Clement Hightower.

The name of Clement Hightower, Republican nominee for Tax Assessor of Lincoln county appears in our announcement column this week. U. S. Senator Jones Coming to Capitan.

Our democratic U. S. Senator A. A. Jones will speak in Capitan on ~~Monday~~ October 8th, at 3:30 in the afternoon. Has Come to the Parting of the Ways.

In its issue of last Thursday morning the Albuquerque Morning Journal, edited and owned by Mr. Carl McGee, comes out squarely for Judge Hanna, the democratic nominee for Governor of New Mexico.
