Capitan Schools.

The Directors of the Lincoln County High School and the Capitan schools have made a splendid start to make the schools a great success. They succeeded in getting appropriations recommended by the County School Board and allowed by the Commissioners which will probably amount to more than \$15,000. Part of these appropriations will be expended on the school building and the grounds. There is to be a heating plant installed in the building; the building to be repainted both inside and out, and thoroughly renovated. A new bell will be purchased and the old bell donated to the Tucson school. A well will be put down and a pump placed in it, and the grounds fenced.

Four teachers have so far been elected and are as follows:

L. B. Boughman, Superintendent.

Miss Nettie Bigbe, to be a teacher in the High School; Misses Mildred Peters and Mary Fritz, to positions in the grades.

There are four more teachers to be elected. A principal and one other teacher in the High School and two teachers in the grades will be elected later on. The directors have found some difficulty in securing suitable teacher for the Domestic Science and Music classes.

Mr. E. L. Moulton, member of the County School Board and County Commissioner, and W. H. Sevier, also, County Commissioner, and Mrs. Maud L. Blaney, County School Superintendent, deserve much credit for the efforts they made in getting the appropriations for the schools at Capitan allowed.

Carl Fisher Returns from the Army.

Carl Fisher came in Saturday evening on the mail car from San Francisco where he was discharged from military service. Carl's discharge shows that he made a highly honorable record in the war. He went into the service in October, 1917, and after a thorough training at Los Angeles, California, embarked for the front in France in June, 1918. He was in the great drive that dislodged the Germans in the Meuse River and Argonne Forest. While in that drive, and when just above Chateau-Thierry, he was gassed, and was kept in the Hospital one month. He then returned to his command on September 15th, and went over the top on September 26th, when the Armistice was signed. Carl has many friends here who are glad to welcome him home after his splendid service at the call of his country.

Dr. Price has been in the military service for the past fourteen months, eight of which were spent in Europe. He witnessed some of the great events of the war; was present at the great battles of Argonne Forest and the Meuse River, where he had charge of dressing stations. These can be said to be the decisive battles of the war, and the American troops alone cleared the Argonne Forest, up to that time considered impregnable. We are glad to have the Doctor and his estimable family back in Capitan.

"Old Stump" is Dead.

"Old Stump" we will call him, not knowing any other name, was found dead in the pasture by the roadside near the P. G. Peters home last Friday morning. Examination showed that "Stump" came to his death by getting his skull punctured by a rifle or pistol bullet from unknown source. "Stump" was probably the most noted dog in Lincoln county, not from any good qualities ever discovered in his character, but from nearly all the bad traits developed in the canine race. He was said to be cross between a bull dog and a loiter wolf. At any rate, when first known he was a wild dog, ranging among the foot hills of the Capitan Mountain. He got to prowling about the home of Mr. Isidro McKinley, and having food placed out for him, finally became gentle and made that place a permanent abode. By his ferocious disposition he became a terror to people who passed that way, and he would frequently pay Capitan visits, and without provocation would pounce on every other dog he met. Many people will feel a sense of satisfaction when they learn that "Stump" will bother them no more.





