## Recollections and Observations of Seven Years in Washington.

By the Editor of the Capitan Mountaineer

I will devote my Recollections this week to New Mexico people, known to many of the Mountaineer readers, and I believe they will find interest in what I say about them.

When the 48th Congress convened in December, 1884, Tranquilino Luna, Republican, of Los Lunas, held the seat from New Mexico, then a Territory. He was then only thirty-five years old, a decedent of an Castilian family who immigrated to this country among the first settlers from Spain. He was a man of striking appearance, tall, finely proportioned and dignified in demeanor. His swarthy complexion, strong features and glistening and expressive black eyes would call attention to him in any assemblage. He had served as delegate in the 47th Congress and held the certificate of election to the 48th. His seat, however, was contested by Francisco A. Manzanara, Democrat, of Las Vegas, and on the report of the Committee on Elections, he was unseated, after serving about three months, and Manzanara got the seat. Luna's leaving the House was a source of much regret by his Republican friends, as he was a very popular young man there as well as at home.

Manzanara was a very different type of man from Luna. He was a native born citizen, also, a decedent of an old Spanish family of distinction. He was rather small of stature, had remarkably fine features, and while a very quiet and unassuming man, he was distinguished in his manners. His early education had been in Spanish, by the best teachers in the country; then he commenced the study of the English language and mastered it, and finished his education at the Saint Loula University, in Saint Louis, Mo. After graduating, he entered mercantile pursuits, and when he died was one of the leading merchants in the Territory. Mr. Manzanara was made a member of the Committee on Territories, to which I had been assigned to duty. I formed a very intimate acquaintance with him and greatly appreciated his friendship. He was popular with both parties in the House, as in the Committee, and his knowledge of the western country enabled him to be a useful man in Congress, and I doubt if the Territory ever had a man who served it more faithfully and ably in the House of Representatives.

Edmond G. Ross, Territorial Governor of New Mexico under President Cleveland's first administration, was a grand old man whose acquaintance I formed in Washington. He had a life history full of interest which is worthy of note, and I will speak of him in this connection. In the winter of 1884-5, Gov. Ross went to Washington and remained there until after the inauguration of the Democratic President, securing influence for the appointment of Governor of New Mexico. He was a close friend of Mr. Manzanara and made the Territorial Committee Room

his headquarters, and by this means I formed an acquaintance with him. He talked to me freely and frankly and I learned a good deal about his history. He was a printer by trade and worked at the case for several years in early manhood. Later, at different times he edited and published several prominent weekly newspapers in Kansas, where he had settled. When the Civil War commenced, Gov. Ross entered the military service and rose to the rank of Colonel, and his record showed that he made a good soldier and fine officer. At that time he was a Republican, and about the close of the war his party elected him to the United States Senate. He acted and voted with the Republicans until articles of impeachment were preferred against President Andrew Johnson, who was tried before the Senate. Senator Ross believed that the evidence against the President did not warrant impeachment, and with two other Senators, John B. Henderson, of Missouri, and William Pitt Fessenden, of New Jersey, he voted against impeachment, and those three Republican votes resulted in the acquittal of the President, as it took a two-third vote to convict. At that time Kansas was probably the most ultra Republican state in the Union and Senator Ross was bitterly denounced by his constituents, for what they termed treachery. After his senatorial term expired he returned to Kansas and commenced work at his trade, but he was boycotted and denied work, all for that offense. Senator Henderson fared better at the hands of his Republican constituents; four years after the impeachment trial, the Missouri Republicans nominated him for Governor and he was ever afterwards held in good fellowship by them.

Gov. Ross finally moved to New Mexico, and I think worked at his trade until he applied for the Governorship under President Cleveland. Here comes in a little scrap of history, which I think has never been published; I have it from first hand authority. When the appointment of Gov. Ross came up for consideration in Mr. Cleveland cabinet, one member, Mr. Lamar, then Secretary of the Interior, stated that he did not consider Mr. Ross a suitable man for such a place as Governor of New Mexico; he had been a United States Senator, and had gotten down to working as a printer; that he thought such an occupation was degrading to his former high position, or words to that effect. Mr. Cleveland, in his blunt way said: "Is that so, Mr. Secretary? I consider that the best recommendation Mr. Ross has before us; I honor a man who will go to work at any honorable trade or occupation when misfortune overtakes him, regardless of any high position he may have held. I will this day send his nomination to the Senate for confirmation for Governor of New Mexico."

Many of the readers of the Mountaineer know as much about Gov. Ross' administration as I do, so I will close this sketch of him.

Henry L. Lindley, a Lincoln county boy, who served in the army in France, and had been reported dead, was in Capitan this week. He is now held in the hospital in San Antonio, Texas, and was permitted to come home on furlough.
