President Wilson's Greeting to France

The high aims of America and her allies are well expressed in President Wilson's greeting to France on Bastille day:

"As France celebrated her Fourth of July, so do we celebrate her Fourteenth. We are conscious of a comradeship of arms and of purpose of which we are deeply proud. The sea seems very narrow today. France is so close neighbor to our hearts. The war is being fought to save ourselves from intolerable things, but it is also fought to save mankind. We extend our hands to each other to the great peoples with whom we are associated; and to the peoples everywhere who love right and prize justice as a thing beyond price, and consecrate ourselves once more to the noble enterprise of peace and justice, realizing the great conceptions that have lifted France and America high among the free peoples of the world. The French flag flies today from the staff at the White House, and America is happy to do honor to that flag."

Cattle Move to Market.

The annual movement of cattle from the grazing districts of the Southwest is in progress. As indicated by the receipt of 30,000 head on July 15 at the Kansas City market. They were shipped from Kansas and Oklahoma. This movement, which ordinarily begins about July 20 to August 1 and ends about November 15 to December 1, is a little earlier than usual, according to a report of the Bureau of Markets of the United States Department of Agriculture. The report indicates that many of the cattle, which have been grazed in the Southwest this year and are now being marketed, are a year younger than those handled heretofore and their condition when they reach the market is slightly better than usual.—Agricultural Bulletin.

A Call to Duty.

From the battle fields in France there comes an unspoken call that should find an answer in every American heart. The recent great events in Europe, the successes of American arms on the fields of France should spur every American to greater effort.

Our people at home should not rest on the laurels of our soldiers in France. Every death on the field of honor in the line of duty and for our country's cause should be a call to us for every sacrifice and every exertion to aid the cause for which our soldiers have died.

Increase production, decrease consumption, save and lend to the Government. Every cent lent to the United States is used to support, strengthen, and aid our soldiers in France.

Cashing in these stamps is going to be better than "getting money from home," for with the money comes the reminder that you contributed to the great victory which then will have been completely won.

With another credit of \$100,000 to Italy and \$9,000,000 to Belgium the credits advanced by the United States to our allies now total \$9,890,000,000.

SUGAR BEET.

When the women of eight of New Mexico's twenty-eight counties are in doubt about any household problem they ask the County Home Demonstration Agent.

If there is a doubt as to whether William's coat will make Willie a pair of trousers or Uncle's shirt will make the baby a dress, the doubt is settled by conference with the Demonstrator.

Will last summers' hat look like new if made over? Ask the Demonstrator. More than that, ask her to meet all the women in the neighborhood who have old hats and spend a profitable, as well as pleasant day remodeling the neighborhood millinery.

There is a surplus of fruit and vegetables in your neighborhood that are going to waste if something isn't done. The Demonstrator will show you how to can, dry, preserve, or store the excess. Or will help you to install a Community Canner or Dryer and will show you how to make a neat commercial pack that will find a place on the market.

Maybe there is trouble with using the substitute flours, and sweetening. A demonstration will make the problem easier.

Sweet butter and good cottage cheese are not easy to make. The Demonstrator gets them just right every time.

Our boys and girls want to work to win the war. The Demonstrator will help them find a job.

Do you have to count every penny to make ends meet? The Demonstrator knows how to make every penny count and she can show the women of her county how to make an expense budget and how to keep household accounts in such a way that there will be money at end of the year for even mother to take a vacation.

Twenty counties have no Demonstrator but they can get assistance and information as to how to secure a Demonstrator by applying to the Extension Service Department of New Mexico State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts.

Beetsugar is excellent for canning, preserving and jelly making.

Erroneous ideas as to the use of beet sugar are prevalent, it being a rather common idea that beet sugar cannot be used for canning, preserving and jelly making.

Beet sugar and cane sugar have the same chemical composition, the same molecular structure and show identically the same reaction.

Refined beet sugar and refined cane sugar are absolutely interchangeable in any cooking process.

Unless the housewife is told which kind of sugar she is buying she will be unable to know, there being no result in cooking of any nature which would show the kind of sugar used.

If for any reason beet sugar is cheaper than cane sugar its use is to be recommended from a economical standpoint, and because the increased use of beet sugar will encourage the sugar beet industry.

With a fruit crop at hand and unknown months or years of war ahead, let not an unfounded prejudice prevent the preservation of all possible food.

Upon request directions for canning and preserving will be supplied to any resident of the

state by the Extension Service of New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts. Tura A. Hays, State Leader, Home Demonstration Agents.

Contracts for sixty-one ships of 480,800 deadweight tons were announced last week by the shipping board. Of this tonnage, \$92,800 will be steel. To Skinner & Eddy Corporation of Seattle, went a contract for thirty-five cargo steamships of a deadweight tonnage of \$22,800.

