## Walton Will Run for the U. S. Senate.

Silver City, New Mexico Feb. 15—Friends of W. B. Walton, now serving New Mexico as representative in congress, are strongly urging him to formally announce his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for United States Senator this year, and he is expected to do so.

Those who favor Walton's nomination to make the senatorial race declare he is the logical man from a party standpoint. His race in 1916 for congress against B. C. Hernandez, admittedly the strongest man on the Republican ticket, demonstrated his popularity with the rank and file of the Democratic party, it is claimed.

Congressman Walton, it is pointed out, has stood squarely behind the President in all the administration measures and has made a splendid record in congress. Even those of opposite political faith readily admit his efficiency.—Correspondence Santa Fe New Mexican.

What is said above about Mr. Walton's record in Congress tells facts, and they can be emphasized in the strongest terms, but they do not tell it all. The President has no more ardent supporter in all the measures pertaining to the war than Mr. Walton. He has not been profuse in speech making, but what he has made have been able, and most of them have been in the interest of the people of New Mexico. He has gained the reputation of being a great worker in the committee room, the place where all legislation originates and the committee reports are usually adopted. It is not only in the important measures before Congress that Mr. Walton has made a reputation. His strict attention to requests of his constituents for favors before the departments is a marked characteristic of his record. These things, though seeming of minor importance, are generally of much interest to those who make them. Mr. Walton's experience in the lower branch of Congress would well fit him for service in the senate, and the reputation he has already made as a legislator would give him a high standing from the time he would enter the senate.

## Capitan's Bank Prospects.

The prospects for two banks in Capitan seems to be a foregone conclusion. Messrs. Ray and Colby returned from Roswell Wednesday, having taken in the Ruidoso country on their way back, and report getting quite an amount of stock in that country. On Thursday afternoon a meeting, well attended, was held in the Julian building, where Mr. Robert A. Hunt acted as chairman. After several short talks by parties present, the question was put to the meeting, "Shall Capitan have a bank?" and it was unanimously adopted in the affirmative. It was then announced that a company would be organized and will be named "The First National Bank of Capitan." Messrs. Ray and Colby state that nearly all the capital stock has been subscribed and as soon as the charter has been obtained the matter will take definite form. The promoters have returned to Roswell, but will be back next week.

While the meeting was being held in Julian Hall, S. J. Sager, cashier of the Exchange Bank of Carrizozo, and a number of other parties were holding a meeting in the office of the Pittsworth Co and we learn the preliminary steps were taken to organize a bank. So, if present plans are carried out there will be two banks in Capitan.

Dr. F. H. Johnson was over from Carrizozo the first of the week receiving greetings from his friends. The Doctor is now enjoying a very fine practice, is health officer for the city, and a member of the local examining board.

## The Citizens' National Bank

## A Large Land Deal.

The Pittsworth Co has bought the Thurber land which was recently sold to O. P. Nye, of Carrizozo. The land is situated in the Baca Canyon country and comprises about 10,000 acres. It adjoins the Baca or La ranch which the Company bought a year ago.

## Cattle Losses.

It is reported that Sam Erambo, ranching in the Corona country, has lost about 200 head of cattle. The indications are that the cattle died from poison, but it is not fully known whether it was from eating brush that contained turpentine poison or from poison that had been put in their feed of salt. Several parties on the Ruidoso have also lost cattle, which died from the same symptoms.

### Red Cross Activities.

The American Soldier is one of the best fighters in the world, but when it comes to the comparatively tame, civilian occupation of shopping he doesn't loom so large, according to a letter from a Paris representative of the American Red Cross, received at the Mountain division headquarters in Denver. So he is "convoyed" by an American woman Red Cross member when he ventures forth in the line of communication canteen village to do a bit of shopping. Thus chaperoned he is placed on an equal footing with the nimble-witted, money-getting French shopwoman, who, until the innovation was inaugurated, had things all her own way.

