New School Superintendent

—Mr. E. F. Funk has been selected Superintendent of the Lincoln County High School at Capitan, and also the Public Schools of the Capitan District, to succeed C. B. Koogler temporarily filling the position in place of C. Y. Belknap, elected, but resigned to enter the army. Prof. Funk comes highly recommended as a teacher and a man of high character. He has been in charge of the school on the Nogal Mesa for the past two years and has given perfect satisfaction to the people of that district. He is a gentleman of mature years, shows culture in his bearing, and will inspire the confidence respect of the students and the teachers working under him. We can expect good work from the hands of Prof. Funk and the corps of excellent teachers assisting him, and the directors of the schools are to be congratulated on the selection of this man as their choice for superintendent of the schools.

Killing Near Arabela.

—Yancey Kemp, a stockman living in the Arabela country, was found dead on the highway Monday night or Tuesday morning of this week near a place called Black Water. Reports say that the body and other things surrounding the case showed that Kemp had been waylaid and shot. A party named Collinder has been arrested and taken to Carrizozo charged with the killing, and reports also say that Collinder has acknowledged that he committed the deed. Full particulars of the affair can not be learned at this writing.

State Land Sales.

—Santa Fe, N. M., March 4.—Two important sales of state lands took place last week, in which Land Commissioner R. P. Ervin sold at public auction 28,082 83 acres in Mora county and 41,863 94 acres in Colfax county, the land being divided into thirty two tracts, ranging in acreage from 40 to 21,000 acres. The Mora county sales brought an aggregate selling price of \$175,430 60, or an average of 46 25. One tract of 600 acres sold for \$16 00 an acre, while a tract of 11,952 11 acres went for \$7 11. In Colfax county the total of selling prices was \$221,254 51, or an average per acre of \$5.30 an acre. The tracts for the most part were small, and the bidding in the Colfax county sale was not active as that in Mora county. Practically all of the lands in both of these sales was grazing land of the better grade. The Commissioner on March 1 paid to the State Treasurer a total of \$89,006, income from the lands during the month of February, the total setting a new high record for that month, which usually is one of the dull months for the land department.

The editor of the Mountaineer made an extended trip around the east end of the county last week and passed through portions of the country he had never seen before. He met many acquaintances on the trip and formed a good many new ones and considering all things it was one of the most enjoyable outings he had in a long time. He expected to have published an account of the trip in this week's paper, but a necessary trip to Carrizozo and pressing work in the office has caused its postponement until next week.

Red Cross Benefit.

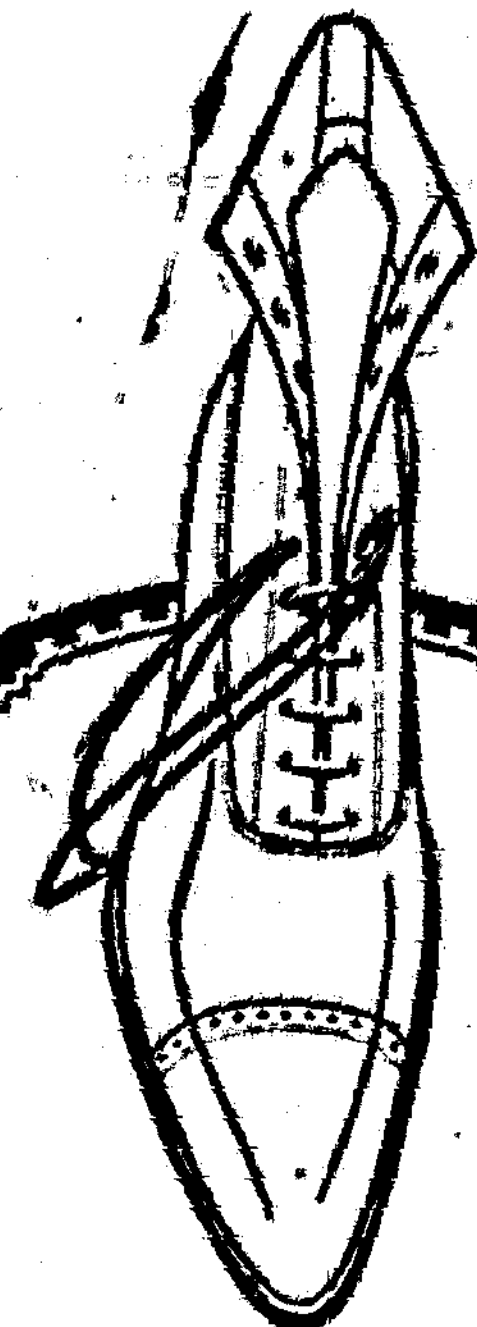

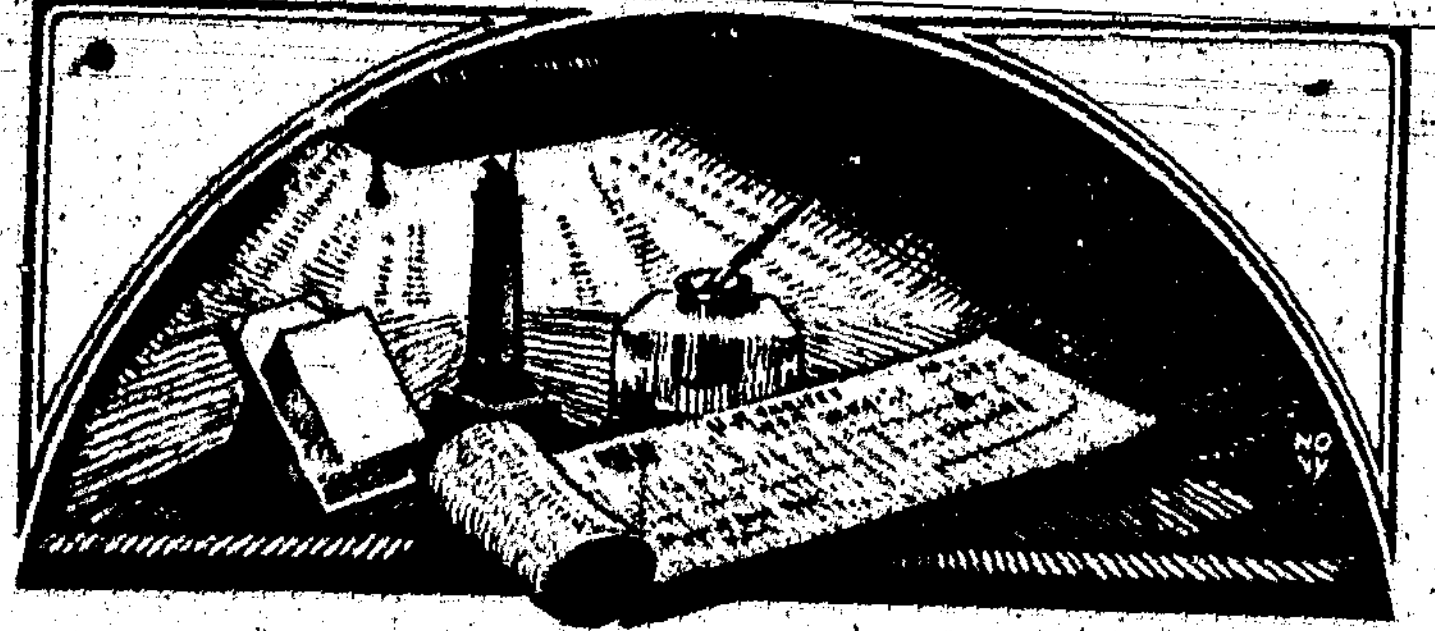
