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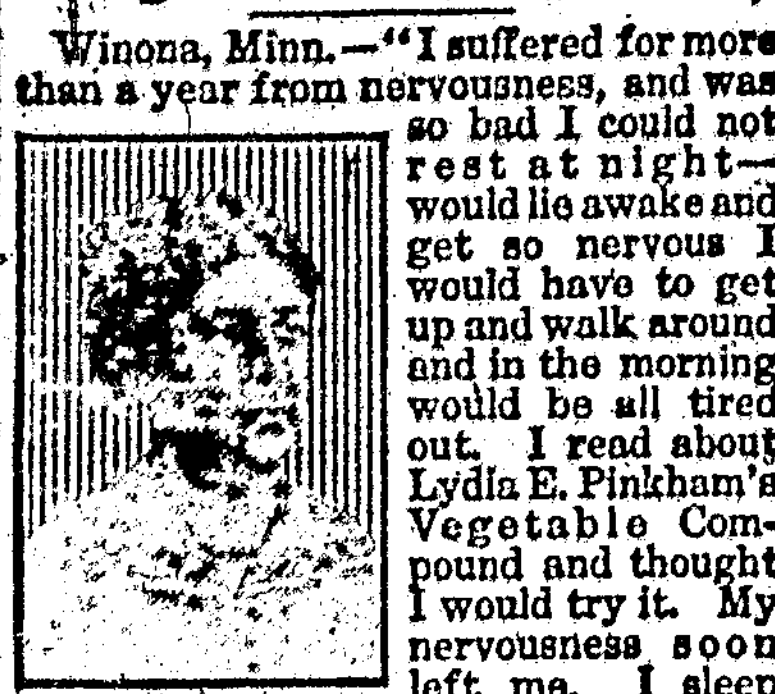
Pithy News Items Gathered From All Over New Mexico

COMING EVENTS.
October - Annual meeting New Mexico Public Health Association.
Ruby Chalm of Deming has been named as a notary public.
A garage at Trosas was robbed of seven auto castings and five tubes.
The May 10 call takes 27 1/2 men from New Mexico for service "over here."
W. T. Burgess, aged 79, and Mrs. M. E. Kettou, aged 70, were united in matrimony at McRosost.
Two hundred out of a total of 461 convicts are engaged on highways or other work outside the penitentiary.
Lieut. Joseph Quesenberry of Las Cruces died from wounds, according to the casualty list issued at Washington.
That a golden era faces New Mexico as a flour producing state, was the prediction made by Ralph C. Ely, state food administrator.
By an overwhelming vote property owners in the district which Gallup sought to have annexed to the town defeated the proposition.
Attorney A. B. Reinelman has applied to the State Supreme Court for oral argument in the appeal of Elbert W. Blainett for a new trial.
Farmington, which sold \$50,000 worth of Liberty bonds, has received her honor flag, which now proudly flies over the telegraph office.
The longest steel span of any bridge in the state has been completed across the Canadian or Red river near Ros, Mora county. It is 300 feet long and costs \$200,000.
The appointment of R. M. Johnston of Albuquerque as executive secretary of the Food Administration for New Mexico was announced by Ralph C. Ely, food administrator.
The Equity Society of Union county, during the past few weeks, has shipped 120 cans of broom corn for members. The brush netted the growers from \$122 to \$210 a car.
A report of the city physician shows that during the month of April thirty-three children were born in Albuquerque. Twenty-one of them were boys and the remainder girls.
Corp. Hugh E. Burr, B company, 144th machine gun battalion, who was drowned while swimming at Ocean Beach, Cal., was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. James J. Burr of Deming.
Col. H. V. Eva, an officer of an artillery command at Camp Cody, received an honorable discharge from the War Department and will return to his former home in Duluth, Minn.
The county of De Baca, the newest county in the state, has ninety-six men in the service, according to the 1918 list compiled by Secretary Landon Brown of the State Board of Historical Research.
Antonio Espinosa, Mariano Lara and Phoenix Duenas, who are accused of abducting sheep herds belonging to E. E. Turner of near Roswell, have been found over to the Chavez county jail for under \$200 bond each.
On account of the demand for convicts from work already under way in the county, the state will be unable to honor the year 1918 with an 18th of prisoners this year.
A long and strenuous effort to support the men in the trenches to a successful war was the work of New Mexico at all heights closed the state convicts for the month of the previous year.
A patient from Fort Huachuca dropped dead at the Carlsbad camp house as the result of a heart attack.
A man reported from Las Vegas that Charles Shupe, who recently shot and fatally wounded Edward Shelton, a young boy, attempted to leave town. His bondsmen had him arrested, the land was forfeited and Shupe was locked up in jail.
C. C. Montoya was convicted in the Federal Court under a charge of attempting to intimidate Rosetta M. Reed, a Socorro county homesteader. There were three other defendants in the case besides Montoya. Anastasio Serrecares was found guilty and Baltazar Serrecares and Gabriel Serrecares were acquitted.
Judge H. D. Terrell of Silver City has just received word that his son, Lieut. Alex W. Terrell, Jr., of the 142nd Field Artillery, who was severely wounded on the French front, several weeks ago, lost a leg by amputation, and is now in a base hospital.
Lieutenant Terrell received both the French war cross and the American medal for gallantry and conspicuous bravery in action.
Grover W. Harrison of Albuquerque will get \$110,236 as his share of the estate left by his mother, Mrs. Guadalupe Perea de Harrison. Judge Herbert E. Reynolds of the District Court granted final judgment in young Harrison's suit against his father, Dr. George W. Harrison of Los Angeles.
With 30,000 seedlings, and sixteen men to help plant them, Hermann Krauch, of the forestry service, left Santa Fe for Old Baldy, in an effort to provide trees to serve as a "wig" for this famous mountain so many decades bare of vegetation.

