Recollections and Observations of Seven Years in Washington.

John G. Carlisle, elected Speaker of the 49th Congress, represented the 6th Kentucky district and lived in Covington, that state. He was 48 years old when elected to the Speaker's chair; had served in the 45th, 46th and 47th Congresses, and was classed with the foremost statesmen of that period. It is not asserting too much to say his name will survive in history as one of the greatest Speakers who ever presided over the Congress of the United States. This is not only my opinion of him, but it is the estimate expressed by men of national reputation. President McKinley said that Carlisle was one of the ablest men he had ever known; that his rulings were always so fair and correct the opposition dared not appeal from them; that his mind was so pellucid that he instantly comprehended every question coming before him for a decision, and he had never known him to make a wrong parliamentary ruling. Thomas B. Reed, Mr. Carlisle's successor, the bitterest partisan on the Republican side of the House, expressed something like the same opinion of him, and added that Carlisle's mere statement of an issue was so clear as to make it unanswerable. His personality was striking. One seeing him for the first time without knowing who he was, would be impressed that he was no ordinary man, and would want to know the name of that distinguished appearing man. He was tall, of rather spare build, with a clean shaven face, pale and seamed by care and thought, without any weak points. His forehead was high and broad; his hair a dark brown, and his eyes wonderfully expressive. His voice was clear and his every utterance could be distinctly heard to the furthest parts of the hall, although bustle and confusion might be ranging and partisan wrangles might have reached fever heat, by the serenity and dignity of his demeanor, he was always able to quiet the tumult and restore order from confusion.

Mr. Carlisle was the most serious man I ever knew, and was absolutely devoid of mirth. During all the time I knew him and saw him preside over the House, I never saw a smile on his face. He never enjoyed jokes nor frivolous talk, but where intelligence prevailed, he was certainly an interesting and charming man. What has been said of another great man can aptly be applied to Mr. Carlisle: "He had the poise of a jurist and the breadth of a statesman; too broad to be a bigot and too great to be a narrow partisan."

Mr. Carlisle had made a close study of the tariff and believed the country demanded revenue reform and his opinions had great weight with a large majority of the Democratic members, and was re-elected without opposition in his own party Speaker of the 49th and 50th Congresses. In 1888 the country again went Republican and they got a small majority in the House of Representatives. Thomas B. Reed, of Maine, was elected Speaker, and the majority

leadership fell to Mr. Carlisle, which he held nearly two years, until a vacancy occurred in the Senate by the death of Senator Beck of Kentucky. Mr. Carlisle was then transferred to that body by the people of his state, and when he entered the Senate he was so well equipped in every essential necessary to statesmanship that he at once became a leader there.

When Cleveland formed a cabinet for his second administration he made Mr. Carlisle Secretary of the Treasury, in which office he served a full term, then he retired to private life and lived until about eight years ago.

SAMUEL J. RANDALL.

Mr. Carlisle's leading opponent for the Speakership of the 48th Congress was Samuel J. Randall, of Pennsylvania, who represented one of the Philadelphia districts. He had been Speaker in the 46th Congress, was an able man, of great force of character and a good parliamentarian. He was entirely a different type of man from Mr. Carlisle. Was full of Irish pugnacity, rather seemed to enjoy a parliamentary scrap, and a match for any one who wished to measure blade with him. Mr. Carlisle made him chairman of the committee on appropriations, which gave him great and frequent opportunities to address the House. Mr. Randall had endeared himself to Democrats by leading a fight against what was known as the "Force Bill," which had for its object placing elections in the southern states in charge of United States Marshalls. That was during the time Mr. Blaine occupied the Speaker's chair, and it was vigorously pushed by the extreme Republicans; although, it is said, lacked the sympathy of the Speaker. For days and nights the fight went on, the Republicans trying to force the measure to a vote, the Democrats under the leadership of Mr. Randall resisting it. Finally Mr. Randall won the fight and it never came up again.

Mr. Randall was a large man, and when I first saw him was nearly 60 years old. Usually he was pleasant and smiling, but at times he had spells of rheumatism or gout, then he was cross and disagreeable. At these times if people came to the Capital to see him and sent in their cards, he would flatly refuse them an audience. He was a protectionist, and voted with the Republicans when any measure came up tending toward free trade. The district he represented was in the manufacturing community and his constituents demanded protection, and a man of his ability and prestige was of great service to them. He died during the 51st Congress, after an illness of many months, and was greatly missed from the House of Representatives, where he had been a prominent figure for more than a quarter of a century.

My next sketch will be devoted to William McKinley, then a member of the House of Representatives, but will probably not appear until week after next.

Rev. L. W. Carleton was down from Alto Wednesday. He reported that the farmers in his neighborhood are very busy preparing to plant their crops; that they are greatly encouraged at the prospects for a good crop this year.

It will be more profitable just now to say the least not to tie up your land for a number of years and get nothing out of it.