An Associated Press Dispatch of the 30th of July says that a tanker arrived at an Atlantic port on that date after a five-hour fight with a German submarine, 600 miles off the New Jersey coast late last Friday. The ship's cook was wounded by sharpnel. The T boat, sighted eight miles away, tried to head off the tanker and fired about 200 shots. The tanker replied with 10 shots from her four-inch guns. The submarine was finally outdistanced.

The war department has sent out an urgent appeal to all young men who are under draft age to attend school or college and continue their education to graduation, in order to prepare the great army of either fighters or for workers in upbuilding this and other countries after the stress of war is over. The educated man or woman is worth more to any nation than the ignorant one. The specialist, who is trained in any line is valuable in special degree.

Pertinent Clippings.

Railroad fares in the United States have advanced to a point discouraging to the traveler. Now there is to be a 7 cent street car fare in some of the large cities. More than that, there is a likelihood of the government shutting off steel supplies for automobile making and instituting a tax of 10 cents a gallon on gasoline. Mr. Average Citizen would not bother about these conditions so much if shoe leather prices had not sharply advanced.

Baseball has been declared non-essential in the United States. But baseball as a game will no more disappear in America for the period of the war than did football in England. Both games, however, have been degraded by being changed from a sport to a trade, and men who can play professional baseball or soccer and thus make a living have their proper place in the two armies. The place to play both games is behind the lines on the western front with the troops in billet at the free "gate."

Says the Berlin Vorwarts: "Conditions are compelling the Central Powers to occupy precisely that part of Russia containing the country's greatest natural resources." Such sophistry reminds one of the German conception of a league of nations as an ideal international organization in which the raw products of other countries are made to contribute to the exclusive advancement of the German Empire. One might as well speak of a burglar who finds that conditions compel him to enter and rob precisely that part of a house which contains its greatest treasures.—Christian Science Monitor.

The northern part of Derbyshire, England, as well as certain parts of Yorkshire are being invaded by an army of "antler moth caterpillars." Battalions of these pests are on the march and are described as "like moving carpet" taking the rocks and walls in their march or crawl just as the Romans did without attempting to go round. Trenches are being dug around fields with growing crops and other methods are being adopted under direction of the authorities to try and exterminate the hordes.

A Washington dispatch says: that the maximum prices on hides for three months beginning August 1, announced to day by the price fixing committee of the war industries board, provide for an average reduction of from seven to eight cents per pound from the old prices. Packerhides range from 24 to 30 cents a pound, according to the weight of the steer, and country hides from 21 to 22 cents.

SAVING AND LENDING.

Sir William Goode, of the British Food Ministry, says that from July, 1917, to April, 1918, the United States exported to the allies 80,000,000 bushels of wheat products. Of this it is asserted that 50,000,000 bushels represented voluntary sacrifices by the American people in their consumption of wheat.

There is a triple economy, a saving of wheat, it saved wheat for our Army and the armies of our allies; it saved money to the American, and for the most part this money went for the purchase of Government war securities.

There is another saving still: this sort of sacrifice and economy is helping win the war—shorten the war—with the resultant saving soldiers' lives.

Mr. McAdoo to Railroad Men

Washington July 31. Rail way employers were told by Director General McAdoo in anouncing details of the wage increase for more than 500,000 shopmen that the nation expected new energy from the workers in return for pay increases and improvements in employment conditions and that strikes and other labor disturbances must be eliminated during the war.

"In reaching the conclusions upon which this order is based," said the director general, "I have been keenly conscious not alone of the interests of the rail way employees, but also of my solemn duty to the American people to see to it that the trust they have committed to me is discharged faithfully."

"Now that the decision has been made, the American people expect every railroad employee to devote himself with new energy to his work and by faithful and efficient service to justify the large increases of pay and the improvement in working conditions hereby granted."

"It is of the utmost importance that motive power and cars shall be kept in repair and that the output of railroad shops throughout the country shall be greatly increased."

"I am proud of the loyal service the great body of railroad men have rendered since the railroads have come under federal control. But I should not fail to say that there are instances where agitation in some of the locomotive and car shops have been extremely hurtful to the country. The loyal and patriotic employees, who constitute the great majority of the railroad workers, have not yielded to these disturbances."

"The loyal and patriotic employees can render new and powerful service to their country by using their influence to expose any who may become slackers in their work."

Liberty loan bonds are very desirable investments, and crafty individuals are using various means to secure them from owners not familiar with stock values and like matters. One method is to offer to exchange for Liberty bonds stocks or bonds of doubtful organizations represented as returning a much higher income than the bonds.

There are various other methods used and likely to be used, some of the gold-brick variety and other less crude and probably within the limits of the law. All offers for Liberty bonds except for money and at market value should be scrutinized carefully. The bonds are the safest of investments and have, non-taxable and other valuable features.

To hold your Liberty loan bonds, if possible; is patriotic. To consult your bankers before selling them is wise.
