Cox and Roosevelt.

Cox and Roosevelt are the outcome of the Democratic National Convention at San Francisco. Gov. James M. Cox, of Ohio, was nominated for President on the 44th ballot, and Franklin D. Roosevelt, of New York, First Assistant Secretary of the Navy, was afterwards nominated by acclamation. The struggle for the nomination was a long and hard one, and not without a good deal of bitterness among the different factions. Notwithstanding all the opposition in the convention to Gov. Cox, it is claimed to be the strongest ticket that could have been presented to the party.

Gov. Cox is serving his third term as Governor of Ohio, nominally a Republican state. In his first election, he carried the state by 100,000 majority over his opponent, who was Warren G. Harding, now the Republican nominee for President. This shows his popularity in his own state which will give him strength in other states, especially in northern and eastern states.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, Gov. Cox's running mate, is a distant relative of the late President Theodore Roosevelt, though he has always been a staunch democrat and is a very strong man in New York state, and will add strength to the ticket where it will be needed.

The ticket is generally endorsed by the party. The anti-Wilson wing of the party which brought about the nomination is enthusiastic in its support and the Wilson people have expressed themselves satisfied and pledged it their support. The present outlook is that Cox and Roosevelt have a splendid show of election.

A remarkably strange incident is connected with both the party candidates in this campaign. They are both practical printers and newspaper men, and own and publish papers. Senator Harding publishes the Marlon Star and Gov. Cox the Dayton News. The newspaper fraternity is sure to have one of their number in the White House, the first time in the history of the country.
