Republican Misrepresentation

The Republican machine smarting under the continuous and unanswerable attacks made upon the machine's record in New Mexico since incoming statehood, is resorting to trickery and misrepresentation of the most palpable sort. The charge is now made that Judge Hanna advocates return to the old system of highway construction in New Mexico, Judge Hanna stands squarely upon the declaration of the Democratic State platform which advocates revision of the present road law so that a law may be had:

"Creating a State Highway Commission having direct supervision of all highway construction and maintenance under an effective budget system which will insure good roads at a fair and reasonable expense."

These are the words of the platform adopted at the Las Vegas Convention. The purpose of Judge Hanna and the Democratic party is to abolish paid supervisors of roads in the counties. These supervisors are entirely independent of the State Highway Commission, and also they are independent in their actions of the county commissioners who pay them. If the present law should remain on the statute books, Judge Hanna, when he becomes governor, would have the appointment of twenty-nine road supervisors. His purpose is to dispense with them and have their salaries matched by the Federal road fund for the actual construction of roads in the state.

By abolishing the offices and the expenses incident to them, and securing an equal amount from the Federal government, which is impossible under the present system, New Mexico could have at least a quarter of a million dollars more than now for actual road work.

That is Judge Hanna's position regarding public Highways in New Mexico.—From Democratic State Headquarters October 26th.

Another False Report.

I have just learned that a report is in circulation that I should have said if I am elected sheriff I would stop farmers and ranchmen from killing beef and bringing it into the different towns and selling it. I have never made any such statement nor anything like it. I have said that if I am elected I will try to enforce the law in cases where it might be violated, but nothing about trying to keep farmers and ranchmen from selling their beef, and this report has been circulated in an effort to keep farmers and ranchmen from voting for me.

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School Notes.

Assistant State Superintendent of Public Instruction, John V. Conway and Mrs. Ruth O. Miller, State Director for Vocational Education, are in the County this week accompanying Mrs. M. L. Blaney, Superintendent of Schools of Lincoln County, on a trip making a survey of the schools. The Corona schools were visited on Monday. The patrons and pupils were addressed and the party then attended the dedication of the consolidated school at Ancho on Monday evening. Mr. Conway made the dedicatory speech. Other speakers were: Mrs. Blaney, Mrs. Miller and Mr. E. M. Brickley, Secretary of the County Board of Education. The meeting was presided over by Mr. J. E. Secrest, Secretary of the local Board of Education.

Capitan School.

On Tuesday the schools at Capitan were visited. The members of the State Department of Education expressed themselves well satisfied with the conditions they found and were delighted to note the remarkable improvement over conditions existing two years ago. The school building is now clean and in splendid condition. During the past year a furnace has been installed so that every room is comfortable, well heated and well ventilated.

The qualifications of the teachers have been raised and are now such as will meet the requirements of the North Central Association of Accredited Schools. This school is now assured placement on the accredited list.

The honor system has been established and the pupils show a fine spirit in responding to this responsibility placed upon them. The patrons recently organized a parent-teacher association, the first in the county schools this year. Mr. Robert Hurt, member of the local board of Education, is the President, and Miss Mildred Peters Secretary. It is the plan for this organization to make particular study of community problems, needs and interests. The first work to be undertaken will be to provide additional equipment for the home economics department. There are about seventy-five members in the association.

Mr. T. P. McCollister is the city Superintendent and Mr. W. J. Cloop is the Principal of the High School. Under the leadership of these two men, the work is progressing exceedingly well. There are now one hundred and ten pupils in the first six grades. Last year there were about one hundred. There are now fifty-seven pupils in the Junior and Senior High School. Last year there were 85. The work is well organized, both teachers and pupils showing a fine spirit of co-operation.

In the home economics classes there are thirty-nine girls enrolled. The girls will organize the local branch of the State Association of Vocational Agriculture and Home Economics and will send a demonstration team to compete in the State contest to be held at the Industrial Meet during State Teachers' meeting, Nov. 22 to 24th in Albuquerque. Miss Lola Wright is in charge of the department.

This is one of the schools in which Mrs. Blaney has made particular effort to improve school conditions and as a result the school shows one hundred per cent improvement, in the condition of the building, qualifications of the teachers and the spirit of the pupils and

the community.

Consolidation.

In visiting the schools, it has been found that in many of the districts consolidation has been effected and adequate transportation facilities provided. At Corona there is an inter-county consolidation of districts in Lincoln and Torrance counties. Three trucks are used at this school. At Ancho there was a re-districting to include Tecolote, placing this village in the same district as Ancho. The children are brought from Tecolote to Ancho in trucks.

At Capitan transportation is furnished the children of school district No. 31.

It is the plan for Mr. Conway to continue to visit schools with Mrs. Blaney the remainder of the week.

Reporter.

The above article which has been furnished this paper by a correspondent and is certainly very complimentary to the Capitan schools and will be greatly appreciated by all connected with or interested in it. We only notice one or two things that deserve to be said about the splendid condition of the school omitted in the article. As credit should be given where it justly belongs, we here make a short statement. The credit for the splendid condition of the Capitan school is due in a much larger measure to the local school board, headed by Robert A. Hurt, than to any one else. In the first place the board saw that much improvement and repairs were needed on the building and grounds. They planned what they wanted and by persistent efforts secured from the school fund sufficient money to accomplish their purpose, and we now see the splendid results. The selection of the splendid corps of teachers now in the school was made by the local board. Prof. McCollister, the superintendent, was the selection of Mr. Hurt. The other teachers were selected by Mr. Hurt and Prof. McCollister, with the endorsement of the board, and we have their good judgment in evidence. The Lincoln Co High School at Capitan has not been provided with transportation to bring students in from the country as several other schools have been. It will be seen from the above article that Corona has been provided with three trucks to take the children in from the country to school. Ancho with trucks, and Lincoln has been provided with two cars to bring the children to school. What has been done for Capitan, the town where the Lincoln County High School is located? The children are brought in from the country to school in a hack drawn by two ponies. Why this discrimination, and who is responsible for it. Let the blame be placed where it belongs.

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