The tremendous activities of the Red Cross workers of Wyoming, Utah, New Mexico and Colorado, in response to increased demands are reflected through a report just completed by officials of the Mountain division comprising the four states, which shows that 322,718 knitted articles, surgical dressings and hospital garments were assembled in the division shipping department in Denver during December. This represents an increase of 279,593 articles over November, when 53,124 pieces were handled. The four states thus place themselves among the leaders of the fourteen divisions of the American Red Cross.

The January production, the figures for which are now being compiled, will show an increase over December, thus bringing the total output for the three months close to 1,000,000.

Thousands of soldiers at the front and in camp and cantonments are now wearing garments made for them. Three thousand four hundred hospitals have received some part of the things sent to France by the Red Cross. Thousands of the wounded soldiers have been bandaged and made comfortable with dressings and hospital garments made in the Mountain division.

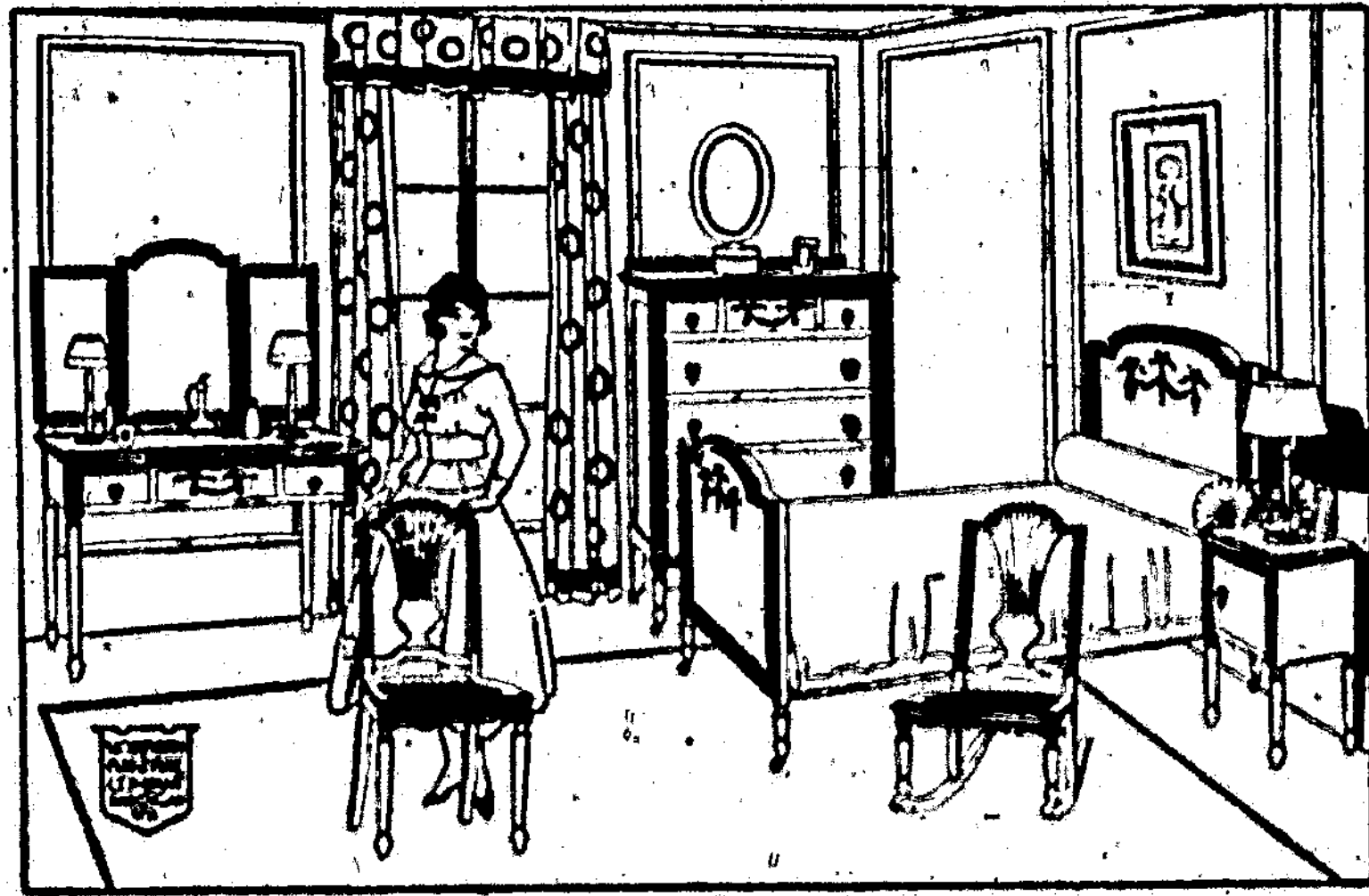

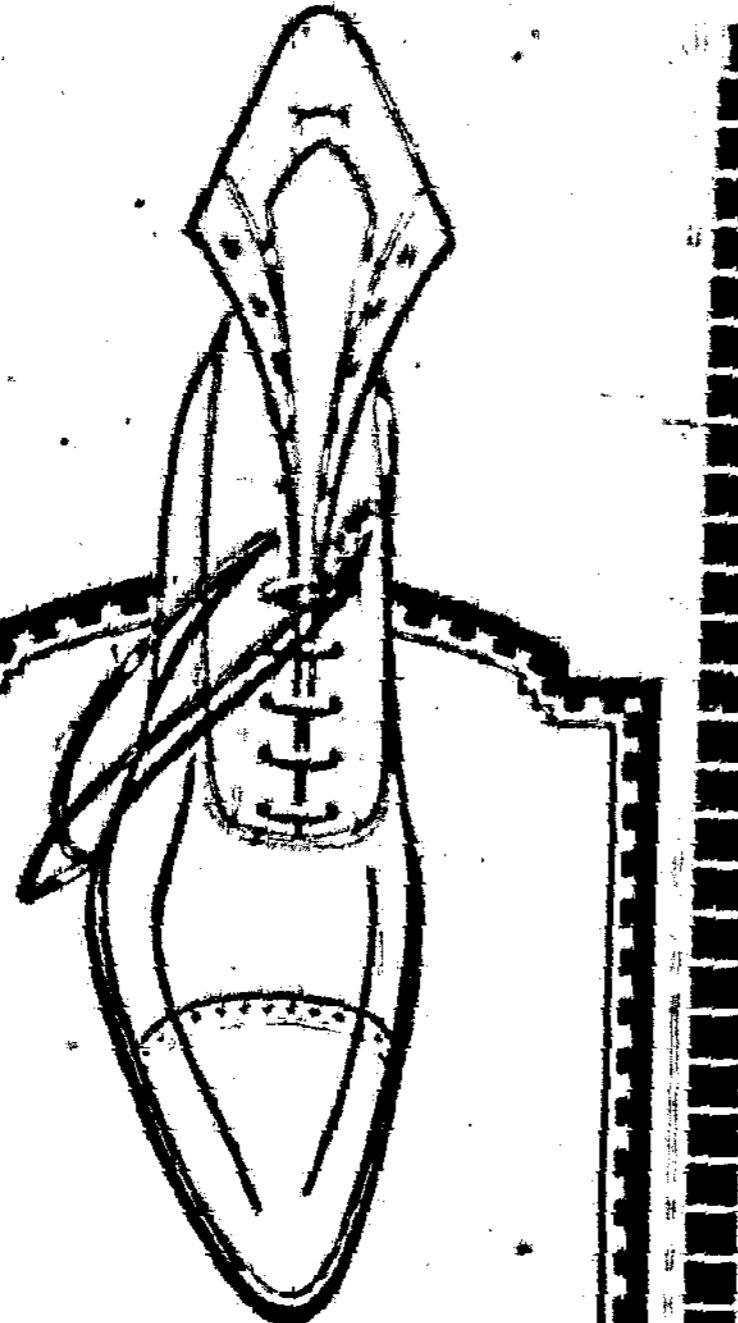
