Carl C. McGee, editor and owner of the Albuquerque Morning Journal, a Republican newspaper, supporting Senator Harding for president, after meeting and hearing Governor James M. Cox, Democratic presidential nominee, makes this frank admission of his impressions of Cox.

"Either what Governor Cox says fails to read as well in print as it sounds there is some truth in his claim that the newspapers fail to treat him fairly.

"Reading reports of the Cox tour had created in my mind an impression that he was shallow, erratic, badly poised, extravagant in statement and under-sized.

"An hour beside him at the dinner table carried convincing proof that none of these things were true of him in repose. He was genial, clever, rapid in his mental processes, avaricious for knowledge of local conditions in New Mexico and free from all pose. He is exceedingly likable and sensible.

"His speech gave none of the impressions I note above. It was extremely effective, sane, progressive and good tempered.

"From 6:30 until 10 o'clock last night I completely revised my estimate of Governor Cox as a man. I had thought him too small a man for the job. Instead he has qualities which will make a good president, in my judgment, if he is the choice of the people."