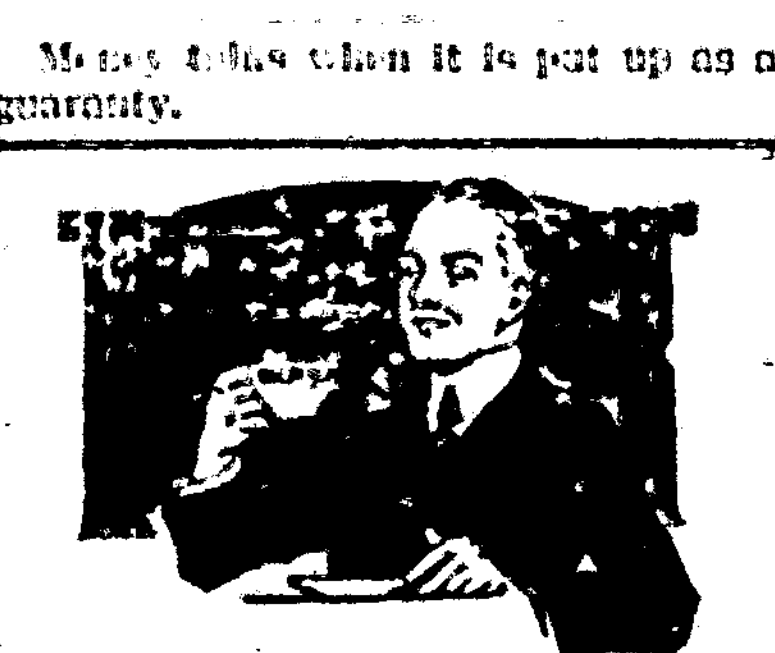

THREE KINDS OF GENTLEMEN
Somewhat Peculiar Distinctions That Are Made by Inhabitants of the Emerald Island.

Chaplain Lederle visited Lincoln last week to attend the school meeting and returned to the Fort in company with County Superintendent Koonce and Assistant State Superintendent Conway, who conferred with Major McKeon about the advisability of appointing a teacher at Fort Stanton.

Mrs. Lewis was the guest of Mrs. Geo. Littworth, at Capitan, for the week end of last week.

Mr. Ferguson came back from El Paso last week and will remain indefinitely.

A very able choir is being successfully organized for the Non-Sectarian services which are held at the Fort every Sunday night.

The Bridge Luncheon given last Thursday by Mrs. F. H. McKeon in honor of Mrs. Rouff was one of the most successful social events of the season. By way of innovation the luncheon was served in cafeteria style, each lady serving her own sweet self from a most gorgeously arrayed table of refreshments. The festive decorations were becomingly arranged in gay spring colors and apple blossoms added not a little to the vernal effect, while lighted candles gave the glow and warmth so essential to perfect fitness. The afternoon was spent at Bridge.

Hondo Notes.

Mr. J. V. Conway, State Assistant Superintendent of Public Instruction, and County Superintendent J. E. Koonce, spoke at Hondo last Thursday in the interest of the schools. Their subject was "Consolidation of Rural Schools." They showed the audience that one teacher can teach two grades better than six. Where one teacher is now employed, only half of the good results can be obtained, compared with the results that two teachers with the same number of pupils would give.

Mr. Conway with his forceful words reminded us that we were not living in the forties when there were two classes of people, the poor and the rich or influential. The sons and daughters of the latter class could get an education by attending private schools or by going to New York or Philadelphia, which cost money to attend.

Quoting Mr. Conway: "New Mexico is coming and must come to the front in every way, and our first step in order to

bring it about is school facilities for the men and women of tomorrow. They are the ones who, if we give them an opportunity will stand on our shoulders so as to reach and throw the ball of the commonwealth of New Mexico and make a score. Does that mean anything to the present generation? Of course the education of our children means everything to our future honor and pride. Let us do away with the little "Red School House." Those are doings of the dark ages of our grand state—do away with a school house at the very door of every home. We cannot all have a school house and teacher at our door. The people of this community and that community should throw their children and teachers together and wait for the good results. It will cost no more. With the money that is being paid to the teacher in this or yonder nook, a driver can be hired to take the children to and from school, and "then some." This is no longer an experiment. The system has been tried in many states, and what other states can accomplish we can, too."

Hondo now has two of the best teachers in the state, so said Mr. Conway, and we proudly approved his statement. In commenting about the appearance and otherwise of our school, Mr. Conway thought, it was hard to beat by any other rural school in the state. Since he is not the only visitor who has said that, we are sure that his speech was not flattery.

To everything these gentlemen had to say we said AMEN. Hence we are for consolidation. More Teachers, Better Schools, Greater New Mexico, and a Prepared U. S. A.

Lincoln Items.
