Since then he has always lived in Ca' Isbad or the vicinity, at one time owning large goat interests in the Guadalupe. In 1911 he sold his goats, and since that time has been engaged in trapping, his outfit being one of the best known on the mountain roads out of Carlsbad. He was a friendly and affable gentleman, with a word of greeting to his comrades, who were legion. The current wishes his soul God-speed - Carlsbad Current.

Mr. Lee Robinson returned home Tuesday. He stated that after receiving the phone message from his daughter, Miss Mabel Robinson, telling him of his brother's illness, he started immediately, but after leaving Roswell he met with so many delays along the route, it was impossible to reach his brother until a very short time before he died. Mr. Robinson's many friends in this community deeply sympathize in his great bereavement.

Rev. John H. Skinner, of the Nogal Mesa, was a Capitan visitor for the early part of the week.

Feterita and Other Substitutes Being Ground by Millers.

Santa Fe, N. M.—Feterita flour and meal, corn flour and meal, barley flour, rice flour, kafir corn and milo flour, and meal, buckwheat flour and other substitutes for wheat flour are being ground by New Mexico mills and others are installing equipment to grind these substitutes. This is shown by replies received from nearly every mill in the state to a query sent out by the Food Administration. Blanks filled in by the millers show that they are making every effort to supply the needed wheat substitutes which under the President's Proclamation are to be sold on a 50-50 basis with wheat flour. The daily capacity of each mill furnished and in a short time it is indicated a tremendously increased supply of the substitutes will be produced by plants in New Mexico.

The United States Food Administration has ordered that the portion of bread served to one at a meal by hotels, restaurants and dining cars shall not be more than two ounces. Food Administrator Ely has received the following wire from Washington:

"The hotel division of the Food Administration is sending the following telegram to all state hotel chairmen. The hotel division of the Food Administration announces the following program for hotels, restaurants and dining cars to be put into effect immediately:


"Monday and Wednesday, Wheatless; Tuesday, Meatless; Saturday, Porkless. One meatless, one wheatless meal each day. Portion of bread on rolls should consist of not more than two ounces and not more than this quantity should be served to any one at any one meal. Rolls should weigh not more than one ounce each, except that when corn, oatmeal, bran or rolls is served alone, portions may consist of not more than four ounces. You will note that all hotels, restaurants and dining cars will come under the baking regulations announced February 1st, hotels and restaurants have led the van of food conservation and can do more. News dispatches from Germany are convincing evidence that food is going to win the war. Show the country that you are more than willing to do your part in this accomplishment."


