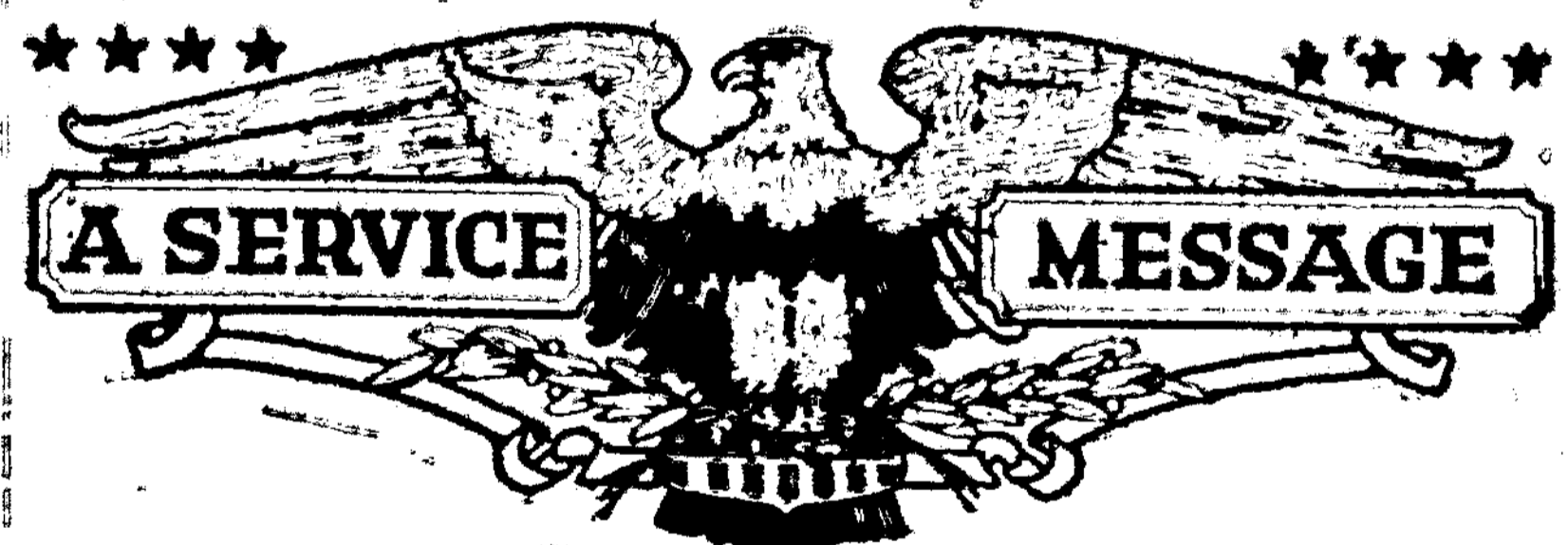

### What Cowards.

When the I. W. W. got in trouble in San Diego, Calif., a few years ago, because the members of the organization spat upon the flag and trampled it under foot and denounced all government, the first thing they did after the mob came was to appeal to all the forms of government in existence—the mayor of the city, the sheriff of the county, the governor of the state, and the president of the United States—for protection.

On May 1st the New York Call, a socialist organ published in New York, issued an appeal to the "workers of the world" to revolt and overthrow the government. That day soldiers and sailors returned from the war, stormed the building in which the Call is published, pried the type, broke up some of the machinery and handled the publishers and employes rather roughly—treated 'em rough, in fact.

On May 2nd, the publishers of the Call sent a telegram to the secretary of the navy stating the facts and closing as follows:

"We demand that you take action to protect our lives and property by preventing further incitation to riot."

So it is always with the radicals. When they are committing or counselling violence, they want no government interference they are for anarchy; but let an outraged public visit summary vengeance, and there is an immediate call upon the hated government for protection.

### Human Bones Found.

They dug deeper and unearthed a number of human bones, the pelvis or hip bones complete, the backbone, one hand and one upper arm bone. Part of these had been bleached and wired together as if having been mounted, but some of them had not. It seems a mystery as to how the bones came to be in that locality. The balance could not be found. They were of an adult and evidently a male.—Springer Stockman.

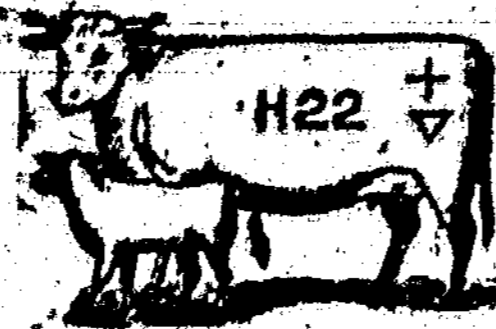

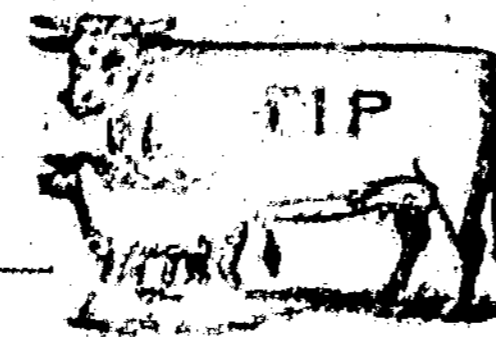

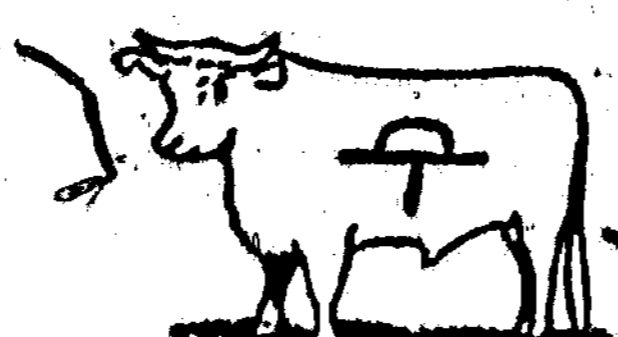
